Discussion Set Today—

Citizens Protest Juvenile Center

A request for support in an attempt to block location of a proposed state diagnostic detention center near the Iosco Medical Care Facility was taken under advisement Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

During later discussion between members, however, councilmen were of the opinion that no action should be taken until more is known about the proposed center. William M. McMillan, director of regional detention facilities for the state, is to meet today (Wednesday) with the Iosco Board of Supervisors to discuss the center, which was first proposed in February 1968.

Appearing before Monday night's council meeting were 15 residents living in the neighborhood of the medical care facility, most of whom were residents of Tawas Township. Spokesman for the group was Mrs. Donald Gingerich, who read a letter which questioned "just what sort of juvenile home is this to be?"

Mrs. Gingerich said that she had contacted various members of the board of supervisors and was unable to learn anything about the proposed center. She said that if a juvenile detention is located in that area, she would not feel safe letting her children out of her sight and believed that a center should be located 10 to 15 miles away from a populated area in order to protect other children.

Clement Stephan, district supervisor representing Tawas City, appeared before the council and stated that interest had been renewed in discussing the proposed center, although there was nothing included in the budget for this or next year.

Stephan, one of two holdovers on the new nine-man board of supervisors, said that the reason for Wednesday's meeting was to acquaint new members with discussion with the state in February 1968.

Mrs. Gingerich said that a delegation of residents from her neighborhood would attend the meeting.

Following the appearance before the council, the group attended a meeting of Tawas Township Board. That group adopted a resolution protesting location of the proposed center in a populated area.

The state director of regional detention facilities told supervisors 14 months ago that he had recommended location of a center in this county and action could be expected within two or three years.

He said that the new regional diagnostic detention center would be used to examine and detain juvenile offenders while probation officers and probate judges are making final recommendations as to corrective procedures to handle individual cases.

McMillan also stated that the state planned to construct eight such centers in the state. Iosco County was selected because it appeared to be in the population

center of the region which it is to serve.

The Herald reported in February 1968 that McMillan had stated that the \$200,000 center would have 20 beds and would employ approximately 23 persons. He indicated that the structure would be erected by the state with no cost to the county, except for use by Iosco juvenile offenders.

Approximately 10 to 15 acres of land would be required for such a center and the board of supervisors, at that time, indicated it would consider use of county property near the medical care facility for such a project.

Also discussed at the time was possible construction of the center by the county and a lease arrangement be made with the state. It was felt that this measure might help to expedite location of the center in this area.

Wounded Friday in Gun Mishap

Lawrence A. Mikoloff, 21, Dearborn, was wounded Friday night through the accidental discharge of a .22 caliber target pistol.

Mikoloff and two other companions had come to Little Long Lake for a week-end of fishing. After having target practice Friday evening, they removed the clip from an automatic pistol and placed it on a sofa.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that the pistol apparently discharged when Mikoloff sat down on the sofa. The bullet entered the left hip and lodged in the opposite side. He was taken to Tawas Hospital for treatment.

Ambulance Discussion Today

Invite City-Township Officials to Meeting

Although passing no formal resolution, members of Tawas City Council went on record Monday night opposing any move to "turn over" of ambulance service over to municipalities or townships.

The council directed Mayor Russell A. Rollin Sr. to serve as its spokesman and appear at today's (Wednesday) meeting of the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

Members of the council said that the city was just financially unable to assume the cost of ambulance service and doubted if such service should be a municipal function.

It was stated that areas of operation would be complicated by municipal and township lines and that there would be duplication of service without organization. Several members expressed the belief that funeral directors had a responsibility and obligation to furnish ambulance service to a community.

Discussion over ambulance service has been "hanging fire" here for the past four months, when Iosco's funeral directors joined others in Northeastern Michigan in announcing they were going out of the business effective June 1.

Following discussion by the board of supervisors in March and April, it appeared as though the county was going to take over operation of ambulances.

At the board's April meeting, however, it was suggested that each city or township with a fire department take the responsibility of setting up an ambulance service. This, it was said, would cover all the county because every township has fire protection, either its own or through an agreement with a unit which has a fire department.

Following this action, however, Fred Lomas, chairman of the board of supervisors, directed the county clerk to send letters to all

units of local government requesting representatives to attend a meeting May 7 to discuss the ambulance question.

While one funeral director at Oscoda has indicated interest in remaining in the ambulance business and the other funeral director said he would follow suit, the three other funeral directors of Iosco have stated that they would discontinue this service effective June 1—or July 1, at the latest, if no other service had been provided by that time.

Effective date for new state regulations controlling operation of ambulance service is July 1.

A tentative budget of \$173,468 was submitted Monday night to the East Tawas Council by the council's finance committee.


Action on the proposed budget for 1969-70 is to be taken following a public hearing to be held May 19.

New Jury Selection Board Takes Over Duties for Courts

Iosco County's new jury selection board was sworn into office last Friday by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Appointed by the governor upon nomination of the circuit judge and recommendation of political parties, the three members were named to staggered terms. Future appointments will be on a six-year term.

Members of the commission include Clarence Everett, Tawas City, six years; Mrs. Helen Collier, East Tawas, four years; Roy Bergeron, Tawas City, two years.

This board is to work from voter lists received from the various

townships and cities of the county. Providing juries for both the circuit and district court, the first list is to be drawn on a chance basis. A second list of jury candidates will then be selected according to qualifications and availability of jury candidates. This list is to be sealed in boxes for use during the year.

The new board is to meet upon needs of the two courts at various times during the year. It will have responsibility for interrogating prospective jurors.

The new board replaces the former system used to select juries, where names were provided by

the various governing units and compiled by the sheriff's department.

Everett was named president of the commission and Mrs. Collier was selected as secretary.

Tawas City Council Adopts Street Program Totaling \$7,200

A \$7,200 street construction program for 1969 was adopted Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Streets included in the program are as follows: First Ward—Oak Street, German Street to Cedar Street, 650 feet, 20 feet wide, grade, prime and double seal, \$500; Spruce Street, Beech Street to Maple Street, 350 feet, 22 feet wide, grade, prime and double seal, \$300; Sunset Drive, First Avenue to Victoria, 850 feet, 22 feet wide, grade, prime and double seal, \$700.

Second Ward—Fifth Avenue, Mathews Street to North Street, 2,150 feet, 22 feet wide, widen, grade and stabilize with prime and double seal, \$3,600.

Third Ward—Elms and Nanette, US-23 to Margo Street, 700 feet, 22 feet wide, grade, prime and double seal, \$600; Mathews Street, from railroad tracks to Dead Creek, \$500.

Members of the street committee, John St. James, Howard Hatton and Clark Tanner, had reviewed possible construction on 18 streets in the city and recommended that the above program be adopted for the year.

An amendment to the proposal was offered by Alderman Martin Wellna, who asked that Manor Drive, Roberta Drive and Victoria Lane be considered in the pro-

Surplus Recipients Required to Report Financial Change

Persons receiving USDA surplus commodities are required to report any change in their financial status immediately to the Iosco Department of Social Services, according to a report Thursday by Director Edward Bureson.

The reason for this requirement is that should a person obtain employment after making application for and becomes eligible to receive USDA commodities, his income may be more than that allowed by the federal government.

The schedule of income and liquid assets for non-relief cases in Iosco County starts at a base salary limitation of \$125 per month and savings limitation of \$750 for one person, progressing upwards to a salary limitation of \$540 and savings limitation of \$1,700 for a family of 12.

In order to become eligible for surplus commodities, the applicant is required to sign an affidavit stating that he is aware that any irregularities constitute damage to the federal government and that he will be required to make satisfactory settlement for the illegal use of such commodities.

In addition, the signatures of the applicant authorizes any investigation to be made of his resources.

Gives Facts on Government Life Insurance

Michigan veterans holding government life insurance policies should pay the premiums by the due dates whenever possible, Robert M. FitzGerald, manager of the Detroit Veterans Administration regional office, said today.

He reminded them, however, that even though their premium payment is late their policy remains in force for a 31-day grace period following the premium due date.

Mr. FitzGerald also pointed out that veterans may reinstate a lapsed government life insurance policy within six months after its

lapse by providing an acceptable health statement. Beyond this period, a complete medical examination may be required, he said.

HALE Lists Questions and Answers Concerning School

Hale Area League for Education continues its second week of questions and answers concerning the upcoming bond proposition of Hale Area Schools.

Question: How was this proposal decided upon?

Answer: Mainly upon the recommendation of a Central Michigan University study, which considered student population, area of the district and valuation of the district—then suggested that the best possibility was to build.

Question: Do we need a second gymnasium?

Answer: A second gymnasium

will free the present building for use by elementary children. There is now no opportunity for indoor activity or physical education for elementary grades, because of the full schedule required by junior-senior high school activities. The present gymnasium could be fully used by elementary children, if each grade, kindergarten through six, were to use it only one hour each day. It is possible that it will be used as a cafeteria for the elementary.

The gymnasium cannot accommodate the entire student body at one sitting and special events create a hazardous overcrowding.

The new gymnasium will assume the schedule for the junior-senior high school activities which now fully occupy the present

gymnasium. In addition, it would provide improved sound and heating conditions for activities attended by large groups—graduation, Christmas and seasonal concerts, indoor sports programs, music events, class plays and other assemblies. The stage area is planned for use as a cafeteria, keeping the main area free for gymnasium use all day long.

Since there is a waiting list for evening use of the present gymnasium, having the two would permit two separate functions in an evening and would allow time for family nights, adult education and extracurricular activities for people of all age groups.

Since the proposed building is for junior-senior high school, how will this solve the elementary problems?

By providing other facilities for junior-senior high school students, the brick wing can be released to provide needed room for two sections of most elementary grades, five of which are now crowded with over 40 students each.

What does the new building offer?

It provides for 17 fully-equipped teaching stations or classrooms. The plan is compact, efficient and without frills. Concentration of rooms requiring plumbing and special equipment, into one central area, reduces building and maintenance costs. Heating costs are minimized by using the least possible amount of outside wall space. The service area for delivery of supplies is away from student activities. The noisier areas—kitchen, gymnasium and music room—are separated from the other classrooms.

The gymnasium can be divided into two separate areas, for two separate activities, and room for a third on stage. The stage is next to the kitchen, for use as a cafeteria—free from the gymnasium area. Over-all construction is of nonflammable material, as specified by the state. The building is planned as a "center" of the main areas of education and is well suited for low-cost expansion if needed.

A poignant episode in the life of David is the one in which his son, Absalom, turns against his father and tries by deceit and force of arms to seize the throne and the kingdom.

Absalom lost his life in the attempt. In spite of his treachery, his father loved him deeply and mourned his loss with bitter grief. "Would God I had died for thee, O Absalom, my son, my son!" Who can forget this anguished cry?

For all his faults and failings, David showed almost divine forgiveness and love for his wayward son. The love of God for His children is infinitely stronger. He loves us even though we neglect Him and even spurn Him at times. Centuries ago, He not only expressed a willingness to die for us, but through His Son, Christ Jesus, He sacrificed Himself for mankind. This He did that our sin might be cleansed and that all might share, with Him, full and perfect life here and in the hereafter.

Editorial Comment
Boards of Review Must Justify Action

Officials of the City of West Branch have stated they would protest the annual tax equalization report adopted two weeks ago by the Ogemaw County Board of Supervisors.

It might be well for officials of Iosco schools which lap over into Ogemaw County to take a look at this equalization report, too.

Ogemaw County hired Gem Survey to appraise real estate as a means of determining the true cash value for property tax purposes. This was the same firm hired for similar purposes by Iosco County and Arenac County.

According to the Michigan Constitution, tax assessments are to be levied on a basis of 50 percent of the true cash value of all real estate—which represents the state equalized valuation. The constitution does not permit any variance from this 50 percent figure.

After accepting property appraisals developed by Gem Survey, which had supposedly established a true cash value of each parcel of land in the county, boards of review of Ogemaw "worked over" these appraisal cards.

The board of supervisors then equalized the county using 40 percent of the Gem figure for townships and 50 percent for the City of West Branch.

Naturally, West Branch is incensed over this—doubly so, for Gem's report revealed that the true cash value of property in the City of West Branch had been too high in previous years. While the total county valuation jumped to over \$106,000,000 as compared to about \$72,000,000 prior to Gem's study, the valuation of West Branch actually dropped.

Editor Robert Marshall of the Ogemaw County Herald correctly points out that if the 40 and 50 percent ratio was allowed to stand, it would mean that residents within the city would be paying school and county taxes at the rate of 50 percent while everyone else paid the same taxes at the rate of 40 percent.

It might be pointed out, too, that taxpayers of adjoining counties also would be effected. Both Arenac and Iosco adopted Gem's figures as true cash value and assessments are based on 50 percent of that figure. If Ogemaw's 40 percent figure is allowed to stand, it would mean that taxpayers in school districts which overlap county lines would be paying on a different ratio.

Unless figures "worked over" by boards of review can be justified, whether in Ogemaw or Iosco, they should not be allowed to stand by the state tax commission. This is the real meaning of equalization and it was the reason why Arenac, Ogemaw and Iosco hired Gem Survey in the first place—to end the conniving at tax equalization time.

(This is not meant to imply that we are pointing our finger at other counties for, in some respects, Iosco's skirts are not exactly clean. We have reference, for instance, to one board of review which lowered tax assessments on local residents and raised assessments of out-of-town owners. This situation was corrected somewhat this year.)

Editor Marshall observes that it looks as if most of Ogemaw County is headed, again, for a plus factor in the computation of taxes—addition of a "penalty" to all townships to bring them up to 50 percent of true cash value—the very thing that was supposed to be eliminated with the Gem Survey.



15 Years Ago—

May 14, 1954—Tawas Area Board of Education proposed this week to resubmit to the voters of the district as soon as possible the \$775,000 bond issue for a new high school which was defeated by a narrow margin in the school election held February 8.

Now under construction on Tawas Point is the new clubhouse of the Tawas Bay Yacht Club. The first unit of the building, to be constructed of concrete blocks, is to be 28 by 40-feet.

The Tawas' newest entry into the manufacturing field, the Tawas Apron Garment Company, managed by William Gilfix, began production operations.

Businessmen of Port Austin and the Tawas are discussing the possibility of inaugurating ferry service across Saginaw Bay between the two communities.

Bruce Campbell Leslie of Adrian College was awarded the Ely D. and Edna M. Miller Memorial Scholarship which is given annually to the junior boy who is active in religious work on the campus and has a high scholastic rating.

25 Years Ago—

May 12, 1944—During the past 11 years, 4,508 persons have been lodged in the Isoco County Jail. A record book was first installed at the county jail in 1883 by Sheriff Clark Esmond. During the next 50 years, or until 1933, 2,682 people were registered in the book with charges against them and their past history. The increase during the past 11 years was not due to an increased population, for during the first two decades of the period following 1883, Isoco County's population numbered from 12,000 to 16,000, or nearly twice as great as it is today. More ways of violating laws and a stepup in law enforcement might be given for the increase.

Fifteen Isoco County boys and girls from the rural schools received eighth grade diplomas Thursday evening at commencement exercises held at Sherman Township Hall.

Earl Hester left Tuesday for

Douglas, Georgia, where he will be an instructor at the Douglas School of Aeronautics.

Parents of Lt. Charles (Bud) Cecil have received word that he is a prisoner in a German prison camp.

Four petitions have been filed for the one vacancy on the Isoco Road Commission. Filing were Ernest Crego, G. P. Sabin, James McDonnell and Frank Brown.

Motto of the class of 1944 at Tawas City High School is "Go Forth to Serve."

A nazi secret weapon made a poor showing in the Cassino sector. Little tanks, loaded with explosives, were sent crawling toward Allied lines. They were powered by electric motors and controlled by trailing wires. Most turned over or ran into obstacles.

May 11, 1934—Tawas City will vote May 28 on a \$12,600 bond issue to build a sewage disposal plant, intersecting sewers and a sewage pumping station. Sewer mains have been under construction here since December 15 as part of the federal works program.

E. T. Burns of the Mikado Bank of Sleeper, Merrick and Company, who was appointed receiver for the Isoco County State Bank, took up his duties here Monday.

Charles Bonney Jr. of East Tawas recently secured his license from the Federal Radio Commission to operate a short wave radio station with call letters assigned, W8LQR.

The finished rocket will be 20 feet long and two feet in diameter. Liquid oxygen and rectified gasoline (propane) will be the fuel used to raise the rocket.

Property owners at VanEttan Lake are complaining that early morning target practice at Camp Skeel interferes with their sleep. They say that the roar of planes and rattle of machine guns at

early dawn must be discontinued or the value of VanEttan Lake as a summer resort will be destroyed. Oscoda is urged to cooperate in petitioning army authorities to have the nuisance stopped.





Special Finishes Demand Special Care

Soil release durable press clothes offer convenience not a guaranteed cure-all for laundry problems. The fabric, the type of stain and soil, and length of time the stain has been on a fabric influence the effectiveness of soil release on durable press.

Satisfaction also depends on the quality of fabric and finish, which is difficult for the homemaker to judge. How pleased you will be with the soil release and durable press depends on the clothing care and laundry procedures you use. You must balance the results you want with the care you are willing to give the item.

Prewash soaking with enzyme active laundry aids helps remove some protein, starch and fat stains but overnight soaking and repeated soakings may be necessary—and regular detergents may be just as effective as enzymes on some stains.

Heavily soiled clothes need hot water to come clean, particularly with oil stains. But hot water may actually spread a large stain and set it in the fabric. The stain needs to be sponged first with cleaning fluid. Hot water may also put wash wrinkles in the fabric.

A short wash period—no more than five minutes—with slow agitation prevents wrinkles and cleans sufficiently if durable press clothes are washed frequently. But if clothes are heavily soiled, they will need a longer wash cycle at the expense of greater wrinkling.

Another problem concerns sorting clothes. Washing white and colored clothes in separate loads, similar colors together and clothes with a similar degree of soiling together prevents transfer of color, lint and soil from one garment to

another. But the family wash normally handles clothes collectively, to some extent, even though care instructions assume individual handling.

Small washer and dryer loads prevent wrinkling. But time, effort, money and equipment are important in determining how many different washer and dryer loads are reasonable.

Undoubtedly, durable press eliminates some of the need for pressing but it may increase other care. The choice is up to you. You must decide what type and how much care you want to give.

Basic Fish Cookery

Spring has come and with it most men seem to get not spring fever but fishing fever. You can't blame them—it is so nice outside, why stay home? But, when he comes home with that gleaming trophy, what do you do with it or to it to make it your trophy, too?

Does the thought of scaling and cleaning a fish make you shudder? Actually, the thought is much worse than doing it.

1. Wash the fish. Remove scales by scraping the fish gently from tail to head with a dull knife.
2. Remove the entrails after cutting the entire length of the belly from the vent to the head. Remove the head by cutting above the collar bone and break the backbone over the edge of the table or cutting board.

3. Remove the large back fin by cutting the flesh and pulling the fin out. Never trim the fin with a knife or shears because the bones at the base of the fin will remain in the fish.

4. Wash the fish thoroughly and half the battle is over. Cooking fish is the other half of the battle. Because fish is already tender and does not have any connective tissue to be broken down, it needs only a short cooking period.
