Population Hike Helps Isosco Budget

Use of preliminary federal census figures to disburse state funds has given a boost to Isosco County's general fund, according to a report Friday by County Treas. Edward Nelkie.

Paying Isosco on the basis of a 1970 population of 24,161 persons, rather than the 1960 census of 16,505, income tax return to this county has increased from \$16,835 in September 1969 to \$21,986 in 1970. During the June quarter, Isosco received \$28,567, as compared to \$17,165 a year ago.

As a result of this unanticipated increase in revenue, Nelkie said that all departments would end the year in the "black." Without the added money, there would have been a slight deficit in the general fund.

According to the county treasurer's November 30 balance sheet, the county had expenditures of \$604,015 during the first 11 months of 1970, as compared to \$634,228 in revenues.

While the preliminary census figure is available for the county, the breakdown by townships and cities will not be made official until next spring. As a result, \$83,000 which represents the share of the income tax increase to be paid to townships has been placed in a trust fund for payment next spring.

Isosco's three cities, as well as Sherman and Reno Townships, will not receive any increase—in fact, preliminary census figures have indicated that these five units will receive less money because of a drop in population during the past 10 years. This fact holds true for all cities of North-eastern Michigan.

Townships which have shown a population increase will also get a boost from the state sales tax refund. The treasurer's office has placed \$61,000 in a trust fund until the population count is made

official. This figure represents the September increase. The county does not receive a share of this fund.

Uniform Fund to be Detailed

Due to the holidays and distribution of the birthday calendars, Tawas Area Music Boosters will release a detailed report of the uniform fund receipts in the next issue of The Tawas Herald.

Contributions are arriving daily and Mrs. Louis Pfeiffer, president, stated that all contributions toward the uniform fund, should the goal be exceeded, will remain in that fund to be used for accessories and replacement.

Fire Early Saturday Destroyed Grant Township Farm Home

Fire early Saturday morning destroyed the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Coates, 3262 West M-55, Tawas City.

The blaze was discovered by a passing motorist, Neil Revord, 1809 West M-55, who was credited with saving the life of the Coates' son, Timothy James, age 13.

A foreman for National Gypsum Company at National City, Revord was on his way to work around 6:30 a. m. when he noticed smoke billowing across M-55 from the burning dwelling. He pulled into the yard, attempted to determine if anyone was still in the house and then checked in the barn.

Mr. and Mrs. Coates were working in the milk parlor and were unaware of the fire. When told that the boy was still in the bedroom, Revord went back to the burning house, smashed out a bedroom window and pulled the boy to safety.

The blaze apparently caused a temporary disruption in telephone service on the party line in that area. Mrs. Coates went to the neighboring farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Long to notify the fire department, but the telephone was out of order. Revord then drove to the home of Donald Warner on Sand Lake Road, about 2½ miles

away, to use the telephone. Warner is a member of the Grant Township Fire Department and turned in the alarm.

The blaze was completely out of control by the time the call was made. The house and contents were a complete loss. Assisting firemen from Grant Township was the Plainfield Township Fire Department.

One Race Set for TC Primary

One race for city council has been assured for Tawas City's primary election on Monday, February 15, but as of Monday, petitions had not been filed for any offices other than the council.

Cecil Cabbie, incumbent Third Ward alderman, will be opposed by Robert N. Rollin, who filed his nominating petition last week.

Both Cabbie and Clark Tanner, First Ward alderman, filed nominating petitions prior to Monday night's council meeting. The third alderman whose term expires next spring, Jack Lardie, Second Ward, said Monday night he would not seek re-election.

Besides the three seats on the city council, terms of other city officers expiring next spring include mayor, clerk, treasurer and supervisor of the three wards.

City Clerk Walter Nelson said Monday that the deadline for filing nominating petitions is December 29, 4:00 p. m.

TC Council Hears 'Pro and Con' on Snowmobiles

Discussion on a proposed ordinance to regulate snowmobiles on city streets, rather than the present prohibition, drew 25 visitors to Monday night's Tawas City Council meeting.

A number of property owners objected to the noise of snowmobiles operating in residential areas, while others believed an ordinance suggested by Police Chief George Westcott regulating operation on certain streets, as well as other restrictions, should be adopted by the city.

The council's ordinance committee is to report its recommendations at the next council meeting.

County Adopts Amended Report

An amended report which slashed previously recommended increases on the 1971 true cash value base in residential property classifications for this county was adopted Wednesday by the Isosco Board of Commissioners and is to be forwarded to the state tax commission to meet a December 31 filing deadline.

Whether or not the state tax commission will accept this amended report, which is based on local rather than state guidelines, remains to be seen. Fifty percent of the true cash value of property represents the state-qualified valuation used to determine property tax assessments.

At its November session, the county board of commissioners unanimously rejected recommendations of Henry Oates, director of the county's tax equalization department, which gave increases to both residential and timber cutover categories. That report had followed guidelines previously established by the state tax commission and 1,039 sales during the period from January 1969 to June 30, 1970, were used as the basis for Oates' report.

In its November resolution, the county board of commissioners directed Oates to prepare a new sales study for the two categories based on a period of 2½ years, rather than the 1½-year study which he used to prepare his November recommendation. In addition, the board stipulated that no changes were to be made on the true cash value in any category unless sales during the 2½-year period represented at least 15 percent of the total property descriptions.

As a result of Oates' compliance with the board's stipulation to use a 2½-year study, January 1968 to June 30, 1970, his previous recommendation that the residential property classification in 14 of 17 units be increased by \$8,240,795 has now been reduced to \$4,988,297. The new total represents an over-all increase of 4.27 percent for residential property in this county, rather than the recommended November increase of 6.97 percent.

Under the new 2½-year sales study, only one taxing unit will receive an increase higher than the November recommendation. That exception is Burleigh Township. One other unit, Sherman Township, is to receive a reduction from the November report due to decreased property valuation found in the new sales study.

There will be no change in the timber cutover category (recreational or hunting lands), due to the fact that, using the 2½-year period stipulated by the board of commissioners, total sales did not reach the 15 percent provision.

In November, Oates had recommended a 12½ percent increase on land value only for the timber cutover category which totaled \$774,229, or about a \$10 per acre increase on the true cash value for

Killey Appointed to County Road Post

Filling vacancies on various county boards was the principal business of Isosco Board of Commissioners, meeting last week in its final session of 1970.

Merton F. Killey, chairman of the Isosco Republican Committee, was named as the new member on the county road commission. On a secret ballot, Killey received six votes from the commission, as compared to three votes for Clarence Curry, who had held that post for a number of years.

Other candidates for the office, but who received no votes, were Charles Nash, Basil Goupil, Fitzhugh Prescott and Claude Benson. J. Berkeley Smith was named to the Isosco Social Services Board to replace the late Arthur Johnson. Smith received six votes from the commission, as compared to three for Fred Holzheuer of Hale.

Fred Lomas, present chairman of the commission, was named to replace Aubrey Belson on the parks and recreation commission. Lomas is the county commission's appointive member. Belson was then appointed to the commission to replace Donald Karcher of Oscoda, whose term expired. Belson received seven votes, as compared to two votes for the other candidate, Neal Miller.

The board is to wait until the next session to replace the late Alva Meade on the regional library board.

Gordon Huck was reappointed to the county building authority. Three members who were defeated for renomination or reelection to the county commission attended their final meeting as commissioners. Included were Smith, Belson and Walter Miller. Replacing them will be Donald L. LeCureux, District Four, the position formerly held by Smith; George Blust, Ninth District, the seat formerly held by Belson; Lloyd S. Little, Eighth District, who takes over from Miller.

AuGres Hearing on US-23 Freeway

Public discussion on bridge replacement and route alternatives for reconstruction of US-23 will be held Thursday, January 28, 8:00 p. m., at the multipurpose room of the AuGres Elementary School, 310 South Court Street, AuGres.

Called by the Michigan Department of State Highways, the hearing will give the opportunity for comments from interested federal, state and local governmental units, as well as local groups and officials.

A description of the alternatives, maps and other pertinent information, is available for inspection at the Arenac County Road Commission office, Omer.


Information concerning the relocation assistance program and the tentative schedules for right way acquisition and construction will be provided at the hearing. Testimony will be taken from interested citizens regarding the so-

cial, environmental and economic impact of the proposed alternatives.

A legal notice on another page of this newspaper gives information concerning preparation of written statements to be submitted to the department of state highways in place of, or in addition to, oral statements made at the hearing.

The proposed US-23 expressway, presumably to be built in the late 1970s, would be a part of the extended arterial system, not the interstate system, and would be funded by 50 percent federal, 50 percent state money rather than the 190 federal funding by the interstate system.

Funding for the US-23 expressway as far as M-65 is already available, but planning, at present, stops at M-55 west of Tawas City. It will be continued soon to Alpena.



Answers to Turkey Questions

by Martha Logan

Q. What are some tips that will help make carving the turkey easy for the host?

A. Place the turkey on a large platter. Avoid overcrowding the platter with garnishes. The breast of the turkey should be at the carver's left. Have a sharp carving knife, a long pronged fork, and an extra plate handy for carving thigh and drumstick.

Q. Why does the roasting time for poultry sometimes vary from the recommended printed schedules?

A. The shape, quality and temperature of the bird; the roasting pan; method used (dry vs. moist heat) and oven temperature are all variables which will influence the roasting time. The roasting time charts for deep-basted Butterball Swift's Premium Turkeys found on the outside of the wrappers are carefully tested each year for best cooking methods and most accurate schedules. The directions are written for cooks who know all about turkey and especially for those who don't.



Q. Does turkey take less time to cook when not stuffed?

A. Yes. Shorten the recommended times about 1/4 hr. for a 14 lb. bird and proportionately for other sizes.

Desperate Need of Homes for Iosco's Homeless Adults

"We need private homes desperately in this county and surrounding counties for homeless adults," reports Edward Burgess, director of Iosco County Department of Social Services. "We are looking for homes where a person can have affection and services needed to care for physical and emotional needs."

Some of these people are elderly and cannot care for themselves sufficiently, and others are mentally retarded, over the age of 18, who are unable to function to the degree of living alone. They need places to live where they will be kindly treated and made to feel like a useful human being. Some will regain their health to a degree where they can once again become self-sufficient, but there are many others, who will require the services provided indefinitely.

Several of these people who need this type of care are occupying beds in skilled nursing homes and medical care facilities and, as there is a growing demand for

these beds, these people should be helped to make other living arrangements as soon as possible.

"We want to find homes where they can provide these services and hopefully can make a person feel he is part of a family," Mr. Burgess continued. "Such homes can arrange to have up to three individuals, as long as each person has a separate bed, and provided the rooms are large enough and meet the minimum requirements established by policies of the department."

For this type of care, the local county department of social services will set a rate of care starting at \$150 per month, depending on the extensiveness and kind of care needed for each individual. Such a program as this can save the state considerable amounts of money, because if these people cannot be placed in private homes, they must be placed, or continue to be cared for, in expensive institutions. When this happens, there is no room for those who need in-

stitutional care and who could benefit from the training available in such places.





Most ornamental balls for the Christmas tree come in the popular size of 2 1/4 to 2 3/8 inches. One firm makes balls ranging from one" to 3 1/4."

Currently a major portion of holiday ornaments comes from Japan, with more and more being imported from Hong Kong and Taiwan in recent years. Italy, Germany and some of the countries behind the Iron Curtain also supply these products to the United States. In fact 8 to 10 per cent of all glass ornaments comes from outside of this country.

Over 80 different designs are offered by one leading U.S. maker, which fashions about 40 million ornaments a year from American-produced glass.

Most glass decorations today are manufactured by machine but a limited number are still made by hand.

Ghosts

Souls of dead persons may wander abroad on Christmas Eve. Or so it was believed in both Yugoslavia and Norway. A lighted candle placed in a window was thought to have power to keep ghosts outside a home and to light them on their way. Yule candles are still placed in cottage windows.

Back in July many companies produced and moved ornaments all over the country in preparation for the Big Holiday.

While the ornament business is not big in the United States when compared with other industries special care is taken in the delivery of decorations that will deck the spruces, firs, pines and boughs of holly this Christmas season.

Mirabile dictu, only 12 to 15 per cent of such decorations are made of plastic.

Because of the special care in the shipment of glass balls, less than 4,000 out of 200 million glass balls produced last year were broken. An excellent performance!

Glass ornaments, which are produced by only three

Christmas in the West in the 1850s

The famous landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted was visiting far from home, in Texas during the Christmas season in the early 1850s. Evidently his preconceived impressions of the wild West bore out. In his diary he noted that from his hotel window he could see the Christmas Eve celebration in San Augustine was noisy and boisterous. The town only had about 50 houses and 12 shops, but its citizens gathered into a band of serenaders who went about the small village beating on tin pans and being very boisterous. This was in sharp contrast to Olmsted's New England upbringing. Throughout Texas and the West, Christmas Day was often spent in wild turkey shoots, followed by a tremendous feast with the bird as featured fare.

Fruit cake Enjoyed by Old Romans

One of the most-favored delicacies of the holiday season is the Fruit-cake.

Many a loving homemaker will start months in advance and make the cake from an old family recipe, wrap it in a rum- or brandy-soaked cloth and store it until the Great Days come.

Most of us envision a dark red-brown cake so filled with fruit and nuts that it can hardly be cut... so aromatic with spirits that we could stand over it all day and 'drink in' its redolence.

However, the term "good fruitcake" has as many variations as the singers of its praises.

Such discrepancies arise, says an expert in bakers' matters, "because no one appears to have decided exactly what constitutes fruitcake." Not even a super-fussy Department of Agriculture of a certain state has attempted to define the delicacy.

It's not difficult to see why. Over the years, fruitcake has had as many recipes as eaters. To the ancient Romans, according to a well-known cookbook, it was Satura, a mixture of a well known barley mash, dried raisins, pine kernels and pomegranate seeds "laced with condiments and honeyed wine."

To Elizabeth of England it was spice cake, containing, according to a recipe of the time, "good ale barme... eight eggs with two yolks... aniseeds bruised... (and) a little rose water."

Most modern recipes appear to descend from the old Pennsylvania Dutch cake and British plum pudding cake. The latter was notable for its considerable brandy content, an ingredient missing from many commercial products.

Here is an appealing story that focuses on Man's old friend, the candle. Back in the Middle Ages, any light, no matter how fragile, was much prized, and a candle, though perhaps common to us, was a possession of great value.

A shoemaker lived in a cottage on the edge of a village, near the dark woods. Although a poor man, he placed his candle in the window each night to guide travelers. Despite wars, hardships and illness, by some miracle, his light never wavered.

This inspired the villagers and during the Christmas season most of them placed a candle in their windows. The custom grew and became universal.

And, yes, if you are wondering, the company's quality assurance staff not only measures the fruit content by weight, but has actually sat down to count all 400 blueberries!

There is a healthful bonus, too. Flour used in the crusts is enriched with vitamins and minerals as are all Kroger baked goods.


The company's pie-baking experts offer a couple of helpful hints also:

—Proper oven temperature is important. The best rule is to get a good oven thermometer and check the oven each time you plan to bake. (Many homemakers do not realize that oven temperatures can be 25 to 50 degrees

higher or lower than indicated by the thermostat.)

—For more even, golden crusts place pies on a dull cookie sheet rather than a shiny one. And place pies as near to the center of the oven as possible so that heat flows evenly around them.

—To keep fruit juices from bubbling over the side, insert several pieces of uncooked macaroni in the slits in the top of the pie crust. Juice will bubble through the macaroni straws rather than ooze over the side.

"We visited a friend who had a huge Christmas tree, and that widened their horizons," says a Jewish mother.



Why not "ham it up" once or twice during the holidays. For meal planning, pork and such related products as ham and bacon are in very large supply. You may have noticed the special merchandising emphasis many markets are putting on these good meats.

The reason is simple. Commercial pork production during October and November showed huge gains. Storage space is at a premium, so hams are getting an extra push as holiday menu features.

After you buy your ham, treat it properly. Do not put it in the freezer. The high concentration of salt in smoked meats reacts adversely with fat at freezing temperatures. This actually speeds up the process by which the fat in the meat becomes rancid.

Even if the ham you buy is labeled "fully cooked" rather than "cook before eating," you will probably want to heat it before serving to bring out the full flavor and set the decorative glaze.



Christmas Tree Had Early Origin

The decorated Christmas tree as we know it developed from the miracle plays of the Middle Ages. The plays originated as liturgical cantatas sung in Latin in churches with very slight dramatization. Scenery was held to a minimum. The Garden of Eden, for example, was designated by a fir tree hung with apples. This Paradise tree, as it was called, represented the Fall of Man, not the Nativity. As the miracle plays gained popularity, they became more elaborate, with more characters, more scenery, even the animals grew the limbs of a character — until their staging out-grew the limits of a church. Moved outdoors, the plays became increasingly secular until, about 1550, their performance was banned.

The tree of Eden, the Paradise tree, somehow survived in the public mind after its play was forbidden. It was set up in the house as an object lesson for children; the ever-green tree was an emblem of immortality, while the apples stood for sin. Round apples were hung on the tree to symbolize redemption. The strictly religious character of the Paradise tree gradually faded into pure decoration as apples were replaced by glittering ornaments, and plain wafers took on the shape of moon and stars, of men and animals.

The ornamental glitter from this basically religious origin has evolved into modern man's Christmas tree.

Snowmobilers Have Safety Precautions All Their Own

Persons taking part in the growing sport of snowmobiling this winter are reminded that snowmobilers have safety precautions all their own.

Dr. William Jackson of the District Health Department Number Two pointed out that most injuries reported have been attributed to improper operation.

He said that back injuries were most frequent, often being caused by a machine's bumping along on uneven ground or leaving the ground and returning with a sharp jolt. Doctor Jackson recommended that persons riding in snowmobiles under such circumstances rise with

knees flexed and support their weight on their feet.

Other injuries often reported have been sprains and broken bones. Some are caused by operators and riders being thrown from machines after hitting rocks, fence posts, tree stumps and earth mounds—both hidden and visible. Doctor Jackson explained that, even when obstructions can be seen, trying to stop a fast-moving snowmobile is sometimes difficult. He strongly suggested keeping speed down except on flat, open snowfields as a good way to avoid these dangers.


Legs and feet also may be injured, the doctor stated, when operators stick their feet out of moving snowmobiles to try to keep them from tipping on tight turns. Feet can then become caught in brush, stuck in snow drifts or strike hidden rocks or stumps.

Making gradual turns by leaning in the direction of a turn is recommended procedure, with arms and legs kept within the machine.

Doctor Jackson also pointed out that the treads which drive a snowmobile—two rubber belts 15 inches to 24 inches—can pick up and throw material while moving over ground, grassy areas and slush. He suggested that people not stand behind or beside snowmobiles as they begin moving.

In closing, Doctor Jackson stated that snowmobiles are not considered unsafe, adding, "It is a driver who best determines whether this exciting winter sport will be safe or hazardous for him and his passengers. Common sense and low-speed experience will go a long way toward making snowmobiling not only a safe, but an enjoyable pastime."
