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MOSQUITO PROBLEMS! THIS TOWN HAS NONE!

Nature's Insect Eradicators

by Grover Brinkman

Any mosquito problems in your community? A great many areas of the United States are plagued by the pests—at least during certain months of the year, or especially if the spring

and summer are rainy. All except one town in Pike County, Illinois—Griggsville.

Griggsville, according to some of its older citizens, had more than its share of mosquitos, for the town lies near both the Mississippi and the Illinois rivers, with swamp areas on all

for the town lies near both the Mississippi and the Illinois rivers, with swamp areas on all sides, and plenty of sloughs and lakes that were breeding places for the insects. During Fair Week, town officials spent as much as \$600 for insecticides, to spray the community to keep the crowds from complaining. But for the past two years, the fair officials haven't spent a cent for insecticides. And there are no mosquitos! It all came about when the Jaycees decided to make their community highly conscious of one of the nation's most useful birds—the Purple Martin. The Jaycees were instrumental in lining the main streets of Griggsville with martin houses, mounted on tall poles, nearly 200 in number. The martins came in—thousands of them, following the Spring migration from the Amazon Valley in far-off South America. And suddenly there were no mosquitos in Griggsville! According to men who have studied the habits of the Purple Martin, an adult bird will eat its weight in mosquitos and other insects in a single day. This means about 2,000 mosquitos. Multiply this by the thousands upon thousands of Purple Martins summering in Griggsville, and you can readily see why the community is free of the buzzing pests. When the young Purple Martins are in the nest, bird-watchers state that the parent birds feed their young every few moments. All the insects are caught on the wing. Recently completed at Griggsville is a 40-foot-high Purple Martin tower, proclaimed the largest birdhouse in America, that has room for about 3,000 birds. The sight of it stops tourists, who can't figure out what it is.

On the edge of Griggsville is a large sign proclaiming the town of 1,200 as the Purple Martin Capital of the World. No one is disputing the honor, for Griggsvillians are all bird-conscious, talk up the Purple Martin to any tourist or stranger who stops by the town. Even the restaurants have place mats that give the history of this lovable little bird so beneficial to its friends.

So if you're troubled with mosquitos, try out the Purple Martin plan. Bird-men will tell you that not always will a new house attract birds the first year. But once it is used as a home by Purple Martins, the birds come back year after year. Usually in the central part of the U. S. the birds arrive during the latter part of March, stay throughout the summer, then migrate to South America for the winter. Banded birds have been known to come back to the
