# Tawas Hospital Needs Pledges --- Now

Most of the community is aware that Tawas Hospital is deep in expansion plans, but what it is not aware of is that the first deadline is approaching.

The ultimate goal for the hospital expansion funds is \$400,000, but to submit application for Hill-Burton federal aid, the hospital needs a total of \$200,000 in pledges to show community interest.

The hospital is now at \$154,000 and needs \$46,000 more by August

28. Hospital officials have arranged to borrow several hundred thousand dollars, which auditors say it is capable of repaying over an extended period to help cover, with donations and federal aid, the total cost of the expansion, costing in excess of \$1,000,000.

Cost of construction is still rising so action must be taken now. In order to insure that there will be a bed available when and if one needs the hospital, pledges are now being solicited. Any

amount will help—from \$1 to \$10,000. Pledges may be called in to Wanda Pipp or Jerry Norwood at 362-3411.

Once again, the hospital has been written up by the chief of the Division of Health Facility Standards and Licensing, State of Michigan, as follows:

"Continuation of your licensure and certification beyond July 1, 1970, is contingent upon your progress in the correction of the physical plant inadequacies, as well as your ability to eliminate,

in toto, the use of corridor beds in your hospital."

(All inadequacies have been corrected in the last two years that can be without a major expansion. Other discrepancies are lack of space for certain areas and cannot be accomplished otherwise.)

Here are a few statistics which will indicate the vital need for expansion:

The increase in patient days from 1968 to 1969 is 2,030; in the newborn nursery, the increase was

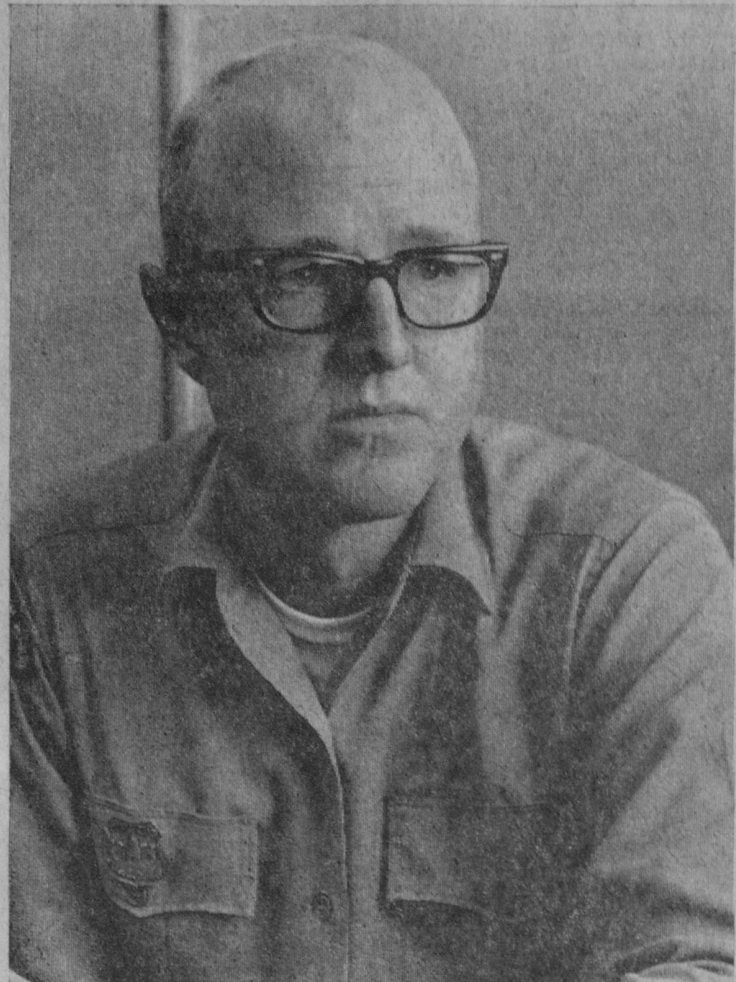
156 days; emergencies increased 691; out-patient laboratory tests increased 1,533; out-patient X-rays increased 691; meals served increased 6,546.

If one has had occasion to visit Tawas Hospital, he may have noticed the inadequacy of space in the emergency room and X-ray department. Emergency room patients in need of X-rays must be taken through corridors crowded with patient beds.

The expansion will place the emergency room directly across the hall from the laboratory and

X-ray departments. The dietary department will be updated to take care of the enlarged patient load and sufficient storage area will be added to comply with state codes, plus providing an additional 20 beds to eliminate the need for corridor beds.

The hospital needs pledges for donations to be able to prove to the state and federal governments that the community and friends are behind it. Pledges may be for a five-year period, with the yearly donations deductible from the individual's income tax.

## New Forester Named for Tawas District

Thomas A. Wilson, 30, is the new forester assigned to the Tawas District, Huron-Manistee National Forest, according to an announcement this week by Myron L. Smith, district ranger.

Wilson returns to active service after a two-year leave for educational purposes. His duties here will be administering and supervising timber management activities in the Tawas District.

This includes the timber sale program, timber stand improvement work and reforestation. It is expected that 380,000 red pine seedlings will be planted in the district during the current fiscal year, as well as offering 7,000,000 board feet in pulpwood products for marketing.

Wilson, an Ohio native, graduated from Michigan State University with a bachelor of science degree in forestry in 1961. He then spent two years with the United States Army, of which 18 months were spent in Germany.

Wilson joined the United States Forest Service in 1964 and worked in the White Sulphur District of the Monongahela National Forest in West Virginia. In 1967, he was promoted and transferred to the Gavley District in the same forest.

In July 1967, Wilson started two years leave without pay to work on a master degree in business administration at the University of Dayton, Ohio.

He and his wife, Chris, have found a home on Lake Huron north of East Tawas.

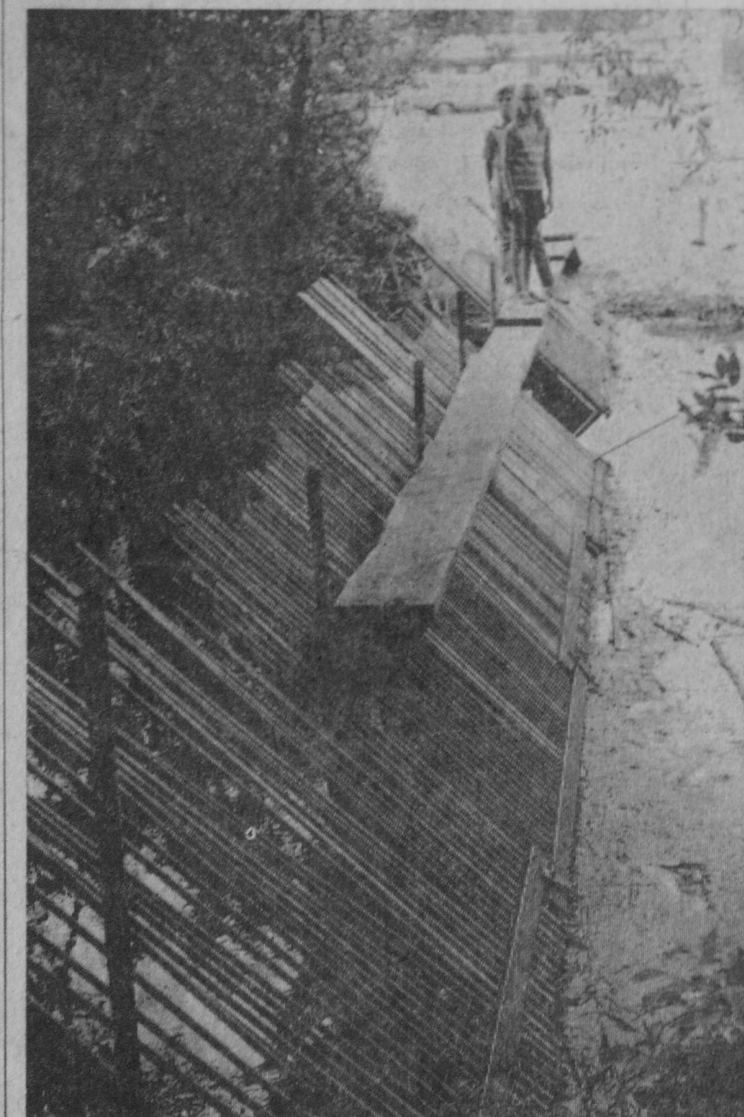

# Iosco May Drop License Bureau

On recommendation of Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, Iosco Board of Supervisors is to give serious consideration to turning the drivers license bureau over to the Michigan Secretary of State.

In a report to the board Wednesday, O'Farrell pointed out that his department had receipts of approximately \$6,000 in fees from

operators licenses last year. The county spent in the neighborhood of \$10,000 in salaries to man the bureau.

"We have spent precious hours on writing drivers licenses and have been forced to neglect our work on complaints and investigation," said O'Farrell.

Three men are assigned to the jail office. Deputy Sheriff Francis Block spends 90 percent of his hours on writing drivers licenses, while Undersheriff Leon Putnam and Deputy Robert Frank spend 60 and 35 percent, respectively, of their time in the same occupation.

Out of the \$4.50 fee the state charges for renewal of a license, the county receives only 50 cents in return. The state charges \$6 for an original license. Although there is a great amount of work in preparing the original, the county receives only \$2.

## Flint Child Drowned Sunday in Long Lake

Robert L. Ward, two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Ward of Flint, drowned Sunday in Long Lake, Plainfield Township.

Iosco Sheriff's Department officers said that the little boy was playing on a dock while his sister was fishing. She took her eyes off him for a minute and, when she turned around, noticed he was gone.

The body was recovered under a swimming raft about 75 feet from shore by Ronald Romanowski, 17, Flint.

"The Michigan Department of State has for years been trying to get complete control of the licenses and is trying to starve us out," O'Farrell told supervisors. "The legislature has done little for the small town police chief and county in raising the fees. Most of the cities have given up on this headache and about one-third of the counties have followed suit."

(In Iosco, fees from all county offices are returned to the county general fund.)

O'Farrell said that one of the reasons that Michigan sheriffs have continued writing drivers licenses is that they can give better service to the people than what could be obtained from a branch office of the department of state.

"The state might combine several counties in one and our people might have to go out of the county for a license," said O'Farrell. "Sheriffs of Michigan feel dedicated to not surrendering anything more to centralized government; too much has already been sacrificed."

The sheriff said that "we have gone on the assumption that the department of state might be more fair with the fees, but we are convinced that they will continue to use the mailed fist in dividing the money. We have fought the department of state for 15 years in this operation, but we cannot win."

Although no official action was taken by the board, the consensus of opinion seemed to be that the drivers license bureau should be turned over to the state to operate. The matter is to be discussed further at the September meeting.

# Ambulance Financing to be Studied Tonight

The problem of financing an area-wide emergency ambulance service has not been solved as yet, according to information received last week by officials at East Tawas.

A meeting is to be held tonight (Wednesday) to decide a course of action following last week's announcement that matching money for ambulance purchase was not available from the federal government.

It was learned last Wednesday that the Highway Safety Planning Department, with offices at Lansing, had depleted funds available and that an \$11,000 grant requested by East Tawas had been denied.

# Expect Slight Increase in School Enrollment

Enrollment at Tawas Area Schools is expected to be at its highest level in history when doors open for the 1969-70 term Tuesday, September 2.

In a report to the board of education Monday night, Prin. John Alexander said that he estimates that the total junior high and senior high enrollment would be 1,015 students, while Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, estimates the elementary enrollment at 882.

Total estimated enrollment is 1,897, as compared to 1,858 for the 1968-1969 term.

In her analysis of the kindergarten through grade six enrollment, Miss Bolen said that the total was about 11 less than last year at present, but believed that the 882 number would be swelled by the time school starts.

At present, the kindergarten enrollment is estimated at 114; first grade, 105; second grade, 136; third grade, 127; fourth grade, 106; fifth grade, 135, and sixth grade, 149.

and senior high school picked up 44 new students this summer while losing 25 for a net gain of 19. However, a number of new families have moved into the area and the children have not as yet registered.

A breakdown of totals lists 186 in seventh grade (161 now registered), 164 for the eighth grade (134 now registered) for an estimated 350 in junior high.

An estimate of high school enrollment gives 168 for the ninth grade, 158 for the 10th grade, 185 for the 11th grade and 140 for the 12th grade.

Miss Bolen asks any new families moving into the area with elementary age children to contact the school this week for registration. Telephone number of the elementary office is 362-3151.

Registration of high school students continues today (Wednesday) with 12th graders. Late registration is to be held Thursday, August 28.

A teacher orientation for all staff members is scheduled for Friday, August 29.

Officials of the 11 local governmental units involved in the ambulance service are to meet tonight, 8 o'clock, to discuss ways and means of raising money to meet an \$11,000 deficit brought on by the federal government's denial of funds.

The 11 local units of government, with the City of East Tawas acting as coordinator, purchased two new ambulances and a used ambulance costing \$19,800. It is expected that an additional \$600 will be needed to equip each unit with radio communications.

City Clerk F. B. Lomas said that when the application for the federal grant had been prepared, assurances had been received by the city that it would be approved.

Lomas said Tuesday that establishment of an ambulance authority may be considered by the group. He said that federal officials indicated that additional funds for assisting with ambulance purchases may be available in November.

Meanwhile, an agreement has been prepared by City Attorney Michael Freil for operation of the ambulance service by Tawas Hospital. This agreement is now being studied by attorneys for the hospital.

One ambulance is being operated by volunteers at Hale and it is anticipated that the second new ambulance will be operated by the hospital effective October 1.

## TAEA Meets Thursday on Final Offer

Negotiating teams for Tawas Area Board of Education and Tawas Area Education Association met Tuesday afternoon to discuss final phases of a master contract for 1969-70.

A spokesman said there was some agreement on the part of the economic package and the rest of the package, mainly fringe benefits, was agreed to be "close in cost," but varied somewhat in principal.

Negotiators for the board of education opened the meeting with their counter proposal, followed by the teachers' counter proposal.

The TAEA team will meet with the teacher group Thursday evening to discuss the final proposal of the board of education.

## Iosco's Role in Watershed to be Discussed

Possible participation by Iosco with Ogemaw and Arenac Counties in an AuGres River watershed flood control program will be discussed at a meeting to be held September 3, 8:00 p. m., at Whittemore-Prescott Area School.

At Wednesday's meeting of the board of supervisors, it was reported that officials of Arenac and Ogemaw were interested in having Iosco participate in a feasibility study of the watershed project.

It was stated that the feasibility study would be financed by federal funds. If such a watershed program is undertaken, cost of the entire project would be shared by the three participating counties, with aid of federal funds.

According to Marvin Davenport, county agent, the watershed project would establish recreational facilities, as well as to provide land conservation facilities in the watershed.

It was stated at the meeting that farmers in the AuGres River flood plains had sustained a million dollar loss this year due to flooding conditions.

Harry Krueger, chairman of the Iosco Soil Conservation District, urged supervisors to "take a good look" at the proposal, stating that many benefits could be derived by establishment of watershed control on the AuGres River and its tributaries.

It was reported that three counties share about equally in land drained by the AuGres River. At Wednesday's meeting supervisors said there were many questions to be answered before any final decision could be given as to this county's participation, principally in the method of financing and determination as to benefits for each county.

Such questions, however, may not be answered until after the proposed feasibility study.

Attending the September 3 meeting at Whittemore will be Stanley Quackenbush, state drain commissioner, along with a watershed expert from his office at Lansing.

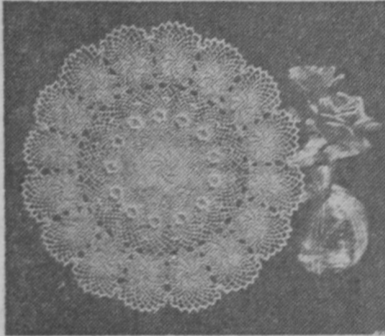

## Use Caution on Highways, Urges Sheriff

Iosco Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell urges all motorists to use extra caution while driving this Labor Day week-end.

Auto Club of Michigan estimates that 3,000,000 vehicles will travel the highways and will log 560,000,000 miles during the 78-hour period of Labor Day week-end.

Sheriff O'Farrell warns that the majority of fatal accidents happen within 25 miles of home. Last year, the holiday period recorded 59 drivers involved in 35 deaths. Sixty-nine percent of these were within 25 miles from home.

The heavy bumper to bumper traffic will commence in early afternoon Friday and continue through the evening. The return traffic will start to build up early Monday afternoon and continue bumper to bumper until late evening.

Sheriff O'Farrell anticipates an extremely heavy flow of cars hauling trailers, campers and boats on US-23 and M-65. He recommends that these drivers carefully consider using the highways at other than the peak period of the holiday.

"The lakes and other waters of the state will also be the scene of the heaviest concentration of swimmers, boaters and fishermen ever to be recorded," said O'Farrell.

Last year's records show that many drownings involving swimmers and waders were caused by the victim being either a non-proficient swimmer, had a physical failure or exhaustion or was swimming in unknown waters. Last year, the total drowned in the state was 305 persons. Of this figure, 213 were not in a boat.

The boating fatalities last year totaled 92. Sheriff O'Farrell said that 65 percent of these accidents were caused by reckless operation or operator and passenger negligence. The use of life preservers would certainly add to protection and saving of lives. The sheriff's department will beef up its water patrols over the holidays and will vigorously enforce the watercraft laws.

"This department has direct responsibility in the enforcement of marine laws and for the safety of those using our waters and for the recovery of drowned bodies. To fulfill our responsibility to the citizens, we must be firm, yet fair, in our enforcement in an effort to cut down the tragic number of water accidents and drownings," Sheriff O'Farrell warns.

## Iosco to Cooperate in Recreation Study

Iosco County Parks and Recreation Commission has confirmed approval that Iosco would cooperate with the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission as a pilot county in the development of a county-wide comprehensive recreation plan.

In a letter read to the Iosco Board of Supervisors Wednesday, Marvin Davenport, county parks and recreation commission chairman, said that this group was engaged in the establishment of a parks system for Iosco to adequately serve both local citizens and tourists who visit the area.

The board transferred \$12,500 from the county general fund to the supervisors' account. Under the budget established last Octo-

ber by the former board of supervisors, \$12,500 had been appropriated to operate the board of supervisors during 1969. As of July 31, the supervisors' account was overdrawn by \$2,000.

Charles Smith, who represents the county on the Alpena Area Community Mental Health Center, reported that the budget of that organization will be more than doubled next year. Iosco's share of the cost during the current fiscal year is \$1,900.

Carlton Merschel was appointed as one of two representatives from this county on the mental health center's selection committee, replacing L. S. Little, who resigned. This group selects county representatives for the mental health board.

The board directed the clerk to

write a letter to East Michigan Tourist Association stating that this county had appropriated \$1,000 to that organization during the current fiscal year and disclaimed any balance due of \$500.

The board authorized a resolution nullifying the old rat bounty in this county. Upon proper certification, the county had paid 10 cents per rat exterminated.

Authorization was given for overtime work in the probate judge's office to prepare records for microfilming.

An appropriation of \$134 was made to Children's Charter, a non-profit organization at Kalamazoo, which conducts seminars for juvenile officers. The appropriation was requested by Probate Judge William McCready.

## Board to Borrow Until Tax Time

Authorization was given Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education to borrow enough money on September 15 to meet expenses of school operation until receipt of local taxes in December and January.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported to the board that from \$110,000 to \$121,000 would be needed to carry the school over to the time of tax collection. He said that it would require about two weeks to receive permission from the Municipal Finance Commission to borrow the funds.

It is expected that the second state aid payment will be received in October and the third payment in December. According to latest information, schools will not receive early advances on state aid payments at this time.

In other business, a contract was awarded to Nelkie Dairy, over-all low bidder on furnishing dairy products to the hot lunch program. Gase Bakery received the contract on furnishing baked goods. Ammond-Restiner Oil Company, low bidder, received the contract for furnishing gasoline. Only one bid was received on furnishing fuel oil. This contract was let to Leonard Refineries.

On recommendation of the superintendent, Mrs. Leah Bowden of East Tawas was hired for the school bookkeeping position, replacing Mrs. Robert Mattson, who has resigned. She is to start on this job September 8.

Announcement was made by Prin. John Alexander that the school is the recipient of an annual memorial gift of \$400 from

Mr. and Mrs. Lowell M. Hill, Bloomfield Hills and summer residents of Whitney Township.

This gift is a memorial to their son, the late James M. Hill. The family specified that the gift be used to purchase a sailboat kit each year for assembly as an industrial art project. When completed by students, the boat would be donated to a local organization, possibly the boy scouts or some similar group.

## Proper Care Can Improve Coho Taste

The proper combination of cleaning and cooking Great Lakes salmon can reduce pesticide residues in the fish to an "acceptable" level, according to research at Michigan State University.

Dr. Eugene Dice, extension specialist in sportfishing at MSU, says that certain procedures studied in laboratories can reduce the pesticide levels in fish to a point that would likely be well below the five parts per million tolerance level set by the United States Food and Drug Administration for commercially sold products.

Dice says that most of the pesticide residues in fish are found in some of the vital organs and in fatty regions along the back of the fish (from head to tail), under the skin and in the belly-fat region along the fish's stomach. Thus, when the fish has been field dressed, skinned and had these fatty tissues removed, much of the pesticide has also been eliminated.

"The only fatty tissues remaining," he says, "are between the muscle layers in the flesh. As the fish cooks, these fats melt out, carrying with them an undetermined amount of the pesticide that had remained in the fish prior to cooking. In the case of DDT, some of the pesticide will escape in steam released as the food is cooked."

Although younger fish are said to have smaller quantities of residues than older, larger fish, Dice cautions that the grease or oil from one batch of fish should always be discarded before a second batch is cooked in the same container.

## Highway Money Distributed by State

Iosco County Road Commission recently received \$137,588 as its share of motor vehicle highway fund collections for April, May and June. This was \$12,815 higher than for the same period in 1968.

Henrik E. Stafseth, state highway director, said net receipts of the highway fund during the three-month period amounted to \$73,000,000, an increase of \$5,900,000, or 8.9 percent, compared to the same period of 1968.

Receipts are derived from license plate fees and a state tax on gasoline and diesel fuel, both collected by the Michigan Department of State for deposit to the highway fund.

After deduction of collection along with \$3,500,000 annually to the Mackinac Bridge Authority, plus a 1.5 percent share of gas

taxes to the Michigan Waterways Commission and other fixed costs, the money is distributed according to a formula established by the state legislature. Forty-six percent goes to the Department of State Highways, 34 percent to the state's 83 counties and 20 percent to the 528 incorporated cities and villages.

Receipts by cities of Iosco County were as follows: East Tawas, \$8,694, an increase of \$558; Tawas City, \$5,942, an increase of \$356; Whittemore, \$1,639 an increase of \$101.

## Guidelines Set for DDT Disposal in Michigan

Guidelines for disposal of DDT products by Michigan residents have been established and will be distributed throughout the state with the help of newspapers, television, radio, magazines and a specially prepared brochure.

The guidelines were set up following action by the Michigan Commission of Agriculture April 16 canceling registration of DDT products in the state. Included are specific directions for homeowners, commercial, agricultural and municipal users of DDT.

Preparation of the guidelines was a joint project of the Michigan Departments of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Public Health, in cooperation with Michigan State University's Extension Service.

Copies of the booklet, "How to Dispose of DDT Products," will be available for cooperating organizations and their regional district offices.

Cooperative planning for the project is designed to eliminate conflicting recommendations and to coordinate efforts of the public agencies involved. Guidelines had been requested by Gov. William G. Milliken.

Homeowners are advised to get rid of DDT (dichloro diphenyl trichloroethane) products such as aerosol bombs, liquid sprays, powders and dusts, bury them on their own property. If each homeowner does so, these products will be safely dispersed and will reduce dangerous concentrations of DDT and other toxic materials at public disposal sites. By law, ingredients are listed on the label.

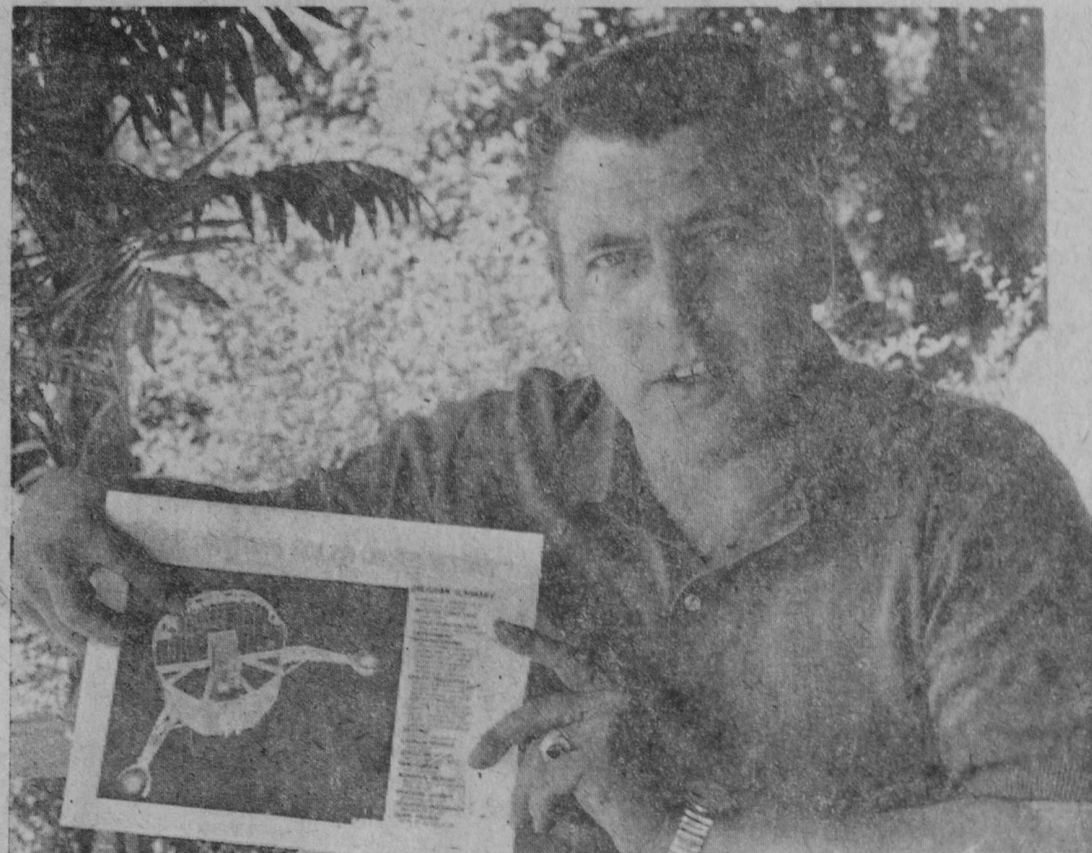

A former Hale resident, Dale Goodrow, 35, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Goodrow, is one of thousands of persons involved in this country's space program.

Enjoying a two-week vacation at Hale, Dale and his wife, Joyce, are residents of Arvada, Colorado, where he was recently promoted to lead electrical assembly technician by Ball Brothers Research Corporation of Boulder, Colorado. This firm builds electrical equipment for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, in addition to building its own orbiting solar observatory (OSO), of which six are currently orbiting around the earth.

Directed by NASA, the OSO is a research spacecraft designed for measurement of solar phenomena and solar effects. Variation in attitude of the observatory during its lifetime also permits observation of the entire celestial sphere and portions of earth's surface.

The latest OSO was launched earlier this month by a Thor-Delta rocket from Cape Kennedy, Florida. It has an estimated payload of 636 pounds.

Ball Brothers has constructed a considerable amount of electronic gear for the Apollo space program. Goodrow had served until his promotion a month ago as an electric assembly technician. He has been an employee of Ball Brothers since January 1, 1968.

After attending Hale Area School, Goodrow entered the air force in 1951 where he served until 1960 as a radar technician. He worked as a truck mechanic for Consumers Power Company, at its Baldwin Township service center in 1961, and later as an automobile mechanic in Florida, Texas and Louisiana.

He has made his home since 1962 in Colorado, where he attended the National Electronics Institute at Denver. He attributes his 10 years of experience as an air force radar technician as the reason for helping to interest him in seeking employment in the space program.

Ball Brothers Research Corporation utilizes a laboratory which is

cleaner than a surgical room in a hospital for assembling electronic gear to be used in the space program.

"All the technicians wear nylon frocks, gloves, caps and boots during the assembly. Everything must be letter perfect and there is no room for error," said the former Hale resident.

He and his wife are avid skiers, which is only natural for a young couple living in one of the greatest ski resort states of the country.

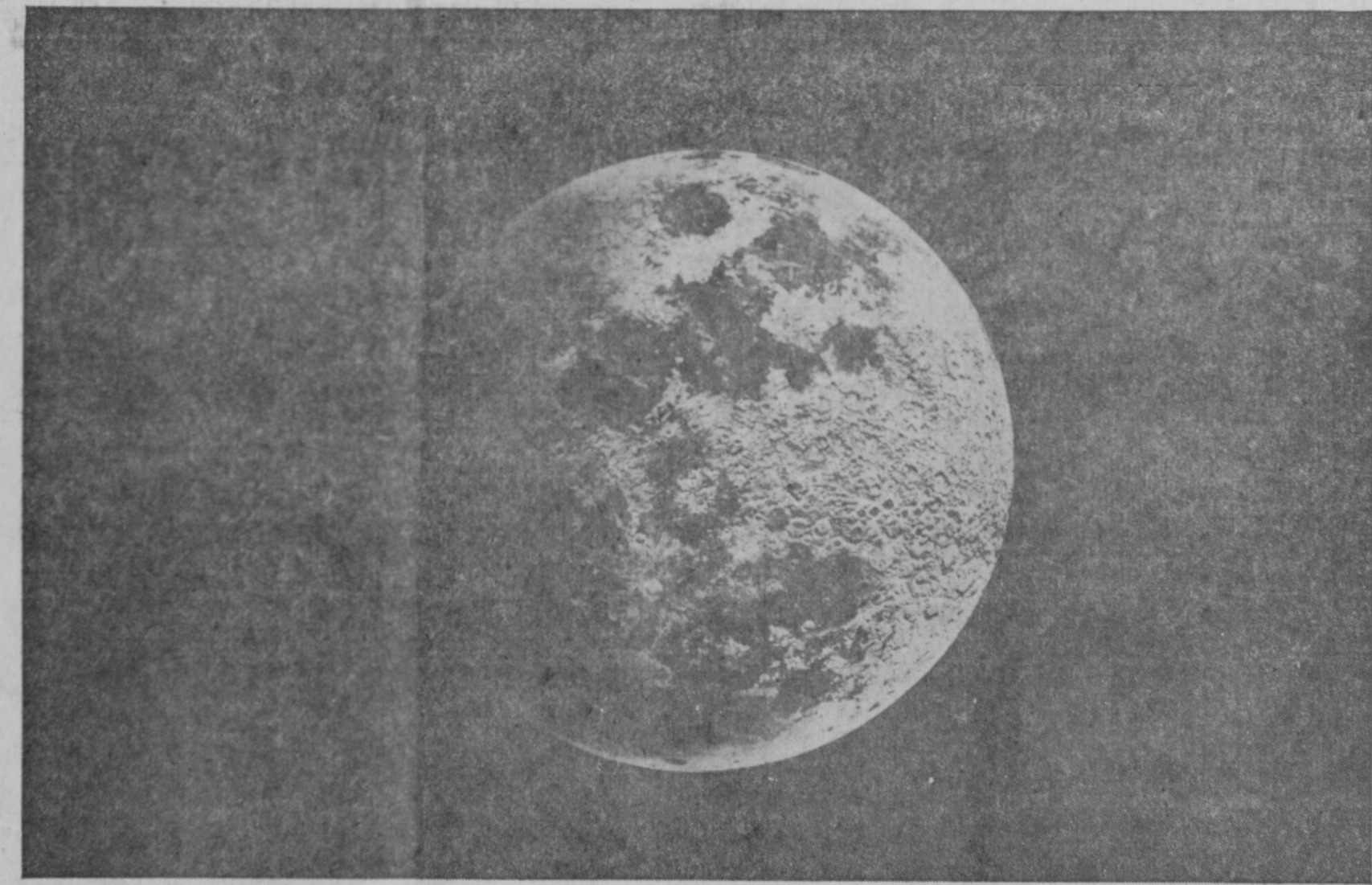
