

In order to become eligible for surplus commodities, the applicant is required to sign an affidavit the federal government and that he will be required to make satisfactory settlement for the illegal use of such commodities. In addition, the signatures of

the applicant authorizes any investigation to be made of his resources.

He reminded them, however, that even though their premium payment is late their policy re-mains in force for a 31-day grace period following the premium due date.


