Police Chief Seeks Local Assistance

Following a week of investigation, Tawas City Police Chief George Westcott firmly believes that 14 break-ins early last Tuesday morning were committed by local persons.

"I know who committed these burglaries, but what it takes now is some concrete evidence," stated Chief Westcott Monday morning.

Early on the morning of December 23, three or more persons burglarized 14 Tawas City business places. In addition to stealing change from cash drawers, vandalism amounted to several thousands of dollars.

These burglaries followed closely on the heels of six burglaries Monday, December 15, at East Tawas.

The ironic part of last week's burglaries in Tawas City is that at least three people saw the burglar

suspects on the streets and, in one instance, heard unusually loud noises coming from one of the business places victimized. They did not bother to call a police agency to report what they had seen or heard until too late.

"I want to stress to all residents that I am very much interested in receiving calls from residents when they think something is wrong," stated Chief Westcott. "The time of day makes no difference and I need the cooperation of everyone in this matter."

Westcott believes that if he had received a telephone call immediately from one of the three persons who later stated they had seen three suspicious young subjects in front of business places early last Tuesday morning, they might have been apprehended.

The burglaries started at the Fletcher station, where the building was entered but nothing was taken. An attempt was then made to enter Sally's next to Tawas Lanes.

Most serious damage occurred at the Tawas Lanes building, where the burglars made a mess out of the bowling alley and Donna and Joyce's Beauty Salon. A coffee maker was upset at the bowling alley, chairs and other items of furniture were thrown down the alleys and carpeting was damaged. The beauty salon had extensive vandalism damage.

The burglars then proceeded to Rainbow Service, entered the building but nothing was taken. Bublitz Pure Oil service at the corner of Lake Street and Mathews Street was entered and approximately \$110 in cash taken. The burglars knocked the combination off a large safe but could not gain entrance. They created considerable vandalism in the office and then discharged a fire extinguisher to add to the mess.

The Dutch Kitchen restaurant was entered and a desk rifled. Entry was made into Coyle's Fish and Chips but nothing was taken.

The burglars then moved to the Greystone Service Station near the Tawas River bridge, where \$15 in change was stolen. They moved across the bridge to Barbier's Mobil Service and made off with \$42 in cash. At King's Market, the burglars found \$60, then moved across the street to the Marathon Service Station and stole \$50 in cash.

Finishing their "work," the burglars then went to the Alibi Inn where they made off with a quantity of liquor and then moved across US-23 to the Tre-Mac Bar where \$100 in cash and a quantity of liquor was taken.

Chief Westcott said Monday that he was continuing his investigation and was to question several more persons this week.

Rev. Fr. Torok Appointed Pastor at Harbor Beach

The Rev. Fr. Bela Torok, pastor of St. James Parish, Whittemore, has been appointed pastor of Our Lady of Lake Huron Parish at Harbor Beach and St. Anthony's Parish, Helena.

Appointed as the new pastor of St. James Parish is the Rev. Fr. Terrance A. Raymond, former assistant pastor at St. Mary's Parish, Bay City.

Other changes announced December 26 by the Most Rev. Fr. Francis F. Reh, bishop of Saginaw, included the Rev. Fr. Bernard J. Kirchman, former pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Tawas City, who becomes pastor of Holy Trinity Parish, Bay City, and administrator of St. Hedwig's Parish, Bay City. He had been pastor of Sacred Heart Parish, Merrill.

The Rev. Fr. Francis J. Murray, a native of Tawas City, has been appointed pastor of St. Mary's Parish, Port Sanilac. He had been a professor at St. Paul Seminary, Saginaw.

All of the appointments become effective January 17.

Field Review Shows Need for Watershed Project

At its last regular meeting on December 16, Michigan Soil Conservation Committee examined the field review report on the Tri-County Drainage District of the AuGres Basin Watershed and has found the project to be eligible for consideration under Public Law No. 566. This field review was held in October at which time the field review team heard the problems of the watershed area and then made a tour of a portion of the watershed.

The sponsoring organizations are now making plans to form a steering committee which will proceed with an education-information program, informing the residents of the watershed of the opportunities that can be made available through Public Law No. 566 as well as their responsibilities. It is hoped the steering committee can be formed by the end of January. The education-information meetings will be held as soon as possible after that date.

Minor Fires During Past 12 Months

Minor fire damage during the past year was reported for 1969 by Fire Chief James Lansky of the Tawas City Volunteer Fire Department. The department answered 37 calls during the past 12 months.

The fire chief reported that there were 25 fires of all descriptions in Tawas City. In addition, the fire department assisted the East Tawas department at a fire at the Tawas Golf and Country Club. The volunteer fire department answered eight calls in Tawas Township and three calls in Alabaster Township.

City Had Average Construction Year

The past 12 months proved to be another "average" building year in Tawas City, although a year-end report by Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, indicated that total construction value was slightly less than the previous year.

Bublitz reported that 88 building applications approved had a cost estimate of \$162,660. This compared to 53 permits last year and a total cost of \$194,897.

The city superintendent stated that the above cost figure was about 30 to 40 percent low, because of the tendency of owners to underestimate the value. He said that the figure to be sent to the state showing new construction would be adjusted upward accordingly.

Tawas City's five new homes valued at \$65,400 during the past 12 months showed a drop from the previous year, which happened to be the best building period since 1960. In 1968, there were eight homes constructed with a valuation of \$154,012.

Garage construction with seven applications and a valuation of \$7,550 also showed a decrease.

The big change came in home alterations and repairs where total number of permits jumped from 27 in 1968 to 63 during the past 12 months. Total cost of repair was \$32,923.

Commercial additions also showed an increase in valuation. This category had five permits with a total valuation of \$19,700, as compared to four additions and a valuation of \$1,800 in 1968. There were two new commercial buildings with a valuation of \$5,200.

The report indicated there was one swimming pool constructed at a valuation of \$11,500. Included in the city total was a \$20,387 valuation for the new county garage at the sheriff's department.

April was the best building month with 16 permits with a total valuation of \$39,705. The month of September was next with 14 applications and a valuation of \$28,872. There were 13 permits with a value of \$17,783 during July.

A review of building applications for the past 19 years indicates that construction in Tawas City has been at about the same

level, as far as permits are concerned, for the past 11 years. Total valuation of new construction during those years varied, however.

The city's best building year was in 1956 when 75 permits totaled \$267,835 with no public buildings included. The next best year was in 1959 when 72 permits totaled \$300,735. The Emanuel Lutheran School was included in that total.

New construction valuation for the past decade are as follows: 1960, \$241,464 (included Peoples State Bank); 1961, \$290,445 (included Zion Lutheran School and the liquor store); 1962, \$301,590 (included Tawas City Elementary Unit); 1963, \$105,538 (included addition to Tawas Industries); 1964, \$114,926; 1965, \$168,941 (included Clark Service and Krumrei Distributing); 1966, \$132,419 (included Pure Oil Station); 1967, \$137,265 (included addition to Tawas Industries and warehouse for Tawas Industries).

No Primary at East Tawas

A primary election will not be required at East Tawas to nominate candidates for city offices. As of Monday noon, only incumbent officers had filed nominating petitions with the city clerk.

Candidates for re-election at East Tawas' nonpartisan election next April will include James Campbell, mayor; Grace Peiton, treasurer; Fred B. Lomas, clerk; Earl Hester, First Ward alderman; Edward Higgins, Second Ward alderman; Robert Bolen, Third Ward alderman.

Alcona Tigers Nip Hale Eagles in Tournament

Alcona Tigers won the Whittemore-Prescott Area Christmas tournament Saturday with a close win over the Hale Eagles, 60-72. Alcona had reached the finals with a 77-21 win over Arenac Eastern and a 74-67 victory over Bay City West Catholic. Hale's second place was earned by a 65-59 victory over Whittemore-Prescott and a 60-53 win over Pinconning.

The Tigers and Eagles played a close first quarter with Alcona having the edge until Hale scored three straight buckets to tie it at 22-22 as the quarter ended. Hale took over the lead as the second quarter started with six straight points and a 28-22 lead.

The Tigers put together a

string of 11 points late in the quarter to go ahead again, 39-32, and led at intermission, 42-38. The Tigers stretched their lead to 10 points, 49-39, early in the third quarter, but the Eagles kept pecking away to cut this down to 61-57 at the three-quarter mark.

Bob Somers started off the last quarter with a bucket. Then Plyn Shellenbarger, Dave Brumfield and Mike Cline connected for the Eagles and it was now a new ball game at 63-63.

The Tigers' fast break began to click with four straight fielders to take the lead again. Cline's two-pointer cut the lead down to six, but the Tigers came roaring back with seven more points and a 13-point edge. A basket by Warren Miller and two charity tosses by

Brumfield cut it to nine, but time ran out on Nelson Shellenbarger's hard-working crew as they ended up on the short end of the 60-72 final score.

Al Stevenson and Somers led the scoring with 26-24 points for the winners. Hale's leaders were Brumfield with 17, Cline with 16, Shellenbarger with 14 and Tom Humphrey with 11.

The Eagles earned the berth in Saturday night's championship game by defeating Whittemore-Prescott Cardinals Monday night and then trimmed the Pinconning Spartans, 60-51, in a close game Tuesday night.

Both the Eagles and Spartans had a cold first quarter and Hale Area held a seven-five margin at the first buzzer. The Eagles warmed up in the second stanza, scoring 18 points to the Spartans' nine.

Pinconning came to life after intermission, outscoring the Eagles, 14-12. The Spartans then closed the gap and took the lead by three points about midway in the final quarter.

Hale Area battled back to regain a four-point lead and, in trying to gain possession of the ball, Pinconning ran into foul trouble. The Eagles were deadly at the foul line and meshed 17 out of 25 tosses for a 70 percent shooting average.

The Eagles had four players scoring in double figures, topped by Dave Brumfield's 14. Warren Miller was next with 12 and Plyn Shellenbarger meshed 10. Both Brumfield and Miller zeroed in on 10 charity tosses.

Others scoring for Hale were Greg Wereley, nine; Tom Humphrey, eight; Timmerer, four; Cline, three.

Berthiaume topped the Spartans with 16 points, while Terry Krevinghaus, leading scorer for the class B Pinconning squad, was held

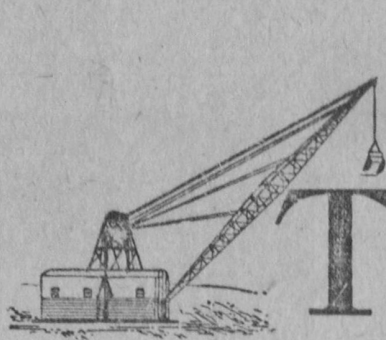

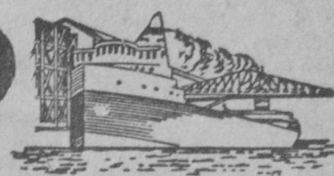

Races for Aldermen-Supervisor to Spice Tawas City Primary

Two races for ward alderman nominations on the city council has assured a primary election in Tawas City on February 16. A third race is slated for one city supervisor post.

In addition, Russell A. Rollin Sr. has indicated he would not be a candidate to succeed himself as mayor. Filing for Republican nomination as mayor was John St. James, who presently serves as

Second Ward alderman.

Two races are lined up for city council posts, all on the Republican Ticket. In the First Ward, Martin Wellna, incumbent, is being opposed by Daniel Ulrich, former alderman, whom Wellna defeated two years ago. The Second Ward where Frank Ahonen, incumbent, is being opposed by Frank Roti.

Unopposed for the Republican nomination as Third Ward alderman is Howard Hatton.

Others filing by the December 29 deadline were Mrs. Mary Byrd, treasurer, and Walter C. Nelson, clerk, both Republicans.

All three of the city's ward supervisors have filed for renomination. Filing nominating petitions by the deadline were Benjamin Brewer, First Ward, and Donald Watson, Third Ward.

Arnold Kuerbitz, Second Ward incumbent, will be opposed for the supervisor post in the primary election by Horace Hilbert.

Since reorganization of the county with district supervisors, the ward supervisor serves as assessing officer.

Voting Machine Representative to Appear at E. Tawas

Fred B. Lomas, city clerk at East Tawas, reported Monday morning that a representative of a firm which sells voting machines is to appear soon before the East Tawas Council.

According to provisions of a new state law, municipalities and townships have until April 6 of this year to reorganize voting precincts to insure that not more than 400 registered voters are in each precinct where paper ballots are used.

Lomas reported two weeks ago that this would entail hiring of a second complete election board at East Tawas and recommended purchase of voting machines.

He said that other voting precincts in the county would probably find themselves in the same situation. The only voting machines at present in Isosco are located at Oscoda Township.

Lomas said the change in the law was brought about following the last election which had so many special propositions. It was found that one precinct in the state with less than 400 voters had more than 3,000 ballots to count, which required a great deal of time for tabulation.

Three Persons Hurt on Snow Machines

Michigan State Police investigated four snow machine accidents in the area last week. Three persons were treated at Tawas Hospital for injuries.

In addition, three persons were ticketed Sunday for snow machine violations. Two persons were operating snow machines in a prohibited area and one person was operating an unregistered machine. Police warn that persons who operate snow machines on roadways are subject to prosecution.

Donald R. Vasicek, 27, Corunna was injured Thursday afternoon when his snow machine crashed on private property in Baldwin Township. A passenger, Kenneth Straughen, 25, Swartz Creek, escaped injury.

Denise R. St. Denis, 15, Oscoda, was injured in another crash Thursday afternoon on private property in AuSable Township. Harold J. Corbin, 13, Mt. Morris, escaped injury.

Kathy Schmidt, 18, East Tawas, a passenger on a snow machine operated by Richard T. Horning, 18, East Tawas, received injuries Saturday night when the snow machine on which they were riding hit a ditch at Tawas Golf and Country Club.

Walter L. Scheffler, 39, Birch Run, and his three sons, Timothy, age 15; Terry, eight, and John, 13, escaped injury Saturday when the snow machine on which they were riding struck a deer which crossed M-55 near the bridge over the East Branch of the AuGres River.

Investigating officers said that Scheffler's machine was traveling about 55 miles per hour when the machine struck the deer.

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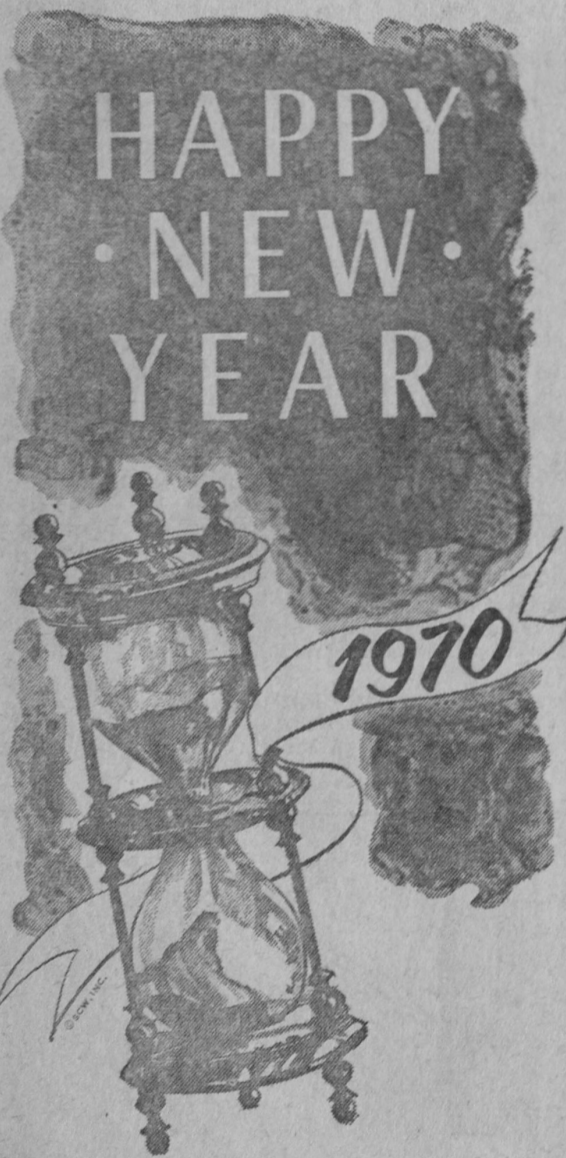

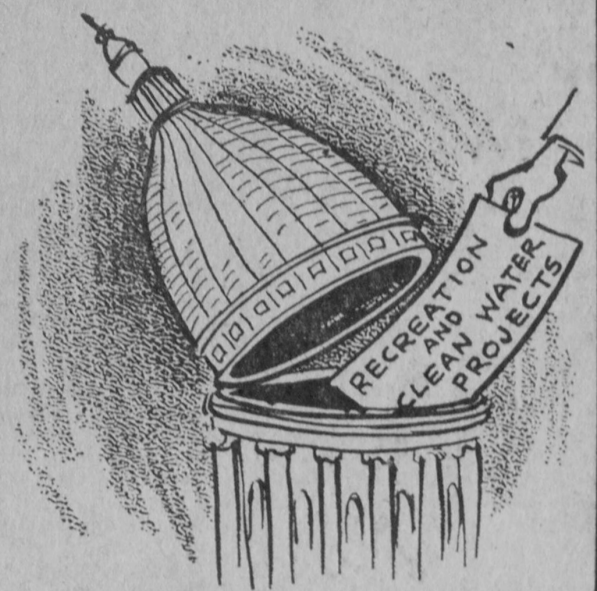

State orders ban on sale of DDT

LANSING—The State Agriculture Commission has blocked the sale of DDT in Michigan, but a federal official in Ann Arbor said pesticide levels in Lake Michigan fish haven't risen since 1955.
The action by the Agriculture Commission

The moon wasn't the only place where the "action was" in 1969. On earth important things were also happening. Among them was the resolute movement for a sort of environmental reformation—a spirited drive for cleaner waters, clearer skies, leisure-time outlets from the tension-packed routine of the workaday world, and a life purged of the haunting dangers of persistent pesticides. One of the big turning points in the quest for that American Dream emerged when Michigan, as a show-down state, became the first to cancel registrations for the general sale of DDT. Near the end of 1969, the U.S. Department of Agriculture followed suit, announcing that all but "emergency" uses of DDT would be eliminated nationwide by the close of 1970. Massive efforts to clean up Michigan's waters by 1980 also gained momentum. More than 100 pollution control projects were approved to receive the first share of monies available under the \$335 million clean water bond program passed by voters a year ago. Under the \$100 recreation bond program which also won at the polls in

1968, the Department of Natural Resources sent to the Legislature requests calling for \$26.6 million to cost-share the first slate of local, urban, and state leisure-time projects. Lake Michigan's salmon fishermen never had it so good as they did in 1969. They landed 175,000 salmon, the whopper of them all being the 34-pound, 13-ounce chinook caught by John Whitkowski of Manistee (lower right photo). Michigan became one of the nation's hot spots among petroleum interests with the discovery of the so-called "North Slope" in the northern Lower Peninsula, shown as the shaded belt on the above map (upper right). The new find showed great potential for oil and gas production and spurred \$880,000 in bids for state oil and gas lease rights in that part of the state. There were a number of other natural resources highlights in 1969, most of them thrusting the we-can-do-it hope which carried men to the moon on that dramatic day of July 20. —Mich. 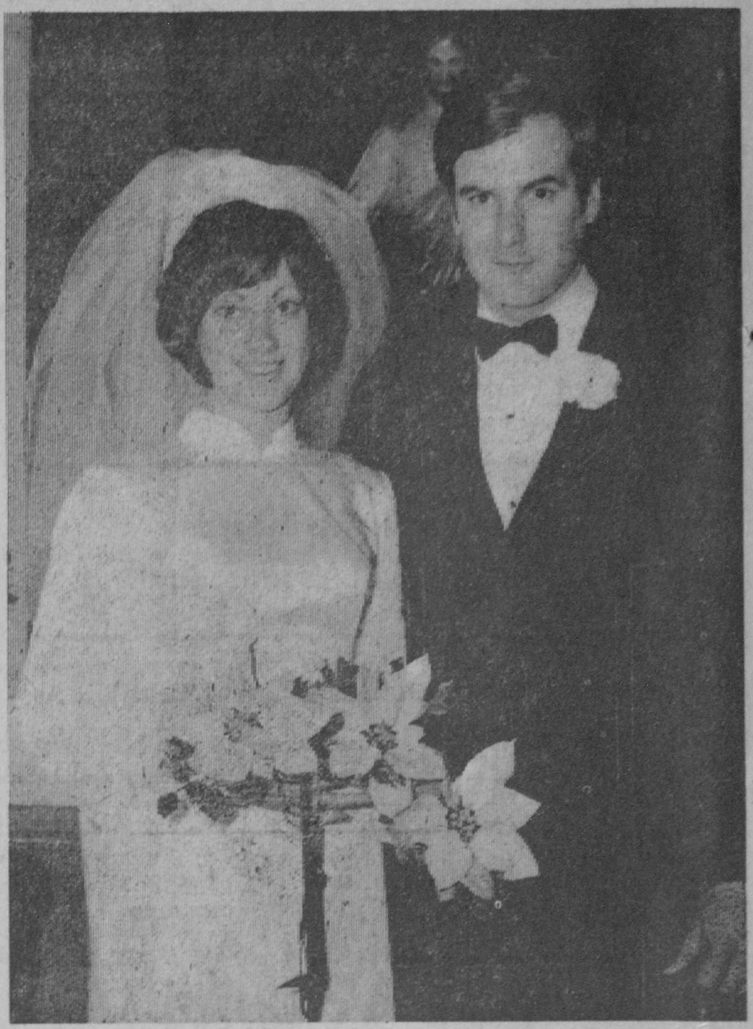

Question: How can I find out about whether my social security check is for the right amount?

Answer: Your best bet is to use the telephone. If the address on your check is to a post office in Bay, Arenac, Gladwin, Ogemaw, Osceola, Iosco or Roscommon Counties, your record should be in the Bay City office of social security. The telephone number is 893-9579, area code 517. Call between 8:45 a. m. and 4:30 p. m. Monday through Friday and Mondays until 6:45 p. m. If your check is addressed to a post office outside these counties, check at the post office for the address of the social security office which will have your record and the phone number may be available at the post office.

The next best way to find out about your benefit is from a social security representative who visits your area. The dates and times will be listed at the bottom of this column or you can check at your post office. You can also write a letter to the Social Security Office, 1009 North Madison, Bay City, Michigan 48706. Be sure to give your name and social security number from either the check or the form you received when your benefits started. For survivors' payments, the name of the worker on whose earnings the benefits are being paid is needed by the office that you contact about the information you want.

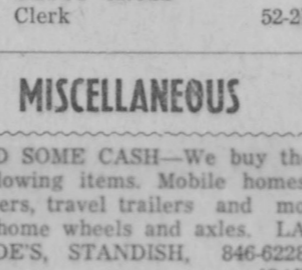

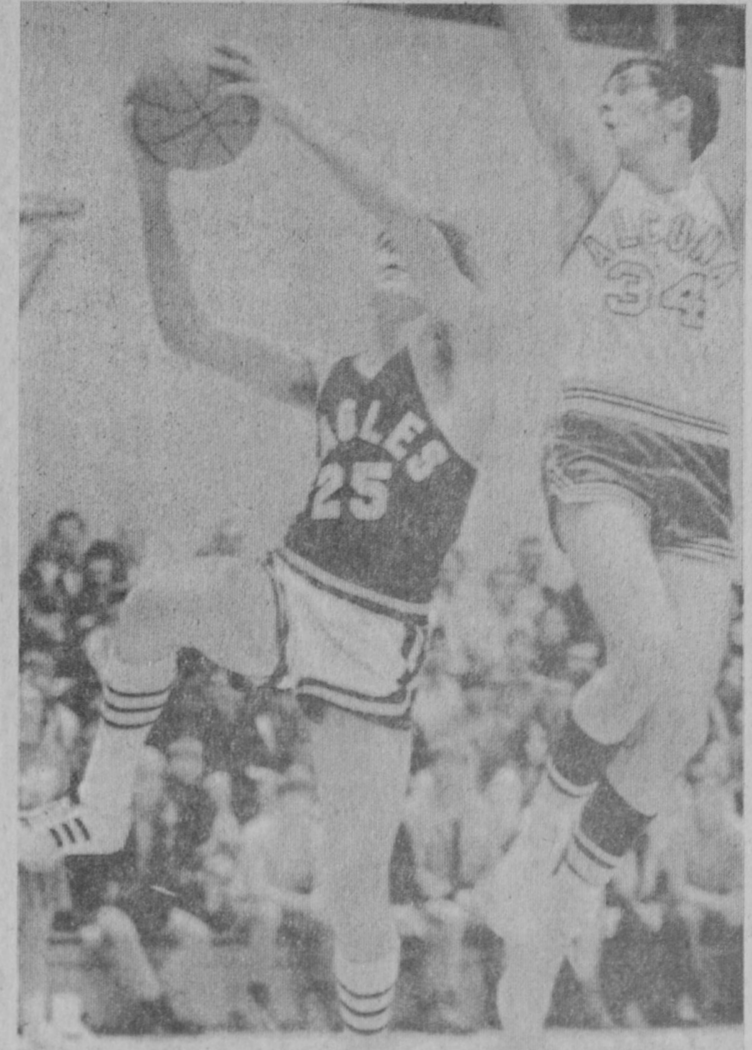

New Executive Director Named

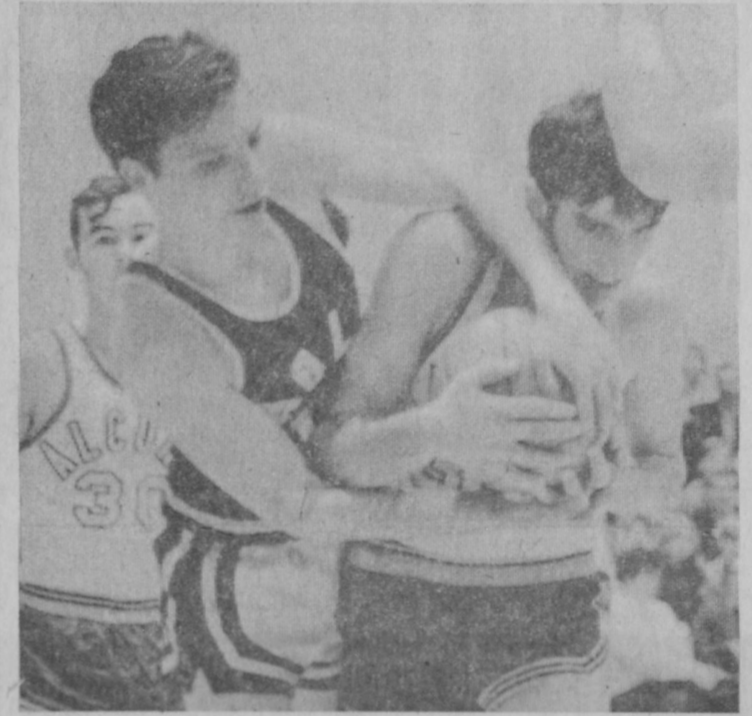


Tom Nemode of Bay City West Catholic was named the outstanding player of the tournament. The Bay City school was awarded the outstanding cheerleader squad trophy.
