

Hospital's Food Director Retires

Retiring Friday after 16 years as food service supervisor at Tawas Hospital was Mrs. Leeta Schlaack. Succeeding her will be Raymond Ferreebe, who retires in July after 20 years in the air force.

Mrs. Schlaack was one of the first persons hired prior to the opening of the hospital in 1953. The hospital was nearing completion and workmen were unpacking equipment and supplies when a tornado struck the area.

"One of the sisters and I immediately began work rounding up a crew to finish unpacking emergency equipment and obtain a supply of food to handle the eight tornado patients who were rushed to the hospital," recalled Mrs. Schlaack.

Today, the food service staff has been increased to 14 persons and serves about 3,500 meals a month. Six of the employees in her department have been there for more than 10 years.

Mrs. Schlaack and her late husband, Glen, who passed away in 1953, came to this area in 1946. She had spent 11 years in food service at Cranbrook School.

Unlike a restaurant, where the customer chooses his own meal, the hospital staff must prepare meals according to the doctor's orders. Her training at Michigan State University has helped her to know what foods are prescribed for certain diets.

She attended a pilot course for food supervisors in 1954-55 at MSU. Food supervisors do the work of a dietician but do not hold a degree.

While still planning to live in Tawas City upon retirement, Mrs. Schlaack said she would have time for some travel. She may even visit her niece in Japan, but that decision will come later.

Meanwhile, she will take care of her garden and "clean a few corners in my house."

Ferreebe, her successor, has been food service supervisor at the Wurtsmith Air Force Base Hospital since 1963.

He said Friday there were many

differences between food service in military and civilian hospitals, mainly in the field of purchasing and scheduling of personnel.

Ferreebe's home originally was in West Virginia. He and his wife, Opal, have three children.

Funeral services are to be held Wednesday (today) at Sheffer Laguna Beach Mortuary Chapel. Burial will be in Hope Cemetery, Galesburg, Illinois.

City Council Explains Priority in Street Construction Work

Two problems which have plagued governmental units of Iosco during the past several weeks—ambulance service and a protest over the location of a proposed juvenile diagnostic detention center—were again discussed informally Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

In addition, the council had a new problem of its own when property owners in two First Ward subdivisions asked for an explanation from the street committee as to how it reached its decision on which streets were to receive priority in the city's \$7,200 street construction program announced two weeks ago.

Paul Sullivan, a resident of North Park Acres, was spokesman for about a dozen residents from that subdivision and the adjoining Huron Gardens Subdivision.

Sullivan had appeared before the council earlier this spring and asked for consideration from the street committee to include new street construction in the north part of town. He repeated his former assertion that streets were of substandard quality in the two comparatively new subdivisions. Sullivan asked how one street—Sunset Drive—was selected out of all the streets in the subdivision for construction.

John St. James, Second Ward alderman and chairman of the street committee, said that members had made a careful study of the entire city and believed that the final selections for construction were the most urgent.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, said that the

street committee had met twice to study possible construction. He said that street committee members had expressed a desire to include the two subdivisions in the street program, but were at a loss as to a starting point. Taken under advisement were Sunset, Roberta Lane, Victoria Lane and several other streets.

Realizing that all of the streets could not be included in the program this year, the committee finally decided on Sunset Drive as a starting point because of the large number of new homes constructed on that street.

Sullivan said he was not talking about his own street, Tim Court, but believed that if the committee followed the above criteria to determine priorities, "it will be a 100 years" before Tim Court is hard surfaced. He believed that the subdivision would soon fill up with new homes and the entire city's valuation would increase if streets there were improved.

Another speaker was of the opinion that property values were not commensurate with taxes paid in the two subdivisions, stating that values on Sunset Drive would now be higher with a new hard surfaced street.

Howard Hatton, Third Ward alderman and a member of the street committee, pointed out that a considerable amount of work had been done in that area, with First Avenue blacktopped through to M-55 about three years ago. He said that the committee realized that it could not satisfy everyone, but there had to be a starting point and the committee had to

stay within its budget. He said that Sunset Drive was the first step toward improving streets in the two subdivisions, that the street committee was not trying to discriminate against other areas and that other streets would be considered in future projects. He pointed out that there were other areas of the city which needed street construction and must be considered.

Martin Wellna, First Ward alderman, asked the street committee to reconsider its program to include the following streets in the blacktop program for this year: Manor Drive from First Avenue to Victoria, \$700; Roberta Drive, from First Avenue to John, \$350; Victoria Lane, from Sunset to Manor, \$1,350.

Mayor Russell A. Rollin Sr. assured those present that the committee and the public works superintendent would consider the suggestion. He pointed out, however, that the "summer tax" is what finances city operation. While stating that he was certain that property owners would not want their city tax doubled in order to meet all street needs, he assured property owners in the two subdivisions that one street, Sunset Drive, was included in this year's program and that others would be considered in future years.

In other business, Mrs. Eugene Wegner, a resident of the northwestern part of the city, was spokesman for a group of mothers who are protesting location of a proposed juvenile diagnostic center. (See TC COUNCIL, page 6.)

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Hospital May Try Ambulance Service

A possible arrangement with Tawas Hospital to provide ambulance service to the Tawas and surrounding townships was suggested at a meeting of the East Tawas Council Monday night.

Appearing before the council was E. John Moffatt, East Tawas funeral director and one of two veteran ambulance service operators in the Tawas who have definitely stated they would be going

out of the ambulance business once a new state law takes effect. Moffatt suggested that East Tawas, Tawas City and the surrounding townships study the possibility of purchasing ambulance

equipment and turn it over to the hospital to operate. The matter is to be considered at meetings today (Wednesday) of the hospital board and the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

He felt this proposal might possibly be the answer to a serious problem which is facing local communities. He believed the hospital would be in a better position to collect bills for ambulance

service, that it would be centrally located and that manpower was available at the hospital to operate the service.

Moffatt said that the problem of furnishing service on the western side of the county would still have to be solved, although he believed an ambulance stationed at Tawas Hospital could effectively operate as far as the M-55-M-65 intersection. The Oscoda area is to be served by two funeral directors, who have stated they would remain in the ambulance business.

Many communities around the state are facing the problem of furnishing ambulance service, once new state regulations go into effect July 1. Moffatt told councilmen Monday night that he simply would be unable to furnish ambulance service once the new law goes into effect because of the higher cost of labor which would be required, along with other new expenses.

Moffatt said that he would continue to provide service until July 1, effective date of the new act, rather than discontinuing service June 1, as announced earlier. He believed that Jacques Funeral Home of Tawas City would concur with this statement.

However, Moffatt said he would not continue in the business for another year, as was requested at the meeting.

Moffatt said it appeared as though state and federal regulations would probably force smaller operators of ambulance service out of business, anyway.

In other business, it was reported that the zoning board of appeals had reversed council action and allowed Arlis Woodward to open a real estate office in the old Pure Oil service station across from Schreck Lumber Company. This decision was reached following a hearing at which no objections were heard concerning this use. The council had denied a building application because of a nonconformance with the zoning ordinance.

The council adopted an appropriation ordinance calling for a spread of 11 mills to finance the city's \$169,794 budget for 1969-70. The 11 mills would raise \$93,444 of the total budget, the remainder to come from sales tax, intangible tax, state income tax, permit fees, motor vehicle funds and Baldwin Township fire agreement.

Dean Reidel of the state housing commission has been invited to attend the May 28 meeting to explain requirements for participation in providing housing for aged persons.

County Gets Larger Slice of Tax Spread

Preliminary order of the Iosco Tax Allocation Board Monday gave county operation a slightly larger slice of the 15-mill tax pie than what was allocated last year.

Under the order, which would be finalized in June, the county is to receive 4.8 mills for operation, as compared to 3.75 last year.

As a result, schools were cut back to nine mills. Last year, Iosco schools received 10.08 mills. The lower allocation would mean that Tawas Area School would receive \$42,000 less than anticipated.

The remaining share of the 15 mills was split as follows: One mill went to townships and 2 of a mill went to the intermediate school district. This compared to .00017 for the intermediate district last year.

The only exception to the above school allocation is in the Whittemore-Prescott Area School District, which has its largest area in Ogemaw County and is controlled by a "pegged" allocation of 9½ mills.

The county school allocation still remained higher than what was allocated two years ago. In 1967, schools received eight mills and the county received 5.85 mills.

A year ago, the allocation board looked over budgets and the new county valuation, noted rising school costs and gave 10.08 mills to schools and 3.75 mills to the county. With cost of the county operation zooming upward this year, however, through salary increases to employees and officers, expense of the new district court, plus many additional expenses and the fact that Iosco faces deficit spending in 1969, the al-

location board apparently felt that the county's share should be placed closer to the old level.

Regardless of the allocation board's action, preliminary budgets for schools and the county could not be met from the 15-mill tax allocation. All budgets will face revision downward.

In addition to taxes received from the tax allocation order, Tawas Area School District receives 4.5 mills, which was approved for two years by voters in February; Oscoda Area School voters approved an additional three mills, running from 1967 through 1971; Whittemore-Prescott Area School voters approved an additional three mills for operation for two years on April 14.

Hale Area School seeks approval of three mills for operation at the annual election June 9.

While the tax allocation board has no control over special voted taxes, all special taxes are noted on its report. This includes three-quarters of a mill for intermediate school special education, plus special voted taxes for the medical care facility, debt retirement for the various schools and special township operating taxes.

Acting on the tax allocation board are Arden Charters (chairman), Ralph Western, Ronald Dahne, County Treas. Edward Nelkie, Intermediate School District Supt. Ernest Jordan and J. Berkeley Smith, chairman of the board of supervisors' finance committee.

Students were cleared out of Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School Tuesday afternoon after receipt of a telephone call at 2:55 o'clock stating that a bomb had been planted in the building.

Michigan State Police searched the building but could find no bomb. Due to the customary 12-hour waiting period recommended by police before entering a public building after such a report, Tuesday night's bandquet honoring the senior band was moved to the Tawas United Methodist Church, East Parish. The caller, a man or boy, disguised his voice while making the call to the school office.

Nunn Announces State Plans for US-23 Construction in 1970

Announcement of a 1.68 million dollar construction program to complete the modernization of US-23 was announced Tuesday noon by W. D. (Mike) Nunn, a member of the state highway department.

Speaking before the Tawas Kiwanis Club, Nunn said that the above project would include resurfacing and widening of 10.2 miles of highway from the Iosco-Alcona County line north to Harrisville.

At the same time, Nunn announced that three new bridges along the route were to be replaced with new structures, bringing total construction cost to \$2,646,000.

Bridges to be replaced include structures over the Rifle River at Omer, \$342,000; Whitney Drain, \$207,000; and a new bridge at Oscoda, \$407,000.

He said that construction on the project was to begin in 1970. "All of this construction will be done at the same time in order that the department can remove bridge weight restrictions along the entire stretch of US-23," said Nunn.

In addition to representing the state highway department at this meeting, Nunn had charge of a flag and plaque presentation as chairman of Hospitality Day during Michigan Week.

Nunn presented a plaque and

Michigan flag to Lt. Col. Earl O'Loughlin of Wurtsmith Air Force Base. A native son of East Tawas, O'Loughlin recently returned from a tour of duty in Vietnam. He has served four years at Wurt-

smith, 11 years at Lockbourn Air Force Base, Columbus, Ohio, and attended staff command college at Montgomery, Alabama.

In his talk before Kiwanians, Nunn said that the state flag's design had been approved by the state legislature in 1911. Gov. Stephen T. Mason, first governor of Michigan, presented the first flag on February 22, 1837, to Michigan's first militia group, the Brady Guard, Detroit.

The plaque was signed by the state chairman of Michigan Week, O'Loughlin is son of Mrs. T. M. O'Loughlin of East Tawas and the late Mr. O'Loughlin.

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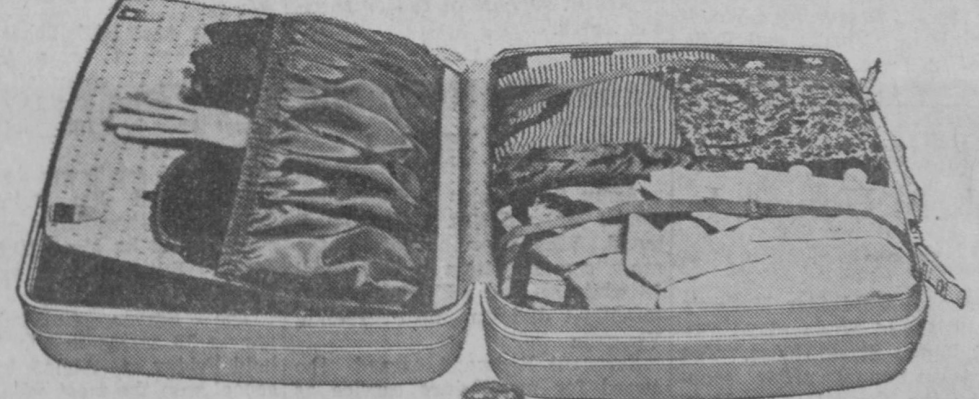
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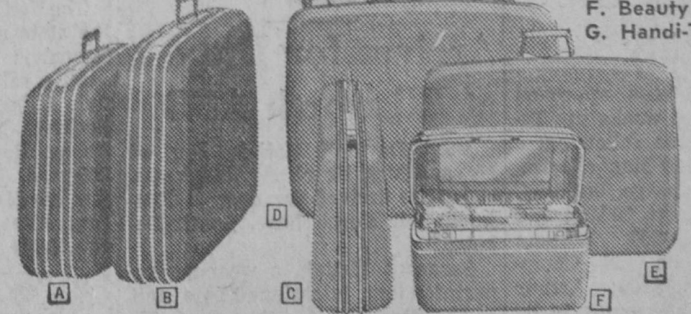

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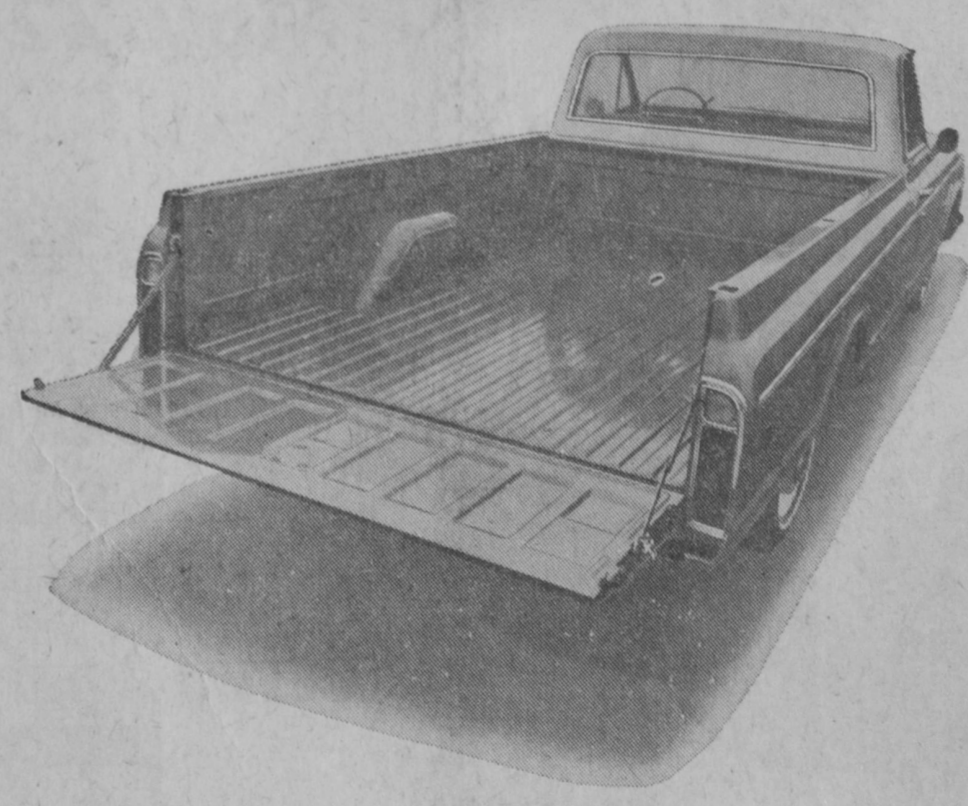
Take Registrations for Woodland Camp

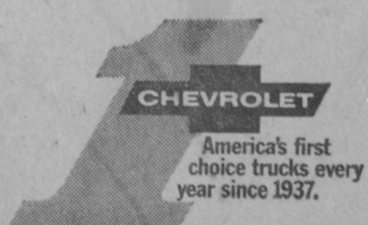

tention center on Isoco Medical Care Facility property. She said she was prepared to turn over petitions signed by 360 persons objecting to that location.

Mayor Rollin said that the city had taken the protest under advisement two weeks ago. He said that the council could possibly take some action when it received information concerning the proposal.

The county board of supervisors has had one meeting with a representative of the Michigan Department of Social Services concerning the possibility of establishing a juvenile center here. However, no action has been taken as to the site and state financing of such centers, regardless of location, is still in question.

Walter Kasischke, Tawas Township supervisor, appeared before the council and reported that a meeting had been held at Hale last Friday concerning ambulance service. Kasischke said he had been informed that the funeral director there, Alvin Forshee, had

definitely stated he was going out of the ambulance service, as has been the case with two other county funeral directors.

Kasischke reported that the consensus of opinion at the meeting was that operation of ambulances should be a function of the county. It was stated that cost of the service could be met by voting one-half mill for operation which would raise close to \$50,000 annually for the county.

The city council stated two weeks ago that it was in no position to finance ambulance service.

The council adopted a state highway maintenance contract to be operative from July 1, 1969, to June 30, 1970, designating Bublitz as the city's official representative. The budgeted expenditure for maintenance this year by the state is \$12,560, slightly less than last year. Cost of this work is paid by the state.

The council adopted a resolution allocating \$354 to the Tawas area summer recreation program.

A proposal of several weeks ago to change numbered streets was turned over to the planning commission for a recommendation. It was stated that confusion exists under the present street naming system, with some streets marked by numbers and others by names.

A request from Tawas Hospital to close Spruce Street between Maple Street and M-55, excepting that portion serving the Masonic Temple, was taken under advisement. Closing the street would allow expansion of the hospital. The council is to ask H. Read Smith, retired probate judge, to study the proposal and make a recommendation.

Upon request for a clarification of the zoning ordinance, the council stated it was permissible for property owners in the commercial zone to use vacant property for rental parking for automobiles and boat trailers. It was said that several residents in the vicinity of the US-23 bridge were considering private parking lots to handle coho fishermen this summer.

Additional copies of a new charter at Harrison were distributed to councilmen for study. Earlier this year, the council considered establishing a charter

commission to adopt a home rule charter.

The council authorized Police Chief George Westcott to hire a full time patrolman for the months of July through October.

Son of Wurtsmith Sergeant Killed in Vietnam Action

PFC Joseph E. Melvin, 20, son of MSgt. and Mrs. Cleophus C. Melvin of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, has been reported killed in action in South Vietnam.

Sergeant Melvin, a navigational aid instructor at Wurtsmith, said his son was killed when a loading zone was hit by a rocket attack, resulting in 19 casualties.

The oldest of seven children, Melvin was graduated from Oscoda Area High School in 1967, where he participated in football and wrestling.

He joined the army in the fall of 1967, undergoing basic training at Fort Knox, Kentucky, and advanced training at Fort McClellan, Alabama, with other stops at Fort Lewis, Washington, and Cam Ranh Bay, South Vietnam.

Melvin was serving with Company D, Second Battalion, Seventh Air Cavalry, near the Cambodian border.

The Melvins have lived at Wurtsmith since 1961. Sergeant Melvin served 10 months at Cam Ranh Bay in 1966.

Born October 7, 1948, at Albuquerque, New Mexico, Private Melvin is survived by his parents, two sisters, four brothers, his paternal grandmother.

Services, with the date yet to be set, are to be held at Pena Blanca, New Mexico, with burial in the Santa Fe, New Mexico, National Cemetery.

Editor:

Hale school needs more areas of opportunity for the students. They need to be able to express themselves, to develop their abilities more thoroughly and to have opportunities that other schools have.

Students in a small school should have greater opportunities. These opportunities are various. The teachers can be more intimate with the students. In this way, everybody is given a chance to develop to the point where they feel they are complete. Each student in a small school knows almost all of the other students. This is useful because it would give the student the chance to know the different kinds of people.

This is all very well but in the schools the problem is there is too little individualism expressed. All of the students have to behave the same way and they aren't able to say what they feel; they have to answer questions or express opinions the way society feels or the way the teacher would like to hear it.

Hale school needs improvements to help the students in their educational opportunities. One of the most severe problems is the lack of reference materials in the library. It would be almost impossible to have a debate team because the school does not provide enough reference material on current issues or even issues of the near past.

If more activities for girls were provided another of the school's problems would be overcome. Women's sports are the best way to be able to express the woman's ability and compete against her own abilities. Sports develops a sense of responsibility and a feeling to want to learn.

Another and very important problem is the lack of student government. With the new system of

teaching, which requires each student to develop a sense of responsibility, more freedom for the student is needed. They have to be able to make decisions without having somebody to decide for them. With the power to govern himself, each student would be able to develop an individual sense of responsibility, where he can learn the difference between right and wrong. The students would need a certain amount of guidance until they reach the point where they have fulfilled their sense of responsibility. This would prepare many of the students for the problems they will face after they get out of school and it would also give each person a better understanding of life.

With more responsibility and understanding, the "system," which is being so severely criticized by college students today, could be changed without riots and demonstrations. Most of all, each student would be proud of his feeling of having responsibility because it would allow him more freedom and opportunity to be treated as an individual.

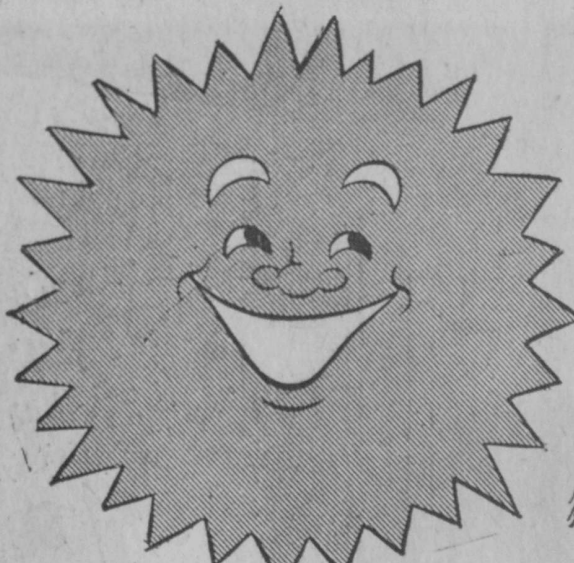

The following requirements must be followed for giving blood:

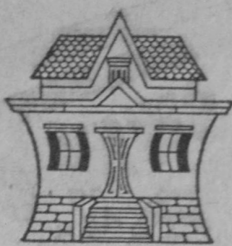
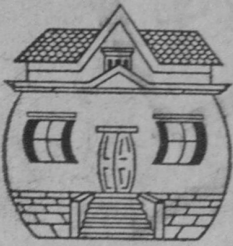

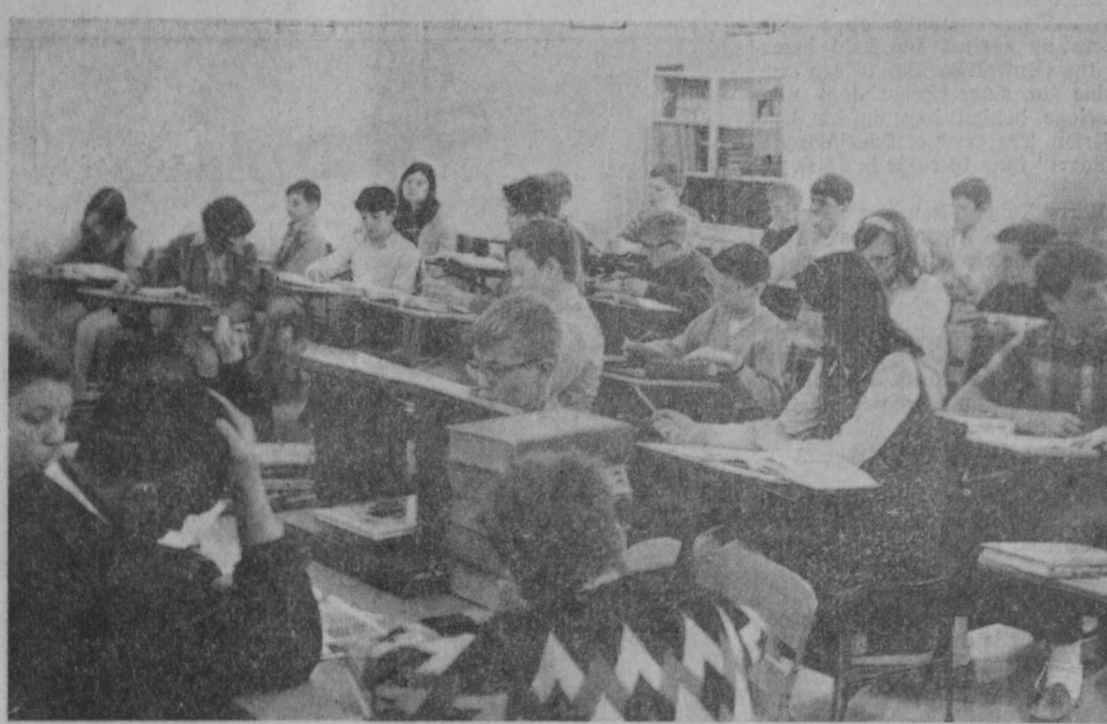
