# 6.54 Percent Hike in Iosco Valuation

## Board Gets Equalization Report Today

A 6.54 percent increase in Iosco's tax base for 1970 is expected to be adopted this week during the April session of the county board of commissioners. The session opened Tuesday and is expected to close on Thursday.

Work of the board during this busy session also includes adoption of a preliminary operational budget for the county. This is to be submitted later this month to the allocation board.

Henry Oates, county tax equalization director, said Tuesday that Iosco's total valuation would be \$101,477,155, a \$6,229,052 increase over the previous year. This compares to a 1.31 percent increase one year ago.

According to the tax equalization director, new construction in Iosco during the past year amounted to \$5,758,750, as compared to \$3,750,000 recorded a year ago. Total adjustment on real property amounts to \$5,800,000, which includes increased valuation on timber cutover and some residential.

Oates said he would recommend to the board that the new total be adopted as the equalized figure for the county with no penalties to individual taxing units.

Largest increase percentage in equalized valuation is noted in Grant Township. This township's valuation is now \$6,415,400, an increase of \$525,600 or 8.92 percent over the previous year.

Oscoda Township's increase of \$2,224,849 is the largest in the county. The township's new trial of \$28,038,353 is 8.61 percent higher than the previous year.

Another large gain is noted in Plainfield Township, which now has a total of \$14,541,100, or a 7.96 percent increase over the previous year.

The report to be submitted to the board today (Wednesday) is to show new construction and adjusted valuation for each unit in the county.

Totals shown on the footing report for other taxing units was as follows:

Alabaster, \$6,027,200, 4.21 percent increase; AuSable, \$3,766,900, 4.85 percent increase; Baldwin, \$8,761,600, 4.61 percent increase; Burleigh, \$1,839,800, 6.48 percent increase; Reno, \$1,781,000, 2.90 percent increase; Sherman, \$3,128,260, 3.95 percent increase; Tawas, \$3,368,700, 6.85 percent increase; Wilber, \$2,489,800, 6.27 percent increase; East Tawas, \$8,944,400, 5.30 percent increase; Tawas City, \$6,531,042, 4.10 percent increase; Whittemore, \$943,600, 2.20 percent increase.

## DNR to Resume Saginaw Bay Fish Study Next Week

Biologists at the Michigan Department of Natural Resources field office at Alpena said Tuesday that resumption of its survey of fish habitat on Lake Huron on Lower Saginaw Bay was to start the middle of next week.

"We expect to set some nets off the mouth of the AuSable River to check on the steelhead run and will then move down to the Charity Islands to check on perch and other species," said Jerry Manz, Great Lakes fisheries supervisor.

Recommendations of the Alpena biologists as to eliminating gill net fishing in Lower Saginaw Bay were not adopted last Friday by the Natural Resources Commission. In fact, some gear relaxations were made on Lake Huron, while crappies and rock bass were added to the legal commercial species list on Saginaw Bay.

Three weeks ago, DNR biologists from Alpena warned that Lake Huron's yellow perch population, centered in Lower Saginaw Bay, was faced with extinction due to over exploitation by commercial operators. It was recommended that fishing be limited to trap netters with a take of about 400,000 pounds.

Manz stated at the time that a high market demand in 1970 would encourage a fishing intensity that could completely negate effects of restrictions already imposed by the state under a new zone management plan.

However, the commission last Friday apparently gave little consideration to the problem area in Lower Saginaw Bay where the last remaining perch population of Lake Huron is centered.

Several local organizations had expressed the hope that recommendations of DNR biologists would be adopted in order to protect this endangered species. Resolutions were sent to the commission supporting the DNR by the Iosco Sportsmen's Club, Tawas City Businessmen's Association and Tawas City Council.

Another blow to Lake Huron

and Saginaw Bay may be in the offering. Because of a shortage of funds, the Alpena field office, which conducted the survey of perch on Saginaw Bay and is to resume its study next week, could be discontinued if there is a further cut in conservation funds.

A new reorganization is soon to take effect with Manz moving to Roscommon where he will become Region II coordinator for Lake Michigan and Lake Huron. He said that his job would now be on a regional basis, rather than just for Lake Huron.

Should department funds be cut by 20 percent, as now being considered by the legislature, it would mean that the Alpena station probably would be discontinued and the crew would be moved to Charlevoix, which would serve as a regional headquarters for both Lake Michigan and Lake Huron survey boats.

On Friday, the commission did reject a plan by the state's commercial fishermen that would have wiped out the current zone management program now in effect. The commission, however, did offer some concessions. One was to allow the taking of carp in seven-inch mesh gill nets in Saginaw Bay, as well as allowing 4½-inch gill nets for white fish during the spring season off Port Austin.

The zone management plan basically divides the state's Great Lakes waters into three areas: Sport fishing only, commercial fishing and rehabilitation zone where commercial fishing is severely restricted.

For several months, the zone plan has been in effect with individual commercial licenses being reviewed by the DNR. Since 1968, the number of such licenses in the state has been cut to less than 400.

Commercial fishermen have been disgruntled over the arrangement. Repeated hearings over the past two years have produced little accord. Fishermen then decided, at the request of the DNR, to submit an alternate approach.

It was that approach the commission rejected in principal Friday.

Dr. Wayne Tody, chief of the DNR's fish division, said that for the most part, the alternate approach by commercial operators would simply throw the lakes open to practically unlimited commercial fishing once again. "And the rebuilding fish stocks of salmon, lake trout and other trout just cannot survive it," he stated.

## Au Gres River Hearing Scheduled Next Monday

A local review of the Au Gres watershed is to be held Monday, April 20, 7:30 p. m., at the Whittemore-Pratt Area High School. The meeting had been scheduled earlier in the month but was postponed because of snow.

A hearing by the Michigan State Watershed Committee is to start at 8:00 p. m. and will be conducted by B. Dale Ball, chairman of the Michigan Soil Conservation Committee and director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

All persons interested in this watershed should attend this meeting.

## Collecting Theatre Pipe Organs is Hobby of Tawas Area Senior

A 19-year-old Tawas Area High School senior has a most unusual hobby—he collects old theatre pipe organs and traveled 1,420 miles to bring home his latest find.

Terry Lobdell, who resides on Anderson Road, Baldwin Township, with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Johnnathan Lobdell, said Sunday he has not found a "home" as yet for his latest acquisition, a Robert Morton theatre pipe organ manufactured in 1922 for the

American Theatre, Denver, Colorado.

"I hope to interest some church or civic center in the Tawas to allow me to install this beautiful organ," said Lobdell. "The installation would be free of charge. This would provide a home for the instrument and all that I would ask is that permission be given to organize a club where interested persons could enjoy listening to, or learning how to play good organ music."

Lobdell spent his Easter vacation at Denver, where he dismantled the organ. Accompanying him there was a neighbor friend, John Shaver.

He spotted an advertisement in the American Guild of Organists Magazine, which offered to sell the organ. The organ had been located in the Pillar of Fire Church, Denver, since 1933, and was being replaced by an electronic organ. Men from the church helped to load the organ on three trucks and a trailer and two men from the church accompanied the two boys on their return to Michigan.

Robert Morton of California, was, perhaps, the nation's most noted organ manufacturer in the 1920s. His instruments were used in the plush motion picture palaces during the silent movie days.

This particular organ cost \$85,000 originally and Lobdell acquired it for around \$3,000. The organ has 17 ranks of 1,850 pipes, four key boards and can duplicate the sound of an orchestra. It has a marimba and various arrangements for bells. It is operated by a 10-horsepower electric motor.

There are only five Morton theatre organs remaining in the United States. The dismantled instru-

## Financial Report Heard by Board

A financial report submitted last week to Tawas Area Board of Education indicates that the school's community school program for the current year has been self-supporting.

Finances during the current year include income amounts of \$3,400 from the Mott Foundation, \$11,424 from adult high school completion, \$2,370 for fees and tuition, \$4,400 as the estimated state aid for the director's salary and a \$300 grant for adult continuing education. Total income was \$21,894.

Expenditures during the 1969-70 year have amounted to \$17,761 to date. This includes \$11,145 for the director's salary, \$4,578 for instructor salaries, \$481 for secretarial salaries, \$1,241 for teaching

supplies, \$152 for travel expense, \$8.13 for library, \$55 for membership dues and \$96 in the miscellaneous category.

The above expenditures leave an unexpected balance of \$4,132. As a comparison, the previous year's program had income of \$5,000 from the Mott Foundation, \$4,212 from adult high school completion, tuition and fees of \$1,975 and \$3,894 from the school's general fund for total income of \$15,182.

Random Drawing Does Not Not Change SS Requirements

The random selection drawing by the Selective Service System does not change the existing registration and classification requirements. The 1970 first priority selection group includes registrants born between January 1, 1944, and December 31, 1950, and are being selected for induction in the sequence of their random selection numbers as determined by the December 1969 lottery.

Registrants born in 1951 (age 19 in 1970) will be assigned a random sequence number based on a new drawing to be held later this year.

Young men 17-26 may volunteer at any time through their local board for two years active duty. They may enlist in reserve or national guard units any time before the induction order is issued. Enlistments for active duty may be accomplished at any time up to the day of induction.

"Registrants who have not been called for their physical examination may request an early examination, but the request will have to be made in writing and we will list them with the next group leaving for the examining station in Detroit," states Mrs. Betty L. Shedenhelm, executive secretary of Michigan Local Selective Service Board No. 36, East Tawas.

## 30 TA Cadet Band Members Participate in Dis. Festival

With 23 instrumental entries, Tawas Area School received 18 first division ratings in the District IX Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association's junior solo and ensemble festival held Saturday at Whittemore-Prescott Area School.

As a means of speeding calls to various fire departments, an advertisement on page 4 of this newspaper lists the telephone number of every volunteer fire department in the county. It is suggested that each homeowner clip out this number and paste it in the telephone book as a handy reference in case of an emergency.

Sometimes, cottage owners compound the threat of wild fire at this time of year by cleaning up around the place and burning the debris without regard to dry conditions.

Under Michigan law, such burning is prohibited without a burning permit from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the United States Forest Service or local fire departments. All agencies keep close watch over danger ratings and when the risk is too great, permits are not given out. This provides a built-in safety factor against breakaway fires.

On days when it is safe to burn

and permits are issued, every debris burner should take three more simple but important steps to prevent fires.

1. After making sure debris is a safe distance from buildings, burn trash in a covered incinerator.

2. Keep a shovel and water can at your side for emergencies and watch over your burn from start to finish. Have help available.

3. Check what you have burned to make sure your fire is dead out. Farmers and other owners of large acreage who enjoy having wildlife around sometimes defeat this purpose in an effort to achieve neatness. Spring burning is still all too common in this county when there is no real reason for it.

Quite often landowners will burn dry grass and weeds from roadside ditches, fences and pastures. By carrying out these burning practices, nature's nurseries for wildlife are being destroyed and thousands of pheasants, rabbits and other small wildlife species are unnecessarily doomed.

Not only is scarce nesting cover destroyed by fire, but burning often destroys humus needed in the soil. It can also ruin fences by burning off wooden fence posts and melting the protective covering from wire, causing it to rust quickly. Soil which has no humus to hold it in place is also subject to fast erosion or, very often, makes way for a bumper crop of objectionable weeds.

If in doubt whether to burn or not, the best advice is usually DON'T BURN.

Residents of the area should also know which fire department serves each particular area. For instance, Tawas City Fire Department serves the City of Tawas City, Alabaster and Tawas Townships, East Tawas Fire Department serves the City of East Tawas and Baldwin Township. The two de-

partments also work together under a mutual assistance agreement, but it is important to call the correct telephone number according to the city or township in which one resides.

The same is true for other fire departments. Plainfield Township handles fires in that township and part of Osceola Township, as well as having mutual assistance agreement with Grant Township Fire Department. The Grant Township Fire Department handles fires in that township, as well as the western half of Wilber Township.

Whittemore Fire Department handles fires in the City of Whittemore, along with the Townships of Reno and Burleigh. The Osceola Fire Department handles fires in those two townships, as well as the eastern half of Wilber.

To be positive of such service a homeowner in doubt as to the correct fire department number should contact his township officials.

In addition, crews from the Tawas Ranger District at East Tawas handle fires in Huron National Forest and the Michigan State Forest.

## Former D&M Telegrapher Died April 8

Eugene F. Smith, 90, 518 Thompson Street, Saginaw, a native of Tawas City and a telegrapher for the Detroit and Mackinac Railway in his youth, passed away Wednesday morning, April 8, at Grand Rapids.

Born December 23, 1879, in Tawas City, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lyman B. Smith. His father was a former Iosco sheriff and prominent Plainfield Township lumberman.

After attending school here, he spent 23½ years as a telegraph operator for the D&M at Tawas City and Cheboygan. He and his late wife moved to Saginaw about 1924, where he served 25 years as traffic agent for the New York Central Railroad, retiring in 1949.

Mr. Smith was a member of First Congregational Church, Saginaw; a life member of Cheboygan Lodge No. 283, F&M; and the Knights Templar; Elf Kurafeh Shrine; Saginaw Elks Lodge and the Rotary Club. He was also a member of the Saginaw Traffic Club.

He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Edward (Lucile) Stevens, Grand Rapids.

## No Glamour in Taking of Drugs

Is the world of the drug-taker glamorous? Experts say it is not. The person who abuses drugs tends to be child-like in personality, dependent, unable or unwilling to make realistic decisions, and reluctant to grow up.

Psychiatric recruiters may stress new sensations of color and sound, a sense of love, expanded creativity. Court and medical records show otherwise.

Any use of LSD, known as acid, is potentially far more dangerous than misuse of amphetamines and barbiturates according to present research. Its effects may last beyond the present generation unless steps are taken to halt its use.

LSD is not distributed legally. No doctor can prescribe it and no druggist can sell it. Most street supplies are illegally produced, often under unsanitary conditions. A "trip," usually monitored by a non-taker of the drug to prevent the user from coming to harm, may or may not lead to a safe return. A "bum trip" can increasingly lead to the psychiatric ward or to a long period of hospitalization.

In its pure state, LSD is odorless, colorless, tasteless and one of the most powerful drugs known. Often, it is bulked for sale with other substances. At the present time, it has no known medical application although scholars have speculated that it might eventually help in treating alcoholics and in alleviating the pain of terminal patients. The drug produces hallucinations by crossing the sensory circuits so that sounds may appear

as color, images may distort, unreal landscapes may appear. Unfortunately, a round-trip is not guaranteed. Some users find it a one-way journey. A trip to the point of no return can leave the user imprisoned in a nightmare, dependent and maimed. Extensive hospitalization is often required. Abnormal brain waves that are recorded under LSD use may persist. An additional danger is the "after-flash," LSD's ability to take the user on an unexpected trip six months or a year after original use. When the hallucination recurs under unexpected conditions dangers may increase.

Recent medical evidence also shows that chromosome damage may result. Genetic effects—which may appear in the user's future children—also are causing serious worry to researchers who are conducting animal tests as well as tests on confirmed LSD users.

Law enforcement officials also point out additional hazards that hover over the LSD user—delinquency, assault, robbery for the purpose of securing drug funds, highway accidents, arrests for drug distribution.

These factors that affect the future health, the careers and the marital happiness of today's youth call for an all-out approach to bring factual material about dangerous drugs to all who are interested. LSD and some of its new cousins are more potent than strychnine and cyanide. If young and old know the odds, they will join in a concerted effort to hold back forces.

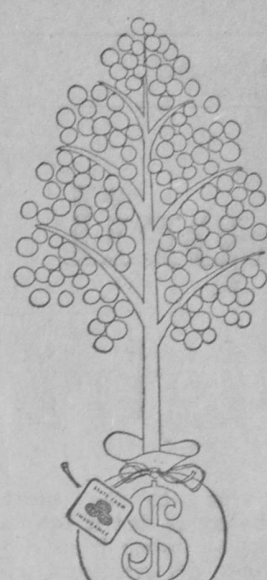

# Library Receives Talking Books

Iosco-Arenac Regional Library has received two talking book machines and 15 talking books from the State Blind and Physically Handicapped Library. The books (records) and machine may be checked out for a short period of time to an individual or groups who wish to demonstrate them to a potential reader or those who work with blind and physically handicapped people.

Anyone who is blind or who cannot see well enough to read normal printed matter is eligible. Those who have lost their arms, or the use of their arms, those whose muscle and nerve control are impaired those suffering from the results of strokes, polio, arthritis, or other ailments which make the holding or reading of ordinary books difficult may qualify for this library service.

For information about how to apply for talking books contact

any of the regional library branches located in East Tawas, Tawas City, Whittemore, Hale, Oscoda, Au Gres, Standish, or the regional library headquarters in Alabaster. Lists of available books and magazines may be seen at any of these locations.

State Blind and Physically Handicapped Library also offers books in braille and large prints. All materials, including the talking machine, are mailed to the user postage free and there is no charge for the service.

## Good Time to Learn About Retirement

Question: I will be 62 in June, I am self-employed, I would like to know how much I will get as I may want to retire.

Answer: This is a good time to find out about your early retirement benefits. You have just filed your 1969 income tax return so we know what your 1969 income is. If you bring in your copy of the returns, we can get a record from our main office of your earnings through 1968 and make an accurate estimate of what your benefit will be at 62 and 65.

Question: I overlooked signing up for medical insurance under Medicare. When can I sign up again?

Answer: You just missed this chance from January 1 through March 31. The next chance will be from January 1 through March 31 of 1971. If you were born before October 1903, you missed your last chance to enroll. However, there is no time limit on hospital insurance. If you are already receiving social security that should already be established. If you have never signed up, you should do so as soon as possible. Hospital coverage can go back for a year, but it is better if you have a Medicare card when you enter a hospital.

A social security representative will be at the Iosco County Building on the second and fourth Thursday of each month from 9:45 a. m. to 3:00 p. m.

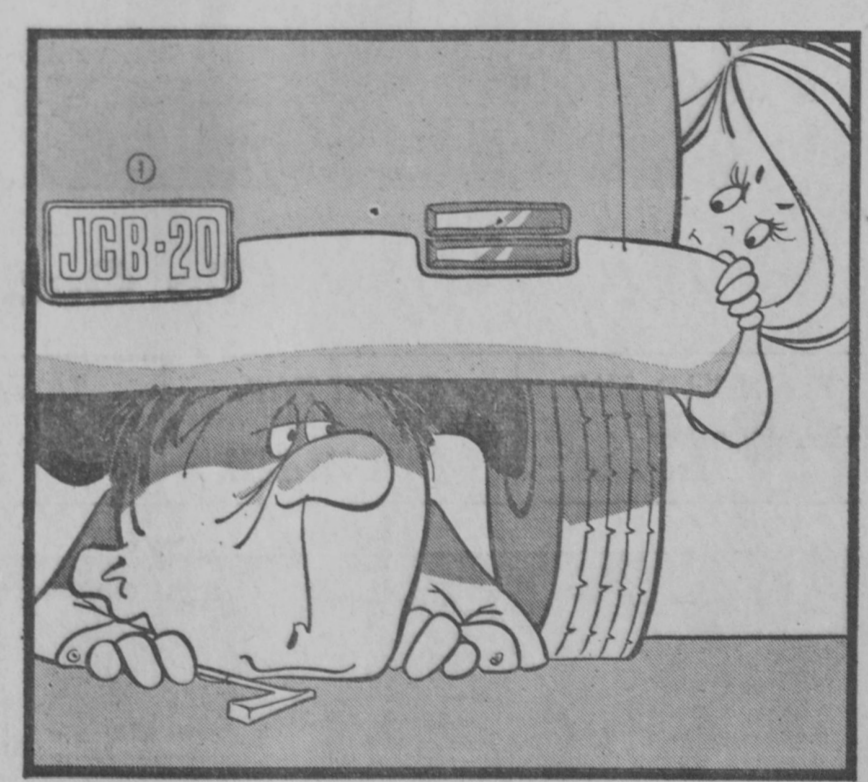

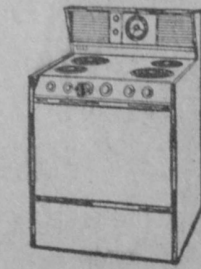

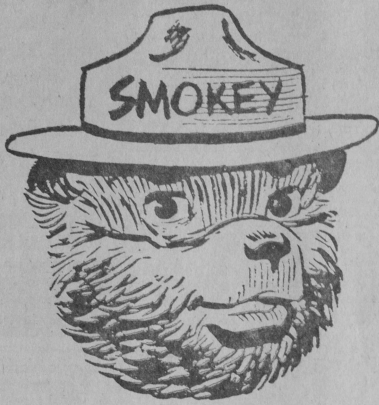
