

Clean Water is Topic of Iosco SCD Annual Meeting April 17

Water pollution prevention will be an important topic at the 17th annual meeting of Iosco Soil Conservation District, to be held Thursday, April 17, 6:00 p. m., at Tawas Area High School.

Harry Krueger, ISCD chairman, states that persons wishing to attend the dinner and program are requested to make advance reservations. This may be done no later than April 11 by telephoning 362-3449.

Two directors are to be elected to the district board at 7:30 p. m., followed by an award to the outstanding cooperator for 1969, plus awards to essay, scrapbook and box display winners.

Feature attraction of the program will be an address by Robert W. Parker, district engineer for the Michigan Water Resource Commission.

Parker's job is one of varied activities, primarily dealing with water quality standards in streams and serves as water basin engineer for this area.

He investigates areas of probable pollution, either because of a letter directed to his department or upon request of any local governmental unit.

In addition, Parker checks out industrial operations as relating to discharge of wastes to either a stream or wastewater treatment plant. Better methods of handling or processing this discharge are reviewed with the operators of plants and businesses.

The water resources commission runs periodic sample checks of streams in the area to test the water standards and by this method, can readily detect any deviation from the standard—controlling it by contacting the source or by eliminating it.

Parker is a chemical engineer which makes him familiar with the various chemicals used by businesses or industry. When these chemicals react, become difficult or are known to be able to cause a problem, Parker takes whatever action is necessary to prevent the occurrence.

Wastewater treatment plants are reviewed by Parker for any problems encountered in the operation. Any suspicious activity relating to a stream affecting water

quality for a fisherman, boater, bather or a water supply problem from a health point of view is thoroughly checked by Parker.

Public relations is a large item in his job of controlling stream standards, in that he must be able to approach various persons for information relating to a stream problem and also to make more persons aware of what constitutes any problem in a stream.

"We cannot emphasize enough the importance of preserving our water supply," states Krueger. "This program should be of concern to all residents of the county and the committee takes this opportunity to extend an invitation to all interested citizens to attend this annual meeting."

Businessmen Hear Talk on Wurtsmith AB

Col. E. F. DeHan, commander at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, was guest speaker at the Thursday noon luncheon of Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

The base commander told businessmen that, from a commercial standpoint, Wurtsmith has a daily operational cost of about \$100,000. Of the total annual expense of \$3,600,000, salaries amount to about 2.6 million dollars.

DeHan pointed out that much of the business was going to metropolitan areas further south and encouraged area businesses to meet this competition.

Insofar as actual military spending is concerned on the base, practically everything is purchased right in the local area through competitive bidding.

A report from Coho City Marina stated that representatives of that firm and the special coho committee had distributed 65,000 brochures at four different sport and boat shows in the Midwest since January. It was estimated that about two million persons had attended shows at Chicago, Illinois; Cincinnati and Cleveland, Ohio, along with the Detroit show in March.

Local representatives were on hand for the Indianapolis, Indiana, show held April 6, using facilities of Eastern Michigan Tourist Association.

It has been estimated that if only two percent of the persons visiting the Tawas booth decide to fish for coho here, the area will be swamped with fishermen.

Council Takes 'Wait and See' Stand Before Hiring Patrolman

With an eye on a proposed 1969-70 budget which is already \$18,000 higher than last year, Tawas City Council—with a tie-breaking vote by the mayor—decided not to hire an additional policeman at its regular meeting Monday night.

Police Chief George Westcott appeared before the council and requested that an additional patrolman be hired for the coming year. He said that his duties required up to 60 hours a week, at times, and pointed out that additional help was needed during the coming tourist season.

Anticipated budget as presented two weeks ago was \$148,660, with receipts of \$149,400. By elimination of two part-time patrolmen and hiring a full-time man at \$5,200, the budget would be \$151,208.

Councilmen pointed out that an additional 1½ mills would be levied to meet the budget as presented two weeks ago and did not know where the additional money could be obtained for a patrolman.

While admitting that fine money should have no reflection on the need for an additional patrolman, councilmen pointed out that revenue from fines had dropped considerably since the start of the year. As the result of forming the new district court, the city receives a smaller share of fine money than under the old justice court system.

During the first three months of 1969, the city received \$290 in fine money, as compared to \$600 last year. In addition, the city paid out \$157.50 in attorney fees to prosecute the above cases, while an attorney was not necessary last year.

Alderman Martin Welna called for a vote on the question, which resulted in a three-three tie. Voting in favor of hiring an additional patrolman were Aldermen Frank Ahonen, Clark Tanner and Welna. Voting against the proposition were Aldermen Cecil Cabbie, Howard Hatton and John St. James.

In casting the tie-breaking vote, Mayor R. A. Rollin Sr. said he was voting no "until I see the money." He indicated, however, that the question could be again discussed before formal adoption of the new budget.

A public hearing is to be held on the 1969-70 budget April 21, 7:30 p. m., at the city hall. All residents interested in operation of the city are urged by the council to attend this meeting.

In other business, a report from the park board indicated that the grandstand at the baseball diamond would be repaired for the coming season and that it would be removed in the fall, to be replaced by a new backstop. The park board indicated that a four-

foot-high chain link fence is to be installed around the old railroad car in the city park. An inspection is to be made of the willow tree on the east side of the park to determine if it is safe to remain standing. The park board's budget this year is \$3,270.

Nunn established his hardware and sporting goods business at East Tawas in January 1941, occupying a location formerly held by the A&P Store.

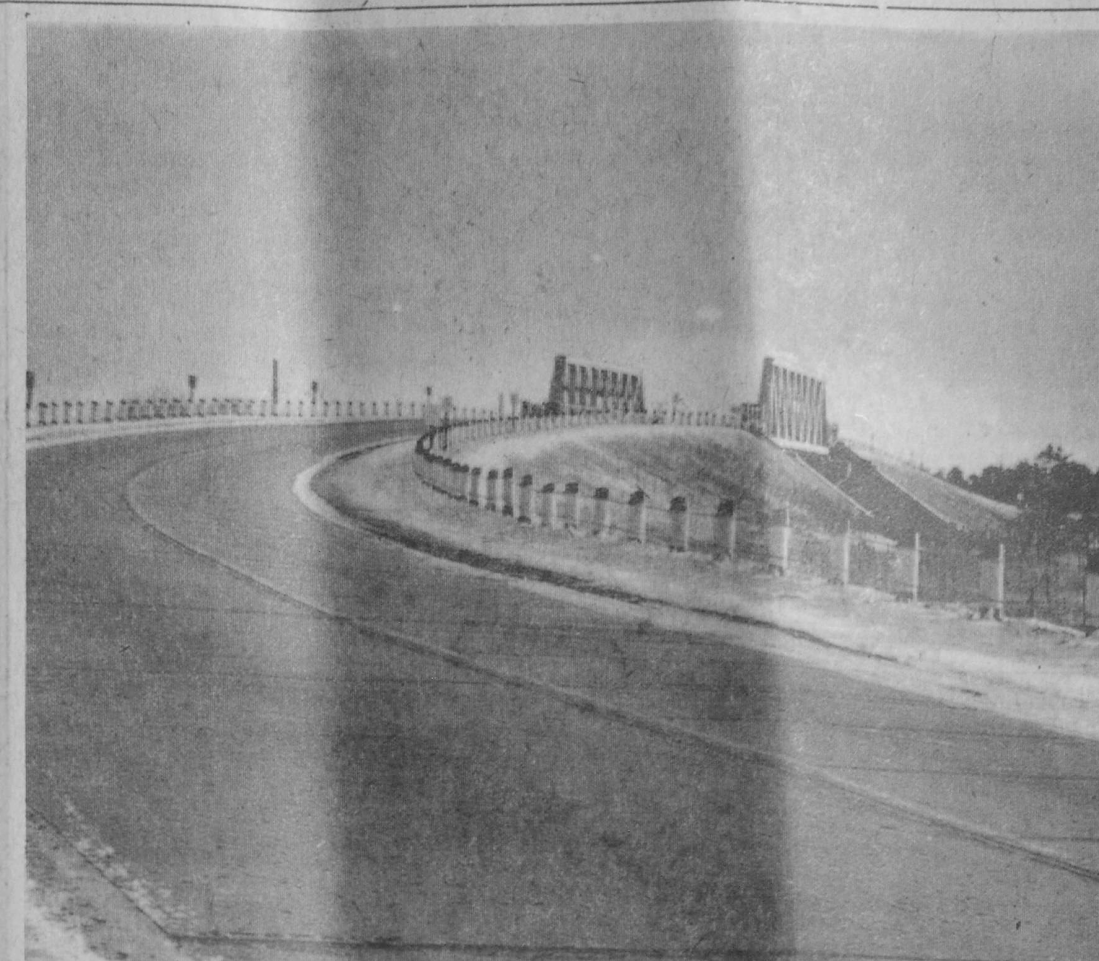
Before entering the hardware business, Nunn, a native of Hale, had spent 10 years with the Michigan Department of Conservation. Nunn was appointed to the state highway commission by former Gov. George Romney in 1964 and reappointed in 1967 for a four-year term ending in 1971. He is past president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce and the County Roads Association of Michigan.

Mr. and Mrs. DeBeau, who said they hope to have their new Tawas Hardware open for business by April 15, have lived in the Tawas area for the past 10 years.

DeBeau, a member of the Tawas Area School faculty, and his wife have been engaged in several business activities, at one time owning Four Seasons Resort and Four Seasons Market north of East Tawas. DeBeau is a radio announcer at WIOS and Mrs. DeBeau is a real estate saleswoman.

The DeBeaus live on Bay Drive, Tawas City. They have two children, Mark, 18 and a daughter, Mitzi, age 14.

New AuSable River Bridge Being Surveyed

A highway department survey crew has almost completed advance surveys for construction of a new bridge to carry US-23 over the AuSable River at AuSable, according to W. D. Nunn, vice chairman of the Michigan State Highway Commission.

Construction contracts are scheduled to be let in April 1970. Cost of the modern, concrete deck

and steel girder structure is estimated at more than \$400,000, including engineering costs and acquisition of right-of-way required for approaches.

The new bridge will replace an older steel truss bridge built in 1932 and last repaired in 1965, but will be located just east of the present site. The plan will permit use of the old bridge while construction is under way.

Load restrictions have been in force on the existing bridge since the last annual inspection revealed some deterioration.

Under a policy adopted by the state highway commission in 1967, all bridges on the state truckline system are subject to annual inspection. All truss bridges of the type in use at AuSable are scheduled for replacement as rapidly as priorities will permit.

Design for the new AuSable bridge will not begin until results of the survey have been analyzed in Lansing. Upon completion of their work

at the AuSable site, the six-man survey crew, led by Jerry Wilcox, survey chief, will move on to similar studies at bridge sites at Omer, Alabaster and Hale.

Board of Appeals Schedules Hearing

Tawas City Zoning Board of Appeals will hold a hearing Friday, 7:30 p. m., on an appeal entered by the Rev. C. H. Synmons, who wishes to conduct a trailer sales next to his motel on US-23.

According to Reginald Blubitz, superintendent of the department of public works, the property is zoned B-2 commercial which allows location of a trailer sales. A permit is necessary, however, according to the zoning ordinance.

Acting on the board will be Howard Hatton (chairman), Edwin Habermehl, Donald Watson, Ervin Ruppert and Arnold Bronson.

Council Appoints Industrial Group

On recommendation of the city planning commission, Tawas City Council has appointed a three-man industrial authority to promote the city's industrial park property on Ninth Avenue.

Named to the authority were John St. James, representing the city council; Hugo Keiser and George Myles, representing the Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

School Board Reaffirms Stand on Denying Tenure to Teacher

At a special hearing Monday night, Tawas Area Board of Education unanimously upheld its recent action in denying tenure next term to a member of the school faculty.

At a meeting two weeks ago, the board voted to send official notification to Alfred Tyo, a high school physical science teacher, that he would not be offered tenure in 1969-70 nor be re-employed, according to terms of the state teacher tenure act.

Reasons for his not being offered tenure, as outlined by Supt. Reynold Mick, were that Tyo discussed and brought things into his classroom other than that which pertained to his teaching of high school physical science—namely, politics during the November general election campaign.

The school claims that political activity in the classroom is contrary to its contract with Tawas Area Education Association.

Accompanying Tyo and assisting in presenting his grievance to the board of education was Robert Erickson, teacher representative for TAEA.

In a prepared statement to the

board of education, Erickson maintained that Tyo was not granted tenure for three reasons:

1. That he engaged in discussion in classroom not immediate to the subject matter;
2. Subjects of discussion were not in harmony with political ideas of the community;
3. That Tyo drove a truck to school which was painted in a manner that was distasteful to the administration.

(Tyo was a supporter of George Wallace in his campaign for president last fall and the truck was painted with political slogans.)

Erickson said that all of the above three points had political overtones. He asked what is education and the role of a teacher in education? He believed that no student was denied his right to an education in Tyo's classroom.

Erickson also pointed out that some classroom materials had not arrived until about 12 weeks after the start of the fall school term and that classes were conducted without these materials.

He thought it was quite natural for students to ask questions about the general election and that they brought up questions concerning Wallace's campaign for

president, as well as asking questions concerning the John Birch Society.

"We know that the board of education acted on rumor and that there is no documentary evidence concerning Tyo's political activities," said Erickson. "We do not hold that the rumor is valid and ask just how much does the principal's evaluation count toward granting tenure to a teacher?"

Erickson pointed out that Tyo had received an excellent evaluation from the high school principal, which cited his willingness to cooperate with the school, his excellent classroom procedure and excellent rapport with students. The teacher representative felt that a principal would have a better opportunity to evaluate a teacher than a superintendent.

The grievance asked that if the offense was so serious, why was Tyo not notified until three months after the alleged offense took place?

Erickson said that the reason for asking for the hearing was that the board of education had heard only one side of the story. "We are sorry that there were no

questions or no comments concerning our point of view at the hearing," said Erickson following the session.

The teacher representative said that TAEA would now press its grievance, asking for mediation, on the following four points: 1. Violation of the master contract; 2. Violation of Tyo's rights as a citizen; 3. Denial of academic freedom in the classroom; 4. Denial of freedom of speech.

Erickson said that TAEA was not contending that the school had violated the state tenure law, which allows the school one year in which to either affirm or deny tenure to a teacher. He said, rather, that the board did not reach its decision based on adequate grounds, as specified above.

Tyo indicated following the meeting that steps were now being taken to have a third party mediator come in, hear both sides of the controversy and make recommendations.

In the event that a settlement is not reached, Tyo indicated that his next step would be channeled through the circuit court to determine if the board of education had acted within the law.

Kuerbitz Tops Roy Bergeron in Lone Contest

Only mild interest was shown in Monday's annual spring election in Tawas City. Some 136 voters cast ballots in the election which had only one contest.

The lone race was in the Second Ward where Arnold Kuerbitz, Republican, defeated his Democratic opponent, Roy Bergeron, 51-25.

Kuerbitz, in his first bid for public office, is a freight conductor for the Detroit and Mackinac Railway. Bergeron is manager of the local secretary of state's office.

Other officers re-elected were R. A. Rollin Sr., mayor, 19-58-29 for a total of 106; Mary Byrd, treasurer, 20-57-31 for a total of 108; Walter C. Nelson, clerk, 19-59-35 for a total of 113.

Totals for ward candidates included Clark Tanner, alderman, 20, and Benjamin F. Brewer, supervisor, 19, First Ward; Frank Ahonen, alderman for one year, 57, and John St. James, alderman for two years, 59, Second Ward; Cecil Cabbie, alderman, 29, and Donald Watson, supervisor, 29, Third Ward.

Watson will be holding his first term of public office in Tawas City, succeeding C. S. Everett.

East Tawas Voters Were Busy Writing Names on Ballots

Richard Moss and R. E. McElheron were re-elected as write-in candidates Monday at East Tawas and a third write-in candidate nearly upset the incumbent Third Ward alderman.

Moss received 26 of 39 votes in the First Ward, while McElheron had 20 of 36 votes in the Second Ward. Neither of the two candidates filed petitions for the election, but decided to be candidates when there were no other nominees for the offices.

Charles Schreck, with 25 votes for Third Ward alderman, was nearly upset by Merton Killely, who received 21 write-in votes.

All other candidates were elected without opposition.

Whittemore Had Good Turnout; Elect Goupil Mayor

A good turnout of voters Monday saw Basil Goupil, Democrat, defeat John Valent, Republican, for the mayor's post at Whittemore.

Goupil received 87 votes to Valent's 41. He succeeds George Blust, who did not seek re-election.

About 57 percent of the registered voters went to the polls, with 128 out of 225 voters casting ballots. Other candidates, all Democrats, were elected without opposition.

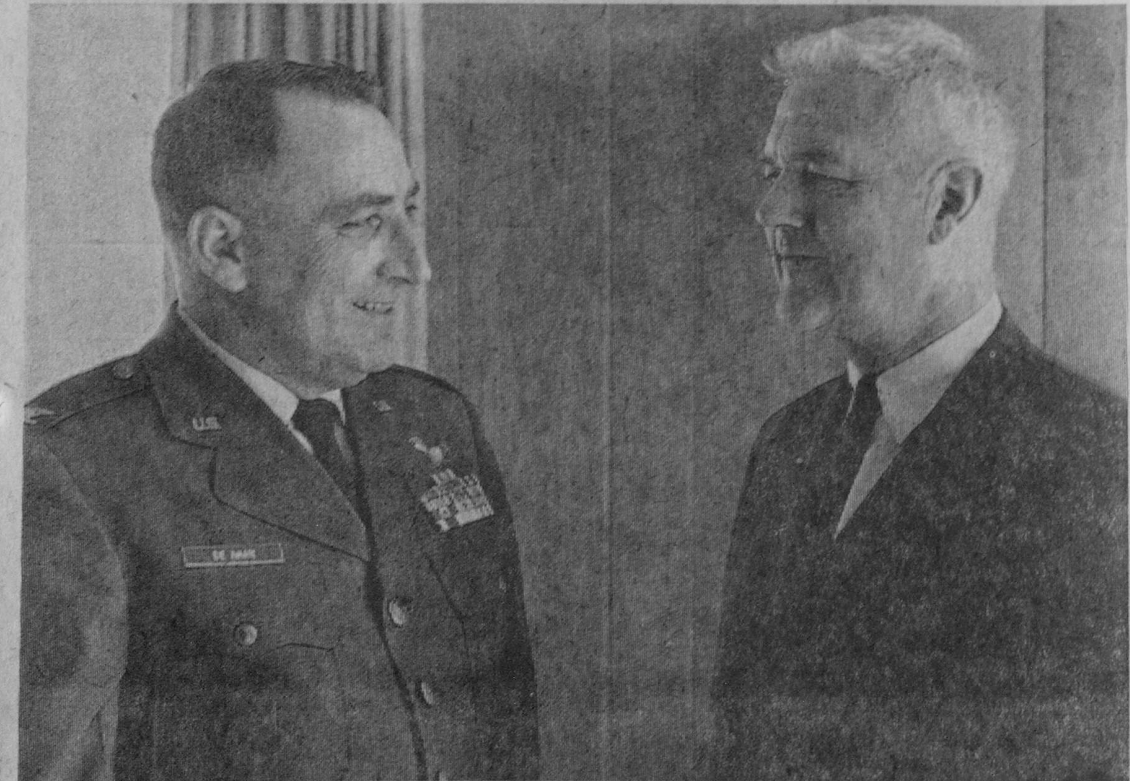
Tawas City Sets April 23-25 as Cleanup Days

Veterans With Disability May Apply for Insurance

Veterans eligible for special GI insurance because of service connected disabilities may now apply for this coverage any time within a year after notification by the Veterans Administration of their disability rating.

Robert M. FitzGerald, manager of the Detroit VA regional office, said that previously application had to be made within a year after VA's determination of the disability rating. He emphasized that the year starts from the date on the VA notification, not the day the veteran receives it.

The coverage is under the National Service Life Insurance program and provides policies of up to \$10,000 for men disabled in service, who often have difficulty getting commercial insurance. It is in addition to converted Servicemen's Group Life Insurance for which veterans may apply after separation from service.

Mr. FitzGerald said that for the disabled veteran to be eligible for NSLI coverage he must be in good health except for his service-connected disability.

Veterans may convert SGLI regardless of disabilities or health condition. They must apply within 120 days after discharge to one of the nearly 600 companies VA has approved to handle converted SGLI policies.

Maximum coverage under this program is also \$10,000. Thus, a disabled veteran eligible for both NSLI and a low-cost converted SGLI policy may be covered up to \$20,000, according to this release issued by the VA.

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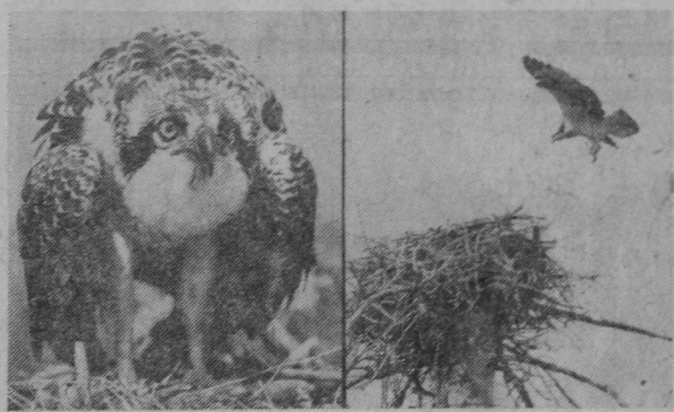
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Ospreys in State Threatened By Chemicals, Says WSU Biologist



The output of the osprey's nest is too meager to assure his future in the State of Michigan, despite the work of birdlovers.

DETROIT—"Endangered in Michigan" is the phrase which applies today to the osprey, one of the State's graceful hawks, especially appreciated because he does no harm to domestic creatures.

The serious threat to this bird is viewed with regret by Dr. William Thompson, Wayne State University biologist who is an expert on Michigan birds and president of the Michigan Audubon Society.

Far from being unwanted, the beautiful and interesting osprey is appreciated by bird watchers and recently has been offered aid by the famous society which Dr. Thompson heads. But this species may be dying out in the State nevertheless.

It's not hunters who are giving him the most trouble, says Dr. Thompson, though an uninformed and lawless gun carrier does from time to time pick one off.

"The osprey's bag of troubles comes from two sources," he says. "First, his nest sites are disappearing. Second, ospreys eat mostly fish, and the female is apparently ingesting with her fish certain chemicals that make her eggs thin shelled and almost unhatchable."

This last-mentioned phenomenon is giving trouble not only to the osprey but to his more famous cousin, the American eagle. Both apparently take in the same unwanted "birth control" chemicals with fish from Michigan waters.

"It's like having to take the pill" whether you want it or not," the biologist explains.

Apparently the wide use of insecticides in Michigan, especially along the fruit-growing coasts, has caused fish to be chemically dangerous to the birds' reproductive systems.

The nesting-site problem may have an easier solution. It was alleviated to some extent during the past several seasons by the erection of nesting platforms at Fletcher Pond in the Dead Stream areas of Roscommon and Missaukee Counties.

The birds built their nests on the platforms and laid their eggs, but the observed losses were great, both from unhatched eggs and from the death of weakened fledglings, the volunteer bird helpers reported.

Sergej Postupalski, a Wayne alumnus, and Stephen Stackpole, working under Michigan Audubon Society auspices, arranged the platforms. The natural dead-tree nesting sites used by the birds have become less plentiful as dead trees in the area have decayed or been cut down.

"The osprey is protected in Michigan by a blanket statute that prohibits destroying hawks, eagles and owls. But unless a solution is found to the chemical 'pill' the osprey may die out in Michigan," Dr. Thompson says.

Since ospreys are widely distributed in other areas, this will not mean extinction for the species, but a loss for Michigan birdlovers, he says.

Find Body of Missing Man in Arenac County

board indicated that more shrubs are to be removed this spring at the cemetery. Additional lots are to be staked out.

The planning commission recommended that no new commercial enterprises be given a certificate to occupy a building unless it is served by water or sewer, when available at the site.

On complaint of two residents, the council is to contact General Cable Television to determine if cable service can be made available along US-23 south of Mathews Street. A complaint of interference from a citizens band radio is also to be investigated.

Edward Savage, 140 Roberta Drive, appeared before the board and complained that a ditch located between North Park Acres Subdivision and Huron Gardens Subdivision was a safety hazard. He said that water had backed up into the ditch behind his property to a level of about three feet. The council directed the city superintendent to investigate a court ruling on this property several years ago to determine status of the private drain.

Paul Sullivan, 126 Tim Court, appeared before the council and asked that consideration be given to improving streets in the above subdivisions, both located north of the baseball diamond. He said that the streets were muddy in inclement weather and dusty during the summer. He felt that the property would develop much faster and, at the same time, help to increase the city's valuation, if the streets were hard surfaced.

On recommendation of the water board, the council sent a letter to the East Tawas Council inquiring as to progress on enlarging the water main between the filtration plant and the Tawas City pumping station. The council asked that immediate consideration be given to this project in order that Tawas City would not have to utilize its deep wells during the summer months, as well as for expansion of water use in this community. A similar request is to be made before the joint East Tawas-Tawas City Water Board, which controls operation of the water filtration plant at East Tawas.

A request is to be made to Consumers Power Company to re-survey its power line along one section of Bay Drive in order that poles be placed nearer to the edge of the street right-of-way. It was stated that the street could not be improved in the future because power poles extended from eight to 10 feet into the street.

Hospital Lists Changes in House Rules for Visitors

Effective April 1, Tawas Hospital announces some changes in the house rules governing visiting hours and in age limit for children. 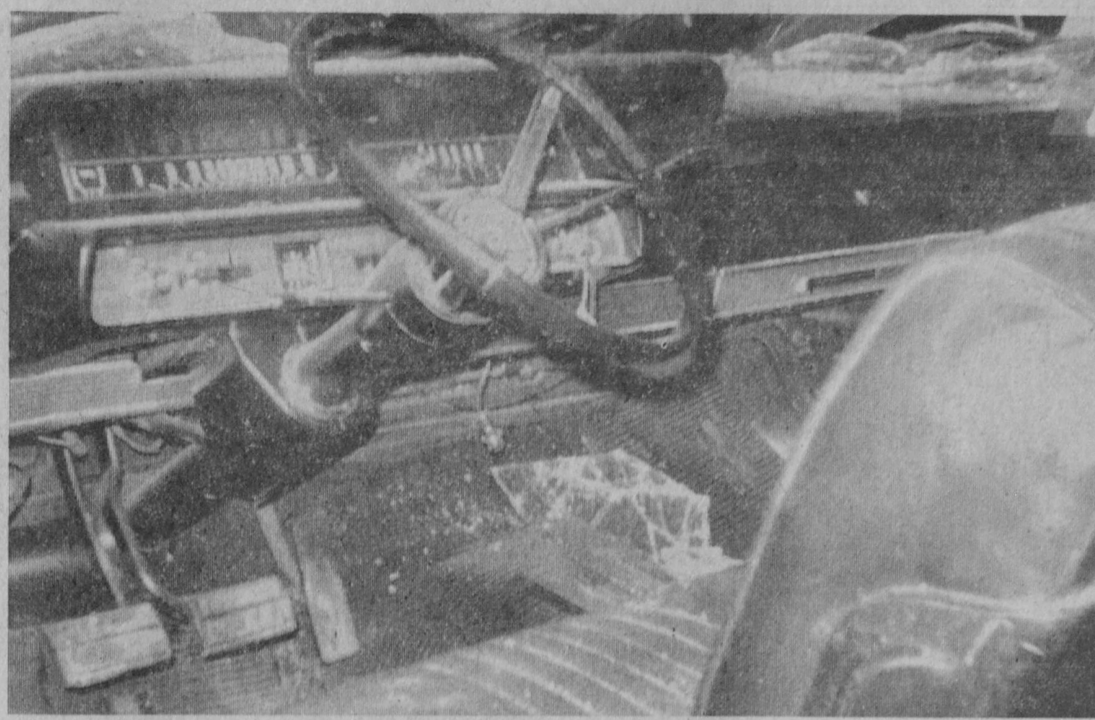

W-P Millage Vote April 14

Whittemore - Prescott Area School voters will be asked to approve a three-mill operational tax levy for two years at an election to be held Monday, April 14.

Polling place, to be open from 10:00 a. m. until 8:00 p. m., will be located in the auditorium at the high school.

Three years ago, school district electors voted to levy two mills of operating tax for a period of three

years. At that time, these two mills, along with the 9.5 mills allocated, was enough for the district to collect full state aid revenue.

This year, the school is faced with the two mills expiring and the district not having enough mills to collect full state aid. All indications are that the state aid act will require 12 mills to collect full state aid. A renewal of the two mills would not qualify for full state aid and the board of education, instead of asking for a renewal of two mills for three years, is asking for a levy of three mills for two years.

Indications at this time are that, if approved, the proposed millage would qualify Whittemore-Prescott Area School for full state aid.

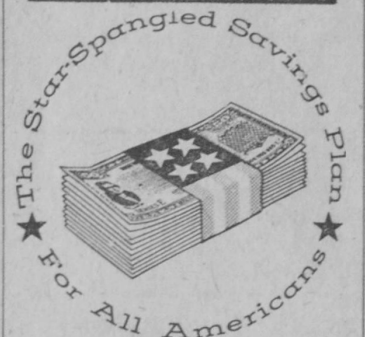

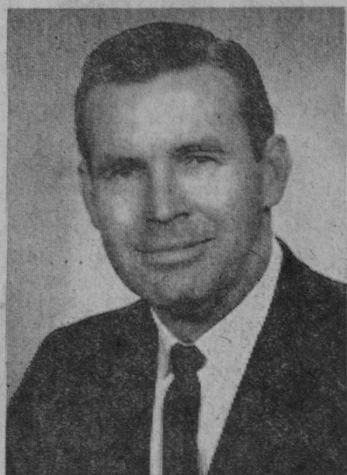

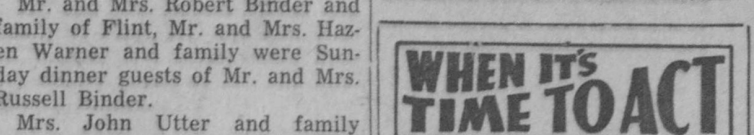

HINTS FOR TEENAGERS

MERRY MAKING

Fashion is dancing to a gypsy tune. Come join the merry-making. This is the season to indulge in fantasies of colorful fabrics and riotous trims.
The making is merry when you start with this "peasant" blouse and dirndl skirt (Simplicity 8015). The ruffled edge of each gingham sleeve is just begging for matching rick rack. The rippling hem of the skirt is turned on by zigzaggy trim keeping time with the checks of the blouse.

Rick Rackery

No two gypsies ever dress alike, so let the one in your soul sew to her own tune. The picture shows ways to use rick rack horizontally. Or, you might make verticle rick rack strips running from the waist to the hem of the skirt. Repeat the same skirt pattern in a print fabric and do the blouse in a solid color, with long sleeves. Trim these sleeves with a rick rack braid, sewn along the top from shoulder to wrist. This braid is made by interlocking two strips of rick rack in colors to match the print of the skirt.

Peeking Petticoats

Another gypsy trick is letting your petticoats show. Gypsy girls wear their whole wardrobe of skirts one on top of another; it saves on suitcases. 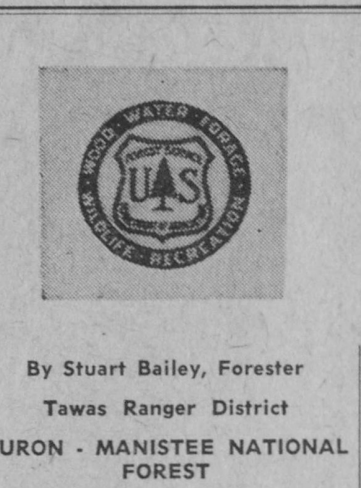

We have a new face in our midst on the second floor in the Federal Building. The man behind the face is Gary Marple, a zone engineer for the Huron National Forest. His jurisdiction covers the Harrisville, Mio and Tawas districts including 120 miles of existing road. He is responsible for maintenance of these existing roads and also construction of new roads and structures.

Two projects getting under way now is the rerouting of the River Road around Lumberman's Monument and the new road and bridge across the AuSable River at McKinley. These two projects are being contracted by private firms. Mr. Marple is responsible for seeing that the contractors follow the designs made by the forest service.
