Health Department Warns of

Unethical Practices of Some Septic Tank Cleaning Firms

"We should be on guard against license number issued at the Lansing. the unscrupulous practices of time of licensing. ethical practices," Doctor Jackson the state health department in doctor cautioned. said. "While overcharges topped the complaints, there had been a number of reports of misleading and false statements.'

The unethical practices seemed to have been associated most often with firms engaged in home solicitation of business. While state law does not prohibit direct solicitation of business by licensed septic tank cleaners, Forrest Weaver, secretary of the Michigan Septic Tank Association, says that those engaged in the field do not normally go door-to-door soliciting business any more than the local plumber, electrician or well drill-

Doctor Jackson said the state's licensing law, covering persons who clean and service septic tanks is quite clear in various requirements. He cites these as (1) the services of a licensed cleaner must be carried out in a workmanlike and hygienic manner with the property served left in a sanitary condition; (2) vehicles used in transporting septic tank effluent must be tightly closed to prevent the escape of contents or odors, and the vehicles' exterior must be kept clean; (3) septic tank wastes cannot be dumped into or adjacent to any public or private lake, pond, stream, river or any other body of water, and local health departments may require the burial of such wastes by regulation, and (4) the licensee or his service representative must furnish the customer with a written receipt carrying the business name and address, name of the firm's owner, and the state health department vehicle

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


