





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All Voters Eligible for **School Ballots**

The United States Supreme Court, in a decision handed down nonproperty owners are eligible to vote on issues of public interest that effect them, including those requiring the purchase of long term, general obligation bonds.

Previously, Michigan law had allowed only property owners to vote on bonding obligations that would take over five years to repay and were to be financed from real property taxes.

The recent supreme court decision ruled that the Constitution of the United States, under the equal protection clause of the Fourteenth Amendment, does not allow any state to pass a law which would exclude any group from voting on an issue of significant concern or interest to all citizens. This means that Article II, Section 6 of the Michigan Constitution is now invalid, as are similar laws in 13 other states.

Several reasons were given by the court to justify its decision:

1. Property owners and nonproperty owners alike have an interest in the improvement of public facilities and will certainly be effected by the outcome of bond elections affecting construction.

2. States have the ability to make other revenues available to districts and localities from sources other than taxes on real property that will be paid by nonproperty owners as well as those who own property.

3. A portion of pro paid by the land owner will certainly be derived from the payment of rent on that property. The land owner may deduct taxes and business expenses and can pass at least a part of the cost of the increased tax on to the renter in the

Cook macaroni according to package directions. Drain and rinse. In saucepan heat butter, and in it cook green pepper, onion and carrot for 10 minutes, or until onion is tender. Add water and cabbage, cover and cook for 10 minutes, or until cabbage is just tender. Add macaroni and remaining ingredients. Bring to a simmer. Correct seasoning and serve piping hot. Serves 6.
