A 54-year-old Tawas City man was one of three persons injured in three separate aecidents involving snowmobiles over the week end All of the injured were treated at Tawas Hospital.

Donald J. Seymour of Tawas City remains hospitalized for treatment of a fractured pelvis, a leg puncture, broken thumb and leg abrasions following a crash Friday night.

Seymour, along with three companions on snowmobiles, Dale Wheatley, Thomas Knight and David Bird, had accompanied a safari to Silver Valley and Sand Lake.

Returning to Tawas Golf and Country Club, Seymour rounded a curve on Camel Road, about onehalf mile west of Monument Road, and lost control of his machine. Going out of control, the machine continued down the road for about 90 feet and then hit a tree about 12 feet from the edge of the road.



Much later, Henry VIII sent out a proclamation against mumming or guising (a person could be jailed for three months for this offense) because many crimes, even murders, were committed during the mumming season.



The following is an especially good sugar cookie, for eating and decorating. 4 cups sifted enriched flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons nutmeg, 1 cup lard, one and 3/4 cups sugar, 2 eggs beaten, 1 teaspoon vanilla and 2 tablespoons milk. Form the dough in a ball and chill 3 to 4 hours. Roll on floured board to 1/8 inch thick. Cut with various shaped cookie cutters, bake on a greased cooky sheet. These are really good — Do shake some plain white sugar over some of them - yummy.

Slightly newer than the Christmas card is the Christmas seal. The Christmas seal was originated by a postal clerk, Einar Holboell, who ordered the first Christmas seals printed and sold at regular post offices in Denmark. While stamping letters and Christmas cards in 1903 in the post office in Copenhagen, the idea occurred to him. Why not have a special stamp printed for the many tuberculosis sufferers who need hospital treatment? The first year more than four million stamps were sold, yielding some 18,000 dollars.

The movement for adopting the stamp in the United States was greatly strengthened through the efforts of Miss Emily Bissell of Willmington, Delaware. She designed the first Christmas seal herself. It had a half wreath of holly and a cross, with "Merry Christ-mas" in the center and "Happy New Year" at the bottom.
