

Preschoolers in Operation Head Start are enjoying films, play games together and are learning what school is all about before entering kindergarten next fall. These children have a noon lunch at school as part of the program. Crawford said that the purpose of Title I money is to supplement, not replace, the regular school program. It is to enable school districts to try something new, or to

experiment. Since starting participation in summer school three years ago, federal grants have diminished from a high of about \$50,000 the first year to an expected \$20,600

next year. The federal programs director said this reduction in funding would require further evaluation of the program in order to make

best use of money available. Crawford said that some of the federal money had been used in the regular school program, involving 30 students in reading improvement classes in grades seven, eight and nine. He said that an evaluation by Robert Blood, guidance counselor, had indicated an average gain of one year in reading improvement by these stu-

Crawford was given authorization by the board of education to prepare a program for next year to be submitted to the state department of education. Plans for a regular school program are due August 15, while summer programs are to be submitted by March 1, 1970.



STRAWBERRY ICE CREAM

1¼ cups milk 2 tbsp. flour 1 cup sugar

1/8 teaspoon salt 2 eggs well beaten 1 quart fresh strawberries 11/2 cups heavy cream

Scald one cup milk in top of double boiler. Combine one-fourth cup milk and flour, blend. Add three-fourths cup sugar, flour mixture and salt to scalded milk. cream. Throw caution and calor- Cook over boiling water stirring ies to the wind, use all the heavy cream the recipe calls for and reand cook 10 minutes. Gradually add hot mixture to eggs, stirring Homemade ice cream does not constantly. Cook one minute, stir-

Add remaining one-fourth cup sugar to strawberries and mash. Add strawberries and cream to egg mixture. Mix well and pour into freezer can. Assemble parts of freezer and pack crushed ice and rock salt in layers around

the freezer can using six parts ice to one salt. Freeze until mixture begins to thicken (when difficult to turn a hand crank or electric motor slows down)

Remove top and draw out dasher, Press ice cream into can. Cover, plugging opening at top. Drain off excess water and repack with ice and salt. Let stand to mellow for about two hours. Yield two quarts.

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





Alewife Problem Better



The cause of alewife die-offs is still shrouded with speculation but, whatever it is, the problem it poses this summer is not expected to approach the disastrous proportions of 1967 in Lake Michigan. An assessment study made last fall by the U.S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries indicates that adult alewife numbers south from Ludington along the east shore of Lake Michigan are at---or perhaps slightly below---the level they were in 1967 following that year's massive losses of the nuisance fish. That die-off knocked the lake's fall population of adult alewives 65 percent below 1966, and mature stocks of those fish have been unable to rebound. Thus, there is not expected to be a "conspicuous" die-off of alewives in Lake Michigan this summer or probably in 1970. So far, fisheries men haven't been able to measure what impact planted lake trout and salmon have had on alewife stocks in the lake. However, as populations of these predator species increase, they will play a decided role in limiting alewife levels and, by virtue of this, convert the alewife problem into a big sport-fishing plus. --- Mich. 





Gypsum Co. Files Unfair Labor Charge

An unfair labor practice charge has been filed with the National Labor Relations Board against the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union and its Local Union 7-239. The charge filed June 23 on behalf of National Gypsum Company, National City, is based on alleged unfair labor practices of the union by its refusal to bargain in good faith.

Plant Manager Richard M. Harris said, "Negotiations have been underway since May but not until the union went on strike on June 21 did the central underlying issues come to light.

"At that time, we were shocked and dismayed to learn that a concerted effort to coerce the company into coordinated bargaining was being made and that the genuine employee concerns of wages and benefits were only of minor importance to the union leadership," said Harris.

"We were told that if negotiations were to be resumed, we would have to meet with representatives of the industrial union department of the AFL-CIO or with representatives of five other unions under multiple plant bargaining conditions.

"This evidences a callous indifference to the legitimate interests of our employees and in our judgment constitutes unfair labor practices since the union has flatly refused to bargain in good faith," Harris said.

Harris continued, "It is a well-known and long established policy of our company to negotiate each plant's labor contract on a local basis in order to give appropriate consideration to employees' requirements in that geographical
