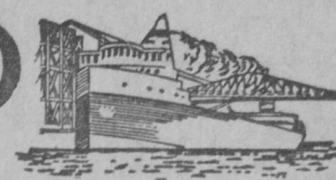

## Tawasites Welcome MUCC Directors

About 100 or more members of the board of directors of Michigan United Conservation Clubs will be in the Tawasites this week-end for the group's annual fall meeting. Hosts for the event, which starts Friday night and runs through Sunday, will be Iosco Sportsmen's Club and Tawas Chamber of Commerce. Headquarters for the convention will be the Holland Hotel and East Tawas Community Building. Saturday's session starts at 9:00 a. m. and will run through 5:00 p. m., with time out for a noon luncheon. Important conservation legislation will be discussed by members of the board of directors, who represent more than 330 clubs and upwards of 100,000 members in the state. Sessions at the community building are open to the public. Saturday evening's entertainment includes a dinner at Iosco Sportsmen's Club clubhouse on US-23, Baldwin Township. A meeting of MUCC District 14 is slated to be held Sunday afternoon at the clubhouse of Iosco Sportsmen's Club. Harry Coy, president of the sportsmen's club, said this was the first visit of MUCC directors to the Tawas area since 1961. In addition to meetings, members will take part in coho fishing on Tawas Bay and will probably visit the weir being operated on Tawas River by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Among political leaders slated to speak at the meeting Saturday are State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City and State Sen. Robert Richardson of Saginaw. Handling arrangements for the local sportsmen's club is Peter A. Lichtfus, past president.

## Schedule Hearing for Zoning Change

On recommendation of the city planning commission, Tawas City Council Monday night authorized setting a hearing for Monday, November 3, to hear objections, if any, to rezoning property along US-23 in the First Ward. Dr. John D. LeClair and brother, Sanford LeClair, had requested the city to rezone their property from the multiple family dwelling category to B-1 commercial. The city planning commission recommended that all of Block 13, Wheeler's Second Addition, be rezoned to B-1 commercial. When submitting their application for a zoning change last month, the LeClairs stated that the property, located across US-23 from the Kroger Store, would be developed for business. Located on the property at present is the residence and dentist office of Dr. John D. LeClair and a house owned by Sanford LeClair. The property was once owned by the Prescott family. In other business, the council expressed disappointment that its contractor, Yockey Brothers, Alpena, had been unable to work on the city's street improvements program this summer. It was stated that poor construction weather in June had prevented the firm from completing all of its street work in various communities of Northeastern Michigan. Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, told the council that he had been assured by the contractor that, if suitable weather conditions prevail, the project could be completed this month. A request from Gordon Clute to install a brighter street light on Ninth Avenue near the intersection with US-23 was referred to the street committee for study. Bublitz reported that work is progressing rapidly on the 40 by 40-foot addition to the city garage on Fourth Street. The addition will be used to house street department equipment and the fire department's tank truck is to be located in the heated portion of the building.

## Launching Ramps Are 'Breaking Even'

Tawas City's boat launching ramp on Ninth Avenue has handled a total of 771 boats and trailers during the past three week-ends of coho fishing, according to a report at Monday night's meeting of the city council. Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, said that the boat launching operation had operated smoothly during the rush period, with good cooperation from visiting fishermen. A total of 213 boats were launched the week-end of September 20, 106 on Saturday and 107 on Sunday; 315 boats were launched the week-end of September 27, 170 on Saturday and 145 on Sunday; 243 boats were launched last week-end, 123 on Saturday and 120 on Sunday. The city has charged a \$1 launching fee on the week-end, but allowed use of the ramp free of charge the five remaining days in the week. This charge was to help defray part of the cost of hiring an attendant and weekly maintenance of the ramps. Bublitz said the city was "about breaking even" on the operation. (See RAMP, page 3.)

Committee members include Ralph Western, Allen Chisholm, John Brugger, Steven Sventko, Mrs. George Prescott and Joseph Barkman. "We need assistance in this campaign which means so much to the local community and agencies throughout the state," said Mrs. DeBeau.

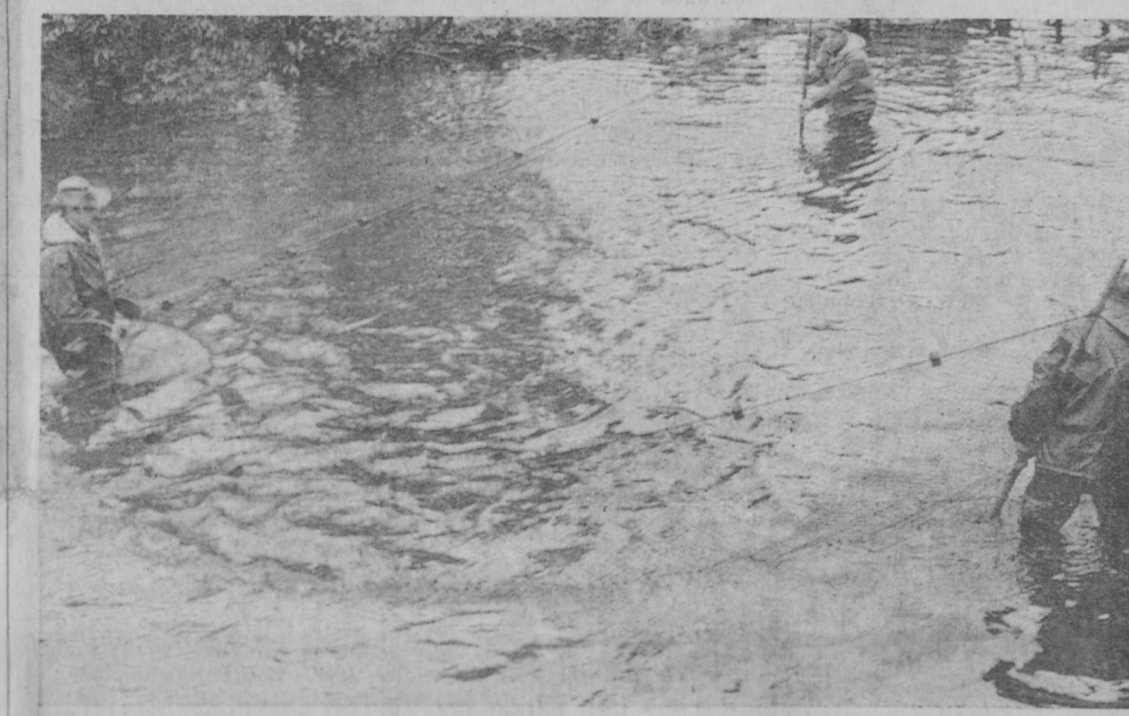

## Unique Method of Aiding Hospital

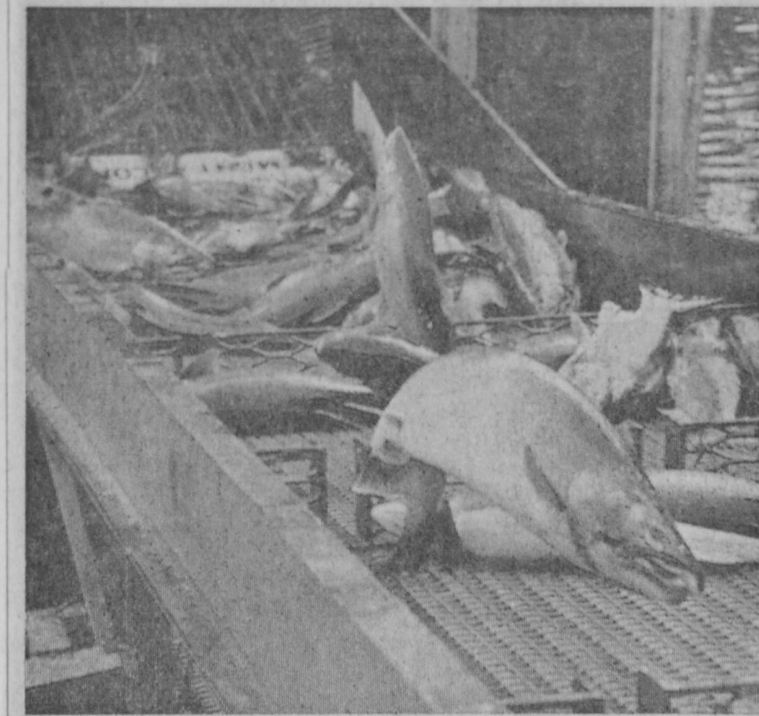


Coho salmon were herded into this collection area and conveyor lift system in the Tawas River.—Tawas Herald Photos.

LOADING AREA at the coho weir, located at the base of First Avenue on Tawas River, was pressed into use for the first time Tuesday morning. About 1,500 salmon which had been trapped there after leaving Tawas Bay were herded into a collection area, given a mild shock and then automatically transported on an endless belt into waiting boxes. After icing, the fish were shipped to the Blackport Fish Company plant, Grand Rapids, where the fish are to be processed. The fish are to be returned here some time Saturday or Sunday for the DNR's fish give away program at the Tawas City Park. A trout stamp will be required to receive a free fish. Hours will be from 8:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon. It is expected that about 10,000 fish will be removed from the weir during the next several weeks. Meanwhile, sports fishermen will continue to try their luck at catching these silver salmon before the fish reach the river on their spawning run.

## East Tawas Adopts New Wage Schedule

A new wage and salary schedule for city employees was adopted Monday night by the East Tawas Council. Effective after the April 1970 election, the city clerk is to receive an annual salary of \$1,500 and the city treasurer is to receive \$300, plus tax collection fees. Other salaries were established as follows: City assessor, \$600; librarian, \$220 per month; office manager, \$335 per month; office clerk, \$160 per hour; superintendent of public works, \$690 per month; foreman, \$550 per month; heavy equipment operator, \$2.75 per hour; truck driver, \$2.70 per hour; laborer, \$2.40 per hour. Water plant operator, \$7,260 annually; water plant assistant, \$2.75 per hour; third shift operator, \$2.60; police chief, \$7,600 annually; patrolman, \$500 per month; assistant patrolman, \$2.15 per hour; cemetery laborer, \$2.10 per hour; janitor, \$2.30 per hour; sewage plant operator, \$6,300 annually.

Minutes of the board of public works indicated that approval had been granted to extending sewer service from the River Street main to the warehouse and office of Tawas Industries, Incorporated, located on the old fairgrounds property in Tawas City. The City of Tawas City has authorized extension of a water main to serve the property, but would be unable to provide sewer service without construction of an expensive lift or pumping station.

## Jury Awards \$31,000 to D&M Office Worker

A jury of nine women and three men awarded damages of \$31,000 Thursday to Mrs. Gwendolyn J. Starling, a Detroit and Mackinac Railway stenographer, who claimed that she sustained severe and permanent injuries June 4, 1965, when she allegedly tripped on a stairway at the railroad's general office building in Tawas City. A three-day jury trial was held starting last Tuesday and the panel deliberated about two hours before bringing in its verdict. Mrs. Starling claimed that as she was descending a flight of stairs, her left foot slipped on the stairway. She claimed that the stairway was highly waxed and that the railroad was negligent. She had asked damages of \$85,000. Apart from the trial record, testimony was taken from persons alleged to have heard remarks made by an employee during the time the jury was at the railroad office to view the stairway. In case of an appeal by the railroad, the testimony is to be made part of the court record. A motion for mistrial filed by counsel for the railroad was denied.

## Accept Application for Recreation Grant

Iosco Parks and Recreation Commission has received word that the Michigan Department of Natural Resources has accepted its application for a \$110,000 80-20 matching fund grant.

County Extension Agent Marvin Davenport, commission chairman, said Friday that, if approved, the funds would provide the bulk of a \$126,000 program to provide sanitary and other facilities for development of Oscoda Park, AuSable River Park and Old Orchard Park. Adopted last Thursday by the Iosco County Planning Commission was a comprehensive county-wide recreational plan. A detailed inventory of present, potential and needed recreational facilities will now be made by recreational commission members. A report of funds is to be given at a meeting December 4. Final plans for a park and recreational system will be drawn up by William Krause of Recreation Research Associates.

## Bay City Youth Receives Sentence

Sentenced to two to 10 years each on two counts of breaking and entering and two to four years on a charge of malicious destruction was Alan Osterhout, 17, Bay City. Osterhout appeared Friday before Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. All sentences are to run concurrently. The youth had entered a guilty plea to breaking into the Capital Business Service and Wojahn Floor Covering, located at the M-55-Wilber Road intersection, on August 14.

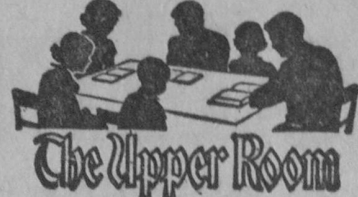

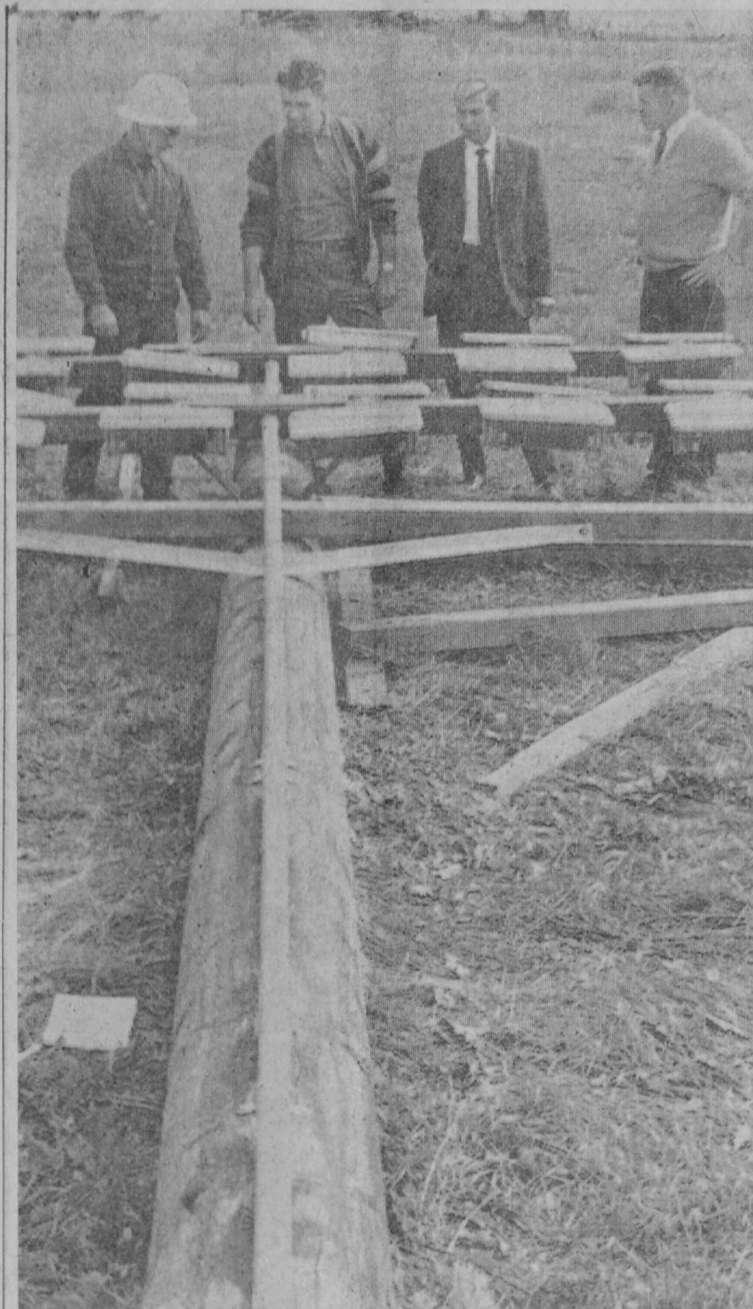

## National Newspaper Week

This is National Newspaper Week, October 5-11, and is being observed by newspapers—large and small—across the nation.

Publishers of the Herald point out that this newspaper has served Iosco County residents, business, city, township and county agencies for more than 85 years.

Through its columns, area "news and views" have been sent to an ever-growing list of citizen-subscribers. As was reported in the October 1 government sworn statement, paid circulation of The Tawas Herald has reached 3,637.

This has only been made possible by appreciative subscribers, advertisers and through installation of improved equipment capable of producing a newspaper speedier and with more news pictures.

Newspapers are local in the true sense of the word. Their columns are best fitted to carry the gist of "small efforts" in their community of readers, whether that community can be counted in the hundreds or thousands, the thousands or even the mere hundreds served in a tiny town far out on the prairie.

Personalized journalism is still the role of the newspaper reporter, writer and editor. The community newspaper's columns are filled with those "small efforts" of family life in America: The arrival of a baby, the reports of achievements from kindergarten through college, the sports accomplishments from Little League through organized school sports.

School budgets, new classrooms, playing fields and even band programs get their full play in the columns of the local newspapers. The school lunch menus for the next week frequently show up as news in the local paper.

Nothing is ever accomplished very fast in a democracy unless the electorate is informed fully and also guided to the proper course of action.

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Family Living Education

Sewing On Double Knits

Double knits are zooming in popularity for home sewing. We used to think of them as stretchy and difficult to sew on, but this is not the case if you make a few machine adjustments and handle with a little extra care.

Double knits best lend themselves to simple styles without many fussy construction details. Pockets can be done successfully but the bulk will show through unless taffeta is used for the under pockets to reduce bulk. It is also wise to use taffeta for facings in order to reduce bulk. Interfacings for double knits should be washable and permanent press. It is not necessary to line double knits. Lining will cause you to lose the elasticity and comfort of the knit. If you are worried about the dress clinging, a taffeta slip will correct the problem.

When laying out and cutting your double knit, there are a few precautions to follow. Use sharp pins and pin within the seam allowance. Blunt pins can mar your fabric. Use heavy shears for cutting and keeping seams straight. Go back and mark your notches later. Use tailor's tacks to transfer markings. Chalk and tracing paper do not work well on knits and are difficult to remove.

Machine adjustments for double knits are simple but very important. Use a fresh fine needle; a dull one might mark the fabric. Use a straight stitch presser foot and throat plate. The zig-zag foot and plate may cause the fabric to bunch.

Presser foot pressure should be set at medium or normal. Test the pressure by stitching two 12-inch strips of fabric together without thread. If the layers come out even, pressure is correct. If the top

layer comes out longer, the pressure needs to be lightened. To test for tension, stitch diagonally on two layers with 12 stitches per inch. Both top and underside should look the same. Pull stitching quickly while holding the ends firmly. Both threads should break. If only the needle thread breaks, loosen the needle thread tension and retest. If only the bobbin thread breaks, tighten the needle thread tension and retest.

### Putting A Lid On Air Pollution



A flying saucer? No, it's a novel way to contain and control odors, ice and fog associated with outdoor tanks at sewage disposal and water pollution control plants. Named Dow Domes by their originators, The Dow Chemical Company, the unusual structures are being used by an increasing number of municipalities. The domes, "spun" of Styrofoam plastic foam and covered with a thin layer of latex modified concrete, usually are constructed on the ground. When lifted into place they create an illusion of a flying saucer.

The circular structures improve the aesthetics of pollution control plants and eliminate obnoxious odors, hazardous, inefficient deicing procedures, and fog which sometimes is a safety hazard on adjacent roads. Because they insulate and contain materials so well, the domes improve the efficiencies of water pollution control facilities under all weather conditions.

Domes have been installed at Elmira, N.Y.; Fairfax, Va.; Cedar Rapids, Iowa; and other cities.

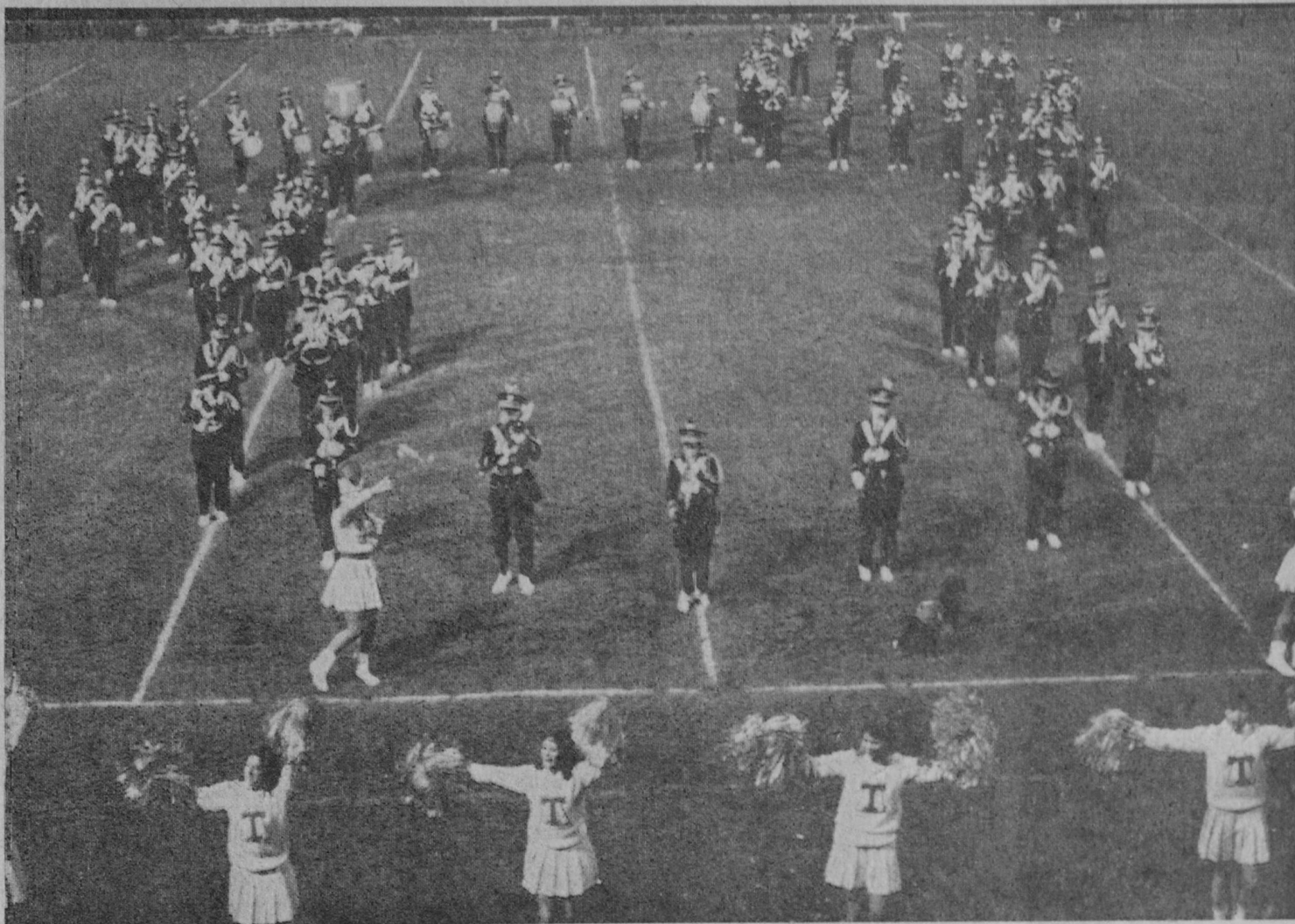

### Large Enrollment In W-P Areas Adult Education Program

A total of 148 adults is enrolled in the Whittemore-Prescott Community School Program, sponsored in cooperation with the Mott Foundation of Flint.

Academic high school, recreation and enrichment classes are under way. It is expected that 22 adults will receive high school diplomas in June, according to Jerry L. Humerickhouse, community school director.

The fall session of classes began the second week of September with 57 persons attending the academic high school classes. The remaining number are enrolled in enrichment classes offered in welding, ceramics, upholstery, women's physical education, reaty and knitting.

The classes in high school completion are arranged so that area adults regardless of residence or age may enroll. These classes are offered throughout the school year. Enrollment in these classes has closed for the fall semester and will be open again in January for the second semester of work.

High school completion classes consist of the basic educational classes taught in the day high school.

The enrichment classes are designed to enable persons from any area to attend the classes which interest them. These classes are started through the efforts of persons interested in learning about any subject area. The initial step is to send word of interest to the school director and he will in turn find the proper meeting place, instructor and materials for the class.

As an example, one class met last year with Mrs. Eimers to develop skills with ceramic ware. This year, the school has purchased a kiln and can fire materials at the school.

The time and effort of setting up the class is now paying off. Mrs. Harkey is teaching additional phases of ceramics this fall with much success.

This year, the community school idea has spread to the young children of the community. Twice a week classes are held for preschoolers to develop the interest and enjoyment of books. Some 38 children met with four leaders to listen to stories and learn the elementary group principles such as forming a circle, sitting as a group and listening to instructions.

An additional development of the program includes recreation after school for junior high school boys and girls, as well as enrichment classes.

As in the past, enrichment classes may begin any time throughout the school year. In that most classes run regularly for six to 10 weeks, the program is flexible enough to enable the

students to choose the dates of the meetings and concentrate their wishes. Adults are always invited to initiate the steps to begin classes they would like offered.

The winter session of community school classes will begin January 19 with many more interesting classes to be offered.

## Forest Chats

During the summer, two forest insect pests have been noticed in Iosco County as well as other parts of the Huron National Forest. As quite often happens, by the time damage is noted it is too late to do anything about them until the following year.

The first pest to become evident was identified as probably the fruit-tree leafroller which in the larval stage feeds on the young oak leaves and may cause a complete defoliation of the trees, although it tends to be concentrated in the upper part of the crown. Along with the defoliation, some areas were hit with a late spring frost which killed leaves on the lower portion of the crown. There is some indication that some of the defoliation was caused by a leaf tier and identification studies are continuing to determine this.

Control of the fruit-tree leafroller in forest areas is not economically possible, but for shade trees either sevin or malathion applied in June and July would help reduce damage.

The second forest tree insect pest noted was identified as birch skeletonizer. His name comes from the damage he does, actually eat-

determine the advance or lack of the pests. For these reasons, we usually do not have prolonged heavy infestations of these pests. This is fortunate for prolonged heavy attacks would severely damage our forest.
