## MC Facility Patients Lend Hand to Others

The diversional therapy department of Isosco Medical Care Facility has taken on a project to assist the Caro State Hospital in providing toys and some items of clothing for children and young adults who are patients there.

Information received from the state hospital indicates that items of clothing, including nightgowns, A-line dresses, knitted bed slippers, mittens, caps, terrycloth bibs and flannel crib quilts are urgently needed.

The particular need at the present time is for large, one-piece toys, including balls, blocks and plastic toys which are easy for patients to grasp. Many patients at the state hospital are unable to grasp small items. Stuffed toys are not too practical for most patients, although many of the older girls and women enjoy having certain types of stuffed animals and

## Iosco Seeks Ideas on Ambulance Service

Iosco authorities are arranging a meeting with the sheriff of Van Buren County to explain the operation of ambulance service by the sheriff's department in that Southern Michigan county.

In a discussion on the proposed discontinuance of ambulance service June 1 by area funeral directors, it was pointed out at last week's meeting of the Isosco Board of Supervisors that operation of such service had been a losing proposition for funeral directors.

Carlton Merschel, a member of the board of supervisors, said that although there appeared to be a difference of opinion as to the new law controlling private operation of ambulance services,

his study in Isosco had indicated that most funeral directors wished to get out of the business.

Merschel and his committee visited Ogemaw County and learned that the sheriff's department was operating the ambulance service at the total annual cost of \$10,000. Merschel said that Oscoda County subsidized the funeral director at a cost of \$6,000 per year, plus a guarantee that all fees would be collected.

One of the problems pointed out by Merschel was that many fees for ambulance service had gone uncollected by the funeral directors. It was said, however, that provisions of the new district court operation would make such collection much easier.

## Bill Wilder Resigning as TA Principal

Bill R. Wilder, principal at Tawas Area High School for the past two years, submitted his resignation Monday night to the board of education. His resignation becomes effective July 1.

In a letter to the board, Wilder said he was announcing his resignation at this time in order that the school could make plans for hiring a successor.

Wilder said that personal matters prevented him from remaining here as principal. He said he was not at liberty to announce his future plans.

The board authorized the school administration to contact school employment agencies immediately to secure candidates for this position.

Wilder served as assistant high school superintendent at Pinconning before coming here at the start of the 1967-68 term. He received his bachelor of science degree from Central Michigan University in 1960 and later received his master degree from CMU.

## Hunt Heads Hale Development

Robert Hunt was named president of the Hale Development Corporation at its annual meeting held last week.

Other officers include Delbert Hewitt, treasurer, and Lyle Bielby, secretary. Trustees are Herman Maas and Gerald Wyatt.

## Discuss Fire-Damaged Building

## City Seeks Action on Removal or Repair

Removal or repair of a fire-damaged building on Lake Street is being sought by the Tawas City Council.

At Monday night's regular meeting, the council asked City Attorney Kenneth Myles to direct a letter to Allen Schultz, owner of the building.

The city's ordinance requires removal or repair of such a structure on complaint of a nuisance or hazard.

The building, formerly housing Schultz Hardware, was struck by fire Monday, November 11.

In other business, it was announced that a joint meeting would be held March 24 between the water board and council to discuss the possibility of phosphate removal and secondary treatment at the existing sewage disposal plant. A representative from Spicer Engineering Company will attend the meeting to discuss costs and the possibility of receiving federal assistance in such a proposition.

## East Tawas Talks About Future Sewers

Possibility of securing initial planning for expansion of East Tawas' sewage distribution system in the Tawas Lake-Lincoln Street areas was discussed at Monday night's regular council meeting.

It was emphasized that such planning would only be tentative and that its main purpose would be to offer some direction to planning of future subdivisions in those areas.

In other business, the council directed the city attorney to contact the state attorney general's office to determine the status of petitions on hand asking a vote on merging East Tawas and Tawas City.

Petitions had been circulated but not filed before the effective date of a new state law, which provides for a state commission to review such petitions. The law al-

so provides a two-year waiting period between such elections.

A similar proposal last April was turned down by a narrow margin. The council wishes clarification from the state to determine if this proposition is affected by the new law.

The council authorized Mayor James Campbell to draft a preliminary sketch for a new chapel at the cemetery. The building would provide facilities for storage of bodies in the winter months.

Police Chief Donald Docking was authorized to advertise for a new patrolman. Charles Viar, present patrolman, has announced he will be leaving the city's employment effective May 1.

## Funerals Set Thursday for Both Victims

A three-car crash late Monday afternoon south of Oscoda on US-23 claimed the lives of two persons, Isosco's first traffic fatalities of 1969.

Dead at the scene was Peter E. Liechty, 43, Deen Road, Tawas City. Dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital was Mrs. Marilyn Joanne O'Farrell, 33, Oscoda.

A car driven by Mrs. O'Farrell was towing a vehicle operated by her husband, Dale. The O'Farrells were headed north and met the Liechty vehicle head-on a curve about one-half mile south of Dobson's Storage Warehouse.

An eyewitness to the crash told investigating Oscoda Township and sheriff's department officers that the Liechty vehicle was driving left of the centerline at the time of impact.

Upon impact, the car being steered by O'Farrell crashed into the rear of the vehicle being driven by his wife. O'Farrell was treated for minor cuts and bruises and released.

Police, ambulance attendants and operators of wrecker services worked for about 20 minutes to remove Liechty's body from the wreckage.

The bodies were taken to Saginaw for autopsies. The accident remains under investigation.

The O'Farrells had been married for about a month. Besides her husband, she is survived by three children by a previous marriage, Debbie, age 14; Steven, 13, and Mitchell, six years old; her mother, Mrs. Ethel Seibert, Topeka Kansas, and two sisters.

The victim's husband is the elder son of Sheriff and Mrs. Ivan O'Farrell. She operated a beauty shop at Oscoda.

Funeral services for Mrs. O'Farrell are to be held at 2:00 p. m. Thursday from Gilbert Funeral Home, Oscoda. The Rev. John McDonald will officiate and burial will be at Oscoda.

Born April 20, 1925, at Rittman, Ohio, Liechty served in the army during World War II, served with the air force in Korea and retired from the air force while serving at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. He was a mechanic by trade. He was a member of Isosco Post No. 5678, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Liechty is survived by his wife, the former Marie Wemert; one son by a previous marriage, Robert, Akron, Ohio; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Liechty, Rittman; one brother, Herbert, Wadsworth, Ohio; two sisters, Mrs. Clara Elgar, Rittman, and Mrs. Alice Hatton, Sarasota, Florida.

Funeral services with full military rites will be conducted Thursday, 2:00 p. m., at Grace Lutheran Church. The Rev. William Lindholm will officiate. Burial will be in Tawas City Cemetery. The body will be at Jacques Funeral Home, Tawas City, Wednesday afternoon.

## Iosco Supervisors Hear Reports from Officers

The county ended 1968 with a balance of \$275.55 in its general fund, according to a report to the Isosco Board of Supervisors last week by Edward Nelkie, county treasurer.

While this report was very favorable, Nelkie reported that the county could expect a deficit in 1969 as the result of increased and added costs of services.

Nelkie expected that the deficit would range between \$50,000 and \$75,000, depending on the cost of the county's assuming ambulance service this year.

Total revenue collected by the county treasurer during the past year amounted to \$453,891.07, which was \$28,176.07 higher than anticipated in October 1967. This included \$328,834.07 in real estate taxes, \$7,119.07 more than anticipated; \$39,281.90 in state income tax, an increase of \$1,281.90; fees

This included appropriations amounting to \$58,649, which went to district health, county advertising, East Michigan Tourist Association, Isosco Agricultural Society, etc.

Expenditures included \$1,680.31 to the planning commission, under the budgeted amount by \$2,252. (See SUPERVISORS, page 6.)

Honor students for the class of 1969 were announced this week by Whittemore - Prescott Area Schools.

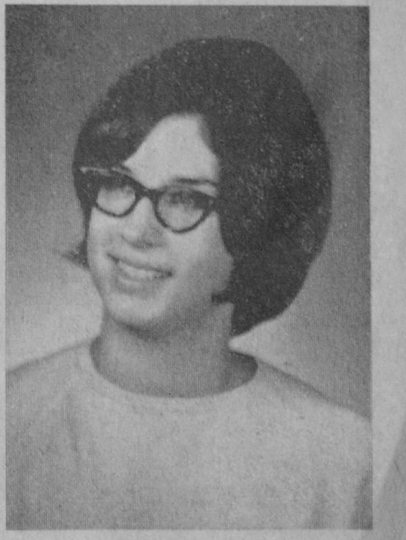

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# Braves Beat Orioles to End NBC Season

Tawas Area Braves finished the regular basketball season scheduled Friday night with a thrilling, 65-59, come-from-behind victory over the visiting Ogemaw Heights Orioles.

It was a great victory for the Braves and Coach Jim Papefus, who have had very little to cheer about this season. The Braves now move into district tournament play at Oscoda Thursday night, meeting the winner of Monday night's opening game between Oscoda and Gladwin.

Friday nights regular season ended similarly to most of Tawas Area's other games in the 1968-69 campaign, with the Braves taking it on the chin in the first quarter and losing ground at intermission.

The Orioles looked like conference champions in the first half, holding margins of 18-9 and 15-9 to hold a comfortable 33-18 lead at intermission.

The Braves, who scored only six field goals during the first two quarters, suddenly came to life in the third quarter. Paced by the deadly eye of Denny Krish, who scored but five points in the first half, and the rebounding of Gary Libka and Chuck Peterson, a pair of up and coming sophomores, the Braves outscored a faltering Oriole squad, 23-12, in the third quarter. Craig Wilkins, another promising sophomore, scored two key buckets in the quarter.

The real fireworks started in the final quarter when Tawas took the lead with five minutes, 12 seconds to go, then quickly lost the margin. The lead changed twice before Mike Hearl took a nice pass from Krish and drove in to score a two-point which put Tawas in the lead for good at the 4:30 mark.

Paul Becker meshed two field goals in the quarter as did Hearl, while Tom Brown flipped in two charity tosses. The big scoring effort came from Krish, who meshed three field goals and eight charity tosses to bring his scoring total to 29 points for the night, 24 of them coming in the second half.

Krish was Tawas' lone player to hit double figures, but a better balanced scoring attack from four other players meant the difference. Tom Benjamin, classy Oriole

guard, scored 24 points to lead his mates while Mike Lane contributed 15 points.

Tawas Area lost the preliminary when the Ogemaw Heights JV downed the Junior Braves, 62-42. The visitors jumped off to a 20-9 lead in the first quarter and were never headed.

Scoring for Tawas were Mark Schirmer, 18; Matt Mayer and Bill Sheldon, seven points each; Ron Ulman, six; Mike Sventko, four; Craig Herriman and Tom Katschke, two points each. Short led the visitors with 15 points.

She received her college education at Delta and Michigan State University. She plans to start working toward her master degree this summer.

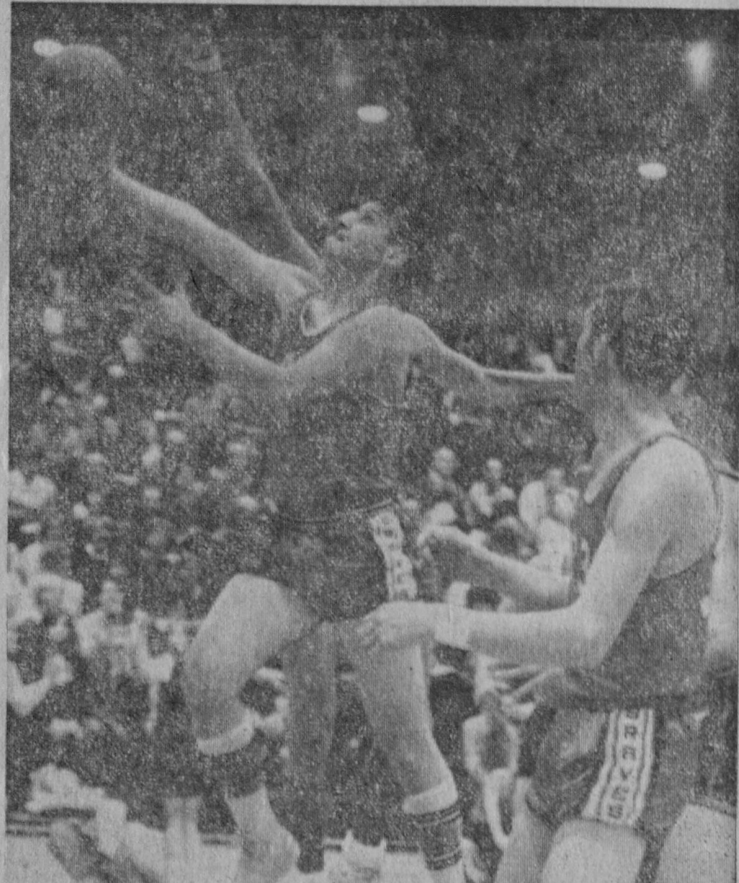
Miss Betelyn teaches three junior English classes and one fresh-

man English class. She states her hobbies are reading, music and anything to do with the water.

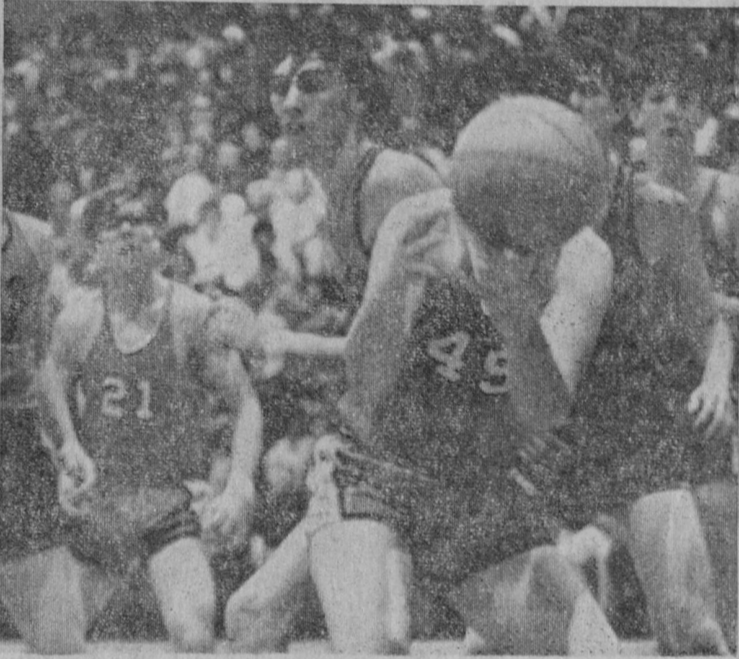
"I really like it here—the people are very friendly," was the way Miss Betelyn expressed her feelings about Tawas to the reporter for the Future Teachers Club.

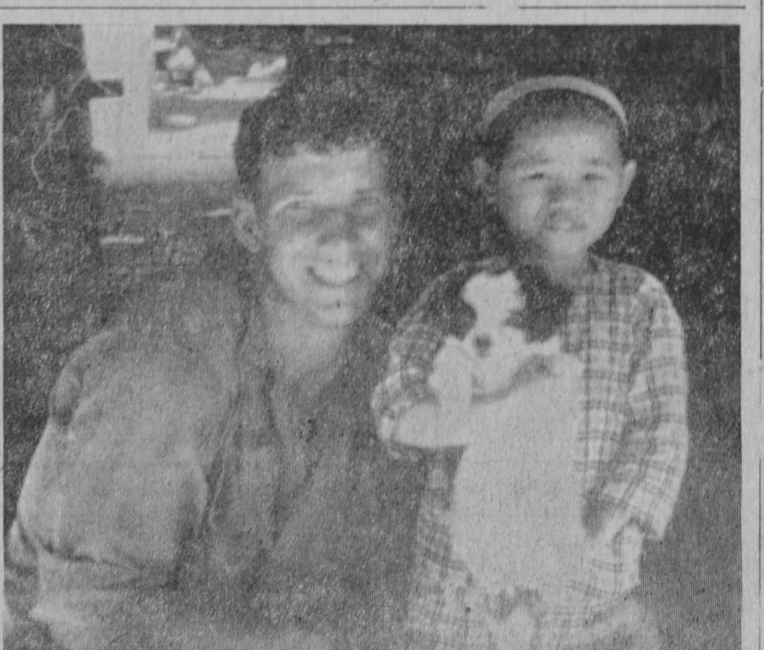

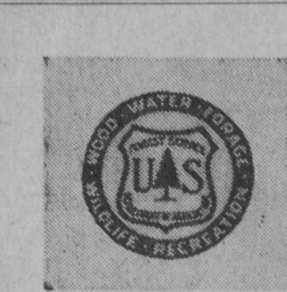

## Forest Chats

### HURON - MANISTEE NATIONAL FOREST

Tawas Ranger District

This article will not pertain to the deer situation, but will relate an event that occurred because of the lack of knowledge about the conditions in a particular area. The event took place in a small swamp in the Maltby hills. While passing through this swamp, I was observing the amount of deer use on the browse. Conditions appeared very favorable; probably the result of having harvested the hardwoods adjacent to the swamp, which provided an abundant supply of sprouts. In passing, I was paying particular attention to the uneven cedar boughs close to the ground. Noticing a concentration of boughs, I went to investigate. I found where 14 small cedar trees had been cut

and left. It had been 10 days since the last snow, but there was still snow on the cut trees. The deer had not touched the boughs. To me, this confirmed by observation that there was plenty of deer food in the area. After further investigation, I discovered 40 cut trees. Since neither a cutting permit nor a cooperative agreement had been issued for that area, the trees had been cut in trespass. The people cutting these trees and boughs may not have realized that cutting and/or removing wood from national forest land without obtaining permission from the district ranger is a violation of the law. They cannot do this on private land, neither can it be done on national forest land. Not only were the trees being wasted, but so were their efforts. We have made observations in most of the swamps in the district and know where their efforts could have been put to good use. An example is in the Big Bear Swamp along the AuSable River. If those cedar had been cut in that swamp, there would not have been a green bough left after two days. The local sportsmen's clubs have been issued cooperative agreements for areas where conditions are poor. As a matter of fact, these areas are poor under any snow conditions. The clubs have organized into groups and are helping the situation. By joining a group, a person will be able to help accomplish a project that would have a lasting effect. If people want to help, they can contact the Iosco Sportsman's Club, The Michigan Deer Hunters Association or this office.
