Community Chorus to Present Concert

The 30-member Tawas Community Chorus will present its annual program, "Christmas Tide," Sunday, December 7, 3:00 p. m., at Tawas Area High School Auditorium. The program will be under direction of Capt. Jerry Williams of Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

This will mark the third year that Captain Williams has directed the Tawas Community Chorus. A graduate of Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas, where he majored in music, Captain Williams served four years overseas before coming to Wurtsmith. He is currently serving as chief of administrative services.

Tawas Community Chorus, now in its 12th year of operation, is sponsored by patron members. Principal impetus toward fostering this organization, which contributes greatly to cultural enlightenment of the community, comes directly from the chorus members.

Preparations for this concert began last September and weekly practice sessions have been held since that time. Sunday's program will be approximately one hour and 45 minutes in length, with 1½ hours of actual singing.

Departing this year from its usual method of categorizing its program, the community chorus' concert this year will be in four sections dealing with the Christmas theme.

Four numbers in the first section depict the Advent of Christ: "While by My Sheep," "There Shall a Star Come Out of Jacob," "Praise Ye the Lord," "Lo How a Rose" and "Alleluia."

The second and third sections deal with the birth of Christ, depicted by the following selections from Bach's overture: "For Us a Child is Born," "Laud We the Name," "Arise, Shine, For Thy Light is Come."

Following a 15-minute intermission, the following selections are to be presented from the "Messiah": "And The Glory of the Lord," "O Thou That Tellest Good Tidings," "Glory to God" and "Amen."

A men's quartet will then present four selections at the conclusion with a theme of adoration: "Now Let Every Tongue Adore Thee," "Round de Glory Manger," "Listen to the Lambs" and "A Canticle of Peace."

Members of the quartet include Captain Williams, Robert Richter, Harry Anderson and Daniel Burgh.

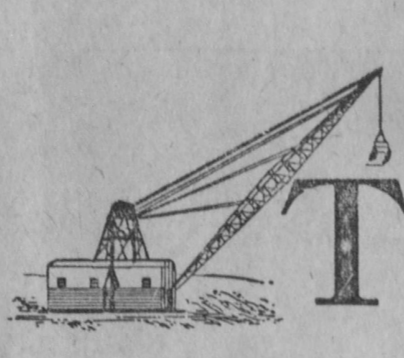
Accompanist on the piano and organ for the program will be Mrs. Merle Panshock of Oscoda.

Westcott said that between \$500 and \$600 in fishing tackle had been stolen at the firm's place of business at the Tawas River mouth on October 29, 30 and November 3.

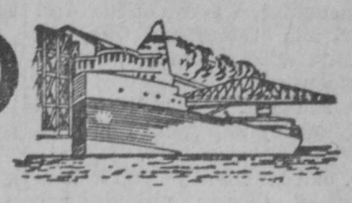

Discussion Renewed on Extra Police Help

Possible hiring of a part time patrolman to assist Police Chief George Westcott is to be discussed at the next meeting of the Tawas City Council.

This recommendation was made at the conclusion of Monday night's regular meeting. It was indicated that the part time position could develop into a full time post next spring.

Chief Westcott requested that a full time man be hired as soon as possible, but most councilmen were of the opinion that the city's present financial status was not adequate for establishing a new position at this time.

Earlier this year, the council authorized hiring of a part time patrolman, but Chief Westcott indicated that he was unable to locate one who would meet qualifications. Alderman John St. James recommended that the city advertise that such a position is open and list the qualifications for filling it.

Need for additional help was stressed by Westcott, who said his work load had increased tremendously during the four years he has held the position. In 1965, arrests totaled 149. The next year, when he held the post part time, there were 241 arrests and 60 complaints investigated. In each succeeding year, activities of the police chief have grown to a point where there have been 340 arrests and 310 complaints investigated with one month to go in the year. Investigation included 42 larcenies and 13 burglaries.

Westcott said that such investigation requires a great deal of his time. This, along with appearances in district court, reduces the amount of time he can devote to patrol work.

In addition to regular patrol and investigation, enforcement of the parking ordinance has grown from two summons issued in 1963 to 56 in 1969, although Westcott admitted that lack of time prevented more attention to this matter.

Westcott said that when he was unable to locate a part time man earlier this fall he worked the extra hours required and, in so doing, believed that he had saved the city between \$1,000 and \$1,500 in additional wages. He pointed out that he was paid on a salary basis and did not receive compensation for the extra hours.

He said that he had received assistance from three good part time patrolmen last summer, but their

regular jobs prevented them from giving any assistance at the present time.

The police chief said there is considerable responsibility involved in filling the position of a police officer, including possible liability for false arrest. He felt that he had risked his life many times behind the wheel in enforcing the law.

The police chief said he was not happy with the new salary schedule adopted by the council at its last meeting, which gave the police chief a \$200 increase and an annual salary of \$7,200. He felt this was "an insult to the position," because of the amount of hours worked and the risk involved.

As an indication of his activity, Westcott said that during the past eight months, fines turned in by his department had far exceeded fines turned in by the two-man department at East Tawas.

He said that he spends a considerable amount of time during duty hours counseling young people. "I am no psychiatrist and I would not be here if I was, but the kids or their mothers call me at all times day and night."

A resolution by Alderman Martin Wellna calling for hiring a full time patrolman received no support. Wellna said that \$5,200 had been included in the police department's 1969 budget for hiring a full time patrolman, but it was realized that this figure was too low. The city spent \$1,598 for part time help this year and he believed that a \$6,000 salary would be more realistic.

Several councilmen were of the opinion that, regardless of hiring a full time patrolman, part time help would probably be required next summer. It was suggested that full consideration be given to advertising for a part time patrolman and Chief Westcott has been requested to appear again at the next meeting of the council.

TA Teachers Threaten Board With Injunction

Claiming that there had been a "breach of an oral or gentlemen's agreement on the part of the board of education concerning coverage under health insurance for the staff of Tawas Area School, a representative of the Tawas Area Education Association last week

warned that if problems could not be resolved on a local level quickly, the matter may be taken into court for settlement.

As part of contract negotiations between the school and TAEA earlier this year, the board of education agreed to supply full fam-

ily hospitalization to TAEA. Following a study of different programs offered, the board advertised for bids and awarded a contract to Confederation Life, low bidder, with John C. Elliott as the local carrier.

In his letter to the board of education last week, Robert Erickson, TAEA president, said his group had already indicated to the board it will be inquiring into the "conflict of interest" question raised by some persons on and off the teaching staff. Robert W. Elliott, school board trustee, is a brother of the successful bidder. The Elliotts are owners of Tawas Bay Agency, Incorporated.

Erickson said that a letter would be sent to the attorney general's office on this matter.

In claiming that there had been a breach of a gentlemen's agreement, Erickson said that during negotiations under health insurance for the staff of Tawas Area Schools, the board agreed to furnish, without cost to employees, full family health insurance.

"The board's representatives made an oral commitment to provide an insurance that would not be less than the coverage it had helped to provide in the past," said Erickson. "It was on the strength of this promise to supply equal coverage that the association did not press to name the carrier of the insurance or the coverage in the master contract."

The TAEA president said the association believed the board had purchased an insurance package that is inferior to the coverage it had been accustomed to and, "being inferior, will cost the employee money to compensate for that lack of coverage."

The teacher group also stated it believed there had been a breach in the specifications unilaterally established by the board. The letter stated that: 1. The specifications do not appear to be comparable with Blue Cross-Blue Shield; 2. The insurance bid accepted by the board did not meet those specifications in all respects.

The TAEA president said that his association "would naturally desire to have these problems settled amicably as soon as possible" and proposed that the negotiators for both sides, who "are most knowledgeable of the problem meet at the earliest convenient date to try and resolve these questions."

The association requested that the board extend the present coverage of Blue Cross-Blue Shield until such time as the association is assured no benefits under the new policy would be less than provided under the current policy.

AuGres Harbor Project Starts Next Spring

Announcement was made last week that contracts would be let in May to start the AuGres harbor of refuge.

Representatives of the United States Corps of Engineers joined representatives of the Michigan Waterways Commission, the AuGres City Council and township boards from Sims and AuGres at a meeting November 25 to iron out final details prior to scheduling advertising for bids next April.

Corps officials said that \$200,000 had been released for the AuGres project during the present year, only a fraction of total funds required. The Michigan Waterways Commission is to build and operate a 60-boat site on land alongside the river just south of the US-23 bridge. The city is to furnish property for this project.

Construction of the marina by the state fulfills the corps of engineers requirement that a certain amount of each project be financed locally.

In addition to the 60-boat marina, the project includes a channel from the US-23 bridge to a point one mile beyond the river's mouth into Saginaw Bay. A breakwater is to be constructed along the northeast side of the channel, providing protection to boats from the northeast storms that make the Point Lookout area one of the most treacherous in the Great Lakes.

ET Council OK's Christmas Turkeys for City Employees

Only routine matters were conducted at Monday night's regular session of the East Tawas Council, according to City Clerk Fred Lomas.

The council adopted a resolution giving a turkey to each city employee for Christmas.

Consumers Power Company will present its annual Christmas food and lighting demonstration Friday, December 5, 1:30 p. m., at the East Tawas Community Building.

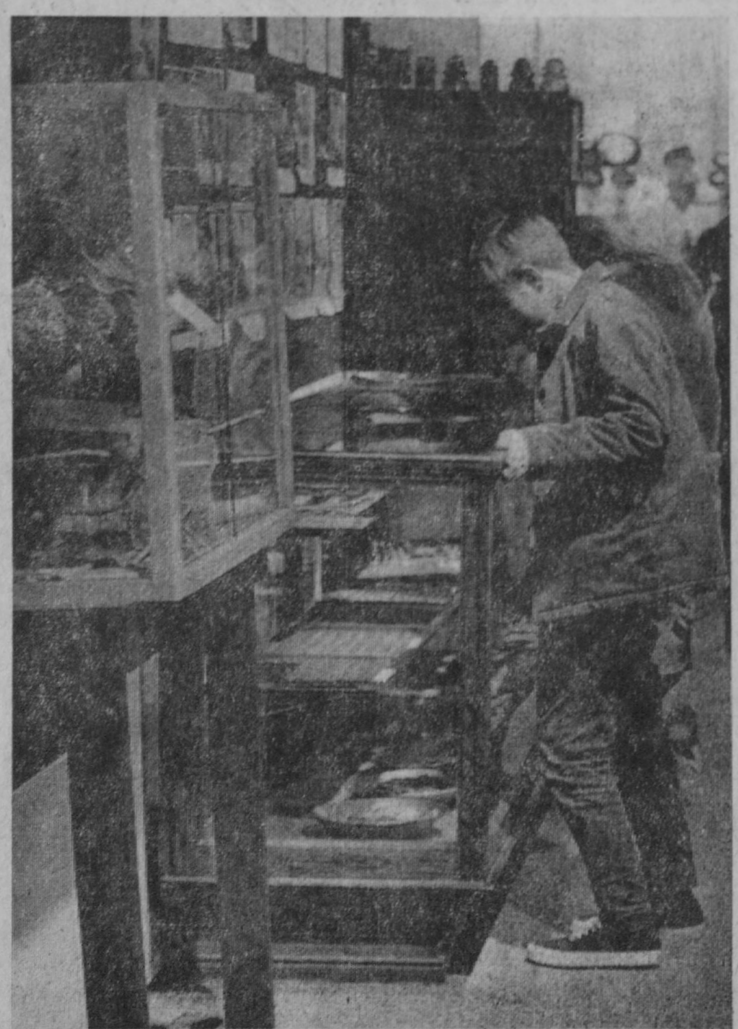
This year's program is entitled "Tis the Season" and will be presented by Margaret Mielock, home service advisor for Consumers Power Company.

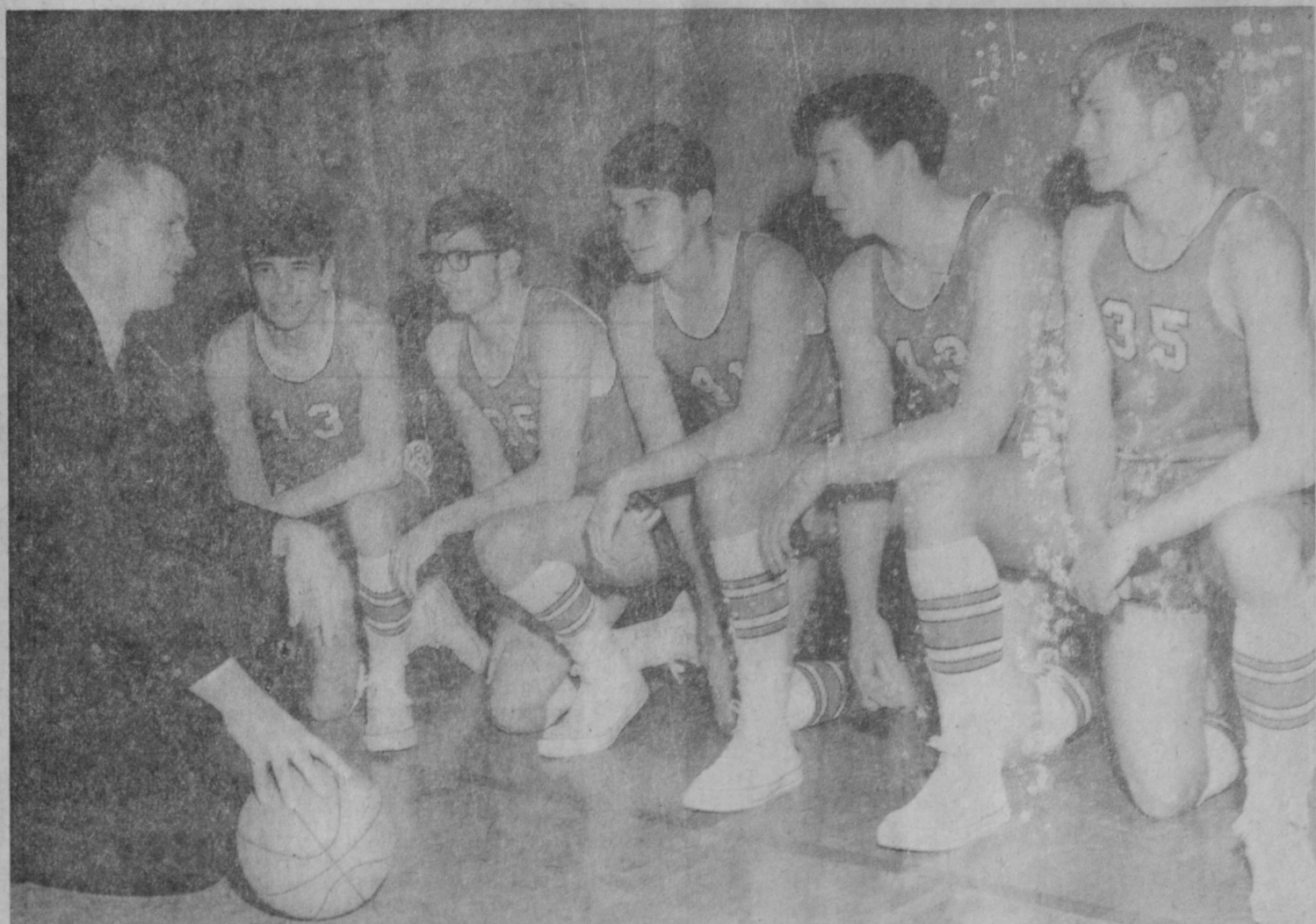

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Christmas Signatures With A Flair



How's your Christmas card etiquette? Do you know the difference between putting your signature on a card going to Aunt Myrtle and the one going to your husband's boss?

Prehistoric Indian Village Discovered in Arenac County

A prehistoric Indian village is new being excavated along the Pine River in Arenac County by a crew of Central Michigan University students. Owner of the land is Delbert Lalone Sr., who has collected hundreds of Indian artifacts in that area.

Every ounce of dirt excavated is carefully sifted for signs of a prehistoric culture. All the excavation goes on from six to 12 inches below the ground. The rolling piece of land on Lalone's property never has been disturbed by a plow and apparently has led to a bonanza of artifacts.

Evidence has been found of a 5,000-year-old Indian village, along with three other distinct cultures. Study of Indian lore is popular in the Southern Arenac-Pinckney area and one resident once owned the state's largest collection of Indian artifacts.

Expect Epidemic Next Year

District Allocated Vaccine for Measles

National and state health authorities warn that 1970 may be a year when rubella—German measles—threatens with the worst epidemic in its history.

In the last national epidemic, in 1964, the United States Public Health Service estimated that 50,000 unborn infants were killed or crippled as a result of rubella, about 370 of them in Michigan.

"Fortunately, a recently developed vaccine—still in short supply—is expected to help minimize the tragic potential of the disease," states Dr. William F. Jackson, director of the District Health Department No. 2, with offices at West Branch.

"Michigan has been able to buy 600,000 doses of the vaccine and proposed to immunize the most common carrier of the disease—the school child of kindergarten through third grade age. If this group is immunized, thousands of pregnant mothers will be protected against the danger of giving birth to a defective, handicapped or dead child," said Doctor Jackson.

The fact that rubella is such a minor and mild disease for the youngsters—that the importance of the immunization is, in a sense at least twice removed from the vaccinated child—may dilute the concentration of our mass immunization effort," said the district director.

"This may make it seem something less than crucial to some Michigan parents, but the program is crucial," he stated.

There are 3,724 children in kindergarten through grade three in District No. 2 and the district has been allocated 3,055 doses of vaccine. Immunization is to start in this district, comprising the Counties of Iosco, Alcona, Ogemaw and Oscoda, in January.

Forest Fires Decreased in Huron Forest

Information released by the United States Forest Service shows that the number of fires controlled during 1969 is less than reported in 1968 and also below the five-year average in numbers of fires, but slightly above the five-year average for acres burned.

Forest Supervisor John von Bargen reports that 106 fires were extinguished in 1969 within the 1,750,600 acres protected by the forest service. This compares with 146 fires in 1968 and an average of 141 fires for the past five years. The 106 fires this year burned an average of four acres this year as compared to 9.5 acres in 1968 and a five-year average of three acres.

Von Bargen contributes the decrease in fire occurrence primarily to the relatively wet spring and fall periods when many of the fires on the national forest normally occur. He also noted that increased efficiency in use of planes for both detection of fires and use

of retardants dropped by plans on going fires contributed to the small burned acreage.

"Most of the success of this past year in our fire control program must still be credited to the forest user," stated von Bargen. "With the user becoming increasingly more aware of the influence he has over the environment surrounding him, he is going to become more critical of poor burning practices used in the past by himself and others. National forest administrators across the country are anticipating even closer cooperation with the citizen in his campaign to prevent fires which damages and destroys our valuable resources, including the air we breathe."

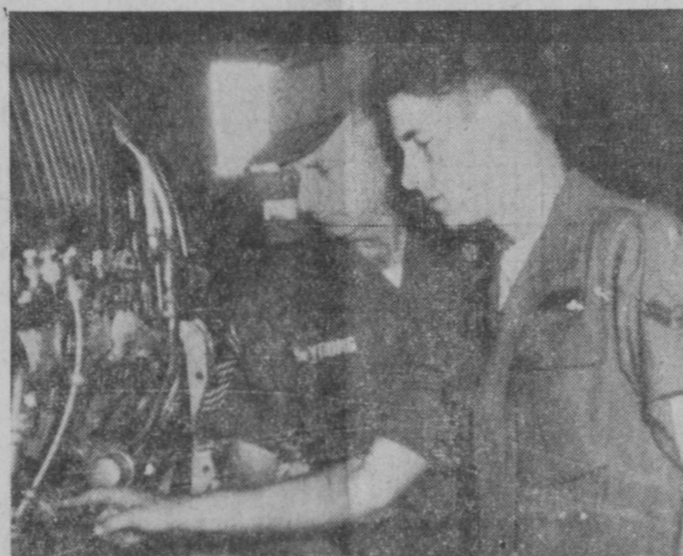

Answer: You will not have to talk to a Social Security representative or go to a Social Security office. In one of the three months before you are 65, you will get a card in the mail asking whether or not you want medical insurance. All that need be done is check the "yes" or "no" block, sign your name and return the card in the self-addressed envelope that comes with the card. Hospital insurance will start the month you become 65.

Question: I did not sign up for Medicare when I was 65. When is the next time I can sign up?

Answer: The next general enrollment period is from January 1, 1970, through March 31, 1970. If you have never signed up at all, you should bring your Social Security card and proof of your age to the office nearest you or contact a Social Security representative when he is at the county building, Tawas City, on the second and fourth Thursday of each month from 9:45 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. or you can contact the Bay City Social Security office, 1009 North Madison, telephone 893-9579. If you are not in this area, the address of the nearest Social Security office is available at your post office. Any Social Security representative can tell you what coverage is available to you.

The Bay City Social Security Office is open Monday through Friday from 8:45 a. m. to 4:45 p. m. and on Monday evenings until 6:45 p. m.

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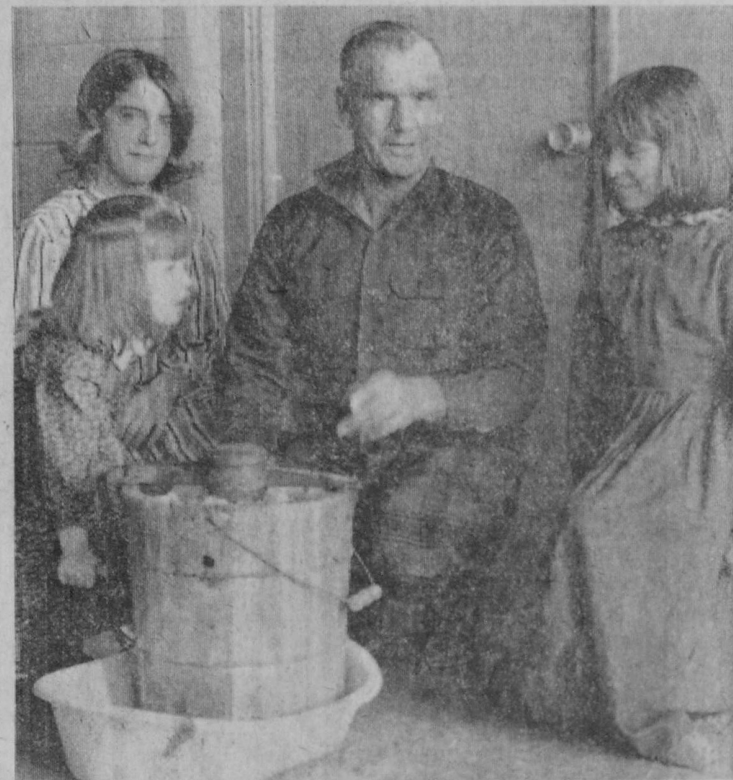

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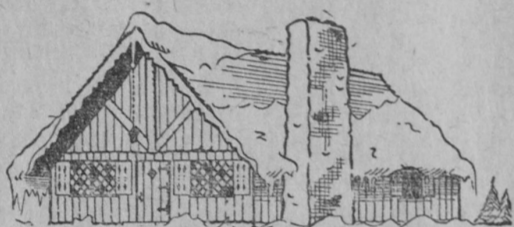
