Lamprey May Cause Heavy Loss to Coho

Despite some recent local success in catching coho salmon, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources fears that heavy losses to Canadian commercial fishermen and the sea lamprey appear to have diminished the chances that Lake Huron will have any substantial run of coho salmon for sports fishermen this fall.

While no one is predicting just how good or how bad fishing will be, evidence indicates that not many of the 400,000 coho smolts planted in Lake Huron in the spring of 1968 remain in the lake today.

One of the reasons is that about half of the coho salmon surviving their first year in Lake Huron were caught last spring in the nets of Canadian commercial fishermen. It is also believed that losses due to lamprey are substantial.

It had been expected that about 20 percent of the coho smolts planted in the Tawas, AuSable, Thunder Bay and Carp Rivers would survive and return to their spawning streams this fall. This would have added up to about 80,000 fish, weighing 10 to 15 pounds each, for sports fishermen to catch.

When the fish were concentrated in lower Lake Huron last spring, the Canadians, operating mainly out of Sarnia and Grand Bend, Ontario, caught a minimum of 40,000 coho, when the fish weighed about three pounds each.

Coho taken by sports fishermen in Lake Huron during recent weeks have shown the scars of lamprey. In addition, a boat operated by the Alpena Great Lakes Fishery Station caught several fish which were scarred by lamprey attacks.

The salmon is the only source of food for the lamprey remaining in Lake Huron. A number of streams feeding Lake Huron have been treated for lamprey, but the treatment was halted last year due to a lack of funds. The lamprey stream poisoning program is back on schedule, but the adult lamprey in Lake Huron are becoming fat on the salmon.

Walter R. Crowe, DNR biologist, said last week that Canada had thus far refused to put coho on the protected list "and we are not happy about the Canadian commercial fishermen netting the salmon."

Negotiations are to be continued through the Great Lakes Fishery Commission for a ban on commercial fishing in Canadian waters, as is the law in Michigan.

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morning that fishing would be allowed upstream from the weir as long as there are no complaints from private property owners concerning trespassing.

A fish biologist at the weir site Tuesday morning found that temperature of water in the river registered 71 degrees. He expressed surprise that the coho had entered the stream with water that warm, although he pointed out that Monday night's rain could have triggered a spawning run.

The DNR fish biologist said that it would be impossible to predict if the fish were going to continue to run throughout the week. He did say, however, that depredation by the lamprey is expected to reduce the number of coho returning to the Tawas River.

Large numbers of spectators jammed the M-55 bridge and other bridges over the Tawas River Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning watching the coho heading upstream. Several fish were caught on hook and line above the M-55 bridge. It appeared as though the fish were headed for Tawas Lake rather than Cold Creek.

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Because of the congestion of cars in front of the ramp, the city council Monday night authorized widening one of the ramps and extending another dock into the river to facilitate unloading of boats.

ing ramp Sunday was partially blocked by fishermen, who unloaded boats and then left cars and trailers parked in prohibited areas.

It is expected that Tawas Bay could receive a heavy influx of fishermen this week-end, once reports of the spawning run are heard in the downstate area.

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Mayor Campbell Charges:

'Help Yourself and Get Penalized'

A letter declaring that federal and state governments were "penalizing those who try to help themselves," has been sent to the governor and area legislators by Mayor James Campbell of East Tawas.

The letter, protesting what is termed as discrimination, was written by Mayor Campbell following receipt of information that federal funds are not to be paid on any cost of ambulance incurred prior to authorization by the Federal Highway Administrator.

In one letter written to Gov. William Milliken, Campbell said that new regulations controlling ambulances were necessary in some areas. "Possibly in itself, it is

a good thing, but like most other federal programs with which we have had contact, the administration of this program leaves a lot to be desired, particularly where there are not a lot of voters involved," said Campbell.

As a result of the state act, funeral directors of Iosco gave notice that they were going out of the ambulance business. On July 1, the county had no ambulance service except for the Townships of Oscoda and AuSable, where two funeral directors decided to stay in the ambulance business.

"In the spring, when the funeral directors gave notice, the county board of supervisors wrestled with

the problem and finally threw it to the local units of government at their April meeting," said Campbell. "At the next board meeting, concerned local units attempted to have the board review and change its stand, but were unable to do so."

"Since we knew none of the townships had the funds to purchase such equipment, had no reasonable way to operate and since we felt there would be no reasonable way to coordinate the required service unless someone was able to head it up, the City of East Tawas decided to take the bull by the horns and try to set up a service which would cover the rest of the county."

"We talked with a representative of the Office of Highway Safety Planning at Lansing and were assured that there would be federal funds available for 50 percent of the cost of the initial equipment required; three ambulances, radio equipment, etc."

"We set up a meeting with the concerned units and made arrangements with them to participate in the 50 percent which we had to raise, then submitted our application. The total amount involved is \$22,000, of which \$11,000 would be from the townships and cities."

Coho Start Early Run in Tawas River

Lake Huron coho must not have reached the headline in the Sunday edition of an area daily newspaper, which predicted "Few Salmon Left for Sports Fishermen."

The salmon began entering Tawas Bay in large numbers over the week-end and on Monday the Tawas River was black with cohos, all headed toward the spawning beds of Cold Creek in which they were released as smolts in 1968.

According to reports from riverside watchers, many of the large fish were terribly scarred by lamprey attacks and some were dying, after having their life juices sucked out of them by the lamprey.

Raymond Ledsworth of Tawas City reported Monday that he found three large salmon on the bank of the river near his home on River Street. All were dying because of the effect of the lamprey depredations.

Actually, the salmon were not expected to start the spawning run until later this month or early in October. As a result, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources had not closed the gates of their weir constructed in the river at the south end of First Avenue and the salmon were rushing up the river toward their destiny in Cold Creek.

When informed of the run, the DNR immediately closed the weir Tuesday morning and posted the river as off limits to all fishing. According to a DNR spokesman, such notification must be given five days in advance of actual prohibition of fishing.

LeClairs Ask Zoning Change for Commercial Development

A request to rezone several lots along US-23 in Tawas City as commercial has been turned over to the city planning commission for study and a recommendation.

A letter was read at Monday night's meeting of the city council from John and Sanford LeClair requesting that Lots 4, 5, 6 and 7, along with the northeast half of Lot 2, all in Block 13, Wheeler's Second Addition, be rezoned from multiple family dwellings to commercial.

It was stated that the property, located across US-23 from the Kroger Store, would be developed for business. Located on the property at present is the residence and dentist office of Dr. John D. LeClair and a house owned by Sanford LeClair.

The property had once been owned by the Prescott family and Doctor LeClair's home and office was constructed shortly after 1900 by G. A. Prescott Sr.

In other business, the council accepted a bid from Roy Newman Sr., M-65, near Hale, for removal of the fire-damaged Schultz Hardware building. Newman's bid was \$465 for demolishing the building and cleaning the property. He is to retain bricks from the structure. A second bid had been received from Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated, for demolishing the building, bringing the site to grade at a cost of \$3,500.

The council directed Supt. Regional Bublitz to contact the low bidder and prepare a contract, with work to start as soon as possible.

On recommendation of the city attorney, the council two weeks ago directed that bids be received for removal of the building. Cost of the work is to be assessed against the property owner.

On recommendation of Alderman Martin Wellna, a study is to be made to consider the possibility of installing parking meters along US-23. Wellna was appointed to as-

ist the council's street committee in studying the project.

The council approved payment of its second share of the total cost of purchasing ambulance equipment under the program adopted by local units of government. An application for a federal grant had been made to assist with purchase of the equipment, but was denied. Three ambulances had been purchased and representatives of the various units of government cooperating decided that each unit would pay a second installment in order to finance the project.

Based on a population-valuation formula, each unit is to pay a second installment as follows: Plainfield, \$1,936; Wilber, \$374; Baldwin, \$1,210; East Tawas, \$2,035; Tawas City, \$1,507; Reno, \$319; Grant, \$759; Tawas, \$858; Burleigh, \$484; Whittemore, \$319; Sherman, \$484; Alabaster, \$726.

Contract for operation of the ambulance service has been accepted by Tawas Hospital, which is now attempting to secure orders for its operation.

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PARKING was removed from nearly two miles of US-23 in Tawas City last week. Recommended by the city council about two months ago, crews of the Michigan Department of State Highways began installation of signs last Wednesday and had the job completed the next day. Parking is prohibited on the south side of US-23 from Fletcher's to the east city limit and from the east city limit to First Street.—Tawas Herald Photo.

Letter to the Editor:

We also are alarmed at the wave of obscene magazines and publications glorifying violence, pornography and disrespect for the law. 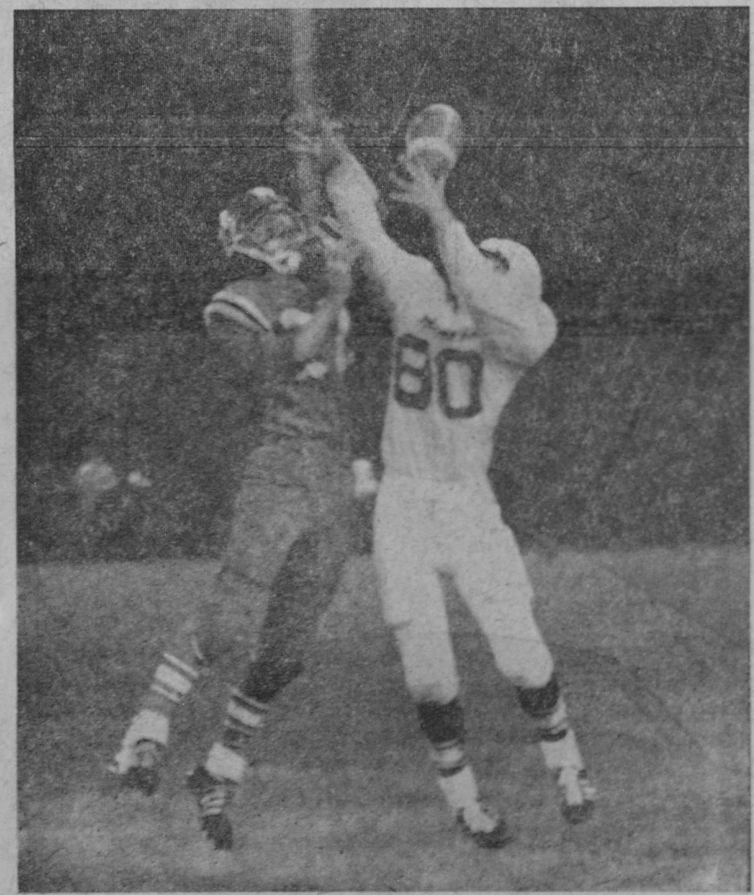
Coach Steve Sventko and his assistant, Roger Spencer, were understandably happy following the game. The Braves had gone without a victory since the 1967 season.

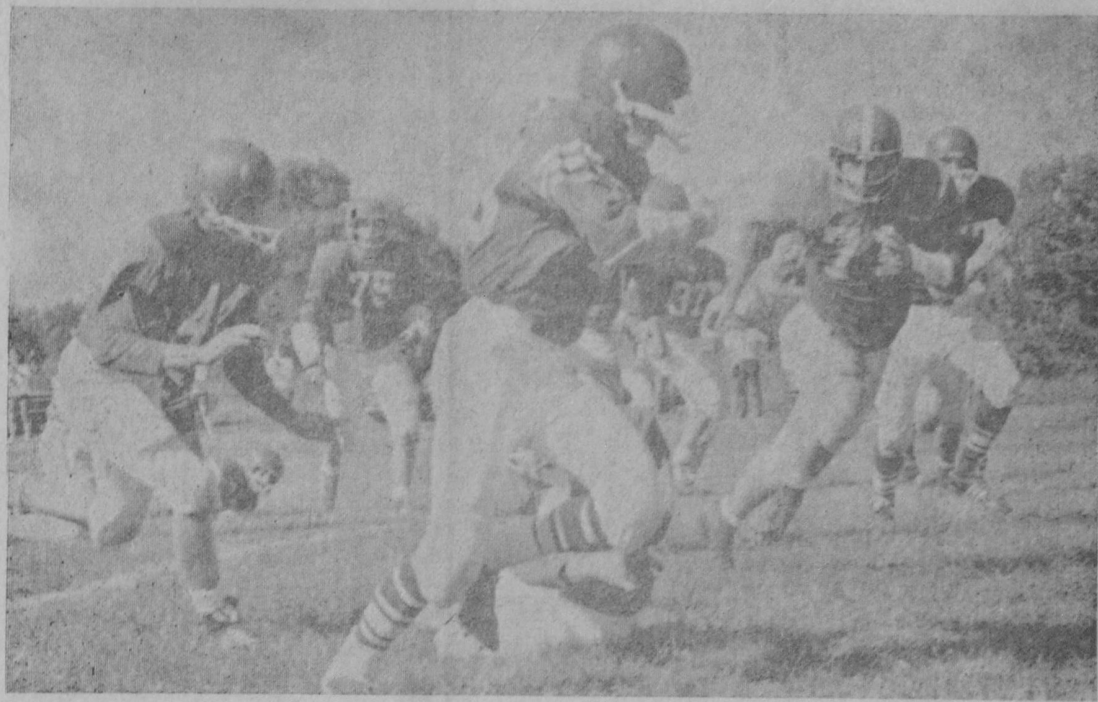
had another shot at the PAT attempt for 1 1/2 yards out from the goal line. Posen stiffened its defense and the try fell about an inch short.

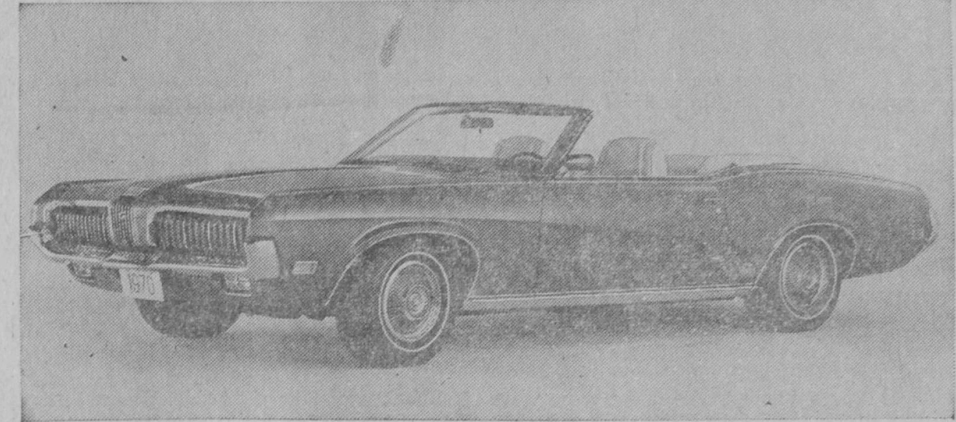

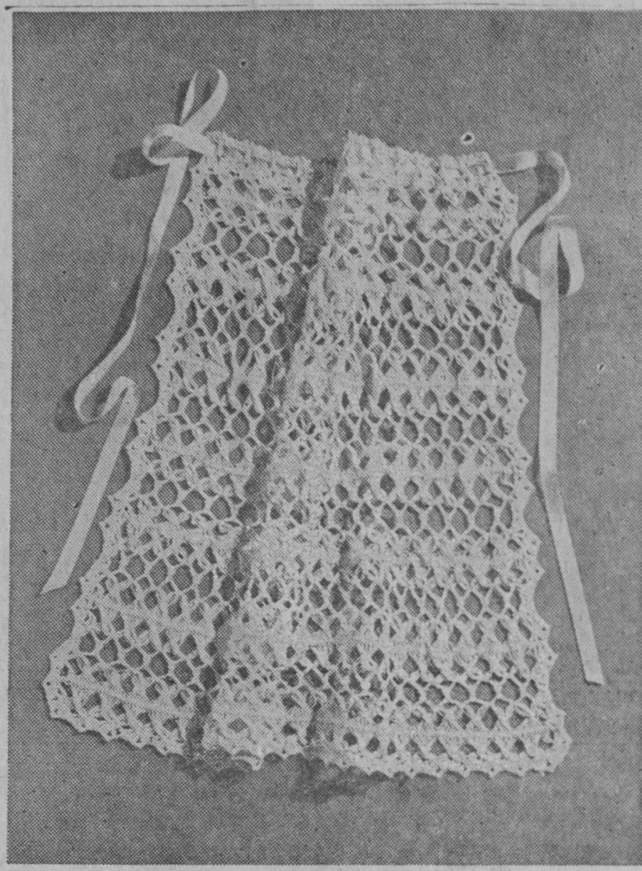
Recommend New Oscoda Bridge at Old Location

Preliminary recommendations of Michigan State Highway Department engineers call for a new bridge over the AuSable River on US-23 at the same site as the present bridge and a temporary bridge will be set up close by to handle interim traffic.

The new bridge would maintain the same clearance above the river as the present span and would be 188 feet long. The present span is 120 feet, nine inches long.

If plans are approved in the near future, construction work on the project could start next April. Cost is estimated at about \$310,000, part of a \$1,168,000 bridge replacement and road improvement program for US-23.

Included in the project are replacement of US-23 bridges over the Whitney Drain south of Alabaster and over the Rifle River at Omer, along with widening and resurfacing of US-23 from the Iosco-Alcona County line north to Harrisville.

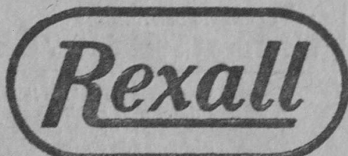

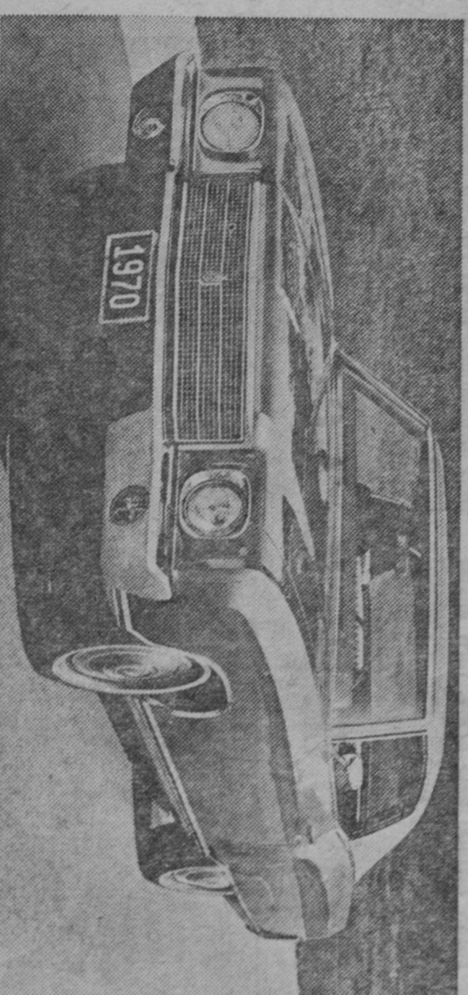

Report Received on Lake Huron Level

The International Joint Commission, United States and Canada, has under way an intensive study of water levels on the Great Lakes, according to Matthew E. Welsh, chairman of the United States section.

In reply, Welsh, said that a careful examination of Lakes Michigan and Huron water levels showed that the natural levels of Michigan and Huron had not been elevated due to regulation of Lake Superior.

At an appropriate time, when the benefits and cost of such additional regulation have been determined, the commission will be held to obtain the widest possible opinion concerning the proposals emanating therefrom," said Welsh.

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Notice to Michigan Bell Telephone Company Customers

the ambulance service with Tawas Hospital and felt that we would be able to make arrangements to have them operate it under a contract with the City of East Tawas. The earliest time they felt they could operate would be October 1, because of hiring and training personnel.

"Since we could not persuade funeral directors to continue to operate on a temporary basis until that time and since we were told it would be 60 to 90 days before we received word on federal aid, we decided that it was necessary to go ahead and operate on a temporary basis until these other things shaped up. We ordered three ambulances, radio equipment and took delivery on them as soon as we could find qualified people to operate them.

"Since we were already well into the tourist season, we received the first ambulance on July 4. It arrived here at noon and within an hour had made its first run."

Campbell said that on August 18, the city received word from the Office of Highway Planning that there were no funds available, that the application was being returned and that the application could be resubmitted at a later time.

However, the city has now learned that since arrangements had been made to borrow funds to pay for the ambulances, there will be no federal aid available. "In other words, don't bother to resubmit your application," said Campbell.

The mayor pointed out that while some of the amounts seem small, in some cases shares are almost half of the entire budget of individual units. One township took funds budgeted for township hall repairs and now will have to put off those repairs.

"If we had set here and not attempted to handle our responsibility; if we had not tried to take care of a problem which was dumped in our laps by those same governments; if we had just screamed that we would not do anything and left most of the county without ambulance service from July 1 to some future date when an application for aid would be processed, we would be eligible for assistance. But since we did try to help ourselves and stood up to the problem, going out on a limb

in the process by making arrangements to get ambulances and other equipment, we are being penalized by a technicality," said Campbell.

The mayor said it has been the same story with every federal program with which he has had contact. "There always seems to be an advance man with a great story, tales of the large amounts of federal aid available and reams of application forms. Each time there are assurances that 'this time it will be different;' but when he has gone there are the conditions and the ifs; and the large cities with lots of voters and big projects—and soon the rural areas get lost in the shuffle."

Attempts are now being made to determine if highway safety funds would be available to assist with the cost of operating the ambulance service.

State Scholarship Program Explained

Bulletins were sent home with seniors of Tawas Area High School last week explaining competitive scholarships, tuition grants and guaranteed loans for the 1970-71 academic year offered by Michigan Department of Education.

Thomas Pintkowski, guidance counselor, said Friday that some 13 scholarships were awarded last year to Tawas Area seniors under this program.

"The bulletins were sent home with students in order that parents may become more familiar with this program," said Pintkowski.

Michigan students may receive competitive scholarships up to \$800 per year or the equivalent of tuition and fees at any approved public or private Michigan college listed on the back of the bulletin.

To be eligible to receive a scholarship, an applicant must take the State of Michigan competitive scholarship examination November 8; be a high school senior, or a graduate who has not enrolled in college after high school graduation and prior to the examination; be a continuous resident of Michigan for the 18 months prior to the examination; be a citizen of the United States or have declared his

intention of becoming a citizen; be of good moral character; demonstrate financial need according to a parents' financial statement; comply with all provisions of the law and rules and regulations of the Michigan Department of Education.

Students are to register for the competitive scholarship examination between September 8 and October 13 through the high school counselor.

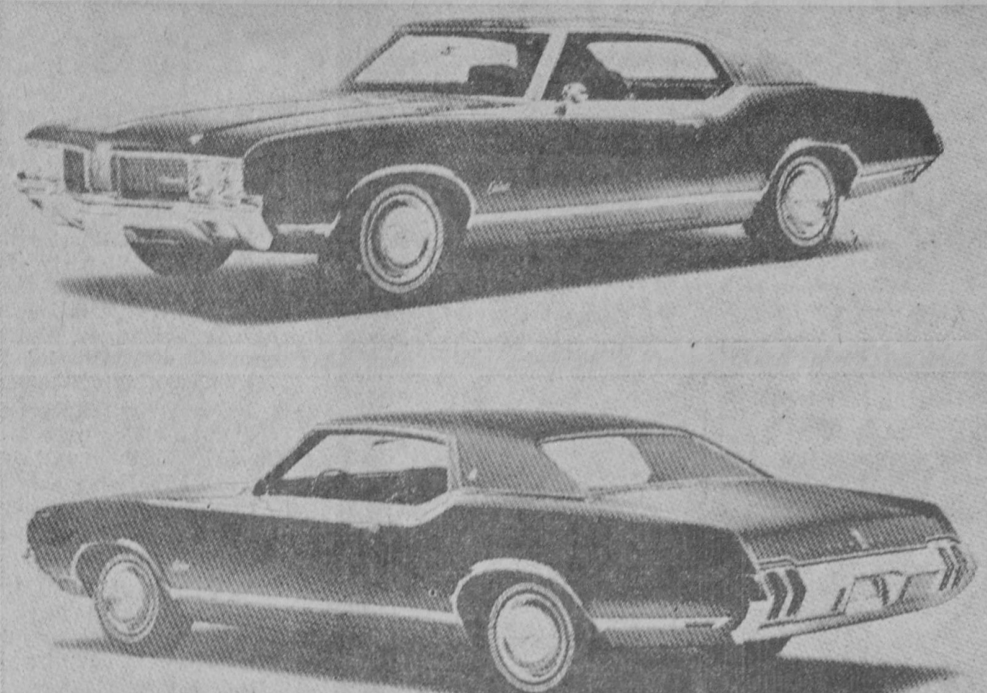
All students who take the examination will be notified of the results by January 1, 1970. Scholarship semifinalists will be sent application materials to be considered for state scholarship and Michigan tuition grants. Students who are not semifinalists will receive instructions concerning tuition grant application materials.

Students who have the financial means for attending college should take the examination in case of later changes in the family's financial circumstances.

The bulletin also explains procedures for obtaining guaranteed loans to help meet educational expenses.

A maximum of \$1,000 per academic year may be available to an undergraduate or vocational

school student attending an eligible school on a full time basis. "This is an important bulletin and I sincerely hope that all interested parents will review this information," said Pintkowski.

Overcrowding Causes Concern at Hale Area

Hale Area is a school with a problem—too many children in its already overcrowded, inadequate wood frame facility.

When doors opened for the 1969-70 term two weeks ago, 74 new students were on hand to be added to a bulging enrollment which had reached 540 at the close of the last school term.

Since June, when district voters turned thumbs down to a proposal to build a new 1.45-million-dollar junior and senior high school, 423 to 351, school administrators and members of the board of education have sought some way to relieve the predicament.

"We purchased two portable classrooms as a means of relieving some of the overcrowding, but with this 74-student increase and possibly more new students before the end of the month, we are right back in the same old position—the school is bulging at the seams," Supt. Paul Southerland.

"We kicked around the possibility of utilizing other buildings around the community to alleviate the problem. We have found, however, that classrooms located elsewhere would not be practical because of safety reasons.

"We have talked about going to half days, but that would be illegal according to the state; we have visited with officials from two neighboring school districts in the county, but find that Tawas Area School and Whittemore-Prescott Area School are in the same boat—they do not have facilities to handle any additional students from Hale Area.

"We have discussed the possibility of adding more portable classrooms, but that would be pouring more money down a rathole that increases our operational expense," said Southerland, in an attempt to explain some of the possible solutions which he and the

board of education have discussed during the past four months.

The superintendent said that Hale Area School's expanding enrollment is not caused by taking in students from other area schools, but from people moving into the school district, buying property and establishing new homes.

"Our two neighboring schools were willing to work out a program whereby students could be exchanged between the three schools for special types of education in the fields of business machines, vocational training, agriculture, fifth year mathematics and other classes which each school cannot offer because of costs.

"But, regardless of possible problems in scheduling, transportation and coordination, which could be licked, we at Hale Area School cannot provide something equal to the other schools—we just do not have the facilities to expand our curriculum," said Southerland.

The superintendent said that Hale Area School's 13 mills for operation is one of the lowest in the state.

"I don't advocate being up with the rest of the schools of the state, or even half way. Had the bond issue for school construction passed last June, Hale Area still would have had one of the lowest millage rates in the state," said Southerland.

"It is deplorable when one tries to fight inflation and high taxes elsewhere to hurt your own people—your own children. I am not for higher taxes either, but it is wrong to hurt our own children—kids should never be used as pawns when their lives are affected," said Southerland.

The superintendent said that many members of Hale Area

League for Education (HALE), a group of citizens which spearheaded the last bond vote, has urged the board of education to again place the school construction bond issue before voters.

The proposal has been turned down two times by voters during the past year and another vote will soon be considered by the board of education.

"I can tell you one thing," said Southerland. "You will never hear threats from myself or the board of education. We will try to urge voters to use reason on this proposition, but it is getting so that just using 'reason' is not quite good enough at this time. The lives of our children and the future expansion of our community are at stake."

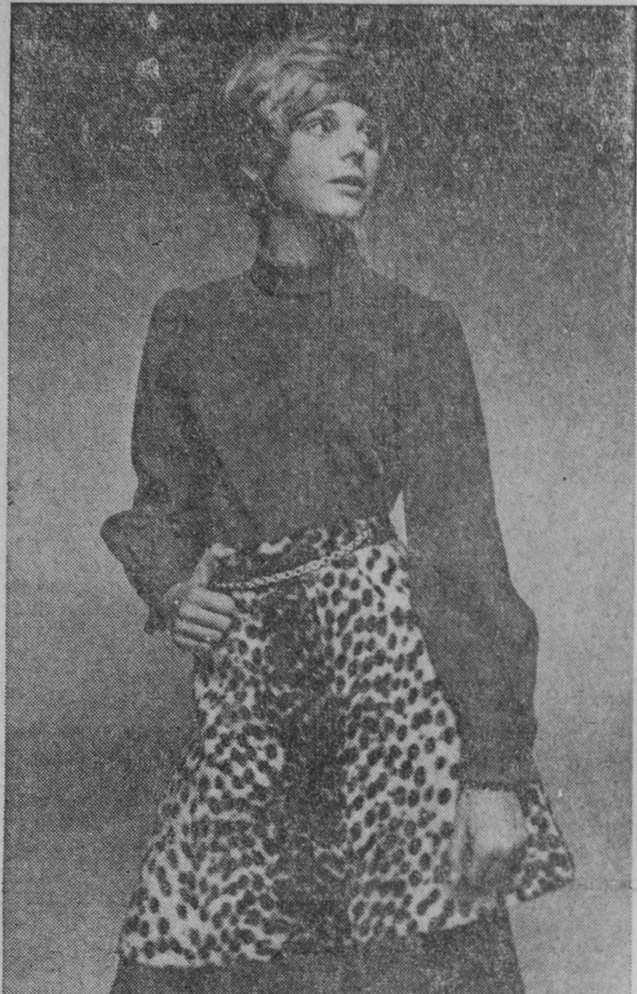

You don't have to be a lady leopard tamer to sew on fake furs. Your deep-pile fabric will purr like a kitten if you take heed from the pros at Coats & Clark. They suggest that you trim away the margins from your tissue patterns, but do not cut away seam allowances. Wherever possible, eliminate seams. For example, when a straight edge is to be faced with self-fabric, cut the body section and facing in one piece. You can cut fake fur fabric more accurately, if you pin the pattern pieces to a single thickness at a time, on the wrong side.

Machine-stitch only on the wrong side of the fabric. Do it slowly, moving in the direction of the pile. On the right side, use a long needle or fine comb to pull out pile caught in a seam. To reduce bulk in seams, shear pile from the seam allowances. Since pressing with an iron will mat the pile, use your thumbnail and then catch the edges of the seam allowances to the back of the fabric.

Fuzzy-Wuzzy Ways

It is better not to understitch or top stitch a facing seam on fake fur. To prevent a facing from rolling, baste it to the garment with a line of pins 1/4" from the facing seam. Fold the facing back on the pin-line and slip-stitch to the garment. Sew your zipper in by hand, using a centered application. To prepare the zipper opening, machine-baste it closed and shear the pile off the seam allowances. Around your hem, make a line of machine-stitching close to the raw edge and catch this stitching to the back of the fabric.

The A-line skirt shown here (Simplicity 8349) is purr-fect for the spotted leopard fabric of which it is made. The pattern has few seams and the least possible dressmaking details and darts. The waistband is fastened by hooks and eyes rather than a buttonhole. The leopard is tethered with a golden waist chain. A big-sleeved crepe blouse (Simplicity 8351) gently soothes the savage beast. Vests, hats and bags are also fun to make for yourself from phoney fur.

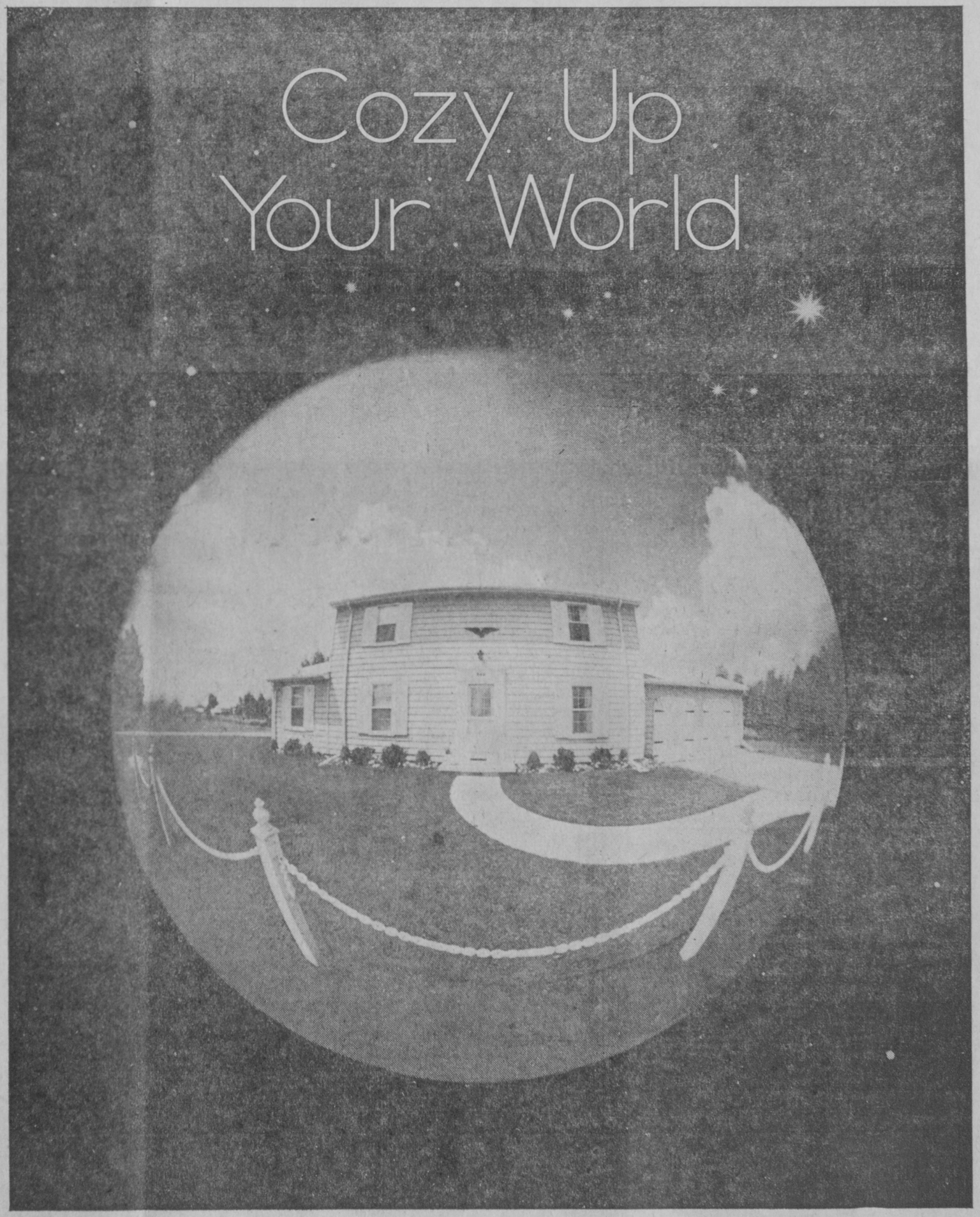

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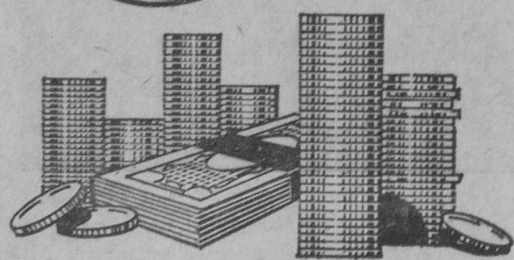

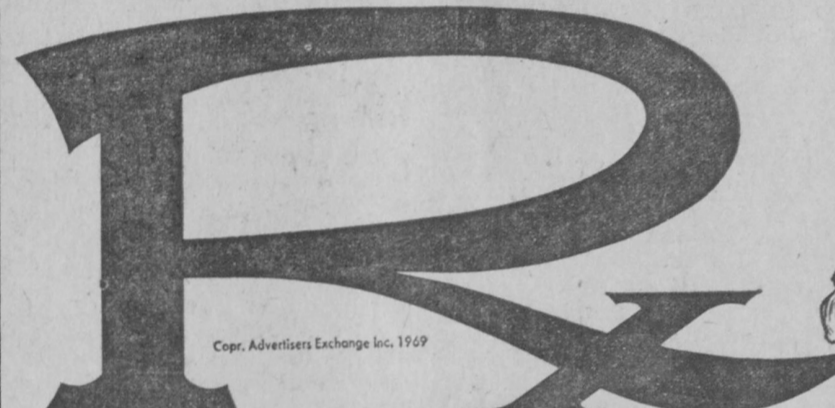
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
