

Only 70 Percent of Goal Reached

For the first time in the seven-year history of the Tawas-Whittemore Area Community Chest, the 1969 campaign is to end this Saturday with only 70 percent of the goal reached.

Mrs. Lawrence DeBeauvoir, campaign chairman, said Tuesday that she regretted making this announcement, but the campaign had been extended beyond its scheduled completion of October 26 and it appeared as though the goal could not be reached with available manpower.

According to Mrs. DeBeauvoir, donations may still be turned in to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office until January 1, 1970. She has the sincere hope that the remaining \$4,398 will be received by that time.

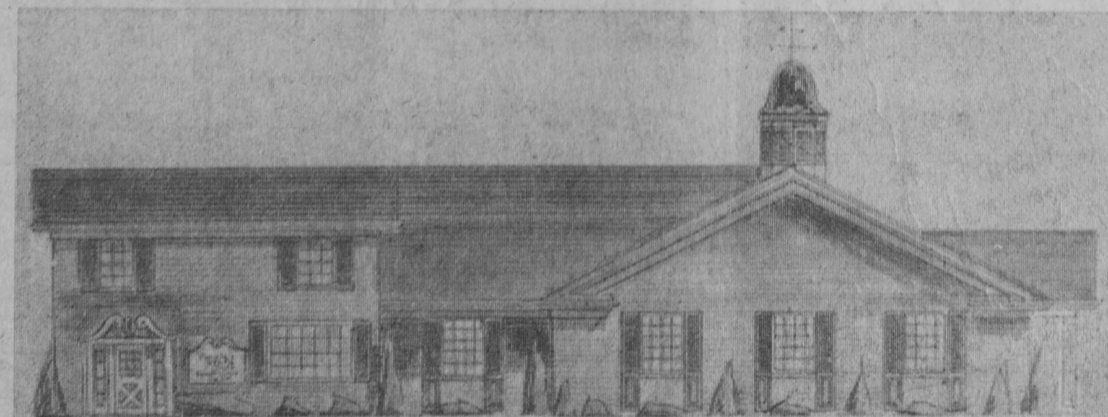

Sugar Diabetes Testing Set at Tawas Hospital

Tawas Hospital is participating in the free testing program for sugar diabetes, sponsored by the Michigan Diabetes Association, a United Fund service, in conjunction with the American Diabetes Association.

Testing will take place at Tawas Hospital Monday, November 17, through Saturday, November 22, from 7:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. Testing will be limited to those persons over 21 and to those who are not known diabetics. Those persons under 21 may receive the test upon request of the family doctor.

This service is made available to find and help as many as possible of the estimated 1,600,000 undetected diabetic men, women and children. At the same time, it reminds the public of the early indications of diabetes and the importance of early detection and control.

Diabetes Detection Week will be observed nationally as well as locally, November 16-22. Last year, 20 Michigan hospitals participated in this program. It is hoped that 200 hospitals will this year provide this valuable community service of free testing for sugar diabetes.

The Michigan Diabetes Association, as in other years, will provide the follow-up for confirmed "positives" by notifying each individual of the positive blood sugar and will recommend that a physician be consulted. Persons taking the test will not be contacted if the test is negative. If no notification is received within four weeks, those taking the test may assume that there was no evidence of diabetes.

On November 12, this newspaper will carry a full story and suggested breakfast menu which should be eaten one hour and 45 minutes before taking the test, as diabetes is best detected after such a meal is eaten.

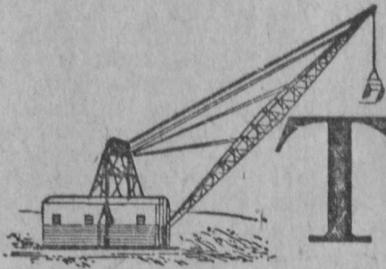

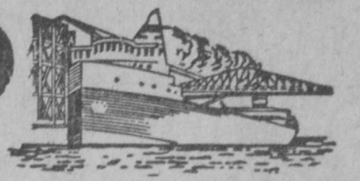

Start to Pour Footings

Work Starts on New Tawas City Plant

Work started Monday on construction of Maher Pattern and Manufacturing Company's new plant at Tawas City's industrial park on Ninth Avenue.

Richard Maher, owner, awarded a contract Wednesday to Vern Eckstein Construction Company, Tawas City, for construction of the building.

The plant is to be of concrete block construction with a 20 by 40-foot office, 40 by 100-foot manufacturing area and will contain 4,800 square feet of floor space. The three-acre site donated by the city has frontage on the railroad tracks with room for a siding.

During an inspection Wednesday of the site, Maher said he was anxious to get started on construction. "I have been most pleased with the cooperation shown in this project by city officials," he stated.

Explaining his intended operations here, Maher said he had been in the pattern making trade for 20 years and that his company at Warren is now five years old. It is a two-part operation—the manufacture of tooling and patterns for

other firms, as well as production of parts.

Maher said he had been planning several months for this new expansion. "To begin with," he said, "we will establish a production operation here to work on a military contract. Eventually, we hope to phase out of production at Warren and bring our entire operation here. We will have to wait and see how things work out."

Maher said it would be difficult at this time to determine the size of the work force to be employed at the new Tawas City plant. At present, the firm has 22 persons involved in production at Warren, but he said he would rather wait for completion of the building before making any comment in this regard.

"Naturally, much depends on recent cutbacks in military requirements. We have one fairly large contract to work on here. We have been producing parts for an amphibious vehicle used by the army and nearly the entire production went to Vietnam by air freight. Our main operation in Tawas City, to begin with, will be in the man-

ufacture of hardware for the army," he stated.

"We do not have a large operation," commented Maher, "but we do a lot of different things at Warren. There, we are basically a pattern-mold-tool maker, dealing with a major automobile companies and other manufacturing firms. Excluding production, we employ on the average of 10 pattern makers at Warren and we have had as many as 16 of these skilled tradesmen on our force."

"It is possible that, eventually, we will move our pattern making operation here, too. We would probably have a program for training local people as pattern makers, but that remains to be seen."

Maher said his firm has had a difficult time keeping up with government contracts during the past year and now hopes to get involved in a number of different production areas.

City Council Wants Fishing Ban Lifted

Immediate removal of the fishing ban on the Tawas River has been recommended to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources by the Tawas City Council.

In moving for adoption of his resolution Monday night, Alderman Howard Hatton said that the DNR had started work Monday on removal of the temporary weir at the south end of First Avenue.

In addition, Hatton said that the fishing ban from the weir to the mouth of the river was not being enforced by the DNR and believed that signs should be removed.

In other business, no objections were heard at a public hearing and zoning of all of Block 13, Wheeler's Second Addition, was changed from a multiple family district to B-1 commercial. This action had been requested by John and Sanford LeClair, two property owners in that block.

A contract was awarded to Ottawa Equipment Company for furnishing a 1970 Dodge dump truck for the department of public works. The Dodge bid of \$6,419.71, with trade allowance to \$495 on the city's 1956 truck, for a total of \$5,924.71, was low among four bids received.

Other bids included Inglis Ford Sales, Ford truck \$5,957; Ottawa Equipment Company, International truck, \$6,003.61. A bid by McKay Sales Company of \$5,594 did not include a non-slip rear end as per specifications. An accompanying letter indicated that price on this feature would not be available for about two weeks.

Area Boards Discuss Educational Reform

Members of five different boards of education of Iosco County met Monday night at Tawas Area High School for the first of what probably will become quarterly sessions to discuss mutual problems.

Guest at Monday night's session was State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City, who discussed educational reform legislation being proposed by Governor Milliken.

School board members were in attendance from Hale Area School, Whittemore-Prescott Area School, Oscoda Area School, Tawas Area School and Iosco Intermediate School District.

Prescott, who pointed out that he was not a member of the house committee on education, said he was not in favor of the entire educational reform package.

He also pointed out to those attending that he was one of only 12 state representatives living north of the Muskegon-Bay County line. He said that with 98 representatives, the area below that line would control any legislation. He believed, therefore, that if the governor's proposal wins downstate support it would be adopted.

Principal items opposed by Prescott in the governor's bill are

the 16-mill, state-wide property tax and removal of the credit on state income tax which presently benefits local government.

Prescott said his belief was that income has a direct relationship with taxes, especially in the northern area of the state where incomes are lower, and that the 16-mill property tax for school purposes was not real tax relief. In addition, he pointed out that a number of schools in his district currently have a levy higher than 16 mills and wondered how they would operate on less money.

He said, too, that he would like to see a definite limit on the proposed state property tax because, as it now stands this tax could go as high as 25 mills.

"I still like the idea of the Smith fair share operating plan to replace all property taxes for school operation with an income tax," said Prescott.

The Tawas City legislator said he had given considerable study to his bill introduced last week calling for a six-cent sales tax. Food and drugs would be exempted from this tax under Prescott's plan.

"The state presently has the collection agency established for this tax and it would not mean more new jobs to increase the collection cost. Exemption of food and drugs would mean a loss of about \$130,000,000, but an additional one cent on other items would more than balance this. By adding one more cent, the state would gain \$220,000,000 in taxes for school operation."

"I don't think that a sales tax is a regressive levy. The food and drug exemptions would help large families and senior citizens. Many people would rather pay their taxes a penny at a time rather than in a large lump sum at tax collection time," stated Prescott.

He said that one of the first bills being pushed by the governor is removal of the tax credit. Instead

of this money from state income tax being returned to local government, it would mean that about \$116,000,000 would be returned to the state. Prescott believed that this money was necessary to help finance local government and should not be removed.

He said that a number of legislators were opposed to the proposed five-cent tax on cigarettes. While it is believed that the tax would net the state about \$45,000,000 in one year, the tax would probably lead to cigarette "bootlegging."

A recent survey by Prescott indicated that residents of this district opposed increasing the cigarette tax. The survey also indicated that residents opposed aid to parochial schools by a two to one margin.

Prescott said that many legislators were concerned about teacher

Forest Chats

Huron-Manistee National Forest Tawas Ranger District
By Stuart Bailey, Forester

If you travel the road along the south side of the AuSable River in the next two weeks, you will probably see a drilling crew working. They are not drilling for oil! They are what is called a "seismic exploration crew." Their equipment includes a drilling rig and a lot of cables. The rig is used to drill a hole 40 to 100 feet deep into which is placed about one pound of dynamite. The cables are called geophones and are used to listen to the vibrations of the ground that originate when the dynamite is set off. The speed of these vibrations, which are echoes from different formations under the ground are recorded and eventually read by a scientist. When the scientist reads the recordings, he is able to chart how deep, how thick, how wide and how long are certain formations.

The seismic exploration work may cover several miles as this crew is doing. All the recordings made by the crew are charted and a map is composed of the underground formations that extend for many miles. This information is used by oil and/or natural gas companies to determine the extent of pockets of these minerals.

I am sure most of you have been reading about the wells that are "coming in" in various parts of the Lower Peninsula. These wells have hit pockets, but the size of the pockets are not known yet. This seismic exploration will help in finding that information.

What does this have to do with the forest service? (I thought you would never ask.) We are managing the resources on 100,000 acres of government-owned land within Iosco County. Part of managing is seeing that the resources are being used and used wisely. We are working with the oil companies to insure that some of our nonrenewable resources, such as soil and water, are not sacrificed in favor of another resource, such as oil. Also we must make sure that some of our renewable resources, such as timber and wildlife, will not be sacrificed unnecessarily. I guess you have heard of "multiple use" before.

Soldier in Vietnam Expresses Doubt Over War Situation

"I'm so confused any more, I don't really know what I'm supposed to be fighting for."

These were the words written by a serviceman in Vietnam to his parents in Tawas City. The serviceman, a former student at Tawas Area High School, was concerned by the news of the recent war moratorium.

"Doesn't anyone care whether we win any more?" was the question SP4 Clark C. Tanner asked his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clark Tanner, 404 Birch Street.

"There are a lot of guys here who do not believe in this war and who just want to go home. But they fight hard because they have to. I had a close friend like that. He was no coward either, but he just wanted to make it home. On July 29, he risked his life to pull back a wounded man and died doing it," said Tanner.

"If we pull out now, it is just like saying, 'Sorry 'bout that, son; too bad you had to die for our mistake.' We're so close to winning now, it would be one of the worst things that the United States could do to leave here now."

"Can't people see that. It would be admitting the 35,000 men who died here and the countless wounded were for nothing. People should know that the Communists won't stop here. I really wonder about the United States now," said Tanner.

He said that one of his chums "won't even go home now. He leaves here soon and is going directly to the Philippine Islands and is not even taking his leave. We have to help these people—he is really a downer."

Tanner, who has been serving in Vietnam since last spring, was recently awarded the Bronze Star medal with V device for heroism in ground combat.

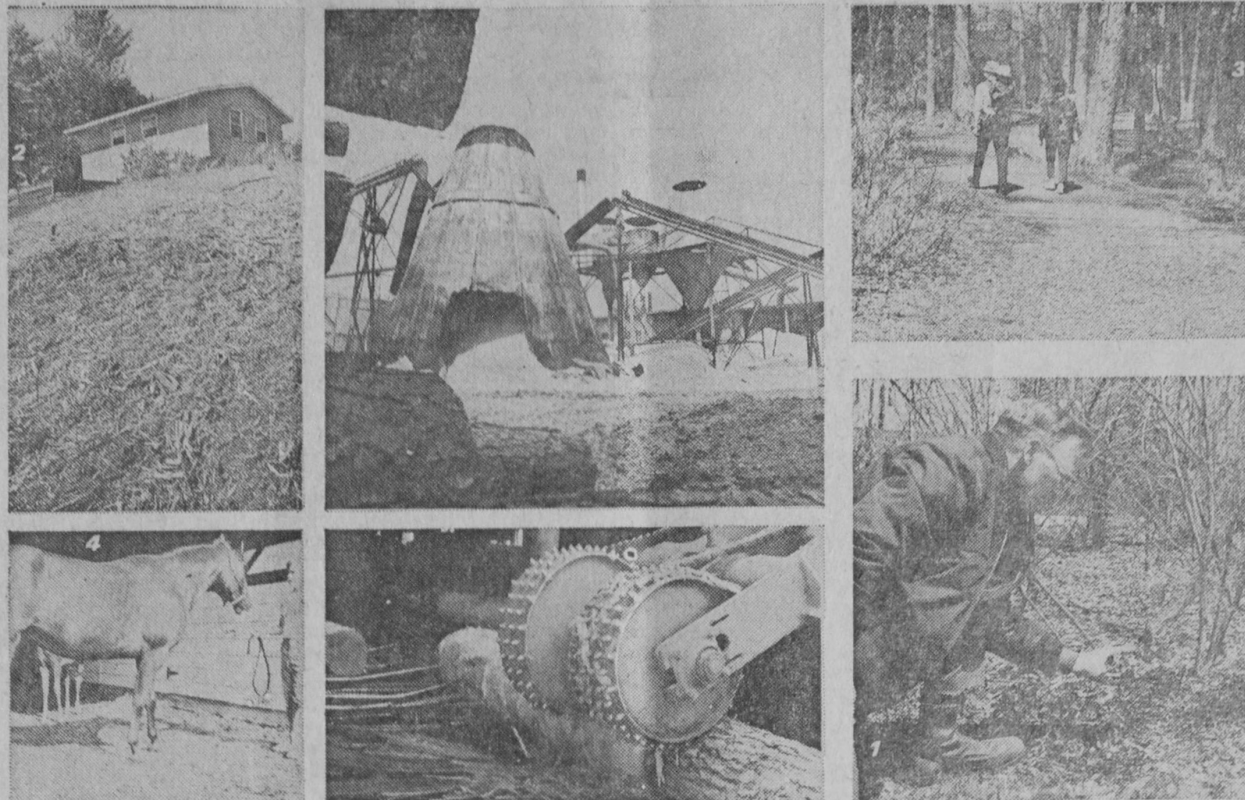

Big Future for Uses of Wood "Leftovers"



It wasn't too long ago that sawdust, bark, and wood chips were considered waste in mill operations. Today, they face a big future for a wide variety of uses in Michigan which could turn their disposal into a multimillion-dollar industry, reports the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). In breaking through the waste barrier to give sawmill operators a new profit-making edge, these by-products are gaining popularity for their use among home and cottage owners, campground enterprisers, horse and cattle raisers, and landscape architects. The reasons are many. Bark and sawdust do an excellent job of reducing weed growth and holding moisture around plants (Photo #1); they stabilize soil that tends to blow or wash away (Photo #2); they provide a good surface and hold down

dust problems around playgrounds, on trails, and in other high-use areas where it is hard to grow grass (Photo #3); they make excellent bedding for cattle and horses (Photo #4); they can be used as landscape material in place of grass or crushed stone. In marketing this material at modest prices to serve so many uses, sawmill operators are able to reduce the amount they have to burn. This is a good stroke of business both in curbing air pollution and wood disposal costs. DNR foresters brand as "untrue" any talk about these materials being toxic to the soil. The DNR's Forestry Division in Lansing has a list of all active sawmills in Michigan where people can get sawdust, bark, and wood chips to meet their needs. —Michigan Department of Natural Resources

Hale Area School Views \$356,175 Budget for 1969-70

The Hale Area School budget for the 1969-70 school year is \$356,175 with an expected income from all sources, state, local and federal, of \$360,000.

The largest item in the budget is for elementary instruction, \$120,025, which includes the summer remedial program and includes the addition of three more teachers to the staff this year to meet increased enrollment.

The secondary instruction program budget is at \$110,125. Hale Area is operating at the present short two teachers, home economics and another mathematics teacher, because no rooms are available. Home economics was dropped from the curriculum and Supt. Paul Southerland is filling in by teaching one mathematics class. Instruction includes all instructional supplies such as textbooks, art materials, etc.

Transportation is \$36,150. This includes another full route this year and purchasing a new bus.

Operation and maintenance of the school plant is \$44,900. This includes repairs, replacing equipment, fuel, electricity, custodian salaries, etc.

Fixed charges, which includes in-

urance, workmen's compensation, fidelity bonds, is at \$8,400.

Capital outlay is \$8,500. This includes furniture and equipment. An increase of 80 students made it necessary to buy more equipment and furniture.

The balance of the budget includes administration, attendance

services, health services, community services, student services, etc., for a total budget of \$356,175.

The hot lunch program has been operating at a loss and has been subsidized by the school board even though lunch prices were raised five cents this year.

The addition of two portable classrooms this year also increased the budget of 1969-70.

Special emphasis was given to various areas of the curriculum; \$1,090 was spent for the band and \$1,400 was given toward chemistry to provide more laboratory ex-

periences. An effort also is being made to add equipment to the shop and a new radial arm saw was recently purchased.

Income from federal sources and special grants will be \$10,900 this year. State sources of income, which includes transportation, forestry reserve, driver education, will be approximately \$113,270. The local sources will provide \$235,830, which is made up of 12 mills tax, charges for nonresident students, income from hot lunch program and resaleable supplies. The athletic program has been operating on its gate receipts.
