## Veteran IRC Shop Foreman Retires

Veteran shop foreman, Eino Haglund, 70, retired from the Iosco County Road Commission effective Friday. He would have had 35 years of service with the commission in May.

Mr. Haglund was an early day automotive mechanic at East Tawas and operated a garage there for about 10 years before selling out to William Look.

A native of East Tawas, Haglund started with the commission in 1934. The late Jesse Sloan was superintendent when he started his employment.

His principal job has been in maintaining road commission equipment. The shop at East Tawas serves substations at Oscoda, Hale and Whittemore, as well as equipment stationed at East Tawas.

Maintenance of equipment has meant that the shop has been on 24-hour call, especially during winter months when heavy storms meant hard usage of equipment.

Haglund's son, Carlton, has been a road commission employee since 1939 and is chief mechanic in the maintenance shop.

"It is a little early to say much about plans for retirement," said Haglund. "My wife, Elizabeth, and I will probably be making a few trips to visit relatives."

Besides their one son, the Haglunds are parents of three daughters, Mrs. Paul (Suzanne) Gikas, Ann Arbor; Mrs. Robert (Marilyn) Lane, Louisville, Kentucky, and Mrs. Kenneth (Jeanne) Gingerich, Downey, California.

Haglund was honored last month with a retirement party at Tawas Golf and Country Club.

## Ottawa Equip. is Low Bidder on Police Car

Low bid submitted by Ottawa Equipment Company was accepted Monday night by the Tawas City Council for furnishing a new police car.

Ottawa's bid was \$1,898.50, representing the difference between a 1969 Plymouth and trade-in on the old car.

In other business, the council's ordinance committee is to begin a study of ordinances and make recommendations to the council for bringing them up to date. Members of the ordinance committee are Aldermen Howard Hatton, John St. James and Martin Wellna.

A joint meeting is to be held between the council and water board next Monday night to discuss needs of the sewer disposal plant. A representative of Spicer Engineering, Saginaw, is to attend the meeting.

Preliminary engineering is to be obtained to determine methods of drainage necessary to improve Court Street. This street parallels the railroad tracks from the county building on M-55 and has considerable traffic.

The council set aside its meeting April 21 for a discussion on steps to be taken to change Tawas City from operating under the Fourth Class City Act to a home rule city. Such a step may be initiated by council action or by petition.

## State Discontinues Forest Fire Station in Reorganization

The United States Forest Service and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources have agreed to an exchange of forest fire protection area in the vicinity of the Huron National Forest in Crawford and Iosco Counties. John von Bergen, forest supervisor of the Huron-Manistee National Forests, stated that the exchange of responsibilities will be effective April 1.

The exchange of protection areas involves almost 100,000 acres in Iosco County and over 80,000 acres in Crawford County. The purpose of the exchange is to lower the cost of protection of wild lands in these areas by consolidating fire protection at the nearest agency station.

In Iosco County, the forest service fire protection area will now include all lands in the county east of M-65, except for the area north of the Ausable River from

Lake Huron west to the national forest boundary. That corner of the county, which is north of Oscoda, will be covered by the DNR station at Lincoln. Lands in the county west of M-65 and south of Long Lake will be covered by the DNR station at West Branch. Protection responsibilities will not change north of Long Lake.

In Crawford County, the department of natural resources will protect all of the lands inside of the national forest boundary in the county. This area was previously protected by the forest service station at Mio. Protection for this area will come from the DNR stations at Roscommon and Grayling.

As a result of this action, the DNR fire station at East Tawas has been eliminated.

The forest fire contact in East Tawas will now be the district ranger, US Forest Service, with offices located on the second floor of the post office building.

Mr. von Bergen stated that this agreement does not affect the responsibilities of local government fire departments in the area concerned. Both agencies have essentially the same procedures in handling burning permits and other public contracts on forest fires and have been working under a cooperative agreement for mutual aid on fires for many years.

## Tawas City's Tax Base Shows Increase in '69

Tawas City's tax base has increased by \$101,460, according to a report Monday by the board of review. The total includes \$5,201,250 in real estate and \$1,069,950 in personal property.

Based on personal property taxes, the city has 78 commercial businesses and six industries, including Tawas Industries, Tawas Tube Manufacturing Company, Bopp - Busch Manufacturing Company, Tawas Plating Company, Detroit and Mackinac Railway and Huron Wood Preserving.

Real property showed a \$128,610 increase, from \$5,072,640 last year to \$5,201,250 in 1969. This included 132 parcels of commercial

at \$1,773,750, as compared to 123 parcels and \$1,615,200 in 1968; industrial, 18 parcels at \$180,900, as compared to 14 parcels in 1968 at \$164,710; residential, 811 parcels at \$3,246,600, as compared to 841 parcels in 1968 at \$3,292,730.

Personal property valuations included 78 commercial at \$500,700, a decrease from last year's \$530,990; industrial, \$189,400, a decrease from \$211,160 in 1968; residential, \$21,000, as compared to \$16,910 in 1968; utility, \$358,850, reflecting an increase over the \$338,040 brought in last year.

All of the above figures are 50 percent of the true cash value, which is used as the state equalized value for taxing purposes.

## TC Takes IDC Millage Plan Under Advisement

A request for one-eighth of a mill of city tax money to assist the work of the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation was taken under advisement Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Appearing before the council was Kenneth Conn, a member of the IDC's board of directors, along with John Austin, president of the chamber of commerce.

Conn told councilmen that all funds of the IDC were currently allocated to the development of its industrial park near the Iosco County Airport in Baldwin Township and additional financial assistance is needed to promote location of industry in the area.

He said that a contract had been let last week to clear six acres of land for an industrial prospect. Cost of this is in the neighborhood of \$900.

Through a land exchange with the federal government, the IDC owns a 110-acre parcel of land for its industrial park. As property is

sold, the debt of \$6,800 would be retired.

Conn said that some industries were interested in locating on property of the type owned by the IDC, with close access to the airport, railroad and highway. However, he stated that other industries would probably be interested in locating on the type of property owned by the City of Tawas City on Ninth Avenue, which has water, sewer and natural gas available. He said that industrial prospects were being shown both the industrial park site and the Tawas City site for possible locations.

Conn told the council that he believed that with additional help from local governmental units, the IDC could be self sustaining in a few years. Both East Tawas and Baldwin Township have stated willingness to contribute the amount of tax money raised by one-eighth of a mill to the IDC and adjoining townships are to be contacted.

During discussion, Alderman Cecil Cabbie pointed out that both the city and IDC had gone into debt to acquire industrial sites. Because of this expense to the city, Cabbie and other councilmen said that perhaps the city could not participate this year, but did not rule out the possibility of future participation.

Legality of such a contribution of tax money is to be investigated by the council and a decision is to be made at the next meeting.

## Local Agents Give Report on Pension Plan

Presentation of retirement plans for city employees from three different local insurance agents were heard at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council.

Appearing before the board were John C. Elliott, Neil Luedtke and Gary Wood. The council's insurance committee is to make a recommendation on adoption of a pension plan.

The council had heard a proposal from the Michigan Mutual Employee's League at its last meeting on a proposed pension plan, similar to one adopted by the county. The council had directed that bids on such a plan be secured from local agents.

In other business, the council heard a report on the program being studied by the city housing commission. A resolution was adopted authorizing the city to submit a workable program for community improvement to the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Wages adopted by the council included \$30 per day for the board of review, \$15 per meeting for the mayor. Salary of aldermen was increased from \$6 to \$10 per meeting. Members of various city committees, including cemetery, park (See ET COUNCIL, page 6.)

## Seven-Man Plane Crew Escapes Injury

While hundreds of spectators lined the beach of VanEtan Lake Monday afternoon, a giant B-52H air force bomber with only four of eight engines working landed safely at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

The eight-million-dollar aircraft had circled the area for nearly six hours because of the engine failure. None of the seven crewmen were injured.

Shortly after the plane took off at 11:00 a. m., the two outside engines on the right wing went out. Cause of the engine failure was not immediately known.

A six-foot-wide pod containing the two jet engines broke away from the aircraft and dropped in a wooded area, now believed to be in Reno Township south of M-55.

The pilot then shut off the two outside engines on the left wing to balance the plane. A decision was then made to have the plane circle the base to lighten the fuel load before a landing.

The plane touched down at approximately 4:52 p. m. It was reported that the aircraft was carrying no nuclear weapons.

Because the plane might have had to ditch in Lake Huron, the coast guard dispatched three helicopters from Detroit and Traverse City, along with an air-sea plane and two cutters from Cheboygan and Port Huron.

Air force personnel, aided by area law enforcement agencies, were still looking Tuesday afternoon for the 11,500-pound pod carrying the two engines. The area in which it is believed to have dropped is to be checked again Wednesday morning (today).

The 157-foot-long plane is part of the 379th Bombardment Wing Command, 40th Air Division, commanded by Col. Lawrence W. Steinkraus.

The program will feature a general session for all on adequate wiring. Separate sessions are to be held, including one for men on heating in and around the home at Tawas and West Branch. Crop drying is to be featured at Standish. The special session for women will feature a look at appliances of the future and a cooking demonstration, "The Counter That Cooks."

There will be refreshments and favors for all. Maurice Rhoads and Marge Mielock of Consumers Power Company will have charge of the program.

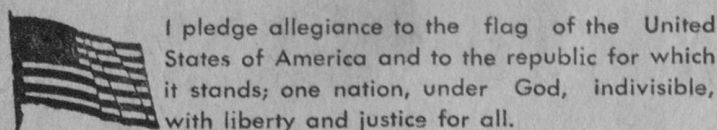
## 25th Anniversary Being Observed

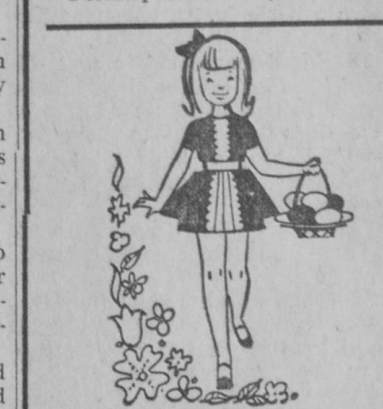

#### Lake Huron Level Nine Inches Higher

### Lake Level to Climb; Cause for Concern

Generally speaking, boaters and commercial shipping interests should be quite pleased with the levels of the Great Lakes for the coming navigation season. Shoreline property owners, particularly those who built during the low level period of 1963-65, may have reason to be a little apprehensive.

The United States Lake Survey's six-month forecast of levels for the Great Lakes indicates the lakes will be up to 11 inches higher than their maximum levels of last year. Higher lake levels, combined with storm generated

strong winds, have a tendency to tilt a lake's surface which can cause problems.

The Army Corps of Engineers states that the maximum level of Lake Michigan and Lake Huron is expected to be about nine inches higher than that which occurred last summer. This is attributed to recent above average precipitation.

The two lakes, considered to be one because they are joined by the Straits of Mackinac, are expected to reach their highest level about mid-August.

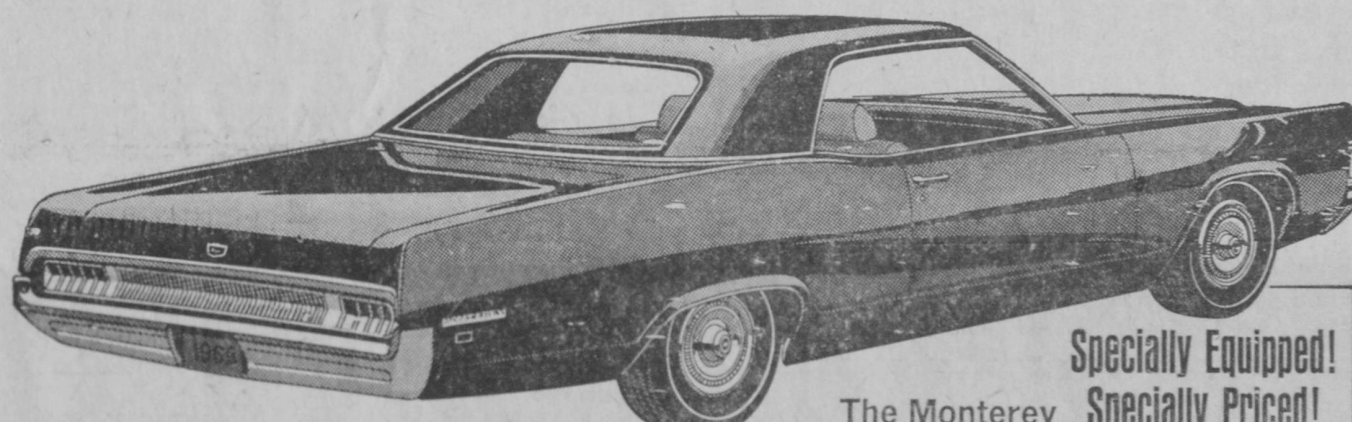
first six grades. Now, due to the increase in enrollment and the modern methods of teaching, she concentrates on sixth grade reading, which is so important today.

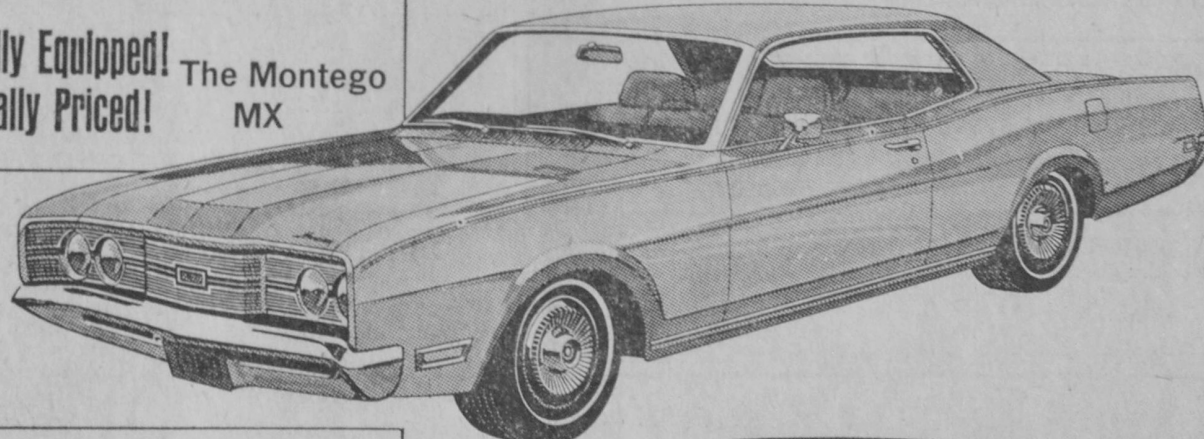

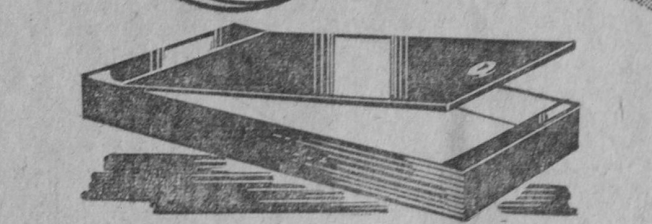

**Balance** \$676.62  
Your Cooperative Extension Service office furnished the educational services that brought federal and state funds for the acquisition and development of AuSable Park, and similar funds are pending for Tawas City Park. The one disappointing program has been the delay of the county-wide comprehensive plan. I have worked with Ogemaw and Arenac Counties in the establishment of county planning commissions similar to Iosco County's that has been functioning since 1963. I promoted the development of a comprehensive plan for each of the three counties and hoped that a savings would be realized by having the same planning firm do all three-county plans. Arenac and Ogemaw accepted the ideas, but Iosco County fell behind when Arenac and Ogemaw hired the firm of E. B. S. of Chicago, Illinois, and have appropriated approximately \$10,000.00 to proceed. Iosco County filed a preliminary application for 701 funds and indicated they would proceed when such funds become available. I would hope this entire project can again be reviewed with your county planning commission before spring.

**Other educational programs, projects and services rendered by your Cooperative Extension Service include:**  
1968, 4-H Club member enrollments, 637; home study extension groups, 63. Monthly assistance with Feeder Pig Marketing Association of Northern Michigan totaled gross income for 1968 to about \$11,893.08 for 6,313 feeder pigs at 12 sales. Summary of extension teaching, etc. activities, 1968: Consultations, providing information and guidance on problems of individuals, families and farm operators, in and out of office, 544; office calls, 699; telephone calls, 1,899; consultations and advice on organizations and agencies, 140; meetings of extension planning development and other committees, 170; leader training, 520; number of different leaders trained, 1,028; other meetings at which extension workers presented information, 23; publications mailed or distributed to public, 7,055; news stories to newspapers or magazines, 87; direct mail, 130; number of pieces of mail distributed, 13,142; radio broadcasts participated in, 220; 4-H leader recognition banquet, 75.

These statistics involve the organization and development of township zoning, all complete save one. The development of the Northern Michigan Charter Boat Association, the Telfarm Cooperators, Farming by Computer for maximum efficiency, the newly-organized Parks and Recreation Commission for Iosco.

That is what extension is really doing, its main function is educational leadership using technical information as a vehicle, dedicated to the progress of man.

Mr. Gordon Huck, vice chairman of the Iosco County Building Authority, appeared before the board and presented plans for a proposed new garage and storage facility for the sheriff's department. He indicated that the project could be financed through the bank rather than a bond issue. After a discussion concerning space for accommodation of ambulances, location, cost, etc., the matter was referred to the public building and grounds committee for study, and a meeting arranged with the building authority for March 11, 1969.

A VISTA volunteer, working with the Northeast Michigan Community Action Agency, addressed the board to request that the addressograph office be opened at 8:30 a. m. each morning, as space has been provided in that office for their representative. Request was granted.

County Treasurer Edward Nelkie addressed the board to request a resolution authorizing him to invest county funds at his discretion, and designating the Peoples State Bank of East Tawas as depository for county monies. Referred to the finance committee.

Drain Commissioner John Mielock addressed the board concerning an invoice from Jim Brown for \$410.00 covering maintenance on VanEtan Lake Dam for the year 1968, indicating that it will require a resolution from the board to authorize re-establishment of the special assessment district to replenish the fund for that dam which has been depleted for some time. He advised that the \$410.00 currently outstanding will have to be paid from the revolving drain fund, as was \$400.00 paid to Jim Brown on February 29, 1968, for 1967 maintenance of VanEtan Lake Dam, with reimbursement of these amounts to be made to the revolving drain fund as soon as tax revenues are received from the assessment district. The matter was referred to the conservation committee.

Oscoda Township Supervisor Charles Smith appeared and requested a meeting with the finance committee. At 11:10 a. m., committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 11:50 a. m., the following resolution was read by Mr. Smith who moved its adoption: Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen: We, the finance committee, approve of a request made by County Treasurer Edward Nelkie, designating Peoples State Bank, East Tawas, Michigan, as depository for monies deposited by county treasurer. And that the county treasurer be authorized to make investments for all county units.

1967. A three-year sales study completed in December resulted in some adjustments both upward and downward in certain county properties.

During 1968 the office purchased about 195 aerial photos, covering nearly the entire county. These have been of great help in solving some of our appraisal problems.

Although the county clerk's report shows the department expenditures exceeding the budget by \$1,538.71, we did have income of \$649.62 from the sale of plats, appraisal cards, transcripts, etc. Also charged to the budget was an item of \$1,261.95 for tax statements. This amount was fully reimbursed to the county treasurer by the several townships and cities, so that actual expenditures were below the budget by an amount of \$372.86. This was probably due to the fact that one employee worked six weeks in the register of deeds office during the summer months.

About 50 days of the director's time was spent in the field in company with the several supervisors and city assessors. It may become necessary in the near future to employ some part-time help for field work, so that the director may spend more time in the office.

ignored and without severe restriction upon "any deer" killing on public lands there are not now and will not be deer to be seen and enjoyed as there have been in years past.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Michigan Townships Association go on record as urging the legislature to pass legislation more stringently regulating "any deer" kill particularly in public lands where the deer herds have become decimated to the point of near extinction.

Supervisor Woreley initiated a discussion concerning compensation for the Iosco Intermediate School District Board and thereupon introduced a motion that they be allowed to set their own compensation. 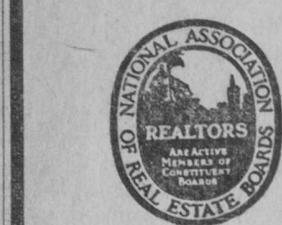

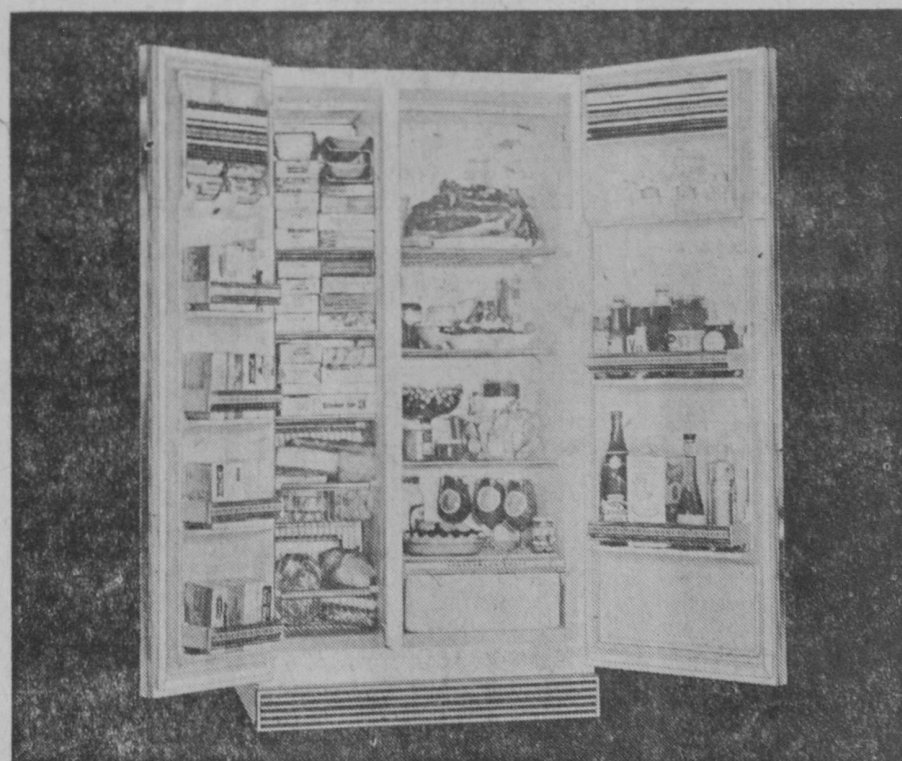
