## Sunday Burglars Hit Six Business Places

Six East Tawas business places were burglarized early Sunday morning with slightly more than \$1,200 taken from four and a considerable amount of equipment damage at one business place.

Under investigation by East Tawas Police Department and Michigan State Police are break-ins at Johnson Auto Supply, Barber Oldsmobile Sales, William Look and Sons, Imperial Service Station, Twin Cities Laundry and the East Tawas Community Building.

The major loss came at Barber's, where over \$1,000 was taken from a small safe. Officers said the burglars entered through a rear door. They knocked the tumbler off the safe to gain entrance.

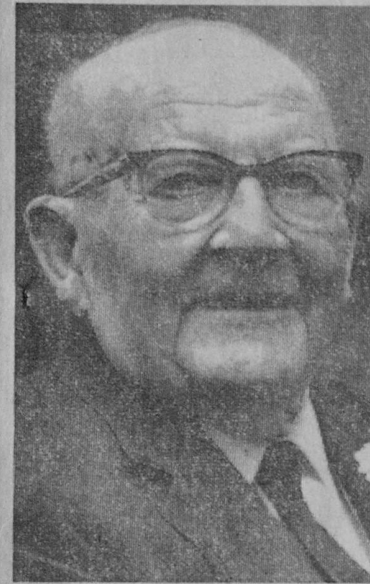
A safe was also cracked at Johnson Auto Supply and about \$140 in cash taken. Entrance was made through a side door. Police Chief Donald Docking said that the burglars caused extensive damage to a grinder in the building when they backed a truck into it.

About \$35 in cash was taken at William Look and Sons but the burglars were unable to crack a large safe. About \$40 in cash was taken from the office at the community building.

Owners at Imperial Service Station and Twin Cities Laundry told police that nothing appeared to have been taken from those places, although both had been entered.

Docking said that the burglaries must have taken place between 3:00 and 7:00 a. m. Sunday. In checking with residents near the Johnson Auto building, Docking said that no one apparently heard any noise. He said that the burglars had used tools from the business place's stock to beat the safe open.

This is the first outbreak of burglaries at East Tawas this year. Last month, there were four burglaries in Tawas City, but all cases have been closed with the arrest at Roscommon of a Houghton Lake man, who had implicated an Oscoda youth as being involved with him in the break-ins here.

## Death Takes F. C. Hosbach of Tawas City

F. Christian Hosbach of Tawas City, age 93, passed away Thursday, December 11. Funeral services were held Saturday, December 12, from Emanuel Lutheran Church with the Rev. J. J. Rockhoff officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Born December 18, 1875, at Seaford, Ontario, Canada, he came to Tawas City with his parents at the age of six years. He had resided here continuously for 88 years.

Mr. Hosbach was employed by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company until his retirement.

His wife, the former Johanna L. Anschuetz, passed away January 6, 1959.

Surviving are his five children, Gerhard Hosbach of Saginaw, Mrs. Clara Eich of Tawas City, Herbert of Berea, Ohio, Arnold and Leonard of Tawas City; eight grandchildren; nine great grandchildren; one sister, Otilia Dodson of Ypsilanti.

## Complaints Heard on Ordinance Violations

Numerous complaints over violations of the city ordinance and state law which prohibits operation of snowmobiles on public streets or highways were heard in Tawas City last week-end.

Mayor Russell A. Rollin told councilmen Monday night that he had received several complaints by telephone over the week-end.

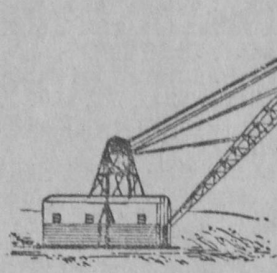
He said that most of the calls came from the Elms Garden area near the south Tawas City limits.

Last January, when numerous complaints were received and several near accidents reported involving snowmobiles with vehicular traffic, the council adopted an ordinance banning snowmobiles from all streets.

The danger of operating snowmobiles on public thoroughfares has been recognized by the state and a law was passed by the legislature controlling their use. In addition, state trespass laws have been strengthened this year to prosecute operators who trespass on private property.

A highway or street as defined in the city ordinance means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained, when any part is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular traffic.

Any person who violates provisions of the act is guilty of a misdemeanor.

## Table Decision on T. City Park

Discussion on possible expansion of the Tawas City Park with state-federal funds, under consideration for nearly two years, is expected to come to a head before the end of this year or in early January.

The city council, after hearing a report from Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, decided to wait another two weeks or a month before taking any final

action on continuing or dropping the program.

An extension of time to continue the project for another year was granted last month by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

The \$31,750 project, of which the city's share would be \$15,875, has received tentative approval of state and federal agencies which administer recreational funds.

Bublitz reviewed past discussion on the project and read highlights of the voluminous correspondence which the city has had with the state and federal agencies concerning the proposed expansion.

The present status of the project, according to Bublitz, is that the city would have to have deeds showing ownership of the four parcels of land for the proposed expansion, a survey of the property, a second appraisal of property and justification of price for one parcel.

It was estimated by councilmen that the survey and reappraisal would cost the city more than \$300 and this would not mean that the project would be approved.

In January 1968, the city filed for federal-state funds to aid with the purchase of four parcels of lake frontage from the west limit of the city park to Rainbow Service Station.

A committee was appointed and the council authorized obtaining options on the property. Since then, the project became bogged down in governmental red tape, although at several times it appeared as though approval was imminent.

In other business conducted Monday night, the council turned an ordinance violation over to the city attorney for legal action.

It was stated at the meeting that Brooks Auto Parts, 413 Ninth Avenue, was violating the city's zoning ordinance by resuming work on construction of a building. Such expansion or extension, said councilmen, was a basic violation of the ordinance which allows the business under a nonconforming use.

The council had denied a building application submitted by the firm several years ago for the reason of noncompliance with the zoning ordinance.

## License Bureau Moves Jan. 1 to East Tawas

Michigan Department of State's drivers license bureau for Iosco County will open its new headquarters at East Tawas effective January 1.

The new office will be in the former location of the Yankee Peddler Shop on Newman Street, according to Thomas Robson of Roscommon, district manager of field offices division for the department of state.

John Mezzano of West Branch, retired state police corporal, has been named manager of the bureau. He is presently managing the field office at Manistee.

The license bureau will be a one-man operation, although it is expected that a road tester will assist during rush periods.

Operation of the drivers license bureau has been handled for many years by the Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Last August, the sheriff's department reported that the county paid out approximately \$10,000 in salaries to collect \$6,000 in fees from the bureau. It was felt that by eliminating the bureau, the sheriff's department would have more manpower to work on complaints and investigations.

As a result of this report, the Iosco Board of Supervisors in September unanimously voted to return operation of the drivers license bureau to the state effective January 1, 1970.

## File Petitions by Dec. 29 for City Primaries

Persons desiring to become candidates for city offices in either Tawas City or East Tawas have until December 29 to file nominating petitions.

Terms of three aldermen are to expire on each city council, as well as the offices of mayor, clerk and treasurer.

In Tawas City, aldermen whose terms expire next spring are Martin Wellna, First Ward; Frank Ahonen, Second Ward; Howard Hatton, Third Ward.

A partisan or party elective system is used in Tawas City and the candidates are to designate the party in which they are running for election.

Should more than one candidate file for any city office in one party, a primary election would be held February 16. Nominating petitions are available at the city hall. Signatures of only three electors are required for aldermen, while five signatures are required to file for the offices of mayor, clerk or treasurer.

The three aldermen whose terms expire at East Tawas next spring are Earl Hester, First Ward; Edward Higgins, Second Ward; Robert Bolen, Third Ward.

Most candidates at East Tawas, which operates under a nonpartisan (no party) voting system, filed nominating petitions Monday night. Hester and Higgins filed petitions, as did Mayor James Campbell, Treas. Grace Pelton and Clerk Fred Lomas. Alderman Bolen was not in attendance at Monday night's meeting.

Annual spring elections for both cities will be held April 6.

Three or more candidates are required to hold a primary election at East Tawas on February 16, under terms of the nonpartisan election law.

## Send Cookies to Boys in Vietnam in SAM Project

Local servicemen in Vietnam soon will be receiving packages of cookies in the Santa Air Mail (SAM) program.

Volunteers packed 89 three-pound coffee tins Saturday, each containing three or four dozen cookies, hard candy, gum, six packs of cheese and crackers, a terry cloth towel, Kool Aid and a copy of the hometown newspaper.

## Recent Student Survey Was Teacher Project

"It came as a pleasant surprise to us, after all the publicity the problem has received during the past couple of years, that the vast majority of our students felt that marijuana should be outlawed completely."

This statement was made by three area school teachers in a project submitted as partial fulfillment of course requirements for adolescent psychology 541, Central Michigan University.

"It also was apparent from the survey that the dope problem among our young is very serious. This we can surmise from the percentage of all classes who felt that it was an extreme problem among today's youth," stated the three teachers.

The three teachers, Robert McDonald, a social studies teacher at Tawas Area High School; Bill McIntosh, assistant principal at Tawas Area, and Robert Kennedy, speech therapist for the Iosco Intermediate District, held personal interviews with students of three area high schools and handed out a questionnaire to be filled out by students.

The survey was made with several personal motivations behind each question. "We, as administrators and teachers, are deeply concerned with the problems, ideas and feelings of our youth

today. We hope that we can become more aware of the problems as a result of this study and, in return, be of more help in our every day contact with our student body," stated the three men.

Personal interviews or discussions were held with groups of four to six students from Tawas Area, Whittemore-Prescott and Hale Area Schools. These students were selected at random from the senior classes and asked several carefully structured questions about the future of their generations.

A questionnaire containing 15 questions, varied from attitudes towards parents and parent-adolescent relationships, to opinions about the future of the world for their generation. Questionnaires were passed out in study halls to students ranging in age from 14 to 18 years.

The survey found that most students do have a positive attitude toward school. In all probability, if the survey was continued it would be found that those students who answered the questionnaire in a negative manner would be those students who have reading problems, or in many cases, would be classified as slow learners.

Four questions were directed toward the parent-student relationship. It was the conclusion of the project writers that parents should make a stern effort to try to understand the younger generation by taking an active interest in their children and by doing more things together.

The survey found that youth today is extremely concerned in a negative way with the present Vietnamese policy and many of them felt this war will linger on and possibly cause World War III. It was interesting to note that the seniors felt that present lottery system for the draft was fair, while underclassmen felt that there must be a better system.

"They seem to foresee a better future for their generation, but interestingly enough, most of them feel that religion is definitely dying," stated the report.

The survey gave the following results concerning a question, marijuana should be: Outlawed completely (nearly 70 percent of the seniors, over 90 percent of the juniors, nearly 80 percent of the sophomores and 90 percent of the freshmen); or legalized (a little more than 30 percent of the seniors, less than 10 percent of the juniors and freshmen and slightly more than 20 percent of the sophomores).

IOSCO COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION

Regular Meeting November 5, 1969 7:00 p. m.

Meeting called to order. Present: Commissioners Conley, Aulerich, Curry and Eng-Mgr. Love. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved as corrected.

Old Business: Warrant deed received 10-22-69 from Conel Development covering parcel of land between Lakewood Shores Golf Course and proposed subdivision on west side of Detroit and Mackinac Railway tracks was discussed relative to legal implications for the Road Commission. Eng-Mgr. to investigate.

New Business: 1. Final plat - Chalet Village: Motion by Aulerich, supported by Curry, "Upon review and recommendation of the Eng-Mgr., the board approve and sign the Chalet Village final plat." Yeas: Conley, Aulerich, Curry. Motion carried and final plat signed.

2. Logs on right-of-way-Youngs Road: Eng-Mgr. to write a letter to Mr. Art Anschuetz requesting the removal of his logs from the Youngs Road right-of-way as soon as possible.

True yogurt aficionados still prefer it plain. But if you are a neophyte, yogurt-like olives—takes some getting used to. Try the plain yogurt as a substitute for sour cream in recipes.

In a small bowl, combine celery and onion salts; stir in yogurt. Cover and chill.

Salad: Six strips bacon, cooked and crumbled  
One medium head lettuce, torn  
Two grapefruits, peeled and sectioned

In a salad bowl, toss together bacon, lettuce, grapefruit and orange sections, and radishes. Top with dressing. Makes eight to 10 servings.

### Answer Social Security Questions

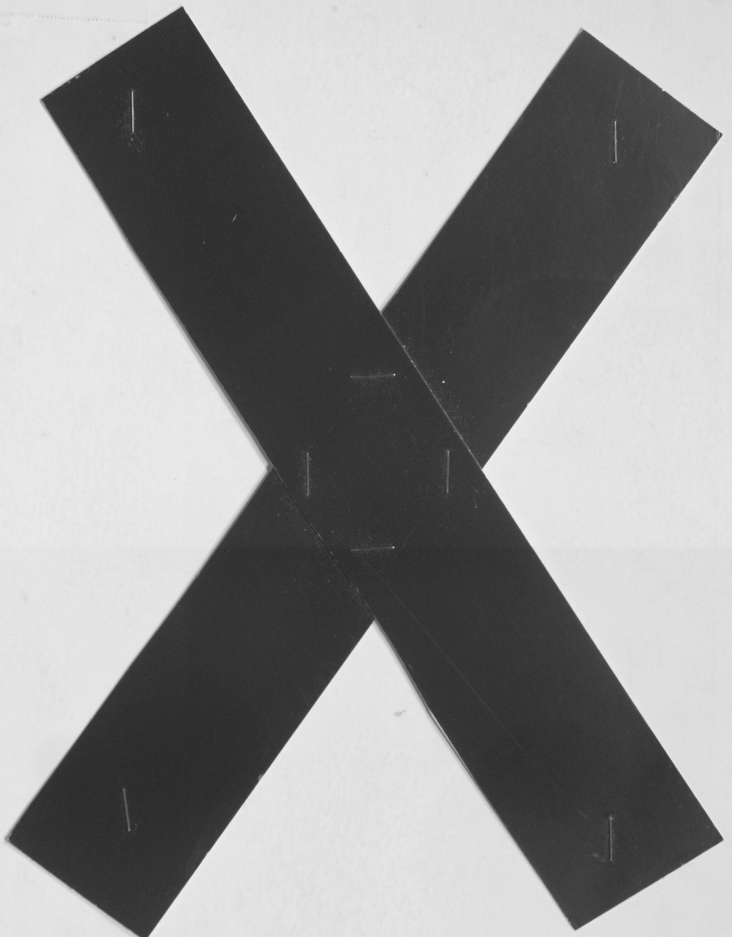
