

Reed Sentenced to 12 to 15-Year Term

Alvin E. (Jack) Reed, 47, was sentenced Tuesday to a term of not less than 12 years nor more than 15 years in Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, for the fatal shooting last December of Mrs. Norma Williamson of Whittemore.

Reed had been found guilty of manslaughter August 8 by an Iosco Circuit Court Jury.

In passing sentence, Judge Allan C. Miller said that Reed "still has the object of his rage in the community," which he said must be considered in sentencing. He said that a second element under consideration was that the sentence should serve as a deterrent and protection to society.

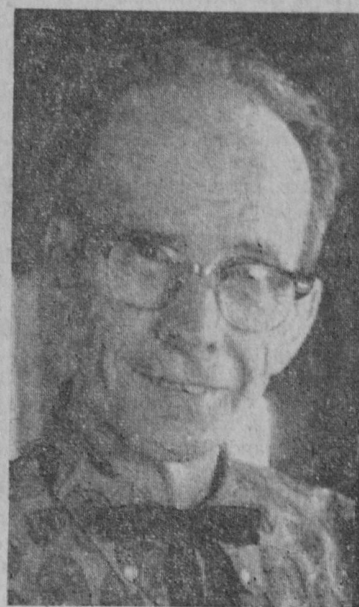
In his remarks, Judge Miller said that there still are questions remaining unanswered in the case, although they could not be considered in sentencing.

Reed was given credit on his sentence for the time spent in the county jail from December 17, 1968, to the present. He was advised that he had the right to appeal the decision within 60 days.

Judge Miller said that if the defendant had no assets, the court would appoint an attorney to perfect the appeal. However, he noted that testimony during the trial had indicated that Reed owned property or held it jointly.

Three other persons were sentenced last Friday by Judge Miller.

N. O. Sibley Dies; Veteran 4-H Leader

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday for Norman O. Sibley, 59, Tawas City, who died August 30 at his home. The Rev. Raymond Bruce officiated at services conducted at Hale Baptist Church and burial was in Evergreen Cemetery, Hale.

Sibley was hospitalized in September 1968, and was transferred to Ann Arbor on December 1 for surgery. He returned home last March for recuperation.

Born August 28, 1910, in Reno Township, Mr. Sibley was well known throughout Iosco County for his work in the 4-H Club program, having served as a community 4-H Club leader for more than 30 years.

In April, he received an award for outstanding service and leadership to 4-H Clubs. The award was to have been made during the annual recognition banquet in December.

An employee of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources since 1938, Sibley worked in the DNR's recreational department after discontinuance of state fire towers. He had other ideas about seeing fire towers being doomed to oblivion, however, as he purchased the old Hale fire tower and presented it to the county for a roadside park.

Sibley was named the American taxidermist of the year in the February-March 1969 edition of the American Taxidermist. He had begun his taxidermy career 30 years ago as a hobby and continued as a semiprofessional.

Stated the magazine's citation: "Norman O. Sibley—taxidermist, conservationist, naturalist, poet, artist, lecturer, author and humanitarian—the American Taxidermist of the year award is hereby presented to you by this magazine for your contribution to your fellow man, your dedication to your country."

He had also been involved in research and banding operation of the monarch butterfly. His poem, "Meditation Upon a Butterfly," won him national acclaim. A number of national magazines published materials written and illustrated by Sibley.

He is survived by his wife, Elsie; two brothers, Jesse and John, both of Tawas City.

Tawas School Contract Still Not Signed

Classes opened Tuesday morning at Tawas Area School for the 1969-70 term, but a contract between the board of education and Tawas Area Education Association still had not been signed.

Negotiators for TAEA members rejected an offer from the board of education last Thursday night. A second meeting was held Tuesday afternoon with the board making a different proposal. This, too, was rejected.

It was understood by this newspaper that teachers are remaining at their posts on a day-to-day basis during contract negotiations.

A proposal submitted Tuesday by TAEA is to be considered next Monday night by the board of education.

Flint Man Died of Heart Attack

A 56-year-old Flint man, George A. Stewart, suffered a heart attack and died Friday afternoon after water skiing on Long Lake, Plainfield Township.

Investigating officers said the victim had jumped from the skis and was swimming toward shore. He began to flounder in the water and was dragged to shore by his wife.

A passerby administered mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and Plainfield Township Fire Department later administered oxygen. The victim was dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital.

Officers said that an autopsy performed at Saginaw disclosed that the victim had died of a heart attack. Investigation was conducted by the Iosco Sheriff's Department and Michigan State Police.

Ambulance Service Contract is Signed

A contract was signed Wednesday night by the City of East Tawas, acting on behalf of other local governmental units, for operation of an emergency ambulance service by Tawas Hospital.

The contract was turned over to hospital authorities for action by the board of trustees. Representatives of the 11 local units of government gave approval to the contract.

Principal discussion at the meeting was ways and means to finance a deficit caused by the present inability to obtain a federal highway safety grant to aid in financing purchase of three ambulances.

Mayor James Campbell explained that federal funds for this purpose had currently been exhausted, although it originally appeared that the local application was "high on the list" and seemed likely to be approved.

It is expected that additional money will be made available in November and a new application will be submitted at that time.

Meanwhile, City Atty. Michael Freely is to prepare a contract between East Tawas and other cooperating units for operation of the ambulance service. There was some discussion concerning possible formation of a nonprofit corporation to finance the operation, but it was felt this could complicate any approval for borrowing funds by the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission.

It was stated that the group owes a balance of \$9,900 on the three ambulances, after payment of a like amount by the various units on a valuation-population basis. An additional \$2,000 to \$3,000 will be required to equip the ambulances with radio and contingencies which may arise.

Steps were taken to finance the cost by having each unit paying a second assessment, based on the same ratio as originally charged.

Officials of the participating units were to go back to the various governing bodies for approval on this method of financing, should the federal grant not be forthcoming.

Richard Harwood of Peoples State Bank appeared at the meeting and said that financing could be arranged by those units desiring to repay the loan over a five-year period, at the regular low interest for municipal bonds. However, he stated that investigation should be made to determine if such an arrangement would be approved by the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission.

Another meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 16, to discuss additional information on financing, the contract and any other matters concerning the ambulance service.

A five-man committee was appointed to study methods of financing. Included were John Weible, Alabaster; Campbell, East Tawas; L. S. Little, Grant; James Mielock, Reno; John St. James, Tawas City.

Council Orders Fire Damaged Store Removed

Upon recommendation of City Atty. Kenneth Myles, Tawas City Council adopted a resolution Tuesday night directing the city superintendent to have the burned out shell remaining from Schultz Hardware to be removed as an unsafe and dangerous building.

The hardware building, located at 530 Lake Street, had been gutted by fire on November 11, 1968. In his letter to the council, Myles indicated that he had sent notice March 17 to Allen Schultz, apparent owner, that the building remaining in its present condition was a violation of the city ordinance.

Myles said that the 30-day period provided by the notice had expired with no action taken.

In addition, the city attorney sent the same notice to Cecil and Ruth Cabbie, owner of record for this property. Cabbie, a member of the council, has stated at previous meetings that he was owner in name only and that his claim on the property was minimal.

The city attorney cited Section Three, Chapter 14, of an 1895 act as the law empowering the city to remove any dangerous building. He indicated that the act provided for the cost of removing the building to be assessed upon the property and collected as a special assessment.

Blitz was directed to receive bids for removing the building and to cause the cost, including legal fees, to be assessed on the property.

Three Schools List Adult Ed. Enrollment

To help adults get any education they might need, an intensive two-week effort will get under way starting September 8.

Called "Project Return," the state-wide effort is being coordinated by the Michigan Department of Education. Locally, the project is being handled through Tawas Area Schools, Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools and Hale Area Schools.

Aims of "Project Return" are to inform citizens who want more education that it is available, to encourage citizens to make inquiries to see if the local adult education program offers something for them and to better utilize the educational facilities in the community.

According to Dr. Ira Polley, Michigan superintendent of public instruction, the growth of adult education in the last few years "has been one of the most encouraging signs in our whole educational picture."

More than 7,500 high school diplomas were awarded through adult education programs in the 1968-69 school year, compared with less than 750 just six years ago.

"Perhaps one of the major reasons is that the state last year paid about 71 percent of the cost of adult high school education programs, with students fees accounting for 17 percent and local districts paying 12 percent," Polley said.

City Garage Expansion Has Council OK

Building and grounds and finance committees recommended to the Tawas City Council Tuesday night that the proposed city garage addition be constructed now due to the essential reason for fire truck housing.

The council adopted the proposal by a five to one roll call, approving an expenditure of \$3,565 for the building. The cost does not include doors, which are to be purchased at a later date.

The two committees had discussed possible financing of this project following the last council meeting two weeks ago. After a complete study of financial obligations and budget commitments, it was found that \$3,565 could be used from the general ledger fund for this project.

A study of the general ledger fund indicated that \$18,909 was available for capital improvements. Other items included payment of \$692 on the city's contract for purchase of the Ninth Avenue industrial site, \$3,000 as the council's share of dragline repair, \$7,000 for a new dump truck and \$1,000 to be returned to the revolving or special assessment fund.

The council had spent an additional \$3,217 from this fund previously this year, including \$710 on the industrial site land contract, \$1,000 for a tractor-mower and \$1,507 as this city's share of purchasing ambulances.

Since the last council meeting, the city has learned that a federal grant had been denied toward assisting purchase of three emergency ambulances. As a result, the city will be required to make a second payment of \$1,507 as its share of the program, although it is expected that arrangements can be made to finance this on a longer term basis.

The proposed 40 by 40-foot concrete block addition to the city garage on Fourth Street would be used to house DPW equipment. The fire department's water tank truck would be quartered in the original portion of the building, which is heated.

Quarters provided for housing fire equipment in the city hall are presently overcrowded.

Pledge Goal Reached by Tawas Hospital

Tawas Hospital has reached its first goal in the current campaign to raise matching money for a Hill-Burton federal grant for hospital expansion.

M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator, announced Friday that the total in pledges and cash at this time is \$211,285, which is a start toward the ultimate goal of \$400,000.

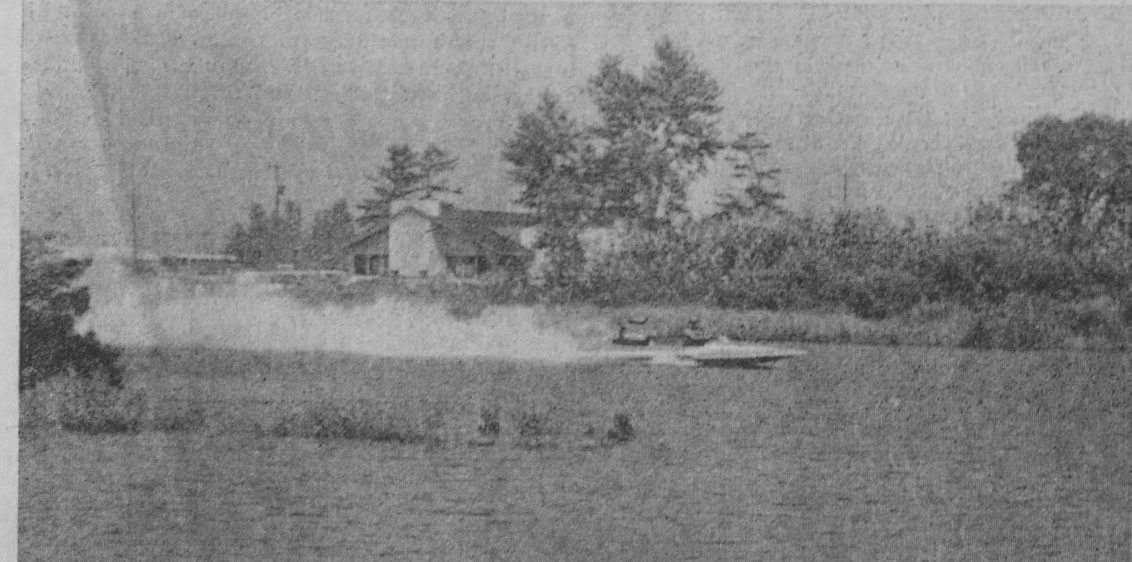
"The many friends from the local communities of Iosco County and surrounding counties, along with our many summer friends from out of the area, have made it possible to reach the first stage of our goal," said Norwood.

"The first step should be definite proof that the communities are fully behind the hospital and are well aware of the need for the hospital expansion," he said. Norwood said the expansion is only the first step toward future expansion and better health care for all citizens of East-Central Michigan.

"For those who could not pledge because of their own financial needs, their good wishes and prayers are appreciated just as much as contributions that were made," said the director. "Without all of us working together, this first step toward our goal could not have been accomplished in such a brief time."

First Baptist Sunday School Plans Rally

Members of the Sunday school will also face a new experience. For the first time in the history of American Baptists and for one of the first times in the history of Protestantism, a completely new curriculum plan for all ages is being put into use.

"We hope to assist the churches to make the church school hours the most valued hours of the week," said the Rev. Grant Hanson, director of the project for American Baptists.

To arrive at this point, nine years ago 16 denominations began to construct a new curriculum design. Four years and several hundred research and planning conferences later, the first step was completed.

The next several years were spent developing new curriculum

resources for the church school. Sixty field-test churches put preliminary materials into classroom use. Weekly reports of teachers and pupils indicated what worked, what worked well and what did not work at all.

Initial response to the new curriculum has been exciting. Already, many items are in their second printing.

"We are not soft-pedaling the facts," says the Rev. Kenneth Blazier, American Baptist's director on curriculum interpretation.

Under the leadership of Lyle Healey, Sunday school superintendent, Sunday school of First Baptist Church will be involved in the use of materials in the new curriculum.

Michigan Heart Association Gives Isosco Report

The percentage of deaths caused by heart attack, stroke and other cardiovascular (CVD) diseases in Isosco County has fluctuated sporadically over the past five years.

Dr. Edward W. Green, president of the Michigan Heart Association, announced today.

In 1964, 59.8 percent of all Isosco deaths were from CVD; 1965, 50.2; 1966, 58.6; 1967, 51; 1968, 54 percent.

In contrast, the state-wide totals were in 1964, 54.7 percent; 1965, 54.3; 1966, 53.9; 1967, 54.1, and in 1968, 53.6 percent.

The state figures approximately match the national which show slowly dropping rates and percentages.

Dr. Green attributed this to new medical techniques for control of at least one risk factor, high blood pressure, as well as campaigns to educate the public to avoid other risk factors.

The association, a Michigan United Fund Agency, has been conducting vigorous programs to teach the public to avoid smoking, high fat diets and lack of exercise.

In 1968, for the first time, the Michigan State Department of Health, source of these figures, was able to determine heart attack deaths. In Isosco County, it was 54, 64.2 percent of all heart deaths

and 45.3 percent of all CVD deaths.

Doctor Green, director of Cardiology, Children's Hospital of Michigan, Detroit, said the Isosco percentages are too small to be statistically significant; however, they demonstrate the magnitude of the heart disease problem.

Analysis of the figures showed that with exceptions, the highly industrialized southern counties with younger population had lower percentages of cardiovascular deaths than the rural counties with more aged populations.

ily, a dish to pass and tableware. Coffee and a cold drink for the children will be furnished at the park.

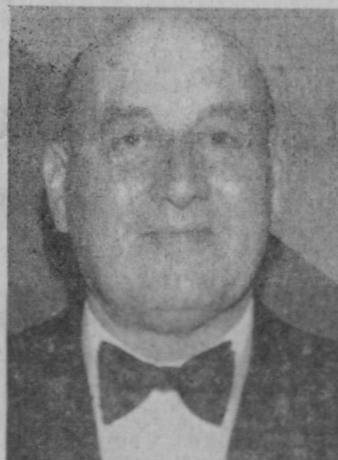

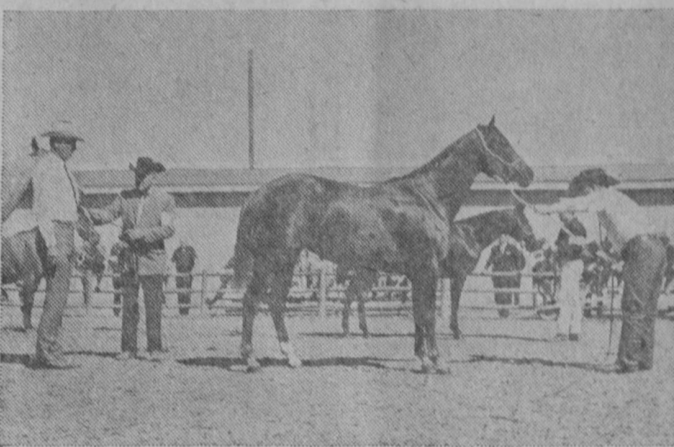

Adult Education Registration Begins September 8 at TAHS

Registration for adult high school will begin the week of September 8 and will run through Thursday, September 11. Hours for registration will be from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. and from 7:00 to 9:00 p. m. Anyone interested in the night school program should call Gene Gerber at Tawas Area High School, 362-2381.

Classes offered for this term will be determined by the needs of the adults who enroll. A suggestion of classes available include United States History, American Government, typing, bookkeeping, shorthand, math, business math and law, English II, algebra, office machines, art and science.

These classes will meet one night a week from 7 to 10 o'clock for 15 consecutive weeks. Classes will begin the week of September 15. Each class that is taken carries one-half credit toward a high school diploma. If a student should enroll for four classes a week, he can earn a total of four credits a year to apply to a high school diploma.

High school credit is also given for certain work experiences, extensive travel, equivalency test results and other courses completed through approved trade or business schools or during military service. Work completed in other approved high schools is also accepted.

It is possible for an individual who has completed an eighth grade education to earn a high school diploma within two years of concentrated study.

The 1969 school year had a total of 37 adults enroll in the Tawas adult high school program. Two of these students received high school diplomas. At the end of this

school year, there will be at least nine students who will receive high school diplomas.

The adult high school program is financed by state aid reimbursement. This enables the school district to offer the high school program to the adult students on a no-charge basis.

Any person, 18 years of age or older, not enrolled in a regular school program, who can profit from the educational program is eligible. Students under 18 years of age may be admitted upon

written approval of the high school principal.

Anyone interested in the adult high school program or wishes more information should call the community school director at Tawas Area High School, 362-2381, on or before September 11. Class offerings hinge upon the number of students enrolled.

Registration and enrollment for the adult enrichment and non-credit classes will be announced at a later date. Enrichment classes will start October 6.

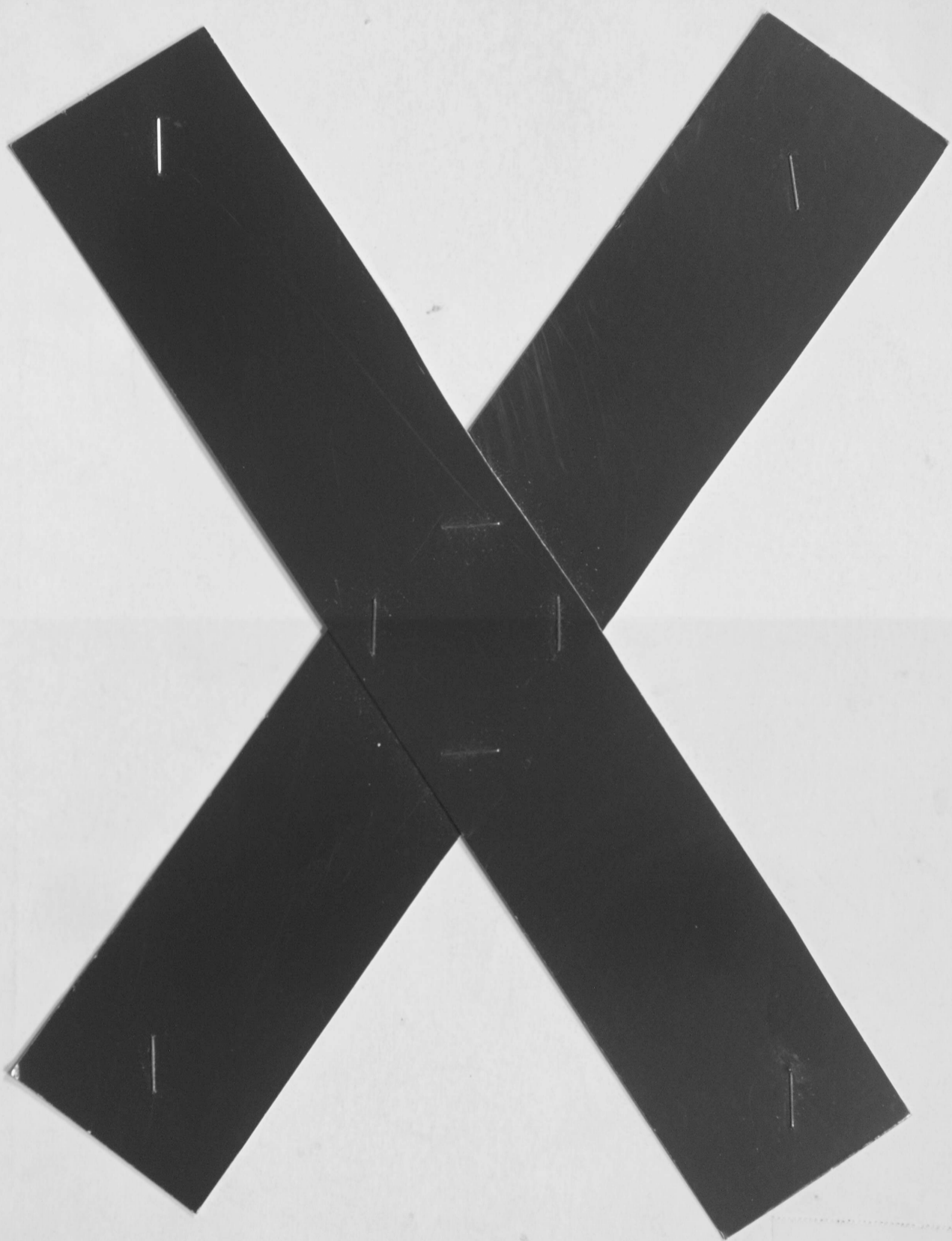
