W-P School Could Recover Lost Funds

When the Michigan Senate reconvenes December 2, it is expected that approval will be given to a 1.5 million dollar appropriation, passed by the house prior to the current recess, thus assuring Whittemore-Prescott Area School and Mio-AuSable School that the schools would receive money lost earlier this year under a ruling by the Michigan Department of Education.

The Whittemore-Prescott School lost \$68,075 under Section III aid for underprivileged children when aid was limited to districts serving Negroes, American Indians or Spanish-speaking groups.

Wounds Fatal to W-P School Honor Grad.

Lt. Cordell J. Ponak, son of Joseph Ponak of Prescott, is the area's latest Vietnam war casualty.

Ponak, valedictorian of the class of 1964 at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School, was wounded in combat near the Cambodian border on November 15. He died of those wounds the following day.

Entering Michigan State University on a 4-H scholarship, he graduated in 1968. He entered the army in September 1968, at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and was assigned to Vietnam last September.

At MSU, he was a member of the Spartan Guards of the Reserve Officer Training Corps unit. He had been an outstanding member of the 4-H Club from childhood and was the winner of many trophies in his dairy work.

Surviving is his wife, Mary, who is attending Central Michigan University and is a special education student teacher of physically handicapped children at Saginaw.

Also surviving are his mother, Mrs. Dorothy Ponak of National City; his grandmother, Mrs. Katherine Yuhas of Prescott; two sisters; two brothers; his step mother, Mrs. Helen Ponak, and two step brothers.

Funeral services are to be conducted at Prescott. Arrangements are still incomplete.

Child Hurt in Snowmobile Crash

A five-year-old Clio boy was injured Saturday morning in a snowmobile crash and treated at Tawas Hospital.

Michigan State Police said that Robert D. Meuhlen Jr., 12, Clio, was operating a snowmobile on private property about 75 yards south of the intersection of Huron Street and Ottawa Lane, Baldwin Township.

Police said that the snowmobile hit a bump and crashed into a tree. Both the operator and a passenger, James R. Stein, five years old, were thrown from the machine. The younger boy sustained lacerations to the face when the windshield smashed, as well as injuries to his left shoulder and arm.

Construction Shows Progress on New TC Industrial Plant

Work is progressing rapidly on construction of a building to house the area's newest industrial plant, Maher Pattern and Manufacturing Company.

Located on Ninth Avenue near the Tawas River bridge, Tawas City, the building is being constructed for Richard Maher, owner, by Vern Eckstein Construction Company, Tawas City.

During an interview earlier this month, Maher told the Herald that he hoped to have the building completed in six to eight weeks. He stated at the time that he was optimistic that the plant could be in operation as soon as the building is completed.

Maier plans to move the manufacturing end of his Wagner operation to Tawas City. The firm has 22 persons involved in production at Warren.

Basically, the firm is a pattern-mold-tool maker, dealing with major automobile companies and other manufacturing firms. In operation for the past five years, Maher has expanded into the production field.

Main operation to be carried on at Tawas City will be the manufacture of hardware for the military. The firm has had difficulty in keeping up with government contracts during the past year and, with the expansion here, Maher hopes to get involved in a number of different production areas.

One contract to be completed here will be the manufacture of parts for an amphibious vehicle used by the army, with nearly the entire production going to Vietnam.

The new plant, located on property in Tawas City's industrial park and donated to Maher by the city, is served by water, sewer, natural gas and power. Michigan Consolidated Gas Company completed work of its service installation two weeks ago.

The building is of concrete block construction with a 20 by 40-foot office, 40 by 100-foot manufacturing area and will contain 4,800 feet of floor space. The three-acre site has frontage on the railroad tracks and has room for a siding.

Maier said earlier this month, that it was his intention to some day move his entire operation to Tawas City, including the pattern making department.

Both Maher and Frank Tenbusch, his plant manager, plan to move their families to the Tawas area as soon as the plant is completed. Maher has seven children.

Domestic Action Committee Base Happy With Participation

"At our recent Domestic Action Committee meeting, the spark of enthusiasm glowed brightly as more people from surrounding communities were added to our committee. Initial results from various action committees began to take form and all indications are that a dynamic program is under way," reports Col. Collin C. Hamilton, commander of the 379th Bombardment Wing (SAC) at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

"Upon receipt of my letter entitled 'Domestic Action Program,' which described our joint accomplishments to date here at Wurtsmith, Lieutenant General Jones, Second Air Force commander, called to express his appreciation for what appeared to be the most progressive program he had reviewed," said Colonel Hamilton.

This new community action program involving key civilian authorities and Wurtsmith Air Force Base officials was initiated to discuss community problems and to decide what could be done to alleviate them.

New business discussed at the November meeting included aid to mentally and physically handicapped, problems relating to underprivileged senior citizens, use of Wurtsmith facilities, drug abuse education.

A suggestion was presented to invite young people from area high schools to the next meeting. This would include student council presidents and other school leaders, in an effort to learn and understand their viewpoints. Among committee members named to invite the participation by young people were Donald J. Wagner, principal at Oscoda Area High School, and Bill McIntosh, assistant principal at Tawas Area School.

One of the ideas currently being investigated by the committee to further better understanding between youths and adults is the coffee house presently operated at Wurtsmith.

Base officials said that increasing numbers of youth are frequenting the base coffee house, where communication and exchanges of ideas are fostered. A similar coffee house is now being planned at Alpena and other communities are discussing such a possibility.

The group is now attempting to locate storage facilities for the clothing bank committee. Administration of this program is to be through the Iosco Department of Social Services, as this agency has many of the clothing needs already identified through its clients.

The Christmas toy committee reported that the foremost problem facing this group is location of adequate storage space of toys until distribution. Between 20 and 25 persons have been named to this group, which will collect old toys, make repairs and distribute them to needy children.

Other reports were heard from the education program involving Central Michigan University and Alpena Community College, a medical self help course, Oscoda Christmas parade, economic development of the area.

Next meeting of the group will be at 2:00 p. m., December 3, at the Wurtsmith Command Post.

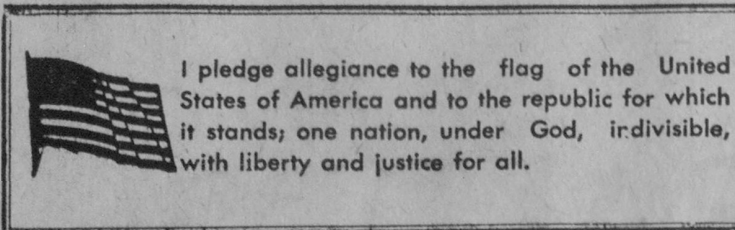

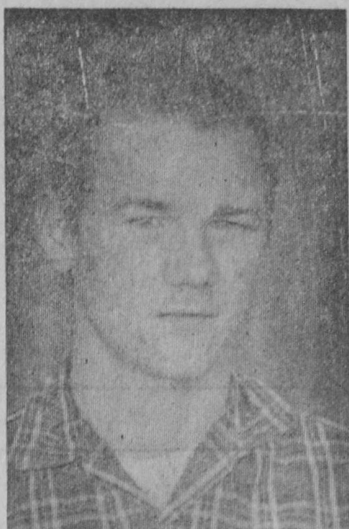

Seek Young Men for State Police Careers

Young Michigan men interested in state police careers are advised that recruiting of trooper candidates has reopened in accordance with a new civil service announcement, Col. Fredrick E. Davids, department director, reported.

Eligible to apply are men 21 to 30 years of age, inclusive, who are United States citizens and who have been residents of Michigan at least a year prior to application. They must have a high school education or the equivalent.

Candidates must be at least five feet, nine inches tall and weigh at least 150 pounds but not more than 230. Weight must be in proportion to height. They must be in good physical condition and meet certain vision and hearing standards. They must be of good moral character and have no serious arrest record. They may be married or single.

Trooper pay begins, including time in recruit school, at an annual rate of \$7,570.44, or \$290.40 every two weeks. Through regular automatic increases trooper pay climbs to a current maximum of \$10,648.80 annually (or \$408 bi-weekly) beginning with the sixth year. Longevity pay is additional after six years of service.

Interested young men can obtain application blanks and more complete information by contacting their nearest state police post or by writing to the Michigan Civil Service Commission in Lansing.

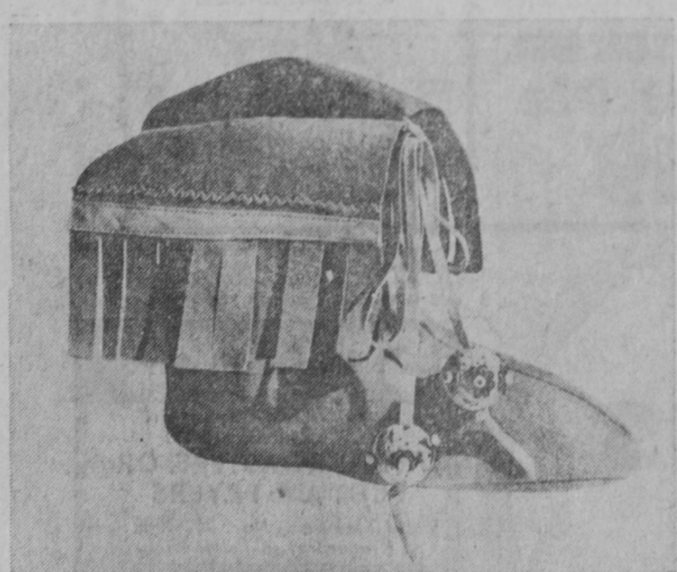

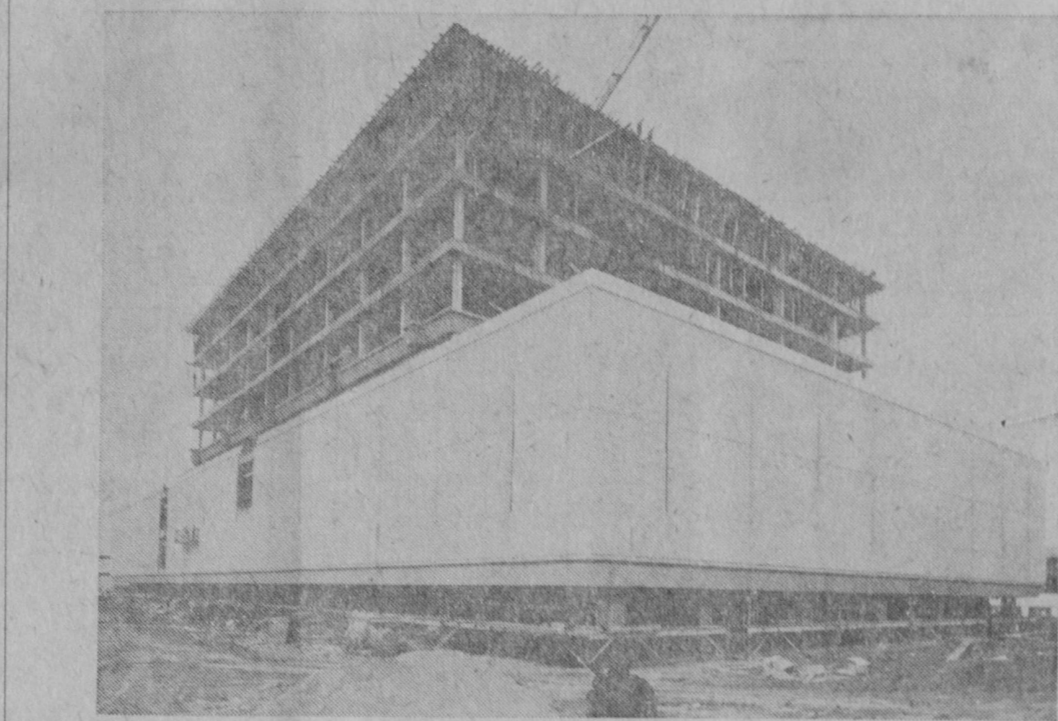

The largest state building ever constructed in terms of both cost and size, it will be only slightly smaller than Detroit's Cobo Hall. Completion of the teaching-research facility, set for the spring of 1971, will provide the first step in enabling the School of Medicine to increase the entering class of 125 students to 250. This will make the WSU School of Medicine one of the largest in the nation. Approximately 70 per cent of Wayne State medical graduates practice in Michigan. Architects for the new building are Giffels & Rossetti, Inc., Detroit.

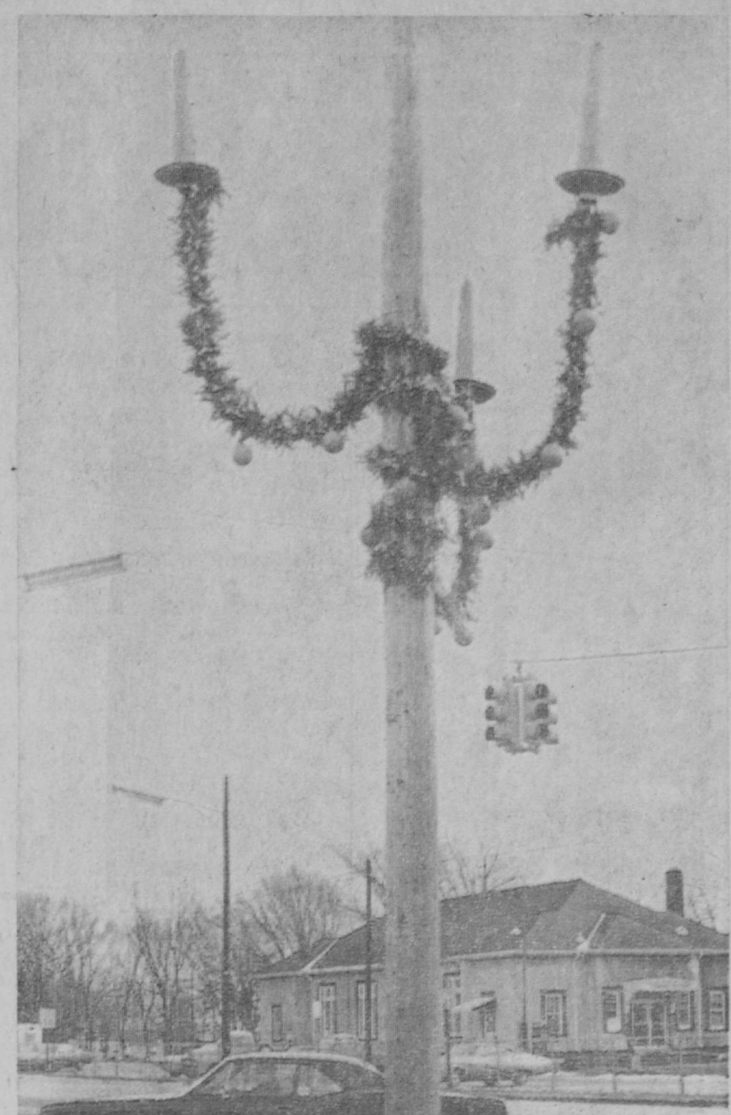

SS Answers Questions on Hospitalization

Question: I am 17 years old and receiving Social Security on my deceased father's account. Can I continue to receive Social Security after age 18, if I remain in school?

Answer: Yes. As long as you are a full-time student, under age 22 and unmarried, you will continue to be eligible for monthly benefits.

Question: Are any changes going to be made in the amounts Medicare patients have to pay under hospital insurance?

Answer: Yes, there will be some changes in the hospital insurance part of Medicare for benefit periods that begin January 1, 1970, or later. The Medicare law provides that the various dollar amounts for which the patient is responsible under hospital insurance be reviewed annually. These dollar amounts include the inpatient hospital deductible and the different per day amounts after certain periods of care in hospitals and extended care facilities. Under the law, if the review shows that hospital costs have changed significantly, these amounts are adjusted for the following year.

The 1969 review has been completed and the following changes have been announced: If you enter a hospital and start a new benefit period in 1970, Medicare Hospital Insurance pays the cost of all covered services except as shown below:

For the first 60 days in the hospital—all but the first \$52.

For the 61st through 90th day in the hospital—all but \$13 a day.

For life-time reserve days used—all but \$26 a day.

For the 21st through 100th day in an extended care facility—all but \$6.50 a day.

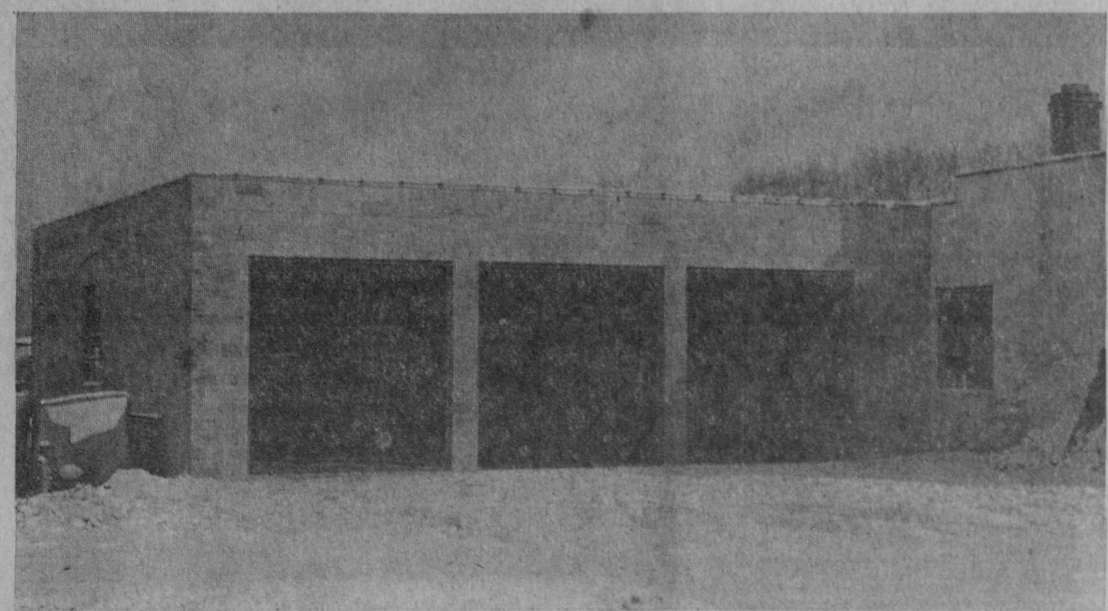

If this ordinance is accepted by the Company as in Section 6 hereof provided, the Company, after it receives such regulatory approval as may be necessary to convey natural gas to the Township of Sherman, shall within a reasonable time thereafter commence the installation of a gas main within said Township and shall proceed to complete the same as soon thereafter as reasonably practicable; provided, however, that the Company shall not be held responsible for delays due to weather or labor conditions, inability to procure necessary materials, or other causes beyond its control; and provided further, that such initial installation and all extensions shall be subject to the Main Extension provisions contained in the Company's Rules and Regulations for Gas Service as ap-

proved by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 3. Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, its successors and assigns, shall not unnecessarily obstruct the passage of any of the highways, streets, alleys or other public places within said Township and shall within a reasonable time after making an opening or excavation, repair the same and leave it in as good condition as before the opening or excavation was made. The Company, its successors and assigns, shall use due care in exercising the privileges herein contained and shall be liable to said Township for all damages and costs which may be recovered against said Township arising from the default, carelessness or negligence of the Company or its officers, agents and servants.

No road, street, alley or highway shall be opened for the laying of trunk lines or lateral mains except upon application to the Highway Commissioner or Township Board, or other authority having jurisdiction in the premises, stating the nature of the proposed work and the route. Upon receipt of such application, it shall be the duty of the Highway Commission-

er or the Township Board, or such other authority as may have jurisdiction, to issue a permit to the Company to do the work proposed.

SECTION 4. The Company is now under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Public Service Commission to the extent provided by statute, and the rates to be charged for gas, and the standards and conditions of service and operation hereunder, shall be the same as now set forth in the Company's Schedule of Rules, Regulations and Rates as applicable in the City of Tawas City, or that shall hereafter be validly prescribed for the Township of Sherman under the orders, rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or other authority having jurisdiction in the premises.

SECTION 5. The words "Michigan Consolidated Gas Company" and "the Company," wherever used herein, are intended and shall be held and construed to mean and include both Michigan Consolidated Gas Company and its successors and assigns, whether so expressed or not.

SECTION 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after the date of publication thereof, which

shall be within ten (10) days after the date of its adoption, and shall continue in effect for a period of thirty (30) years thereafter, subject to revocation at the will of the Township at any time during said thirty (30) year period; provided, however, that when this ordinance shall become effective the Township Clerk shall deliver to the Company a certified copy of the ordinance accompanied by written evidence of publication and recording thereof as required by law and that Michigan Consolidated Gas Company shall, within sixty (60) days after the date of the adoption of this ordinance, file with the Township Clerk its written acceptance of the conditions and provisions hereof.

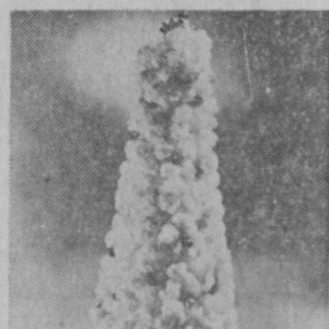
