

# Court Election Surprises Area

Coming as a complete surprise to most residents, Iosco and Arenac Counties are to vote November 4 to determine if the two counties are to form a probate court district prior to the 1970 general election.

All 42 counties north of the Bay-Muskegon line are being forced to hold similar elections. Registration notices for the special election were published last week and this week. Estimated cost for holding this election in the two counties will run in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

While it is expected that costs for running the district court will be increased over the present handling by individual counties, promoters say the state's share of the operation will be increased, thereby reducing the cost to local taxpayers.

Salary of the new district judge, if approved by Iosco and Arenac, would be a minimum of \$20,000 per year. Judge William McCready presently receives a salary of \$8,200 per year. Judge Kenneth Ralph presently receives \$8,250 in Arenac County.

The proposed district court has been promoted by downstate probate judges, who seek higher pay, along with State Rep. Donald Holbrook Jr. of Clare.

Probate judges would no longer be able to practice law on the side, according to terms of the new district probate court setup. As a result, income of judges in smaller counties would decline.

The present law calls for the state to pay 50 percent of the minimum salary set for probate judges, based on population. The state provides \$3,750 to Iosco and \$3,250 to Arenac. Iosco adds \$4,450 to Judge McCready's salary, while Arenac adds \$5,000 to the salary of Judge Ralph.

It is expected that the increased cost to the state would be covered by increased fees charged for probate work.

One of the important duties of probate judges in smaller counties, apparently overlooked by promoters of the new probate district judge, is in the field of juvenile work.

In a report last May, Judge McCready's office had a case load of 20 juvenile offenders, all 16 years of age or under, as well as six

neglected children. Some 23 adoptions, which the probate office handles, were pending at the time.



**Fred Musolf Dead; Retired TC Fire Chief**

Frederick W. Musolf, retired chief of the Tawas City Volunteer Fire Department, died September 24 at Tawas Hospital. Funeral services were held September 26 at Zion Lutheran Church, with burial in the church cemetery. The Rev. Robert Beyer officiated.

Born March 16, 1898, in Tawas City, he grew to manhood here. He was employed in the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company shop from 1915 through 1924, then entered the employment of United States Gypsum Company at Alabaster, from which he retired October 1, 1963, after a 38-year career.

At Alabaster, Musolf was credited with the development of a high speed twist bit for rotary drills used in the quarry. The bits designed by Musolf and manufactured by him in the USG shop proved to be far superior to those purchased commercially.

Musolf had suffered a stroke early in 1963, forcing his retirement as volunteer fire chief in Tawas City, a position which he had held for more than 20 years.

Starting as a volunteer fireman in the early 1920s, he had been associated with a city function longer than any other person in the community's history.

He is survived by one son, Willard of Oscoda; three daughters, Mrs. Marjorie Baelawski of Kensington, Maryland, Mrs. Janet Smith of Tawas City and Mrs. Joan Gowin of St. Joseph; 16 grandchildren; one brother, Martin Musolf of Bay City; three sisters, Mrs. Elsie Samson of Pelston, Mrs. Freda Nuerminger of Saginaw and Mrs. Celia Klennow of East Tawas.

## 'Coho Blues' No Hit Tune Fishermen Crowd Bay, But Few Coho Taken

Following several action packed days of fishing last week, the "Coho Blues" were sung Saturday and Sunday on Tawas Bay as fishing pressure increased and catches remained about the same or lower than the previous week-end.

Despite much unfavorable publicity in downstate newspapers, Tawas Bay from a point south of Townline Road to the Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas was jammed with boats of all shapes and sizes.

An estimated 300 boats were on the bay both Saturday and Sunday. About 100 salmon were taken over the week-end, slightly lower than the previous week but the percentage of success was much less due to the larger number of fishermen on the bay.

Fishermen were concentrated Saturday morning in the vicinity of the Tawas River mouth, then moved up the bay Sunday to a point offshore from the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office. There, the fish were seen breaking water, but, frustrating to fishermen, the coho did not seem to care for any of the lures being offered.

The opposite was true throughout most of last week as the coho were apparently hitting at any type of bait being thrown at them. Attendants at Tawas City's launching ramps on Ninth Avenue reported that 315 boats were launched there over the week-end, 170 on Saturday and 145 on Sunday. East Tawas' launching ramp east of the state police post reported heavy usage, as did facilities at Coho City Marina and Jerry's Marina.

There is continued optimism that a salmon run in Lake Huron like the one that jammed many parts of Lake Michigan with eager anglers is near. But it is becoming increasingly clear that coho will not be taken in large quantities on the east side of the state this year.

Three basic reasons for a smaller than expected coho run in Lake Huron this fall include extensive netting of salmon this spring by commercial fishermen from Canada, the lamprey attack and smaller plantings of salmon in Lake Huron than in Lake Michigan.

"There are 50 percent fewer salmon in Lake Huron than we could

have expected if Canadian fishermen had not taken their toll," states David Borgeson, trout-salmon specialist for the Department of Natural Resources. "Although we planted 500,000 coho in the spring of 1968, past history shows no more than 20 percent of these fish survive their first year."

Department of Natural Resources officials claim that 90 percent of the salmon coming into Thunder Bay at Alpena and the Tawas River have lamprey scars on them.

The lamprey problem this year was compared by Jerry Manz of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, to be one that helped destroy the lake trout population in the 1940s. "There is an abundance of lamprey in Lake Huron. They do not have enough to eat and they have been chasing salmon into the rivers," he said.

Mortality rate of the salmon will not be known until late November or early December, when salmon runs will be completed in the Tawas River and Ocqueoc River.

Unlike the commercial netting situation, lamprey control in Lake Huron is near. In 1970, only the AuSable River will be a major producer of lamprey since it is the only river not treated chemically this year. All other areas leading to Lake Huron have been chemically treated. The results will show up in 1970.

The AuSable will be treated in 1970 with lamprey control expected in 1971. The river was not treated this year because of the cost. These chemical treatments were started in the early 1960s on Lake Michigan tributaries. Lake Michigan is now 90 percent free of the lamprey problem.

A number of sports fishermen in the Tawas area believe that the 90 percent figure used by the DNR for fish bearing scars of lamprey attacks is too high.

### Ferguson Now Detective Sergeant

William M. Ferguson, formerly assigned to the East Tawas Post, Michigan State Police, as a trooper, has been promoted to detective sergeant. He has been assigned to the fire marshal division at East Lansing.

Ferguson joined the state police in 1956, serving first at East Tawas and later at Battle Creek. Prior to his promotion, he was a detective in the fire marshal division at Detroit.

He is married to the former Lorraine Welch of East Tawas.

## 77-Student Increase on Fourth Friday

An increase of 77 students over the previous year was noted by administrators of Tawas Area School in preparing the fourth Friday enrollment count, used to compute state aid payments.

Supt. Reynolds Mick said Tuesday that the elementary enrollment was 916 pupils, an increase of 23; junior high enrollment is 344, an increase of 21; high school enrollment is 661, an increase of 33.

Total enrollment is 1,935 students, as compared to 1,858 in 1968-69. This includes 14 students enrolled in special education for both years, but does not include approximately 28 persons enrolled in adult high school.

The superintendent said that between 35 and 40 parochial students entered the public school this term and between 80 and 90 new students in the area entered school here. He said that a complete analysis of enrollment figures, including those students moving away, would be given at a later date.

Enrollment figures as of Friday were as follows: Kindergarten, 125 as compared to 121 last year; first grade, 113, as compared to 173; second grade, 142, as compared to

116; third grade, 123, as compared to 101; fourth grade, 111, as compared to 131; fifth grade, 139, as compared to 129; sixth grade, 150, as compared to 122; elementary special education, 13, none last year.

Junior high enrollment included seventh grade, 184, an increase of 20; eighth grade, 160, an increase of one.

High school figures included ninth grade, 178, as compared to 163 in 1968-69; 10th grade, 173, a loss of 10; 11th grade, 171, an increase of 6; 12th grade, 141, an increase of four.

## 15 Percent Hike in Hale A. Enrollment

According to an announcement by Supt. Paul Southerland of Hale Area School, the official fourth Friday count for 1969 is 620, an increase of 80 students, representing a 15 percent increase over last year's count. The increase has accelerated each year.

The school has 21 teaching stations including the shop and two portables added this year. Based on 25 students per station, the capacity is 525 students. Presently, the school has 95 students over capacity.

Should the same increase result next year and to take care of the 95 student overload existing now, it would take seven additional portable classrooms, which represents an expenditure of approximately \$100,000 to provide the portables with furniture, plumbing and installation costs for facilities

that are classified only as temporary structures.

Millage will have to be voted on to provide temporary structures or permanent structures. Use of buildings in the community, if they meet state specifications and approval, would also mean millage for rental and furnishing.

### Armed Forces Manpower Cut to Effect Wurtsmith

As the result of an ordered armed forces manpower cutback by the defense department, about 320 officers and enlisted men are to be trimmed from Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

The cutback is to be based on the release of enlisted men scheduled to leave the air force between February 1 and June 30, 1970, about two months prior to their scheduled date of separation.

Release dates for officers will vary according to individual situation and status, an air force spokesman said. Some 3,000 air force personnel are stationed at the base near Oscoda.

An air force spokesman said Tuesday that the full impact of the cutback will not be known until a review of personnel records is completed later this week.

### File Negligence Suit in Iosco Court

An auto negligence civil suit seeking damages totaling \$150,000 was filed in Iosco Circuit Court by Allen J. Clark of Oscoda against Kilpatrick Forest Products Company and its driver, David A. McQuarrie, Ossineke, Alpena County.

On January 15, 1969, Clark was driving a pickup north on State Street, Oscoda Township. He alleges that he stopped preparatory to make a left turn and was struck from the rear by a tractor truck driven by McQuarrie.

Clark claims that because of McQuarrie's negligence, he sustained severe and permanent injuries and asks the court to allow damages of \$125,000. In the same suit, Clark's wife, Betty Jane, asks for a judgment of \$25,000.

## Red Feather Drive Set for October 13-26

Although a campaign chairman is yet to be named, dates of October 13-26 have been set for the annual financial campaign of the Tawas-Whittemore Area Community Chest.

Goal for this year's red feather drive is \$14,243, about five percent higher than last year.

Five cochairmen named for the drive are John Forsten, Albert Duquette, Mrs. Edward Savage, Mrs. George Kindell and John Skrocki.

The Tawas Chamber of Commerce office is to again be used as campaign headquarters and Mrs. James DeWyse is to act as secretary for the campaign.

Budget hearings for the 1969 campaign were held September 16-17 at the county building. Mrs. George Prescott had charge of the meetings.

The following budget was adopted: Boy Scouts of America, \$2,100; American Red Cross, \$2,600; Girl Scouts of America, \$500; Michigan United Fund, \$2,643; local youth activities, \$1,300; Salvation Army, \$1,000; Lutheran Social Services, \$600; Michigan Children's Aid Society, \$1,400; Catholic Family Service, \$1,400; operational fund, \$800.

## Hurt Saturday in Dune Buggy Crash

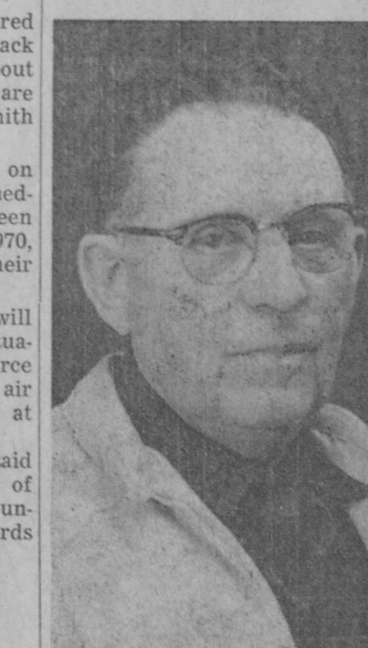
A Bay City man was injured Saturday when the dune buggy which he was operating crashed into a dirt bank located on private property in Plainfield Township.

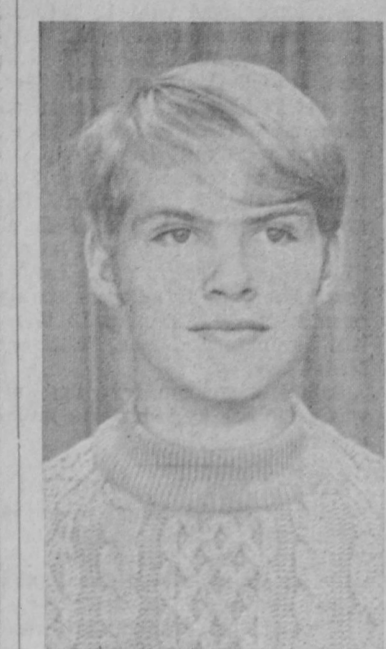

## Braves Beat Panthers; NBC Showdown Friday With Oscoda

With the defense turning in its hardest-hitting game in four years, Tawas Area Braves downed Standish-Sterling's Panthers, 26-8, in Northern B Conference action Friday night.

This sets the stage for the renewal of traditional rivalry this Friday night when the unbeaten Oscoda Owls invade the wigwam of the Braves. Tawas' record now stands at two wins and a tie.

The two Isosco squads should be fairly evenly matched, with Oscoda holding a slight edge in its aerial attack. The Braves of Coach Steve Sventko and his assistant, Roger Spencer, probably will be making some defensive adjustments this week to meet this passing threat.

The Braves will be going into the game looking for revenge, having tasted defeat at the hands of the Owls for the past two years. Tawas' last win over Oscoda was in 1966, when the Braves upset the Owls, 19-7.

Tawas' chances will depend a lot on the recovery of Lyle Klingner, who sustained a sprained ankle in Friday night's battle with the Panthers. Klingner was second leading ground gainer against Standish-Sterling. Also injured in that game was Fullback Mike Glancy, who topped the squad's running attack with 89 yards.

That the Braves were hitting hard Friday night was evidenced by three first quarter fumbles by the Panthers. Tawas kicked off to Standish-Sterling and recovered a fumble on the 30. The Braves moved only eight yards and the Panthers took over on their own 22.

Standish-Sterling moved the ball to the 35, but another hard tackle jarred the ball loose and Tawas recovered. Halfback Ron Ullman immediately scampered 30 yards for a touchdown, but this was called back on a penalty. Tawas finally drove to the three-yard line, but the Panther defense stood up to the test and recovered a fumble at that point.

After another Panther fumble on the 21, Klingner and Glancy combined running chores for five plays and Klingner went over for the touchdown from six yards out. The kick from placement was wide.

Standish-Sterling took the next kick and, after six plays, was forced to punt. The Braves moved the ball from their own 48 in 11 plays to score. Bill Cholger converted the last two yards. Mike Greenlee converted the PAT from placement.

The third quarter found Tawas receiving the opening kick. In 13 plays, Glancy scored the TD from two yards out.

Another Standish-Sterling fumble set up a touchdown when Tawas recovered on the 33. This drive was capped by Tawas' second string backfield scoring the touchdown. Craig Herriman picking up 14 yards and Chris King adding 12 yards. Herriman went over to score.

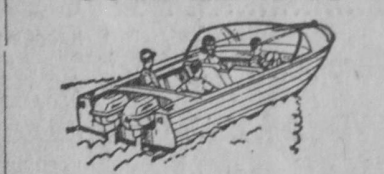
