Legal Opinion 'Impossible'

# Schools Await State Interpretation

"The legislature shall maintain and support a system of free public and elementary and secondary schools as defined by law," states Michigan's Constitution of 1963. A recent decision by the state supreme court in the case of Bond vs. Ann Arbor School District, the court held that levied charges for books and supplies were unconstitutional. "Although the court passed only on the legality of charges made by the Ann Arbor Board of Education, the opinion has broad implications for all school boards in the state," reports F. M. Thrun, legal counsel for Tawas Area School District. Thrun stated in a letter to Tawas Area Board of Education last week that clarification from the appropriate state agencies, particularly the department of education and attorney general, is necessary before definite answers can be given to the many detailed questions posed. He pointed out, however, that certain general guidelines were given in the decision. The court held that if items are either necessary elements of any school's activity or constitute an integral fundamental part of elementary and secondary education then they must be supplied without cost or charge by the school district. "Although the generality of the tests makes their application uncertain, the effect of the decision, if not its precise holding, requires a school board to supply many and varied items which here-to-fore had been supplied by the student or for which fees had been charged," stated Thrun. In his opinion, these include the following: 1. Textbooks. This would include textbooks for elective as well as required courses and would include workbooks and periodicals required for a course. Tawas Area School has never made a charge for textbooks. 2. Materials. No charges may be made for materials necessary for participation in specialized courses, including industrial arts, home economics and art. 3. School activities. The attorney general has ruled that a school board may not impose a fee as a condition of participation in activities such as band and interscholastic athletics. Additionally by implication, the court held that a school board may not impose any fee which is required as a condition of registration in its elementary or secondary schools. "Unfortunately, it is impossible to give a more detailed legal opinion at this time," stated Thrun. "What are necessary elements and integral fundamental parts of an elementary and secondary education must be determined largely by educators, not lawyers." The opinion has immediate effect and those items which fall within the tests by the court must be supplied without cost or charges for the 1970-71 school year. School costs are expected to be increased by the ruling.

## Postpone Action on Zone Change

Formal action following Monday night's zoning hearing was postponed until a later date by Tawas City Council. The hearing had been called to consider changing zoning from residential to B-1 commercial of lots fronting M-55 from Victoria Lane to the Tawas River bridge. Requested by Elmer J. Burrell, developer of North Park Acres Subdivision, the council discussed the proposed change with Burrell and his attorney, William Sinclair of Midland. No adjoining property owners were in attendance. The proposed change involves Lots 84 through 73 and Lots 89, 90

## City Finally Acquires Park Expansion Land

A plan started nearly four years ago to expand the west end of the Tawas City Park reached culmination last week. Mayor John St. James announced that the city had acquired title to lake frontage from the west limit of the park to Rainbow Service property. In January 1968, the city filed for federal-state funds to aid with the purchase of four parcels of lake frontage. The city's share of the \$31,750 project was \$15,875. Considerable delay resulted when application for a grant became snarled in governmental red tape, but the city finally received the grant last spring. Arrangements were completed last week with local individuals to borrow the city's matching share.

## At East Tawas Park Swimming Pools Are Considered

Discussion on the possibility of constructing two swimming pools at the East Tawas City Park was held at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council. John C. Elliott, representing the East Tawas Business Association, appeared before the council and said it was the thinking of the association that construction of such facilities would be a much needed improvement to the park. It was suggested that financing such a project could be handled through a revenue bond issue. The matter is to be investigated further and information turned over to the park commission. In other business, hearing dates were set for a proposed zoning change and a request to vacate an alley. A hearing is to be held Friday, September 11, 7:30 p. m. at the city hall to hear objections on rezoning property in the Tawas Lake area and 40 acres of land for the proposed American Home development. The property would be rezoned from Residential A to Residential B. A hearing was set for September 21 on vacating an east-west alley running through the center of Block One, Jesse Freedom's Subdivision. The request was signed by nine property owners. The council approved an application from M. L. Wheatley for dredging along the lake front of Tawas Lake in front of property owned by the applicant. Such approval is necessary in order to make application for a state permit. A letter from Truman F. Barbier requesting a change in zoning was turned over to the planning commission. Barbier seeks to change zoning on eight lots owned by himself along Tawas Bay from Resort A to commercial. Previous requests for a change had been denied by the city. The letter stated that the property had been acquired by the applicant for commercial use and that it had been zoned commercial when acquired. The letter further stated that changing zoning from commercial to Resort A was done without his actual knowledge. Barbier had installed a breakwater, bulkhead and pier for a marina with consent of the city council. The letter stated that full use of the property for a marina could not be had without the property being zoned commercial. Barbier's letter stated that the entire area in both directions from his property is being used commercially and that the commercial use intended is a service for patrons of restaurants, stores, cabins and motels in that area.

## W-P Area School Starts New Term September 1

Whittemore-Prescott Area High School will open for a half-day session Tuesday, September 1. Registration will be the week of August 24-28 for the high school, Juniors and seniors will register Tuesday, August 25; freshmen and sophomores, Wednesday, August 26; junior high, Thursday, August 27; late-comers, Friday, August 28. Elementary principals will be in their offices the week of August 24-28 for new families wishing to register. A preschool meeting for all teachers will be held Monday, August 31, at 9:00 a. m.

## Harbor Code Under Study by City Council

Preliminary discussion on a proposed new harbor ordinance was held Monday night by the Tawas City Council. According to Jack Lardie, chairman of the ordinance committee, the proposed harbor regulations would control river traffic and construction from the Mathews Street bridge to a point outside the river mouth in Tawas Bay. Further study is to be made on regulations controlling construction of docks in the river. In other business, Reginald Bulbitz, superintendent of public works, announced that special enumerators hired by the city had picked up 52 additional names to add to Tawas City's count in the federal census. Next regular meeting of the city council is to be held Monday, August 31, rather than Monday, September 7, which is Labor Day.

## Elect Officers New Charter Group Held First Meeting

Formal organizational meeting of the new Tawas City Charter Commission was held Tuesday night at the city hall. City Clerk Walter Nelson presided over the opening session and election of officers was to have been held. This nine-man commission, named by city voters by special ballot in the recent primary election, has responsibility for developing a new city charter for presentation to city voters. Voters approved by an overwhelming margin two proposals in the recent election. One ballot called for revising the charter and the second approved the home rule form of government. Tawas City has operated under the Fourth Class City Act since the 1890s. Members of the charter commission are Hugo J. Keiser, Jerry Cotter, Lawrence DeBeau, Carl Babcock Sr., Arnold Hoshbach, James Dillon, John Hoshbach, Neil Thornton and John Brugger.

## Two Acres of Cultured Marijuana Seized in Iosco

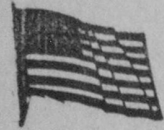
A two-acre plot of cultured marijuana plants was seized and destroyed last week in Reno Township by Iosco Sheriff's Department officers. Officers said that the field contained 751 plants about two feet in height. The plants had been grown from Mexican seed and contained three standard varieties. Apparently the work of an amateur grower, officers said they had received a tip as to its location. A search was conducted for two more fields reportedly growing in the area. The sheriff's department is now awaiting official word from the state police laboratory at the East Lansing before treatment of Grant Township Fire Department.

## East Tawas Garden Club's Show Has Indian Theme

After an absence of several years, East Tawas Garden Club will again sponsor a flower show at the East Tawas Community Building Friday, August 21. Show hours are from 3:00 to 9:00 p. m. Theme of the show is "Indian Summer." According to the club's printed program, the Tawas area was once the home of Chippewa Indians and the bay was named for Chief O-ta-wa, leader of the tribe. "They were free to hunt and fish the forests, lakes and streams, never taking more than they needed. They left this area unspoiled for centuries. They were the true conservationists," states the program. The program consists of four different sections: Arrangements, potted plants, specimen blooms and junior division. The "Indian Summer" theme is carried out in arrangements with the following titles: "Sunrise Dance," "Along the Trail," "Reflections of Beauty," "The Potters Crafts," "A Visit With The Weaver," "Green Corn Dance," "Indian Harvest," "Evening Shadows," "Pow Pow," "The Milky Way." There are 38 different classifications in the horticultural section for potted plants and specimen blooms. The junior division is open to pupils in grades one through eight. Theme of the division is "The Song of Hiawatha." Classification titles under arrangements include "Hiawatha's Childhood," "Song of the Forest," "By the Shining Big Sea Water," "Birds or Animals Made from Fruits or Vegetables," "Any Flowers or Plants Grown by a Boy or Girl." The junior division for horticulture includes the same classification for the adult division. Mrs. Leslie Lambert is chairman of the event and co-chairmen are Mrs. Andrew Manchak and Mrs. Joseph Hennigar. Mrs. Lewis Besancon has charge of the junior division. Programs may be obtained from the above individuals. Entries may be made from 9:00 to 11:30 a. m. on the day of the show. Any entry made after that time will be displayed but not judged. During the hours of judging, from 12 o'clock noon until 3:00 p. m., no person will be permitted in the hall except judges and the committee in charge. There will be ribbon awards in each section, along with best of show awards for arrangements and horticulture.

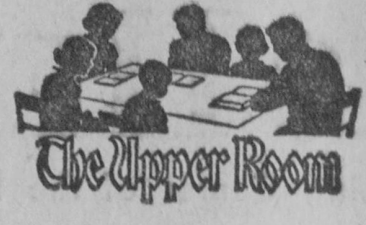

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# Michigan's First Economic Study Conducted in 1854

Michigan's first known economic development study was made in 1854—the year Tawas City was founded. It may also have been the state's first public opinion survey.

The study was made by James Dale Johnston, a railroad agent in Detroit who sent a lengthy questionnaire to a number of communities in Southern Michigan.

Forty-two of Johnston's 44 questions asked for data on the community and the advantages it offered to settlers. The other two questions concerned a proposed general railroad law being considered by the state legislature.

"What is the opinion of your neighborhood respecting a general railroad law, offering charters for other lines?" question No. 37 asked. "Are the people anxious to have increased railroad facilities?"

With his public opinion poll questions out of the way, Johnston then did a little editorializing—some people might call it propagandizing—when he asked: "Do they believe the state would more rapidly become populated by settlers, both from other states as well as from abroad, in consequence of increased railroad intercommunications?"

The questionnaires, addressed "To the Postmaster, Minister or Justice of the Peace," asked for a complete listing of the community's agricultural and industrial resources—and needs—as well as its educational facilities and number of churches and taverns.

Shiawassee County Prosecutor L. H. Parsons reported Corunna needed a harness maker.

Justice of Peace Samuel Dean of the Lenawee County community of Addison said "we are in need of carpenters, wagon makers, coopers and fiddlers."

And the person who filled out the questionnaire in Ann Arbor said: "An oil mill is most wanted. Starch factory, woolen factory and almost any other kind of manufactory, except whiskey, would be well received."

# Review of Dismissal Set by Iosco Board

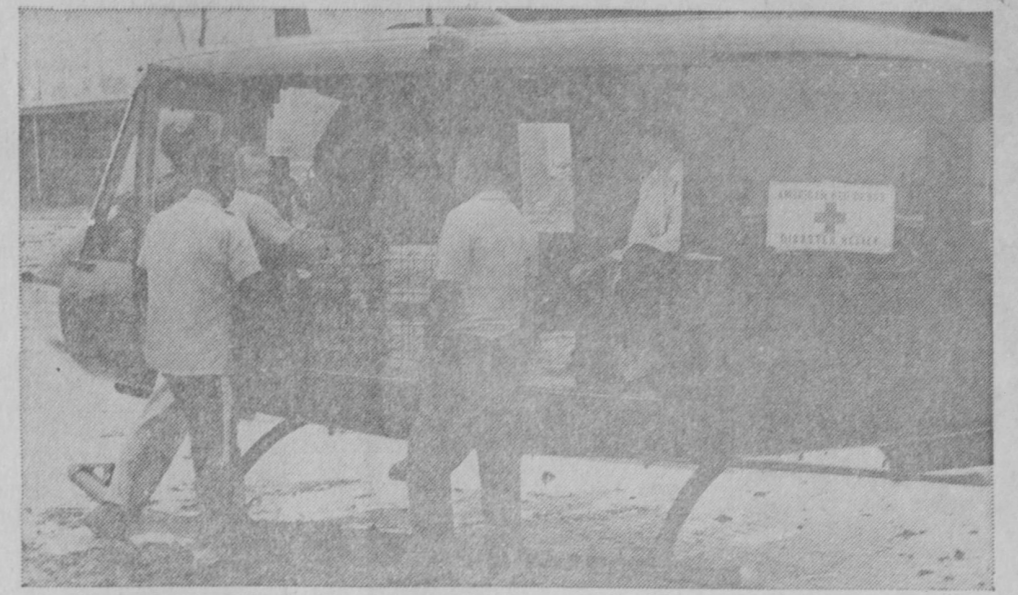
A complete review of the release of two former managers of Old Orchard Park will be held Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

Executive board of the Iosco Park Commission is to meet with the county commissioners to discuss the reasons for the release of Nilo C. Burger and Jess M. Bolin.

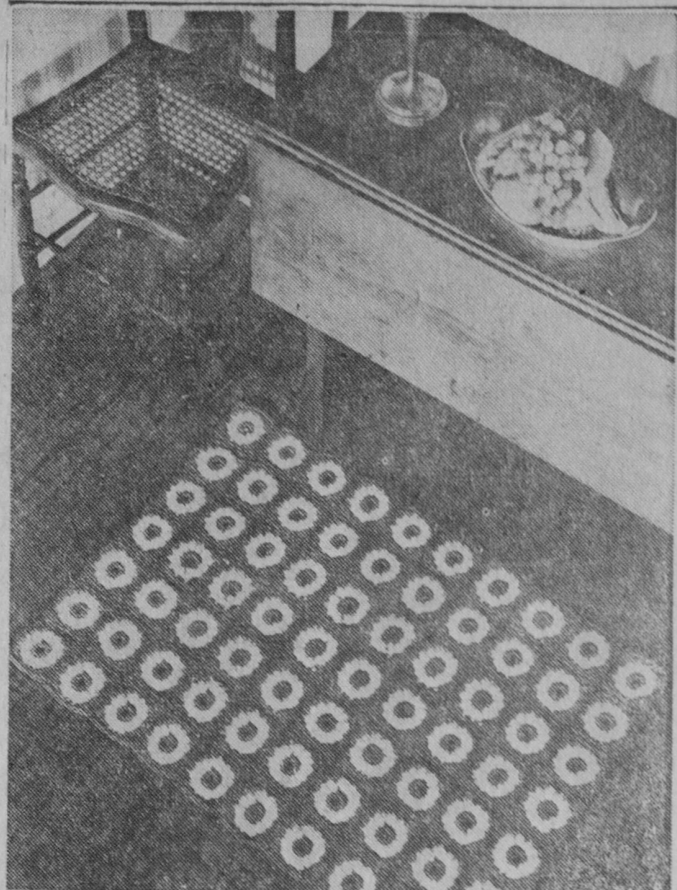
The men were released June 15 after managing the park and concessions since January 19, 1963.

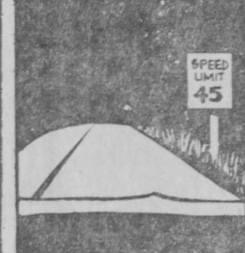

Unofficial signs posted along busy highways detract and confuse motorists, constituting a driving hazard. Highway department maintenance employees have standing instructions to remove all such signs from state highway rights-of-way and bridges, the commission said.

Election years usually bring a flurry of political signs along state highways, although rapid removal of such signs usually discourages further placements.

The Michigan Department of State Highways has jurisdiction over all state highway right-of-way.

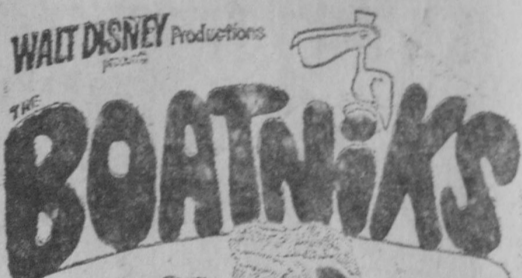

Hale elementary students will be registered on the opening day of school, September 8. Families new to the school district, however, are requested to bring their children in to the school prior to the September 8 opening date.

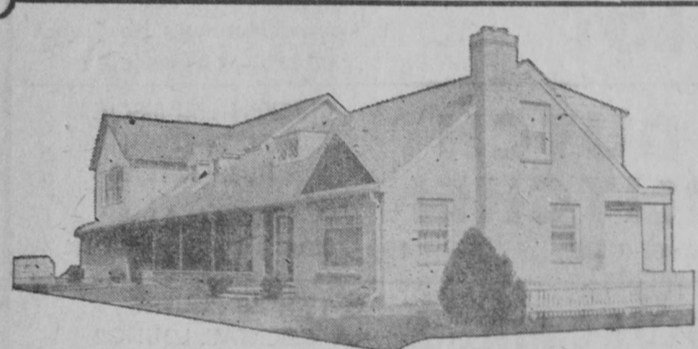
School will open for a half day session at 8:45 on Tuesday, September 8. Buses will pick up students at their regular morning time and return them home after 11:30 dismissal.

"There are 200 plating plants in the Detroit area, but we felt Xavier would learn a lot more if he visited Tawas Plating," explained Steve Lewis, production manager for Udylite Corporation at Detroit, who accompanied the visitor to Tawas City. "Tawas Plating is a well organized and efficient operation and one of the most unusual in the industry," he stated.

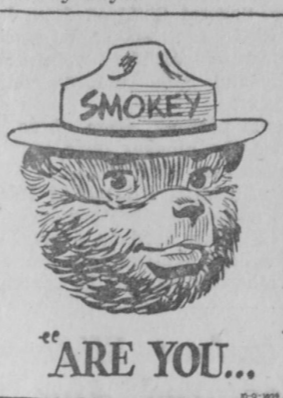
Back in Spain, the plating plant owned by Xavier's father employs 100 persons. Utilizing copper, nickel and chromium plating, the firm has the latest European equipment in plating parts for the automotive industry.

Barcelona is a city of 4 1/2 million persons. One of the main differences between his country and

the United States is that here, people live in the suburbs and work in the city. The opposite is true in Spain, where the people live in the central city and commute to their jobs in the suburbs. "Our operation in Spain has to be a little more versatile than those in this country" explained Xavier. "Production is the principal concern in the business in the United States. In Spain, we must be geared for short runs on many different types of plated parts."

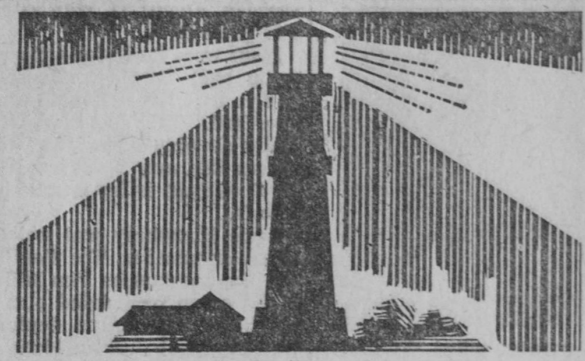

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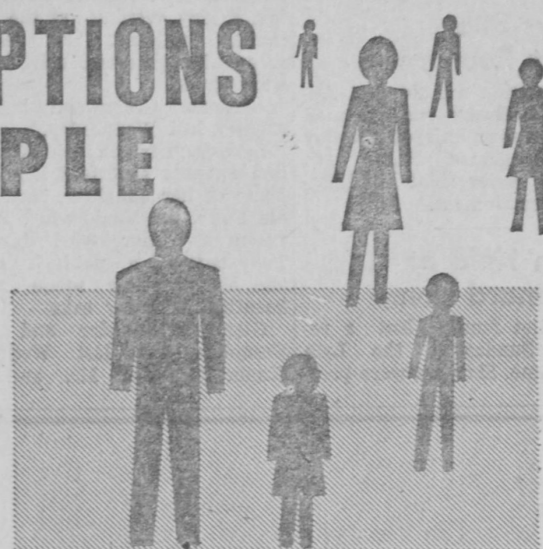
