## Tawas City Has New Mayor This Week

With no contests listed on ballots Monday, only a light turnout of voters showed at polls of Tawas City and East Tawas. There

were 123 ballots cast in Tawas City and 108 at East Tawas.

Tawas City will have a new mayor following the official canvass of votes later this week. John St. James, who has served as Second Ward alderman, received 121 votes for this position, 36 in the First Ward, 35 in the Second Ward and 50 in the Third Ward.

He succeeds Russell A. Rollin, who retires as mayor after serving as a city official since 1965. He first served as Second Ward alderman and was named mayor in 1967.

Walter Nelson received 120 votes for clerk, 36 in the First Ward, 34 in the Second Ward and 50 in the Third Ward. Mrs. Mary Byrd was elected treasurer with 123 votes, 39 in the First Ward, 34 in the Second Ward and 50 in the Third Ward.

First Ward electors returned Benjamin Brewer as supervisor with 37 votes. Martin Wellna received 32 votes for alderman and Daniel Ulrich received four write-in votes.

Second Ward voters gave 35 votes each to Arnold Kuerbitz, supervisor, and Frank Ahonen, alderman. Donald Watson received 46 votes for Third Ward supervisor while C. S. Everett received five write-in votes for this position. Howard Hatton received 51 votes for alderman.

James Campbell was re-elected mayor of East Tawas with 100 votes. Fred Lomas received 103 votes for city clerk and Mrs. Grace Pelton received 103 votes for city treasurer. Earl Hester received 38 votes for First Ward alderman, Edward Higgins received 27 votes for Second Ward alderman and Robert Bolen received 33 votes for Third Ward alderman.



A. A. Bigelow, Retired D&M Worker, Dead

Allie A. Bigelow, 83, retired railroad conductor and one-time secretary of the Tawas City Board of Education, died Sunday, April 5, at Vermillion County Hospital, Clinton, Indiana.

Mr. Bigelow and his wife, Mabel, had gone to Rockville, Indiana, recently to live with a daughter.

Funeral services are to be held Wednesday, April 8, 2:00 p. m., from Jacques Funeral Home, Tawas City. The Rev. Sidney J. Rowland will officiate and burial will be in Tawas City Cemetery.

Mr. Bigelow retired July 31, 1954, after a 49-year career as a railroadman, first with the Erie and Michigan Railway and Navigation Company and later with the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

His entire railroad career was spent on the run from the United States Gypsum Company plant at Alabaster to the rail yards in Tawas City—a daily round trip of about 14 miles.

He started with the E&M in August 1905 as a brakeman under the late Frank Allen, engineer, and Merton Barnes, conductor. He became conductor two years later.

In 1948, the D&M purchased the Erie and Michigan line. At the time of the merger, Bigelow was the road superintendent. He then served as conductor on the Alabaster run for the D&M, which hauled rock to Tawas City for shipment to plants of United States Gypsum Company.

He was a member of First Baptist Church, Tawas City, and a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

He is survived by his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Phyllis E. Lott of Lafayette, Indiana, Mrs. Beverly J. Rowe, Rockville, Indiana, and Mrs. Dorothy Boulder, Cadillac; one son, Arthur Bigelow, Lansing; nine grandchildren, and 19 great grandchildren.

### Council-Sportsmen's Club-Businessmen Adopt Resolutions

## Support Biologists' Stand on Gill Nets

Tawas City Council has joined the Isoco Sportsmen's Club and Tawas City Businessmen's Association in adopting resolutions urging the Michigan Conservation Commission to approve recommendations of DNR biologists at Alpena concerning elimination of gill net fishing for perch on Saginaw Bay.

At its regular meeting Monday night, the council adopted the following resolution proposed by Howard Hatton, Third Ward alderman:

"We, the Common Council of the City of Tawas City, being highly concerned with the loss of perch in Tawas Bay, which loss is having a tremendous negative impact on our area economy as well as a loss of enjoyment to the citizens of all ages of our area and knowing full well that if the use of gill nets is continued in Saginaw Bay the yellow perch face the same fate as the herring, lake trout, pickerel and whitefish; therefore, we, by unanimous vote, ask that recommendations of the fish biologists

of the Alpena Station of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources be followed completely." Copies of the resolution are to be sent to the state senator, state representative, members of the Michigan Conservation Commission, chairmen of senate and house conservation committees.

Hatton said he believed such a resolution was in the best interest of the community and the area. He believed that the resolution should receive the support of the chamber of commerce and all businesses,

stating that perch runs of former years brought more people to the area than any single promotion.

The Third Ward alderman said that, under recommendations of the biologists, trap netters would still be allowed to take around 400,000 pounds of perch. He said that the number of party boats located here five years ago, which had to discontinue business because of the lack of perch, was more than the number of commercial fishermen currently operating out of here.

Following a report by DNR biologists last week, which stated that perch of Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron face extinction unless gill net fishing is eliminated, Isoco Sportsmen's Club passed a similar resolution asking the Michigan Conservation Commission to adopt the recommendations of the biologists.

Last Thursday, the Tawas City Businessmen's Association unanimously endorsed the sportsmen's club's resolution.

## Shore Erosion Program Set Next Week

Robert Koenig, chairman of the St. Joseph River Soil Conservation District, will be principal speaker at the annual meeting April 15 of the Isoco Soil Conservation District. The meeting is to be held at Tawas Area High School, 8:00 p. m.

Koenig was appointed chairman of the Michigan Shore Erosion Committee and is now serving on the national committee on shore erosion.

Realizing the importance of the shore erosion problem along beaches of Lake Huron and interest among local land owners, district directors believe that this meeting should be of utmost importance.

Myron Smith, Tawas district ranger, will present a film entitled "Patterns of the Wild" following Koenig's presentation. The film shows the inter relationships of wildlife and the forest. Through the eyes of a fox, the film takes viewers from season to season to demonstrate this relationship.

## AuGres Youth Hit by Rifle Slug

A 13-year-old AuGres youth was treated at Tawas Hospital Sunday after being struck in the left thigh with a 22 caliber rifle slug. The accident took place on the East Branch of the AuGres River, Whitney Township.

Treated at Tawas Hospital for removal of the slug was Mark A. Fitzgerald.

Investigating state police said that Juan Gonzales, 18, Turner, had fired his rifle at the water. Unknown to Gonzales, Fitzgerald with other companions was on the opposite bank, about 75 yards away.

## Council Gives Nod to Court St. Study

A meeting with Detroit and Mackinac Railway officials, to determine future plans of the railroad for work on its tracks along Court Street, is to be requested by officials of the City of Tawas City.

The action was taken Monday night on recommendation of Mayor Russell A. Rollin Sr., who presided over his final meeting in this capacity.

A lengthy discussion developed when the council's street committee presented its proposed street construction program for 1970. Martin Wellna, First Ward alderman, questioned the committee's action in not including Court Street in the program.

Wellna, who has sought improvement to Court Street for several years, reminded the council that it had passed a resolution last October directing the street committee to study the possibility of including Court Street in its future construction plans. He believed the street was an important artery paralleling US-23 and carried considerable traffic.

When the railroad was constructed, the right-of-way was located in the center of the street, leaving a narrow strip on either side of the tracks for vehicular travel. Drainage of the lane on the south side has been a problem.

Unofficially, the council has learned that the railroad does not plan any construction work on its tracks this year. The city hopes to coordinate its street work with the railroad in order to provide drainage in the south lane.

Alderman John St. James, who

was elected mayor Monday, said that as a member of the street committee he had looked at Court Street and believed that drainage was necessary before any street work could be undertaken.

St. James said that he had planned to recommend that the city study the possibility of providing drainage, which would cost in the neighborhood of \$5,000 or \$6,000. He believed that contacting the railroad before solving the drainage problem was "putting the cart before the horse."

When a motion to place the proposed 1970 street construction program to a vote of the council, Alderman Wellna raised a point of order stating that the new budget had not been approved as yet.

The First Ward alderman then presented a resolution which would direct the mayor, superintendent of public works and the two aldermen from the First Ward to contact officials of the railroad to work out a problem of drainage on Court Street.

Work proposed by the street committee, which includes but does not effect the 1969 program which was not completed by the contractor, included: Manor Drive, from First Avenue to Victoria, 800 feet, \$700; Roberts Drive, from First Avenue, 450 feet west, \$400; Victoria Drive, from Manor to Sunset, 350 feet, \$300; Sixth Avenue, from Second Street to First Street, 650 feet, \$900; All of these streets would have prime and double seal 20 feet wide.

Fourth Street, from Sixth Avenue to Ninth Avenue, 1,000 feet, \$2,200; Ninth Avenue, from railroad tracks to US-23, 600 feet, \$1,300; Bay Drive, from Townline Road to US-23, 2,250 feet, \$4,900. These streets would be 22 feet wide, stabilized and receive prime and double seal coat.

Already approved under the 1969 program are the following streets: Oak Street, from German to Cedar, 650 feet, \$600; Spruce Street, from German to Maple, 550 feet, \$500; Sunset, from First Avenue to Victoria, 800 feet, \$700; Elms Avenue and Nanette, from US-23 to Margo, 700 feet, \$600. These streets would receive a 20-foot-wide strip of prime and double seal.

Fifth Avenue, from Mathews Street to Second Street, 850 feet, 22 feet wide, \$850; Fifth Avenue, from Second Street to North Street, 1,350 feet, 22 feet wide, stabilized with prime and double seal, \$2,950; Mathews Street, from railroad tracks to Fifth Avenue, 300 feet, 22 feet wide, \$300; Mathews Street, from Fifth Avenue to Sixth Avenue, 500 feet, 22 feet wide, stabilized, prime and double seal, \$1,100.

## Hurt Sunday in Shotgun Blast

Thomas J. Hinkelman, 22, National City, was treated at Tawas Hospital Sunday for injuries when a defective shotgun exploded.

According to Michigan State Police, Hinkelman loaded a shotgun, went into the backyard and fired into the air. The shotgun exploded and pieces of brass from the shell entered his right shoulder.

He was released after treatment.

## House Destroyed by Fire Monday Night

Fire Monday evening caused more than \$7,000 damage to the Stanley Patterson home on Ruell Road, located on the Alabaster-Tawas Township line. First floor of the dwelling was completely gutted by flames.

Tawas City Fire Department was called to the scene about 6:45 o'clock and found flames pouring out of every window of the first floor. The fire department was again called at 8:30 a. m. Tuesday to extinguish a fire in the side-walls.

According to Fire Chief James Lansky, Patterson was in the process of moving his furniture from Detroit into the dwelling after completely remodeling the structure. He had left the dwelling a short time earlier and discovered the fire on his return.

Lansky said the blaze was apparently caused by an overheated wood stove. Firemen were at the scene until 9:30 o'clock. The fire chief said the house was reportedly insured for \$6,000 and contents for \$1,000.

This same dwelling was damaged by fire two years ago when Patterson rented it to other occupants.

## City Council Eyes 1970-71 Budget

Study was held Monday night by the Tawas City Council on a proposed \$168,190 budget for fiscal 1970-71. A public hearing on the new budget is to be held at the April 20 council meeting.

While the proposed new budget is \$19,820 higher than the previous year, the same millage will be levied as in 1969-70—nine mills for general fund, 1½ mills for streets and 1½ mills for public debt.

Due to an increased valuation, the 12-mill levy is expected to raise \$64,400 in city taxes, as compared to \$62,500 during the previous year.

Reginald Blublitz, superintendent of public works, told councilmen that estimated income from sales tax and state income tax was still questionable. Unless the city gains approximately 13 percent in population during the current census, sales tax and income tax returns would probably be lower to the city.

As it now stands, the receipts budget includes \$21,900 from sales tax, \$7,500 from state income tax, \$30,400 in Act 51 highway money.

Most categories under disbursements showed slight increases. One of the major increases is in the category of new streets. The city has budgeted \$20,000 in this category and probably will approve an actual expenditure of \$18,000. However, \$7,600 of this total remains from last year. This money was set aside when the contractor was unable to perform the work.

Blublitz said that he believed that 1969-70 was the best year financially since he has been connected with the city. There were no outstanding bills at the end of the year, the city treasury showed a balance and a number of major projects had been completed, which were unforeseen at the start of the year.



## Lightfoot Named as New Conservationist for Area

Charles Lightfoot has been appointed to fill the USDA Soil Conservation Service's district conservationist position in the Isoco work unit office in the Federal Building, East Tawas. Lightfoot will be assisting the Isoco Soil Conservation District carrying out its conservation program along

with other related duties. A graduate of Michigan Technological University, Lightfoot has been transferred from the Sanilac Soil Conservation District where he was a soil conservationist. He will be residing at Osceola with his wife, Pat, and two daughters, Lori and Vicky.

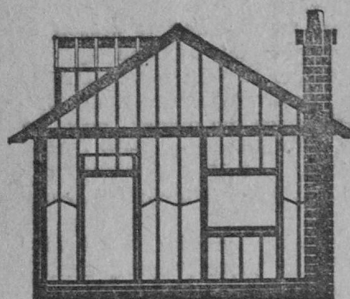
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### Tawas K of C Plans Ladies' Night April 18

### Upper Room Marks 35th Anniversary

Today, The Upper Room is published in 48 editions and 38 languages and is read in 120 countries.

"The shivering Alaskan and the warm African alike read The Upper Room." Speaking of its worldwide readership, Doctor Weldon said:

"They read of Jesus Christ, of His love for humanity, of His promises meant for them and for all mankind."

"In moments set aside for meditations, a wrinkled, aged mother turns the pages of her Bible to find the Scripture passage suggested for use with the day's meditation. In a New England home, a blind man listens to the meditation as he turns on his Upper Room Cassette and worships in sound rather than in sight."

Weldon said The Upper Room has attempted to do more than publish devotional guides. A non-profit concern, dedicated to Christian beliefs, it has had 35 years of leadership in personal and family devotions, worldwide Christian fellowship, encouraging acts of mission with others and promoting brotherhood and peace.

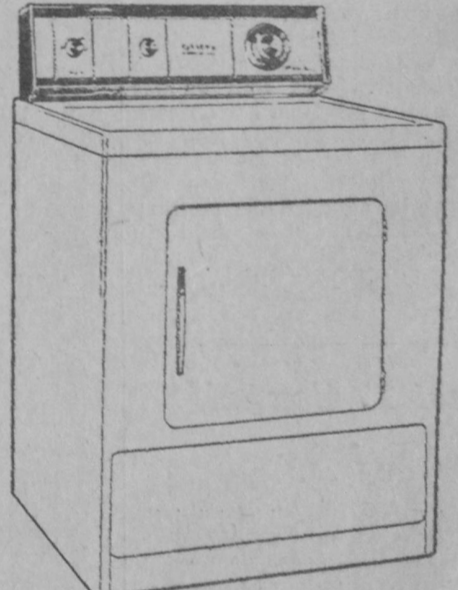
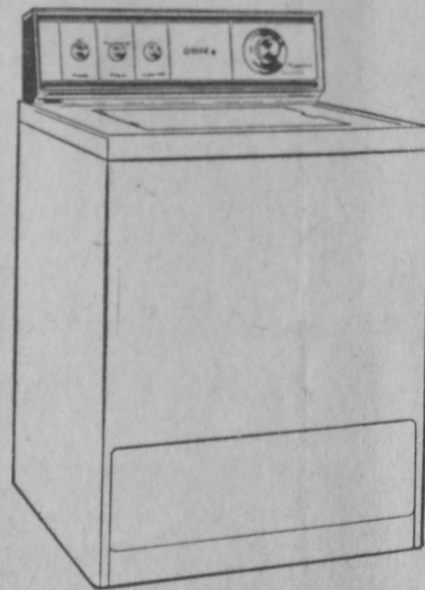

## New Chairman for Mackinac Trail Scouts

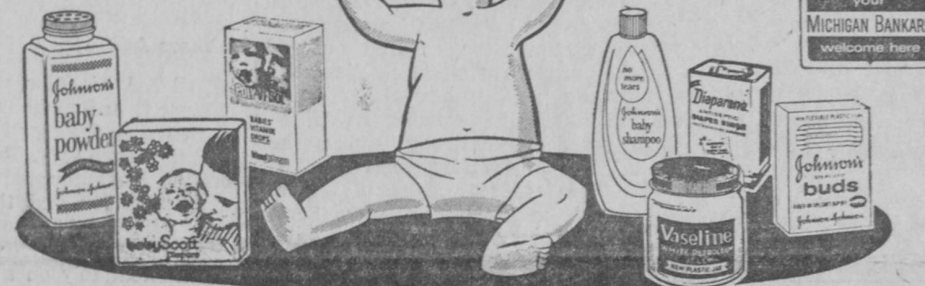
