Tawas Welcomes Exhibitors

Ninth annual exhibit and sale of Tawas Bay Arts and Crafts will be held Saturday and Sunday, August 23, at the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building.

More than 100 artists and craftsmen have submitted registrations for this event sponsored by Tawas Chamber of Commerce and Tawas Bay Artists.

Late registrations may be made the first day of the show in the county building.

This show has attracted exhibitors from several other states, including Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Florida and Illinois. Classifications include artists with paint-

ings, jewelry, lapidary, caricatures, pottery and sculpture. About 10 percent of the exhibition will be from the local area.

A large corps of local volunteers will assist exhibitors and visitors, including members of Tawas Bay Artists, Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Keyettes and friends. Gerald Reitler and his committee from the chamber of commerce will have charge of grounds and arrangements.

Other chairmen include Mrs. Harold Peterson, registration; Donald Darr and Harold Peterson, publicity; Mrs. James Thomas and Mrs. Ivan O'Farrell, hostesses;

Mrs. Herbert Blust, guides; Mrs. Herbert Hertzler and Andrew Oberla, judges and prizes.

Michael Church from the Extension Service for Cultural Activities at the University of Michigan will be present Saturday to act as consultant and judge.

As before, awards and the popular prize will be given in the park at 4:30 p. m. Sunday. Door prizes are to be awarded Saturday evening, 8:30 o'clock, at the county building.

The public is urged to attend this colorful event, which has seen growth each year since its beginning.

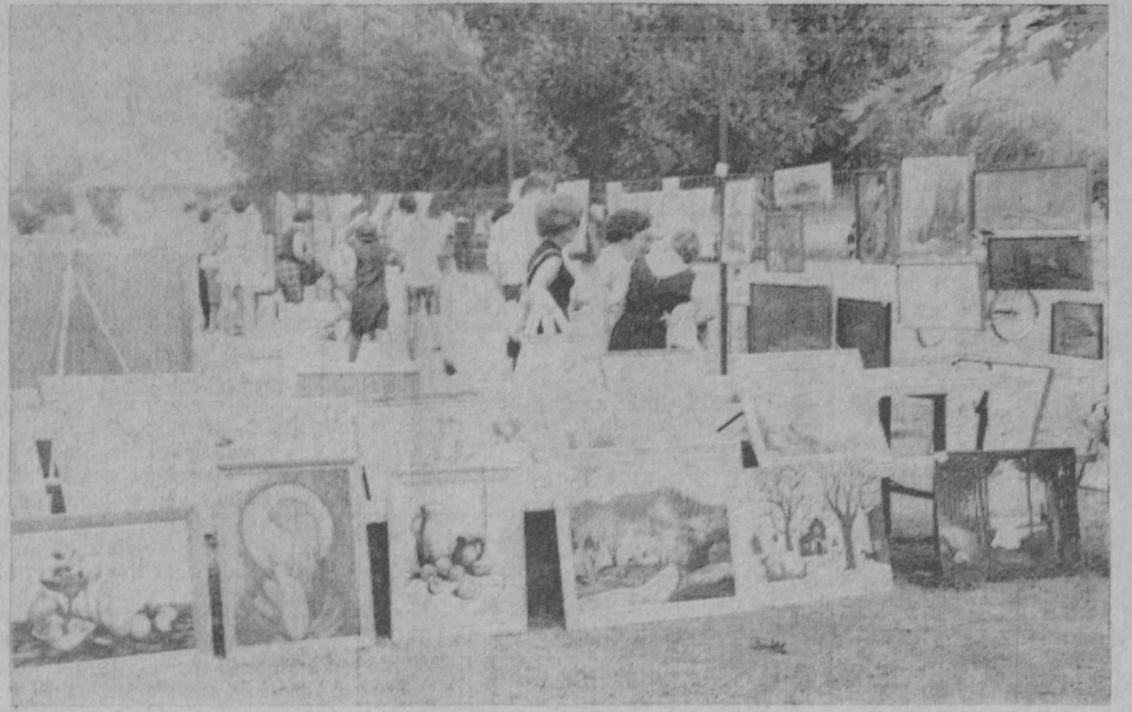

Object to Proposed Location

New Opposition to Coho Weir

Opposition to possible use of city property at the foot of Hamilton Street as a site for anchoring a proposed coho weir in the Tawas River was voiced Monday morning by a group of property owners in that area.

Mrs. Ruby Williams, manager of Rolls Apartments on Mathews Street, and Paul Sobish, who resides on Hamilton Street, reported to the Herald that they had obtained signatures of 13 different property owners on a petition to be presented to the Tawas City Council next Monday night.

"I plan to continue circulating this petition and expect to have many more names before August 4, date of the next council meeting," said Mrs. Williams.

The petition expressed fear that the proposed coho weir would attract unusually large numbers of fishermen to that area and that private property rights would be violated. The petition stated that should the council approve the weir, it would be held responsible for "all or any damages caused by coho fishermen on said properties."

This was practically the same fear expressed by property owners of the First Avenue-First Street area two weeks ago. They appeared before the council and opposed location of a weir at the foot of First Avenue.

At its July 21 meeting, the council gave authority to the mayor and city clerk to negotiate a one-year lease with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for an anchorage point at the foot of

Hamilton Street. This location is west of the Latter Day Saints Church and upriver from the mouth of Dead Creek.

It was reported that meeting that attempts were being made to interest the state in a one-year lease of property owned by Harold Bublitz and Pure Oil Company on the opposite side of the river for a loading site.

At a meeting between the council and the DNR in June, the above site was the council's first choice for location of a coho weir. The site was also recommended by the city planning commission.

The two sites on First Avenue and the Bublitz-Pure Oil property were the only locations said to be available for the proposed coho weir. Both the city council and state wished to locate the fish trap closer to the mouth of the Tawas River, but not so close as to interfere with boat traffic in the river.

The council emphasized last week that it would only approve a one-year lease for use of Hamilton Street as an anchor point for the weir. The state is considering installation of a temporary weir and the council felt that a one-year lease would be sufficient to determine if trespassing on private property would be a problem.

It has been emphasized by representatives of the DNR and city council that removal of surplus coho from the river later this summer and early fall would be a necessity as the fish die soon after spawning.

Fishing is to be limited to Tawas Bay and the Tawas River is to be posted as off limits to fishermen.

Tornado Follows 1953 Path

Iosco Watches Funnels, but No Damage

Tornado funnels were sighted Monday afternoon in the eastern half of Iosco County, but no damage was reported.

Iosco Sheriff's Department reports that its telephone was busy all afternoon with sightings from worried residents from Grant to Oscoda Township.

The sheriff's department reported that its first call came from Allan Herriman shortly after 1:00 p. m., indicating that a tornado was "skipping along the ground" in Section 16 of Grant Township.

Orie Hodge, who had driven the county ambulance to Sand Lake Road on an emergency run, reported that a large tornado—perhaps a mile across at the top of the funnel—was traveling high in the air in an easterly direction. The funnel disappeared into some clouds over Wilber Township.

Police Chief Donald Docking of East Tawas reported observing a tornado funnel which touched down on Tawas Lake.

Docking said he watched one funnel pick water out of the lake. A tornado was later sighted over Lake Huron at Oscoda around 6:00 p. m.

Route of the above sightings was in the general direction taken by a tornado in June 1953, which roared along an 18-mile path in Iosco County, leaving four dead and nine hospitalized.

Police said that cars driven by Delmar E. Laidler, 38, Lapeer, and Duane A. Nicholls, 28, Lapeer, were involved in the collision.

Two Tawas City youths, Michael C. Kendall and James Fisher, both 18, were rushed to Tawas Hospital early Sunday morning following a crash on Lorenz Road south of Townline Road. Officers said that Kendall's car crashed into the rear of a car owned by Michael D. Harvey, 18, Chelsea.

Tawas City Water Board Discusses Plans

Investigation into possible overloading of sewer mains which may or may not be caused when a proposed expansion of Tawas Hospital is completed was discussed at the Monday night meeting of Tawas City Water Board.

At the request of Martin Wellna, First Ward alderman, the city engineer is to make a thorough study of mains and maximum capacities, along with recommendations.

In other business, the board recommended to the council that it authorize repairs to the DPW dragline in the amount of \$9,000. The dragline has been out of order for about six weeks.

It was stated that the above amount of money would finance the complete rebuilding of the machine. It was stated that a replacement for the 17-year-old machine would be approximately \$24,000. The water board is to assume \$6,000 of the total cost.

A general discussion was held on future improvements to the water and sewer system. This included discussion on a larger water distribution main from East Tawas to achieve greater capacity, additional elevated water storage to give minimum supply of water for one day of 300,000 to 400,000 gallons. Capacity of the present stand pipe is 50,000 gallons.

Also discussed was an additional force main from the Second Avenue lift station, with pumps of greater capacity than at present to alleviate problems in the sewer system during times of high water. Discussion included an addition to the sewage treatment plant for phosphate removal and secondary treatment.

Projects discussed would cost in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

Tawas Area School Expects Slight Enrollment Increase

A slight increase in enrollment is expected this fall at Tawas Area School, according to a report at Monday night's meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education.

John Alexander, high school principal, said that 1,015 students had registered for the fall term,

as compared to 990 last term. An additional 30 or more youngsters are expected to register before the start of school.

Alexander said that there would be a near 100 percent utilization of classrooms in the building. According to class scheduling, there would be three vacant rooms during the first hour, one in the second hour, two in the third hour, one in the fourth hour, two in the fifth hour and two in the sixth hour.

The junior high wing will have only two free classrooms for one hour each during the entire day.

As a result of the overworking, there will be three 8:00 a. m. classes in art, typing and biology.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, reported that 102 children had been enrolled in kindergarten. She expects that the total will be up to 107 when school starts. This figure is below last year's kindergarten enrollment.

In other business, Supt. Reynold Mick reported that with last fall's increase in hot lunch cost to students, lunches served dropped from 155,404 in 1967-68 to 134,716 in 1968-69. Special milk served jumped from 77,986 in 1967-68 to 97,475 in 1968-69. Federal reimbursement in inventory remains about the same as the previous year.

The board decided to abide by its action of earlier this month abandoning the election poll at Alabaster and transferring voters

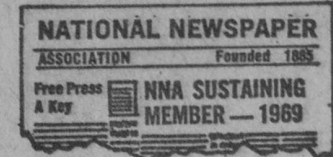

Plans were also discussed regarding an anniversary party dinner meeting to be held in September.

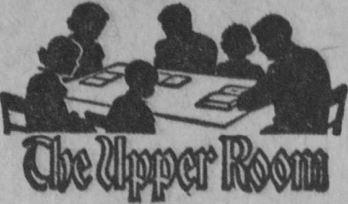
Hemlock Road Church to Host Association

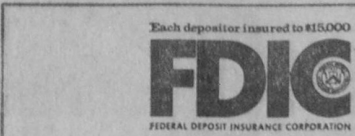

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Fishers May Repopulate State's Forests, Says WSU Biologist



DETROIT—If you see a creature that looks like this as you travel through Michigan's northern forests this year, you'll probably be taking your first look at a fisher. He's a returned to the State, trying to reestablish residence here.

Having populated the area in fair abundance when Michigan was young, he retreated before the settler's ax, partly because he likes to spend a good share of his time in trees, points out Dr. William Prychodko of Wayne State University's Biology Department. Steel traps and rifles also took their toll.

Now the fishers are getting solid encouragement to come back and stay. The 61 which National Forest officials released in the western Upper Peninsula's Ottawa National Forest have had progeny which are apparently prospering.

The creature is the size of a large house cat with short legs and a bushy tail. His name "fisher" is a misnomer, since the animal is not aquatic and does not enter the water in search of fish. He frequents the areas of streams and lakes, and can swim, but, as both a tree-and-ground dweller, does not wander far beyond the deep forests.

One of the fiercest and fleetest of the tree-climbing fur bearers, he growls, snarls and spits and occasionally cries mournfully.

Among the many wild creatures he is capable of killing and eating is the porcupine. Fishers are noted, in fact, for their ability to catch and eat these spiny creatures with which the northern forests

Conservation officials are not interested in eliminating all porcupines because of their interest in preserving all members of Michigan's wildlife family. But they are interested in reducing the population in areas of overabundance, so they have encouraged the plan of bringing fishers back.

Official conservationists are not the only people interested in the fisher-repopulation plan. Some Michigan sportsmen look forward to the day when the fisher may again provide valued furs for hunters and trappers as in Michigan's early days. Others are simply glad to see any former mammalian resident of Michigan regain his citizenship after a period of exile.

You probably won't get near enough to the fisher to observe this feature, says Dr. Prychodko, but the creature's head, neck and under parts are slightly grizzled and buff in color. The rest of his body (except the black tail) is a bit unpredictable in shade, but a typical specimen is deep mahogany in color, with bluish overtones.

He is a member of the weasel family, so that his trait of ferocity is a family characteristic. Some have described the fisher as a large edition of the marten.

Hunting the fisher at this time carries a strong "don't" from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, which is watching with interest the return of the once discouraged resident to a State he again is happy to live in.

JUMP IN

Looking for fashion action? Plunge into a jumpsuit and sew. Follow the nap of cuddly terry velour, jaunty corduroy or luscious velveteen. All of the pile fabrics are perfect for jumpsuit making and wearing. This zip-front jumpsuit (Butterick 5324) has raglan sleeves, few seams and no buttonholes—all of the splendidly simple styling that lends itself to a pile fabric.

A pile or napped fabric has a plushy surface which runs in one direction just like an animal's furry coat. Pet it one way and the pile feels smooth; run your hand the opposite way and the pile ruffles. If you treat them well, pile fabrics are as gentle as a lamb.

One Way Signs

A suitable pattern will have a layout plan for fabrics "with nap." Follow this layout and allow extra yardage because all of the pattern pieces must be placed with their tops pointing in the same direction. Coats & Clark's sewing experts suggest that you cut corduroy with the pile running down for longer wear and up on velveteen for richer color. Tailor's tacks or pins are more effective than the tracing wheel for transferring pattern markings to a pile fabric. All sections of the garment should be basted carefully before machine-stitching because pile slips easily. Hand-basting is recommended. A longer machine stitch (10-12 per inch) works best for the final stitching. Slightly loosen the tension and presser foot. Stitch in the smooth direction of the nap. With velveteen, put tissue paper between the two sections before stitching. This makes a smooth seam and prevents matting.

The Kid Glove Treatment

Press gently with steam, don't iron, when working with pile. Cover your ironing board with a pad of Turkish toweling or an extra piece of the same pile fabric, right side up, and lay your fabric, pile side down.

Think Thin

In finishing pile fabric garments, try to reduce bulk as much as possible. Trim, and grade the facing seams by cutting one edge 1/4" narrower than the other. Slash deep darts and press open. Trim away seams inside hem allowances. Overcast facing and hem edges, and then stitch 1/4" from edge. The object is to look smooth, sleek and slender, both you and the jumpsuit.

Saratoga spittlebug! That seems to be too poetic for a name of an insect pest, doesn't it? This insect which causes damage to young red and jack pine was first collected in Saratoga County, New York, thus was given the name Saratoga spittlebug.

This insect which is less than one-half inch long and shaped like a boat had his way for a long time before an entomologist discovered that he caused damage to young trees. The reasons it took so long are his small size, camouflaged color (he looks like the twig he feeds on) and living habits. Also, the trees did not die until after he had gone.

It was not until 1941 that this insect was recognized as a plantation pest and ways of controlling him were tried. The most effective method found, not considering natural methods, was to aerial spray him with the universal insect exterminator, DDT. But as most of you know by now DDT may be more harmful under most conditions than the insect. Therefore, a new insecticide had to be concocted.

Several new insecticides have been developed and found to be effective but not as effective as DDT. One of these which is called Malathion will be used to spray about 4,000 acres of infested plantations this week.

During the month of June last year and this year, surveys were made to determine how many Saratoga spittlebugs were present. The surveys indicated the population was high enough to severely damage the trees and if the insect is not controlled before next year, many young pine trees may die. It was decided that we could not take a chance on nature controlling the insect without some help. Malathion was chosen to help because of its effectiveness against insects and its non-toxicity to animals when properly used. This insect-

cide will deteriorate and break down into nonharmful chemicals quite rapidly. This characteristic is just opposite of DDT which takes a long time, over 10 years, to break down into nonharmful chemicals.

The only area to be treated on the Tawas district is near South Branch. This plantation is about 50 acres in size and located at least a quarter of a mile from any lakes or streams in the area. This distance is just an added

measure to insure that the insecticide is not spread to areas where it is not wanted.

Another article on this topic will follow in which the results will be explained.

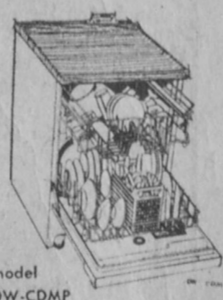

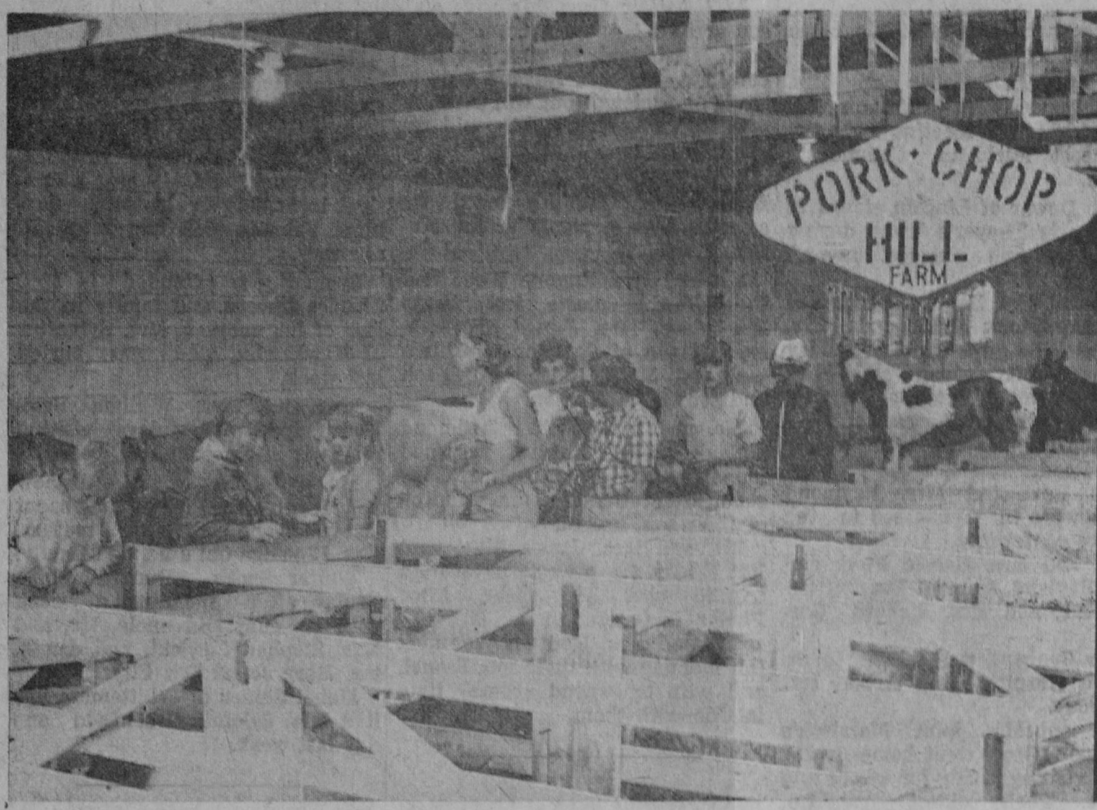

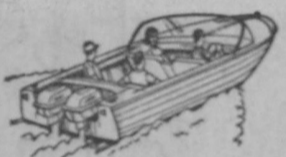
Ninety-two Tawas Area Senior Citizens enjoyed Wednesday, July 23, at the Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

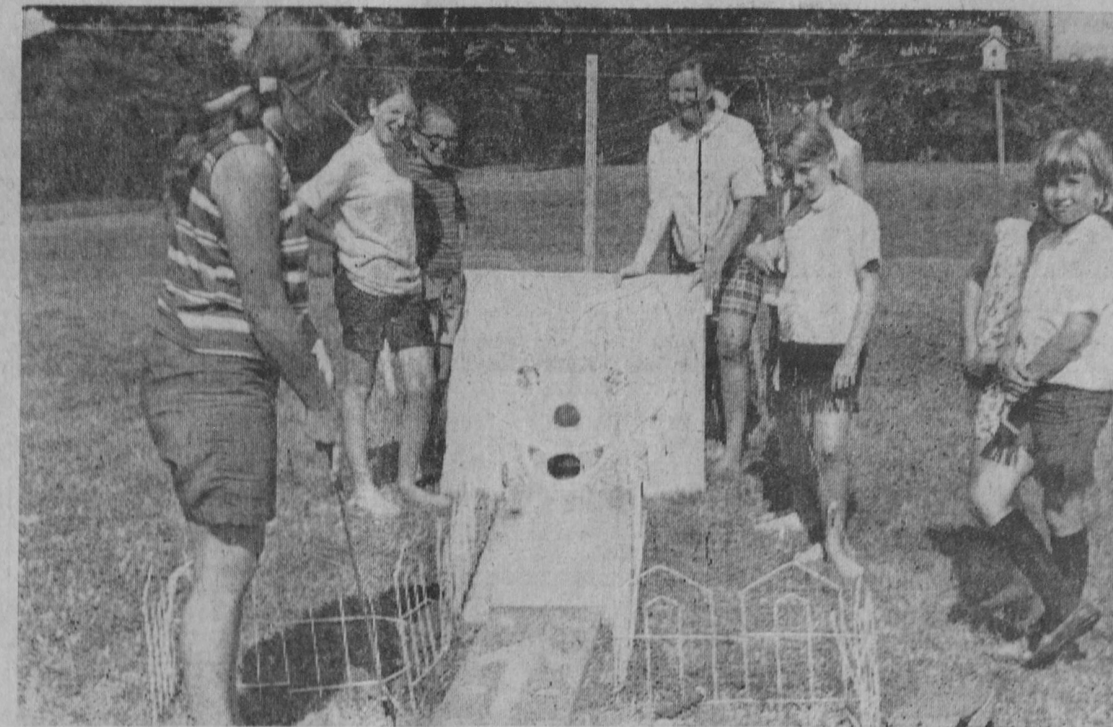
