

# Hale Voters OK Bonds on Fourth Try

In its fourth try for modernization and expansion of school facilities, voters of Hale Area School District approved a 1.6 million dollar bond issue December 9 by the narrow margin of 520 to 517.

Following the election, Supt. Paul Southerland said the board of education was awaiting official word from the county canvassing board before it would go ahead with architectural planning for the new school.

"This victory for children of Hale Area School District would never have been possible without the effort of all residents—especially the Hale Area League for Education," said Southerland. "No one person was responsible for the vote—it was a combined effort of

all persons interested in improving our school system."

Southerland said that the election was closely supervised in order to prevent any possibility of legal entanglements. "Ballots were counted five times or more the night of the election in order to insure the count was accurate. Because of the closeness, some persons may desire a recount by the county canvassing board," he stated.

The superintendent said the next step would be to work with the school attorneys on selling bonds to finance the new junior and senior high school. It may take three months or more to make preparations to sell bonds.

"The bond market seems to be

improving rapidly as interest rates are decreasing," said Southerland. Although he would have preferred a much wider margin of victory, Southerland said he was happy with the outcome. Noting that residents of the district had long dreamed of a new junior and senior high school, Southerland said the district could now accomplish something in the education of its youngsters.

The new school is to be built on a 25-acre site, which the district owns, northeast of the present school. The new 17-room junior and senior high school building would include eight regular classrooms, two science laboratories, one home economics room, a library-materials center, a cafeteria-auditorium, arts and crafts room, music room and gymnasium.

The present junior and senior

high school would be converted into an elementary school, to be used for special programs. The present wood frame structure would not be removed immediately as these rooms would be needed in order to eliminate cost of portable classrooms presently being utilized.

Need for these new facilities has become critical to Hale Area School District. As new roads are constructed in Michigan, the lakes area of Western Inisco County has been filled with a year around population as many heads of households commute to other areas for employment.

Total student population at Hale Area School jumped from 560 stu-

dents in 1968 to 650 in 1970 and the district has a projected enrollment of 800 students in 1975.

In addition to a five percent enrollment increase each year, good education today requires more modern facilities than are presently available for children of the district.

Approximately 5 1/2 to seven mills of taxes would be required to finance the bond issue, dependent upon interest rates, district valuation and length of time to retire the debt. All of the school's current bonded indebtedness is to be retired at the end of this school year.

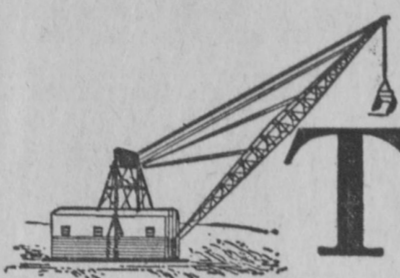
The proposed new school would be ready for occupancy in the fall of 1973.

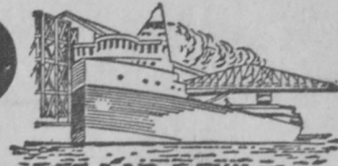

## Board OKs Band Uniform Money

Tawas Area School Band will have its new uniforms for the district festival next spring.

This was assured Monday night when the board of education unanimously approved financing for 50 percent of the uniform purchase program.

The uniform purchase plan, as presented by Tawas Area Music Boosters, had been discussed at the board's November 9 meeting, but final action awaited a study of finances to determine if the school's share would be possible this year.

In October, the music booster club started a fund-raising campaign to raise \$5,000 as its share of the uniform purchase. Since then, \$2,600 has been raised through a community wide effort.

Supt. Reynold Mick said Monday night that an analysis of funds available and obligations revealed that it would be hazardous to promise \$5,000 from the general fund. He said, however, that there was \$4,135 in the building and site fund, plus \$875 from the December payment for the Alabaster School from Inisco-Arenac Regional Library for a total of \$5,030.

By unanimous vote of the board of education, these funds are to be used as the district's share of the uniform purchase. Money taken from this fund is to be replaced next year as there may be a need to expand school sites when land becomes available.

One of the problems facing the board of education in financing such a purchase from the general fund was that the request was not received in time to be included in the school's annual budget. Robert Elliott, board president, pointed out that budgets are prepared in January and February for submission to the county allocation board.

Present uniforms worn by the band are 15 years old or more and many are becoming threadbare. Music boosters, an organization composed of parents and other interested adults, had discussed a

band uniform fund-raising campaign for the past three years. In the meantime, it has provided funds for the purchase of additional band instruments.

Tawas Area School Band has an outstanding record and is considered one of the top high school band organizations in the state.

Gene Salamony, band director, and Mrs. Louis Pfeiffer, who has charge of the fund-raising campaign for the music boosters, were present at the meeting to answer questions. A sample uniform which has been on display during the fund-raising campaign was viewed by the board of education.

Present uniforms worn by the senior band are to be turned over to the school's cadet band.

Salamony said that the music booster organization would now double its efforts to raise the remainder of its share of the uniform purchase.

## Slash Student Cost to Save Hot Lunches

In an attempt to save its hot lunch program, Tawas Area School will slash its daily ticket cost to students effective next month.

This action was taken Monday night on recommendation of its hot lunch committee, which said the reduction in price should encourage more students to participate in the program. It is hoped that an increased volume will reduce the over-all cost.

The new rate for all students will be 30 cents per lunch, regardless of whether or not they purchase a weekly ticket. The ala carte line is to be eliminated.

The present cost to students is 40 cents per lunch in the high school and 35 cents for elementary students. Adults will continue to pay 50 cents per lunch.

Speaking for the hot lunch committee, Trustee Leonard Sarki said

that his committee and administrators had visited Standish-Sterling Central and found that the hot lunch program there was a paying proposition. It was found that labor cost per meal there amounted to nine cents, as compared to 19 cents at Tawas Area, because of greater participation by students.

"We do not ask that the hot lunch program be a paying proposition, but we would like to see it break even," said Sarki. At the present time, as has been the case in recent years, the hot lunch program has been operating at a deficit.

The reduced rate to students will be on the experimental basis for six weeks.

In other business, the board authorized payment of 85 percent of the cost of constructing the new track. The action followed a conference with the contractor. This payment had been withheld as a means of insuring that the track would be completed in a satisfactory manner.

The Jackson contractor explained that his firm had gambled with the weather in an effort to provide a completed all weather track by next spring. Because of fall rain and damage to the surface, some portions of the track did not cure properly.

The contractor assured the board that the track was fully covered by warranty and he could foresee no problem in curing once the weather turns warmer.

He expressed disappointment that the track could not be lined this fall, which will prevent its use for meets next spring. The new facility will be available for practice use next spring.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that all teachers in Tawas Area School have been certified by the department of education.

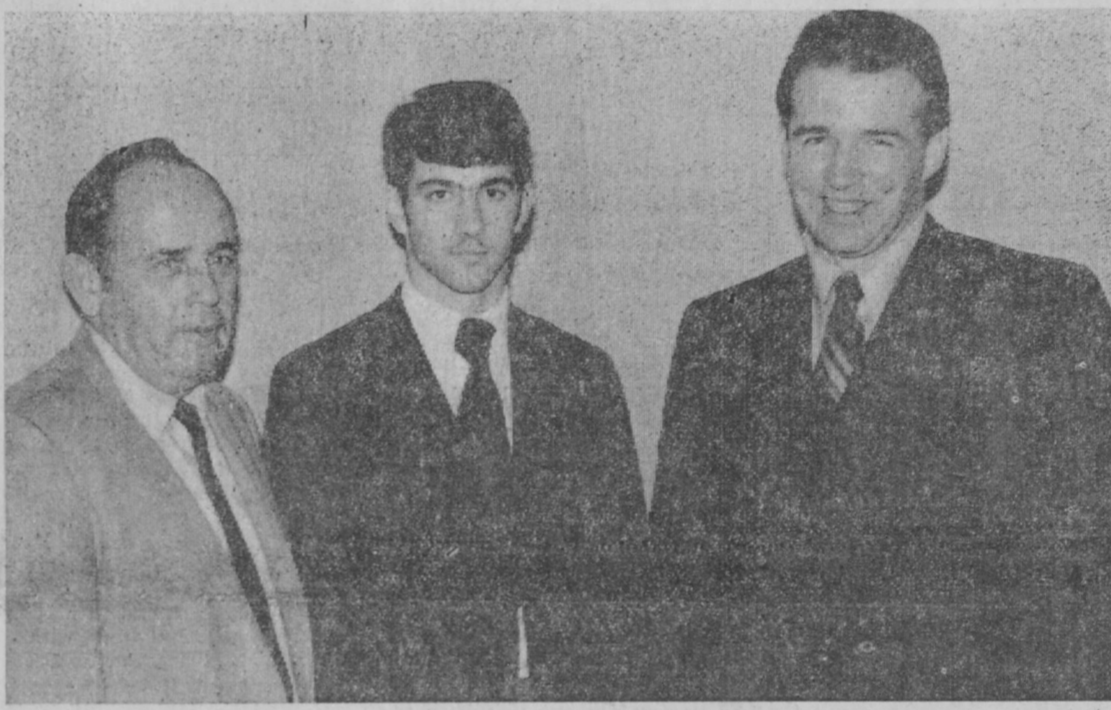
As a means of providing additional participation in basketball among eighth graders, the community school recreational program is to be expanded next month. Eighth graders who are not members of the regular basketball teams will be able to participate in an intramural program on Tuesday nights as well as during the Saturday program now in effect.

A request had been made by parents to hire an additional coach and that a full contingent of 40 players be played in the 10 interscholastic games. It was felt that such a number would be too large for such a program and that the community school alternative would actually give more playing time to those not on the regular teams.

The board approved attendance to reserve cheerleaders at games played away from home. All schools of the league now allow the entire cheerleading staff to attend away games. The action would be canceled immediately if any objections develop from administrators.

## Oscoda Pedestrian Fatally Injured

A 17-year-old Oscoda girl, Janell Renee Golding, received fatal injuries Friday night when she was struck by an automobile while walking along River Road in front of Oscoda Area High School.

Miss Golding, a senior at the high school, was struck by a car driven by Daniel T. Myles, Oscoda. She was dead on arrival at Wurtsmith Air Force Base Hospital.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said Myles was traveling east on River Road at approximately 40 miles per hour. As he was passing another car, the left front fender of his car struck

Miss Golding, who was walking east on the traveled portion of the west bound lane.

The driver told deputies he did not see Miss Golding until it was too late to avoid hitting her.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at Oscoda Methodist Church with burial in the Oscoda Cemetery.

She was born February 25, 1953, at Pontiac. She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Golding of Oscoda; a sister; a brother, and grandparents.

A scholarship fund for the school's art department has been established in her memory.

## Tawas Hospital Employees Ask Union Vote

Attempts are now being made to unionize employees of Tawas Hospital.

Michigan Council 55 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO, and the Michigan Licensed Practical Nurses Association have petitioned the state labor relations board for an election.

The hospital has been notified that such an election would take place within the next few weeks. The notice was signed by Joseph B. Bixler, trial examiner for the Michigan Labor Mediation Board.

Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator, said that one meeting has been held between Bixler and the hospital's attorney.

Norwood said Tuesday that a wage study had been recently completed among private hospitals of Northern Michigan for comparison purposes. This study included hospitals at Gladwin, Standish and West Branch, as well as Tawas.

## Give Tips on Holiday Calls

If you are planning to call your son, husband or special friends in Vietnam this holiday season, ask him to call you instead.

This advice came from Howard L. Haight, Michigan Bell's local manager, who said that servicemen in Vietnam are very hard to locate and combat conditions frequently prevent a call from the United States from getting through to the person wanted.

"It's much easier for a serviceman to find a phone than for a phone call to find him," he said.

Best thing to do, said Haight, is to write to your man in Vietnam in advance and arrange a date and time for him to call you—preferably collect. (The time difference between Eastern Standard Time and Vietnam is 13 hours; when it is 12 o'clock noon in Michigan, it is 1:00 a. m. the next day in Vietnam.)

Haight said that servicemen can call home at certain hours during the Christmas season through special arrangements made by the United Service Organizations (USO), the United States military, Hong Kong Cable and Wireless and the Bell System's long lines department.

"There is no domestic telephone service outside of Saigon," Haight explained. "Our military and the USO can make arrangements for only occasional use of military circuits to be connected with the commercial system at the Saigon USO. Calls then go via radio, undersea cable or satellite to Oakland, California."



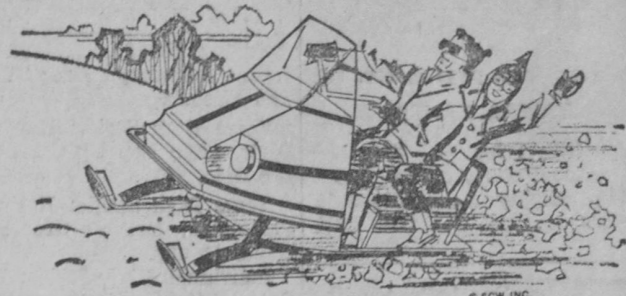

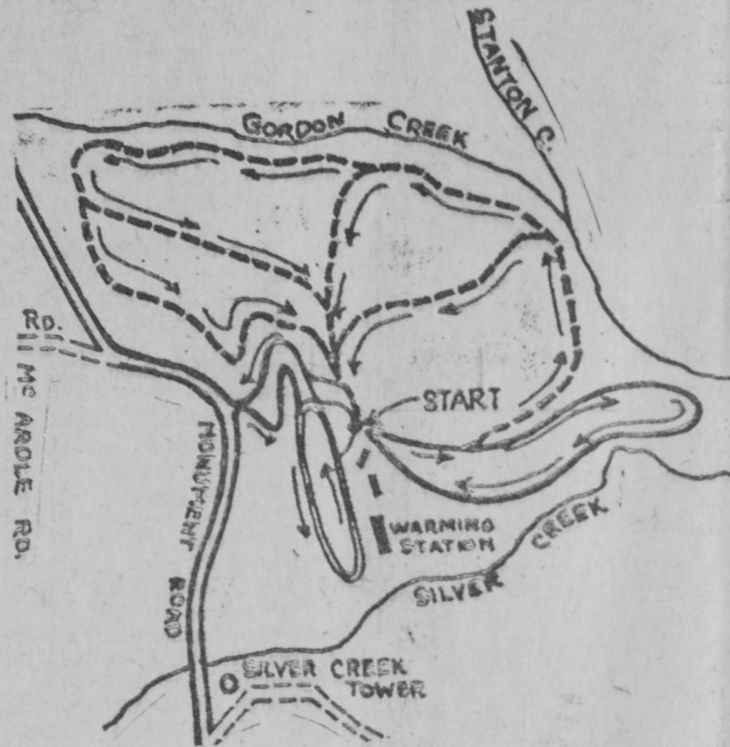

**25 Years Ago—**

He said that a 30-hour week could not be efficiently adjusted to projects of this kind. It is expected that other contractors will be free to bid on this project shortly.

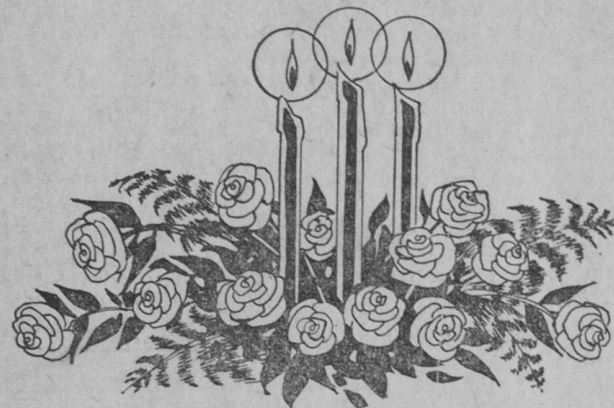

## Here Are Answers to Social Security Questions

Question: When I apply for social security benefits, what information must I have to support my claim?

Answer: The information needed to support your claim depends upon the type of benefit you expect to receive. If your age is a factor of entitlement as it would be for retirement benefits, you must furnish evidence of your date of birth. This would be your birth or baptismal certificate if you have one. Other documents, recorded early in your life, also can be used. If relationship is involved, evidence of marriage and divorces may be needed. Proof of death is necessary to receive survivor's benefits and medical evidence is required in disability cases.

Question: I often work for my husband in his business. He is the owner of a tavern. Is it possible for him to pay me wages and report them so I can become insured for social security benefits?

Answer: No. This is considered family employment and is not covered by social security. However, there are two exceptions. A wife can be covered by social security if her husband's business is incorporated or is a partnership in which at least one owner is not related to her.

Question: My father wants to retire at 62. Will he be able to get social security?

Answer: Yes, but his monthly checks would be 20 percent less than the amount he would collect if he retired at 65.

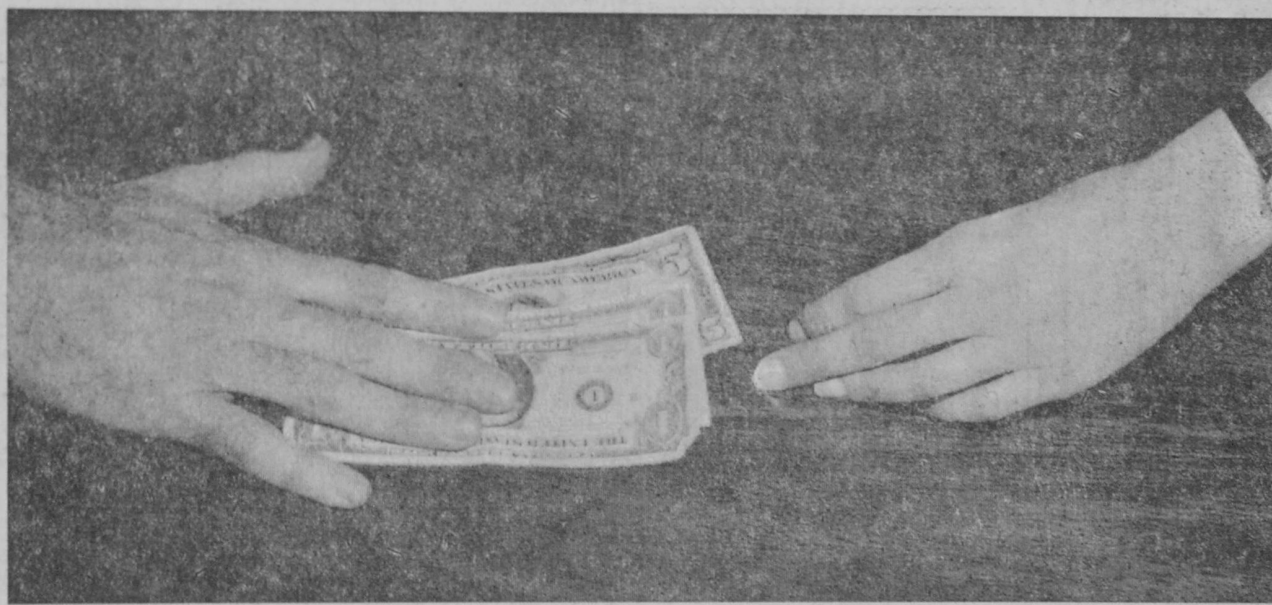
