Tawas City Council OKs New Budget

Formal adoption of an operational budget for 1970-71 was made Monday night by the Tawas City Council following a public hearing. The budget calls for revenues of \$160,500, which includes \$64,400 in city taxes based on a city valuation of \$6,531,042, and disbursements of \$168,180.

An appropriation ordinance adopted by the council calls for 12 mills to be spread on tax rolls. This includes nine mills for the general fund, 1 1/2 mills for the street fund and 1 1/2 mills for the public debt fund.

In other business, discussion was held on cleanup days to be held in Tawas City on April 29, 30 and May 1. City trucks are to pick up all debris placed at curbside by property owners.

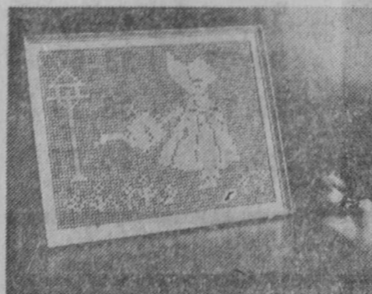


Jolly Appliqué

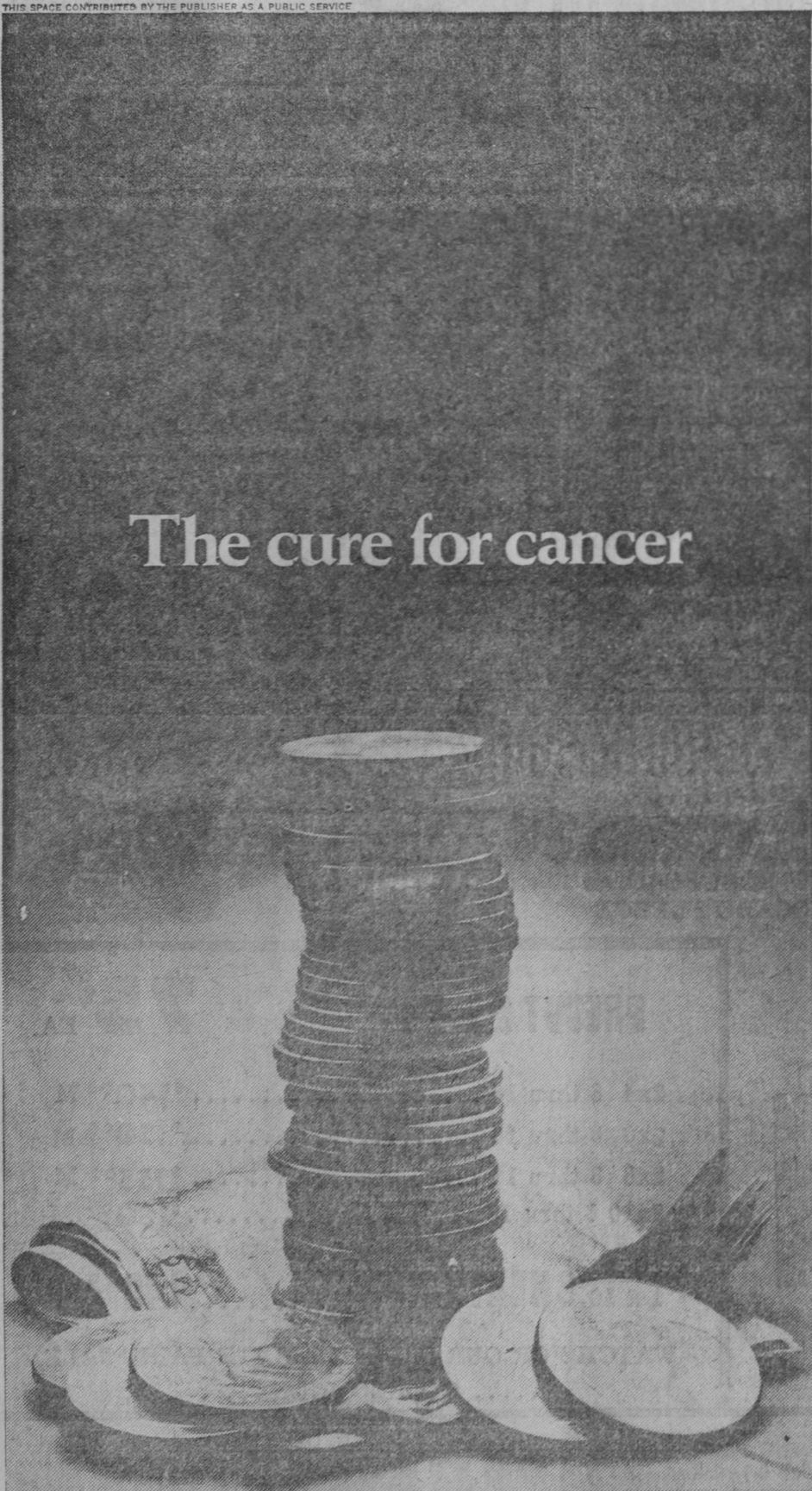

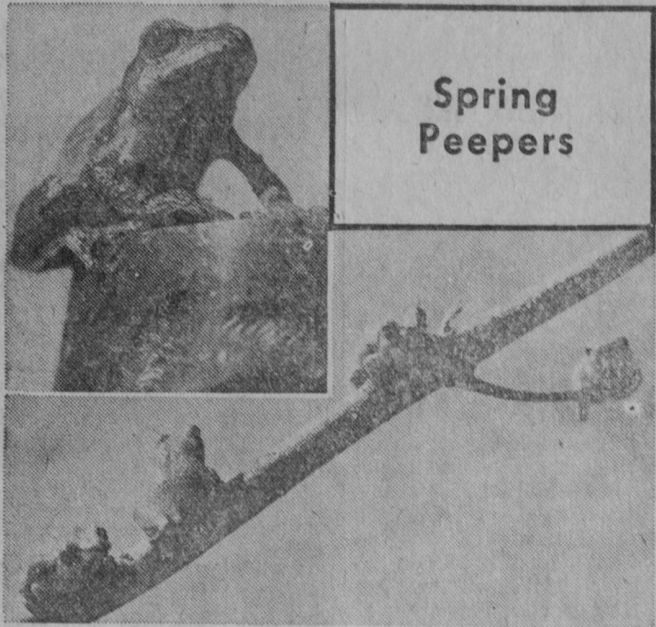

Spring Peepers

Pictured here are some of the noisiest residents of Michigan, and depending on how you view them, they may be spoilers of the night's rest, or a musical and friendly addition to a spring evening. Spring peepers are members of the Hylidae, or wood frogs, and are the smallest of that lot of chirrupy creatures. Peepers are found throughout Michigan and make their presence known most forcefully early in April, continuing their rolling chorus of calls until May. How anything so small can make so much noise is sometimes beyond comprehension (thinks the would-be sleeper). And if you try to find the source of all this tumult, look in low moist places, under fallen leaves, or among the mosses. That's where they sit. They stay there in the winter, too, and wait patiently for the first warm days and nights of spring to loose their torrent of sound on the countryside. --Mich. Dept. of Natural Resources.
