## Magistrate Post to Oscoda Man

Appointment of Stanley Snable of Oscoda as district court magistrate for Isosco County was confirmed last Wednesday afternoon by the county board of supervisors.

Snable was appointed to this post with a \$6,500 salary by District Judge J. Richard Ernst.

The new district court magistrate is to maintain offices in the county building.

A retired air force senior master sergeant, Snable had served as the base sergeant major at one time. He served at Wurtsmith from 1958 to 1965 and retired enroute home from overseas duty on November 1, 1967.

He first joined the air force in 1940 and served during World War II until 1945. He was recalled as an air force reservist in 1951 during the Korean conflict. He returned to the Oscoda area upon his retirement.

A native of the Bay City area and a graduate of Bay City Central High School, Snable was an insurance salesman before being recalled to active duty in 1951.

He is now in the process of studying Michigan laws as pertaining to work of the new district magistrate court. Assisting him are Judge Ernst and LeRoy McCue, district court probation officer.

The new magistrate is authorized to accept guilty pleas and pass sentence on all traffic violations with the exception of careless, reckless, impaired and drunk driving. He is also authorized to accept pleas on conservation law violations, serves as deputy clerk

## Principals Say TA Enrollment Creeping Up

Enrollment at Tawas Area School continues to creep upward, according to a report at Monday night's meeting of the board of education.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, said that enrollment in grades kindergarten through six had now reached 902 children. The count reported at the last meeting was 899 and this was nine higher than the total registered at the start of the year.

An increase of six students was noted in the past two weeks in the high school, reported Bill R. Wilder, principal.

While the rate of increase does not seem to be alarming, administrators have pointed out that classrooms are becoming extremely overcrowded.

Miss Bolen reported to board members that parishioners of Immaculate Heart of Mary Church had voted 90-18, to discontinue the IHM School next fall. A survey is now being taken to determine the number of students who would be attending St. Joseph School next fall. It was said that the four classrooms there would house grades one through six.

Miss Bolen said that, in all probability, the public school would receive some children who had attended parochial schools.

"We will definitely need additional elementary teachers next fall," she said.

## TA Community Ed. Program Well Received

Increasing participation in the community school program, partly financed by a grant by the Mott Foundation, was noted Monday night by Gene Gerber, director.

In presenting his budget for 1969-70 to the board of education, Gerber said that indications are that participation in the adult high school program next fall can expect an increase.

Present enrollment during the winter term includes 37 students in adult high school, as compared to 25 for the fall term; 118 persons in adult enrichment, down six from the fall term; 280 in youth enrichment, up nearly 200 from the start of the term.

Budget for the community school program proposed for next year is \$19,997. This compares to \$19,234 during the current year. The budget for 1968-69 includes \$3,727 to be used for the summer program.

Gerber presented a suggested summer program which would be open to residents of all ages—from fourth graders to persons 50 years and over.

Classes would include archery, arts and crafts, badminton, basketball (boys', girls' men's), baton twirling, bicycle repair, cooking for fun, creative dramatics, peewee baseball, gymnastics, horse-shoes, mathematics for fun, knitting, reading for fun, science for fun, softball (slow pitch for men and women), singing, teen club, table tennis, tot lot, beginning and advanced tennis, track and field, typing, volleyball and wrestling.

Courses provided will depend upon registration of those interested. Complete information on the summer program is to be announced at a later date by Gerber.

## Reed Returned to Face Isosco Murder Charge

Alvin (Jack) Reed, held on an open charge of murder, has been returned to Isosco County after psychiatric examination at the state forensics center, Ypsilanti.

Officials here said that a report from the forensics center indicated that Reed was capable of aiding in his own defense on the charge of having allegedly fatally wounded Mrs. Norma Williamson of Whittemore on December 17.

A hearing would probably be held in Isosco Circuit Court, at which time testimony would be given by psychiatrists from Ypsilanti.

## Grant Oscoda Relief on Loss

Tax relief in the amount of \$3,602.16 was granted to Oscoda Township last Wednesday by the Isosco County Board of Supervisors.

This figure represents the county's share of the loss in revenue that was brought about by a reduction in valuation on Consumers Power Company property in Oscoda Township.

In an historical precedent last month, the Michigan Tax Commission upheld an appeal on 31 parcels of land in Oscoda Township owned by the power company. As a result, the township lost \$1,111,865 in assessed valuation, which meant an actual revenue loss of \$24,905.78.

The county's share of this loss was \$3,602.12. The township board had an excess of tax rolls of \$5,113.72, which meant that the total loss in revenue was \$19,792.

The township board is now negotiating with the Isosco Intermediate School District for relief of \$811.48 in taxes, as well as Oscoda Area School for relief of \$10,252.33.

Supervisors were of the opinion that the tax revenue should be waived because of the fact that the tax commission's ruling was not made public until January 14, one day after tax statements had been mailed to property owners.

Had this action not been taken, the township board would have been required to spread the \$19,792.06 loss in revenue on the township tax rolls.

The township board of review had cut the power company's assessment in March 1968 by \$827,370, or about 26 percent of that requested. In October, the tax commission upheld the township's assessment, but the power company then appealed for a hearing.

The case was reconsidered and the township withheld mailing tax statements until January 13. The tax commission announced its cut the following day.

The major portion of the property involved was river frontage. Some of the frontage was included in the original holdings of the Louds, projectors of hydroelectric dams on the AuSable River.

Gem Survey had established true cash value at \$25.71 per front foot, but the power company main-

tained that this figure was too high, inasmuch as federal regulations prohibited the company from selling this property during the life of its federal use license.

Charles Smith, township supervisor, said that two more dams were to be licensed by the federal government this year. Because of the no sale clause in the license, the assessment is to be reduced in order that a similar problem will not be encountered next year.

No estimates were given but, based on the current loss, it would mean that the county, schools and township would have a total loss of nearly \$40,000.

## Board Vows to Hold Line on Health Budget

With an eye toward "holding the line" on its share of the district health department's budget, Isosco Board of Supervisors approved paying \$19,834 as its share of the operation, as budgeted last year by the previous board of supervisors.

This sum represents 41 percent of the district health unit's total budget. It was reported that the district health unit, which includes Isosco, Ogemaw, Alcona and Oscoda Counties, sought to have Isosco's share raised to 50 percent of the total.

Reason for this change, it was said, was that Isosco has a larger population than the other counties. Supervisors pointed out, however, that they disagreed with population figures being projected for Ogemaw County. It was also felt that this county should receive some credit for the fact that Oscoda Area Schools provides its own nursing service and that the district health department is relieved of this work.

In other business, Henry Oates, tax equalization director, appeared before the board and explained the reason why the City of Whittemore was given an adjustment on this year's taxes.

He said that his sales study made last year indicated that property sales in that community had been approximately 79 percent of appraised property valuation.

The sales study also indicated that adjustments would have to be made upward in various parts of East Tawas and Tawas Township, where property appraisals were running lower than actual sales. Over the whole county, he said that sales were about 100 percent of appraisals.

He said that he had received no further information from the state tax commission if the Whittemore reduction would be allowed.

A long discussion was held on measures to be taken to provide emergency ambulance service when area funeral directors cease.

## Perchville Festival Drew Record Week-End Crowd

Record crowds jammed the ice of Tawas Bay Saturday and Sunday for the sixth annual Tawas Perchville Festival. Despite mild temperature accompanied by fog early Sunday, weather conditions were favorable for the event.

Reigning over the week-end festivities was Mrs. James Mason, Garden City, who was selected Saturday afternoon as the 1969 queen.

"My husband and I came here last year for the festival and enjoyed it," said Mrs. Mason. "We decided to spend the entire week-end here this year and I was extremely surprised when chamber of commerce officials found us fishing on the ice and selected me as the festival queen."

The 1969 queen received her crown during Saturday night's banquet at the Holland Hotel. Officiating at the ceremony was Barry McGuire of Lansing, former Tawas resident, who had been crowned Perchville king the previous night.

On hand to participate in the festivities was Mrs. Peter Young of Warren, 1968 Perchville queen. Her husband is a former East Tawas resident and a graduate of Tawas Area High School.

Bernard Slavinski of Tawas City won first place for the largest pike. His fish measured 35 inches and weighed 11 pounds.

Lorna Joyce of Tawas City caught the largest pike in the children's category. Her fish measured 30 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches and weighed seven pounds.

Social events were well attended during both nights of the festival. More than 100 people attended Friday night's stag fish fry at the Barnes Hotel. Bob Reynolds, WJR-radio sports announcer, who has been a visitor here during winter festivities for the past 20 years, officiated at crowning ceremonies for Perchville King McGuire.

A headcount Saturday night revealed that 210 persons were in attendance at the annual Perchville banquet held at the Holland

Hotel. Walter Champion of Tawas City was toastmaster.

## Board Opens Bids; More Next Meeting

A contract was awarded Monday night to F. M. Piggott Company, Bay City, for purchase of four typewriters to be used in the commercial department of Tawas Area High School.

Piggott was low bidder among four firms entering bids. Its bid was to furnish four Underwood typewriters at a unit cost of \$149.50.

Opening of bids on bus chassis was delayed until March 10. Also to be studied at the March 10 meeting are bids for furnishing the remainder of equipment for biology and physical science laboratories. The school had purchased \$8,000 worth of equipment for the laboratories last July, but then had to delay purchase on the remainder due to the lack of funds.

It was reported that because of the delay, one bid received indicated that equipment to complete the laboratory would now cost \$5,292, an increase of 10 percent. The bid was tabled and administrators were directed to obtain prices from other firms on the equipment.

## Hale Health Council Opens Seal Campaign





in the recent millage election, based on the number of persons voting, was established as follows: Tawas City and East Tawas, \$22; Tawas Township, \$18; Alabaster Township, \$16.

The board authorized administrators to enter into contract with Consumers Power Company to install a new dryer in the home economics room. Total cost of the dryer is \$130. An electric range was also purchased at a cost of \$190. The present range is 13 years old and not operating. Both items are to come under the power company's replacement plan. Replacements are made at no cost to the school.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that the budget to be presented to the allocation board must be ready by early April. Choices are to be made where money is to be directed and a discussion is to be held at the March 10 meeting on these questions.

Mick said that there will not be enough funds available to do all the things that the school desires, but he urged board members to list priorities in order that various programs may be priced and considered.

Authorization was given to advertise for bids on two electric welders presently in use at the shop. Purchased as federal surplus, it was found that four of these large industrial-type welders required too much power to operate. Money received from sale of two welders will be used to purchase smaller units.

# Forest Chats

HURON - MANISTEE NATIONAL FOREST

Favorable weather continues to help the deer situation in the county but the critical part of the winter will start now.

Where deer are concentrated the bulk of the available natural browse has been taken earlier in the winter so they will have to be able to range out from cover further for food. They also will be feeding on the less favorable foods at this time of year.

Near timber sales, in areas where there is a favorable balance of deer and natural foods, we don't expect serious problems. We do know that there will be localized areas on the forest where

they could have serious problems during these last days of winter. We hope to direct volunteer work into these areas if necessary.

The Iosco Sportsman's Club has had several work sessions in two wintering areas near the AuSable River. The last outing was a browse management project located northwest of Five Channels Dam. Three acres of noncommercial hardwood and aspen were cut down to stimulate sprouting growth. The tops are available this year for deer but the sprouts will be expected to provide browse for the next three years.

During field examination of the area last year, our foresters noted a serious lack of deer browse in this large wintering area. In writing the multiple use plan for the area, they designed 20 acres of "patch" browse production projects along the edge of the swamp. In addition to having volunteer sportsmen help, we also have requested funds for completion of the projects next year.

Iosco Sportsman's Club and Michigan Deer Hunters' Association have sponsored several work sessions out of Oscoda and have worked along the lower sections of the AuSable River.

About a year ago, we reported that pulpwood production was quite low in the county due to market conditions. Since fall, however, our markets have steadily strengthened. Jack pine pulpwood markets have firmed up due partly to scarcer supplies west of the county. We predict that production for the county will return to the 1965 and 1966 levels during this year.

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## On Pins and Needles HINTS FOR TEENAGERS

...From your Sewing Editor



### QUESTION MARKS ???

Where is your wardrobe going? Fashion explorers are looking into every cranny of the earth for ideas and heading for outer space. Put a compass in your pocket and chart your own fashion way.

Here is a picture of the fashion independent. She is intrigued by cowboys and Indians and gypsies and pirates. With careful caprice, she has put on a swashbuckling pair of navy bell-bottomed pants, a red printed blouse and a long, white vest over all. The look is especially her own because she made it herself (McCall's 9586). Then she linked a chain belt around her waist, tied a silken scarf around her hair, ringed her fingers opulently and slipped her feet into a pair of patent leather moccasins.

As a stylemaker, she hazes her own trail. As a dressmaker, she takes the advice of professionals. At Coats & Clark, they stress the importance of marking to achieve sewing success. Marking means transferring pattern markings to the fabrics, after cutting. Accurate marking serves as the guide for all construction.

### The Wheel of Fortune

How to mark has alternatives, depending on your fabric and personal preferences. Using dressmaker's carbon and a tracing wheel is one of the most accurate methods. There are two kinds of wheels. The kind with teeth makes a line of small dots and can be used on most fabrics. The kind without teeth makes a continuous line and is good for hard-to-mark fabrics.

A tracing wheel is not recommended for sheers, where marks would show through on the right side, and spongy fabrics or tweeds, where the marks might not show at all. Instead, try tailor's tacks. This method is visible on both sides of the fabric and does not leave any permanent marks. A tailor's tack is made with a needle and long doubled thread. At the point to be marked, take a small stitch through the pattern and both layers of fabric, leaving a 1" end. Take another stitch at the same point, leaving a 1" loop. Cut the thread, leaving another 1" end. Remove the pattern and carefully pull apart the two layers of fabric to the limit of the thread loop. Cut through center of threads joining right sides of fabric. A tuft of thread will be left as a marker on each piece.

### How Many Marks Should a Dressmaker Make?

There are two kinds of markings on a pattern. Those which help in pattern alteration and layout need not be transferred. Those which aid in garment construction must absolutely be transferred. Dotted lines for darts and other construction details, circles for matching points such as the sleeve cap and shoulder seam, where fabric meets in a dart or where the collar ends at a lapel are obviously essential. Also pay special attention to marking seamlines at such critical places as curves and points on collars and cuffs, or inner corners on a square neckline. A solid line which shows where a piece is to be folded during construction has to be marked. It is helpful to mark center-lines, front and back, as a reference for proper fit and center-points on smaller pieces for accurate joining.

Your pattern is the map you follow for a safe and speedy trip to a finished garment. Let your sense of direction guide you style-wise, but learn to read and use the dressmaking road signs.

### Study Shows Need for Vo. Ag. Course

15 Years Ago—

March 5, 1954—A survey of Tawas Area School District has shown that 70 boys have a farm background and the board of education, along with a special committee, feel that the number furnished a basis for establishment of a vocational agricultural class as soon as possible.

An amendment was reported out of committee Tuesday in the state legislature, that, if passed, would provide for the continuous maintenance of dams built to control water levels in the Michigan inland lakes. While of benefit in the maintenance of such projects throughout Michigan, the amendment was prepared to meet problems arising in the VanEtan Lake Dam. The dam was built in 1947 under the special assessment of \$54,000 to property owners benefited by the dam. Spread over a three-year period, property owners have now paid all taxes levied

### Order Trees- Shrubs Now For Spring Planting

"Order trees and shrubs for spring planting now," advises Edward Burgess, forestry and equipment committee chairman, Iosco County Soil Conservation District.

"Even though there is snow on the ground now, the tree planting season is very close," notes Mr. Burgess. "Those who want to plant trees and shrubs for forestry and wildlife purposes stand a better chance of getting what they want if they order now."

The soil conservation district has a good line of tree seedlings this year including red and white pine, spruce and others. Also available in limited quantities for the first time are blue spruce and Austrian pine.

In addition to the trees again this year, wildlife shrubs such as autumn olive, hawthorne and honeysuckle can be obtained individually or in mixed packets of 100 and 500. Mr. Burgess states that wildlife shrub plantings are becoming very popular. They are very good additions to wildlife habitat, especially in hard winters. Thousands of acres of poor and unused land in the county can be

improved very reasonably by the tree and shrub plantings.

Along with trees and shrubs which can be purchased from the district, tree planting by hand or machine can be arranged through the district's tree planting manager, Elmer Anschuetz, 4051 West M-55, Tawas City.

Anyone who is not sure what or where to plant may contact the soil conservation service office, Federal Building, East Tawas, for assistance. Those interested in federal cost sharing are to contact the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, also in the Federal Building.

### At Andrews University

## Dairy Technician Course Starts March 3

A training class in dairy technician will be offered beginning March 3 through the Manpower Development and Training Act. This training will be held at Andrews University, Berrien Springs, and is being inaugurated by the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

Training is open to interested persons who have an eighth grade education, are able to read and write well enough to understand technical instructions and are at least 17½ years of age. Persons interested in this training should have the physical ability to stoop, bend and climb; possess normal use of eyes and ears; be able to lift up to 75 pounds, and able to withstand varying weather conditions.

The course will consist of orientation to the dairy cattle enterprise. It will include introduction, classroom work, milking machines and procedures, DHIA testing and

artificial breeding. Upon completion of the training, dairy jobs will be available to applicants in various areas of Michigan, wherever the need exists. A study has been made of the job opportunities. It is estimated that upon completion of the course there will be ample opportunity for trainees to locate a desirable dairy job.

The wage rates will range from \$350 to \$500 per month, plus house and extras for married couples, and \$300 to \$400 per month, plus room, board and laundry for singles.

Qualified applicants will be paid while attending this training, and in some cases, subsistence will also be paid. The course will last for 22 weeks.

Interested persons may get further information by contacting their local Michigan Employment Security Commission or Rural Manpower Office.



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


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
