The training program will consider mental health of school aged children and how teachers may detect emotional problems of children.


John Alexander, principal at Ta-was Area High School, said that all public school teachers would be in attendance and that an invitation had been extended to all parochial school teachers of the community.

In claiming that there had been a breach of a gentlemen's agreement, Ericksen said that during negotiations under health insurance for the staff of Tawas Area Schools, the board agreed to furnish, without cost to employees, full family health insurance.

"The board's representatives made an oral committment to provide an insurance that would not be less than the coverage it had helped to provide in the past," said Ericksen. "It was on the strength of this promise to supply equal coverage that the association did not press to name the carrier of the insurance or the coverage in

the master contract."

The TAEA president said the association believed the board had purchased an insurance package that is inferior to the coverage it had been accustomed to and. "being inferior, will cost the employee money to compensate for that lack of coverage.

The teacher group also stated it believed there had been a breech in the specifications unilaterally established by the board. The letter stated that: 1. The specifications do not appear to be comparable with Blue Cross-Blue Shield; 2. The insurance bid accepted by the board did not meet those specifications in all respects.

Project Starts Next Spring

AuGres Harbor

Announcement was made last week that contracts would be let in May to start the AuGres harbor of refuge.

Representatives of the United States Corps of Engineers joined representatives of the Michigan Waterways Commission, the Au-Gres City Council and township boards from Sims and AuGres at a meeting November 25 to iron out final details prior to scheduling advertising for bids next

Corps officials said that \$200,000 had been released for the AuGres project during the present year, only a fraction of total funds required. The Michigan Waterways Commission is to build and operate a 60-boat site on land alongside the river just south of the US-23 bridge. The city is to furnish property for this project.

Construction of the marina by the state fulfills the corps of engineers requirement that a certain amount of each project be financed locally

In addition to the 60-boat marina, the project includes a channel from the US-23 bridge to a point one mile beyond the river's mouth into Saginaw Bay. A breakwater is to be constructed along the northeast side of the channel, providing protection to boats from the northeast storms that make the Point Lookout area one of the most treacherous in the Great Lakes.





How's your Christmas card etiquette? Do you know the difference between putting your signature on a card going to Aunt Myrtle and the one going to your husband's boss?

Even in these informal living days, there's still a right and wrong way to sign your Christmas cards, and here's a brief review of the rules.

If the husband and wife are sending a card, it is never signed "Mr." Only the first and last acard, it is never signed "Mr."

If the husband and wife are sending a card, it is never signed "Mr. and Mrs." Only the first and last names are used, with the man's name first, such as "Jim and Marge Smith."

When the children's names are included in the signature, the proper listing is father's name first, then mother's name, and finally the children, such as "Floyd, Alice and Scott Williams."

A variation on this is to sign your cards with the man's full name and to add the word "The," such as "The Floyd Williams."

Business cards, according to The Paper Mate Company, makers of colorful Flair pens, are sent by the business rather than by the business man and his wife.

They are signed with either the company name, "The Hawthorne Company," or by the individual sender's name, "Andrew Hawthorne."

Such cards are sent to an office and addressed to a man or a

Such cards are sent to an office and addressed to a man or a woman alone, not to husband and wife.

What about the printed versus the hand signed signature? This is an individual choice, though most people prefer to sign their cards so they can add short personal greetings to express their warmth, and well wishes. their warmth and well wishes.

In such cases it's fun to get in the holiday spirit by signing
