

Community Chest Fund Tops Quota

Thanks to an all out effort last week by volunteers, including a contingent of students from Tawas Area School, the Tawas-Whittemore Area Community Chest surpassed its 1969 goal.

Early last week it appeared as though the campaign would reach only 70 percent of its goal of \$14,686.60.

According to an announcement Monday, Peoples State Bank will sponsor a victory dinner in the near future. Details are to be announced next week.

Mrs. George Kindell, community chest president, has announced that the board of directors will hold a meeting the first week in December.

TA School to Borrow \$15,000 to Meet December 5 Payroll

In order to meet payroll expenses prior to receipt of taxes, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night authorized school administrators to borrow \$15,000, if necessary, to meet the December 5 payroll.

Supt. Reynolds Mick said that the school could be in a financial bind should the payment of state aid be delayed. Last year, the check arrived on December 5.

Without the state aid check, the school would have a deficit of \$6,000, plus November bills. This deficit is in excess of the amount anticipated due to the fact that the school has paid about \$36,000 more bills than at the same date in 1968.

Each payroll is up about \$7,000 over last year and maintenance is up \$10,000, due mainly to purchase of storm windows and the

Tax Statements Ready for Mail

"Winter" tax bills totaling \$2,167,693.57 will be mailed December 1 to Iosco taxpayers, according to an announcement this week by Edward Nelkie, county treasurer. Tax rolls are now being printed by the county's Addressograph Department and are to be in the hands of township and city treasurers within the next two weeks.

Taxes are due and payable on or after December 1 at township or city treasurer's offices. Dog licenses may be purchased at the same time from the various treasurers.

The total tax bill for Iosco, representing a 12 percent increase over 1968, includes county operation, Iosco Medical Care Facility, Iosco Intermediate School District, township and school taxes.

Free Diabetes Tests Nov. 17-22 at Tawas Hospital

Free diabetes testing will be conducted November 17-22 at Tawas Hospital, 7:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. Results of the testing last year showed 45 out of 260 persons tested were potential diabetics.

"Should one suspect, or even not suspect there might be a chance of being a diabetic, he should take advantage of this free testing," states M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator.

The Michigan Diabetes Association will provide a follow up for confirmed "positives" and will notify those taking the test as well as the family doctor.

Testing is generally limited to persons 21 years of age and older and to those who are not known diabetics. A child with a family history of diabetes may receive the free testing if there is a written request from the family doctor.

The Michigan Diabetes Association especially urges those persons in the high risk group—over 40, over weight or with a family history of diabetes—to take advantage of this community service, which is manned by hospital personnel and the entire expense of which is born by the hospital.

Diabetes is best detected by testing the patient after he has eaten a meal. It is important to include all the following foods in the amounts listed in the sample meal plan. Do not drink (other than water), eat, smoke, chew gum, candy, cough drops, etc., following the meal until the blood sample is taken. The following diet is recommended for the two-hour postprandial blood sugar test: One cup milk, two slices toast, one egg (if desired), one tablespoon jelly, one tablespoon sugar, one cup orange juice, hot beverage (if desired), one cup cornflakes or oatmeal.


Finish meal within 15 minutes. Report to Tawas Hospital for test one hour and 45 minutes later.

Two Women Killed Nov. 5 in Crash South of Tawas City

A head-on crash on the US-23 curve south of Tawas City Wednesday night killed two women and seriously injured the driver of the other vehicle involved.

Killed instantly were Corrine A. Langlois, 42, driver, Boulder City, Nevada, and Bernice H. Dietzel, 53, East Tawas, a passenger in Mrs. Langlois' convertible car.

Receiving severe chest injuries, multiple cuts and bruises was Dean Smith, 36, Sterling, driver of a van-type truck owned by Sears-Roebuck and Company. He was given emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and then transferred to Bay City Mercy Hospital.

Investigating state police officers said it appeared as though the Langlois car, headed north, passed another vehicle on the curve near the residence of John Konenske and crashed head-on into the truck driven by Smith.

The two women were returning to East Tawas from Detroit, where Mrs. Langlois had attended the funeral of a relative earlier in the day. Mrs. Langlois' husband and family had moved to Nevada about two years ago and she was here to visit her two daughters.

The two deaths brought Iosco County's 1969 highway fatality toll to nine, as compared to 12 at this time in 1968.

Bernice Helen Dietzel, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas A. Wood, was born May 19, 1916, at Melvor. She had been employed at a Saginaw drug store.

She is survived by one son, Gary Wood, East Tawas; a daughter, Mrs. Jean Ann Charles, Garden City; eight grandchildren; two brothers, Mark Wood of Zephyrhills, Florida, Clyde Wood of National City; four sisters Mrs. Grace Zinseltie of Saginaw; Mrs. Winifred Johnson of Grand Rapids; Mrs. Nettie Matthews and Mrs. Goldie Coolidge of Florida.

Funeral services were held Saturday, November 8, at St. Joseph Catholic Church, East Tawas, of which she was a member. The Rev. Fr. Arthur Mulka officiated. Burial was in St. Joseph Cemetery.

Corrine Amelia Langlois was born at Detroit March 25, 1927. She was married December 31, 1945, to Robert Langlois. Mr. Langlois had operated a service station and garage at East Tawas for several years prior to moving to Nevada.

Judge Impounds State Aid for Disadvantaged Children

Judge John Warren of Ingham County Circuit Court Friday enjoined the State Board of Education and state treasurer from further payment to schools of special state aid money for the education of disadvantaged children.

The court's injunction impounded money appropriated by the legislature, but Judge Warren held the case open for any further discussion by the two parties involved.

This suit was the result of an all-out effort by Supt. Ray Kesler of Whittemore-Prescott Area School, who enlisted the help of State Rep. Joseph Swallow of Alpena. Under new wording in the school aid act, Whittemore-Prescott Area School stood to lose \$33,745.90 for the education of disadvantaged children.

Legal proceeding were started in behalf of a white student in the Mio-AuSable School District, Bonnie Lynn Hoover. The Mio-AuSable School is in Swallow's legislative district, but the issue is the one brought up by Kesler.

Money is available to school districts which, according to a point schedule, have a certain number of disadvantaged children within the district. Last year, Whittemore-Prescott Area School had enough points and received money to provide a special program at the Sherman School for disadvantaged children, as well as receiving funds to train teachers at Central Michigan University for educating teachers in this special field and money for a speech program conducted at the school by Iosco Intermediate School District.

A new definition was added this year limiting the disadvantaged aid to districts containing

Most Voters Reject Probate Court Districts

Voters in only one district above the Bay City-Muskegon County line approved a proposed plan November 4 to replace probate judges in each county with a district probate judge.

The only counties approving the measure were Clare and Gladwin. The plan was devised by State Rep. Donald E. Holbrook of Clare.

In this area, Iosco County voters turned thumbs down to the proposal, registering 110 "yes" to 1,276 "no." Arenac County defeated the measure, 132 "yes" to 569 "no."

On an area basis for Northeastern Michigan, the redistricting was defeated 5,210 to 3,244, with the margin of defeat ranging from about five to three to a high of 12 to one (Iosco) against the proposal.

The plan called for division of 42 of the 45 counties north of the Bay City-Muskegon line into 20 probate court districts, each served by a full time judge with a minimum salary of \$20,000 annually.

All counties in any designated district had to approve the redistricting to permit passage of the proposal.

Sventko Quits Head Football Post at TAHS

Resignation of Steven Sventko as head football coach of the Tawas Area Braves was accepted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. The letter of resignation was dated October 17.

"I have been associated with athletics at Tawas for a long time and the experience has been a pleasant one. Due to personal reasons, I no longer have the desire to coach," said Sventko.

Carl Helmer, board of education president, directed that a letter be sent to Sventko thanking him on behalf of the school for his dedicated service.

Sventko has served the past three years as head football coach, taking over from Ernest Mousseau after the latter's resignation just prior to the 1967 football season.

Coming to Tawas Area School in the fall of 1969, Sventko served one year as assistant junior varsity coach and then moved up as assistant varsity coach when Herbert Escott took over the head coaching position.

Before coming to Tawas Area, Sventko had been head football coach at Merrill. He is a graduate of Ferris State College and is a commercial teacher.

Sventko, who resides at East Tawas, has said that he plans to remain at his teaching position here.

Auto Plates Go on Sale November 15

Michigan automobile license plates go on sale November 15, 9:00 a. m., at the secretary of state's branch office in Tawas City.

Roy Bergeron, branch manager, said Tuesday that his office had sold slightly more than 9,200 plates last year. He now has a supply of 9,200 plates in the 1970 colors of gold and white, in honor of Oakland University.

The first person in line Saturday morning will receive a plate with the number, BRM 000. Numbers with these three letters will then jump to 500 and run through 999.

Under a new identification system adopted this year, Iosco County plates will bear the following numbers: BRN, BRP, BRR, BRS, BRT, BRV, BRW, BRX and BRY. These letters replace the familiar WS, which has been used to designate Iosco plates for a number of years.



Braves End 1969 Grid Season With Win Over W-P Cardinals

An exuberant bunch of Tawas Area Braves carried their coaches off the field Friday night—not so much for their 36-8 win over the plucky Whittemore-Prescott Cardinals but just for the sake of giving a lift to Coach Steve Sventko and Assistant Coach Roger Spencer. It was Tawas' first win since the third game of the season.

After racking up two wins and a tie to open the season, Tawas' football fortunes took a turn for the worse after losing to the Oscoda Owls, who went on to an undefeated NBC season. The season

was entirely uphill for the Braves after that game—staggered by injuries, the team's morale was still high in spite of five straight losses.

With Friday night's win, Tawas ended the season with a record of three wins (two being non-conference games) five losses and a tie.

Although having an even more frustrating season than Tawas', the Cards of Coach Bill Bell with a winless season never gave up Friday night and scored a touchdown late in the game to prevent a shutout.

Outgunning the Cards all the way Tawas scored two touchdowns in the first quarter to get some revenge for Whittemore-Prescott's 6-0 victory which closed Tawas' 1968 winless season.

First to score for the Braves was Mark Schirmer, a sophomore up from the junior varsity who was switched from end to halfback. Schirmer went 15 yards to score on a trap play. Mike Glancy, senior fullback who has been Tawas' main offensive threat all season, powered over for a two-point conversion.

Second touchdown of the first quarter came when Don Mick, senior quarterback, rolled around right end to score. Glancy again powered his way over for a two-point conversion.

After the Cards' marched down into scoring territory, only to lose the ball on downs, Tawas scored its third touchdown in the second quarter. Glancy plowed through the Cardinal line on a one-yard plunge and Tawas had a 22-0 lead at halftime.

There was no scoring in the third quarter, but Whittemore threatened at one point. Becker of Tawas intercepted a pass in the endzone to end the threat.

Tawas scored early in the fourth quarter when Dave Moe went 30 yards up the middle. Mike Sventko passed to Craig Wilkins for the two-point conversion.

The Braves' final touchdown came when Chris King went around right end for two yards.

The Cards took to the air in the second half and it paid off late in the game as Quarterback Dave Fellows completed three aeriels to set up a touchdown. Lomason scored the touchdown and the two-point conversion was good.

Tawas Area recovered four Cardinal fumbles during the night and the Cards picked up two Tawas bobbles. The entire south end of the field was muddy, which caused problems for both teams.

Singled out for outstanding performances during the night were Schirmer, Defensive End Larry Sidebottom, Center Bill Sheldon, Quarterback Mick, Fullback Glancy and Sventko as a linebacker.

The halftime ceremony included introducing candidates for queen during Whittemore-Prescott's special program marking the 100th anniversary of football. A dance was held following the game, during which the queen was crowned. A plaque was awarded to the Braves as winner of the game, along with certificates and medals to members of both teams.

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

TITLES ARE A BIG THING this year, according to Automobile Club of Michigan auto license plate clerk, Marjorie Wyson. She uses an enlarged title to emphasize that Michigan motorists buying 1970 plates, which go on sale Saturday (November 15), must bring their car titles. Titles are required for the first time in five years to update secretary of state records which are being computerized. Motorists must also have a license application, which most car owners received in the mail, plus proof of insurance. Persons with proof of insurance also must pay \$1 into the state's uninsured motorist fund and those without proof \$35, in addition to the cost of plates. New plates are painted gold with white letters and for the first time will have three letters followed by three numbers. Auto Club also points out that license plates now will have all zeros for the first plate in a series instead of the prestigious "Number One." Motorists will have until March 31 before 1969 plates expire, a month later than last year.

Social Security Representatives Here November 20

Because of the Thanksgiving holiday, Social Security representatives will be at the Iosco County Building, Tawas City, Thursday, November 20, from 9:45 a. m. until 3:00 p. m. instead of November 27.

The representatives can take applications for benefits of any type. Those over 62 who are applying should bring a birth or baptismal certificate if available; otherwise, they should bring the oldest record of age they have. In addition, the claimant should have a record of the Social Security number of his own and in the case of wives and widows, the Social Security number of their husband. The representative can also help in filing Medicare applications. In these cases, the doctor bills or receipts should be brought in with the Medicare and Blue Cross cards.



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

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

New Deer Management Units



These 98 permanent deer management units were established this year by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to further refine its programs keyed to Michigan's deer herd and range. For hunters, the new system should be more convenient because unit numbers and boundaries will remain essentially the same from year to year. The plan, too, will promote more flexibility in deer regulations because these rules can be better tailored to local situations by working with more, but smaller management units. The stabilized units will allow DNR game men to make better year-to-year comparisons of the kill and hunter success in each area and provide more accurate guidelines to work from in shaping deer hunting regulations. Each of the new unit's ownership of land, cover types, land-use patterns, and climatic zone were carefully weighed to form close-knit and clearly-defined management tracts which, as such, will also lend themselves to effective wildlife habitat improvement work. Of the 98 units, 83 will be open to antlerless deer hunting this fall under a permit system scaled for a harvest of about 45,600 animals. The projected antlerless deer kill for this season is slightly less than last year's. As shown here, units 1-3, 37, 57, 59, 66, 69, 74-77, and 96-98 will be limited to bucks only hunting during the 1969 firearm deer season. After buying their 1969 deer licenses, hunters have through September 30 to mail applications for nearly 200,000 antlerless deer permits to the DNR's Lansing office. Those seeking permits for the Beaver Islands Wildlife Research Area, listed as Area 27, are urged not to make mail applications. Instead, they will find an unlimited number of permits available on a "come-and-get-them" basis at the DNR's Beaver Island field office at St. James right before and during the November 15-30 season. —Michigan Department of Natural Resources.





Huron-Manistee National Forest Tawas Ranger District

Wes Belcher, Don Stitt and John Ristow have a new job this fall. They are engaged in planting crops on 265 acres of your national forest.

Yes, the forest service is in the farming business, but our crop happens to be trees. You could call us tree farmers.

Just as the farmer plants his crops in the spring, we plant our crops in the spring or fall. One big difference, however, is the time it takes the crops to reach maturity or rotation age. The farmer harvests his crops the same year he plants them. The tree farmer has to wait slightly longer.

We plant our crops in rows about 10 feet wide with a six foot spacing between trees within the rows. This gives us approximately 700 trees per acre. With proper

management, we should be able to harvest the crop in 60 years.

Proper management would include a partial harvesting of the crop approximately 30 years after planting. We call this partial harvesting a "thinning." In this operation, we remove about one-third of the original crop by cutting every third row. The trees removed in the thinning can be sold as pulpwood and the trees that are left will receive more sunlight, have more room to grow and subsequently grow faster.

Another thinning may be necessary 10 to 15 years after the first thinning. This operation might remove half of the remaining trees and the trees removed will be large enough to make sawlogs or lumber. The remaining trees will be the final crop.

As you can see, planting trees is a long-term investment and it does pay off. We are now receiving dividends in the form of thinnings from the CCC plantings of

the 1920s and 1930s. In future years, the dividends will become greater and greater as more trees approach sawtimber size.

Thanks to the efforts of men like Wes, Don and John, your forests will continue to improve and approach the condition they were in before man destroyed them.
