

# Board Ratifies Pact Without Any Change

Formal ratification of a new master contract with teachers was given Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. Teachers had approved the contract two weeks ago and tentative approval had been given by the board last week.

Wordings of one section had apparently delayed formal adoption last week by the board. The board finally adopted the contract as written by negotiators for both parties.

In question last week was the proposed elimination of three words from one paragraph, which required the listing of reasons by the board for not continuing the employment of a probationary teacher.

The 32-page agreement, negotiated during the past six months, includes 18 articles and one supplement.

The board recognized Tawas Area Education Association as the exclusive bargaining representative for all teaching personnel, but excluding supervisory and executive personnel, substitute teachers, office and clerical employees.

The contract outlines rights of teachers, rights of the board of education, membership fees and payroll deductions, teacher conditions, illness or disability benefits, sick leave days, teacher evaluation, professional behavior, student discipline and teacher protection, negotiation procedures, professional grievance procedures, curriculum study, insurance.

The contract calls for a base salary of \$6,900 for a teacher with a bachelor degree and a maximum of \$10,143 for a teacher with 10 years experience.

Salary for teacher with a master degree is \$7,300, with a maximum of \$10,950 to be paid to a teacher with 10 years experience.

The district is to provide without cost to the teacher full family health care insurance benefits.

A teacher having classes beyond the normal teaching load is to receive a salary equal to that of a substitute teacher performing a similar task (\$5 per hour).

A supplemental extra duty list included the following salaries: Head varsity football, \$425; assistant varsity football, \$400; head junior varsity football, \$400; assistant junior varsity football, \$300; head ninth grade football, \$300; assistant ninth grade football, \$300; head varsity basketball, \$600; junior varsity basketball, \$400; ninth grade basketball, \$300; eighth grade basketball, \$300; head varsity baseball, \$400; junior varsity baseball, \$300; head track, \$400; head cross-country, \$300; assistant track, \$300; cheerleading coach, \$150; assistant cheerleading, \$100; golf, \$300.

Additional salaries for other duties included debate, \$225; forensics, \$150; department heads, \$200; lockers, \$200; special education, \$500.

The agreement is to be effective and in full force until June 30, 1972. However, it was expressly agreed that within 120 days prior to the anniversary date of the agreement, negotiations are to commence on salary consideration, including schedule, index, insurance, extra duty, substitute pay, compensation for hours earned above degrees and sabbatical leave pay.

## Three New Teachers Hired by Tawas A.

Three new teachers, all wives of personnel at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, have been hired by Tawas Area School to meet teacher needs brought on by an expanded enrollment this fall.

Mrs. Emma Chesser has been hired to teach the overloaded sixth grade class. She is a regularly certified teacher. Mrs. Sharon Chadwick has been secured to teach a section of second grade. She will be teaching as a substitute as she does not have a regular provisional certificate at this time.

Mrs. Dorothy Mooso has been hired to teach four extra classes in the seventh grade.

Miss Clara Bolon, elementary principal, said the district was fortunate in obtaining the services of these excellent teachers.

A report from Supt. Reynold Mick indicated that the pupil-teacher ratio, excluding administrators, is now 26.4 students per teacher. The school has 1,928 students and 73 teachers. Last year, the ratio was 28.6 students per teacher, based on 65 teachers and 1,858 students.

Miss Bolon and John Alexander, high school principal, said that daily enrollment totals were fluctuating slightly and that the fourth Friday count for state aid purposes would be held this week.

## Basketball for Girls OK'd at TA School

Authorization was given Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education to incorporate girls' basketball in the high school athletic program. This is a first in the history of the reorganized district, although individual schools had offered the sport previous to reorganization.

Board of education members were unanimous in their opinion that this athletic activity should be offered to the girls. The squad will carry 15 players in a 10-game schedule.

Estimated cost of starting the program is \$840, although it is expected that the cost could be slightly higher than this during the first year.

A break down of the estimated cost included salary of coach at \$300, uniforms amounting to \$300, four basketballs at \$80 and \$160 for officials in the five home games.

By state rules, the girls are limited to 1 1/2 hours of practice per day and no more than five practices and/or games per week.

In other business, Joseph Ruth from Yeo and Yeo Certified Public Accountants, East Tawas, presented the school's annual audit report.

### First Week-End of Fishing

# Fishermen Reported Fair Success With Coho

A conservative estimate by river and bay watchers indicated that approximately 100 coho were taken last week-end in Tawas Bay, the first time in history that these fish planted in Lake Huron by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources had been taken in any substantial number.

Fair success was reported during the first two days of this week and it is expected that larger numbers of fish will be taken as the season progresses. It is also expected that fishing pressure will be increased.

Attendants at the Tawas River launching site on Ninth Avenue said that the average weight for the coho was running around 10 pounds, although one fish tipped the scales at 18 pounds and a number of fish were in the 15-pound class. The fish had been planted in Cold Creek in 1968 as six-inch smolts.

It was estimated that about 50 percent of the fish showed scars of lamprey attacks, although this figure was lower than previously anticipated by conservation department officials.

While it was difficult to estimate the actual number of fishermen on the bay, a quick count in the vicinity of the Tawas River mouth both Saturday and Sunday indicated that there were about 125 boats in the 12-foot to cruiser class. From two to four persons were in each boat.

Law enforcement officials said Tuesday that the fishermen were very orderly, all apparently bent on enjoying the excellent weather conditions for the first week-end of fishing.

Residents of the shore line of Tawas Bay south of the river mouth reported that the beach was clean and that very little trash, if any, had been thrown into the water by fishermen.

Official count of cars and boat trailers at the Tawas City industrial site on Ninth Avenue, which was used for parking, was 213. The total was split about equally for the first two days, with a slightly higher number on Sunday.

"We had more trouble with local residents than out-of-town fishermen," said Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

The visitors, apparently seasoned fishermen who realized the serious problem caused last year to communities of Western Michigan, were very cooperative.

"The attendants reported that waiting time to launch boats was minimal, there were no problems with parking and trash was deposited in facilities provided in the area," said Bublitz.

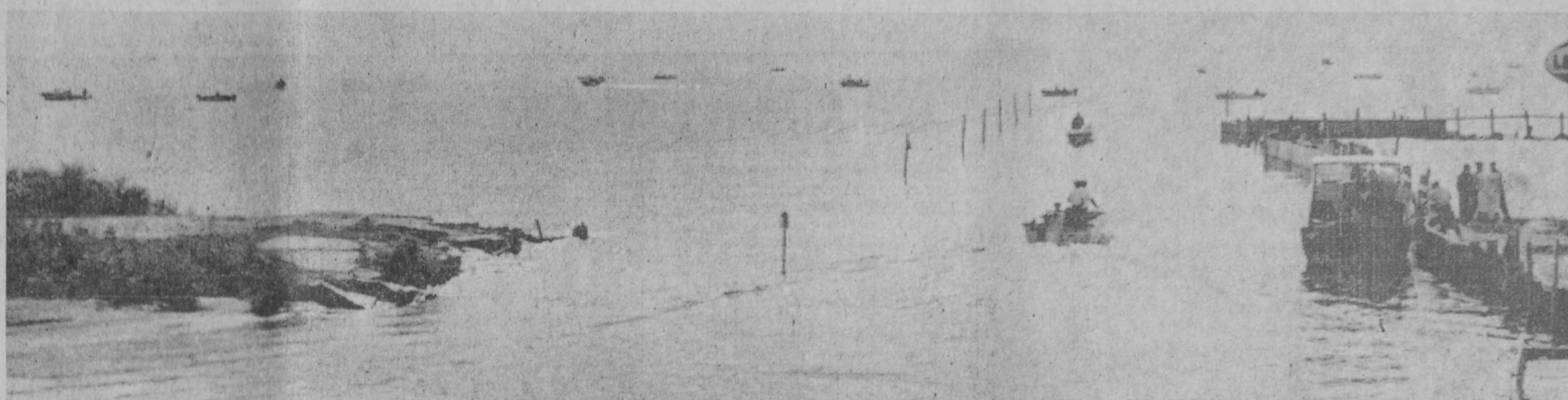
He said that six or seven local persons objected to the \$1 launch fee, although visiting fishermen thought the fee was reasonable. The fee covers the cost of maintaining the facility.

The weir at the south end of First Avenue caused no serious problems, although a number of persons parked along Court Street and looked at the installation from the river bank. The most serious problem seems to have come from area youngsters, who have damaged pipes in the weir by standing on them. One pipe was removed allowing the fish to travel upstream. This has been replaced and no trespassing signs erected.

Fishing is now prohibited along the entire length of the Tawas River, from the river mouth to Tawas Lake, and has been posted by the DNR. It had been announced that fishing would be allowed above the weir, but action was taken last Tuesday afternoon to close the entire river.

A spokesman for the district office at Mio said Tuesday morning that the Tawas River would definitely be patrolled this week-end to enforce the no fishing regulation.

Steelhead fishing at the Whitney Drain is expected to steal some of the "thunder" from coho fishing this week-end. Cecil Minard of the Singing Bridge Grocery reported Tuesday morning that several large steelheads were taken by fishermen.

## County Finances Not Bad, Says Treasurer

Iosco County's financial picture has improved considerably during the past three months, according to a report Friday from County Treas. Edward Nelkie.

As of August 31, the county general fund had a balance of \$57,668 to finance operation for the remainder of the year.

This was a great improvement over the picture earlier in the year when it was anticipated that the county general fund would probably have a deficit of \$50,000 by September 1.

Much of this improvement is reflected by the general prosperity of the entire state, said Nelkie. As an example, he cited the fact that the county's share of the state income tax was \$4,000 higher during the past quarter than during the same period a year ago.

The total return to Iosco County in income tax payment, last quarter was \$34,000, of which \$17,000 went to the general fund, \$12,243 to townships and \$4,921 to cities.

Nelkie expects that income tax returns from the final quarter for 1969 will show an even larger increase over the previous year.

The treasurer anticipated earlier this year that \$7,200 would have to be taken from the general fund to complete work on the medical care facility. The Department of Social Welfare recently reimbursed \$5,200 to the general fund to pay its share of the cost.

Through a new system of tax notices developed by Nelkie, the county is far ahead of previous years in tax collections. A year ago, 996 delinquent tax notices were mailed to property owners amounting to \$60,000 in past due taxes. This amount was greatly reduced this year and 797 statements were mailed.

Nelkie is now preparing a report of finances to be presented to the county board of supervisors at its October session.

## Water Board OK's Extension in First Ward

Authorization was given Monday night by the Tawas City Water Board to extend a water main on Cedar Street to serve the warehouse building of Tawas Industries, Incorporated.

Total length of the main will be 1,000 feet. The board authorized obtaining engineering for the project.

In other business, the water board ordered purchase of a new pump to be installed at the Second Avenue sewer lift station.

The pump would be incorporated into plans for future construction of a new force main from the Second Avenue station to the sewage disposal plant.

The new equipment would pump 750 gallons of water per minute, as compared to 300 gallons pumped by the present equipment.

Authorization was given to Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, to attend the sewage treatment operators training school to be held September 30-October 1 at Higgins Lake. Bublitz has attended this annual school for the past 14 years.

## Tawas Men Hurt in Motorbike Crash

Two Tawas men were injured late Saturday afternoon in a head-on crash with their motorbikes on Anderson Road, 3 of a mile west of Monument Road.

Injured and taken to St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw, was Herbert W. Galliker, 26, who sustained head injuries and a fractured arm. Treated at Tawas Hospital for a concussion and hand injury was Gary A. Lutes, 22, Tawas City.

Investigating officers said that the two men were riding together on the unimproved trail. Galliker was some distance ahead and, unknown to Lutes, turned his motorbike around and reversed his course. The two motorbikes met on a blind curve and the drivers were unable to avoid a collision.

Galliker sustained an eye injury and fractured jaw in addition to the fractured arm. Lutes lost the tip of one finger and smashed another finger in addition to the concussion.

# County to Quit Writing State Drivers Licenses

Iosco Board of Supervisors voted unanimously Wednesday to return operation of the drivers license bureau to the Michigan Secretary of State office effective January 1, 1970.

This action had been contemplated last month following a report from the sheriff's department which indicated that the county paid out approximately \$10,000 in salaries to collect \$6,000 in fees from the drivers license bureau.

It was also felt that by eliminating the bureau, the sheriff's department would have more manpower to work on complaints and investigations.

In addition to this action, the board authorized hiring of an additional deputy sheriff immediately to replace all of the present part-time officers. Effective January 1, two additional officers are to be hired.

In other matters, Mayor James Campbell of East Tawas appeared before the board and asked for county assistance in financing the ambulance service being operated by 11 local units of government in cooperation with Tawas Hospital.

Campbell pointed out that a federal grant which had been assured to pay one-half of the cost of ambulance purchase had been denied

and that it appeared that the 11 local units of government would not be eligible for a grant in the future.

The mayor suggested the possibility that the county apply for the grant, or assist in borrowing \$11,000 to offset an anticipated deficit. The matter was referred to the health committee for study.

The board authorized the prosecuting attorney to prepare a resolution authorizing the county's park and recreation committee to administer its own finances. This administration had previously been handled through the clerk's office, with all bills submitted to the board of supervisors.

A resolution was adopted approving Iosco's participation in a tri-county study of the AuGres River watershed. This study would be financed through federal funds at no cost to Iosco.

The board authorized increasing the salary of the dog warden from \$100 to \$300 per month, plus fees. The change was made retroactive to September 15.

Charles Smith, Oscoda Township supervisor, appeared before the board and asked assistance from the county concerning a dispute with the state health department over operation of a sanitary land facility in Oscoda Township. The

matter was referred to the health committee.

Discussion was renewed on the possibility of constructing an office building near the medical care facility to house the department of social services and health department. It was stated that 50 percent of the cost of quarters for the department of social services was available from Hill-Burton funds and that the state would provide 50 percent of the funding required for health department office space. The county's share of 50 percent could possibly be financed by the county building authority, through issuance of revenue bonds. A feasibility study on this project was authorized.

An additional allocation of \$250 to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce was authorized from the county advertising fund. A \$500 allocation had been approved previously. The board authorized a total of \$750 to the Oscoda Chamber of Commerce.

County Clerk Keith Papas was authorized to attend a court administrator conference at Lansing in October.

A request by the parole and probation department for a new electric typewriter was denied. The board authorized repairs to (See SUPERVISORS, page 4.)

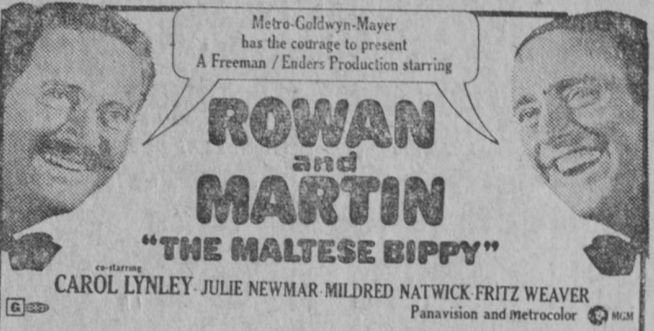

### Bloodmobile Sets Iosco Visit Sept. 29-30

Information is being distributed this week in the Tawas and the Oscoda area urging area residents to donate a unit of badly needed blood in the upcoming blood drive, September 29, 2:00-8:00 p. m., East Tawas Community Building, and September 30, 2:00-8:00 p. m., Oscoda Township Hall.

Iosco County is now in the 80 percent bracket, which means there could be a chance that this county could lose the privilege of participating in the blood bank program.

If this were to happen, it could cause a financial hardship on everyone who might need blood.

Now, blood may be replaced—free of charge—for any Iosco County resident, any place in the United States, simply by contacting Wanda Pipp, secretary of Iosco County Chapter of the American Red Cross, at Tawas Hospital.

The information needed is: The name of the person who received blood, how many pints of blood were actually used, the name of the hospital where blood was received and the approximate date or dates when blood was received.

The age limit of donors has been extended through the age of 65, which will enable many older persons to earn their five or 10-gallon pin. Those over 65 may also donate blood by having a doctor's written permission. Young people between the ages of 18 and 21 may

also donate blood by having written permission from their parents. There have been 115 pints of blood used at Tawas Hospital and 63 pints have been replaced for county residents who have received blood at hospitals outside the county since the last blood drive on May 26.

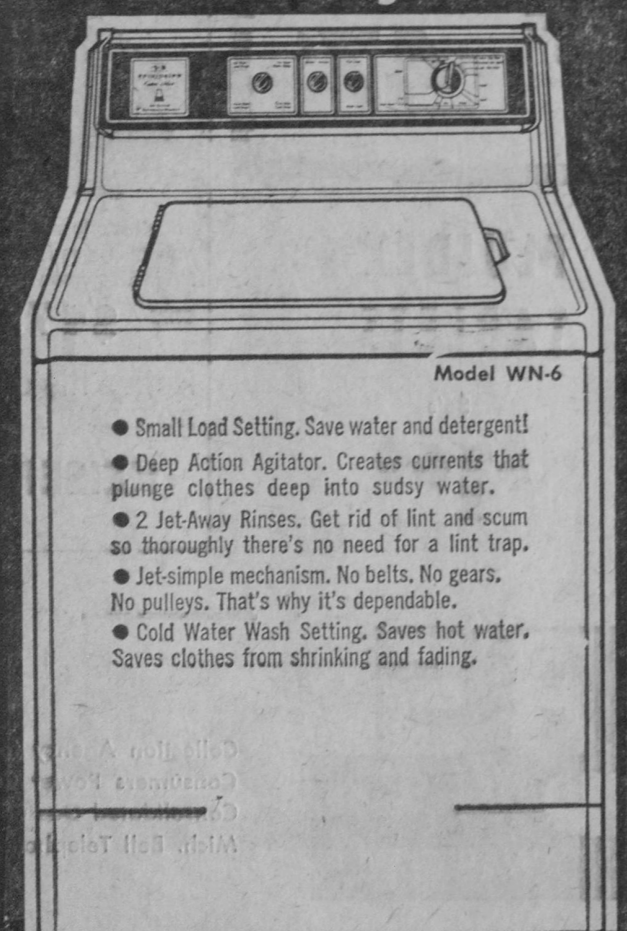

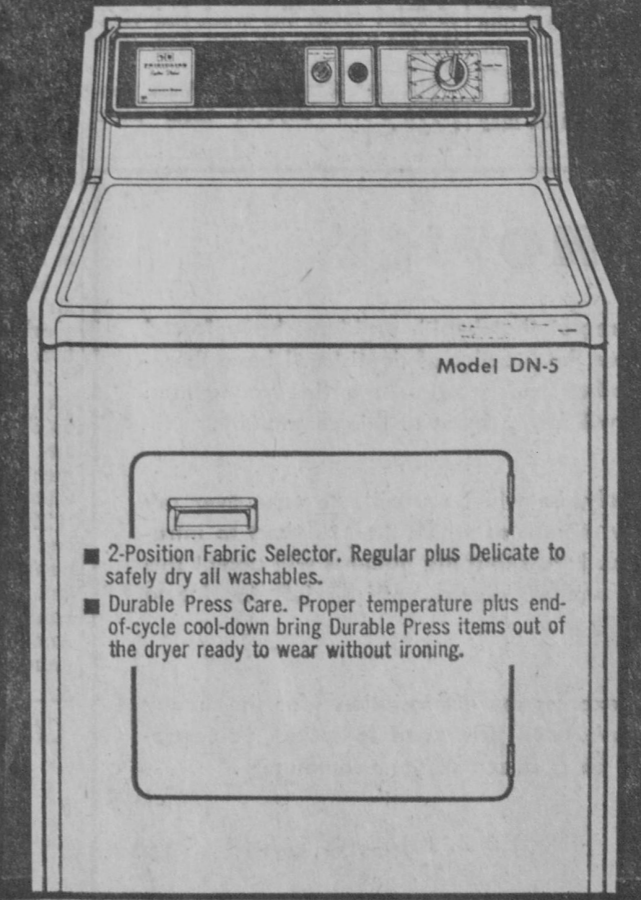

Hale then scored two times on the ground, Randy Chrivia going over from four yards out and Dave Graves on a 25-yard sweep around left end.

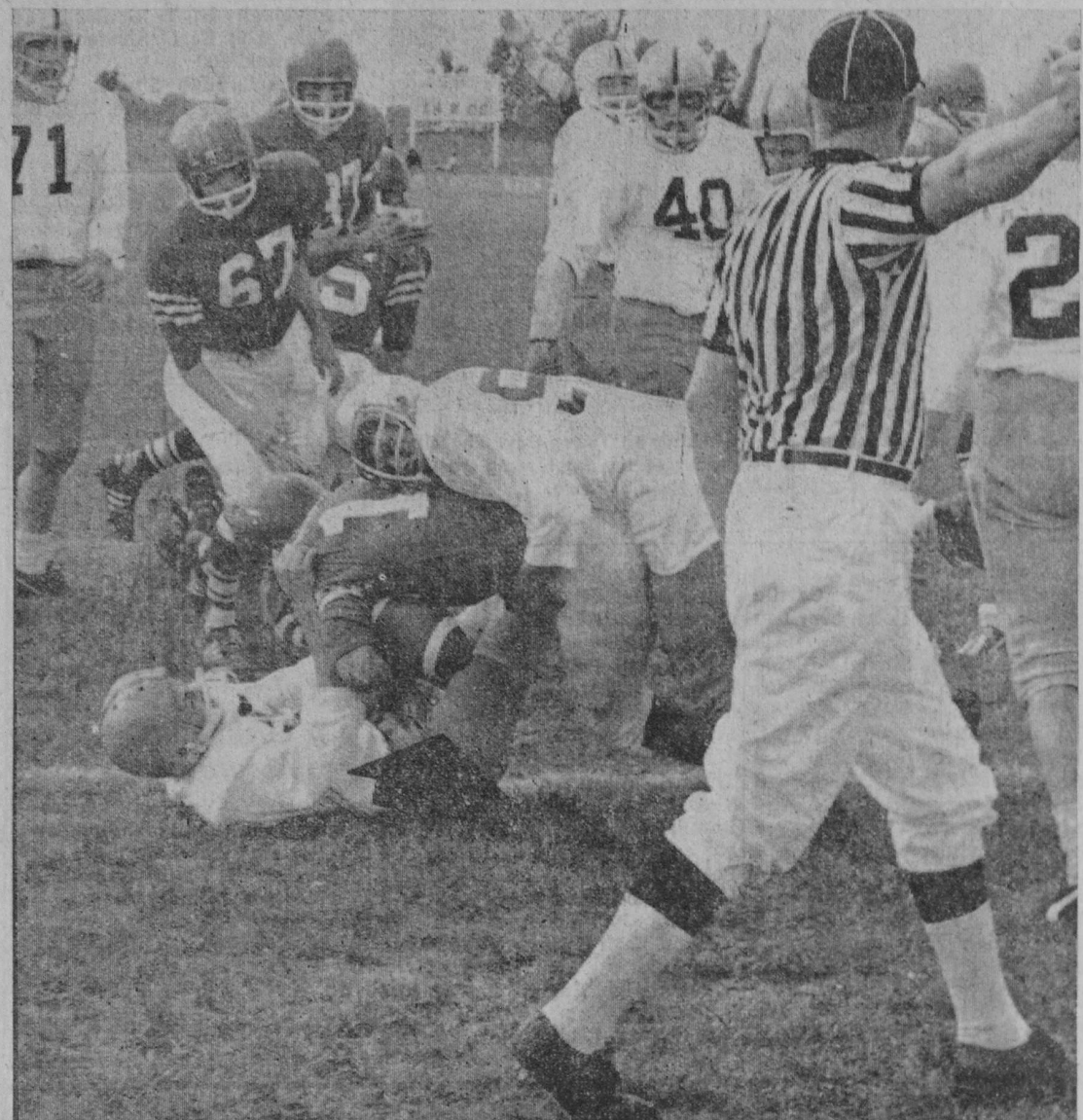
The next score came on a pass

and loss of three yards on one play stalled the drive and Pinconning took over on its own seven.

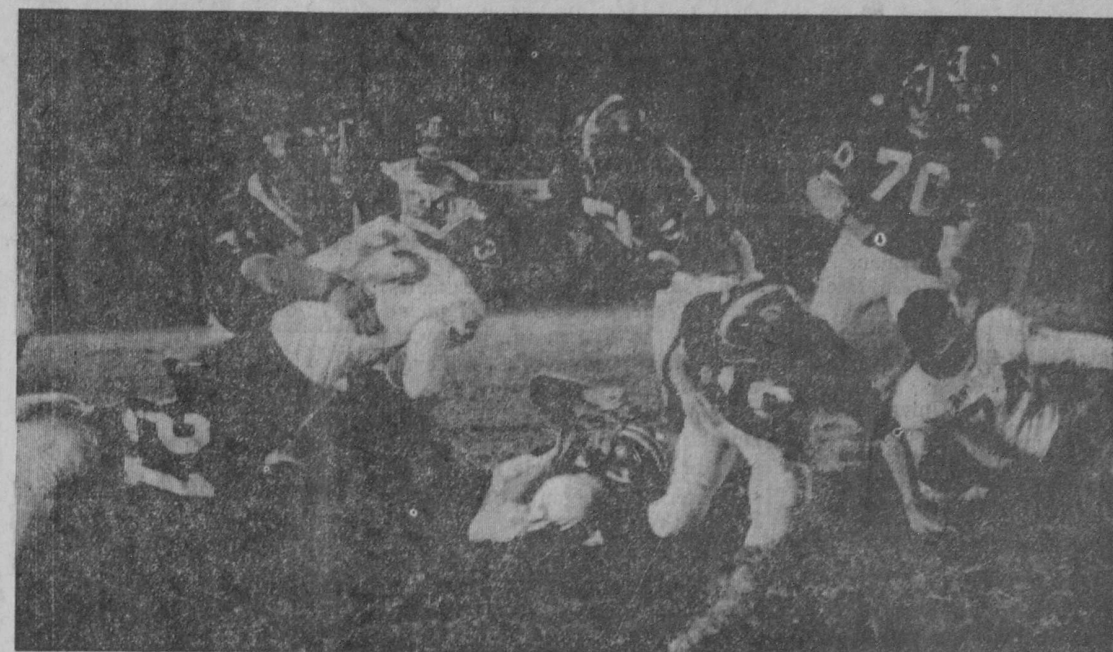

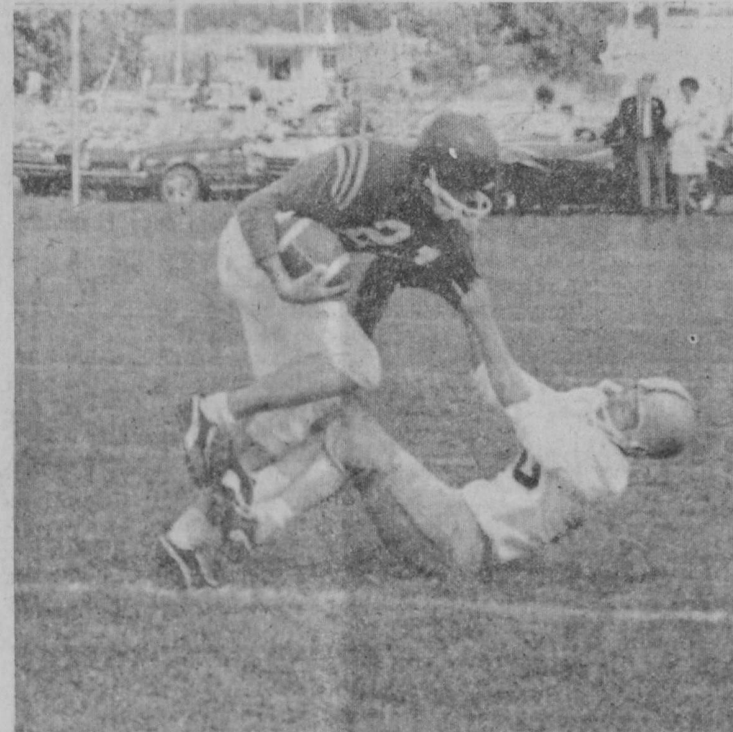
The Braves had 180 yards rushing and 36 yards passing, while
