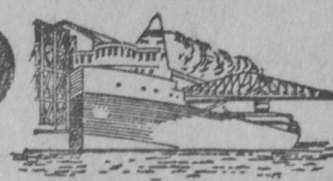

## Educators Innovate in Summer Classes

Tawas Area School's summer educational program, which started last week, has 17 children enrolled in Operation Head Start and 67 youngsters enrolled in enrichment classes.

In a report to the board of education Monday night, Robert H. Crawford, federal projects director, said the summer enrichment program was providing youngsters from grades one through six with a variety of experiences.

"They are learning without knowing it," he said. "It is still too early to have any concrete evidence as to how successful it is, but this is the first time in my experience that kids are fighting to come to school."

Examples he cited to substantiate this belief included two boys, who missed the bus and then walked two miles to school in order that they did not miss a particularly interesting class scheduled for that day.

One parent told Crawford that his child had never liked school, but now was getting up early in the morning to be ready for the bus. Another child had never spoken to an "outsider" before, but was now communicating with others.

The children are attending the enrichment courses on recommendation of classroom teachers and some by the insistence of parents. Crawford said the philosophy behind the instruction was to try to change the attitude of children in order that they like school, rather than to make summer school a punishment for them.

Four activities listed by Crawford were as follows: In a natural science program, Roger Spencer is teaching science without using a textbook. Children are studying birds, insects, trees by making drawings, collections and discussions. He is incorporating films, pictures, short trips and other methods.

Miss Burnetta Miller has a little vegetable garden behind the school. The children plan the garden, lay out the rows for planting, figure how far apart rows should be, how many seeds per row and other mathematical problems. In the process, they are learning arithmetic, reading and other skills.

Mrs. Elizabeth Bielby is having her children take part in art activities. They are making trees, flowers and many other things from crepe paper, clay and paints.

Mrs. Jeanette McCombs is working in the area of rhythms, playing instruments, learning simple notes, singing and dancing. Such activities are designed to improve communication of children in the classroom.

In addition, Miss Margaret Loblance is working in physical education dealing with coordination. Mrs. Eleanor Cooke is taking another phase of science, while Larry Larson is working in social science.

Children are divided into groups of about 10 each and the group stays with each teacher for four days. The program is to last for six weeks.

The summer program is financed by a \$24,229 grant under federal Title I funds. Priorities set by the state department of education include preventative rather than remedial education, with strong emphasis on early elementary and preschool.

Operation Head Start, another phase of the program, is designed for the educationally disadvantaged preschool child. This is the first time such a program has been held at Tawas Area School.

"From what I have seen so far, it is great and worth all the effort," he said. (See SUMMER SCHOOL, page 6.)

## Employees on Strike at National Gypsum

Production and maintenance employees, represented by Local Union 7-239, OCAW, went on strike at the National City plant of National Gypsum Company Saturday. A company spokesman interpreted the action as, "A maneuver by the Industrial Union Department of the AFL-CIO, which does not represent our employees, to coerce National Gypsum Company into coordinated bargaining among the company's gypsum plants."

The company made its final proposal to the local union for settlement of contract negotiation on June 7, an offer including increased hourly wages over two years of 46 1/2 cents and improvements in insurance and pension for a total package of 55 cents.

Friday, June 20, Plant Manager Richard M. Harris informed local union officials that the company had not yet been advised officially of the action taken by the local union's membership on the company's last offer.

"The company has been advised through a representative of the federal mediation and conciliation service that the plant would be struck if the company refused to meet with an individual who is not a member of the local union nor a part of the International Union which is the certified bargaining agent," Harris said.

Monday, Harris said the plant would be opened for employees who prefer to continue working. He noted that it is a long-standing policy of National Gypsum Company to negotiate each of its labor contracts on an individual basis giving appropriate recognition to the needs of employees at the particular location.

"Over the years of experience with this approach it has proved beneficial to our employees," said Harris, "and we will resist any efforts by unknown third parties with questionable motives to bring about changes which would have obvious disadvantages to our employees."

Harris added that late Friday the company was advised by a local union official that if further meetings are to be held they would have to be with a representative of the IUD or presidents of five different unions.

## Two Fireworks Displays Set by Tawas C of C

Fireworks will be displayed again this year on July 4, 9:00 p. m., Tawas City dock, and on July 12, 9:00 p. m., Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas.

A spokesman for Tawas Chamber of Commerce said this week that if it rains hard enough to cancel these programs, they are to be held the following nights of July 5 and July 13.

"The reason these programs are so close to each other is because the Michigan Tourist Festival starts July 8 and ends on July 13," stated Gerald F. Reitter, fireworks chairman for the chamber of commerce.

Several daytime fireworks displays are to start both programs. To be seen, it is necessary for the viewer to be closer to daytime fireworks than those fired at night. Such displays consist of parachutes, plastic toys and smoke trails.

"We hope you will enjoy our display this year," states Reitter. "Come out and see them light up the sky over beautiful Tawas Bay."

The fireworks committee chairman extended thanks to city councils of Tawas City and East Tawas for financial aid in helping the chamber of commerce finance these programs.

## Charge Kozlow With Murder

A murder charge has been lodged against a National City man after a convict's letter to authorities led to the discovery of a skeleton in Arenac County.

Frank Kelley, state attorney general, revealed Friday that the skeleton is the remains of James A. Shannon of Flint, who disappeared in 1962.

Charged with his murder is Edward Kozlow, 41. Also expected to be charged is his brother, Joseph, 27, now serving a prison term for auto theft. Both are former Omer residents.

Kozlow demanded examination Friday afternoon before J. Richard Ernst, 81st District Court judge, who set the hearing for 9:00 a. m. Wednesday (today) at Standish. He was held without bond.

Shannon's skeleton, with a ring, wristwatch, a shirttail and a pair of shoes on it, was found Thursday in a grave near Omer. The skeleton had been covered with lime.

The discovery climaxed a seven-month investigation which started with an informant's letter to Kelley, whose office prosecuted the man in 1968 for armed robbery.

Kelley said the information from the prisoner led to investigation in many parts of Michigan and other states. The tipoff came last November.

## Enrollment Drops in TA Kindergarten

Another reduction in kindergarten enrollment is expected next fall at Tawas Area School, according to a report at Monday night's board of education meeting.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, said that 99 children had been registered for kindergarten next fall, with the possibility of five more to be registered.

"This is the smallest kindergarten enrollment in years, unless there is to be an influx of families of kindergarten children which we do not know about," said Miss Bolen.

Last year, Tawas Area had a kindergarten enrollment of 329 youngsters, which was down considerably from the 179 children enrolled the previous year.

In other business, the board accepted bids on replacing windows at the East Tawas Elementary Unit. Proposals are to be studied and a decision on possible incorporation into this year's budget is to be made later in the week.

Bids included Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City, basic price of \$18,970 for 103 units. Two alternates included deductions of \$2,070 and \$2,088.

Forest Construction Company entered a basic bid of \$21,220.50. Deductions for alternates included \$4,454 and \$3,915.

Alternates in the bids would reduce the number of windows to be replaced.

The board approved a \$10 per month increase for bus drivers. The district hires 15 bus drivers, whose salaries had ranged from a low of \$120 monthly or \$1,140 yearly to a high of \$200 monthly or \$1,900 yearly, depending upon the number of miles traveled.

It was reported that two bus drivers were retiring this year and the district is to lose the services of three other drivers.

Salaries of custodians and secretaries were tabled until contract negotiations are completed with Tawas Area Education Association.

Eligible members of the union include all employees of the sheriff's department, including deputy sheriffs, turnkeys and matrons, but excludes part-time employees, dog warden, office clerical employees and supervisors.

## Vietnam Veteran Dies in Collision

Andres Reno, 22, Tawas Township, became Iosco County's fourth traffic fatality of 1969 in a two-car crash Thursday night in Burleigh Township.

Reno, with three companions, was a passenger in a car driven by James M. Jordan, 20, Turtle Road, National City. The car was owned by the victim.

Investigating state police said that the vehicle was traveling south on Mill Station Road when its headlights went out. Police said the vehicle went through a stop sign at the intersection with Prescott Road and the car was struck broadside.

The vehicle driven by Jordan rolled over into a ditch and all four occupants were thrown from the car into a field.

Jordan and his brother, Joseph, 19, were treated at Tawas Hospital and then transferred to St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw. A third passenger in the car, Roy Reno, 19, was treated at Tawas Hospital and released.

Michael W. Cassell, 18, Prescott, driver of the other car, was treated at Tawas Hospital and released.

Services for Reno were held Monday at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Tawas City. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Born in Nuevo, Mexico, August 20, 1946, he was discharged from

the army last August after serving in Vietnam.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Cirenita Reno of Tawas Township; one brother, Roy; two sisters, Mrs. Delia Youngs of Drayton Plains and Miss Carmon Reno of Mt. Morris; one step-brother, Armond.

## Add 3rd Ambulance to Federal Application

Application for an \$11,000 federal highway safety planning grant to aid in the purchase of emergency ambulances was mailed Monday by East Tawas City Clerk Fred B. Lomas following the signature of Mayor James Campbell.

This action followed action of last Wednesday night, when representatives of 11 local units of government met at the East Tawas City Hall and reached agreement as to the method of financing the local share of purchasing three ambulances.

Lomas said this week that only the City of Whittemore had not indicated its intention in participating in the new ambulance service, although that unit of government has been included in preliminary planning should it desire to be included at a later date.

Following a lengthy discussion as to mode of payment, it was finally agreed to base payment of the local share of \$11,000 on a 50 percent population and 50 percent valuation basis for each unit involved.

A proposal from Dennis Chrivia, Plainfield Township supervisor, to base an ambulance at Hale and operate it with volunteers, was accepted by the group. This unit

would serve the west side of the county.

Representatives are to meet with officials of Tawas Hospital to determine if such an arrangement would be agreeable. While the City of East Tawas is to be the responsible agency for the ambulance service during the first year of operation, according to regulations under application for the grant, the hospital is to operate the service and handle billing for this service.

Two new four-coat ambulances are to be purchased under the plan, one to be based at Tawas Hospital and one to be based at Hale. A third used ambulance is to be based at the hospital for local transfer of patients and as a backup unit.

Total cost of the equipment purchase and for training drivers and attendants is \$22,000.

Lomas said it is hoped that this new service might be started October 1 by the hospital. In the meantime, Lomas said he had been assured by Moffatt Funeral Home that it would continue its ambulance service. Funeral directors at Oscoda have said they would provide ambulance service to Oscoda and AuSable Townships.

## Iosco Board Opposes Federal Taxation of Municipal Bonds

Routine business matters were conducted last Wednesday by Iosco County Board of Supervisors during its June session.

The board adopted a resolution opposing taxation of municipal bonds. A move is now being made in the federal congress to remove the tax exemption status on municipal bonds. Such removal is being vigorously opposed by state and national supervisors associations, which state that removal of this exemption would raise the cost of funding public projects.

Authorization was given to transfer \$2,500 from the Old Orchard Park fund to the general fund to pay administrative expenses of the parks and recreation commission.

The board adopted a resolution authorizing final payment to the Gregory Construction Company on completion of the addition to the Iosco Medical Care Facility.

A \$500 allocation was granted to the Iosco County Agricultural Society for the 1969 fair.

A meeting is to be arranged with Consumers Power Company officials to discuss a new lease agreement with Old Orchard Park. State auditors have directed that all park funds of the county be kept in one general park fund, instead of several different funds. In order to accomplish this, a new lease must be obtained with the power company for the county-operated Old Orchard Park.

Upon recommendation of the conservation committee, the board accepted a bid from Inglis Ford Sales for a three-quarter ton, four-wheel drive vehicle for Old Orchard Park. Cost was \$3,616.94.

The board adopted a resolution authorizing the replacement of a processing unit for the county's new microfilm equipment in the register of deeds office. Purchase price on the original equipment has been allowed by the supplier and improved processing equipment is to be purchased at an additional cost of \$1,870.



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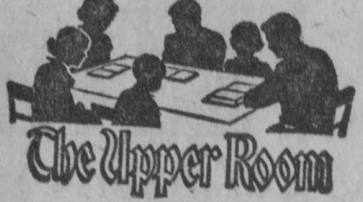

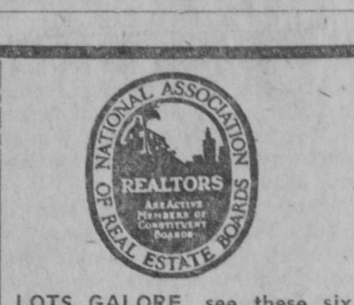

fort," said Crawford. "Progress of the children is amazing. The parents are involved and love it."

Preschoolers in Operation Head Start are enjoying films, play games together and are learning what school is all about before entering kindergarten next fall. These children have a noon lunch at school as part of the program.

Crawford said that the purpose of Title I money is to supplement, not replace, the regular school program. It is to enable school districts to try something new, or to experiment.

Since starting participation in summer school three years ago, federal grants have diminished from a high of about \$50,000 the first year to an expected \$20,600 next year.

The federal programs director said this reduction in funding would require further evaluation of the program in order to make best use of money available.

Crawford said that some of the federal money had been used in the regular school program, involving 30 students in reading improvement classes in grades seven, eight and nine. He said that an evaluation by Robert Blood, guidance counselor, had indicated an average gain of one year in reading improvement by these students.

Crawford was given authorization by the board of education to prepare a program for next year to be submitted to the state department of education. Plans for a regular school program are due August 15, while summer programs are to be submitted by March 1, 1970.

My office has recently received two telephone calls asking what to do with leg bands found on live or dead birds. I was unable to give the callers a good answer so I dug deeper into the question and found there are three different places to send leg bands. Some leg bands are state, some federal and some Canadian. I will close this column with the address for each.

Why are birds banded and what do the bands look like? The band is a little aluminum ring around the bird's leg which carries an identification number. Somewhere, this number is on a sheet of paper along with other details about the bird; such as, species, sex, where banded, etc. There is usually some information to show whether the band is of state, federal or foreign origin.

Birds are banded primarily to help researchers determine the winter and summer ranges and the flyways used by the birds. Some identification of song birds' habits may not occur until they die and the bands are sent in. While game birds may be shot a few months later and the bands recovered.

This type of study has gone on for many years. The information gathered shows some birds fly thousands of miles from their winter area to their summer area. Some fly long distances over water without resting.

So if you should find a dead banded bird or shoot a banded game bird, return the band to one of the addresses below with your name and address so the area the bird was found can be identified. I know it will be appreciated.

The drill, called field day, is being sponsored by the national amateur radio organization, the

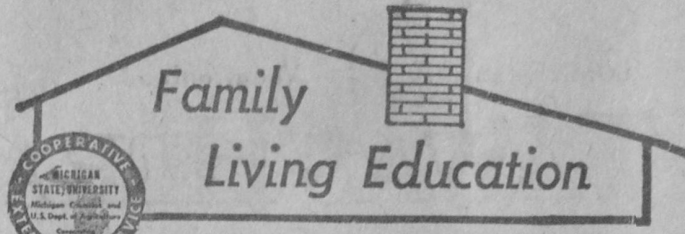
American Radio Relay League, and will find radio amateurs of the United States and Canada leaving their homes and retreating to preselected emergency operating sites.

The object of the exercise is to checkout equipment and to test the procedures that will be used in actual emergencies, where amateurs frequently have provided the only communication with the outside.

The public is invited to visit the site. Guides will be available to explain the equipment and show how the group works with the American Red Cross, civil defense, police and other authorities in times of need.

A popular family pastime during the summer is making ice cream. I won't debate for hand cranked or electrically operated ice cream freezers but will cast my ballot for homemade ice cream. Throw caution and calories to the wind, use all the heavy cream the recipe calls for and resolve to eat now and diet later. Homemade ice cream does not store very well, so it is a good idea to invite your friends and eat it all at one setting.

### STRAWBERRY ICE CREAM

1 1/4 cups milk  
2 tbs. flour  
1 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs well beaten  
1 quart fresh strawberries  
1 1/2 cups heavy cream

Scald one cup milk in top of double boiler. Combine one-fourth cup milk and flour, blend. Add three-fourths cup sugar, flour mixture and salt to scalded milk. Cook over boiling water stirring frequently until thickened. Cover and cook 10 minutes. Gradually add hot mixture to eggs, stirring constantly. Cook one minute, stirring. Cool.

Add remaining one-fourth cup sugar to strawberries and mash. Add strawberries and cream to egg mixture. Mix well and pour into freezer can. Assemble parts of freezer and pack crushed ice and rock salt in layers around

the freezer can using six parts ice to one salt. Freeze until mixture begins to thicken (when difficult to turn a hand crank or electric motor slows down).

Remove top and draw out dasher. Press ice cream into can. Cover, plugging opening at top. Drain off excess water and repack with ice and salt. Let stand to mellow for about two hours. Yield two quarts.

Alewife Problem Better

Alewives outnumber all other fish in several of the Great Lakes. Sea lamprey paved the way for these invaders from the Atlantic when lampreys reduced predator fish like the lake trout and burbot.

The cause of alewife die-offs may be the result of a salt-water fish not yet adjusted to fresh water—especially during rapid temperature changes or in the presence of cold water (less than 50°).

The increase of alewife-eaters like the coho, chinook, lake trout and rainbow will help reduce the herds of the "herring from the sea."

The cause of alewife die-offs is still shrouded with speculation but, whatever it is, the problem it poses this summer is not expected to approach the disastrous proportions of 1967 in Lake Michigan. An assessment study made last fall by the U.S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries indicates that adult alewife numbers south from Ludington along the east shore of Lake Michigan are at—or perhaps slightly below—the level they were in 1967 following that year's massive losses of the nuisance fish. That die-off knocked the lake's fall population of adult alewives 65 percent below 1966, and mature stocks of those fish have been unable to rebound. Thus, there is not expected to be a "conspicuous" die-off of alewives in Lake Michigan this summer or probably in 1970. So far, fisheries men haven't been able to measure what impact planted lake trout and salmon have had on alewife stocks in the lake. However, as populations of these predator species increase, they will play a decided role in limiting alewife levels and, by virtue of this, convert the alewife problem into a big sport-fishing plus. —Mich. Dept. of Natural Resources.

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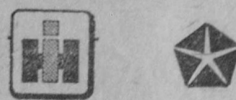
