### Retired AB Utility Chief Died Oct. 17

Frederick T. Luedtke, 76, former Tawas City businessman and retired superintendent of utilities at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, died suddenly at his home Friday, October 17.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Emanuel Lutheran Church, Tawas City, with burial in the church cemetery.

Born February 28, 1893, in Tawas City, he was in the plumbing business here for 21 years. He later worked 20 years as a civil service employee at Wurtsmith.

Mr. Luedtke was a veteran of World War I and a past commander of Jesse C. Hodder Post, American Legion.

Mr. Luedtke and the former Miss Louise L. Schanbeck of East Tawas were married June 28, 1917.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Frederick E. of Mt. Clemens and Neil E. of East Tawas; two daughters, Mrs. Louise F. Giegerich of Tawas City and Mrs. Ruth J. Wright of Madison Heights; 11 grandchildren, and two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Haglund of East Tawas and Mrs. Minnie Waack of Lansing.

### Oscoda Park Grant OK'd by DNR

Matching fund grant of \$36,950 has been approved by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for construction of a new Oscoda Township park on Lake Huron.

The funds are part of the state recreation bond money approved by Michigan voters last November.

According to Marvin Davenport, chairman of the county parks and recreation commission, Iosco's share of the project would be about \$9,000.

The \$3.3 acre development will have restrooms and a bathroom. There will be parking space for about 250 cars.

### Court Street Study OK'd by TC Council

Tawas City Council directed its street committee to study possible improvements to Court Street with a view toward incorporation into next year's street construction plan.

Appearing before Monday night's regular meeting were seven property owners, who believed that traffic on the street warranted improvements.

Residents said that the street presented numerous problems to property owners, including flooding, dust in the summer, icy conditions in the winter and generally rough travel conditions.

It was pointed out that Court Street was an important arterial to US-23, that it was used by truck traffic and residents believed it was second only to First Street in the amount of traffic handled.

Court Street has been a maintenance problem for many years. The street is 33 feet wide as compared to the standard width of 66 feet, and is bounded on the north by the railroad tracks.

It was pointed out that one of the principal problems is drain-

age and about 2,000 feet of storm sewer would be necessary to drain the street. Cost of storm sewer is running from \$3.50 to \$3.75 per foot.

During the past three years, 300 yards of gravel have been placed on the street. Residents said that traffic on the street has thrown most of the gravel on yards or the railroad right-of-way. Residents of the area asked that the street be drained and that it be included in the city's blacktopping program.

John St. James, mayor pro tem, who presided over the meeting during the absence of Mayor R. A. Rollin Sr., said he and the city superintendent had inspected the street and believed that something should be done to remove water standing at several intersections.

In adopting Alderman Martin Wellna's resolution calling for Court Street to be considered in next year's construction program, councilmen expressed the opinion that all work should be done on a priority established by the street committee, based on money available.

## City's Industrial Group Secures Plant

In operation slightly more than three months, Tawas City Industrial Authority has landed its first new plant for the community.

At Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council, John St. James, a member of the industrial authority, presented a building application for Maher Pattern and Manufacturing Company of Warren for construction of a new building.

To be located on the city's industrial site west of Ninth Avenue, the new building will be located just north of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway tracks across from Tawas Tube Manufacturing Company.

The concrete block building will have a 20 by 40-foot office, 40 by 100-foot manufacturing area and will contain 4,800 square feet of floor space.

The firm is presently located at Warren and will move its entire operation here. St. James said that he and two other committee mem-

bers, George Myles and Hugo Keiser, had been in contact with this firm for the past two months.

St. James said that Richard Maher, owner, is expected to be in the city later this week to make arrangements for letting a contract in the very near future to construct the building.

"Mr. Maher will announce his plans for the new manufacturing plant, along with the type of operation expected and the number of employees, at that time," said St. James.

The council gave its approval directing the mayor and clerk to approve a deed transferring a 200,000 square-foot site owned by the city to the industrial firm, at a purchase cost of \$1. As a protection to city interests, the deed is to be held in escrow until the building is completed.

The three-acre site has 580 feet of frontage along the railroad tracks with provisions for a siding. Plans call for construction of an asphalt drive entirely around the

building, with employee and visitor parking areas.

Property contained in this first parcel comprises about one-fifth of the city's industrial site. Slightly less than 14 acres remain in the entire city-owned parcel.

The property was purchased last year from Gordon Clute, Wa-

ter, sewer, power and natural gas are available at the site.

City councilmen were highly complimentary of the work of the industrial authority, which has held numerous meetings during the past two months in working out details with this first prospect.

St. James told councilmen Mon-

day night that the industrial authority has a number of other prospects and would now begin to concentrate on bringing in additional industrial firms.

The council established a \$200 fund to be used by the authority to defray incidental expenses.

St. James said that, while per-

sonal contact was probably one of the most important steps in landing an industrial prospect, he felt that the new sign south of the city limits advertising the industrial site was very beneficial. He is hoping that this new sign may be lighted at a future date in order to make it even more effective.

### Dislike Milliken's Plan Supervisors Oppose State Property Tax

Iosco Board of Supervisors went on record Thursday as opposing Gov. William Milliken's proposal to the legislature to finance school operation with a state property tax.

The board's resolution declared that it opposed any state-control of property taxation to finance education or for any other purpose.

Copies of the resolution were sent to boards of supervisors of all counties in the state, to the governor, to State Rep. George A. Prescott and State Sen. Robert Richardson.

In other business during the four-day October session, the board met with members of the county parks and recreation to discuss establishment of rules and regulations under which the commission is to operate.

The commission reported that projects to provide bathroom and toilet facilities at three parks are now being processed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Included are Oscoda Township Park, with a total cost of \$40,200 of which \$9,240 would be paid locally; Old Orchard Park, total cost of \$42,000, with \$8,400 in local participation; AuSable River Park, \$36,000, with a local cost of \$7,600.

It was reported that plans for a park in Plainfield Township are to be discussed at the commission's next meeting on December 2.

The board approved participation with the state in a county marine safety program. Total cost of the program is \$15,000, of which the state would pay two-thirds.

Approval was given to the budget of the Northeastern Michigan Mental Health Board, Alpena. Total budget is \$288,425, with \$15,000 shared by participating counties. Cost to Iosco County would be \$2,850.

Authorization was given to Consumers Power Company to relocate street lights at Lumbermen's Monument.

Approval was given to pay \$975 to Yeo and Yeo Certified Public Accountants for auditing justice of the peace accounts, \$500 was paid to Tawas Chamber of Commerce for county advertising, \$2,900 was paid to the Northeastern Child Guidance Clinic at Alpena.

Other appropriations included \$416 to the East Central Michigan Economic Development District and \$1,750 to the probate court for purchase of new recording equipment.

The board approved terms of a lease with the county building authority for rental of the sheriff's garage and airport hangars. This money from the general fund is to pay off bonds under a lease agreement with the commission.

A proposal to use money from the general fund for maintaining VanEtan Lake dam was referred to the conservation committee and to the prosecuting attorney. The county has paid \$810 out of the re-

volving fund over the past two years to maintain this dam, but the old board of supervisors, in 1967-68, instructed that the funds be repaid to the county when taxes were spread by the township.

According to information given at the meeting, the special assessment district which financed maintenance of the dam has expired. In February of this year, the board instructed the drain commissioner to re-establish the special assessment district. It was the opinion of several supervisors that should the county pay the maintenance on the VanEtan Lake dam, it would have to pay maintenance on other lake level control dams in the county.

Charles Smith, Oscoda Township supervisor, appeared before the board and asked county supervisors to attend a township supervisors' conference. He said that townships needed assistance with the serious problem of establishing sanitary land fills according to regulations adopted by the state.

A letter was received from the secretary of state's office acknowledging transfer of the drivers license bureau from the sheriff's department to the secretary of state's office effective January 1. Work of this office was returned to the state because of the high cost of hiring personnel and the low return from license fees.

Representatives of the Civil Defense Office were present at the meeting and outlined the county's responsibility in this program.

Discussion was held on the possibility of closing Court Street adjacent to county property in order to expand parking facilities. The board's buildings and grounds committee is to make such a request to the Tawas City Council.

## Judge Orders Bus Drivers Back to Work at Oscoda Area School

A temporary injunction was issued Monday ordering bus drivers of Oscoda Area School to report for work.

The drivers, members of Local Union 1545, AFL-CIO, had been on strike and picketing school property since October 2.

Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller continued the case until Friday, October 24, when a hear-

ing is to be held starting at 9:30 a. m.

Negotiations on a contract between the school and union, affiliated with the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, had been under way since last May. Bus drivers were returned to their jobs at the start of school in September.

In its petition to the court, Os-

oda Area School claimed that operation of the school district, charged with educating approximately 4,344 children, had been disrupted and demoralized since the strike started October 2.

The school continued to operate during the strike and parents were taking children to school with private automobiles. School of-

## TC Councilmen Insist Fishing Violators Are Responsibility of DNR

A member of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources was quoted last week as criticizing area residents for violating state law in regard to prohibition of coho fishing in the Tawas River.

Members of the Tawas City Council said Monday night that, up to a point, they could sympathize with the DNR in this problem—particularly concerning vandalism at the coho weir at the foot of First Avenue. Such vandalism has been a black mark against the community and the youngsters (or adults) responsible should recognize this.

However, councilmen said that one fact seemed to have been overlooked by the DNR spokesman—as a law enforcement officer, he should have immediately issued summonses to those persons violating the law—both adults and children.

"Parents whose children were using spears to take coho or fishing in prohibited areas of the river should have been summoned into court. And any parent who knowingly sends his child out to willfully violate a conservation law should have his head examined. This can only lead to future trouble with violations of other laws," commented Third Ward Alderman Howard Hatton.

The council pointed out that prior to the arrival of coho, district and regional spokesmen for the DNR promised officials that no fishing would be allowed in the Tawas River and that the law would be enforced. There is very little public property bordering the Tawas River and many property owners were concerned with the possibility of large numbers of trespassers.

A very confusing situation resulted when the DNR announced that it was going to prohibit fishing from a point 500 feet above the weir to the river mouth.

As of Monday morning signs were still posted prohibiting fishing along the entire length of the river. Many people trespassed on private property Saturday and Sunday to fish for coho. No complaints were heard from property owners.

Actually, most residents are quite pleased with the coho season—visitors have been orderly and cooperative, disposal of refuse has not been a serious problem, there have been adequate facilities for boat launching and parking, fishing has offered considerable excitement and the DNR's free give away of coho on two different days was a spectacular success.

A report on the city-operated boat launching site on Ninth Avenue Monday night indicated that 892 boats had been handled there over the past five week-ends. Activity has dropped off the past two week-ends, with only 15 boats launched Saturday and eight on Sunday.

The council felt that an attendant would no longer be necessary at the launching site this season.

### Second Youth Gets Prison Term

Sentenced to concurrent terms of two to 10 years on two counts of breaking and entering and two to four years for malicious destruction of property was Christopher L. Stutzman, 17, Bay City.

Stutzman appeared Friday before Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller, Alan Osterhout, 17, Bay City, had received the same sentence October 3 when he appeared before Judge Miller.

The youths had entered guilty pleas to breaking into the Capital Business Service and Wojahn Floor Covering, located at the M-55-Wilber Road intersection, on August 14.

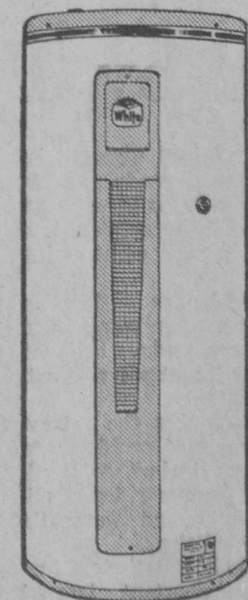

# Gloomy Week for Tawas Fans; Braves Lose Homecoming, 20-6

Tawas Area School had little to cheer about last week after losing three games to Essexville Garber. The Braves lost the 1969 homecoming game Friday night to the visiting Dukes, 20-6, while the Junior Braves lost to Essexville, 42-6, and the Tawas freshmen lost to the visiting Essexville freshmen, 12-6.

Friday's loss was the third in a row for the Braves, who had the wind knocked out of them by Oscoda three weeks ago after putting together two wins and a tie to open the season.

The Braves have been injury riddled, forcing Coach Steve Svontko to bring up two promising players, Dave Moe and Mark Schirmer, from the junior varsity. Naturally, the move took some of the steam out of the Junior Braves' offensive attack.

The visitors, chalking up two straight wins after losing four games, jumped on the Braves early in the first quarter and were on their way to a victory.

Quarterback Mike Paradise capped the Essexville eleven's first touchdown drive with a one-yard sneak. His 35-yard run earlier in the quarter helped to set up the score. Russ Atkinson ran in the conversion.

Second Garber score was a 15-yard run by Bob Hogan up the middle, ending a 55-yard march. The try for point after touchdown fell short and Essexville held a 14-0 halftime lead.

Essexville was penalized 70 yards, while 43 yards were marched off against Tawas, most

of them the latter's trouble being with linemen jumping off sides. Homecoming fans were treated to a fine halftime show by Tawas Area Marching Band, along with gaily decorated floats by the four high school classes and Keyettes.

Other action in the NBC saw Oscoda continuing its undefeated pace with a 20-14 win over Pinconning, Standish-Sterling Central upset Carrollton, 10-0, and Gladwin defeated Ogemaw Heights, 22-6.

The Braves play host to Ogemaw Heights this Friday night.

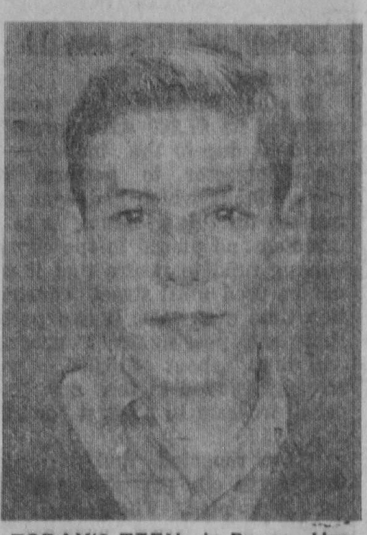

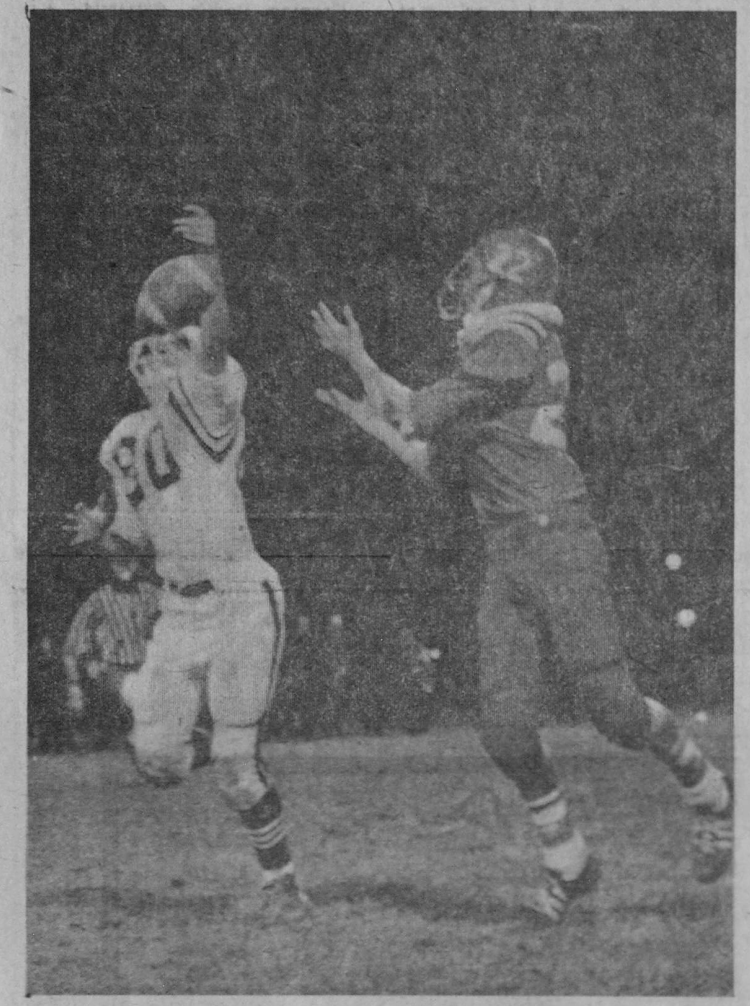

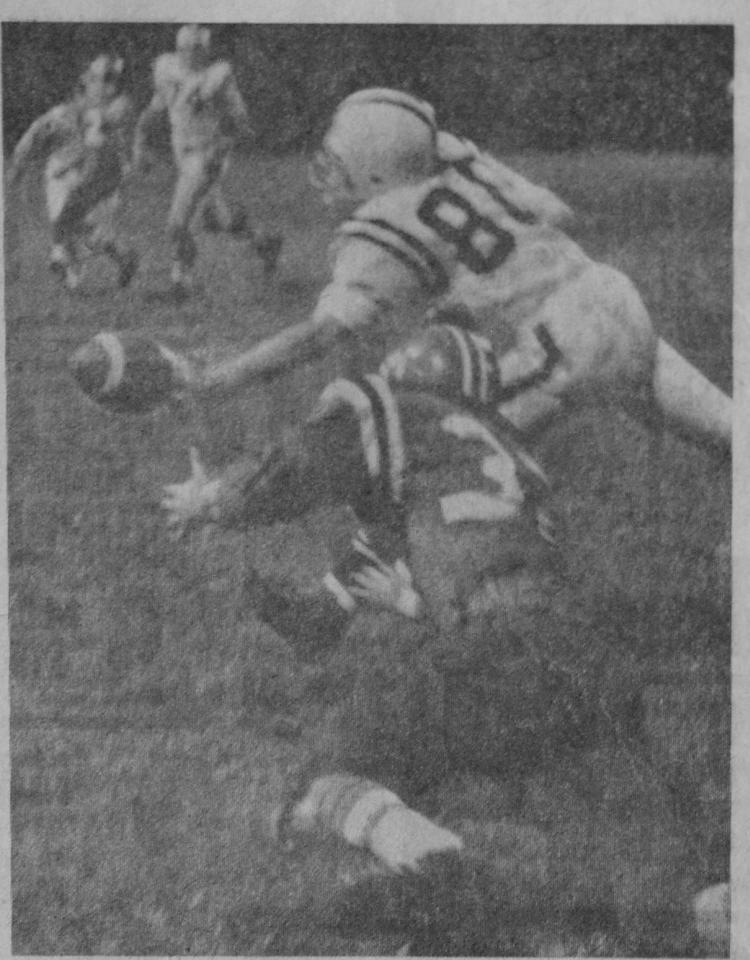

Family Living Education

By MARY PETERS Home Economist Assembling A Double Knit Garment

Tricks in sewing your double-knit are today's column aids. Stay stitching should not be used everywhere as it interferes with straight sewing of double knits. If your machine has a chain stitch, this is preferable for stay stitching as it has give and still controls stretching. Stay stitch necklines, the armholes of sleeveless dresses and waistline seams.

Basting is recommended although it is not a must if you are skillful. Hand basting will allow you to bring seam lines together on a flat surface. Pin ends and center of seam, then a few pins. Baste from top down and use a small stitch rather than a knot. Leave thread ends long to allow for give when machine stitching.

Darts should be stitched from wide to narrow, stitching to a very gradual point just along the fold for at least four stitches, then let the stitching run off and chain. In heavy fabrics, the darts can be slashed and pressed open.

In medium knits, they can be pressed in one direction and the fold cut so the edges graded or layered to uneven widths. This will prevent the fold line from pressing through to the right side.

Press darts over a press mitt or tailor's ham to shape. Always use a thin press cloth to protect the fabric. Set the iron for the lowest steam temperature.

Shoulder seams should be stitched with the back shoulder, which has ease, against the feed. This will help to ease the extra fabric. To be sure the shoulder seam cannot stretch, stay it with woven edge seam binding. Pin the binding along the front seamline so that the seam stitching will fall near the center of the seam binding and stitch it while stitching the seam.

Neckline facings can be applied just as in woven fabrics. Baste interfacing to neckline, being careful not to stretch the neckline. Hand baste the facing, seamed and finished, right sides together to hold the neck.

Stitch, grade seam edges to eliminate bulk. Press open, then under stitch through facing and all seam allowances from the outside.

Press over a press mitt and be careful to protect the fabric from the direct heat with a press cloth. The same method should be used whether you apply a self fabric facing or taffeta.

A bound neckline is popular for knits. They eliminate the bulk of a facing and are both durable and secure. To make a bound finish one-quarter inch wide when fin-

ished, cut a bias strip 1 5/8-inches wide. Zig zag one edge. Then baste the unfinished edge to the neckline, stretching very slightly. Stitch, taking a five-eighths-inch seam, trim seam allowances to slightly less than one-quarter inch. Press seam open. Turn the bias over one seam allowance, keeping the bias even. Hand baste the loose edge of the bias near the first stitching, just to the neckline seam allowance. Machine stitch very close to the first stitching through one seam allowance and the extended bias edge that has been zig-zagged. Instead of bias, you can use double knit cut on the cross-wise or length-wise grain.

If there is a waistline seam, it should be reinforced with a stay of woven edge seam binding to prevent stretching.

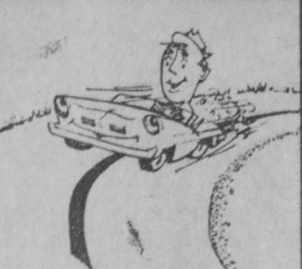
Hems are easy in double knits but the stitch must be correct so it will not show or pull on the outside of the garment. Take your hem length, baste at the hemline fold. Press, trim hem width even.

If the top has ripples, use a row of basting one-quarter inch from edge to draw up and control ease, then press again. Zig-zag the raw edge and press.

Fold the hem back and using regular thread or buttonhole twist carefully catch stitch alternating stitches between hem and garment. This makes a blend catch

stitch between the layers, not over the edge. Press carefully when finished. This hem finish makes hem invisible on the right side.

Know Your Point!



BEBA Bill says:

Stay on the right half of the roadway except when passing. This applies to one-way roads and freeways. Don't straddle lanes. The driver should be especially careful upon approach to hills or curves which do not permit a clear view ahead or when the view is obstructed within 100 feet of any bridge, viaduct or tunnel. Conviction on this violation means 2 points on your driving record. Conviction on a similar violation, failure to drive on the right half of the roadway where vehicles are traveling in the same direction, also is a 2-point violation. An exception is when lanes are occupied by vehicles moving in the same direction in substantially continuous lanes of traffic; then any lane lawfully available is permissible.

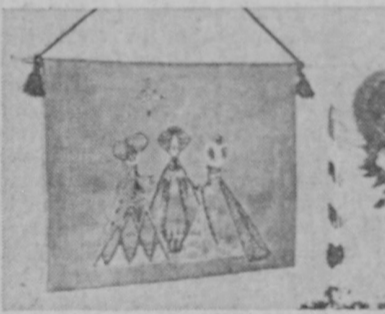
