Herbert Ostrander, Horse Trainer, Died Friday Night

Herbert Ostrander, 62, well-known trainer of harness racing horses in Iosco and Arenac Counties, died Friday night after apparently falling and striking his head while riding in the back of a pickup truck at Whittemore. Investigating Iosco Sheriff's Department officers said that Ostrander apparently climbed into the back of a truck at Whittemore. When the truck reached its destination, only a block away, he was found unconscious in the bottom of the truck box. Officers believed he had fallen as the truck was moving and struck his head. Driver of the truck was identified as Percy Bronson of Tawing. Ostrander was dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital. E. John Moffatt, Iosco County coroner, ruled death was caused by a concussion. He had worked as a horse trainer for George Grabow of Whittemore. He was a veteran of World War II. Surviving are his wife, Florence; a daughter, Mrs. Donald Strong of Gladwin; three grandchildren; four great grandchildren; one sister. Funeral services were held Tuesday at Porshee Funeral Home, Tawing, with burial in Cedar Valley Cemetery.

OK Classroom Expansion Study at Tawas Area

Study of possible expansion of classrooms at Tawas Area High School to meet rising enrollment was authorized Monday night by the board of education. At the same time, a recommendation was heard from one trustee relative to splitting the school day into two shifts so as to eliminate the need for any new construction. According to a report last month and reiterated Monday night, all classrooms are practically filled to capacity. There is one room in the high school which is free three periods a day.

Projected enrollments indicate that the school will become even more overcrowded when the present sixth grade enters junior high school and the present seventh and eighth grades enter high school. "Now is the time to give consideration to the problem—we cannot wait until next spring," emphasized Trustee Leonard Sarki. As a result of his motion, the board is to contact the school architect to study the possibility of adding four or five classrooms on the east side of the high school's west wing. The proposed classrooms would be located in the school's court area. The only dissenting vote came from Trustee Robert Elliott, who said he was opposed to building any additional classrooms until a complete study is made concerning the possibility of splitting the school day into two shifts. Elliott said that the split shift idea had been discussed at the recent convention of the Michigan Association of Boards of Education and he believed it had merit, as it would mean that existing facilities would be fully utilized. Other members of the board indicated that full consideration would be given to the split shift idea. Under this plan, the school day for some students would possibly run from 7:00 a. m. until 12 o'clock noon, followed by a second shift from noon until 6:00 p. m. Actual headcount enrollment in the school this year is 1,934 students, as compared to 1,858 last term. Adult high school, along with nonpublic school students participating in band and physical education (based on actual hours in class), brings the total to 1,966. While enrollment in elementary

grades increased from 893 to 916, the most serious overcrowding is in junior high school and high school where total enrollment is now 1,018, as compared to 965 last term. Tawas Area School has had a net gain of 127 students in comparison with last year's enrollment. This included parochial students entering the public schools. If entrants and exits due to parochial students are excluded, there have been 78 new students entering Tawas Area since school closed in June. Pupils are fairly evenly divided this year in all grades, with a slightly higher increase in kindergarten through grade six. Fifteen kindergarten pupils are present beyond the school census of 1967. If these are added to the total, incoming students have increased five percent for the year. This year's sixth grade numbers 150 pupils, as compared to 122 last term. The seventh grade numbers 184, an increase of 20 over last term. Supt. Reynold Mick said present elementary classrooms are adequate, although there is no additional space for special education.

Supervisors Making Final Budget Study

Discussion on a \$602,757.75 operational budget for 1970 started Monday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors, meeting for its four or five-day October session. The new budget is scheduled for tentative adoption Thursday morning, but official action cannot be taken until after a public hearing in November. The new budget is \$14,330 lower than the preliminary figure adopted in April, but actual expenditure in 1970 for county operation is expected to be \$54,000 higher than the actual budget included in the preliminary figure. This was brought about by the fact that an item of \$54,000 was added to the \$563,087.75 preliminary budget to repay a deficit anticipated in 1969 for county operation. This deficit has been unexpectedly wiped out by an increase in state income tax payments to the county (about \$4,000 per quarter), increased revenue from the district court (about \$15,000) an improved tax collection in the county (about \$27,000) and interest (about \$5,000) received on short term investments. According to J. Berkeley Smith, county finance chairman, the new budget would be met by a tax collection of \$457,190, based on 4.80 mills granted by the allocation board last spring, along with \$145,567.75 in fees from county offices. He said that a number of factors had contributed toward increasing the actual budget from its tentative level last April. The \$54,000 which had been deemed necessary to pay the expected 1969 deficit will now be spent in seven different categories. On Monday, the board approved a \$5,500 expenditure from the county general fund to assist local units of government in purchasing ambulances. The local units had applied for federal assistance, purchased three ambulances, then were denied federal funds. The local units had paid \$11,000 toward the ambulance purchase and were considering a second identical assessment to each unit to

District Health Unit Offering Tuberculin Tests to Freshmen

"We aim to offer every ninth grader in Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties a tuberculin skin test as part of a special statewide program this year," said William F. Jackson, M. D., director of the District No. 2 Health Department. "Through the ninth grade testing program, all students tested will know if they've been exposed to TB and, secondly, we will have an index of TB infection in our area to compare with the state-wide results." All ninth grade students in public and private schools in the counties served by District Health Department No. 2 will be offered the test. This will involve a total of 1,100 ninth graders. Consent cards approving the testing will be sent home to the parents of all ninth graders and must be signed in order for the students to be tested. The program will begin on November 3, and is scheduled for completion by November 14. The testing date for each school will later be announced by the health department. The purpose of the special statewide testing program is to determine the index of tuberculosis infection in ninth grade students. Based on the information gained from the program, new guidelines will be developed by state health authorities proposing surveillance programs for areas with low infection rates and intensive activities for areas with high rates. Ninth graders have been chosen because the bulk of the teenagers are still in school at this time. Also, testing students at this age level provides an indirect index of the TB problem in their families and in the communities in relation to the infecting of children by adults. Doctor Jackson said, "For uniformity, the Mantoux skin test will be used here and state-wide and previous reactors will be encouraged to be retested for this special program."

Supervisors Open Busy Oct. Session

Iosco Board of Supervisors, soon to be called the county board of commissioners following adoption of a new state law, is holding a busy October session this week. One of the first items of discussion Monday morning was status of the proposed Tawas Lake Dam. John G. Kleekamp, president of the Tawas Lake Association, made an appearance and asked for information. Such a dam has been under discussion and consideration for a number of years. The latest action apparently was in December 1968, when it was recommended that a feasibility study be commenced. A communication from the drain commissioner, John Mielock, indicated that an order would be required from the supervisors to commence condemnation of land for the dam. Sup. Carlton Merschel suggested that a feasibility study was necessary because of a possible health problem which might arise through possible problems with septic tanks. He suggested that the state health department make a study. In other business, appointment of K. Berkeley Smith, Republican, and Harold Peterson, Democrat, was approved for the county canvassing board. Members of the board were invited to attend a tour October 24 of the AuGres River watershed. Sup. Jack Allen reported that a meeting is to be held October 22 with the United Mine Workers for negotiations on a contract with sheriff's department deputies. Sup. Clement Stephan reported that an old barn located at the rear of the county jail had been removed at a cost of \$200. Representatives of the Alpena Mental Health Center were present at Monday's meeting and stated they would be interested in obtaining office facilities in any proposed expansion of the Iosco Medical Care Facility, now under consideration by the county building authority for the department of public health.

Custodians Receive Full Family Insurance

Full family hospitalization for six custodians and one maintenance worker was granted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. The board denied a request from bus drivers for full family hospitalization, but granted an additional \$95 salary for the year. It was felt that bus drivers are not full time employees and not eligible for the insurance. Some 15 drivers will share in the \$1,425 salary increase package. In other business, the board discussed general guidelines for health insurance specifications to be submitted to various companies wishing to bid on providing this service to the school. A special meeting is to be held October 30 by the board for presentation by each firm bidding. Carl Helmer, board president, named Dr. James Jacques, Leonard Sarki and Clare Herriman as the board's employee relations committee. The board authorized taking of bids on furnishing three new school buses. Authorization was given to the English department for a field trip to Central Michigan University by 65 sophomore college preparatory English students. To be held Tuesday, October 21, students are to tour the CMU library and campus. Miss Clara Bolan reported that six new elementary students had entered school Monday morning.

Seek Opinions on Parking Meters

At its last regular meeting, Tawas City Council asked that its street committee meet and study the feasibility and possibility of installing meters in Tawas City. As a result of the street committee meeting, it was suggested that persons interested or having opinions concerning parking meters, either pro or con, get in touch with members of the council and express opinions on this matter. Committee members said this was necessary in order to obtain a cross section of public opinion to better justify or reject the project.

Miniskirts and Supermarkets Spark Hosiery Sales Spurt

If your wife explains that \$1.99 expenditure on her supermarket shopping list as "Ugly Ducklings," do not expect to see them served for Sunday dinner with orange sauce.

To your wife and daughter, they are a new kind of hosiery with a "memory" that makes them fit every body.

And you, as a businessman, might take special interest in them because they typify the reasons behind the biggest boom in the hosiery industry since the introduction of nylon.

Last year's record 103,800,000 dozen pairs represents a whopping 185 percent increase over 1962—all the more spectacular because it followed a decade of sales dormancy. And a one-third sales jump is projected for 1969 over 1968.

Two major trends are helping to revitalize United States hosiery sales:

Miniskirts are the hosiery industry's best friend. Women now are buying an average of 24 pairs of stockings a year. And minis also helped capture an ever-growing share of the market for pantyhose (stockings which go all the way to the waist). A relative new comer to the hosiery field, pantyhose accounted for 20 percent of 1968 hosiery purchases. They will be up to almost a third this year. And the industry believes that more than half the women in the United States will be wearing pantyhose by 1972.

Supermarkets are the second big trend. Hosiery sales in supermarkets were so low in 1965 that they were not even considered in national totals. Last year, for the first time, more women bought their stockings in supermarkets than in major department stores. Stockings are among the non-food items which now account for at

least 20 percent of the weekly "food" bill. And now supermarkets are moving into the forefront as innovators rather than "me-too's" in hosiery fashions.

Those Jubilee Products' Ugly Ducklings your wife bought, in between the soap flakes and the cabbage, tell the story.

They are a new kind of stocking which solves fitting problems which have been plaguing the industry for years.

They are pantyhose and they come in fashion colors. Gone are the days when the shopper had a choice akin to Henry Ford's black cars—one color, dubbed "super-market beige."

And the new stockings are being introduced at Kroger Food Stores in this area, rather than in the more traditional fashion outlets.

For years, the hosiery industry has pursued the elusive stocking which could be carried in one size to fit all women. Old-fashioned, so-called "one-size" hose actually could be worn by only about 80 percent of women and few of those had what they considered an "ideal" fit.

Pantyhose caused further complications. The industry began receiving complaints from women who were very small ("they wrinkle") or extra tall ("I can't bend").

Perhaps because Ugly Ducklings concentrated on the final result rather than the initial impression, they succeeded where others failed.

"Fanny-looking" is the kindest way to describe the appearance of Ugly Ducklings as they come from the package. "They look like they're made for a wrinkled mid-get," was the quizzical reaction of one five-foot, 11 inch girl who had never before been able to wear "one-size" pantyhose and had difficulty being fitted at any price.

But she had a perfect fit, as did her five-foot tall girlfriend, and other test subjects in assorted sizes who reported previous fitting difficulties.

There are two secrets: First, Ugly Ducklings are "unboarded." Traditional hosiery is stretched to a certain size over board forms and then heat-treated to retain that size. In the process, however, they lose stretchability. Unboarded hosiery retains more stretching power and is, in a sense, shaped by the legs of the individual wearer.

But something more was needed, and that is where the second secret came into the picture. It is a new yarn called "Downyloft" which is fantastically flexible yet "remembers" its original shape and returns to that when laundered. Perfectly balanced temperature controls during manufacture help to retain this capability.

The hosiery industry is buoyed up by such new developments and by what they feel will be continued feminine interest in hosiery styles. And it is enjoying the arithmetic of mini and micro adding up to maxi sales.

What is more, a whole new market has opened up. The mother who wore bobby-sox until after she graduated from college in the 1950s is finding that her seventh grade daughter is demanding pantyhose to wear to school!

SAC 'World Series' Held in Washington

The Strategic Air Command (SAC) 1969 "World Series of Bombing" was conducted October 7-13 at Fairchild Air Force Base, Washington, featuring SAC's top bomber crews.

The bomber crews, backed by the best maintenance men in the command, matched their flying and bombing skills—without dropping a bomb—in SAC's 16th combat competition.

Twenty-four SAC bomber crews, flying B-52 Stratofortresses and B-59 Hustlers, plus three British Royal Air Force crews flying Vulcans, competed for the coveted Fairchild Trophy, individual awards and championship title.

SSgt. Donald L. Gaither was crew chief on the B-52 selected to

represent the 379th Bomb Wing at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. He is the son of Mrs. Wilda Beck and Henry Gaither of Lafayette, Indiana.

The honor of being chosen to support their unit's entry in the competition is awarded to maintenance men on the basis of technical skill, proficiency and consistent outstanding performance.

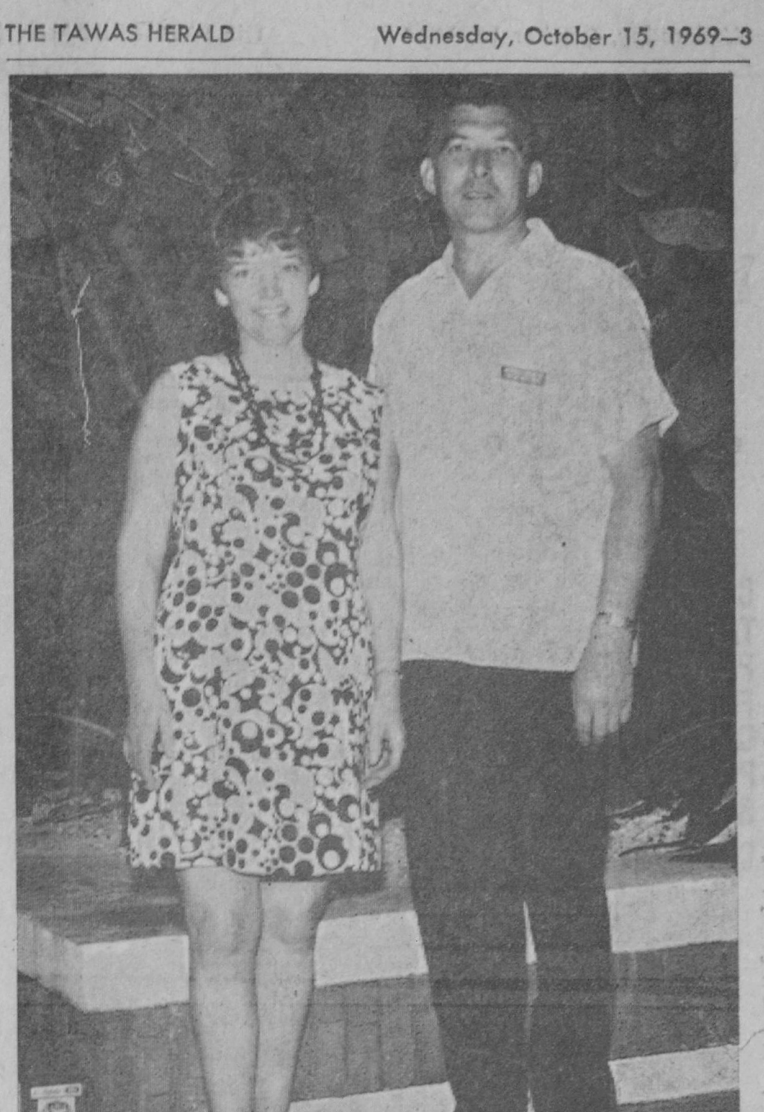
During the competition each crew flew two round-robin missions of 2,500 miles from Fairchild Air Force Base, encompassing high and low simulated bombing and pinpoint navigation. Missions last about six hours.

Three mobile radar sites, each covering four targets near Harvey, North Dakota; Moberge, South Dakota, and Great Falls, Montana, tracked and scored the aircraft and crews on the accuracy of their "bombs."

The accuracy of the simulated bomb releases is computed electronically by the mobile sites from their record of release signal. The score is combined with navigation points earned for the total score.

The wing amassing the highest number of points in combined bombing and navigation was awarded the Fairchild Trophy.
