

# Council Adopts Wage Increases

A new pay schedule was adopted Monday night by Tawas City Council giving a 10-cent-per-hour increase to hourly workers and pay hikes ranging from \$100 to \$300 annually to salaried employees.

In presenting the report of the council's finance committee, Alderman Martin Wellna recommended that a study be made on a pension plan for city employees for presentation to the council next year. Pay increases adopted for hourly workers were: Laborers, \$2.50 to \$2.60 per hour; truck drivers, \$2.55 to \$2.65 per hour; heavy equipment operator, \$2.75 to \$2.85 per hour.

The department of public works presently employs two laborers, two truck drivers and one heavy equipment operator. Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, said his crew was presently short one man.

Pay increases to salaried employees were as follows: Librarian, \$100 increase, from \$1,970 to \$2,070; office secretary, \$200 increase, from \$3,200 to \$3,400; foreman, \$200 increase over last year's income. This would include \$6,000 regular salary plus overtime at \$3 per hour; chief of police, \$200 increase, from \$7,000 to \$7,200; superintendent of public works, \$300, from \$8,200 to \$8,500.

The committee recommended that a study be made toward possible hiring of additional clerical help at the city hall, stating this would relieve the city superintendent from such duties and he could spend additional time in

the field. The committee felt that the city treasurer was the logical person to handle the additional clerical duties.

Acting with Wellna on the finance committee are Alderman Frank Ahonen and Cecil Cable.



## Rev. Crews Died Thursday at Chapel Lake

Funeral services for the Rev. O. James Crews, founder and pastor of the Temple Church of the Temple of Light, Detroit, were held Monday at the Bird and Mott Funeral Home, Detroit. Burial was in Parkview Memorial Cemetery, Livonia.

Mr. Crews of 140 Edison, Detroit, died the night of November 13 while at his lodge at Chapel Lake.

He was well known in Iosco County as director of the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials, which were held during the summers of 1958 and 1959.

He was ordained as a minister in the Interdenominational Church in 1935 and was known as the "Messenger of Light" in radio broadcasts on Stations WXYZ and WJKB during the 1930s. He was also known as an astrologer.

Survivors include his wife, Florence; a brother, Lester W.; two sisters, Mertha and Mrs. Lela Emde.

## Receives Fatal Injuries When Struck by Car

A 70-year-old Grant township man, Henry R. Watts, received fatal injuries Saturday night when struck by an automobile at the intersection of M-55 and Sand Lake Road.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that Watts walked across M-55 into the path of a car driven by Thomas S. Seator, 72, Twining. Officers said that Seator was headed west and could not avoid the collision.

The victim was taken to Tawas Hospital for emergency treatment and then was rushed by ambulance to General Hospital, Bay City. He was dead on arrival.

Henry Robert Watts was born July 28, 1899, in Grant Township. He was a retired farmer and had been making his home with his brother, Phillip, at 4701 M-55.

He is survived by his brother and one sister, Mrs. Grace Butts, Turner.

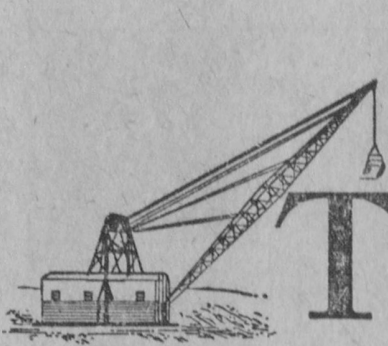

## Await Report on Autopsy

Although a report from an autopsy was incomplete as yet, Iosco Sheriff's Department said Monday that death of one of two persons found in a car on a trail off Jose Lake Road November 13 was due to asphyxiation.

According to the sheriff's department, asphyxiation caused the death of Norman A. Wright, 41, 512 Locke Street, East Tawas. An autopsy had not been completed as yet to determine the cause of death of Sally L. Atkinson, 25, Monroe.

The two were found dead in a car last Thursday afternoon by hunters preparing for the opening of deer season. Several posts blocking a trail had been removed, the car driven through and the posts replaced. Officers said that a hose was found connected to the automobile's tail pipe and run through a rear window.

## Anticipate Possible Future Growth

# Establish County Public Works Board

Looking to future needs of the county and, at the same time, providing the vehicle by which present needs of an expanding population can be met, Iosco Board of Supervisors has established a new board of public works for the county.

Immediate results of the formation Wednesday of this new five-man board will be to enable Oscoda Township to take steps to finance a \$2,605,000 addition to its water system. This system will serve the new Lakewood Shores Subdivision, five miles north of Oscoda, being developed by Conel Development Company.

Organized under Act 185 of 1957, the new board would act as a clearing house for approving bonding issues of various townships or municipalities which wish to utilize the full faith and credit of the entire county in financing water or sewer projects at a lower interest rate, rather than to use only the single unit's valuation for bonding purposes.

Oscoda Township had commenced legal work in preparing to sell water revenue bonds to finance this project and had progressed to a point where application was to be made to the Municipal Finance Commission.

While the special assessment district at Oscoda will still have full responsibility of paying off the bonds, it is expected that there will be a savings of more than \$400,000 in interest rates through use of the entire county's valuation as a financial base.

Financial consultants for Oscoda Township explained that safeguards were written into the act to protect interests of the county at large as the special assessment district would assume the entire risk of retiring the bonds.

It was noted that state law limits bonded indebtedness of a governmental unit to 10 percent of its assessed valuation. As a result of the new board of public works, other townships or municipalities of the county wishing to establish special assessment districts to finance water or sewer construction would have approximately \$7,000,000 remaining in the 10 percent debt limit for the entire county.

Charles Smith, Oscoda Township supervisor, said that the total county valuation would be increased considerably through development of this new subdivision.

William Cottrell, a spokesman for Conel Development Company, said that total valuation of the development when completed would amount to approximately \$15,000,000. At present, 1,249 lots have been sold in Lakewood Shores and the total number of lots amounts to 4,995. He said that home construction there had been discouraged during the past 1 1/2 years in order that recreational and other facilities could be completed. It is expected that between 80 and 120 homes will be constructed there in 1970, all in the \$19,900 to \$39,000 price range.

Nearly \$3,000,000 has been spent on the project, which will see development of a new 18-hole golf course and clubhouse as well as riding trails and other facilities.

It was stated that the special assessment rolls for financing this project were approved by property

owners last week. Through issuance of bonds under the supervision of the county board of public works cost to property owners, estimated at \$80 per lot annually, would be cut by one-third.

Oscoda Township's water system started with 312 customers and

now has reached 612. The township maintains four wells and two storage tanks. The new system would be interconnected with present facilities and construction is expected to start next spring.

Coming to the county board as an afterthought following approval

of the special assessment district, Supervisor Smith said "we hope we have started something here which will benefit many local governmental units."

Fred Lomas, chairman of the county board of supervisors, said that an immediate check would be

made to determine if the recent bond issue sold by East Tawas to finance its new sewer distribution system and disposal plant could be included in this new arrangement.

"At this stage, the county would establish a board of public works

and there would be no expenditure of money. Its establishment will make it possible for Oscoda to have the machinery to better finance its project and other units may do the same, if they wish," said Kenneth Myles, prosecuting attorney.

## Tawas Hospital Now Operates Ambulances

Emergency ambulance service covering most of Iosco County was taken over Monday noon by Tawas Hospital. This was the result of several months of discussion and planning by local governmental units and hospital authorities.

All calls for ambulance service are to be placed through the Iosco County Sheriff's Department, phone 362-3485. A direct line connects the jail with the hospital and ambulances have radio equipment operating on the sheriff's department frequency.

Two ambulances are stationed at the hospital and one ambulance is stationed at the Plainfield Township Fire Hall.

At a meeting November 14, rates to be charged for ambulance service were established. Attending were M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator; James Campbell, mayor of East Tawas; Fred Lomas, chairman of the county board of supervisors; Dennis Chrivia, Plainfield Township supervisor; Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell; Norman Lesinski, supervisor of ambulances, along with other hospital personnel.

A loading fee of \$30 is to be charged along with \$1 per patient mile. A waiting time of \$10 per hour is to be charged and calls canceled at pickup point will be charged \$15. There will be a charge of \$30 for transfer to the Iosco Medical Care Facility. A charge of \$5 is to be made if oxygen is used.

Other transfer charges range from \$50 to West Branch to \$125 to Detroit or Ann Arbor.

Ambulance service in the Oscoda-AuSable area is to continue to be handled by funeral directors at Oscoda, although all ambulances are to be coordinated when necessary.

## Hurt Sunday in M-65 Crash

A 40-year-old Lincoln woman was injured Sunday when she lost control of her car on M-65 near Swartz Road and rolled over. Treated at Wurtsmith Air Force Base Hospital was Eva L. Krutlin. Investigating state police said the driver was attempting to pass another car. The left wheel of her vehicle dropped off the highway and she turned the steering wheel to the right, losing control.

## Two Hunters Are Wounded

Two hunters were wounded by gunfire in Iosco County on the opening week-end of deer hunting season.

Injured were Lawrence Bellant, 57, and Charles E. Haley, 36, both of Oscoda.

Haley was hunting in Wilber Township and was wounded by a bullet fired by an unknown hunter. Investigating state police said the victim was walking in light cover when three deer ran within 20 yards of him.

An unknown hunter began shooting and one slug struck him

on the inside of the right wrist, passed through and into his left leg above the knee.

Passing hunters found Haley and took him to an ambulance at Oscoda.

Bellant was hunting Sunday in AuSable Township. An unknown hunter's bullet shattered his right elbow.

Raymond Bellant, 44, Roseville, who was walking with the older man, told investigating state police that he heard two shots fired at two deer about 100 yards away from him. Both victims were treated at Tawas Hospital.

## Hunters Spent Night in Woods

Two hunters, who "went for a walk" in the woods the day before the deer season opener, walked out of Section 18, Oscoda Township, Saturday morning after spending a cold night in the woods.

Alfred A. LaFrance, Lakeport, and Robert Leoad, Westland, failed to return to camp on Friday and state police began a search.

Police said the two men were covered with frost when they returned to camp at 8:30 a. m. Saturday.

## Hunter Assaulted; Toughs Steal Buck

An East Detroit hunter, who shot a deer Sunday in Section 10, Oscoda Township, was assaulted by two strangers on Bissonette Road.

Robert Martin hold investigating state police officers that two hunters walked up to him, admired his buck, then struck him in the face, knocked him to the ground and kicked him in the ribs.

The men tossed Martin's rifle in the brush, then put the deer in the trunk of their car and sped off.

**Nelkie Reports on State Funds Received by Iosco**

A total of \$2,059,357 in state funds was paid to local units of government during the past year, according to a report last week by Edward J. Nelkie, Iosco County treasurer.

Largest item on the list of receipts was the \$1,182,621 which Iosco schools received in state aid.

Townships and cities received \$39,281 in state income tax, \$176,933 in sales tax and \$19,971 in intangibles tax.

For county use, Iosco received \$571,494 for highways, \$19,055 for social welfare, \$2,417 for child care, \$2,196 for state aid health, \$39,281 in income tax return, \$3,750 as the state share of the probate judge's salary, \$1,800 from the Veterans Trust Fund and \$486 in liquor law enforcement.

**State Gas-License Fees Set Record**

State gasoline taxes and license plate fees produced a record \$74.2 million dollars for Michigan's motor vehicle highway fund during the 1968-1969 fiscal year.

According to the report, Iosco County received \$655,092, as compared to \$554,478 during 1967-68.

Shares received by cities included: East Tawas, \$42,631, as compared to \$35,862 in 1967-68; Tawas City, \$29,130, as compared to \$24,923 in 1967-68; Whittemore, \$8,039, as compared to \$6,888 the previous year.

Net revenue for distribution to the state, counties and municipalities amounted to an increase of 19 percent.

**ON THE GRAIN OF FASHION**

With a swoop and swagger, there's high adventure afoot. Ponchos, capes and shawls are the great outer wraps. The look is a natural for unisex fashion intrigue. Take a poncho like this (Simplicity 8467) for he and she. You are simply putting together two straight pieces of fabric and adding fringe. Straight, there's the rub. Your pattern will be marked with an arrow and the words going something like this, "place on straight grain of fabric."

**Warp and Woof**

Come to terms with woven fabric. It is made of two sets of threads. The crosswise threads (woof, weft or filling) are woven back and forth through the lengthwise threads (warp). The finished lengthwise edges are selvages. The direction of these threads is known as "grain." Fold a corner of the fabric over so that the crosswise grain is parallel to the lengthwise and the diagonal fold shows you a third direction, the true bias. This direction has the most give. The lengthwise grain is the strongest.

You may be a "cockeyed optimist," but grain perfection is absolutely essential for a garment to fit and hang properly. The great thing about a poncho or cape is swing and good grain makes it happen. When a fabric is "on grain," the lengthwise and crosswise threads run at exact right angles. The fabric you buy is cut or torn from a bolt, leaving a raw edge. A torn end is always on grain—a cut end seldom is. You can straighten an uneven end by pulling a crosswise thread running near the edge and cutting along the pulled thread line.

**The Straight and Narrow Path**

A fabric will be off grain if it has been rolled onto a bolt with uneven tension or treated to irregular pressure during the finishing process. Here is a way suggested by Coats & Clark to make woolen fabric grain perfect and/or preshrink it. Leave the fabric folded in half lengthwise with right sides together, as purchased. Do not worry about wrinkles. Wet a sheet thoroughly, wringing out excess moisture, and fold lengthwise. Place the fabric on a flat surface with the sheet on top. Beginning at one end, turn the layers over together in wide folds. Wrap the whole thing in a towel for 6 to 8 hours. On a flat surface, smooth the damp woolen fabric into grain perfection with your hands. Dry thoroughly and do not press with an iron.

**Crowe Reports on DNR Coho Program**

Michigan Department of Natural Resources' salmon program in Lake Huron is only a qualified success, "but the important thing is that our restoration effort on Lake Huron is off the ground," according to Walter R. Crowe, in charge of the Great Lakes Section of the DNR's fish division.

The above was included in a letter to State Sen. Robert Richardson of Saginaw, who noted the prevalence of sea lampreys and lamprey wounds on coho salmon entering the Tawas River from Lake Huron.

"We are fully aware of the seriousness of the lamprey problem in Lake Huron," said Crowe, "and for the past two years our department has worked diligently to prevent any curtailment of the lamprey control program on Lake Huron because of lack of funds."

Crowe noted that the lamprey control program on the Great Lakes is carried out by the Great Lakes Fishery Commission which was established by treaty between the United States and Canada in 1955.

Under terms of the treaty, the United States supplies 69 percent of the funds; Canada, 31 percent. To conduct the actual control program, the commission contracted with the Federal Bureau of Commercial Fisheries in the United States and the Federal Department of Fisheries in Canada.

The lamprey control program was initiated in Lake Superior in 1958, expanded to Lakes Michigan and Huron in 1960, but because of reduced appropriations, the program on Lake Huron was discontinued. "It was not possible to continue on Lake Huron while

maintaining control on the other two lakes," said Crowe.

In the past two years, the Michigan Legislature, the DNR and Michigan's delegation in Washington have been able by means of emergency action to restore funds to the Great Lakes Fishery Commission budget. "At this moment, the restoration of a \$200,000 cut is pending in congress and we are optimistic that it will be restored," said Crowe.

The program for Lake Huron is now on schedule and it is expected that the first round of stream treatment will be completed in 1970. Several streams, including Tawas River, have already received initial treatment. Crowe expects that effects of the control program to be evident in the fall of 1970, "and by then I am confident our rehabilitation efforts in Lake Huron will be catching up with Lakes Michigan and Superior."

Crowe said that the salmon program in Lake Huron was something of a calculated risk. "Salmon, steelheads and brown trout are far less vulnerable to sea lampreys than are lake trout. Salmon in Lake Huron have not been bothered by sea lampreys until they start inshore on their spawning migration—when they do come in close contact with lampreys. The same occurs in Lake Michigan, but because lamprey control is further advanced there, the problem is not so severe."

Crowe said the lamprey control program will go forward "and we will continue our efforts to enhance the recreational fishery that plays such an important role in our tourist industry."

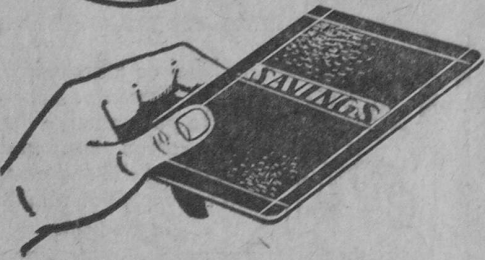

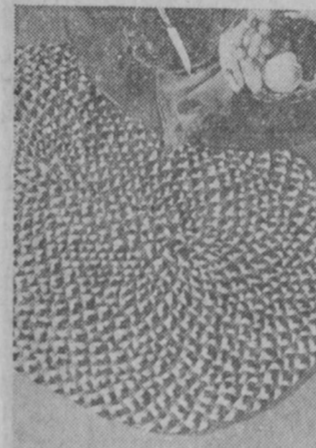

## Hale Board Objects to Reorganization Bill

In a resolution adopted November 10, Hale Area Board of Education went on record as being strongly opposed to the reorganization of local school districts as proposed in Senate Bill No. 1081. The board's resolution stated that it believed that no reorganization of local districts should be forthcoming without approval of the majority of the people residing in the districts involved. "Inasmuch as the legislature has admitted the need for assessment in order to evaluate the educational programs of all school districts, it is our belief that it is premature to reorganize school districts until the assessment can be completed. "If the other aspects of educational reform are fulfilled, it would strengthen the position of the smaller school districts. Based on per capita costs, the facts show that the smaller school districts are more economically operated than the larger districts. "Therefore, by providing vocational education, special education, etc., through the intermediate districts and increasing the

state's responsibility to finance education, we could maintain the many assets of the small school districts and, at the same time, solve the major problems without the need of reorganization," stated the board's resolution.

### Air Force Needs Women in Aerospace

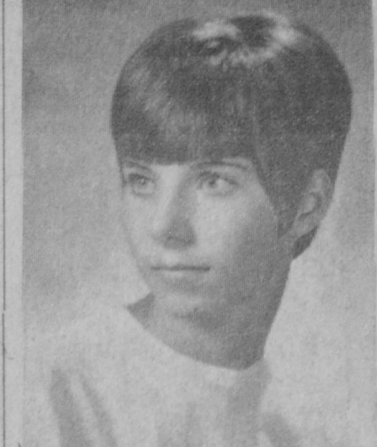
The United States Air Force is in need of women to serve on its aerospace team.
