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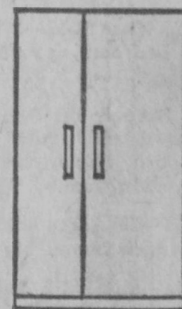

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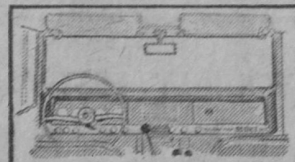
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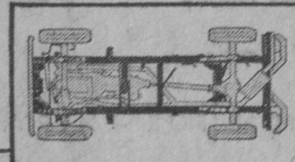

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Second Largest Timber Sale in Forest History

John Von Bargen, forest supervisor, Huron-Manistee National Forest, has announced the sale of

the second largest timber sale in the 60-year history of the forest. The 10-year sale on the Harrisville Ranger District includes 113,500 cords of wood to be cut from 7,000 acres of land. Known as the bridge sale, it has been designed to provide for improved wildlife habitat, watershed conditions and access along with the timber yield. Timber cutting units have also been arranged to retain a pleasing aesthetic forest environment.

Participating in the oral auction were the Abitibi Corporation of Alpena, United States Plywood of Gaylord and Packaging Corporation of America at Filer City. After two hours of spirited bidding, Packaging Corporation emerged as the final and successful bidder with a total bid value of \$215,125.00. A portion of this money will be reinvested in the sale area in road improvements and timber improvement work. The greater

portion will be placed in the United States Treasury with a 25 percent share being returned to counties of the forest for their use on roads and schools.
