Veteran Forest Employee Retires

After working over 32 years on the Huron-Manistee National Forest, Otto Kobs plans to retire October 31.

All of his time with the United States Forest Service had been spent on the Huron. "My first work began in 1927 as a seasonal employee, working as a tree planter at \$2.50 per day and board," states Kobs.

Working at this for several seasons, he was promoted to crew boss. "In those days, we lived in tent camps and I looked forward to this each season. The tents measured 16 by 20 and 10 men were assigned to each. The tents were heated with wood stoves and we had oil lanterns for light," he recalls.

The district ranger in charge of the camps was Ralph Johnson and he and his wife lived in the camp with the men. "Ranger Johnson kept us in line and saw to it that the lights were out at 10 p. m.—then he would make inspections during the night to see if stoves and everything else were OK."

The mess hall was of simple construction covered with tarpaper. The forest service provided plenty of food, well prepared by the cook, Harry Bischoff, and his son, Herman, plus other help.

Looking back over his 32-year career, Kobs can see that some of

the first plantations he helped to plant now have been thinned for pulpwood and some have gone up in smoke. One plantation was lost in the Welcome Lake fire in 1937, in which one man was burned to death. Other fires that he recalls are the Osoda fire in 1943 and the Ski Bowl fire in 1957.

During Kobs' career, he has held many different types of jobs. From 1935 to 1937, he was stationed at the Silver Creek CCC camp as a local experienced man. There, he worked on equipment repair and fire control.

After leaving the CCC, his work continued in fire control and mechanical work, plus equipment operation. Since 1957, when the forest service started a construction and maintenance unit, he has held the position of maintenance and operation foreman. This put him in charge of road maintenance, forest signing and camp ground construction in the Tawas, Harrisville and Mio ranger districts.

During his career, he has worked under nine different forest supervisors and traveled one-half million miles without a reportable accident, for which he was presented a safe driving award by regional forester, George James.

Kobs was honored at a retirement dinner October 19 at Tawas Golf and Country Club. There were 80 guests present.

Plans after retirement include catching up on work around the house, "and then my wife and I plan to do a little traveling, hunting and fishing."

Judge Orders Fence Removed

In an opinion rendered October 22, Judge Allan C. Miller issued an order to Conel Construction Corporation to remove a fence on state highway right-of-way north of Osoda.

The Michigan Department of State Highways petitioned the court asking that the firm be ordered to remove its fence on highway right-of-way in front of two lots on Lake Huron Sand Beach Subdivision.

Vote on Probate Court District

Voters of Isosco and Arenac Counties will go to the polls Tuesday, November 4, to decide if they wish to form a new 16th District Probate Court to replace the present two probate judges serving the counties.

Enrolled as House Bill No. 3366 and introduced last June by Rep. Donald E. Holbrook Jr. of Clare along with seven other sponsors, the special election came as a surprise to most residents of the two counties when election notices were published earlier this month.

If approved by a majority of the electors voting on the question in each of the counties, Isosco and

Arenac would constitute a probate court district effective January 1, 1971. The first election of a probate judge for the district would be held in November 1970.

In a statement to the Herald Monday, State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City said that he was one of 26 members of the Michigan House of Representatives who voted against the bill June 12. The bill passed by a 70-26 roll call.

"As far as I am concerned," said Prescott, "this new law is just one more attempt for Lansing to take over control of local government."

All 42 counties north of the Bay-Muskegon line are being forced to hold similar elections. Estimated cost for holding this election in Isosco and Arenac will run in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

The new law provides that the district probate judge would receive an annual salary of \$20,000, three-quarters to be paid by the state and one-quarter by the counties comprising the district. Each county would contribute to the salary in the same proportion as the population of the county bears to the population of the district.

The law provides that probate

judges, except those counties which do not approve the new probate court district, are not to engage in the practice of law. A new fee schedule was also provided.

In those counties where electors do not approve the probate court district, the law established a new salary system. Based on the last census, this would mean that the Isosco judge would receive not less than \$7,500, one-half to be paid by the state and one-half by the county. In addition, the judge may receive additional salary as determined by the board of supervisors. At present, the state pays 50

percent of the minimum salary. The state provides \$3,750 to Isosco and \$3,250 to Arenac. Isosco adds \$4,450 to Judge William McCready's salary, while Arenac adds \$5,000 to the salary of Judge Kenneth Ralph.

Duties of the probate court include jurisdiction over the estates of decedents, distribution of property, probating of wills, and change of name of adults, adoption of children and jurisdiction of juvenile division of the probate court over children.

Wurtsmith AB to Lose Men in New Cutback

The Department of Defense announced Tuesday that Wurtsmith Air Force Base's 75th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron would be deactivated and replaced by the 94th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron from Selfridge Air Force Base.

The Wurtsmith squadron will be transferred to the National Guard at Hector Field, North Dakota, after its deactivation.

The order is part of a world-wide closing of 307 bases. As a result, Wurtsmith will gain strength in the squadron shift, but this will be only temporary.

Earlier this year, the Defense Department ordered a cutback of 320 men at the base. When it takes full effect, along with Tuesday's transfer order, the base will have lost 245 personnel.

The cutback is to be made by releasing men according to a staggered schedule before their scheduled end of enlistments.

The Defense Department said that closing of military installations around the world will realize a 609-million-dollar savings.

Ask Court to Set Aside Jury Verdict

Attorneys for the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company have petitioned Isosco Circuit Court to set aside a \$31,000 judgment rendered by a jury October 8 in favor of Mrs. Gwendolyn L. Starling.

As an alternative in the event the above motion was denied, attorneys requested that a new trial be set.

The jury awarded damages to Mrs. Starling following a three-day trial before Judge Allan C. Miller. An office employee of the railroad, she claimed that she sustained severe and permanent injuries June 4, 1965, in a fall at the general office building in Tawas City.

In asking for a directed verdict in favor of the railroad, attorneys claimed that there was no evidence present at the trial which the jury could find the defendant guilty of any negligence.

Railroad attorneys asked that if the motion be denied, a new trial be set because of the court's failure to grant the defendant's motion for a mistrial. The motion in question arose out of alleged prejudicial remarks made to a juror by an employee of the railroad during an inspection of the premises by the jury.

In addition, attorneys for the railroad claimed that the verdict was grossly excessive and that the court failed to charge the jury as requested.

Higher Instructional Cost Boosts Budget

Work on a final operational budget for 1969-70 is being completed by administrators and the board of education of Tawas Area Schools. A tentative hearing date is being considered for November 10, but the final date will depend on the progress of final work.

At Monday night's board of education meeting, the working budget for 1969-70 appeared to be settled at \$1,075,634. This is about \$31,000 higher than the tentative budget of July 1 and a \$130,761 increase over the actual expenditure of 1968-69.

Chief increase in the budget is in instructional salaries, accounting for \$105,394 of the total increase. Besides salary increases, seven new teachers were hired by the district. Actual increase in instructional salaries is \$113,796, but the position of curriculum coordinator was eliminated saving the district \$8,402.

Discussion on the budget indicated that the expanded adult education program will pay for itself this year through increased receipts from state aid.

Increases were noted in administration, where \$2,090 was established for contracted services and \$1,300 for legal services. This provides some funds for a professional negotiator.

Transportation shows an increase of \$6,652, with salaries accounting for \$2,088, equipment replacement of \$2,389 and repair parts of \$1,465.

Operation shows an increase of \$2,189, with the amount rather evenly divided among all phases of the operation.

Maintenance shows an increase of \$1,249. Last year's amount of \$27,350 was high due to furnace replacement and final payment for cleaning the shop area. This year's increase is due to the new win-

dows at East Tawas and added purchase of furniture due to increased enrollment.

Fixed charges are increased \$15,277, due to \$2,600 increase in interest and a budgeted figure of \$12,250 for health insurance. The final figure on the latter is yet to be determined.

Capital outlay shows a decrease of \$12,237. Of this amount, \$5,600 is due to no improvement of sites and \$7,637 is due to no new furniture, other than replacements. This category is expected to present a future problem as much of the furniture is now 16 years old.

A comparison of budgets indicates that cost of elementary instruction will increase from \$273,689 last year to \$326,211 in 1969-70, the principal increase being in teacher salaries and new teachers, from \$234,900 to \$287,266.

Total secondary instruction is expected to increase from \$400,415 in 1968-69 to \$454,400 this year, which includes teacher salaries of \$368,190, \$47,270 higher than last year.

Other budget categories include community school program, from \$15,182 in 1968-69 to \$21,709; administration, from \$32,586 to \$37,000; transportation, from \$75,197 to \$81,850; operation, from \$88,150 to \$90,340; maintenance, from \$27,350 to \$28,600; fixed charges, from \$15,172 to \$30,450.

Total estimated revenues for 1969-70 are \$1,084,280, an increase of \$205,992 over the previous year. The district will have a net state aid increase of \$55,738, due principally to increased enrollment, which nets an additional \$48,000.

The district's tax levy will show an increase of \$161,928, due to increased millage adopted by electors, from 10.02 mills to 13.5 mills, and a slightly higher valuation.

Last year, the district expended a balance on hand of \$60,000 in order to meet current operating expenses. Although a balance of \$8,596 is indicated when revenues are compared to expenditures, it is anticipated that the district will be required to borrow money for operation due to the usual delinquent taxes amounting to about 10 percent of the total.

School Board Opens Chassis Bids; Hear Architect's Report

Bids on furnishing three new 66-passenger school buses were opened at Monday night's meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education. Bids on furnishing chassis were presented by four firms.

In other business, it was reported that the school's architect had visited the high school and made some rough drawings for proposed classroom expansion.

It was stated that the architect had recommended that classroom expansion should start at the mathematics room and be extended 60 feet south making one large room. This could be used for team teaching, or be divided with curtains for smaller classrooms.

A report is to be given at a future meeting on discussion by Tawas Area School administrators

with Harrison School officials. The latter school operates on a two-shift day, with classes starting earlier in the morning and extending later in the afternoon.

Trustee Robert W. Elliott, as chairman of the board's curriculum committee, said his group would start meeting in November with the administration, department.

Ambulances Transfer Nov. 17

Operation of the area ambulance service will be taken over by Tawas Hospital effective at 12 o'clock noon, November 17.

Representatives of the 11 local units of government which purchased ambulance equipment through a cooperative program met October 13 with M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator, to work out final arrangements.

Attending the meeting were Mayor James Campbell of East Tawas, William Wersley, district supervisor, and Dennis Chrivin, Plainfield Township supervisor, both of Hale.

Fees were discussed at the meeting and final arrangements made to establish communications between the sheriff's department and the hospital for operation of the service.

Applications for licensing of the

vehicles and operators have been submitted and a training program is under way in cooperation with the various governmental units and the hospital.

Norwood said that one or two more employees were still to be hired for the ambulance operation, although he did not believe this shortage would effect the starting date of the hospital ambulance service.

Operation of the ambulance service by Tawas Hospital is the culmination of many months of discussion and meetings.

The discussion started last February when three of Isosco's five funeral home directors announced they were going to discontinue ambulance service effective June 1.

After discussing the problem for two months, the Isosco Board of

Supervisors decided to turn the matter over to local units of government. Possible operation of the ambulance service by Tawas Hospital was discussed in May. The next month found 11 different units of local government organizing to finance purchase of three ambulances.

Application for an \$11,000 federal highway safety planning grant to aid in the purchase was made by the City of East Tawas. Ambulances were purchased and one was placed in service July 1 on an interim basis with the sheriff's department. Two new ambulances were received in August, one being located at the Plainfield Township Fire Hall at Hale and operated by volunteers.

In late August, it was learned that the application for \$11,000 of federal funds had been denied.

Local units of government had agreed to pay one-half of the total cost and then decided to pay the remaining deficit caused by denial of federal funds. During its October session, the Isosco Board of Supervisors allocated \$5,500 to pay one-half of the remaining cost.

A "hot line" telephone has been installed at the county jail, which connects directly with Tawas Hospital. All requests for ambulance service are being channeled through the sheriff's department.

Ambulances are equipped with two-way radio communications operating on the sheriff's frequency. Ambulance service in the Osoda area is being handled by the two funeral directors of that community. The remainder of the county is handled by ambulances stationed at Tawas Hospital and the Plainfield Township Fire Hall.

Vote No!

Voters of Iosco and Arenac Counties will go to the polls November 4 to decide the question of organizing a new probate court district.

Costing taxpayers of the two counties approximately \$4,000 to \$5,000 for election expense, very little interest has been shown by voters in this proposal. One of the principal reasons for this lack of interest is an apparent lack of information concerning the proposed probate court reorganization.

Outside of the persons connected with courts or election officials, the November 4 vote came as a complete surprise to residents of both counties. Yet, those same taxpayers will be the ones footing the bills for paying election boards and printing special ballots.

It has been stated that the proposed reorganization has been promoted by downstate probate judges, who seek higher pay. It has also been reported that such reorganization would reduce the cost of the probate court to local taxpayers. We believe the first statement is true, but have reason to doubt the latter.

It is our belief that a probate judge fills an important function in the county, particularly in his capacity with juvenile offenders. Under the proposed reorganization (one judge for two counties), he would be spending more time on the road than in his office.

For this reason, we urge those persons who take the time November 4 to go to the polls to vote "NO" on this special proposal.

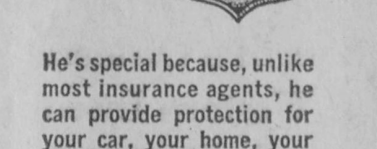
Wilber Farmer Died Oct. 24

He is survived by his wife, the former Ada Jones, whom he married September 22, 1923.

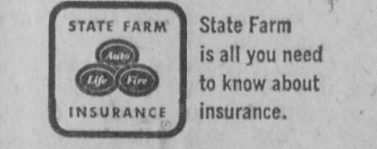

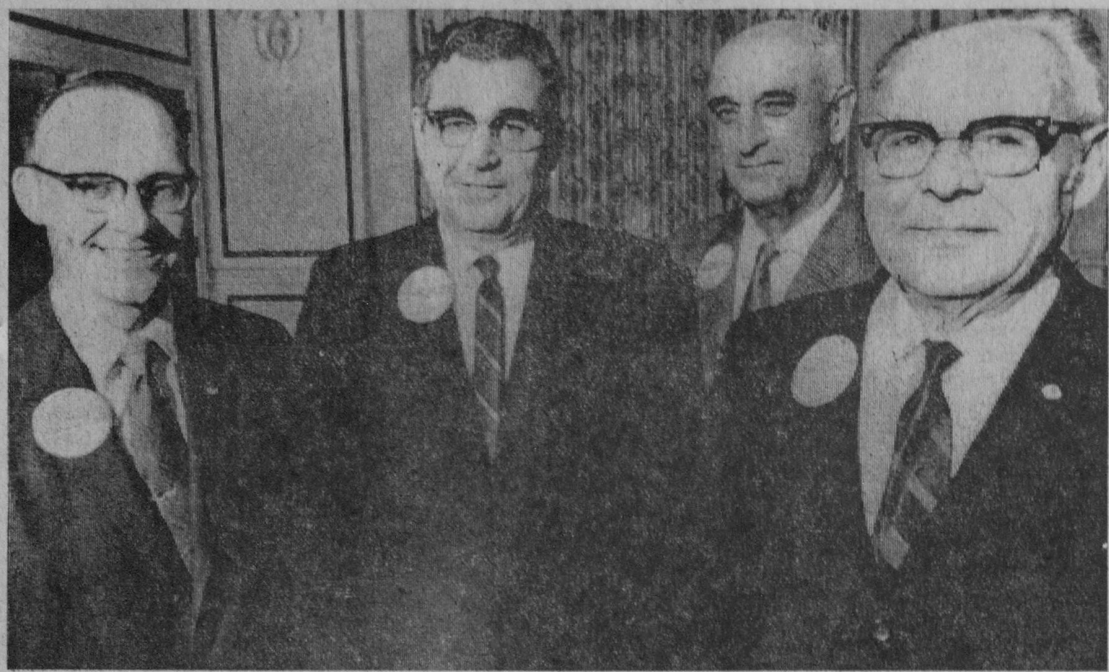

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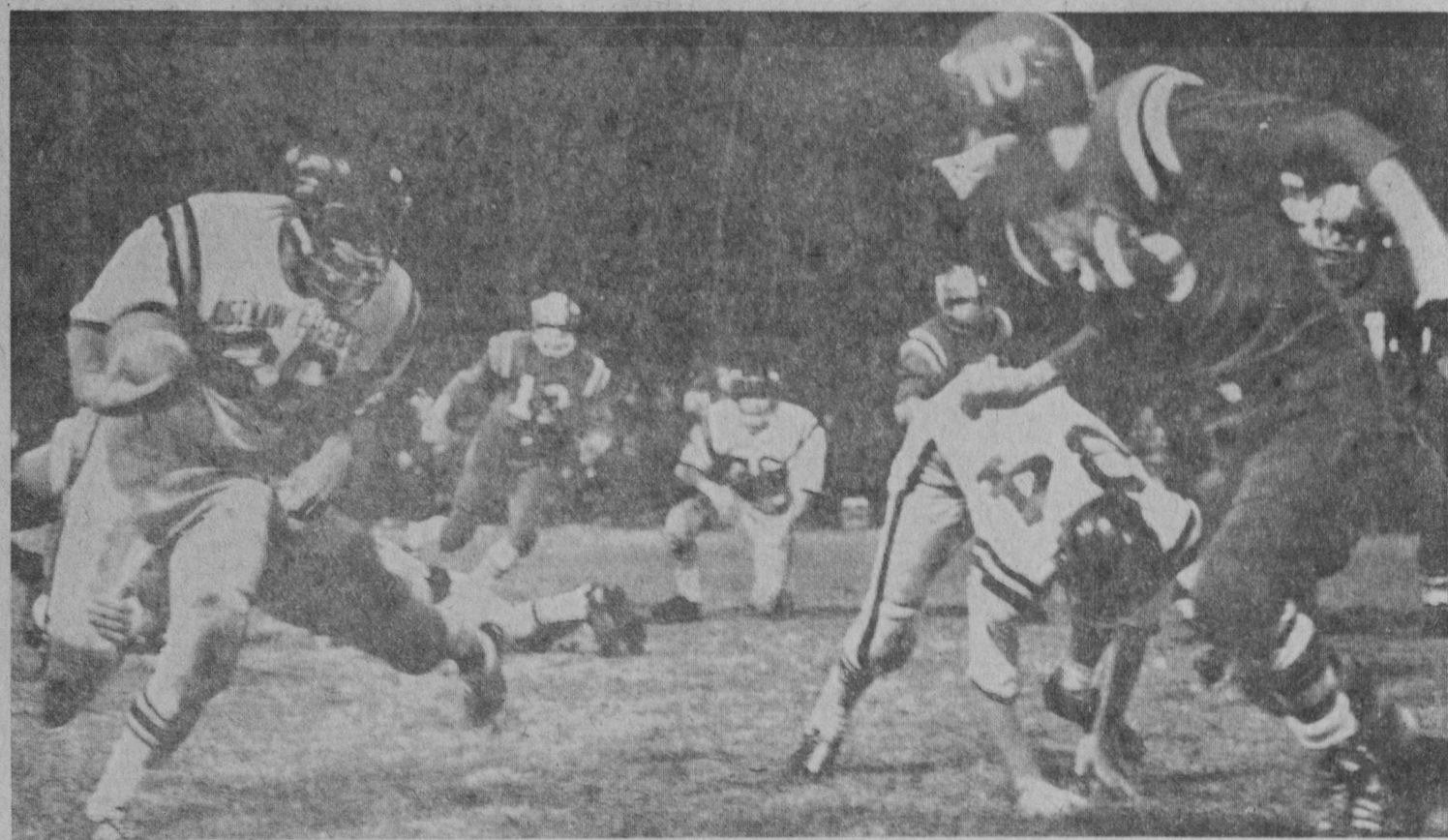

Braves Lose to Falcons

Second Quarter Lapse Costly

A second quarter defensive lapse proved costly to the Tawas Area Braves Friday night, losing to visiting Ogemaw Heights, 16-12. The Falcons, chalking up their first victory of the season, took to the air in the second quarter to score two touchdowns. The Braves defense, led by End Craig Wilkins, Tackle Bob Bublitz and Center Bill

Sheldon, closed the door on Ogemaw Heights in the second half. The Braves opened the game with a rush, recovering a Falcon fumble on the OH 47-yard line. In six plays, the Tawas offense had a touchdown with Fullback Mike Glancy going in to score. The drive included two nine-yard runs by Glancy, a nine-yarder by Halfback

Ron Ulman and a seven-yard run by Gary Sidebottom. Mike Greenlee's attempted kick from placement hit the center bar and Tawas settled for a 6-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. The Falcons started to move in the second quarter. Quarterback Dirk VanOosten hitting End Larry Bruder with a 25-yard pass to set

up the score. Kaye Humphrey carried the final seven yards to score. The Falcons scored a two-point conversion on a pass from VanOosten to Bruder. Tawas took the next kickoff and moved about nine yards in three plays. The Braves gambled on fourth down and Ogemaw Heights took over the ball on its 44-yard line. In 12 plays, including a 40-yard pass play from VanOosten to Don Fritz, the visitors scored another touchdown with Stan Kartes going the final three yards. VanOosten passed for a two-point conversion.

The Braves had another good scoring opportunity in the first half, but the drive ran out of steam with a penalty. Tawas Area shored up its defense in the second half and the two teams played a scoreless third quarter. The Braves dominated fourth quarter play and almost pulled the game out of the fire. Several major penalties were marched off against the Falcons early in the fourth quarter and Tawas Area moved down to the eight-yard line but could not score.

Mike Sventko took over as quarterback for the Braves and led the team to Tawas' second touchdown. On the seventh play from scrimmage, Sventko hit Glancy with a 30-yard touchdown pass. The try for a two-point conversion was stopped.

This opportunity was short lived as the Falcons intercepted a Tawas pass. Late in the game, Sventko hit Chris King with a 25-yard pass play to the Ogemaw Heights 40-yard line. Sventko ran 12 yards to the OH 28. A pass interference penalty moved the ball to the OH 16 and, in two running plays, Tawas moved inside the 10-yard line. Two passes went incomplete and time ran out on the Braves with the ball on the three-yard line.

Glancy was Tawas Area's offensive standout, carrying for 79 yards and scoring both touchdowns. Although making a few mistakes under pressure, Sventko rallied his teammates in the fourth quarter with a good passing attack.

The Braves play their final NBC game of the season this Friday night, hosting Carrollton. It will also be Tawas' final home game, with the Braves playing at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School the following Friday night.

The entire offensive unit turned in a good game and provided excellent pass protection for Brumfield and Chrvia.

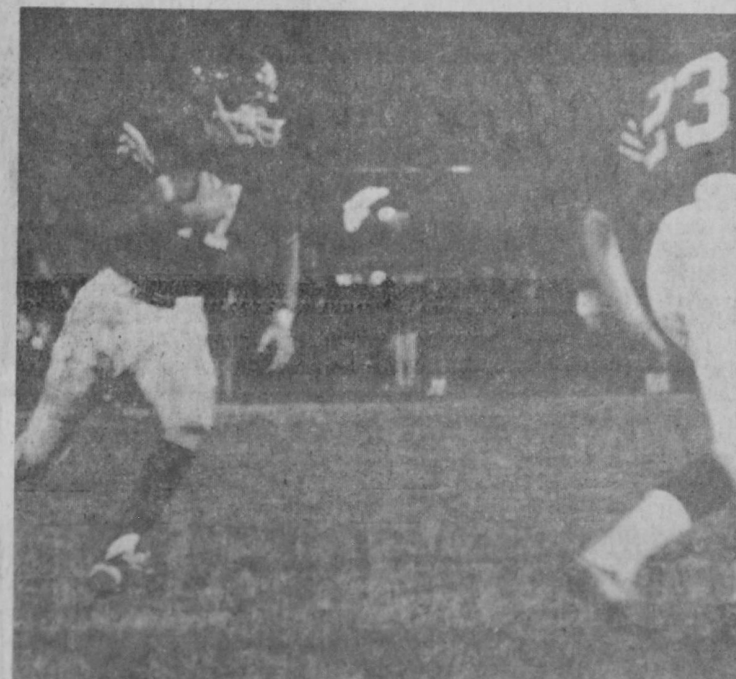

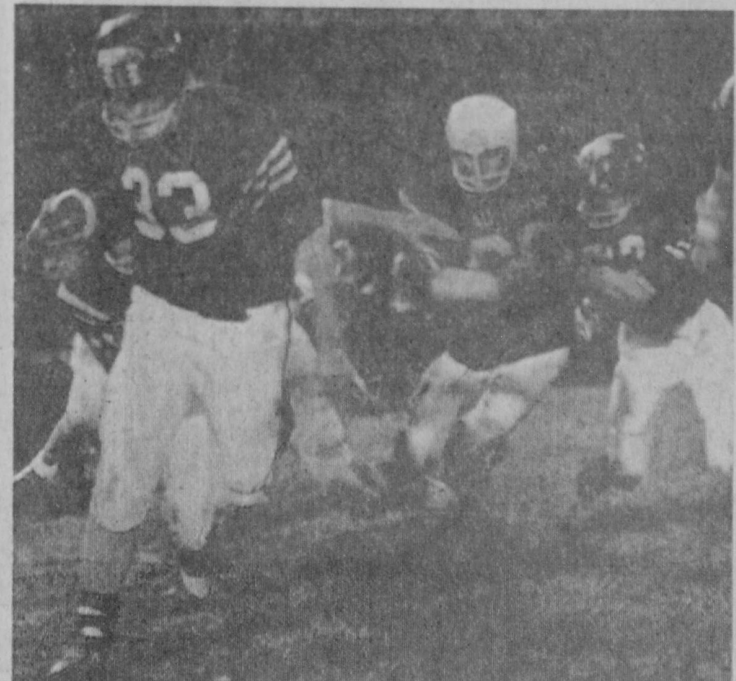
