



Thus, when the fish has been field dressed, skinned and had these fatty tissues removed, much of the pesticide has also been eliminated.

> "The only fatty tissues remaining," he says, "are between the muscle layers in the flesh. As the fish cooks, these fats melt out, carrying with them an undetermined amount of the pesticide that had remained in the fish prior to cooking. In the case of DDT, some of the pesticide will escape in steam released as the food is cooked."

> Although younger fish are said to have smaller quantities of residues than older, larger fish, Dice cautions that the grease or oil from one batch of fish should always be discarded before a second batch is cooked in the same






