Seven - Man Plane Crew **Escapes Injury**

lined the beach of VanEttan Lake Monday afternoon, a giant B-52H air force bomber with only four of eight engines working landed safely at Wurtsmith Air Force

The eight-million-dollar aircraft had circled the area for nearly six hours because of the engine failure. None of the seven crew-

men were injured. Shortly after the plane took off at 11:00 a. m., the two outside engines on the right wing went out. Cause of the engine failure was

not immediately known. A six-foot-wide pod containing the two jet engines broke away from the aircraft and dropped in a wooded area, now believed to be in Reno Township south of M-55.

The pilot then shut off the two outside engines on the left wing to balance the plane. A decision was then made to have the plane circle the base to lighten the fuel load before a landing.

The plane touched down at approximately 4:52 p. m. It was reported that the aircraft was carrying no nuclear weapons.

Because the plane might have had to dil h in Lake Huron, the coast guard dispatched three helicopters from Detroit and Traverse City, along with an air-sea plane and two cutters from Cheboygan and Port Huron.

Air force personnel, aided by area law enforcement agencies, were still looking Tuesday afternoon for the 11,500-pound pod carrying the two engines. The area morning (today

2 cans (6½ or 7 ounces each) tuna in vegetable oil 1 cup pancake mix 1 egg
1 tablespoon salad oil 1 can condensed cream of mushroom 13/4 cups milk, divided soup, divided

Combine pancake mix, egg, salad oil and 1½ cups of the milk. Beat only until smooth. Pour batter on a hot, lightly greased griddle, making pancakes about 4 inches in diameter. Bake to a golden brown, turning only once. While pancakes are baking, combine tuna and ¼ cup of the soup; heat. Put a spoonful in the center of each pancake; fold pancake over filling. Place tuna filled pancakes in shallow casserole or on oven-proof platter. Add ½ cup milk to remaining soup; heat. Spoon over tuna filled pancakes. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 15 minutes. YIELD: 6 servings of 2 pancakes each.
