

## Council OK's Street for Weir Anchorage

A new development in efforts to secure a suitable site for location of a coho weir in the Tawas River was revealed at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

The council went on record as giving the mayor and city clerk authority to negotiate a one-year lease with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for an anchorage point at the foot of Hamilton Street. The location is west of the Latter Day Saints Church and upriver from the mouth of Dead Creek.

Reportedly, attempts are being made to interest the state in a one-year lease of property owned by Harold Bublitz and Pure Oil Company on the opposite side of the river for the loading site. This property has frontage on US-23, is zoned commercial and contains about 300 feet of river frontage.

This site had been recommended as the council's first choice at a meeting between the city and state last month. It was stated that representatives of the DNR were

interested in the property and that contacts with the owners were to be made this week.

Last week, the city planning commission went on record as endorsing the Bublitz-Pure Oil Company property for the weir. As an alternative, it suggested the possible use of property behind the city hall as a site.

Both the council and the state are desirous to obtain a site as close as possible to the mouth of Tawas River. While this site is about one-quarter mile above the river mouth, its location is most suitable as it would not interfere with boat traffic which is heaviest near the city's launching ramps.

The council has emphasized that the proposed weir anchor point on Hamilton Street would be for one year. It was felt that inasmuch as the state was considering installation of a temporary weir this year, it would be in the best interest to study its operation during the first run of coho salmon in the river. A decision on a permanent weir site could be made at a later time.

Location of the proposed weir was blown into a full scale controversy two weeks ago when residents of the First Avenue-First Street area objected to location of the trap near the First Street bridge.

Residents of that area believed that its location would be detrimental to private property owners because of a trespass and parking problem which could be caused by large numbers of persons who visit the site.

Last Wednesday, the Iosco Board of Supervisors signed a one-year contract with the DNR for use of county property along the river as an anchor point for the weir. Supervisors stated, however, that the lease was contingent upon approval of the city council. This was not indicated in the signed lease, however.

Removal of coho from the river late this summer and early fall is a necessity as the fish die soon after spawning. Fishing is to be limited to the bay and the Tawas River is to be off limits to fishermen.

Representatives of the DNR have said that the weir site would be completely fenced off. A conveyor system is to be used to transport coho trapped in the weir to waiting trucks.

The weir to be installed this year would be a temporary affair constructed of pipes. The state hopes to secure a site later for a permanent installation, which would include concrete pads for trucks and a building.

## Iosco Finances Improve; Still Expect Deficit

County Treas. Edward Nelkie reports this week that the county's financial picture has brightened somewhat since last April, but he still anticipates that the general fund would end with a deficit at the close of 1969.

Last April, Nelkie estimated that the county would end the year with a \$54,000 deficit. While he said he could make no definite prediction as to what the deficit would be on December 31, he believed it would be much lower than his original estimate.

Reason for this is apparently due to an intensive collection campaign on delinquent taxes. This year, city and township treasurers had returned more than \$49,000 in delinquent taxes to the county treasurer to collect.

Nelkie said that his office had mailed 4,000 statements to delinquent property owners. As a result, collections during the past four months were \$27,000 higher than during the same period of 1968.


The treasurer also noted that revenue from the district court had increased to a point where he believed it was higher than under the old justice of the peace system. He said this was probably due to the increased business during the summer months.

Nelkie also stated that revenue from the various county offices was running about 20 percent higher than preceding years.

Last April, the county also faced the possibility of operating an ambulance service. Nelkie said that adoption of a new system by other local governmental units had relieved this previously anticipated strain on the county treasury.

## Supervisors Approve Garage; Let Contract

A five to four roll call vote Wednesday saw the Iosco Board of Supervisors approve a plan to re-submit plans to contractors for construction of a new garage for the sheriff's department.

On recommendation of the Iosco Building Authority, the board authorized elimination of some items in plans in order to reduce costs of the project.

Following this action, the building authority accepted the low bid of Don Reed Construction Company, Lincoln, of \$20,387 for construction of the new building. It was reported that the garage is to be completed within 90 to 120 days.

Originally, the county's architect had estimated cost of the building at \$27,500. When bids were opened, however, costs ranged from a low of \$40,982 to a high of \$45,000.

It was then decided to eliminate toilets, plumbing, electrical and heating items in plans in order to reduce costs. The original plan included office space in the new structure, but this was eliminated. It is now the thinking that present living quarters utilized by the sheriff could be eliminated in the future and expanded into office space.

The new, 30 by 60-foot garage will be constructed to conform with lines of the jail and county building. To be built of concrete blocks, with a stone front to match the other buildings facing US-23, it will have four stalls for storage of sheriff's department vehicles and boats.

The building is to be located on the west side of the county property. A parking area located off US-23 is to be preserved.

Voting in favor of resubmitting the proposal to contractors were Supervisors Aubrey Belson, Fred Lomas, Carlton Merschel, Walter Miller and Clement Stephan. Opposing the move were Supervisors Jack Allen, Robert Foster, J. Berkeley Smith and William Weryley Jr.

Acting on the building authority are A. J. Aulerich, Bruce Myles and Gordon Huck.

Included in the proposal was a plan to combine this project with payment of the balance owed on hangars at the Iosco County Airport. The hangars were constructed by the late Floyd Schaaf of East Tawas and had been leased by the county. Remaining cost of the hangars would be \$35,229.

The two projects would be financed under a new financial arrangement with the county building authority, which allows the latter to bond the county without a vote of the people.

In other business, the board of supervisors approved a request from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for the use of county-owned property along the Tawas River as an anchor point for a proposed salmon weir. Approval was given subject to approval of the Tawas City Council.

The board nominated Mrs. Doris Thayer of Hale as the county's liaison agent with the Northeast Child Guidance Clinic, Alpena. The appointment is to be made by the child guidance clinic's board of directors.

Approval was given to allow one part-time employee in the probate court office to assist with micro-filming that department's records.

Payment of \$7,093 to Gregory Construction Company for completion of work on the medical care facility addition was approved. The Department of Social Services approved \$5,000 of this amount from its funds.

Appointed as county members of the East Central Michigan Advisory Council were Adolph Siegrist, Whittemore; Harry Krueger, Wilber Township; the Rev. William Lindholm, East Tawas; Weryley, Plainfield Township; Paul Chevis, Tawas City; John Skrocki, Grant Township; James Reynolds, Oscoda; Donald Karcher, Oscoda; Burdge Ashton, Oscoda; Richard M. Harris, East Tawas.

A resolution by Allen, calling for county building flags to be flown at half staff during funerals of all Vietnam war veterans, as well as during funerals of all veterans of foreign wars, was approved by the board.

Supervisor Foster was appointed to the county planning commission.

## Dodge Named New Principal at Hale Area School

Richard C. Dodge has been hired as principal of Hale Area Schools to replace Jerry L. Inman, who resigned after four years to accept the superintendency at Kingsley.

Dodge will receive his master's degree in administration from the University of Michigan in August. Previous experience included working in the personalized curriculum program for potential school dropouts and culturally deprived youngsters at Flint North-western High School.

Prior to this, he served as director of vocational education at Mt. Morris High School for two years and as teacher of business and physical education for two years in the same school system.

Dodge and his wife, Lynn, have purchased a home on Londo Lake.

## Maas Elected President of Hale Area School Board

Herman E. Maas was elected president of the Hale Area Board of Education in its recent reorganization for 1969-70.

Other officers named were Thomas L. Clark, vice president; Mrs. Audrey Kocher, secretary; Gilbert Follette, treasurer.

Regular meetings of the board are held the second Monday of each month in the school library at 7:30 p. m.

Clark was appointed as a voting delegate to represent the Hale Area board at meetings of the Michigan Association of School Boards.

A committee of Dale Brumfield, Clark and Follette was appointed to represent the school board in future teacher negotiations.

Bids awarded for the coming year were McDonald Dairy, milk; Farm Bureau, bus insurance; Ammond-Restefner Oil Company, gasoline and fuel oil.

## Two Auto Negligence Suits Filed

Two auto negligence causes and one damage suit were filed Friday in Iosco Circuit Court.

Kathleen and Merrell J. DeWitt filed a \$90,000 damage suit against William Look and Sons, Incorporated, East Tawas.

An automobile owned by the East Tawas firm, driven by Burdine Orr, was involved in a collision with the DeWitts' automobile in October 1967 at the M-55-US-23 intersection in Tawas City.

Mrs. DeWitt claims damages of \$50,000 and DeWitt asks damages of \$10,000.

An auto negligence cause was filed by Joseph and Yula Perry vs. Chester H. Houswerth in the amount of \$15,000. This cause involves a collision on US-23 at Oscoda on September 11, 1968.

Damages of \$25,000 are asked by Awuld H. and Irene Tonneberger vs. Robert J. and Marion Toska of East Tawas. The Tonnebergers own property in Wilber Township and claim that a bridge allegedly constructed by Toska over Silver Creek has damaged their property.

Raymond was thrown 15 feet from his motorcycle. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

## National Gypsum Strike Ends; New Contract Ratified

The strike at National Gypsum Company's plant ended Thursday, July 17, after the Local Union 7-239, OCAW, ratified a contract proposal amounting to .565 cents over a two-year period. Increased pension, increased insurance benefits and a major medical plan were included in the package along with a cash settlement of .455 cents.

The plant resumed normal operation on Thursday.

## Portable Classrooms Received at Hale Area

Hale Area School has received delivery on two portable classrooms and installation is to start this week. The classrooms are 40 feet in length and each can handle from 25 to 30 children.

Supt. Paul Southerland said Monday that indications are that the school's enrollment will jump by 50 or more students this fall.

"It would have been impossible to have crowded the increase in enrollment into the already overcrowded facilities," he stated.

The used structures, consisting of four units which make up into two classrooms, had been utilized previously at Birch Run. They are

to be located on the former school bus pad.

Another step taken by the board of education to handle increased enrollment this year was elimination of home economics from the high school. The room formerly used for teaching this subject will be used as an elementary room. "The portable classrooms will only take care of this year's enrollment increase and will not alleviate the overcrowded conditions of the past three years," said Southerland. "The portables have not even made it possible to remain status quo, as the high school curriculum is being cut by the loss of home economics."

## East Tawas Council Expresses Concern Over Recent Carnival

East Tawas Council Monday night directed the city clerk to write a letter to the chamber of commerce informing that group of its concern over operation of a carnival last week on the old fair grounds site.

Councilmen stated they were unhappy that the grounds had not been cleaned immediately after the tourist festival. It was noted, however, that work on the cleanup had started Monday evening.

Councilmen also expressed concern over operation of the carnival. Police Chief Donald Docking reported that he had closed three different concessions because of gambling complaints. It was also stated that the grounds lacked sanitary facilities. Complaints were heard that workmen had used obscene language around children.

A report from the East Tawas Park Board indicated that it was studying use of the old fair grounds site and Wadsworth Street facilities as a parking area, if conditions warrant, for coho

fishermen this fall.



## Western Melon Shortcake




Are you a perfectionist about wanting perfectly round melon balls? Try laying the melon baller or measuring teaspoon flat on the surface of the melon. Apply enough pressure to cut, then give a twist to make the ball. Usually melon balls are made by cutting into the melon flesh at an angle so it leaves one side flat. Heat oil, 1/2 inch deep in skillet, until drop of water added to oil sizzles. Place chicken, skin side down, in skillet. Put larger, meatier pieces in first; add livers last few minutes of cooking time. Cook uncovered 15 to 25 minutes on each side, turning only once. Drain well on absorbent paper.

YIELD: 8 servings.  
Variations: Savory-Fried Chicken: Add 2 teaspoons poultry seasoning, savory or thyme to flour mixture. Curry-Fried Chicken: Add 2 teaspoons curry powder and 1/2 teaspoon ginger to flour mixture. Parmesan-Fried Chicken: Decrease flour to 1 cup; add 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese and 2 teaspoons oregano to flour mixture. Crispy-Fried Chicken: Do not rinse chicken. Dip pieces in evaporated milk, then roll in seasoned flour.

## Joint Research Project Studies Environment

A joint research project to study the environment of Lake Michigan has been announced by the six investor-owned electric utilities operating in the four-state area bordering the lake. The study complements other research projects already under way.

The announcement for Consumers Power Company was made by Harry R. Wall, senior vice president, in a talk before a governor's conference called to discuss the effects of warm water discharged into the lake from nuclear power plants.

Wall said the study will be conducted by the Great Lakes Research Division of the University of Michigan's Institute for Science and Technology. "The joint research project is a further demon-

stration of the concern of electric utilities in the lakes area in preserving and protecting the quality of our environment," Wall said.

"Consumers Power Company is on record that it will avoid any action or any practice that would damage our environment. At the same time, in justice to all the people who use electricity, it is our obligation to determine exactly what dangers exist and how they can best be contained. This is what we are trying to do, by these extensive experiments. Needless expense for needless equipment should be avoided, just as firmly as we would avoid inflicting environmental damage," said Wall.

The environmental study will include an inventory of materials presently in the lake and a projection of the condition of the lake in 1975.

The University of Michigan recently announced an initial grant from the National Science Foundation's Sea Grant Program which will strengthen and expand its efforts in the marine sciences.



## Iosco Fair Opens Today

Iosco County Fair opens its four-day, 25th anniversary event today (Wednesday) at Hale.

A full program of activities has been arranged by the board of directors of Iosco County Fair Society for the four-day event ending Saturday.

A special invitation is extended today by Gerald Bellen, president of the Iosco County Fair Society, to all persons of the area interested in entering exhibits.

"We need the support of exhibitors to make this fair a success

and there is no better time to exhibit than during this 25th annual fair," said Bellen.

Richard Samson, secretary-manager, reminds prospective exhibitors that exhibits are to be assembled from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. today (Wednesday).

Judging of 4-H Club exhibits will be held the same day, 7:00 p. m. This does not include livestock.

Department heads for exhibits include: Livestock, George Erickson; poultry, Perry Shellenbarger; farm produce, John Dooley; home economics, Dorothy Mielock; antiques, Mrs. Adell Brown; art, hobbies and handicraft, Fay Ewing; conservation, Lyle Bielby; Adolph Siegrist and Val Samson have charge of the 4-H Club division.

Other departments include games and contests, Elwood Ruckle; harness racing, Bruce Goupil.

Thursday's program includes judging of all 4-H livestock except horses, to be followed by judging of all open class livestock except horses.

Friday's program starts at 9:00 a. m. with judging of all 4-H Club horses, followed by open class horses.

Saturday is the big day in the program with games and contests for all ages starting at 10:00 a. m. The annual parade starts at 12:30 p. m. at the fair grounds. All exhibits are to be released at 9:00 p. m.

Throughout the four days, Big City Shows, Incorporated, will have its large midway on the fair grounds and will give away, one each day, choice of a bicycle or live pony.

Three days of harness racing will be a program feature. There will be a \$1,000 purse for each two-heat race. Thursday's program includes a pace for horses which have not won more than \$10,000, a trot in the \$2,000 class and pace for horses which have not won more than \$1,500. Friday's program includes a trot for Michigan-owned horses, winners of not more than \$500; pace in the \$3,000 and trot in the \$5,000 categories.

Saturday's grand finale in harness racing includes a pace for Michigan-owned horses, winners of not more than \$500; a trot in the \$20,000 category, pace in the \$5,000 class and final pace in the top category of \$35,000 winners.

One of the interesting features of the fair is the arts and crafts building which was remodeled last year. Several store fronts have been constructed in this building and displays are so arranged that visitors may look through windows without touching valuable antiques. Full time guard protection is provided during the fair.

## Pamona Grange Sponsored First Iosco Fair 25 Years Ago

Twenty-five years ago, a group of some 40 rural people, from this county organized the Iosco County Agricultural Society and held the first two-day fair at the Plainfield Township Hall. Today, this same organization marks its 25th anniversary event at Hale.

The expanded 1969 Iosco County Fair is a far cry from that first event back in 1944, but the same cooperative spirit prevails among members of the fair board.

The county fair had its actual beginning in 1943, when 100 4-H Club members held an exhibit day at the Iosco County Garage at East Tawas. An achievement night was held in October of that year at Plainfield Township Hall and plans developed out of that meeting to again have a county fair. Iosco had been without a fair since the mid-1930s, when the depression wrote finis to the original fair which began in the 1870s.

Following two meetings of the agricultural society at Plainfield Township Hall in the summer of 1944, a board of directors and officers were elected for 1944-45.

Fair association officers included Mrs. T. G. Scofield, Plainfield Township, president; Wilton Finley, Tawas City, vice president; Harold F. Black, Reno Township, secretary; Mrs. Mabel Scarlett, Grant Township, treasurer.

Members of the first board of directors included Waldo Curry, Tawas Township; Alex Robinson, Reno Township; Harry Cross, Wilber Township; Mrs. Clarence Earl, Tawas Township; Elwood Mclmurray, Plainfield Township.

The 1944 fair began with assembling of exhibits in the forenoon, judging and a livestock parade in the afternoon. The evening program was in charge of the Pamona Grange and featured state grange and department of agriculture speakers.

Program for the second day included a horse pulling contest, a clown parade and a baked goods sale.

Committees were selected to solicit exhibits from all parts of the county and to further encourage participation in the fall fair.

The general committee for the home economics department included Mrs. Fred Pfahl of Grant Township, Mrs. Mae Putnam of Hale, Mrs. Harold Black and Mrs. Alex Robinson, both of Reno.

A general committee in charge of livestock, poultry and produce included Roy Sims of Wilber, Ed Teall of Plainfield, Theodore Bellville of Burleigh.

Community committeemen included Mrs. Scarlett of Grant, Mrs. Anna Bills of Plainfield, Mrs. Caroline Siegrist of Burleigh, Mrs. Phoebe Robinson of Reno, Mrs. Sarah Johnson of Plainfield, Mrs. Margaret St. James of Whittemore, Mrs. Irene Lorenz of Tawas, Mrs. Marie Webb of Plainfield, Mrs. Joy Bellen of Burleigh, Mrs. Sarah Londo of Hale, Earl Thompson of Plainfield, N. O. Sibley of Taft, Octave St. James of Burleigh, Frank Gardner of Hale, Margaret O'Farrell of Whittemore.

In 1945, the fair program was expanded to three days and \$1,200 was offered in premiums for exhibits. Featured attractions included an amateur talent program, baby contest, an evening concert by the East Tawas High School Band, calithumpian parade, Charles H. Lee of Bay City brought his merry-go-round to the fair and fair goers were treated to airplane rides. John Dooley's heavy weight team won the horse pulling contest and more than 5,000 persons attended the event.

There were 201 exhibitors at the 1946 fair and attendance rose to 8,000 persons. The one event which created more interest than any other one part of the three-day activity was the drawing of a 600-pound baby beef. T. G. Scofield was the lucky winner and he gave the calf to the Hale High School Band. Auctioneer Black was called to the stand and he auctioned the beef off to Mr. and Mrs. Harold Ulrich of East Tawas for \$160. A team of Belgian geldings owned by James Mielock won the heavyweight pulling contest.

The fair was expanded in 1949, under Thurman Scofield, secretary-manager, with new bleachers and a flood lighting system. Program features included a wood-chopping contest, donkey baseball, boxing matches, old time dancing, besides the regular program. Horse racing was inaugurated

on the new track in 1950, along with a 10-mile hot rod race. Jack Raum from Ozark, Missouri, presented six shows.

The 1958 fire destroyed the Plainfield Township Hall just as preparations were being made for the annual fair. Exhibits were moved into the county garage at Hale and the program was held as usual.

The new Plainfield Township Hall was first used as an exhibit center at the fair in 1961. Modernization of the fair

grounds began in 1963 with two new livestock barns.

Mr. Scofield, who held the position of secretary-manager of the fair for about 16 years, recalled this week that the fair's first parade probably will never be surpassed. It featured \$1,000,000 worth of farm equipment and livestock.

Following Mrs. Scofield as president of the Iosco County Agricultural Society were Ralph Bohl, 1947; Harold Clark, 1948; Lloyd Newvine, 1953; Gerald Bellen has served as president since 1955.
