

# City's Canvass Picks Up 47 Names, but Final Figure Still Low

Names of 47 persons missed in the 1970 federal census last spring are to be forwarded to Washington, D. C., next week, but Tawas City officials are not optimistic about this community's chances of retaining the same population level as found 10 years ago.

shocked to learn when preliminary figures were released a few weeks ago that population of this community had shown a substantial decrease from the 1960 census.

According to Reginald Blublitz, superintendent of public works, the city would have lost between \$5,000 and \$6,000 in annual revenue from the state if the preliminary figure of 1,625 persons would have been adopted as the final census figures. The 1960 census listed 1,810 residents in this city.

As a result the council authorized a complete new canvass of the city to determine if any residents had been missed in the federal count.

Blublitz reported that the two women hired to perform this canvass had found 47 "new" names to add to the federal count and it is hoped that more will be found before the deadline for returns next Monday.

The superintendent said that residents of seven homes were still to be contacted. Two of the families were on vacation and five refused to answer door bells when canvassers called.

Any resident missed during the federal census last spring is asked to contact the city hall immediately, telephone 362-3731. Special forms will be delivered to your door to insure that your family is included in the 1970 census.

Blublitz expressed some optimism Monday night that the final figure from Washington would be higher than the preliminary, regardless of the outcome of the extra work by the city in conducting its new canvass.

There was a fair turnout of voters at the polls, possibly generated by this local interest, with 95 votes in the first precinct, 123 in the second precinct and 102 in the third for a total vote of 320.

# Zoning Conflict at East Tawas

Following recommendation of its planning consultant, East Tawas Council has denied a request from Truman Barbier for construction of a marina and sales building in the Resort A district fronting Tawas Bay along US-23.

The council indicated Monday night that the applicant's only recourse was to appeal this decision to the zoning board of appeals.

Raymond W. Mills, planning consultant, found that the use proposed by Barbier, whose building application of May 18 specified sales and service of recreational vehicles, comprised a proposed land use of strictly a commercial nature.

Mills said that he saw no compliance whatsoever with Zoning Ordinance No. 208 which specifies uses under a Resort A district.

The consultant said that certain marina type uses could be reasonably justified within the spirit and interest of the zoning ordinance. He felt this could be accomplished with slight revision of existing permitted use within such a district.

Mills recommended denial of Barbier's request for "the best interest of the people of the city and in compliance with the zoning ordinance interest and the long range master plan proposals."

In other business, a report from the board of public works stated that the city is not now in a position to provide financial aid for sanitary services for American Homes, Incorporated, a proposed 40-acre plot east of Bennington Subdivision. The board stated that the plating ordinance places the burden of such service on the de-

veloper. It has been proposed to build a housing complex for retired persons in that area.

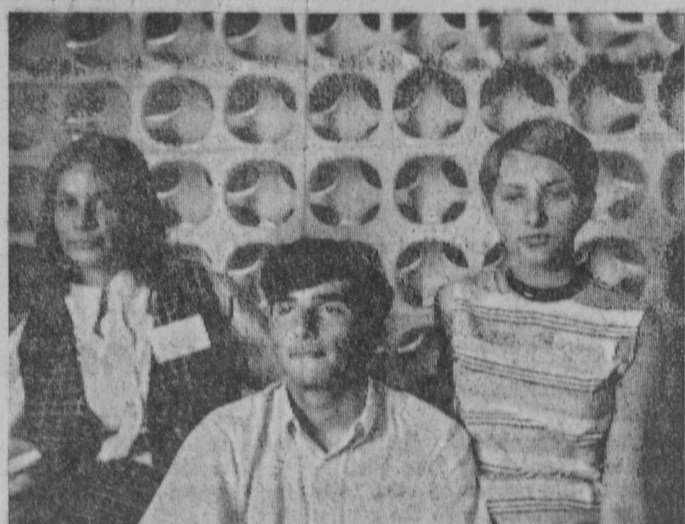

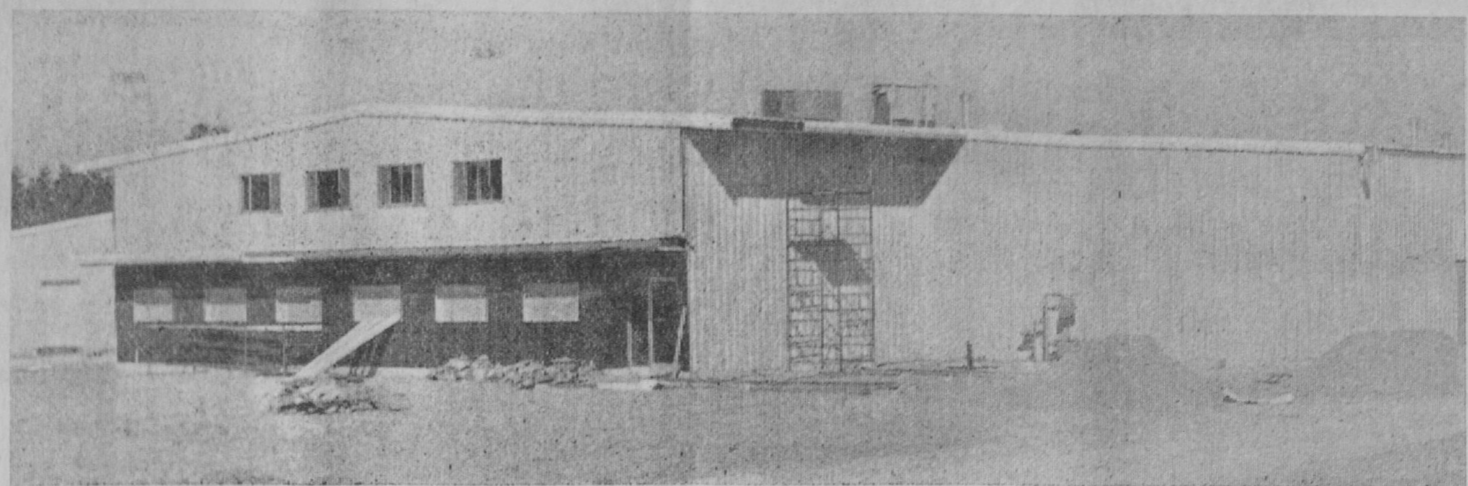

# Michigan Has Oversupply of Teachers, Says Board Head

The State Board of Education was warned that an oversupply of teachers in Michigan is apparent by a fact and one that the state "will need to learn to live with for some time to come."

School enrollment and census data indicate high school populations will hit a peak in about 1975, while elementary school populations have already peaked, the board noted. Basically, this means a change in the supply and demand setting for teachers and the school districts which employ them.

"This new setting will provide a change in conditions for teachers and employers of teachers," said Dr. Peter Oppewall, state board of education president. "Besides the basic change in school enrollments that has taken place or is expected, there are other factors which have a bearing on the expected oversupply of teachers," Oppewall said.

"First, increases in higher ed-

ucation enrollment in Michigan have resulted in a parallel increase in teacher production. Teacher production rates have increased substantially during the past four years.

"In 1965-66, for example, just over 9,000 provisional elementary and secondary teaching certificates were recommended by Michigan teacher education institutions. In 1968-69, by contrast, 12,706 such certificates were recommended," Oppewall said.

Michigan production of teachers has long been high among the states, he noted.

"In addition," Oppewall said, "teacher salaries, fringe benefits and working conditions have improved and this has tended to retain many persons in teaching rather than encouraging them to elect another type of work."

"These same factors have attracted a number of former teachers back to the classroom and teachers to come here from other states," he said.

For example, records show 3,794 such out-of-state teachers were attracted to Michigan in 1965-66 while 4,872 were attracted in 1968-69. Also adding to the available teacher force have been the financial squeeze on local school districts, which has forced some administrators back into the classroom. There is also an apparent decline in non-teaching opportunities for prospective former teachers.

"Several college and university placement officers report difficulty in placing their spring graduates," Oppewall said.

"It is entirely possible that several hundred spring and summer graduates will not find teaching positions for the 1970-71 school year. With an opportunity to be more selective, employers are tending to place a greater emphasis on grade point averages and the nature of the experience reports from former employment and/or student teaching," he said.

Additionally, Oppewall noted, Michigan certification code changes have an effect on the teacher oversupply.

"Several thousand persons have been employed in Michigan classrooms under the temporary permit provisions for long periods of time," he said. "The certification code, of course, requires that districts employ such persons only when certificated persons are not available."

"Therefore, a predictable competition occurs between persons with provisional or permanent certificates and persons who have been employed for various periods of time under the permit provisions."

Oppewall pointed out that persons employed under permits were notified individually in 1967 that changes in the certification code to take effect September 1, 1970, would require them to take additional college courses to meet increased permit requirements.

"It can be predicted, however, that many persons will have failed to heed that warning," Oppewall said.

"This is particularly true in view of the teacher shortage that has been a fact in Michigan for a long period—about a quarter of a

century. While the certification code, rules have always been very clear in providing that fully certificated persons be employed in preference to permit holders, there has not been a real test of intent in the past," he said.

"Michigan employers of teachers have long sought the freedom to be selective by retaining only the most competent and most qualified members of their teaching faculties," Oppewall said.

"Basically, the opportunity for employing officials to be selective for both initial employment and for retention is desirable since it creates a circumstance where only the best persons will be retained in the profession," he said.

"It is essential, however, that not only those in the educational world but also that all other Michigan citizens be aware of the basic change in the employer-employee situation regarding teachers and school districts which will prevail this fall for the first time almost in memory."

"The State Board of Education will be working with the educational community and the general public not only to produce understanding of the facts but also to provide an educational climate in which the best interests of the school children are served," Oppewall said.

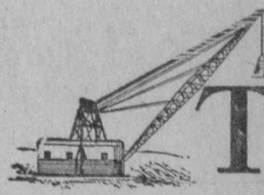

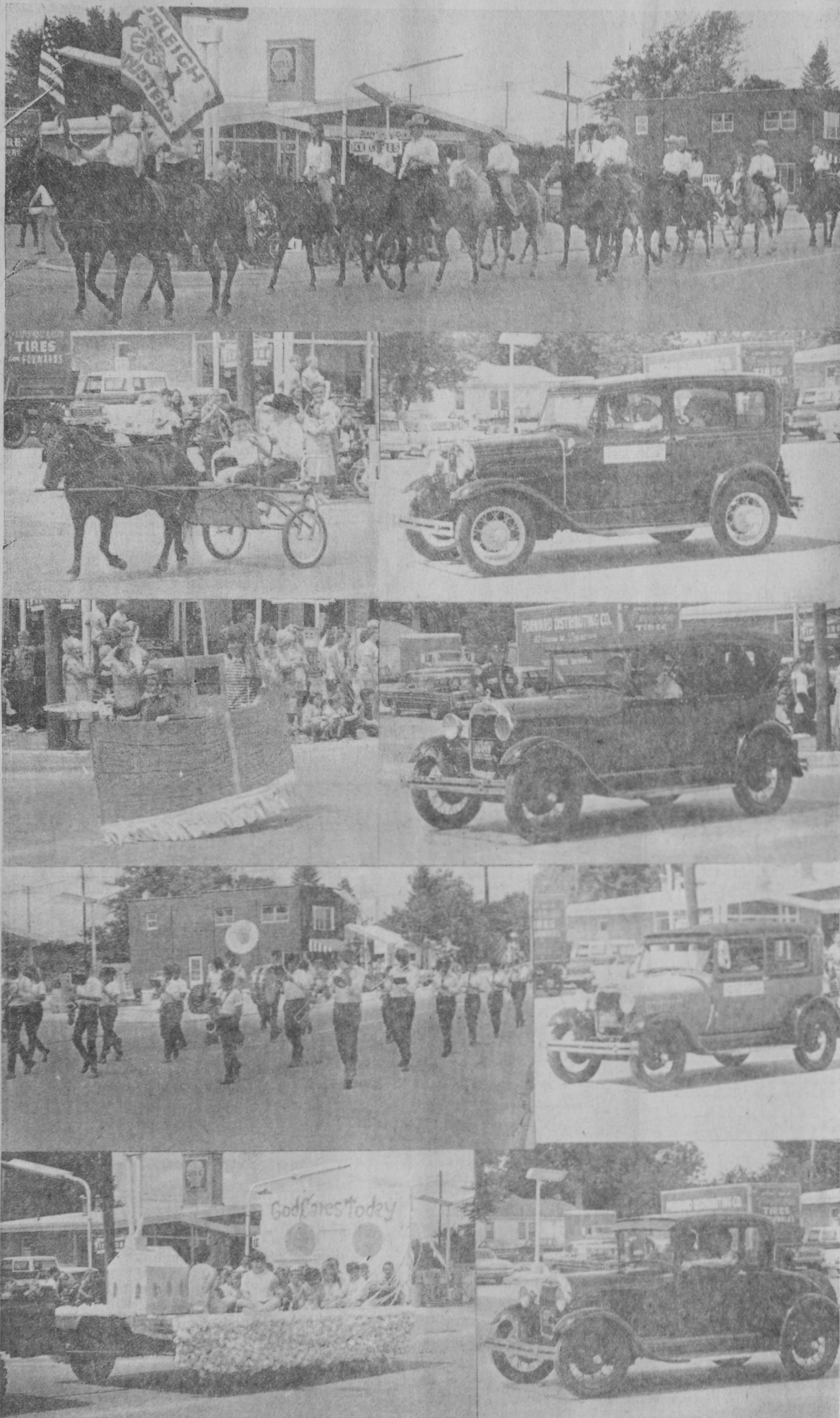

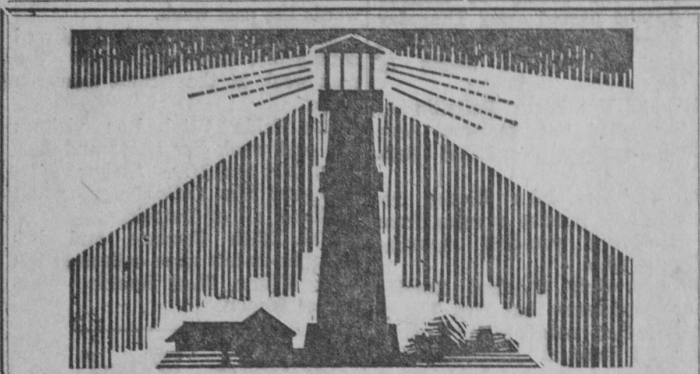

**Most Farmers  
Received 1970  
Wheat Money**

Most of the farmers who participated in the 1970 wheat and feed grain programs in Iosco County have now received their program payments, according to Grant Bessey, chairman of the Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

"Farmers earn program payments by diverting portions of their cropland to conservation uses, and complying with other program requirements," Mr. Bessey explained. "Diverting unneeded cropland helps maintain a balance between supply and demand, preserves the excess acres for future

use when they are needed, provides a more orderly supply of farm products to consumers and helps to assure equitable prices to farmers."

"Throughout the nation, over three-million farmers earned the farm program payments," Mr. Bessey said. "Payments were disbursed during a six-week period beginning July 1. In past years, the payment period has extended over a three-month period from July through September," Mr. Bessey said.

"Compressing the payment period into half the normal time required close cooperation between farmers and ASCS personnel," Mr. Bessey said, adding, "Speaking for the entire farmer-elected committee, I am proud of the way everyone has cooperated to get the payments out early as we had promised farmers that we would do."

"Because of budget restraints, partial payments could not be made this year during the spring sign-up period for the feed grain

program," Mr. Bessey explained. "When this decision was made, the department told farmers that full payments would be made as early as possible. That commitment has now been largely fulfilled," Mr. Bessey said.

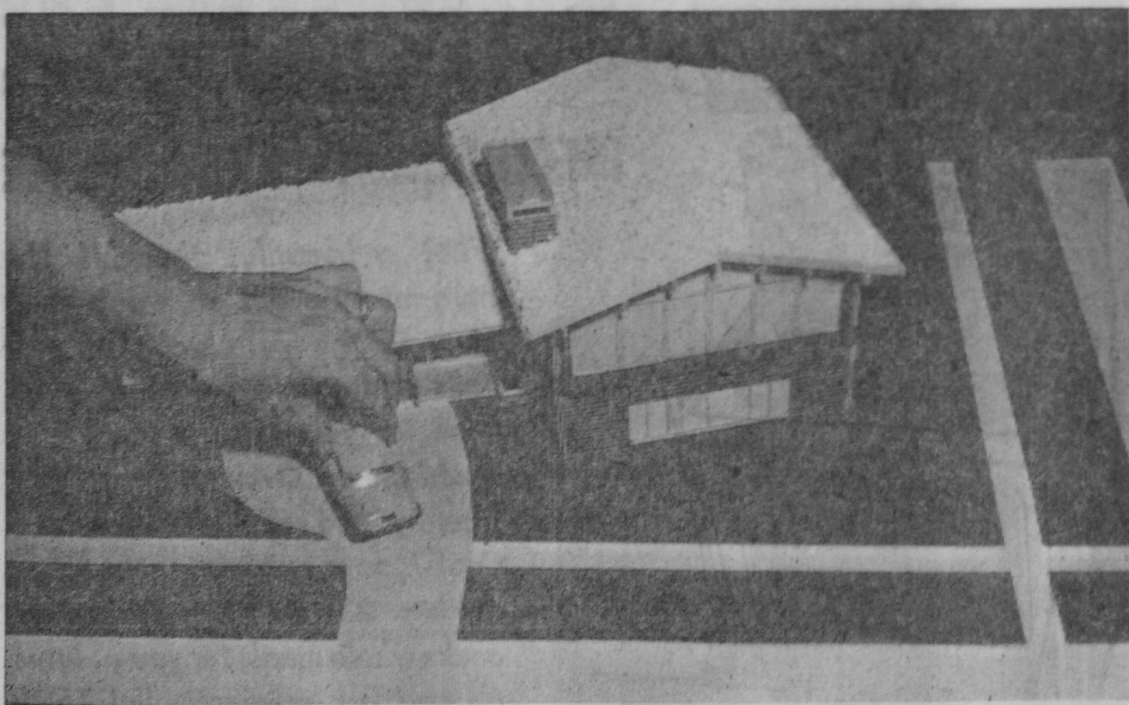

## Family Living Education

### Financial 10 Commandments

Money is not necessarily the root of all evil, but money management is often a point of disagreement for couples. The following "commandments" were written by Dr. Milton Huber, director of the Center for Consumer Affairs, University of Wisconsin. Honor these commandments and your marriage can be harmonious, even prosperous whatever your income.

1. You shall have no more children than your income will permit

to maintain the standard of living you desire for them, do not forget that the older children become, the more expensive they are to raise, financial planning and family planning must complement one another.

2. You shall not make the mistake of starting your marriage by purchasing all the modern conveniences and comforts that your parents have taken a lifetime to afford and accumulate, ignore this commandment and you shall be bowed down with debts when the first child comes and the income from the wife's job is no more build your budget basically around

the income of the husband.

3. You shall not take for granted that your mate has the same ideas about spending money that you have, many good family names are taken in vain by creditors because couples have not worked out a spending plan together and assigned the responsibilities for shopping, purchasing and meeting one's obligation to one or the other.

4. Remember to save for the day the unexpected happens, plan for the medical emergency, the short week or the breakdown of the car, set aside in savings, from the top of the paycheck, the equivalent of income from six months of your labor to care for emergencies.

5. Honor your credit rating, pay your debts on time so that installment credit at reasonable rates will always be available when you need it, beware of merchants who advertise "easy credit" but specialize in harsh and expensive repayment contracts.

6. You shall not kill your

chances of enjoying the good life by buying impulsively, especially beware of door-to-door salesmen and the lure of "something for nothing," however disguised. Do your shopping in showrooms, not your living room, compare merchandise and prices as carefully for large appliances and furniture as you do for food and clothing, not to do so is to be penny-wise and dollar foolish.

7. You shall not commit yourself to any installment contract without reading it completely, be sure that all blanks have been filled in and that all verbal agreements have been put in writing.

8. You should not cheat yourself by securing new loans at high interest to pay off old due bills, charging little or no interest. This is an expensive way of buying time, not a way of paying bills. The continued consolidation of your debts can lead to the gradual

disintegration of your marriage. 9. You shall not bear the responsibility of purchasing a car or major appliance on the installment plan without inquiring into the true annual rate of interest, dollar charges and other special fees, interest rates vary considerably, shop for your credit as well as your merchandise.

10. You shall not covet a house of your own if you move frequently, financing, selling and closing costs increase the cost of home ownership prohibitively for families which move every few years, neither shall you compare the costs of renting versus buying without including all of the costs of home ownership besides monthly mortgage payments; depreciation, taxes, hazard insurance, mortgage, life insurance, closing costs, upkeep and repair, and income from interest lost on savings used as a down payment on a house.

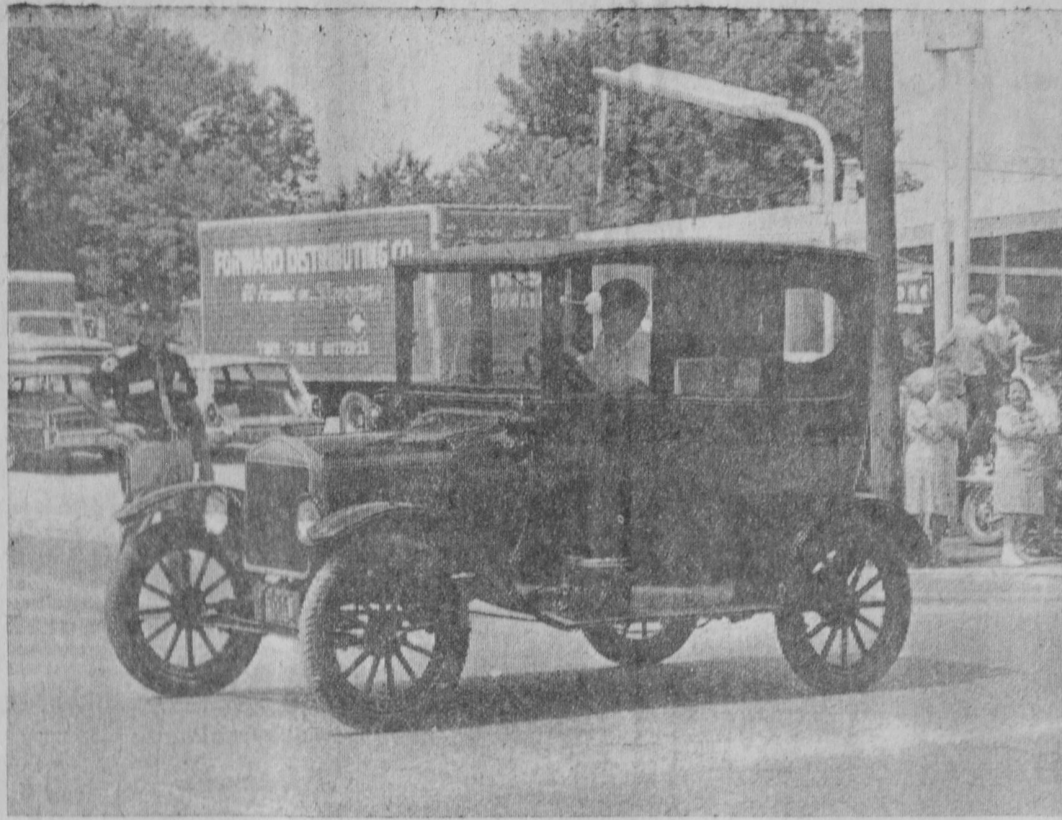

Judge Miller Studies Law in Nevada

Judges from all parts of the United States Friday completed an intensive four-week course in the rapidly changing area of criminal and civil law that will better enable them to administer justice.

Judge Allan C. Miller of the Iosco Circuit Court was one of 113 graduates who were selected from a total population of 5,000 trial judges nationwide to participate.

The National College of State Trial Judges (NCSTJ) at the University of Nevada, Reno, signifies a national effort on the part of judges, themselves, to give justice more reason, integrity, and fairness when an alternative to violent dissent and armed revolution is sorely needed.

The college is under the direction of Dean Laurence M. Hyde Jr., who sees the college as "making a valuable contribution to the improvement of the administration of justice."

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Judges attending the four-week course preside over criminal cases from murder to lesser crimes and civil cases from automobile liability claims to child custody actions.

The curriculum includes court administration, civil proceedings before trial, judicial discretion, family law, evidence and many other areas of vital concern.

Long-range funding for the NCSTJ is primarily assured under a 10-year grant from the Fleischmann Foundation with additional funding from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek.

Many of the judges gave up their own vacation time to attend. They spent about six hours a day in actual class time and were required to spend four hours per day on outside reading in addition to evening seminars.

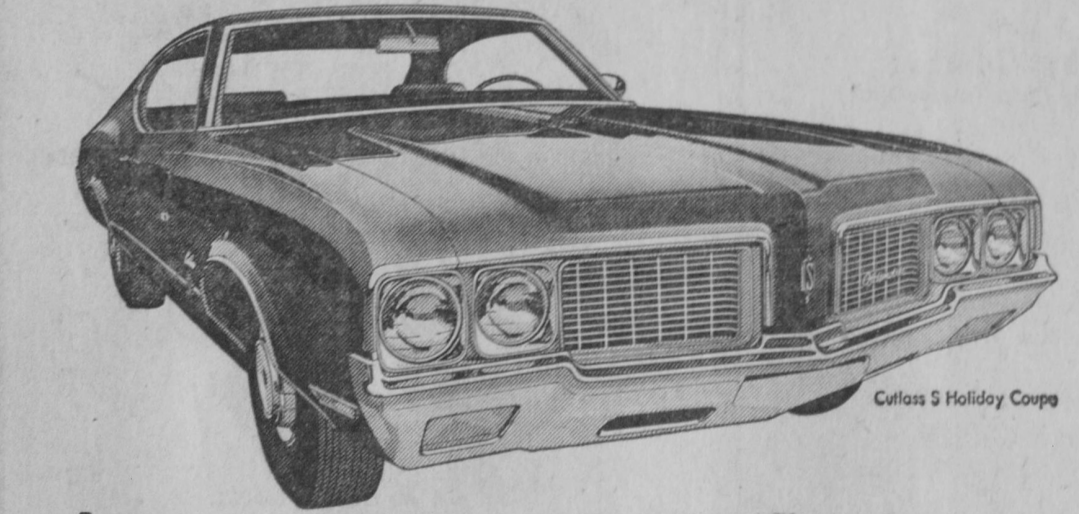


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
