Seventh Annual Event in Tawas

Tourist Festival Extends Welcome

This week marks the seventh annual Michigan Tourist Festival in the Tawas, July 8-13, and Chairman Jack Jacques and his committee have prepared what could well be the best program in the festival's history.

Highlighting the six-day program will be a contest to select the Michigan Tourist Festival queen. Handled this year by Mrs. Edward Gordon and a committee from the Tawas Newcomers Club, 13 girls have been registered as contestants and others are expected prior to judging Saturday afternoon.

Grant Township Fire Department has sponsored three girls in the contest, including Jacqueline Sidebottom, 17, National City;

Madeline Wetherell, 17, National City, and Norma Bailey, 19, Whittemore, who was a member of the queen's court for Grant Township's centennial celebration two years ago.

Other contestants include Kathy Karcher, 19, Oscoda; Deborah Schultz, 18, Oscoda; Nancy Jo Guay, 17, Whittemore; Rhonda Joyce, 16, Oscoda; Danya Kennedy, 19, Oscoda; Sandy Schuette, 18, Tawas City; Mickey Ronchetto, 17, Hale; Diane Roncone, 16, Oscoda; Karen M. Stoy, 22, Tawas City; Mae Cadarette, 24, Alpena.

Judging will highlight Saturday's program at the East Tawas Park starting at 2:30 p. m. All contestants are to be guests of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce at a

noon luncheon to be held at the Holland Hotel.

Girls between the ages of 16 and 25 are eligible to enter. First prize will be \$100 in cash and a trophy. Second prize will be a trophy.

The schedule of events started yesterday (Tuesday) with free bingo at the East Tawas Park, 3:00 to 5:00 p. m.

Today (Wednesday) will see the opening of the carnival on Bridge Street at East Tawas. The carnival will run throughout the festival.

Wednesday's program will include special exhibitions and demonstrations concerning coho fishing and other sports activities. John Hodge, district extension natural resource agent, Michigan State University, is to present a program at 7:00 p. m. at the East Tawas Community Building on coho fishing and its impact on a community.

This will be followed by a demonstration by Glenn Lau, fly casting expert, who will discuss techniques and equipment for coho fishing.

The above two speakers are to be followed by Mary Peters, area extension home economist, who will present a basic cooking demonstration with coho salmon; recreational land development will be given by Myron Smith, Tawas District forest ranger; advantages in membership in the soil conservation district will be given by Harry Krueger, soil conservation district chairman.

Other speakers will include June Scott, office manager, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service, along with Marvin Davenport, county extension director. Other activities planned for Wednesday include a street dance and square dance, 8:00 p. m., on Newman Street.

Thursday's schedule features children's games and contests at the East Tawas Athletic Field, 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. To be under the direction of Gene Gerber, games will include sack race, peanut race, penny scramble, wheelbarrow race, greased pig contest and other games.

Tawas Area High School Band will present a concert Thursday night, 7 o'clock, at the Tawas City Park.

Friday's program will highlight a sidewalk sale at participating business places.

Annual tourist festival parade starts at 10:30 a. m. Saturday in Tawas City and the line of March will be along US-23 to East Tawas.

C. A. Arlington, parade chairman, urges all business places and individuals who wish to enter floats to be at the Mathews Street starting point before 10:00 a. m.

A children's clown contest will follow the parade at East Tawas. Ruth's School of Dance will present a vaudeville program, 1:00 p. m., at the East Tawas Park to be followed by judging of the Michigan Tourist Festival queen's

contest at 2:30 p. m. An ox roast is scheduled to start at the Tawas City Park at 11:00 a. m. Saturday and continue through the day.

Saturday activities will include Knot Hole and Pony League all-star games at the East Tawas athletic field on Newman Street. Saturday's program includes fireworks, 9:00 p. m., at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas.

Sunday's program will include a chicken barbecue by the East Tawas Lions Club at the East Tawas Park, a ski show and scuba diving demonstration at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock.

A spokesman for the chamber of commerce urges area children to dress up as clowns and participate in Saturday's parade and costume judging contest. There will be fun for all.

Residents Protesting Coho Weir Location

Possible location of a state-owned salmon weir on Tawas River at the south end of First Avenue has brought a strong protest from several property owners from that area.

Appearing before the Tawas City Council Monday night was a delegation of about five or six property owners, who maintained that such a device for removing surplus coho salmon should be located closer to the river mouth and not in a residential area.

A meeting has been arranged for next Monday, 7:30 p. m., at the city hall at which time the Michigan Department of Natural Resources is to be asked to discuss its proposal. The public is invited.

On June 18, representatives of the department appeared before the council and asked for recommendations for locations of such a device. At the time, representatives of the department stated that after investigation, only two sites were available for a weir.

The two sites include property owned by William Borosch at the foot of First Avenue, directly across the river from the county building, which could be purchased outright. The other site was adjacent to Bublitz Oil Company's service station, west of Mathews Street. This property was available on a lease arrangement.

While department spokesmen said that the state was interested in securing a permanent location for this installation and apparently interested in the First Avenue site, the council recommended the Bublitz property because it was closer to the mouth of the river.

Some local citizens now foresee many serious problems to be encountered when the coho salmon, planted in Cold Creek two years ago as smolt, return to the river as adult fish. Despite the fact that city officials have recommended that all fishing be closed in the Tawas River during the expected run of coho starting in August, it is expected that there will be a serious problem of fishermen trespassing on private property.

Reason for the salmon weir is to remove the fish from the river before they die. If not removed, the dead fish could become a serious problem.

Among those speaking before the council in protesting location of the weir were Benjamin Brewer, First Ward supervisor; James Dillon, a member of the city planning commission; and Daniel Ulrich, former First Ward alderman.

Brewer stated that from his experience in fishing for coho in Western Michigan, the weir would attract large crowds of fishermen and spectators. He felt that its location in a residential area would be an injustice to property owners. Dillon questioned if any consideration had been given to placing such an installation in an area zoned residential, which is the case of the First Avenue site. He pointed out that the city planning commission had never been contacted officially.

Alderman Cecil Cable stated that the state and city had investigated possible sites all along the

river and that only two sites appeared available. He was of the opinion that regardless of the location, adjacent property owners would probably object to a weir.

Alderman Howard Hatton pointed out that boat traffic was an important factor in selection of a site, despite the fact that the council had been assured by the state that a gate would be placed in the weir to allow passage of small boats.

Gypsum Co. Amends Unfair Labor Charge

Unfair labor practice charges were filed July 2 by National Gypsum Company against the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union and its Local Union 7-239 at National City.

"The company charges that these parties have caused the employees of the National City plant to go on strike by insisting on multi-plant bargaining in an attempt to merge historically separate bargaining units in violation of the law," said Plant Manager Richard Harris.

The company requests damages for its employees and itself as a result of this action. Also joined in this action are the United Cement, Lime and Gypsum Workers International Union and its Local No. 354 at Shoals, Indiana, and the United Cement, Lime and Gypsum Workers International Union and its Local No. 88 at Portsmouth, New Hampshire.

These charges are an amendment to unfair labor practice charges previously filed by the company.

East Tawas Council Gets Flood Complaint

A delegation of property owners from the northeast section of the city learned from the East Tawas Council Monday night that there was no immediate solution to the problem of flooding during recent rain storms.

Mayor James Campbell said that the city was in the process of making a preliminary survey of the problem, but could not foresee any answer in the immediate future.

About 10 persons from the Evans, Franklin and Adams Street areas attended the council meeting.

Campbell stated that a storm sewer system would be very costly and that no money was available at the present time for such construction.

It was pointed out that some of the problems during recent rain

False Arrest Suit Filed Against Iosco Sheriff

A \$150,000 false arrest suit was filed July 3 in Iosco County Circuit Court against Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Deputy Sheriff Kenneth Bronson of Whittemore.

Filing the suit was Patrick Finnerty, former Whittemore resident, who was arrested May 6, 1967, and charged with resisting arrest, drunk and disorderly and littering a public highway.

Finnerty's complaint stated that he was sitting on the front stoop of a building which contained a television repair shop and residence owned by his father at Whittemore. He admitted in the complaint that "he had been drinking beer and was somewhat under the influence of alcohol."

As Deputy Bronson approached, Finnerty claims he dropped a bottle of beer on the sidewalk and retreated into the shop, locked the door and then went into the residential portion of the building.

Finnerty claims that Bronson broke open the door leading to the shop, then broke open a door leading into the residential portion of the building, where the officer made the arrest.

At the time, Bronson, who serves as Whittemore police chief, stated that he had received a number of complaints that Finnerty had been throwing beer bottles at automobiles passing on M-65 and had been using abusive language to persons passing by. The deputy claimed he arrested Finnerty outside the building and that he resisted arrest by running inside.

Finnerty claims that the deputy used unnecessary force and violence and that no warrant for arrest had been issued.

On May 8, 1967, Finnerty entered a plea of not guilty to the charge. He was lodged in the county jail and later taken to Ionia State Hospital for mental evaluation.

He was held for a total of 115 days, being released September 20, 1967.

Upon his return to Iosco, the circuit court adjudged that he was mentally competent to stand trial. The charge of resisting arrest, drunk and disorderly and use of obscene language was dismissed. He entered a plea of guilty to littering a public street, paid a fine and costs and was released.

Finnerty claims that he had been a student at Cleveland State University at Cleveland, Ohio, and was on a \$1,050 scholarship. He was unable to return to school during his incarceration and unable to finish work of the semester.

He also claims that his incarceration and the evaluation under the allegation of being mentally incompetent had raised serious questions in his mind as to his sanity and caused damage to his personality and mental health.

A petition was presented requesting off street parking in the State Street area.

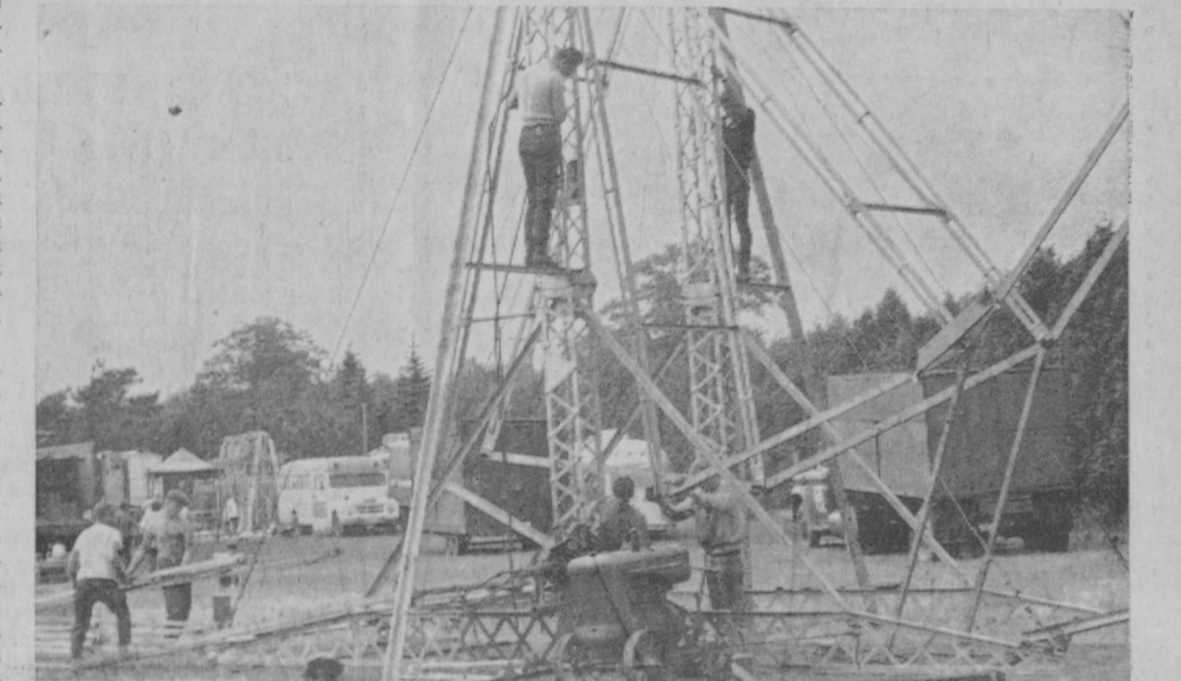
Crops Threatened

Iosco Has Big Problem With Ambulance Service

Emergency ambulance service in Iosco County has been handled since July 1 on an interim basis through an arrangement with the sheriff's department and area funeral directors. How long this arrangement will continue remains to be seen.

Delivery has been received on a used ambulance ordered recently by the City of East Tawas in cooperation with other local units of government. This ambulance is stationed at the sheriff's department on a "backup" basis.

Since July 1, all calls for emergency ambulance service have been coordinated through the sheriff's department. Local funeral directors, who have announced discontinuance of ambulance service effective July 1, have been handling calls when available and ordered out by the sheriff's department.

New state regulations governing ambulances became effective July 1 and the three funeral directors in the Tawas and Hale are not licensed by the state to operate such a service.

Fred Lomas, chairman of the board of supervisors, said Tuesday that he hoped this arrangement could continue until October 1, when it is expected that a new ambulance service will be inaugurated in cooperation between Tawas Hospital and local governmental units.

Within one hour of receipt of the used ambulance last week, the unit was on its way to assist in transporting victims injured in a two-car crash near Hale.

Lomas said that one of the two new ambulances ordered by East Tawas two weeks ago is expected to be received within two weeks. It is hoped that this four-coat unit may be placed into service immediately in the Hale area, where it is to be operated by trained volunteers.

The board chairman admitted Tuesday that he probably exceeded his authority in stationing the used ambulance at the county jail, to be used only in the cases of extreme emergency, but stated that something had to be done immediately to provide this service.

"We are just operating from day to day with this unit, but I really do not know how long it can con-

tinue with our limited manpower," he stated.

The sheriff stated that men had been available on two ambulance calls, but he did not know what would happen if there was a call and no deputies were around.

"We will do the best we can with our limited manpower—that is all I can say at present," said O'Farrell.

Meanwhile, Lomas said that a considerable amount of work remained in drawing up agreements between the various local units of government with Tawas Hospital for operation of the ambulance service. He said that a number of technical problems were being encountered which had not been considered.

Fortunately, the Tawas and townships south of AuSable and Oscoda escaped the heavy traffic over July 4 with relatively few personal injury traffic accidents which required an ambulance.

John Moffatt, East Tawas funeral director, said Tuesday morning that he was going to attempt to operate an emergency ambulance service on call from the sheriff's department as long as possible. However, he did not know if he could operate until October 1 with limited manpower.

Moffatt was called to Oscoda Monday when ambulance services operated by two different funeral directors there were not available. A patient suffering from a perforated ulcer had to be rushed to Tawas Hospital. After transporting the patient to Tawas Hospital, Moffatt was called on to transfer the patient to West Branch.

On the trip to West Branch, a tire blowout halted the Moffatt ambulance east of the Ogemaw-Iosco line. The backup ambulance at the sheriff's department had to be rushed to the scene to resume the trip to West Branch.

"The tire only had 2,000 miles on it," said Moffatt. "After the delays encountered, I really do not know if the patient arrived at

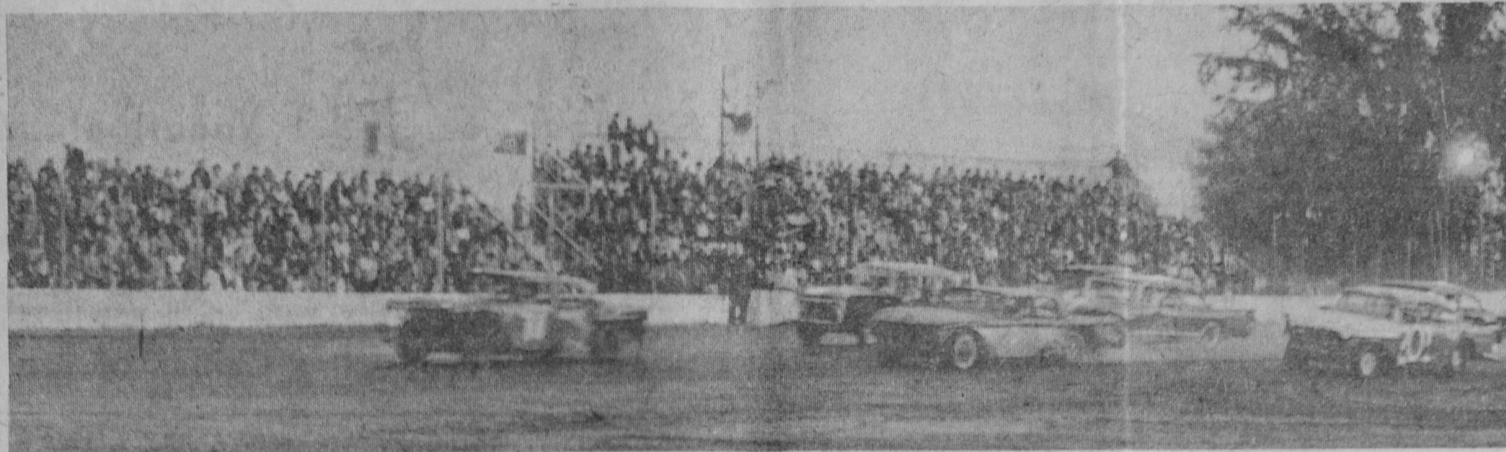

TC Council Hears Protest Over Basement Flooding

Protest over flooded basements in the area of M-55 and Court Street during the recent rain storms was heard Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Mrs. Virginia Coyle and Mrs. Charles Quick appeared before the board and stated that the sanitary sewer had again backed up into their basements last week, causing a serious flooding and health problem.

The two property owners, along with Martin Wellna, First Ward alderman, were of the opinion that Tawas Hospital was causing an overload to the sewer system.

Reginald Bublitz, city superintendent, stated that one of the principal reasons causing overflow of storm sewers in that area was the fact that basement drains were connected to the sanitary sewer system.

This overload, he said, causes a serious problem at the Second Avenue pumping station, where water backs up into the sewer when it cannot be pumped away fast enough.

Bublitz pointed out that he had recommended in the past that basement drains be plugged during periods of heavy rain. Such basement drains are now prohibited by city ordinance. He said that basement flooding could be eliminated by installing a sump pump in the basement and pumping excess water to a sewer connection at ground level.

Mayor Russell A. Rollin said that the matter would be turned over to the water board for investigation.

In other business, a letter from the waterways commission stated that the state legislature had deleted funds for participation in construction of boat launching facilities for coho fishing until the full effect of DDT losses could be

investigated. This would mean that funds for Tawas City's parking lot on Ninth Avenue have been deleted until this fall or possibly next spring.

Joseph Ruth of Yeo and Yeo Certified Public Accountants, East Tawas, presented the city audit for the year ending March 10.

New Conservation Officer at Oscoda

Transfer of Cons. Officer Larry E. Crowder to Iosco County, effective July 6, is announced by Owen J. Bennett, region II conservation law supervisor. Crowder will be assigned to the north half of Iosco County and the southern portion of Alcona County, a patrol area that was vacated by the recent transfer of Cons. Officer John LaPear to Kalamazoo County.

Crowder, 28, is a graduate of Manton High School and Michigan State University where he majored in park management. He worked as a seasonal state park ranger while attending college. He was first assigned as a conservation officer in Kalkaska County in 1965. More recently, he was assigned to Missaukee County. Crowder and his family will reside in the Oscoda area.

National City Man Arraigned on Murder Charge

Following preliminary examination in district court, Edward Kozlow, 41, National City, will face circuit court trial at Standish on a charge of first degree murder.

Arenac County Prosecutor Carl L. Horn said that a second charge of conspiracy against Kozlow had been dropped. No date has been set as yet for the trial.

Kozlow is charged with the murder of James A. Shannon, 38, Flint, who disappeared in 1962. His skeleton was discovered June 17 in a grave near Omer.

Fred Dockham Reunion July 5

The Fred Dockham reunion was held Saturday, July 5, at the home of Laurence Good. Plans were made to meet at the same location next year.

Fifty-five guests were present from Flint, Saginaw, Montrose, Holly, Detroit, Millington, Mt. Morris and Rantoul, Illinois.

Council 'Stands Pat' on Parking Removal

Tawas City Council decided Monday night to "stand pat" on its decision of June 18 recommending to the state highway department that US-23 parking be removed from the east end of Fletcher Oil Company property to the city limits at East Tawas and from the east city limits to First Street.

Gordon Huck, area manager for Consumers Power Company, asked that consideration be given to allow parking on the north side of the highway from Wheeler Street to First Street. He said that elimination of the two parking spaces in front of the general office would cause great inconvenience to the public.

Huck said that he had conducted an investigation and found that no accidents had occurred in that immediate area. He believed that it would be dangerous for customers to pull out on US-23 from a small parking lot at the west side

of the building. A copy of a letter written to the state highway department by Mrs. Perry Crooker of Midway Drive-In Restaurant was also received by the council.

The restaurant owner claimed that the city council was discriminating against that business by removing parking in that location. She recommended to the state that if any parking is removed on US-23, it should be removed from city limit to city limit.

In removing parking in the east and west bound lanes mentioned above, the council acted on a recommendation of City Police Chief George Westcott. He cited a danger to traffic in that area, stating that his department and the sheriff's department had policed 11 rear-end collisions in that vicinity since January 1, 1967. A fatal accident occurred in that area two weeks prior to the council's action.

Drivers Who Drink Cause Most Accidents

Motorists who drink and then drive are seemingly on the increase as the major cause of fatal accidents in Michigan, according to Automobile Club of Michigan's 1968 traffic study, "Portrait of a Year," just released.

"A total of 72 percent of the

drivers involved in fatal accidents studied were either drinking or suspected drinking drivers," Fred N. Rehm, Auto Club general manager, points out.

Police reports used for statistical information in Auto Club's study show that 24 percent of the drivers were impaired by alcohol and 48 percent were listed as "not stated or not sure."

"Of the 135 fatal accidents studied, in which 180 persons died, police officials listed only 28 percent of the 207 drivers involved as "not drinking."

HINTS FOR TEENAGERS

...From your Sewing Editor



A TRIBUTE TO "RAGGEDY ANN"

Remember when you were six, a tattered "Raggedy Ann" was your constant companion? She wore a pinafore over a printed calico dress and you did, too. Fashions come and go and come back again, but little girls will always wear pinafores. Though you long ago outgrew the one you wore at six, this crispy pinafore (Simplicity 8010) has grown up to big girl proportions. It has ruffled wings and a teeny-tiny sashed waist. It solos as a mini-skirted sundress, or aprons this peasantly printed, puffed sleeved, A-line dress.

Nimble Fingers

You probably first learned to sew by hand, making doll clothes from scraps of fabric. Now you sew all your "fine seams" by machine. However, hand sewing is still a necessary skill. Hand-basting is usually best for easing, matching a fabric design at a seam, and in the preparation of pleats. Finishing details such as tacking down facings, sewing on fasteners and overcasting ravelly seam edges are also hand-done. As better and better machines cut down sewing time, hand sewing is becoming an art. For example, stitching the outside of a zipper application gives an expensive, custom-look to a garment.

Generally, you would use the same thread for both machine and hand-stitching a garment. The thread is used single, unless extra strength is needed for a button or zipper. 18" is a good working length to begin with; any longer will tangle.

Cut your thread from the spool on a slant; never break it. Thread your needle and make a knot with this cut end. Use a knot if you can hide it under a hem or seam allowance. Otherwise, start and finish your sewing with a few tiny backstitches on top of each other.

The Thimble Is Golden

The thimble is the sign of a real dressmaker. Learn to wear one on the middle finger of your sewing hand. It helps you to push the needle forward more quickly and accurately.

Fish Finding Aboard "Steelhead"

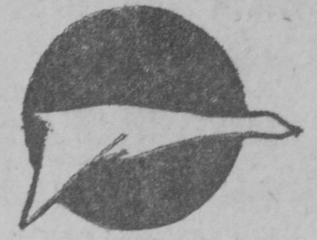


Four men and the Department of Natural Resources' survey vessel, the "Steelhead," are on a big mission in Lake Michigan to find lake trout and salmon for sport fishermen to catch. With veteran Great Lakes skipper Bill Palmer at the helm, their systematic search is closely geared to using the most modern electronic equipment to pinpoint fish concentrations. One key piece of this equipment is the boat's sonar-type fish-finder which DNR fisheries biologist Lee Moffit (inset above) studies for "blips" showing where fish are being intercepted on a depth index graph. After the fish-finder's graph has been read to target in on possible fish schools, the "Steelhead's" gear specialists set nets to learn what kind of fish-

ing opportunities lie below. After leaving their nets out overnight, the crew lifts them the next day and the fish taken are identified, aged, weighed, measured, and studied for stomach contents in the vessel's "wet" laboratory. Some of the fish are sent to other laboratories for pesticide studies; others are given to state institutions for food. Findings made aboard the "Steelhead" are promptly relayed to news outlets to provide information aimed at help boosting sport catches. Also, when a potentially good fishing area is found, it is marked with an orange-colored "Steelhead" buoy to draw angler attention. From there, the boat's crew pushes into new areas, hoping each good "find" will lead to others. —Mich. Dept. of Natural Resources.

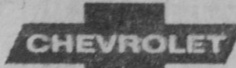

Judge Miller Issued Injunction Against Picket Line Violence

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller issued an injunction July 1 ordering Local Union No. 7-239, Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers, AFL-CIO, refrain from preventing Jefferson Trucking Company employees from entering the strike-bound National City plant of National Gypsum Company.

At the same time, Judge Miller issued an injunction limiting the number of pickets to four per shift and a general injunction against any violence.

In an affidavit filed with the court, Ralph T. White of Jefferson Trucking claimed that employees of National Gypsum had threatened personal injury to Jefferson employees who had attempted to enter the plant.

National Gypsum Company claimed that pickets had threatened to prevent nonunion employees from entering the plant and had threatened to prevent the Detroit and Mackinac Railway from entering and leaving the company's quarry in Grant Township.

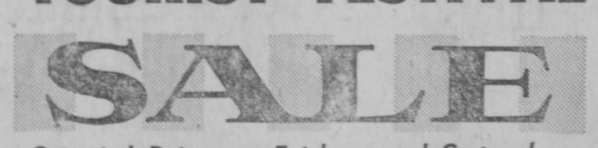

Other speakers will include June Scott, office manager, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service, along with Marvin Dav-enport, county extension director.

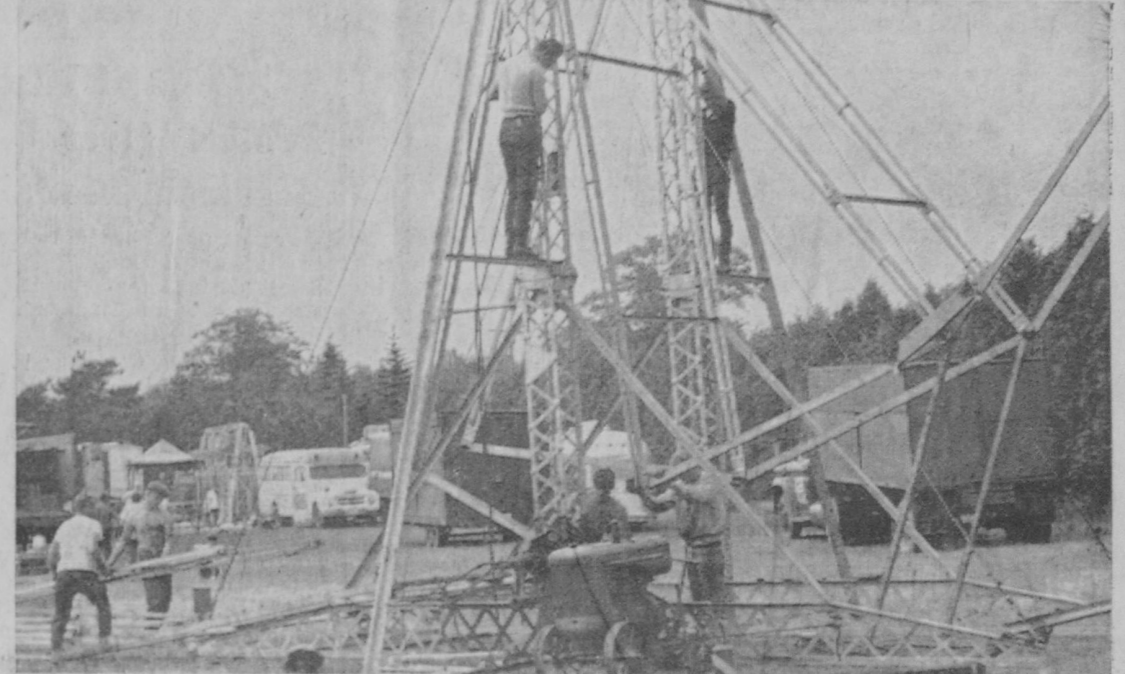
Other activities planned for Wednesday include a street dance and square dance, 8:00 p. m., on Newman Street.

Residents Protesting Coho Weir Location

Possible location of a state-owned salmon weir on Tawas River at the south end of First Avenue has brought a strong protest from several property owners from that area.

Appearing before the Tawas City Council Monday night was a delegation of about five or six property owners, who maintained that such a device for removing surplus coho salmon should be located closer to the river mouth and not in a residential area.

A meeting has been arranged for next Monday, 7:30 p. m., at the city hall at which time the Michigan Department of Natural Resources is to be asked to discuss its proposal. The public is invited.

On June 18, representatives of the department appeared before the council and asked for recommendations for locations of such a device. At the time, representatives of the department stated that after investigation, only two sites were available for a weir.

The two sites include property owned by William Borosch at the foot of First Avenue, directly across the river from the county building, which could be purchased outright. The other site was adjacent to Bublitz Oil Company's service station, west of Mathews Street. This property was available on a lease arrangement.

While department spokesmen said that the state was interested in securing a permanent location for this installation and apparently interested in the First Avenue site, the council recommended the Bublitz property because it was closer to the mouth of the river.

Some local citizens now foresee many serious problems to be encountered when the coho salmon, planted in Cold Creek two years ago as smolt, return to the river as adult fish. Despite the fact that city officials have recommended that all fishing be closed in the Tawas River during the expected run of coho starting in August, it is expected that there will be a serious problem of fishermen trespassing on private property.

Reason for the salmon weir is to remove the fish from the river before they die. If not removed, the dead fish could become a serious problem.

Among those speaking before the council in protesting location of the weir were Benjamin Brewer, First Ward supervisor; James Dillon, a member of the city planning commission, and Daniel Ulrich, former First Ward alderman.

Brewer stated that from his experience in fishing for coho in Western Michigan, the weir would attract large crowds of fishermen and spectators. He felt that its location in a residential area would be an injustice to property owners.

Dillon questioned if any consideration had been given to placing such an installation in an area zoned residential, which is the case of the First Avenue site. He pointed out that the city planning commission had never been contacted officially.

Alderman Cecil Cable stated that the state and city had investigated possible sites all along the

Gypsum Co. Amends Unfair Labor Charge

Unfair labor practice charges were filed July 2 by National Gypsum Company against the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union and its Local Union 7-239 at National City.

"The company charges that these parties have caused the employees of the National City plant to go on strike by insisting on multi-plant bargaining in an attempt to merge historically separate bargaining units in violation of the law," said Plant Manager Richard Harris.

The company requests damages for its employees and itself as a result of this action. Also joined in this action are the United Cement, Lime and Gypsum Workers International Union and its Local No. 354 at Shoals, Indiana, and the United Cement, Lime and Gypsum Workers International Union and its Local No. 88 at Portsmouth, New Hampshire.

These charges are an amendment to unfair labor practice charges previously filed by the company.

False Arrest Suit Filed Against Iosco Sheriff

A \$150,000 false arrest suit was filed July 3 in Iosco County Circuit Court against Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Deputy Sheriff Kenneth Bronson of Whittemore.

Filing the suit was Patrick Finnerty, former Whittemore resident, who was arrested May 6, 1967, and charged with resisting arrest, drunk and disorderly and littering a public highway.

Finnerty's complaint stated that he was sitting on the front stoop of a building which contained a television repair shop and residence owned by his father at Whittemore. He admitted in the complaint that "he had been drinking beer and was somewhat under the influence of alcohol."

As Deputy Bronson approached, Finnerty claims he dropped a bottle of beer on the sidewalk and retreated into the shop, locked the door and then went into the residential portion of the building.

Finnerty claims that Bronson broke open the door leading to the shop, then broke open a door leading into the residential portion of the building, where the officer made the arrest.

At the time, Bronson, who serves as Whittemore police chief, stated that he had received a number of complaints that Finnerty had been throwing beer bottles at automobiles passing on M-65 and had been using abusive language to persons passing by. The deputy claimed he arrested Finnerty outside the building and that he resisted arrest by running inside.

Finnerty claims that the deputy used unnecessary force and violence and that no warrant for arrest had been issued.

On May 8, 1967, Finnerty entered a plea of not guilty to the charge. He was lodged in the county jail and later taken to Ionia State Hospital for mental evaluation.

Crops Threatened

The wettest planting season in 30 years threatens Michigan farmers with crop losses unless autumn frost comes late, according to information from the state agricultural department. The word from Lansing is no news to state farmers, still striving in many areas to get seed planted or to get hay in for the winter.

Iosco Has Big Problem With Ambulance Service

Emergency ambulance service in Iosco County has been handled since July 1 on an interim basis through an arrangement with the sheriff's department and area funeral directors. How long this arrangement will continue remains to be seen.

Delivery has been received on a used ambulance ordered recently by the City of East Tawas in cooperation with other local units of government. This ambulance is stationed at the sheriff's department on a "backup" basis.

Since July 1, all calls for emergency ambulance service have been coordinated through the sheriff's department. Local funeral directors, who have announced discontinuance of ambulance service effective July 1, have been handling calls when available and ordered out by the sheriff's department.

New state regulations governing ambulances became effective July 1 and the three funeral directors in the Tawas and Hale are not licensed by the state to operate such a service.

Fred Lomas, chairman of the board of supervisors, said Tuesday that he hoped this arrangement could continue until October 1, when it is expected that a new ambulance service will be inaugurated in cooperation between Tawas Hospital and local governmental units.

Within one hour of receipt of the used ambulance last week, the unit was on its way to assist in transporting victims injured in a two-car crash near Hale.

Lomas said that one of the two new ambulances ordered by East Tawas two weeks ago is expected to be received within two weeks. It is hoped that this four-coat unit may be placed into service immediately in the Hale area, where it is to be operated by trained volunteers.

The board chairman admitted Tuesday that he probably exceeded his authority in stationing the used ambulance at the county jail, to be used only in the cases of extreme emergency, but stated that something had to be done immediately to provide this service.

The board of supervisors has gone on record stating that providing ambulance service is the responsibility of local units of government and not the county.

Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell said Tuesday that his department was having a serious problem in manning the ambulance stationed there.

"We are just operating from day to day with this unit, but I really do not know how long it can continue with our limited manpower," he stated.

The sheriff stated that men had been available on two ambulance calls, but he did not know what would happen if there was a call and no deputies were around.

"We will do the best we can with our limited manpower—that is all I can say at present," said O'Farrell.

Meanwhile, Lomas said that a considerable amount of work remained in drawing up agreements between the various local units of government with Tawas Hospital for operation of the ambulance service. He said that a number of technical problems were being encountered which had not been considered.

Fortunately, the Tawas and Oscoda escaped the heavy traffic over July 4 with relatively few personal injury traffic accidents which required an ambulance.

John Moffatt, East Tawas funeral director, said Tuesday morning that he was going to attempt to operate an emergency ambulance service on call from the sheriff's department as long as possible. However, he did not know if he could operate until October 1 with limited manpower.

Moffatt was called to Oscoda Monday when ambulance services operated by two different funeral directors there were not available. A patient suffering from a perforated ulcer had to be rushed to Tawas Hospital. After transporting the patient to Tawas Hospital, Moffatt was called on to transfer the patient to West Branch.

On the trip to West Branch, a tire blowout halted the Moffatt ambulance east of the Ogemaw-Iosco line. The backup ambulance at the sheriff's department had to be rushed to the scene to resume the trip to West Branch.

"The tire only had 2,000 miles on it," said Moffatt. "After the delays encountered, I really do not know if the patient arrived at

East Tawas Council Gets Flood Complaint

A delegation of property owners from the northeast section of the city learned from the East Tawas Council Monday night that there was no immediate solution to the problem of flooding during recent rain storms.

Mayor James Campbell said that the city was in the process of making a preliminary survey of the problem, but could not foresee any answer in the immediate future.

About 10 persons from the Evans, Franklin and Adams Street areas attended the council meeting.

Campbell stated that a storm sewer system would be very costly and that no money was available at the present time for such construction.

It was pointed out that some of the problems during recent rain

storms were caused by the filling in of ditches by property owners or placing of improper tile in ditches and covering them over.

In other business, the council authorized purchase of 66 new parking meters to be installed at the city's parking lot at the corner of East Westover and Main Street. The meters are to cost approximately \$4,000.

The council authorized the chamber of commerce to rope off Newman Street for a dance Wednesday night.

Upon recommendation of Orrie Hodge, veterans counselor, flags on all public buildings in the city are to be flown at half mast during funerals for veterans returned from Vietnam.

A petition was presented requesting off street parking in the State Street area.

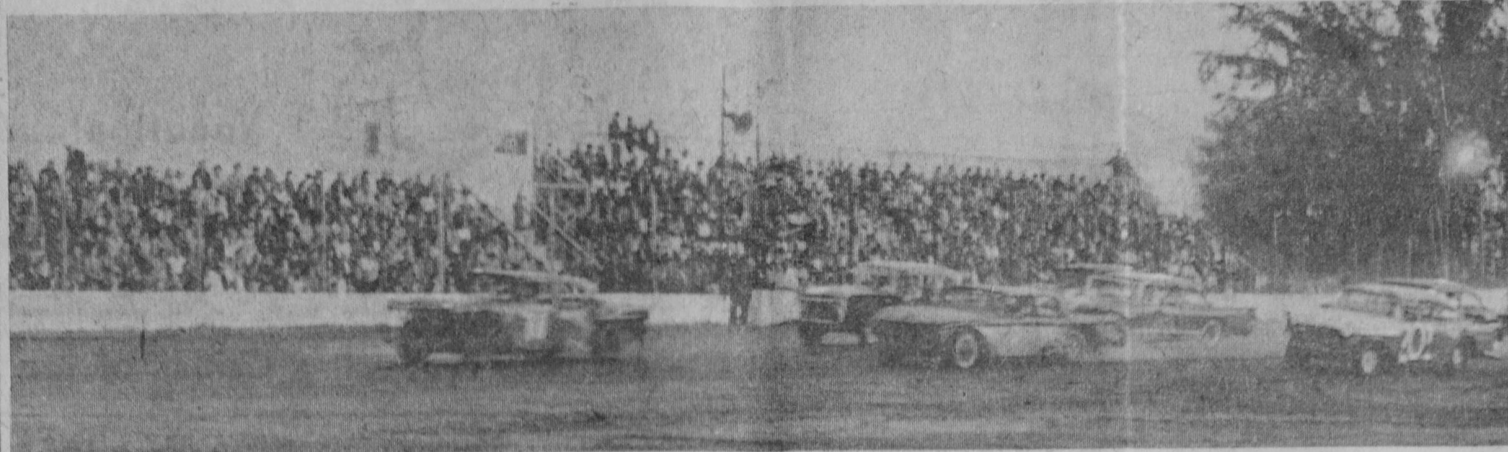

TC Council Hears Protest Over Basement Flooding

Protest over flooded basements in the area of M-55 and Court Street during the recent rain storms was heard Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Mrs. Virginia Coyle and Mrs. Charles Quick appeared before the board and stated that the sanitary sewer had again backed up into their basements last week, causing a serious flooding and health problem.

The two property owners, along with Martin Wellna, First Ward alderman, were of the opinion that Tawas Hospital was causing an overload to the sewer system.

Reginald Bublitz, city superintendent, stated that one of the principal reasons causing overloading of storm sewers in that area was the fact that basement drains were connected to the sanitary sewer system.

This overload, he said, causes a serious problem at the Second Avenue pumping station, where water backs up into the sewer when it cannot be pumped away fast enough.

Bublitz pointed out that he had recommended in the past that basement drains connected to the sanitary sewer be plugged during periods of heavy rain. Such basement drains are now prohibited by city ordinance. He said that basement flooding could be eliminated by installing a sump pump in the basement and pumping excess water to a sewer connection at ground level.

Mayor Russell A. Rollin said that the matter would be turned over to the water board for investigation.

In other business, a letter from the waterways commission stated that the state legislature had deleted funds for participation in construction of boat launching facilities for coho fishing until the full effect of DDT losses could be

Following preliminary examination in district court, Edward Kozlow, 41, National City, will face circuit court trial at Standish on a charge of first degree murder.

Arenac County Prosecutor Carl L. Horn said that a second charge of conspiracy against Kozlow had been dropped. No date has been set as yet for the trial.

Kozlow is charged with the murder of James A. Shannon, 38, Flint, who disappeared in 1962. His skeleton was discovered June 17 in a grave near Omer.

Transfer of Cons. Officer Larry E. Crowder to Iosco County, effective July 6, is announced by Owen J. Bennett, region II conservation law supervisor. Crowder will be assigned to the north fifth of Iosco County and the southern portion of Alcona County, a patrol area that was vacated by the recent transfer of Cons. Officer John LaPear to Kalamazoo County.

Crowder, 28, is a graduate of Manton High School and Michigan State University where he majored in park management. He worked as a seasonal state park ranger while attending college. He was first assigned as a conservation officer in Kalamazoo County in 1965. More recently, he was assigned to Missaukee County. Crowder and his family will reside in the Oscoda area.

Council 'Stands Pat' on Parking Removal

Tawas City Council decided Monday night to "stand pat" on its decision of June 18 recommending to the state highway department that US-23 parking be removed from the east end of Fletcher Oil Company property to the city limits at East Tawas and from the east city limits to First Street.

Gordon Huck, area manager for Consumers Power Company, asked that consideration be given to allow parking on the north side of the highway from Wheeler Street to First Street. He said that elimination of the two parking spaces in front of the general office would cause great inconvenience to the public.

Huck said that he had conducted an investigation and found that no accidents had occurred in that immediate area. He believed that it would be dangerous for customers to pull out on US-23 from a small parking lot at the west side

of the building. A copy of a letter written to the state highway department by Mrs. Perry Crooker of Midway Drive-In Restaurant was also received by the council.

The restaurant owner claimed that the city council was discriminating against that business by removing parking in that location. She recommended to the state that if any parking is removed on US-23, it should be removed from city limit to city limit.

In removing parking in the east and west bound lanes mentioned above, the council acted on a recommendation of City Police Chief George Westcott. He cited a danger to traffic in that area, stating that his department and the sheriff's department had policed 11 rear-end collisions in that vicinity since January 1, 1967. A fatal accident occurred in that area two weeks prior to the council's action.

Fish Finding Aboard "Steelhead"



Four men and the Department of Natural Resources' survey vessel, the "Steelhead," are on a big mission in Lake Michigan to find lake trout and salmon for sport fishermen to catch. With veteran Great Lakes skipper Bill Palmer at the helm, their systematic search is closely geared to using the most modern electronic equipment to pinpoint fish concentrations. One key piece of this equipment is the boat's sonar-type fish-finder which DNR fisheries biologist Lee Moffit (inset above) studies for "blips" showing where fish are being intercepted on a depth index graph. After the fish-finder's graph has been read to target in on possible fish schools, the "Steelhead's" gear specialists set nets to learn what kind of fish-

opportunities lie below. After leaving their nets out overnight, the crew lifts them the next day and the fish taken are identified, aged, weighed, measured, and studied for stomach contents in the vessel's "wet" laboratory. Some of the fish are sent to other laboratories for pesticide studies; others are given to state institutions for food. Findings made aboard the "Steelhead" are promptly relayed to news outlets to provide information aimed at help boosting sport catches. Also, when a potentially good fishing area is found, it is marked with an orange-colored "Steelhead" buoy to draw angler attention. From there, the boat's crew pushes into new areas, hoping each good "find" will lead to others. --Mich. Dept. of Natural Resources.

Judge Miller Issued Injunction Against Picket Line Violence

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller issued an injunction July 1 ordering Local Union No. 7-239, Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers, AFL-CIO, refrain from preventing Jefferson Trucking Company employees from entering the strike-bound National City plant of National Gypsum Company.

At the same time, Judge Miller issued an injunction limiting the number of pickets to four per shift and a general injunction against any violence.

In an affidavit filed with the court, Ralph T. White of Jefferson Trucking claimed that employees of National Gypsum had threatened personal injury to Jefferson employees who had attempted to enter the plant.

National Gypsum Company claimed that pickets had threatened to prevent nonunion employees from entering the plant and had threatened to prevent the Detroit and Mackinac Railway from entering and leaving the company's quarry in Grant Township.

Eight Persons Hurt Friday in Crash Near Hale

Eight persons were injured in a two-car crash Friday afternoon on M-65 at the Towerline Road intersection, Plainfield Township.

Iosco Sheriff's Department officers said a car driven by William T. Kulow, 66, Hale, traveling on Towerline Road, stopped at the intersection and then pulled in front of a car driven by Timothy E. Ruth, 24, Malcolm.

Seven persons injured in Ruth's car included Theresa Ruth, 25; Debra Ruth, 18 months old; Daniel Cavagan, 18, Center Line; Robert Cavagan, 26; Grace Cavagan, 12, and Michele Cavagan, 16.

All of the injured were taken to Tawas Hospital. Timothy, Theresa and Debra Ruth were transferred to Hurley Hospital, Flint.

The company asked that the union be permanently enjoined from picketing or maintaining a picket line on or near company property. This request was not allowed by the court.

National Gypsum Company installations here have been picketed since a walkout of employees on June 21. Supervisory personnel have been operating the quarry and it was expected that the board line was to resume operation this week utilizing supervisory personnel.

Oscoda Woman Asks \$30,000 Damages in Court

A complaint filed in Iosco Circuit Court by Georgette J. Hart, Oscoda, asks damages of \$5,000 and punitive damages of \$25,000 against the General Electric Credit Corporation.

On October 17, 1968, Mrs. Hart owned a parcel of land near Greenbush. She claims that she is not now, nor has ever been indebted to the defendant.

On the above date, the defendant caused to be levied a writ of execution against properties owned by her. She claimed this was done maliciously and with full knowledge that property was owned by her and that the credit corporation had no legal right to cause an execution against the property.

Mrs. Hart claims that actions of the defendant slandered her title and caused personal embarrassment.

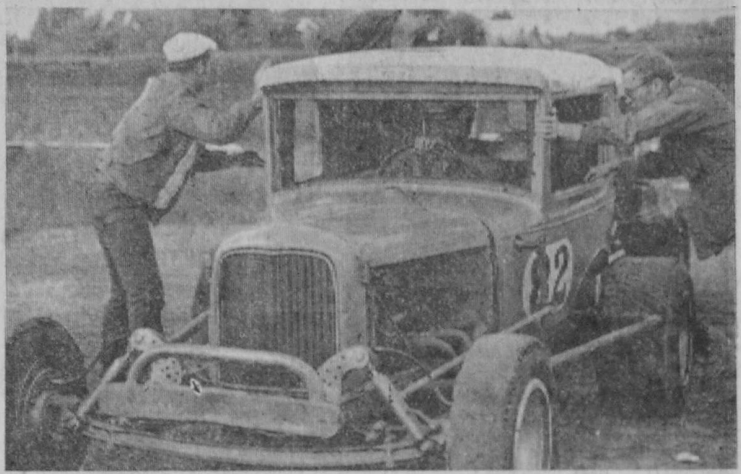

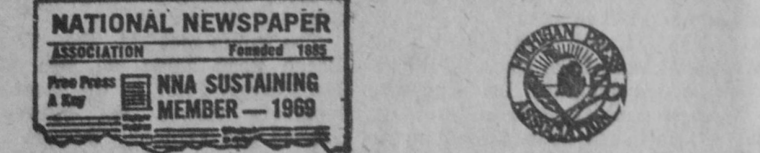

A BULLSEYE FIT
How is your dart game? Does the fit hit the bullseye every time you make a garment? The shape of you and your clothes ought to agree. Darts are the stitched, pointed tucks that shape flat fabric to female curves. Their precise length, depth, and placement are essential to a good fit.

Dart - Darting - Darded
The center fold of a dart is indicated on your pattern by a solid line, the line of stitching by a broken line. Transfer both lines to your fabric and make short crosslines at the point and matching dots. You can begin stitching at either end, but you may have better control of a take-off from the point. The dart experts at Coats & Clark score a perfectly tapered point by taking two stitches along the fold at the point, as close to the edges as possible.

Take Aim
Aim your darting skill at this pantdress target (McCall's 9789). It is bound to be the hit of your summer wardrobe; with a low-down V-neck, flared legs and no sleeves at all. Fit and fabric are where it's at. The garment takes shape from four different types of darts: deep bust darts and curved darts in front; very narrow neck darts and double-pointed darts in back.

A deep dart should be slashed to within 1/2" of the point and pressed open. A double-pointed dart should be clipped at the widest part, and a curved dart at the curve. On both, reinforce with a short line of stitching at the clipped place. Press vertical, uncut darts toward the center of the garment. Horizontal and diagonal darts are pressed downward. Be careful not to crease your garment beyond the dart point. A smooth, puckered dart is easy if you mark, stitch, and press with care.
