Erosion Control Program Slated

The meeting will deal with erosion and the changing shoreline of Lake Huron, which is of prime interest to lakeshore property owners.

NFO President Slated as Speaker

Oren Lee Staley, president of the National Farmers Organization, will be speaker Saturday, April 4, at an NFO progress dinner to be held at Standish-Sterling Central High School.

A roast beef dinner is to be held in the school cafeteria from 5:00 to 8:00 p. m.

A resident of Rea, Missouri, Staley operates a diversified farm in northwest Missouri and raises purebred shorthorn cattle.

One of the nation's outstanding agricultural leaders, Staley was elected first national president of the NFO which has pioneered collective bargaining for American agriculture. He has since continued to serve in that capacity.

The NFO has had rapid growth and is now organized in all 48 states of the continental United States. Staley is a dynamic and interesting speaker and is called upon to appear before a variety of groups throughout the United States and Canada.

Fish biologists from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Great Lakes Fishery Station at Alpena last week warned that Lake Huron's yellow perch population, centered in Lower Saginaw Bay, is facing extinction due to over exploitation by commercial operators.

Jerry V. Manz, Great Lakes Fishery supervisor, and Randy Eshenroder, biologists, told the Herald March 25 that a high market demand expected in 1970 would encourage a fishing intensity that could completely negate effects of restrictions already imposed by the state under a new management plan adopted only last year.

Additional new regulations have been proposed to the Michigan Conservation Commission which would further protect the yellow perch population from continued over exploitation commercially.

Present and proposed regulations are being challenged by commercial operators and it is expected that great pressure will be brought on the conservation commission to greatly reduce the effectiveness of these regulations. It can be expected that the multi-million-dollar tourist and resort industry along the Lake Huron shore, which has seen sport fishing for perch dwindle to practically nothing during the past decade, to join in the fight to protect this species as a possible means of re-

newing sport fishing in these waters.

Since establishment of the fishery station at Alpena, biologists have conducted a habitat survey of the Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay perch population. Although they admit that their survey will not be completed until next fall, their findings have shown a nearly complete absence of the once-plentiful perch in much of Lake Huron.

Except for a small "run" of abnormally large yellow perch taken by hook and line ice anglers a few weeks ago on Tawas Bay, the major perch population is located near Au Gres and into the lower end of Saginaw Bay. The perch taken at Perchville weighing two pounds and over are remnants of a year class in the early 1960s and are about eight years old.

"Closing small areas and limiting the amount of gear will not guarantee a reduced harvest," said Manz. "Fishermen are very adaptable and can, with encouragement of a high market price, change their methods to overcome such restrictions."

"This is particularly true of the gill net fishery," he stated. "Piece-meal restrictions will not insure protection for an endangered stock and a major change is warranted."

Both the sport and commercial fisheries for yellow perch outside of Saginaw Bay are depressed and for this reason commercial fishing for yellow perch in the main has been terminated. Nearly all of Lake Huron has been designated as a rehabilitation zone. Exceptions include Thunder Bay, Tawas Bay to Point Lookout, Saginaw Bay east of a line from Sand Point to Fish Point, which are sport fishing development zones where sport fishing is permitted. The only problem is that these areas are practically void of perch.

The present rule allows commercial fishing in Saginaw Bay south and west of a line from Point Lookout to Sand Point and west of a line from Sand Point to Fish Point.

At present, the fishery is pursued by a group of gill netters operating mainly from the west shore and a trap net fishery centered at Bayport on the east shore. The report stated that in the last five years, commercial exploitation has intensified greatly, mainly through an increase in the expanding gill net fishery.

Biological data indicates that the stock is already overfished and it is feared that another year of intense fishing may destroy the stock. Current projections indicate that, conditions being equal, at most the current restrictions will reduce production by only 16 percent.

A dramatic change in yellow perch production in Saginaw Bay has been indicated during the past seven years. Prior to 1964, commercial fishermen mainly used trap nets to take perch. In the mid-1960s, a strong market demand for perch coupled with a collapse of the chub market encouraged an intensive gill net fishery for perch, utilizing the then recently developed nylon twine.

Production rose drastically in Saginaw Bay and has remained high through 1969. In 1963, for example, trap netters took 172,000 pounds of perch while gill netters took 80,000 pounds. Production by gill netters jumped to 452,000 pounds in 1964, increased to 548,000 pounds in 1965 and has never dropped below 400,000 pounds during the six-year period.

Trap net catches increased considerably at the same time, with 218,000 pounds in 1964, a high of 741,000 pounds in 1966 and 370,000 pounds in 1969.

One of the disadvantages of fishing with gill nets is that they destroy the young of protected and commercial species, whereas wall eyes and other protected species can be released unharmed from trap nets.

This is not the first exploitation of yellow perch in Lake Huron. At the turn of the century, commercial production of yellow perch in Saginaw Bay was very high—nearly 3½ million pounds in 1900. Af-

ter 1915, production declined rapidly and fell to an all time low by 1927. A study at this time of growth characteristics of the stock disclosed that perch were showing signs of over exploitation. Production remained low after 1927 and this apparently allowed the stock to recover.

By the 1950s, the biological characteristics of the stock showed

improvement over 1927 observations. The growth rate had slowed down and older age groups were showing strongly in the catches. This condition persisted through the early 1960s as shown by departmental data.

In the mid-1960s, perch production increased sharply to an annual take of over one million pounds. This increase was due almost en-

tirely to an expansion of the gill net fishery, which was no longer able to market chubs.

This increase in production has had a profound impact upon the perch stock. Older age groups were virtually eliminated from the stock and the fishery became nearly dependent upon one age group or one stronger year class.

Production in 1968 and 1969

was supported almost entirely by a single year class, which cannot be expected to last much longer. The growth rate in 1969 was comparable, if not greater, to that of 1927 when the stock was overfished and at an all time low.

At present, there is insufficient information to assess the strengths of the 1966 and 1967 year classes, which should enter the fishery in 1970 and 1971. If these year classes prove to be weak or only of moderate strength, it seems doubtful that the present high level of production can be maintained without seriously reducing the stock.

It is believed that cutting back perch production to about 400,000 pounds, using selective trap nets, the stock will be allowed to recover. Biologists are hopeful, but not guarantee, that the perch fishery stock could return to the high levels seen in the 1950s.

Alleged Murderer Goes to Ypsilanti for Examinations

She had been held at the Iosco County Jail under \$20,000 bond since arraignment March 7 in district court.

She is charged with killing and murdering Perkins with a rifle. An autopsy attributed Perkins' death to a gunshot wound.

Jack D. Parker Fills Bud Guest's Spot on Radio

Jack D. Parker, former East Tawas resident, who is board chairman of Parker, Wilcox, Fairchild and Campbell Advertising, Incorporated, Saginaw, will serve as vacation replacement on Edgar A. Guest's daily commentary programs on WJR, Detroit. The three-week replacement began Monday, March 30, and includes "Sunnyside Break" at 8:15 a. m. and "The Sunnyside of the Street Club," 1:45 p. m. The afternoon program is repeated by WJR each evening at 8:15 o'clock.

Under the program announced in February, persons living more than a quarter mile, but less than one-half mile from the post office are eligible to receive delivery at home.

The only requirement to obtain the service is that it must be requested of the postmaster and a majority of those living in the area must desire service.

The expansion was to be achieved by such steps as extending rural routes and adding delivery stops to these routes. In some locations of the country, new rural routes could be established among the 18,700 post offices included in the program.

Martin Kasischke, Tawas City postmaster, said Monday that only two areas of the city—Burrell Subdivision and Oak Street—had requested this service.

"I honestly thought that more eligible residents would want this delivery service," said Kasischke. He said that it may be that other areas served by this post office are interested in being added to a rural route, but that no one had taken the initiative to circulate a petition along the street to obtain the necessary 50 percent participation.

Kasischke said that patrons may also feel that installation of a mailbox along the street is a drawback.

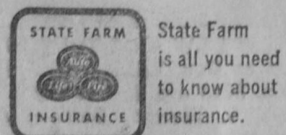

AuGres Project Public Hearing

A public hearing of the tricounty watershed basin is to be held at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School Thursday, April 2, 8:00 p. m.

Such a project has been discussed in past years but had met opposition in Iosco and Ogemaw Counties. Following two floods in the summer of 1969, the Arenac Soil Conservation District initiated an application to form a tricounty watershed area.

The application was subsequently signed by the Arenac Board of Commissioners, Arenac Drain Office, Iosco SCD, Iosco Drain Commissioner John Mielock, the Ogemaw SCD and the Ogemaw Drain Office.

An application was received in the field by the watershed review committee on October 18, 1969, which was followed by an information meeting February 24.

At that meeting, held at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School, a letter was sent to the state soil conservation committee asking for a public hearing.

The hearing is of utmost importance to persons residing in the watershed area.

"The state's economy, as a whole, will not lose much by curbing commercial fishing now centered in Lower Saginaw Bay. We are afraid of losing our entire perch population this year and if we are successful in stopping this over exploitation, coupled with good climatic factors, the population of perch should increase, to the benefit of future commercial and sport fisheries," said Manz.

In order for good sport fishing for perch to return to Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay, several good year classes would be needed. Manz emphasized that it actually required more fish to support a good hook and line fishery than it does for a commercial fishery.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Please take notice that the following amendments to the REGULATIONS OF DISTRICT HEALTH DEPARTMENT NO. 2 AS APPROVED FOR APPLICATION IN IOSCO COUNTY were approved by resolution of The Iosco County Board of Supervisors, adopted while in regular session on March 18, 1970, to become effective May 1, 1970:

ORDINANCE NO. 1 CHAPTER III
Garbage and Rubbish Scope

AMENDED TO READ:
These regulations will apply to all buildings, structures, apartments and dwellings and will complement but not abrogate the requirements of Acts 87 of the Public Acts of 1965 or Rules R 325.1101 through R 325.1110 as published in Supplement No. 45 of the 1954 Administrative Code.

Section B
Accumulation of Garbage

AMENDED TO READ:
No owner or occupant of any building, structure, apartment or dwelling shall permit to accumulate upon such premise any garbage except in covered containers of rodent proof, fly proof, and water tight construction.

Section C
Accumulation of Rubbish

AMENDED TO READ:
No owner or occupant of any building, structure, apartment or dwelling shall permit to accumulate upon such premise any rubbish except in durable containers with close fitting covers except that bulky rubbish such as tree limbs, weeds, large cardboard boxes, etc. may be bundled and so stored as not to provide a harborage or breeding place for rodents.

CHAPTER IV Section A
Condemnation and Placarding of a Substandard Dwelling

AMENDED TO READ:
Any dwelling which shall be found to have any of the following defects shall be condemned as unfit for human habitation by the local health officer / his authorized representative subject to review by the county health committee and shall be so designated and placarded by the local health officer:

- (1) One which is so damaged, decayed, dilapidated, insanitary, unsafe, or vermin-infested that it creates a serious hazard to the health or safety of the occupants or the public.
- (2) One which lacks illumination, ventilation or sanitation facilities adequate to protect the health or safety of the occupants or of the public.
- (3) One which because of its general condition or location is insanitary, or otherwise dangerous, to the health or safety of the occupants.

ORDINANCE II CHAPTER II Section N

AMENDED TO READ:
There shall be twenty-five (25.00) dollars annual fee for renewal of such permit. The \$5.00 renewal fee will be deleted.

SECTION P ORDINANCE NO. 2 Part B

AMENDED TO READ:
Septic tank construction

Septic tanks shall be of water-tight construction and of materials not subject to corrosion or decay. Steel tanks used as sewage treatment devices shall not be permitted. All septic tanks shall have a water depth of not less than (4) four feet, the length from inlet to outlet shall be not less than five (5) feet. All septic tanks shall be provided with suitable openings with covers to permit inspection and cleaning. There shall be at least eight (8) inches of air space between the liquid level and the cover. The outlet must have a "T" or "L" tile to withdraw liquid from the middle third of the tank. A tank less than four (4) feet in depth may be approved by the health officer.

Kiwanis Asks: 'Are You Planning a Trip on Drugs?'

Warn Against Misuse of Drugs

To misuse drugs is to play "Russian roulette," experts are agreed.

Few people would load a gun, fire it at the temple and take a chance. But many today, particularly in young age brackets, are taking the same chance with amphetamines, barbiturates and hallucinogenic drugs.

What happens with unprescribed drugs depends on both the drug's chemistry and the user's chemistry. Drug abuse can be harmful.

The drug classes most subject to current misuse are controlled by federal law, and illegal sale and distribution are punishable. In many cases, the drugs secured illegally may be counterfeit or stolen, adding to the taker's risk.

The amphetamine class—stimulant drugs—are known by such slang terms as pep pills, co-pilots and bennies. The drugs were medically developed for legitimate use. Unwisely used, they overstimulate the nervous system. Temporary reactions include a rise in blood pressure, palpitations, dry mouth, sweating, headache. Vivid imaginary experiences are common. A psychological dependence on the drug can lead to later physiological dependence on more dangerous drugs.

The barbiturate class—depressant drugs—may be known as goofballs, red birds, yellow jackets or may be characterized by other de-

scriptive terms. Potentially, they are far more dangerous than experimenters realize. Barbiturates distort the sense of time and space and fatal overdoses can easily result. A combination of barbiturates and alcohol can be fatal as well. Withdrawal from the barbiturate habit is a painful process that includes spasms and convulsions.

The hallucinogenic drugs—primarily LSD—present hazards of serious scope. Although LSD cannot be sold legally through drug outlets, it is appearing widely in counterfeit form for street sale, and medical research shows increasing mental and physical abnormality resulting from its use.

Drugs are powerful, each and every one. How powerful? A drug can save your life, or blow your mind. It can turn a hero into a monster—as every writer and science fiction fan has known since the days of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde to the latest horror movie. Drugs can change beauty into beast and vice versa. A drug can ease pain or give it. You can possess a drug or it can possess you. To tell you all the reasons why a drug affects your personality as well as your body, it would take a great length of time for the basic facts.

The field of drugs is just as complicated as the field of electricity or the field of chemistry or any other branch of the physical or biological sciences.

Answer More Questions on Social Security

Question: Will you explain about the social security raise?

Answer: Your March check which comes about April 3 should be 15 percent higher in most cases. However, this is based on what the workers benefit would be at 65 so some raises might be a little under that. The raise was effective for January 1969, so later, in most cases, there will be a check for the raise which would cover January and February, which in most cases will come about April 22.

Question: I am retiring in June. What should I bring with me when I apply and when should I apply? I am self-employed.

Answer: You can apply now. You should bring your social security card and proof of your age—a birth or baptismal certificate made within five years after your birth is best. If you never tried to get a birth or infant baptismal certificate you had better get one if you can, but do not hesitate to apply if you cannot get one. Bring the oldest evidence you have.

We would suggest you file your 1969 tax return before you file and have an extra copy made for social security. Bring it with you. We would also suggest you pay your tax with some kind of money order so you can bring the money order copy or stub with you.

We will also want to know how much your earnings have been so far in 1970. Your representative will be at the county building in Tawas City on the second and fourth Thursday of each month from 9:45 a. m. to 3:00 p. m.

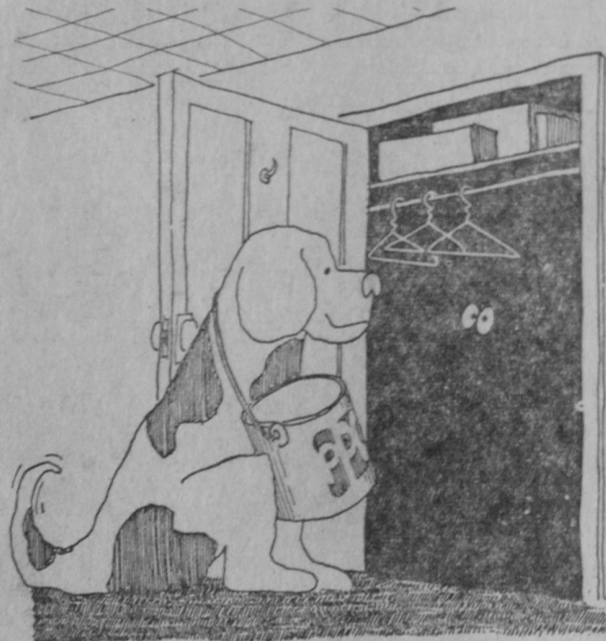
Today is Census Day Throughout United States

mon. Census questionnaires were distributed to households in these places by the post office a few days ago. They are to be filled out and held for the census taker to pick up. The district manager says it will probably take from three to five weeks for the census takers to get around to all the households.

It is possible that some households did not receive a questionnaire but the district manager says they need not fear they will be missed because a census taker will find them and have a questionnaire for them.

Dear Editor:

After reading about all the wonderful things an AuGres watershed would do for us, I think we should look at the other side of this rosy picture. According to law PL566, the federal government will pay the cost of engineering and original construction of the flood prevention part. Land acquisition and administrative costs must be paid for by local taxpayers.

These costs can be high. A small example can be seen in the Big Creek drain south of Twining in Arenac County. Ten people petitioned the drain commission to clean out five miles of Big Creek. The cost is \$97,000, as high as \$13.50 per acre of land in the watershed. Of the 10 people who signed the petition, only four were farmers and one of these is a week-end farmer, leaving only three actual farmers wanting this project.

I wonder what agricultural benefits we could get from this project. I know it will help some AuGres area farmers but what good will we get out of it? We also have a water and drainage problem some years and also lose crops because of too much rain, but will this project tile our land for us and dig drainage ditches to give us an outlet for excess water?

Much has been said about all the recreational benefits this project will bring to Ogemaw and Iosco Counties. The best water storage areas needed in a project such as this are "dry" lakes that fill up in times of high water, then go dry again until another big rain. Other areas have a small amount of water in the bottom at all times so sediment washed down the stream will settle out. These would just be a permanent mud hole.
