## Escape Holiday Traffic With 3 PI Accidents



## East Tawas Council Approves Measure to Provide Ambulances

East Tawas Council took the first step Monday night toward a possible solution to the area's ambulance problem.

The two city officials learned that matching money for purchasing ambulances, training drivers and attendants was available through federal highway safety funds. Necessary forms to make application for this money were obtained.

According to the plan adopted Monday night, the city would borrow \$7,000 as the local share of the matching fund arrangement. A meeting is to be called for next Monday night inviting officials of Tawas City and townships of Iosco to discuss the possibility of each unit paying a proportionate share of the initial cost.

Lomas pointed out that federal money probably would not be available until September or October. Operators of the two local ambulance services announced this week that they would be going out of the ambulance business effective July 1, due to the fact they would not be licensed by the state on the effective date of the new state act.

However, both funeral directors in the Tawas are to be asked to remain in business until such time as the new ambulance service becomes effective. It was believed at the meeting that the state health department would relax its rules during the interim period to insure ambulance service to the area.

It is Campbell's contention that operation of an ambulance service could be self-supporting through higher rates and a coordinated collection procedure at the hospital.

Under terms of the federal grant, the governmental unit or units obtaining the federal grant must operate the ambulances for one year. After that, the equipment could be sold to the hospital at a minimal rate, or as low as \$1. Campbell said that local units purchasing the ambulances would be reimbursed for the original capital outlay from proceeds of the ambulance service. East Tawas Council voted unanimously in favor of the project.

## Michigan Bell Opens New Office Here

Howard L. Haight, area manager for Michigan Bell, said customers can visit the new business office from 8:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., Monday through Friday, to discuss telephone accounts, order phone service or pay monthly bills.

Arrangements can also be handled by telephone. The telephone number is 362-4401.


The new office will also serve telephone customers in St. Helen, West Branch and Standish. Records for customers in all these communities will be located in the East Tawas office.

Haight stressed that customers still will be able to pay bills at local authorized agencies, if they choose, after the new office is opened. Or, they may mail payment checks to the company's accounting office.

The new Tawas area office is expected to be staffed by six employees.

Part of the newly-organized Bay City District, the new office is being opened to better serve the communications needs of area customers and to handle future expansion, Haight explained.

In addition to the new office in East Tawas, the Bay City District has business offices at Bay City, Midland and Clare.

## Schools Lose

### Tax Order Remains Same as Preliminary

Preliminary order of the Iosco Tax Allocation Board, which cut tax money to county schools next year by 1.08 mills, will stand as adopted May 19.

Two different tax split plans were voted upon before finally adopting the preliminary order. This called for nine mills for schools, 4.8 mills for county, 2 of a mill to the intermediate district and one mill to townships showing a budgeted need.

Representatives of three school districts of the county appeared before the board Wednesday morning to seek some relief from losing slightly more than one mill under the preliminary order.

Last year, schools received 10.08 mills, the county received 3.75 mills and the intermediate district received .00017 of a mill.

Following the noon adjournment, the first of three plans was voted upon. Presented by Chairman Arden Charters, this plan failed on a three to three tie vote. It called for 9.45 mills to schools, one mill to townships, 2.5 of a mill to intermediate school district and 4.30 mills to the county. Voting in favor were Charters, Ernest Jordan and Ronald Dane. Voting against the measure were J. Berkeley Smith, Ralph Western and Edward Nelkie.

The next move came when Western proposed a split giving 9.30 mills to schools, one mill to townships, 2.0 of a mill to intermediate school district and 4½ mills to the county. This was the key vote of the day, insofar as schools were concerned. The tie vote failed on a three-three tie.

Voting in favor of the measure were Dane, Western and Charters. Voting against the measure were Jordan, Smith and Nelkie.

Smith then moved that the preliminary order as adopted a week earlier be approved. This plan was approved by a four to two roll call. Voting in favor were Smith, Western, Nelkie and Charters. Voting against the measure were Dane and Jordan.

At the conclusion of voting, a motion adopted by the allocation board informally requested that the Iosco Board of Supervisors give consideration to place a proposal before voters calling for a pegged millage plan.

This arrangement has worked successfully in Ogemaw County for the past three years. Through this means, the 15-mill limitation can be increased to 18 mills, with millage to each taxing unit—schools, county, township and intermediate district—stabilized by a vote of the people.

By adoption of pegged millage, the work of the tax allocation board would be eliminated.



## Pick Up 50 Tons of Clothing for Disaster Relief

Students of the Transportation Training Department, Lansing Community College, participated Tuesday, May 13, in a 2,000-mile mission of mercy.

Five truck drivers trainees drove the college's training vehicles in "Operation Disaster Relief" and picked up an estimated 50 tons of processed used clothing collected throughout the state by the welfare departments of local Seventh-day Adventist churches in Michigan. The material was then transported to the denomination's East Coast depot in New York City, New York, to be held in readiness for quick shipment to disaster areas anywhere in the world.

Each spring and fall, Adventists in Michigan, through their local welfare centers gather together used clothing. They keep part for their own local needs and send the excess to their East Coast depot. Here, it is held in readiness for shipment to disaster areas in any part of the world.

According to Elder Richard Broome of Tawas, eight million people in 48 countries with government declared disaster areas received help from the Adventist denomination.

Included in this year's collection of clothing are 10,000 pairs of new shoes donated by a manufacturer. They are slated for shipment to the 54 orphanages operated by Adventists in Korea.

The student trainees from Lansing drove their trailers in 16 pick-up points throughout the state where area Adventists had assembled the clothing. Camp AuSable in Grayling was designated as the pick-up point for this area. The trainees then assembled in Battle Creek where the material was then transferred to four 40-foot trailers which took the clothing to New York City.

The Michigan Conference of Adventists paid tolls, food and lodging for the men involved in the trip. Gas was furnished for "Operation Disaster Relief" by the Pure Oil Company of Palatine, Illinois. The cabs and trailers were made available to Lansing Community College through 11 different tractor and trailer manufacturers.





## Hale Area School District Voters Decide 2 Special Proposals

Voters of Hale Area School District will decide two special proposals on Monday, June 9. One calls for construction of a 1.45 million dollar junior and senior high school and the second asks approval of a three-mill operational tax for one year.

Following the 369-233 defeat of the school bonding proposal on January 15, a group of citizens organized what is known as Hale Area League for Education (HALE), which began a successful

petition drive to again place the proposition before voters.

Headed by Richard Parkinson of Farmers and Merchants State Bank, this group, during the past three months, has attempted to explain the needs of the school district through public meetings, newspaper articles and a brochure mailed last week.

HALE petitioned the board of education to resubmit the same modernization and expansion proposal which was defeated earlier.

In addition, Hale Area Board of Education will be asking for three mills for one year to replace the two mills of operational taxes which expired this year.

Voters are to receive three ballots at the polling place, located at the present high school building. Proposition one asks that the tax rate limit be increased by three mills for operation; the second proposal (limited to taxpayers) asks to bond the district for 1.45 million dollars; the third ballot is to fill two vacancies on the board of education. Candidates for four-year terms are Harvey Rasch and Audrey Kocher.

The board of education states that the three-mill operational levy is absolutely necessary to meet and maintain the present operational budget for next year. Hale Area School District, like all school districts in the county "lost" 1.08 mills in the county tax allocation last week and the three additional mills is the minimum under which the present school program can continue to operate.

The program to be financed by the 1.45 million dollar proposal includes a new junior and senior high school building containing 17 teaching stations. With corridors and service areas, the building would contain 52,000 square feet of floor space.

To be located west of the elementary building, the new structure could be used to house the junior high school and upper elementary grades in the event of future consolidation with any other school district.

The building would contain four classrooms for grades seven and eight, three classrooms for English, two classrooms for social studies, one mathematics classroom and one laboratory each for physics and chemistry, natural sciences, homemaking, arts and crafts, commercial. In addition, there would be a gymnasium and a music room.

West wing of the present structure would be devoted entirely to elementary grades, providing a minimum of six teaching stations. These rooms, added to the six now available, would provide a surplus of one over assumed requirements. The one additional room could be

used for special education.

The remainder of the old wooden structure would be abandoned and removed from the site.

In planning its building program, the board of education and HALE considered enrollment figures, standards of existing facilities, curriculum, teacher and student working conditions, accreditation standards, needs of the community and effects of any future consolidation.

The proposed building would provide rooms for two sections of all elementary grades, eliminating the three oversized classes at present. It would provide enough room to include special education, to take advantage of the special intermediate school district tax which has been in effect for three years.

In addition, the proposal would provide rooms for two additional high school teachers to cut down excessive teacher loads and class sizes; it would provide for the present staff to utilize the shop all day with possibly including auto mechanics; provide for a part time librarian, arts and crafts, plus a guidance counselor, which would correct a deficiency in the present lack of accreditation.

The proposed new gymnasium would provide equal time for boys and girls, as well as more use by the community. The old gymnasium would be used as an all-purpose room for the elementary and community, if needed.

The proposed building with renovation of the old brick building (west wing) and removal of the wood frame structure would cost a total of \$1,450,000. At the district's present valuation, this would be about 6½ mills or approximately \$6.50 per \$1,000 valuation. Next fall, the district's valuation should increase another 1½ to two million dollars, which would reduce the number of mills assessed yearly. As the valuation increases, the millage decreases on building programs.

Additional staff to operate facilities would be approximately three mills, based on present state aid and costs. This varies yearly as the legislature sets the state aid formula. Indications are at present there will be increased state aid effort in the future.

The total cost for building and operation would be under the state average. At present, Hale Area Schools' voted operational millage is among the bottom six out of over 500 school districts in the state.

In 1963, a six-room elementary unit was built and the brick west wing was added to the old high school. Enrollment in 1963 was 432 students and when that project was completed, rooms were immediately filled to capacity with no allowance for future growth.

Since 1963, enrollment has increased to 540 students. A storage room has been converted to an undersized classroom and other students have been added to classrooms which have presented grave overcrowded conditions, hindering education of children.

Enrollment of the school is projected to reach 584 in 1970 and 597 in 1971. Larger elementary grades will soon be moving into the high school which will cause overcrowding without any new students moving into the district.

### LETTERS to the EDITOR

Dear Editor,

This letter is in answer to the question, "Why do we need a new school?" I have written them down in the order in which they came to me. I have undoubtedly left out many which should be recognized, but the following are the ones which I have thought are most important:

1. The facilities of our school are very inadequate for the number of students who attend our school.
  2. The appearance gives a student a feeling of not learning.
  3. There is not enough equipment to make the learning process more interesting.
  4. The building, itself, is in very poor condition. It makes a student feel more like he is in a warehouse rather than a school.
  5. Our gymnasium has a tile floor, which is below par for some elementary schools.
  6. The heating is bad, the lighting is bad and acoustics are bad.
- I believe a good school is half of a community. If we have a good school, it will benefit everyone.
- Without a new school, we will probably be transferring to another town before long. That will mean there will be no school in Hale. People will not want to move here and our town will die.
- As of now, we have a school to be ashamed of—not proud of! For me, there is but one answer and that is to vote yes for the new school.

### HALE Lists Reasons for 'Yes' Vote

"Our main concern is the student who could easily lose his identity in a larger school district," is one of the main points being stressed by Hale Area League for Education in urging district voters to approve a 1.45 million dollar bond issue June 9 to finance cost of a junior and senior high school.

One of the basic reasons behind the above thought is that by retaining the junior and senior high school at Hale, students can achieve better communications with teachers, administration and parents through individual attention and, therefore, better education.

In a recent news article, Hale Area League for Education pointed out that if Hale Area School was to consolidate with any other district in the county, additional classrooms would be required. Thus, Hale Area School District would have to pay for a new building, plus assuming the debt of a district with which it merged.

The valuation of Hale Area School District is \$30,677 behind each student—one of the highest in the state.

"We would like to keep money like this in our own district, where our board of education—which knows our needs and aims much better than any adjoining district—would be able to handle the education of youngsters," states HALE.

Other points stressed by HALE include:

1. In a consolidated district, local board representation would be limited.
2. Transportation in any consolidation would create many problems. An added hour a day, traveling to and from school, would be involved for each student. Extra curricular activities would mean more time spent in travel to and from school. Cost for buses, drivers and upkeep would be higher.
3. The highest dropout level is in the larger school districts. At present, the dropout level at Hale Area School is far below the state average.
4. The proposed new school building would provide a center for all activities of the community, centrally located in the Hale Area School District.

After reviewing all of the above mentioned points, HALE states: "We feel our children will be given as good or better education here with the building of the proposed new high school plant."

# Proper Use of Soil and Water is Big Problem

Proper use of soil and water in and around growing towns is a pressing problem today in Iosco County.

Through the leadership of the Iosco County Soil Conservation District, resource conservation measures have become well accepted and are practiced now on farms in the area. But large scale land use changes, accompanied by rapid urban-suburban land development projects, can quickly undo this "conservation good."

Living in the city often causes people to forget their ties to the land. It provides their food and produces the raw materials for their clothing and shelter. Houses rest on it. Trees, flowering plants and lawn grasses root in it. Its water resources are dependent upon it.

The people's repayment to the land begins with its wise use. Urban people need to realize this and do their share to treat and prevent conservation problems rather than create them. Effective public support that endorses sound land use in city and county planning can help direct the actions of planning boards and local governments.

Cities and suburban areas need additional space for recreation areas, highways, airports, industrial parks, office buildings and parking lots. City and county planners are trying to meet these needs. They want to be sure that cities will remain pleasant and healthy places in which to live.

Misuse and haphazard development of former agricultural lands rapidly triggers problems in these new urban areas. Water and wind carry away loose soil from exposed ground on construction sites. It accumulates as sediment in waterways, blocks roadways and smothers young plants and

small trees. Streets not laid out to conform to topography may create special problems of drainage and erosion. The skyrocketing demand for more houses in suburbia and highways to reach them may encourage construction on poor site in high risk areas.

In suburban areas where most lands are being rapidly changed to nonagricultural uses, planners need to consider the total use potential of the land. There is still a place for agricultural and forested lands along the urban fringes. They provide open space that helps beautify the total area. They separate new urban development from adjoining cities.

To meet these expanding urban needs and to provide services to the evergrowing number of non-farming land uses, the Iosco County Soil Conservation District is working with all types of landowners. Through the district, United States Soil Conservation Service technicians, headquartered at the Federal Building, East Tawas, are now providing technical assistance to such people as the urban planner, the engineer, the developer, the administrator and the elected official.

## HALE Lists Questions-Answers on Proposal

The final week of questions answered by Hale Area League for Education is presented this week. If anyone still has questions concerning the June 9 bond issue for Hale Area School, he is requested to attend a meeting at the high school on June 4, 7:30 p. m.

How much will the proposed building and remodeling cost? The additional cost to each of us who owns property would be 54 cents a month, for every \$1,000 of assessed valuation. Our annual tax increase would be \$6.50 (possibly less) per \$1,000.

To apply this to your own property, check your last tax statement. Take the amount which shows as state equalized valuation, down in the left corner, and multiply each \$1,000 by 54 cents to show the monthly increase—or by \$6.50 to show the annual increase. A valuation of \$5,000 would result in a monthly increase of \$2.70—or a yearly increase of \$32.50.

What if valuation of the district increases?

As our district's valuation increases, from new homes, subdivisions, businesses and industry, the millage required to maintain operation and pay building debts will reduce.

What will we be voting on?

All registered residents may vote on election of two school board members, and on renewal of the present operating fund (to be shown on the ballot at three mills). Property owners may also vote on the bond issue for building and remodeling (to be shown on the ballot at \$1,450,000).

When and where do we vote? Polls will be open from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m., Monday, June 9, at the school gymnasium. At HALE offers these comments on the building proposal:

In education, we are dealing with our most prized possessions—our children. The annual cost to improve and expand the education of every child, for a home assessed at \$5,000 is \$32.50—or just six cents per child, per year. It is up to each of us to determine if the education of our children is worth it.



## Consider Cookware For the Bride

June and weddings seem to go together and weddings mean gifts. When young couples are first starting they need everything, so practicality is one thing we need not worry too much about. Practicality and beauty, however, make the ideal combination and today's cookware rates high on both counts.

New developments have made cookware prettier and in some ways better than ever. Bright colors rather than plain metals and

other materials are common and pots and pans with color are usually as practical as they are pretty. Nonstick finishes on the interiors are the rule rather than the exception.

Another notable development is the improvement in traditional materials. For example, many porcelain enameled steel pans now resist cracking and chipping; stainless steel is usually combined with aluminum or copper to get the best of easy cleaning and good heat conduction in one utensil. Some materials are not as damaged by high temperature, including oven heat and dishwasher washing as they were in the past.

In aluminum ware some of the colored aluminum has been anodized. That is given a type of finish without adding a different material.

On pans for the top of the range cooking, colored anodized finishes are often confined to the covers of pans and the finish will last indefinitely unless washed in a dishwasher.

The new porcelain enamel and ceramic finishes which are only on the outside do not interfere with the transfer of heat to the food inside the utensil and usually have a nonstick finish. The exterior finish will not scratch, mar or dent in ordinary use. The color is unaffected by heat or dishwasher washing.



## What Do We Value Most?

The children of our school district are our most priceless possessions. Over the years, the citizens have provided them with that which they feel is most important—a good education.

We are now faced with an important decision—an opportunity to expand and improve the education of every child. An election is set for June 9, to determine how we can provide for this.

## The Problem

We are faced with a number of problems in our present educational facilities.

Topmost is the increase in student enrollment. Enrollment has swelled, since 1963 when all classrooms were filled, from 452 to 550 students. ## How Would Education Benefit?


- A. Smaller sized classes, for more efficient teaching and improved learning.

- G. More productive use of Library, by eliminating other activities in the room and providing the assistance of a Librarian.

The program to be financed by the 1.45 million dollar proposal includes a new junior and senior high school building containing 17 teaching stations. With corridors and service areas, the building would contain 52,000 square feet of floor space.


Educational benefits to every child can be assured, by the voter's support of the two proposals being presented at the annual election, June 9.

# present frame building or THIS?




## Proposed New High School
