## Jury Convicts Reed of Manslaughter

Alvin E. (Jack) Reed, 47, Union City, Oregon, was found guilty of manslaughter Friday by an Isosco Circuit Court jury of eight women and four men, which deliberated nearly four hours before bringing in a verdict.

Convicted of fatally shooting Mrs. Norma Williamson, 34, Whit-

temore, last December, Reed stood trial charged with first degree murder. The trial opened August 5.

In charging the jury at the conclusion of the trial, Judge Allan C. Miller told the panel it had one of five choices as to a final decision: First degree murder, second degree murder, manslaughter, not guilty or not guilty by reason of insanity.

Reed failed to post a \$25,000 bond set by Judge Miller and is being held at the Isosco County Jail. His case was referred to the department of corrections for presentence investigation. It is expected that Reed will be sentenced in about two weeks.

Defending Reed was Ogemaw County Probate Judge Raymond King. The state's case was handled by Pros. Atty. Kenneth Myles.

Officials at the county building believed Friday that this was the first murder case to go to an Isosco Circuit Court jury since October 1940.

## Board Reduces Fee Schedule to '66 Level

Living up to its stated promise at the last millage election, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night adopted a schedule which returned most fees to be charged high school students to the 1966 level.

As a means of helping to finance the school during its "austerity program" last year, fees for expendable materials and some classes were increased.

The new schedule for 1969-70 was set as follows:

Expendable materials returned to the 1966 level, \$2.50 per student as compared to \$7.50 last year; the 50-cent locker fee of last year was dropped; shop fee (excluding lumber) was returned to \$5, a drop of \$2.50; art supplies, reduced to \$4, a drop of \$2, but \$1 higher than 1966; drafting, now \$3, a drop of \$1, but \$1 higher than 1966; chemistry and physics breakage, returned to the 1966 level of \$1, a decrease of 50 cents from last year.

One new fee was added to the schedule. This calls for charging home economics students \$2.50 per year for materials used.

Remaining the same since 1966 were band uniform deposit, \$5, which is refunded to the students, and band instrument rental, \$5 per semester.

The fee for expendable materials used by elementary students is to be returned to the 1966 level of \$2.50, a \$5 decrease from last year. Hot lunch fees would be the same as last year, \$1.75 per week or 40 cents per lunch.

In other business, the board accepted bids on milk, bread, gasoline and fuel oil. A decision on successful bidders is to be made at the next meeting.

Mrs. Mildred Parsons was hired as head cook at the high school. She will be responsible for drawing up the school's master menu for the second semester. Menu for the first semester was prepared by Mrs. Harvey Welch prior to her retirement.

A new salary schedule was adopted giving cooks a five to six percent increase in salaries. Wages for cooks was raised by 10 cents per hour, giving head cooks \$1.89 per hour this year. For her extra work, Mrs. Parsons will receive \$2 per hour. First year help-

ers to receive \$1.50, experienced helpers are to receive \$1.68.

Upon recommendation of Mick, Edwin Peterson was hired for the custodian vacancy. He had been (See TA BOARD, page 6.)

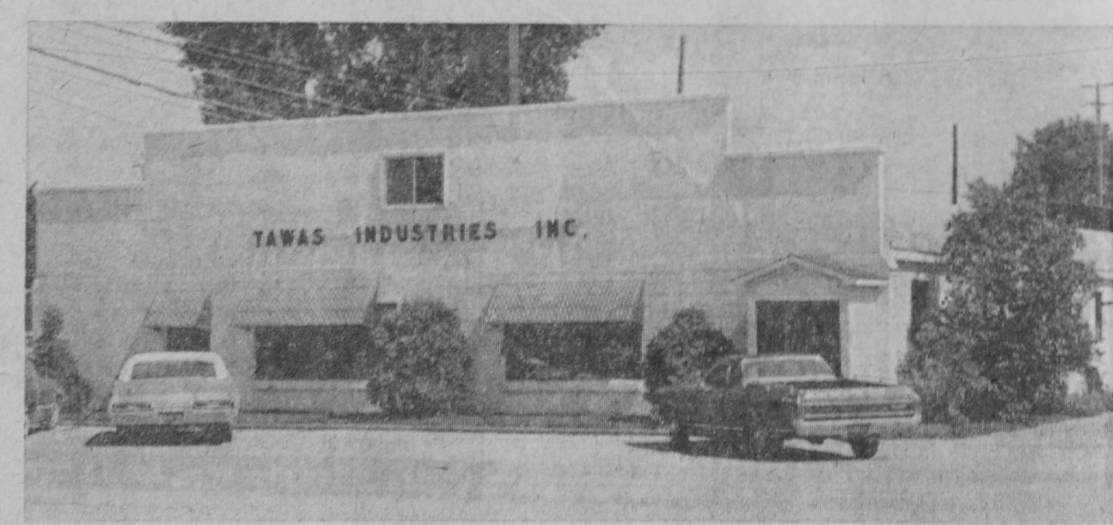
## Registration Days Set at TA School

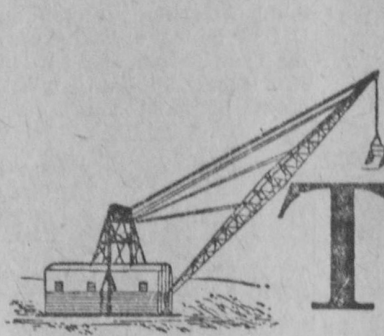
Seventh grade students open the registration on August 20, followed by eighth graders on August 21.

## DNR to Start Construction This Week

# Council OK's First Avenue Weir Site

Approval of a site at the south end of First Avenue for a coho weir was given Monday night by Tawas City Council. Work on installation of this temporary fish trap in the Tawas River is to start this week by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

This action was taken at a special meeting of the council, following several weeks of controversy concerning its proposed location. Representatives of the DNR asked for and the council approved, by a four to two roll call, a one-year agreement to allow the installation.

Appearing before the council were Troy Yoder, DNR district supervisor; John McGregor, regional fish supervisor; Charles Gunther, director of the Higgins Lake Training School, who has been named as the department's liaison agent with communities along Lake Huron.

A delegation of property owners residing in the First Avenue-First Street area was on hand to voice objection to the proposed location. Of particular concern to property owners was the possibility that large numbers of spectators would be attracted to the weir.

In opening the meeting, Mayor R. A. Rollin Sr., stated that additional information had been received by letter from the DNR.

T. R. Tucker, who has charge of land acquisition for the state, said in his letter that relatively few suitable locations had been found for a fish weir. Designation of sites was made by a feasibility review of a committee, including fish biologists, engineers and the DNR land appraiser.

"A peculiar problem of fish weir locations is the need for land control on both sides of the river, which requirement ruled out some otherwise feasible locations," said Tucker. "A further consideration was the necessity of permitting boat traffic through the weir structure."

Tucker said that after many contacts with officials and attorneys representing the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company, all consideration of use of any of its land, either for anchorage site or weir and loading site requirements was ruled out. "They quite properly point to their main corporate responsibility for operation of the railroad as safely as may be possible. Liability for railroad safety is their stated reason for not granting any easement or selling any land which might be otherwise suitable for a weir location," said Tucker.

After much search, Knox Jamison of the lands division selected and secured needed lease and option rights which would allow a weir and anchorage construction at the base of First Avenue.

"Minimum boat traffic interference with local navigation by weir operations should be a stated positive benefit of this location," said Tucker. "It is our belief and understanding that First Street bridge rather clearly marks the upward limits of larger, lakegoing craft. Only smaller boats will be expected to need passage through the weir."

As a matter of public information, Tucker noted that the present temporary structure will not

permit boat passage, but future structures will be so designed.

Another question which apparently was settled concerned the fact that the weir location was zoned residential.

A telephone conversation between Charles Leman of Vilcan, Leman and Associates, the city's planning consultants, and the city superintendent Monday indicated that from Leman's experience, a public agency such as the DNR did not have to abide by local zoning restrictions.

Reginald Bublitz, city superintendent, said that the city's zoning ordinance provides that public agencies could operate in any zoned district. Leman told Bublitz that legal opinions had borne this out in recent court decisions.

In answer to a question concerning use of the Bublitz-Pure Oil property west of Mathews Street as a possible location, McGregor said this site had been ruled out because of inadequate anchorage on the proposed use of Hamilton Street, which is 60 feet wide. He said that the weir would require an anchorage of between 200 and 300 feet.

Mayor Rollin stated that further investigation by the city revealed that Hamilton Street did not extend to the river. A check of the

plat and other records indicated that the street did not cross the railroad tracks.

Yoder said "we have a run of salmon coming and there is nothing else to do but to remove the surplus fish." He felt that the problem of allowing the fish to die

in the river would be much greater than any possible inconvenience created by the fish weir.

The DNR's district supervisor also stated that the novelty of the coho salmon had probably worn off and he did not expect the same problems here as were experienced

on the Lake Michigan side during the past two years. He said that coho would be returning to many different streams on both sides of the state, rather than a concentration in one area.

McGregor again stressed that weir site on First Avenue would

be completely fenced off and that the public would not be invited to the facility.

Although the DNR has an option to purchase three lots for its site, it is negotiating for an anchorage point on private property (See WEIR, page 6.)

## Two New Ambulances Now Serving County

Delivery of a second new ambulance was received this week by an area organization of local government units, which was formed recently to provide emergency ambulance service to most of Isosco County.

The first delivery was made a week ago and the ambulance was immediately dispatched to its new location at the Plainfield Fire Hall, where it will serve the entire western side of the county.

The second ambulance is to be stationed temporarily at the Isosco County Jail. It replaces a used ambulance, which is to be used for "backup" purposes.

The two new ambulances, along with the used ambulance, cost \$22,000, of which one-half is to be borne by the 12 participating governmental units. Application has been made for a federal highway-safety grant to finance the remainder.

The two new ambulances are equipped identically with the latest improvements in oxygen and radio equipment. Each ambulance is capable of carrying four cots.

Until October 1, when Tawas Hospital is to take over operation of the service, the ambulance at the county jail is to be operated by Orle Hodge. The ambulance at Hale is to continue operation under a volunteer organization.

A group of 26 volunteers from Hale completed a basic first aid course last week under Deputy Sheriff Francis Block, a qualified American Red Cross instructor. In addition, four persons from East Tawas and two from Oscoda completed the same course.

Hale volunteers completing the course were William S. McKlusky, Lyle E. Bernard, Dennis Chrivia, Alta Chrivia, Frederick E. Cavery, James A. Mann, Harold L. Bannister, Ralph J. Shaw, Fred

Chrivia, who serves as township supervisor, said that a second class in first aid would start in the near future and that additional volunteers are being sought for this needed service.

Purchase of the ambulances has been handled by the City of East Tawas. City Clerk Fred Lomas said Monday that there were a lot of "little details to be attended to" and that emergency service was being provided on a temporary basis.

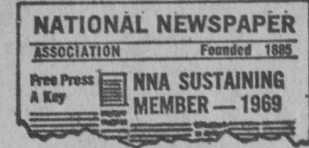

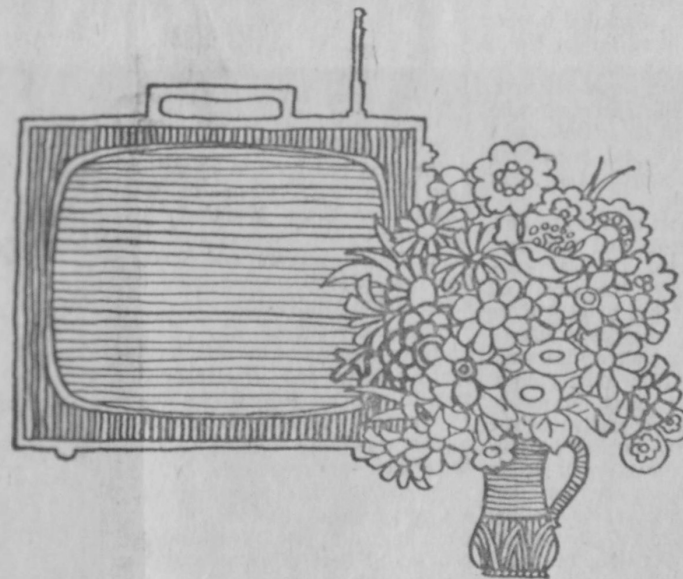

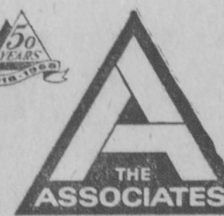

One of the best ways to avoid an accident is to let someone else take the wheel when you're emotionally upset, advises the Automobile Club of Michigan. Too frequently, the accident of 10 or 11 a.m. was caused at the breakfast table. In some cases, psychologists report, persons literally drive "blind" because of anger.

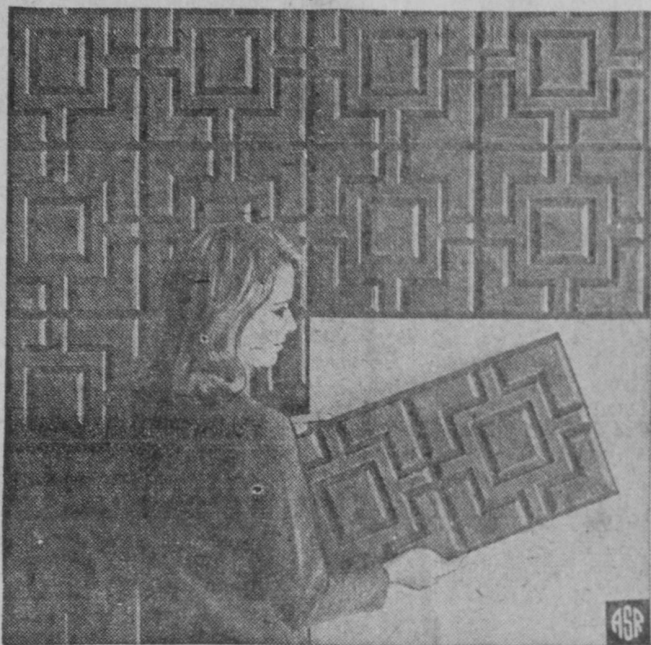

Prin. John Alexander announced that, with the hiring of a speech instructor, all vacancies on the faculty had been filled.

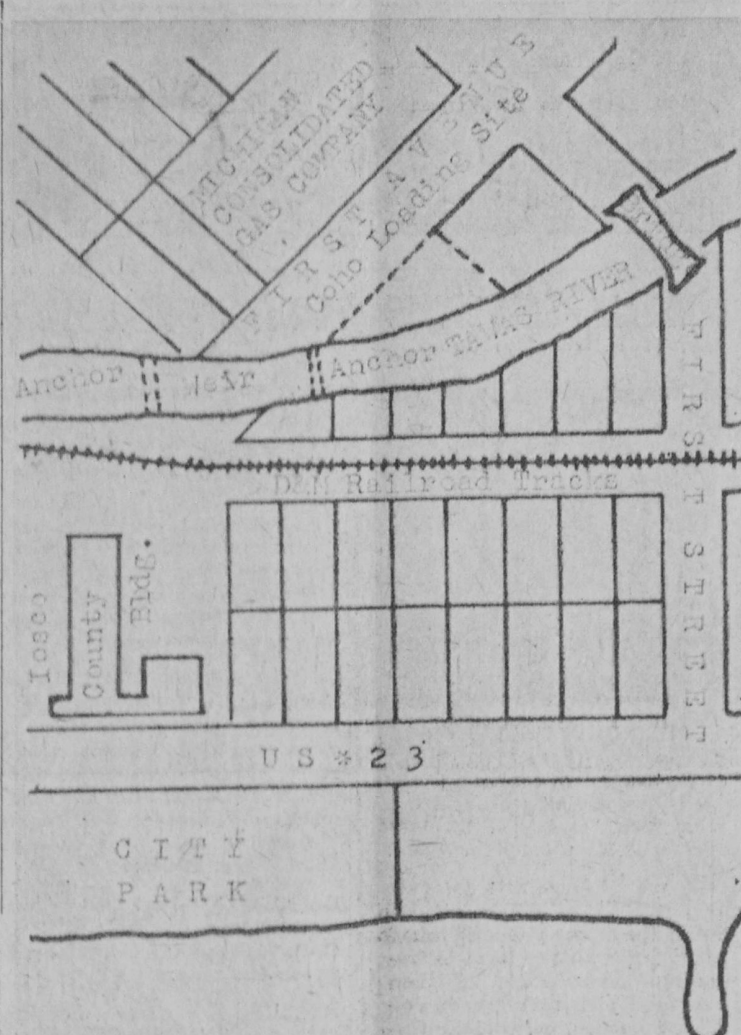
### Two Roll Overs

and has a one-year lease from the county for a second anchorage point, the DNR representatives stressed that the river to be constructed in the river this year would be temporary.

Yoder said that, ideally, the weir should be located at the mouth of the river, although there has been local concern over possible hindrance to boat traffic. "We started at the mouth and worked our way up to find a site," he said.

McGregor said that the DNR plans to leave the First Avenue site in its natural setting and would not denude it of trees. "Hopefully, it will look better than it is today," he said.

Yoder said that while Tawas Bay is an ideal sheltered location for coho fishing, the DNR is now looking for some tributary other than the Tawas River for future plants of coho salmon. "We want to bring these fish back to Tawas Bay and if we can find some other tributary to plant them, we will use it," he said.

In submitting a motion to the council to allow use of the First Avenue site, Alderman Howard Hatton pointed out that there were only two choices before the council. He felt that it was necessary to remove the fish before they died in the river and created an even more serious problem.

Hatton's motion was seconded by John St. James. Voting in favor were Frank Ahonen, Cecil Cabbie, Hatton and St. James. Opposing the measure were Martin Wellna and Clark Tanner.

According to a report in Sunday's Detroit Free Press, the Tawas may be one of several areas set up as "coho salmon handout centers" in the state. The report stated that the DNR plans to get rid of excess coho salmon by giving them away. Official action on this idea, one way or the other, is expected this week from the Michigan Conservation Commission.

### NROTC Exam. Set December 13

Vice Adm. Charles K. Duncan, chief of naval personnel, has announced that the 24th annual national competitive examination for the Regular Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps (NROTC) will be given December 13.

The regular NROTC program prepares a young man for a navy or marine corps commission while he is studying at one of the many civilian colleges and universities where NROTC units are established. All tuition, fees, uniforms and books are furnished by the navy, and the student receives \$50 per month subsistence allowance for not more than four years. During the summers between academic years, the student participates in interesting at-sea training periods as a midshipman. After successfully completing a baccalaureate level college course and all military requirements, he is commissioned in the regular navy or marine corps.

Eligible high school seniors and graduates should submit their applications before November 14. Application forms are available from high school counselors, the Navy Recruiting Office, Alpena, Michigan, or from the Chief of Naval Personnel (Pers-B6411), Department of the Navy, Washington, D. C. 20370.

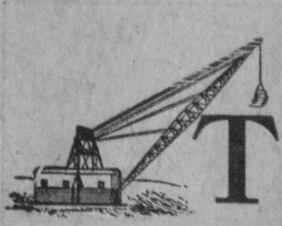

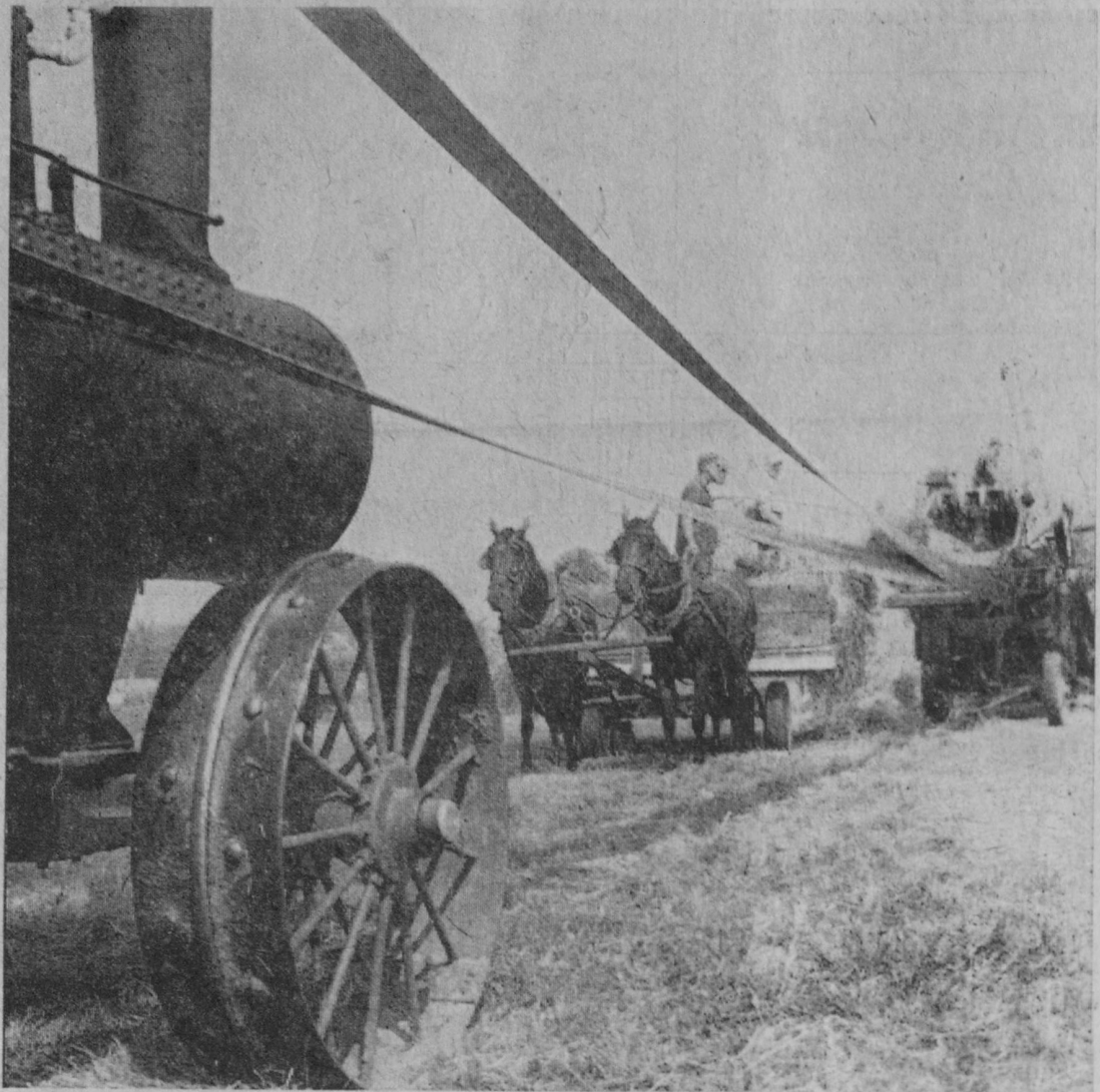

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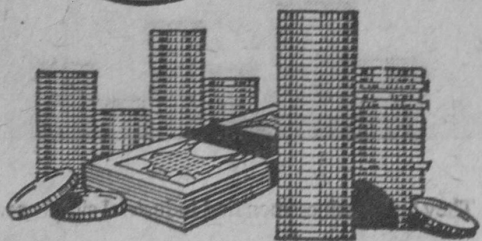

## New Process for Feeding Livestock

The least expensive nitrogen source for livestock, anhydrous ammonia, can now be mixed with corn silage to help farmers produce less expensive beef, milk and lamb chops, Marvin Davenport, county extension director, announces.

The patent pending process for suspending the anhydrous ammonia (a gas) in solution so it can be mixed with silage was developed by three Michigan State University scientists, Dr. Hugh E. Henderson, professor of animal husbandry; Dr. J. T. Huber, associate professor of dairy, and Dr. D. B. Pursler, associate professor of animal husbandry.

The corn silage additive they have developed has been given the trade name "ProSil."

The use of anhydrous ammonia as a protein source in livestock feed represents a significant development in ruminant nutrition, Doctor Henderson reported July 31 at a press conference at MSU.

He said urea is now the most commonly used nonprotein nitrogen source for livestock. But anhydrous ammonia is only one-third as expensive per unit of nitrogen.

Henderson explained that humans have to have virtually all of their nitrogen requirement supplied in the form of preformed amino acids. These are contained in proteins such as casein (milk protein) and meat proteins. But the ruminant—animals like the cow with four-compartment stom-

achs—have microorganisms (bacteria) that can incorporate nitrogen into amino acids. Therefore, they can be fed anhydrous ammonia mixed with corn silage and can convert the nitrogen into protein.

As far as the MSU scientists know, anhydrous ammonia must be mixed with corn silage, using the ProSil additive, in order to be effective. They warn farmers not to feed anhydrous ammonia directly to livestock. Further tests are being conducted to see if the anhydrous ammonia can be mixed in with grass or small grain silage or sorghum.

Reduce Heart Attack Risk  
College Study Finds Ideal Exercise



A new machine, the Exer-Cor Exerciser, used regularly in the home or office, can produce the kind of cardiovascular conditioning the body needs to combat heart disease — the nation's number one killer, according to a test conducted at San Diego State College.

The machine also takes away the danger of too much exercise, too rapidly performed, which can cause damage, too.

Aerobic exercise (literally, "with oxygen") when regularly performed, provides the rhythmic contracting and relaxing of blood vessels within the muscles that helps pump the blood back to the heart again. This does much to overrule the dangers of too much food, too much tension, and too little exercise — causes of atherosclerosis, and eventual heart attacks.

The San Diego State College tests were part of a ten-year physical fitness research program conducted by Dr. Fred W. Kasch, and John Boyer, M.D. and were performed by Dr. Anthony A. Succi. They showed that regular use of Exer-Cor can produce aerobic results comparable to strenuous

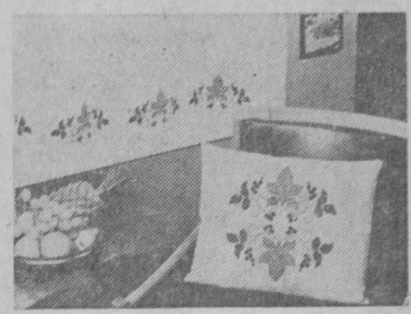
