## Ann Arbor Team Wins Tawas Race

Tawas River has a new canoe championship team. Richard Kuski and John Baker, 27-year-old paddlers from Ann Arbor, finished in front of an 18-team field Sunday afternoon to win the 16th annual event.

The champions' winning time of 56 minutes, 3.5 seconds, was nearly six minutes off the record time last year of Ralph Sawyer and Stan Hall. The added time was understandable as weather conditions for the 1969 race should go down as the toughest in history for competitors.

A brisk wind out of the northeast whipped up a rolling sea on Tawas Bay and five canoes were forced out of the race after swamping just east of the river mouth. Several more canoes overturned, but paddlers managed to work their way toward shore, dump the water out of their craft and continue on to the finish line.

## Millage Proposal Lost at Oscoda A.

Voters of two Iosco school districts split their decisions on operational millage proposals in annual elections held Monday. A third proposal calling for construction of a new school was defeated.

In a record turn out for two special propositions, voters of Hale Area School District turned down one proposal asking to bond the district for 1.45 million dollars to construct a new junior and senior high school, 433 to 351. A second proposition seeking approval of a three-mill operational tax for one year was approved, 427 "yes" to 374 "no."

Oscoda Area School District, with a total of 1,829 persons going to the polls, defeated a seven-mill proposition by an overwhelming majority, 1,362 to 475. In addition to the above school propositions, trustees were named to the various boards of education. At Hale Area School, Harvey Rasch and Audrey Koehler were elected without opposition. Mrs. Koehler receiving 602 votes and Rasch, 532. Mrs. Celia Perrin, incumbent, was re-elected in a light turn out of voters at Whittemore-Prescott Area School. She re-

## Helmer and Jacques Win Trustee Posts

With a full slate of candidates, but no issues and no campaigning, Tawas Area School's annual election to name two members to the board of education saw a turn out of only 583 voters.

Named to four-year terms as trustees were Carl Helmer, incumbent, East Tawas, and Dr. James Jacques, Tawas City, who was successful in his first bid for public office.

The two men ran neck and neck in balloting, Helmer receiving 323 votes and Jacques receiving 322.

The other three candidates received votes as follows: W. Ray Coleman, 165; LaVerne Koepke, 143; Gerald Gracik, 126.

Jacques is to succeed Waldo Curry, who retires effective July 1 after serving on the board of education since reorganization of the schools in 1952.

Voting in the four precincts was as follows:

Precinct No. 1, East Tawas and part of Baldwin Township: Helmer, 183; Coleman, 96; Jacques, 95; Koepke, 43; Gracik, 34.

Precinct No. 2, Tawas City, Wilber Township and part of Baldwin Township: Jacques, 167; Helmer, 88; Koepke, 48; Gracik, 41; Coleman, 36.

Precinct No. 3, Tawas Township, Grant Township, Sherman Township: Koepke, 43; Jacques, 36; Helmer, 33; Gracik, 24; Coleman, 22.

Precinct No. 4, Alabaster Township and Whitney Township: Gracik, 27; Jacques, 24; Helmer, 19; Coleman, 11; Koepke, nine.

Total votes in the four precincts were as follows: Precinct No. 1, 234; Precinct No. 2, 216; Precinct No. 3, 81; Precinct No. 4, 52.

ceived 97 votes, as compared to 71 for William Thompson and 40 for Brian Bellville.

At Oscoda Area School, William Brandt was the successful candidate for one-year term on the board of education. With 742 votes, Brandt defeated Michael Richardson with 603 and Mrs. Donna Webster with 324. Wilbur Garrett, with 986 votes, and Bruce Myles, 937, were successful candidates for the two four-year terms. Mrs. Doris Krahnke had 438 votes and Robert Grampré had 866.

Sunny skies brought out voters in droves in school districts around the area which had millage propositions. At West Branch, a 12.6 mill operational proposal was turned down by Ogemaw Heights School voters, 1,049 to 541.

Hale Area Board of Education has set a meeting for Thursday night to discuss the result of the bonding proposition which lost Monday. Faced with an increasing school population, officials had sought to replace existing frame facilities with a modern building. This was the second loss this year for the bonding proposition, having been defeated January 15, 369-233. Immediately following that election, a group of citizens organized Hale Area League for Education (HALE) and held a successful petition drive to again place the proposal before voters.

Contacted Tuesday morning, Richard Parkinson, who has headed this committee, said that it was only natural to be disappointed over the final outcome. He said it appeared as though the majority of the people did not want to lose their school through a consolidation with another district, as evidenced by the successful vote for operational millage. But, he said, at this point, people apparently were tax conscious and did not wish to spend additional money for construction of a new school.

Parkinson felt the turn out of voters was outstanding, with 784 out of approximately 900 eligible taxpayers voting in the election. He said that an estimated 57 persons who had indicated they were in favor of the proposition did not show up at the polls.

The committee said that the protest by taxpayers around the state could have had something to do with the bonding proposal's loss. Although stating there were no "frills" in Monday's proposal, he believed that the board of education may have to restudy its plans, trim some items of construction and resubmit a proposal at a later date.

"Such a move would take some real study, as I do not know where the cuts could be made and if it would be desirable," said Parkinson. "Monday's operational millage vote was a good indication, however, that people here want to retain their school."

Supt. Paul Southerland praised the HALE committee for its "hard work, time, effort and expense involved" in acquainting voters with facts about the proposals and the subsequent excellent turn out of voters.

"I still believe in the old adage that 'a stitch in time saves nine,'" said the superintendent. "Unsuccessful school bonding propositions have cost taxpayers millions of dollars in Michigan. By the time a bonding proposition is eventually passed, building costs have skyrocketed and the taxpayer is the loser."

Southerland said that, despite the outcome of Monday's vote, the school district is still faced with the same serious problem of overcrowded and inadequate classrooms.

Following Thursday night's board of education meeting, HALE will hold a citizens' meeting either Friday night or early next week—to finish its business left outstanding or to aid the board of education in any way possible in its plans for the future.

## Tawas Man Dies in US-23 Crash

A 51-year-old Tawas Township businessman died Thursday, June 5, when the truck he was driving rammed into the rear of a tractor-trailer unit parked on US-23 in Tawas City.

Killed instantly was Harold G. Katterman, veteran owner of a sand and gravel hauling business on M-55.

Katterman, traveling east on US-23, drove into the rear of a

Mulvena Truck Line tractor-trailer unit which had stopped in the outside parking lane of US-23 in front of the Midway Drive-in. The crash occurred at noon and the driver, John Replinski

of Saginaw, was having lunch at the restaurant.

Katterman's dump truck, loaded with rock, was traveling about 25 miles an hour, according to a witness. The impact drove the two units about 97 feet east of the point of impact.

In ramming the rear of the Mulvena unit, the engine of Katterman's truck was forced under the deck of the trailer unit, which sheared off the hood back to the driver's compartment.

The victim was pinned in the wreckage for slightly more than one-half hour while police, two wrecker service operators and volunteers worked to remove the body.

Investigated by Police Chief George Westcott, an autopsy performed on the body disclosed that the victim had not suffered a heart attack. Lack of skid marks prior to the crash had led police to speculate that the driver had become ill.

He was the third traffic fatality on Iosco County highways in 1969. He was born June 16, 1917, in Tawas Township.

He was married to the former Mabel Simons at Zion Lutheran Church, Tawas City, on April 19, 1941.

He is survived by his wife; three children, Neil, Hal and Candace, all at home; his father, William Katterman, Tawas Township; two brothers, John and Lloyd, both of Tawas Township; a sister, Mrs. Helen Alstrom, Tawas Township.

Funeral services were conducted Monday, June 9, at Zion Lutheran Church with the Rev. Charles F. Boeder officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.

## TA Summer School Starts Next Monday

Tawas Area School's summer educational program, funded under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, is scheduled to start Monday, June 16. As in the past, the program is to be held at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

Harry Crawford, federal program director for Tawas Area School, announces that this year's program will be somewhat different than in previous years. Rather than the traditional system, the program will concentrate on enrichment of social, education and physical skills.

"The children will be taking part in field trips, role playing, art activities, nature study, social studies, movies and a variety of other activities," said Crawford. "We believe that this program will be extremely rewarding to the children participating. We hope to teach that learning need not be drudgery, but an exciting experience."

## School Gets State Aid Advance; No Interest

Instead of borrowing money to meet payrolls and expenses this summer, Tawas Area School is to receive an advance of \$46,000 of its 1969-70 state aid payments.

This was the word received Monday night by the board of education Supt. Reynold Mick said this action would mean that it would not be necessary to borrow money and the school would save the interest fee.

At its meeting two weeks ago, the board of education directed administrators to borrow money to meet needs during the time preceding receipt of property tax money.

In other business, it was announced that bids were to be opened Monday, June 16, on replacing windows at the East Tawas Elementary Unit. Two alternate proposals are being requested in order to spread construction and financing over a period of two or three years.

The board of education directed that a letter be sent to the Alabaster Township Board to determine if that township was going to charge for the use of its polling place. The three other voting precincts have made polling places available to the school district free of charge. According to the administration, use of the Alabaster Township Hall would cost \$10. Board of education members expressed the opinion that it may be necessary to combine this precinct with the polling place at Tawas Township Hall.

Permission was granted to Peoples State Bank to use school property for the parking of automobiles owned by bank employees. Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, reported that 126 sixth graders visited Longway Planetarium and Sloan Museum, Flint, on May 24. All students of Mrs. William Schmidt, the group was transported by school buses.

A letter of intent has been signed by Miss Angela Lee, Royal Oak, a 1969 graduate of Aquinas College, as a kindergarten teacher.

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# Happy Ending

by Betty Stern

The meal is delicious but what's for dessert? This is often heard from children, and adults might be thinking it. That final touch leaves us with a pleasant remembrance of a perfect meal. An easy way to accomplish this is with the use of a Blender. Chocolate can be liquefied right in the Blender by blending it with a heated liquid. For a dessert that needs to gel, ice used in the blending procedure speeds gell action and cuts down refrigerator chilling time considerably. You can make pie crumb crusts in a whiz with a Blender. ## Chocolate Charlotte A.

8-10 ladyfingers  
2 envelopes unflavored gelatine  
½ cup cold milk  
¾ cup milk, heated to boiling  
1 egg  
¼ cup sugar  
⅛ teaspoon salt

1 6-ounce package (1 cup)  
semi-sweet chocolate morsels  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup heavy cream  
1½ cups ice cubes or crushed ice

Split ladyfingers and stand around sides of 6 cup bowl. Sprinkle gelatin over cold milk in Blender container; allow to stand while assembling other ingredients. Add boiling milk; cover and process at Stir (LO) until gelatine is dissolved. If gelatine granules cling to container, use a rubber spatula to push them into the mixture. Add egg, sugar, salt and chocolate morsels. Turn control to Liquefy (HI) and continue to process until smooth. Add vanilla and cream. Add ice cubes, one at a time, and process until melted. Let stand a few minutes, until somewhat thickened, and turn into ladyfinger-lined bowl. Chill about 1 hour. If desired, garnish with whipped cream. Yield: 8 servings.

NOTE: Chocolate mixture may also be turned into a 5-cup mold or individual serving dishes. Chill mold about 1 hour and individual servings 15 minutes.

## Strawberry Parfait B.

1 3-ounce package strawberry gelatin  
¾ cup strawberry juice drained from frozen strawberries  
¾ cup crushed ice

1 pint vanilla ice cream, cut in chunks  
2 10-ounce packages frozen strawberries, thawed and drained  
Blender whipped cream for garnish

Boil strawberry juice. Put juice and strawberry gelatin in Blender container; cover and process on Stir (LO) until dissolved, about 30 seconds. While Blender is running, add crushed ice and ice cream chunks, a few at a time; continue to process on Stir (LO) until all ice cream is dissolved. Pour mixture into a bowl and chill until it mounds when spooned. Spoon some in parfait glass, add layer of strawberries, add more parfait and then strawberries on top. Chill. Garnish with whipped cream and one strawberry on top. Yield: 4-6 servings.

Break 4 graham crackers into Blender container; cover and process on Grate (LO) until crackers are finely crumbed. Empty into a bowl. Repeat process until all crackers are crumbed. (You should have 1 cup crumbs.) Add sugar and cinnamon to cracker crumbs; mix. Add melted margarine and mix well. Press firmly into bottom and sides of 9-inch pie pan. Chill until firm.

**Walnut Pie**

- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup soft margarine
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup light corn syrup
- 1/2 cup whipping cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups California walnuts
- 1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell
- 1 1/2 cups whipping cream, Blender whipped

Preheat oven to 375°. Put first 7 ingredients in Blender container; cover and process on Blend (HI) for 2 minutes. Add walnuts; cover and process on Chop (HI) turning Blender off and on just until walnuts are coarsely chopped. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake 40 minutes. Cool. Top with whipped cream. 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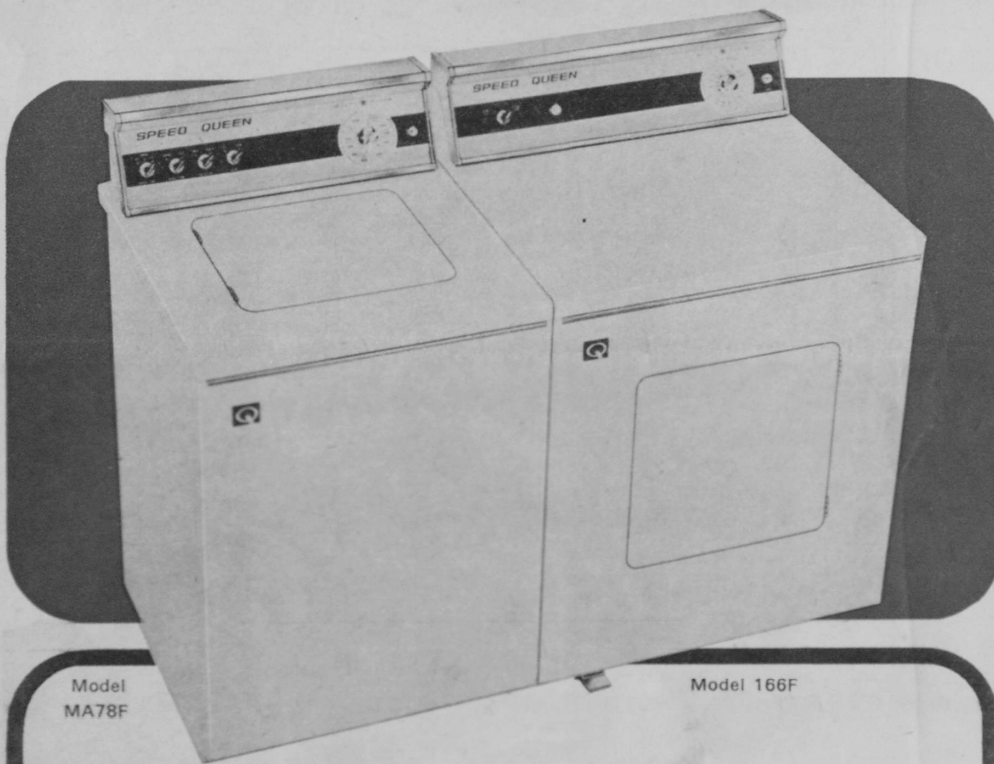

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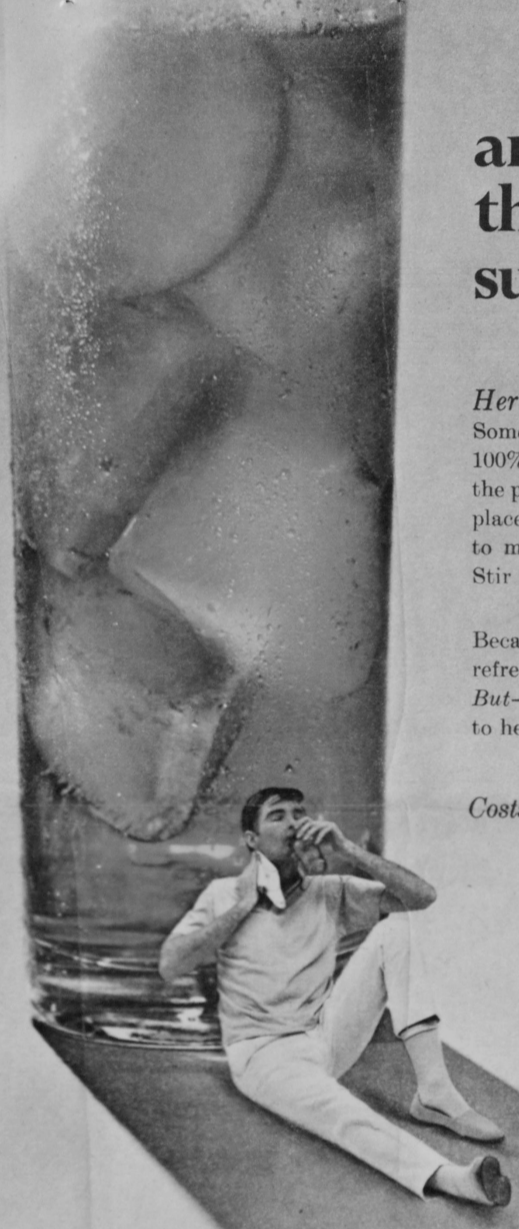

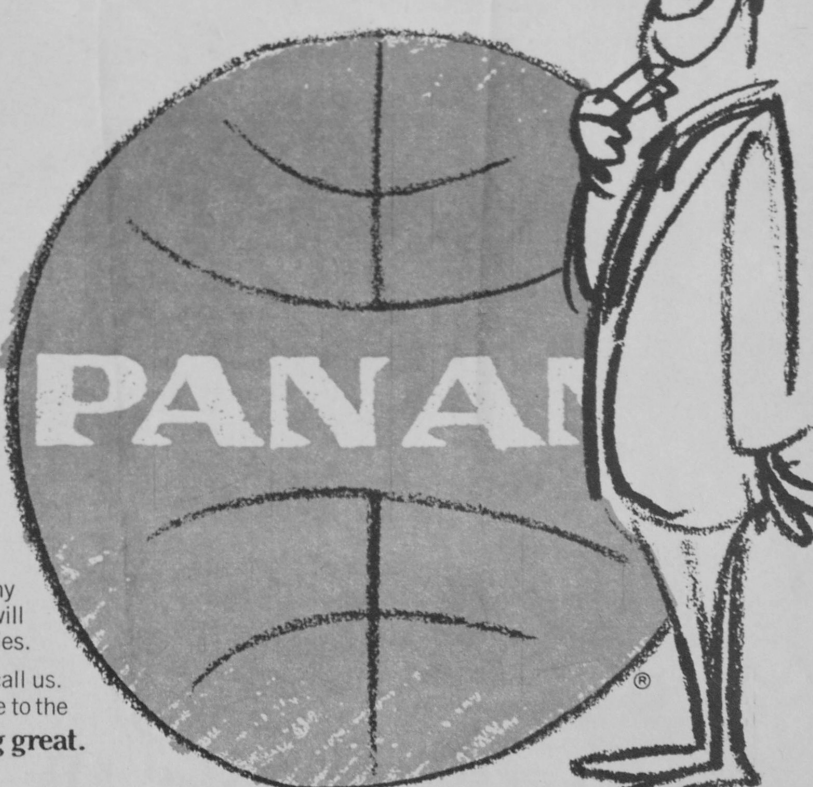

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## MOSQUITO PROBLEMS! THIS TOWN HAS NONE!

Nature's Insect Eradicators

Any mosquito problems in your community? A great many areas of the United States are plagued by the pests—at least during certain months of the year, or especially if the spring and summer are rainy.

All except one town in Pike County, Illinois—Griggsville. Griggsville, according to some of its older citizens, had more than its share of mosquitos, for the town lies near both the Mississippi and the Illinois rivers, with swamp areas on all sides, and plenty of sloughs and lakes that were breeding places for the insects. The Jaycees were instrumental in lining the main streets of Griggsville with martin houses, mounted on tall poles, nearly 200 in number. The martins came in—thousands of them, following the Spring migration from the Amazon Valley in far-off South America. And suddenly there were no mosquitos in Griggsville!

According to men who have studied the habits of the Purple Martin, an adult bird will eat its weight in mosquitos and other insects in a single day. This means about 2,000 mosquitos. Multiply this by the thousands upon thousands of Purple Martins summering in Griggsville, and you can readily see why the community is free of the buzzing pests.

When the young Purple Martins are in the nest, bird-watchers state that the parent birds feed their young every few moments. All the insects are caught on the wing.

Recently completed at Griggsville is a 40-foot-high Purple Martin tower, proclaimed the largest birdhouse in America, that has room for about 3,000 birds. The sight of it stops tourists, who can't figure out what it is.

On the edge of Griggsville is a large sign proclaiming the town of 1,200 as the Purple Martin Capital of the World. No one is disputing the honor, for Griggsvillians are all bird-conscious, talk up the Purple Martin to any tourist or stranger who stops by the town. Even the restaurants have place mats that give the history of this lovable little bird so beneficial to its friends.
