## Study Expansion at East Tawas C. Park

Possible expansion of the city park is now being investigated by the East Tawas Council.

At Monday night's regular meeting, it was stated that federal participation in the form of a 50 percent grant may be available for expanding recreational use areas.

Discussed as a possibility for expansion was the purchase of property owned by Dr. Harold D. Jones, whose residence is located adjacent to the southwest boundary of the park.

According to Doctor Jones, the property is presently listed for sale and he has several prospective purchasers. He plans to leave the area in the near future. He said Tuesday that he had never before been contacted by the city concerning the purchase and that "time was now getting short."

Another possibility discussed was purchase of the pier and dockage area owned by Gordon MacAndrew, located behind the state police post. MacAndrew was present at the meeting and discussed with councilmen the possible purchase by the city.

In other business, it was reported that the board of appeals had denied a building application requested by William Look and Sons for construction of a paint and repair shop on Main Street. It was stated that such use did not conform with city ordinance and adjacent property owners objected to the change.

On recommendation of the park board, additional lights are to be placed in the parking lot at the city park.

## US-23 Parking Ban Effective September 8

Effective September 8, a little more than one mile of parking is to be removed on both sides of US-23 in Tawas City.

This notification came this week from R. A. Rigotti, traffic operations engineer for the Michigan Department of State Highways.

This action had been recommended by the Tawas City Council June 16, following a truck crash a week earlier which claimed the life of a Tawas Township sand and gravel business owner.

The council had acted on advice of City Police Chief George Westcott, who said that his department and the sheriff's department had policed 11 rear-end collisions in that vicinity since January 1, 1967.

Actual area in which parking is to be removed is on the south side of US-23 between the easterly limits of Tawas City and a point 400 feet west of First Street, on the North side of US-23 between the east city limits and First Street.

Rigotti said in his letter to the Tawas City Council that his division had made a study of the situation and that the highway commission had approved the action.

## 2 Bay City Youths Face Felony Charge

Two Bay City youths were charged with four felonies each after admitting being involved in a series of vandalisms which took place early Thursday morning from the Singing Bridge to Tawas City.

Arrested were Christopher L. Stutzman and Allan P. Osterhout, both 17. A 16-year-old juvenile was turned over to Bay County Probate Court authorities.

The boys were hitchhiking from Bay City and, when they could not get a ride, destroyed 31 mail boxes in the Singing Bridge area. A passing truck driver witnessed the action and notified state police at East Tawas.

A patrol car was dispatched to the area, but the boys had received a ride and were in Tawas City. After throwing a rock through the Barkman Lumber Company window and damaging a sign at the antique shop on M-55, the boys continued to Wajahn Floor Coverings. There, they broke out a window, entered the building and proceeded to pour paint on carpeting. Damage was estimated at \$2,411. They next broke into Capital Business Service and damaged the interior to the extent of \$346.

Apparently on their return to Bay City, the trio was arrested by state police west of Mathews Street.

Bond was set at \$2,500 each in district court. Stutzman demanded examination Monday morning before District Judge J. Richard Ernst, which was set for August 26. Osterhout waived examination

## Western Losco Hit Saturday by Storm

Western Losco County was hit by a damaging rain, wind and thunder storm Saturday afternoon, which at one time saw M-65 in Whittemore covered by more than one foot of water.

Extensive damage was reported in Burleigh Township, where high winds knocked down a field of corn at the Dornace Bellville farm, uprooted trees, damaged barns and other out buildings.

Bellville's rain measuring device indicated that 3½ inches of rain fell between 1:00 and 5:00 p. m. Saturday afternoon.

An estimated 25 or more cars stalled during the afternoon when motors were drowned out by hitting deep water on M-65. Heavy traffic on the major north-south route through Losco County was practically at a standstill for an hour during the height of the storm.

Basil Goupil, mayor of Whittemore, said the major difficulty with high water on M-65 was the fact that a storm sewer constructed by the state last year proved to be too small for removing such an extreme downpour of rain.

Basements in several homes on the west side of the highway were flooded.

The downpour canceled Saturday night's racing events at Whittemore Speedway, which was flooded with several inches of water standing in the infield. A threshing bee Saturday afternoon at the Earl Erickson farm south of west of Whittemore was cut short due to the storm.

Although the remainder of the county was not hit with such an intense storm, rain hampered the program during Grant Township's Pioneer Days. A barbecue scheduled Saturday evening at Sand Lake had to be moved inside the Grant Township Fire Hall. Fire Chief Ronald Ponke reported that more than 800 persons were served during the barbecue, which was about 100 more than served last year.

Lightning struck several trees in

the Whittemore area Saturday afternoon and shorted out the alarm at the Whittemore Fire Department.

During a break in the storm, several young people floated along M-65 on inner tubes and one resident turned heads of passing motorists by "catching" a pike from the deep water running along M-65.

## Council OK's Fence Across First Avenue

Approval was given Monday night by Tawas City Council for use of First Avenue as one anchor point for a coho weir being constructed in the Tawas River to trap coho salmon.

In addition to this action, the council authorized the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to construct a fence across First Avenue near its base on Tawas River to prohibit trespassing on the coho loading site during the spawning run expected in September.

The fence across the street, as well as the weir, are to be removed following the coho run.

At a special meeting last week, the council authorized the DNR to construct a coho weir at the base of First Avenue. This action followed weeks of discussion on the availability of other sites for such an installation.

Work started Monday by the DNR on preparing the site as a loading installation. A second anchor point for the weir is to be located about 200 feet upstream on private property.

In other business, the council held preliminary discussion on means of financing a proposed addition to the city garage which would house DPW equipment and possibly the fire department's water tanker. The council's finance committee is to meet next week with Supt. Reginald Bubitz to review the city's financial status.

Next meeting of the council will be Tuesday, September 2. The regular meeting date falls on Labor Day, which necessitated a change.

## Huron National Forest Marks 60th Birthday

Huron National Forest this year is observing its 60th anniversary.

A proclamation by Pres. Theodore Roosevelt established the Michigan National Forest on Feb-

ruary 11, 1909, later to be called Huron National Forest.

The bill creating the first forest was introduced by Cong. George A. Loud of Oscoda, a member of a prominent lumbering family which had once wrested a fortune from the banks of the AuSable.

But, the term "forest" at that time, was only a dream. Much of the land was sterile, blackened by repeated forest fires that had destroyed timber and soil. It was a challenge to the fledgling United States Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture and it was then just a dream of far-sighted conservationists that has today become a reality.

The first forest supervisor was S. M. Higgins, a former employee of the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Company. Shortly afterward, Higgins was replaced by the late William B. Piper, a Harvard forest graduate, who took over in 1911.

The first 13.5 acres of red pine were planted at Seven Mile Hill and Piper planted the first pine seedlings near Buck Creek and the site where now stands the Lumbermen's Monument.

The Silver Creek Nursery was established in 1912 and the Beal Nursery was established at East Tawas in 1915, which until World War II, produced millions of seedlings that are now tall forest trees.

People—more than a million annually—are users of the forest in some activity or another, including hunting, fishing, camping, canoeing, commercial wood pulp cutting and logging.

Huron and Manistee National Forests were consolidated in 1945 to form the Huron-Manistee National Forest with headquarters at Cadillac.

Myron L. Smith is Tawas District ranger for the Huron Nation-

al Forest with headquarters in the Federal Building, East Tawas. He has charge of managing more than 100,000 acres of national forest land in Iosco.

## Three Auto Crashes Hurt 7 Over Week-End

Seven persons received injuries in three accidents investigated by state police last week-end.

Five persons received injuries and were treated at Tawas Hospital following a three-car collision Sunday evening on US-23, south of Media Drive, Baldwin Township.

Police said that Leo F. Majchrycki, 43, Detroit, pulled out into traffic in an attempt to pass a truck ahead of him driven by Calvin W. Thornton, 59, Mikado. Majchrycki lost control of his car. The car slid around in a circle, crossed the north bound lane and rolled over.

Injured were Virginia Majchrycki, 45, Detroit; Nancy A. Barton, 18, Alpena, and two passengers in her car, Catherine Murphy and Kathy Zamer. Thornton received minor injuries.

Two persons, George and Irene Harmon, Mikado, received minor injuries Saturday afternoon when their car was struck on US-23 at Huron Street, Baldwin Township, by a car driven by Clifford J. Eppert, 26, East Tawas.

Hazen J. Warner, 24, Flint, lost control of his car early Saturday morning and it ran off M-55, struck a highway guard rail and then went through a fence at the Waldo Curry farm. He escaped injury.

## Start Restoration of Steam Locomotive

For the first time in more than 20 years, a steam locomotive is standing in one of the repair stalls at the Tawas shop of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

The D&M, which in 1946 was one of the first railroads in the country to adopt the diesel locomotive, is not returning to steam for its motive power. The steamer is to be restored for its historical interest.

About two years ago, the D&M shop crew began part-time work on restoring an old wooden coach to its original condition. Work on refurbishing the combination passenger-baggage coach is now nearing completion.

Layer after layer of paint has been removed from the interior and exterior of the coach revealing the gleaming original finish of oak and cypress wood.

During that time, Charles A. Pinkerton Jr., president of the railroad, has attempted to secure a steam locomotive to go with this beautiful coach.

Last Saturday, a D&M diesel locomotive towed a six-wheel Baldwin switch locomotive from an Al-

pens scrap yard to the Tawas yard. The locomotive had been decommissioned years ago after long service in a quarry.

After such a long period of standing on a siding, it was not known if bearings would hold up for a 60-mile trip. The bearings were repacked and the 60-year-old engine made the trip without any serious overheating.

Edward Goodman, general manager, said the locomotive is in a very deteriorated condition and it is expected that its restoration will require from 1½ to two years of work.

Like the steam locomotive which once powered passenger and freight trains on D&M rails, the expert mechanics who once kept them operating have retired—all but one, Rupert Charters, who as a young man worked in the D&M shop and later witnessed the conversion from steam to diesel in 1946.

One of the first steps in restoration of the locomotive will probably be the use of a sand blaster to remove rust and an accumulation of grime.

## Social Security Administration to Mark 34th Anniversary

With over 24 million Americans receiving 2.5 billion dollars a month in social security benefits and 20 million people insured by Medicare, the Social Security Administration will celebrate its 34th anniversary, John J. Carr, district manager of social security in Bay City, said recently.

The anniversary is being observed with ceremonies and special displays in many social security offices throughout the country, as well as at the national headquarters in Woodlawn, Maryland, just outside of Baltimore. At the headquarters, a historical room was opened last week showing mementos of the agency's history including the desk used by all heads of the social security system since 1935.

When Pres. Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act into law on August 14, 1935, he called it "the cornerstone of a structure which is being built but is by no means complete."

"The original law," continued Carr, "provided for old-age benefits to retired workers in industry and commerce only. Over the years, the social security program has expanded so that it now provides financial protection for virtually everyone in the country."

## LOOKING BACKWARD—

### 'Big Mac' and Seaway Listed as Benefits

**15 Years Ago—**  
August 27, 1954—The Mackinac Bridge and St. Lawrence Seaway were pointed out Tuesday at Lansing by Charles A. Pinkerton, president of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, as stimulating factors in the industrial growth of Michigan. Pinkerton is chairman of the northern half of the Lower Peninsula advisory board of the State Economic Development Commission.

The traditional end of summer vacation on Labor Day will send 3,200 students and 123 teachers back to the various schools in Isoco County.

Thirty-seven golfers registered for the annual stag day at the Tawas Golf and Country Club on Wednesday.

All four lanes of US-23 between Pinconning and Standish will be open to traffic this week-end. Work on widening the pavement with a divider strip is expected to be completed within a month.

Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale reports it will give 100 percent cooperation to boys in the way of financing help in starting livestock and crop projects in the vocational agriculture program at the Hale School.

Subiltz Oil Company recently added a new truck-transport unit to its fleet. The 6,000-gallon tanker will haul gasoline and fuel oil from the Bay City terminal to the local bulk plant.

Water pressure in Tawas City's mains dropped to 18 pounds Monday night, endangering the entire community had there been a fire. City officials said that the lack of pressure could be traced to home owners, who regularly break city regulations governing the use of water for sprinkling lawns during the hot summer months.

**25 Years Ago—**  
August 25, 1944—Two Isoco servicemen were reported killed this week. William Goupil, killed

in action in France on July 29, is Whittemore's first war casualty. Stanley A. Daley, chief yeoman in the United States Navy, was killed August 19 in the Pacific.

Harry Goldsmith has purchased 280 feet of frontage on Tawas Bay and secured an option of the balance of the Junior Fisheries property in Tawas City from Joseph Trudell Jr.

Miss Dorothy White of East Tawas, who attended the WSCS World Friendship Camp at Walden Woods, will have charge of the opening of the church school at the Methodist Church Sunday morning and will report on her week at the camp as part of the service.

With Sweden and Switzerland both closed to Hitler for escape, his few remaining havens are Japan—which won't last long—and Argentina. It has long been rumored that the Nazi top men were building up cash reserves in Argentina.

Extensive repairs and redecorating have been completed during the summer months at Burleigh Rural Agricultural School, Whittemore. Work has been under direction of Supt. Fritz B. Pedersen and John O'Farrell, custodian.

A 38-foot cabin cruiser from Saginaw ran aground off the Tawas City Park Saturday. With some men and a team of horses, Peter Vallier of this city had the boat afloat after about two hours of work.

Crops throughout Isoco County are well above average, making it necessary that most farmers will have to file income tax reports on or before January 15, 1945.

Council has set a speed limit of 20 miles per hour on city streets. A traffic light has been ordered.

Whittemore High School opens September 4 with the following staff of teachers: Howard Switzer, superintendent; Mr. Nelson, principal; Miss Lilley, Mrs. Musser, Russell Rollin, Norman Schuster and Miss Leslie.

It will end at a lift station to be constructed on Second Avenue between the railroad tracks and Second Street.



## Mini-Bikes Not Legal on State's Highways-Streets

Operators and owners of the so-called mini-bikes are reminded by state police that these vehicles cannot be lawfully operated on public streets and highways in

Michigan.

Because they generally fail to meet minimum equipment specifications, they do not qualify under Michigan law for registration and licensing.

Col. Frederick E. Davids, state police director, said, "I am becoming alarmed at the incidence of mini-bike accidents occurring on roads and highways. In the case of juvenile riders, this indicates a lack of parental responsibility. "On the other hand," Davids pointed out, "accidents and fatalities involving adults colliding with authorized highway vehicles represent cases of flaunting the very laws made to protect them." That these vehicles are a hazard in traffic, whether or not they are intentionally driven on streets and highways, is borne out by the state police traffic division figures which show that already this year there have been six deaths of mini-bike operators and riders in Michigan.

# Hale Area School Set for Sept. 2 Opening

Students of Hale Area School will report for a half-day session Tuesday, September 2, to open the 1969-70 school year, according to an announcement this week from Prin. Richard Dodge.

Buses are to leave the school at approximately 7:20 a. m. and are to return students home at 11:45 a. m. First day of school for the kindergarten will be Wednesday, September 3.

First day for lunches will be September 3. Dodge announced that lunch prices for grades one through six would be 35 cents; grades seven through 12, 40 cents; teachers, 50 cents.

Teachers are to report Friday, August 29, for a preschool orientation.

Due to retirements, splitting of elementary grades and adding two portable classrooms, there will be 12 new staff members this year.

Dodge replaces Jerry Inman as principal. Inman accepted the position of superintendent at Kingsley. Dodge received his master degree in administration from the University of Michigan and was in

the Flint Northern School system last year.

Other teachers in the system include:

Judith Pokorney returns as kindergarten teacher. She attended Central Michigan University this summer; Mrs. Carol Holley, first grade, is a graduate of Wayne State University and previously taught in the Detroit system; Thomas Webb, fifth grade, received his degree from Pillsbury Bible College, Owatonna, Minnesota, and traveled in Europe extensively for two years; Eldon Miller, returns to the sixth grade after spending the summer attending Spring Arbor College; Lyle Nordin, sixth grade, received his degree this year from the University of Minnesota.

Lyle Bielby Mrs. Alfreida Lange, Mrs. Bernice Thomsson and Mrs. Lottie Pierce retired at the end of the last term. Miss Carol Thomson and Miss Marie Sawycky will be attending the University of Michigan full time this year. Miss Karine Strandli returned to Central Michigan University as a full time student.

David Anderson, who will be teaching English in grades seven through nine, received his degree plus 85 graduate hours from the

University of Minnesota. He was a teaching assistant in English at the university and has taught in the Illinois remedial reading program.

Alan Bromund, mathematics teacher, a resident of Alpena, received his degree from Central Michigan University in mathematics and geography.

New texts and methods will be used in chemistry. Dodge said that everything is geared to learn by doing, "which means almost everything in the text books will be carried out with laboratory experiments." There will be two classes taught by Pokorney.

Instead of teaching American history to both the seventh and eighth grades, Sherer will introduce geography to the seventh grade.



## Hearing to Outline AuSable Bridge Plans

Plans for construction of a new bridge to carry US-23 over the AuSable River in Oscoda will be discussed September 10 at a public hearing in Oscoda, according to the Michigan Department of State Highways. Presiding at the 7:30 p. m. hearing in Oscoda Township Hall will be G. Robert Adams, public hearings officer for the highway department.

The bridge will replace a 37-year-old span, one of 16 older bridges on state highways slated for replacement by 1974. The department plans to take bids on this project in April 1970. Estimated cost of construction is \$310,000.

Two schemes are being studied that will minimize inconvenience to motorists and to businesses in the vicinity of the bridge.

One calls for replacing the bridge on the existing location, maintaining traffic on a temporary bridge east of the present structure. The other calls for construction just east of the present span, maintaining traffic on the present bridge.

Testimony will be taken at the

hearing concerning the social, environmental and economic impact of the proposed alternatives. Information will be given concerning the department's relocation assistance program.

Written statements and exhibits, in place of or in addition to oral statements at the hearing, may be submitted up to 10 days after the hearing, by writing to Adams at the Department of State Highways, Public Hearings Section, State Highways Building, P. O. Drawer K, Lansing, Michigan 48904.

Descriptions of the alternatives, maps and other pertinent information are available for public inspection prior to the hearing at the township hall.

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


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
