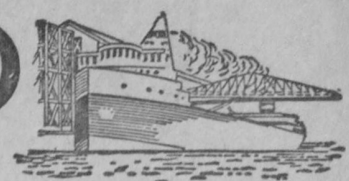

Would Regulate Rather Than Prohibit

Study New Snowmobile Ordinance

Tawas City Council, hearing both sides of a controversy concerning operation of snowmobiles in residential areas, is taking a new look at its present 1969 ordinance which prohibits operation of snowmobiles on city streets.

This action follows a discussion held December 21 at which more than 25 interested persons attended the council meeting.

That snowmobiles are "here to stay," that they have been a boon to the economy of Northern Michigan and that they will become even more popular in years to come was pointed out and then reiterated by a number of speakers at the meeting. Choosing a reasonable middle ground for municipal control of snowmobiles, to benefit the entire community, is the task of the city's elected officials.

Principal objection heard at the meeting was the high noise level of machines operating in residential areas. Ralph Ellsworth, Third Ward, and Irwin Ruppert, First Ward, along with several other persons, complained that operation

of machines at night interrupted their sleep, caused interference on their television screens, as well as causing a public nuisance when operators trespassed on private property.

One of the noise problems apparently stems from the fact that engines on some machines are not muffled as well as on others. Persons advocating more lenient laws governing snowmobiles pointed out that the operator had no control over the manufacturer's design of mufflers, although they admitted that some machines were "noisier" than others.

When it was stated that snowmobiles are no more noisy than lawnmowers or motorbikes, it was pointed out that snowmobiles are usually more concentrated in one area, they operate frequently at night and for longer periods of time.

In answer to the point raised that taxpayers had the right to peace and quiet in a residential neighborhood, Dale Wheatley pointed out that he, too, was a taxpayer and believed

that everyone would be benefited if snowmobiles were allowed to operate in the city and with reasonable control.

Considerable interest was shown in a proposed ordinance suggested two weeks ago by Police Chief George Westcott, who said that although he did not own a snowmobile, he probably was more directly involved with controlling machines because of his capacity as police chief than anyone else in the council room.

Westcott believes that the present ordinance prohibiting snowmo-

biles on city streets should be scrapped and that a new ordinance, patterned after one in use at Grayling, be adopted.

The proposed ordinance would specify certain streets on which snowmobiles could not be operated. This would include US-23 from the east city limit to the west city limit and on M-55 from US-23 to Fifth Avenue. All other streets would be open to snowmobiles, but regulated by the city. Operation of snowmobiles would be prohibited in the cemetery, city parks and on private property without con-

sideration of the property owner.

Operation of snowmobiles during the hours of 10:00 p. m. and 6:00 a. m. would be prohibited on city streets.

One of the most important aspects of the ordinance is that only persons with a valid motor vehicle operator's license would be allowed to operate a snowmobile on city streets. In addition, the owner of a snowmobile operated by a nonlicensed driver would be held responsible in case of a complaint or an accident. Under present state law, there is no age limit

for operation of a snowmobile on public highways and no provision is made for holding the owner responsible for machines operated by a minor.

To comply with the ordinance, snowmobiles would be required to have a muffler, brakes and lights, along with registration number. There would be a speed limit of 10 miles per hour, or less depending upon conditions, for operation on city streets. All traffic laws would apply to snowmobiles, although wheeled vehicles would have the right of way on streets.

Formal action is to be taken on the new ordinance January 4.

Gunman Held on Felony Charges

Christmas Eve was turned into a 30-minute nightmare for a family of eight when they were kidnapped at gunpoint and their car stolen after stopping to aid a motorist whose car was stalled on Wilber Road north of Tawas City.

Held under felony charges of kidnapping, armed robbery and car theft is Walter W. Graham, 32, Troy, who was arrested in the family's station wagon less than an hour later.

Graham is being held under \$25,000 bond at Iosco County Jail following his arraignment before Dist. Judge J. Richard Ernst. District court examination has been set for Tuesday, January 5, 3:00 p. m.

In addition, local authorities said Graham is wanted at Troy for auto theft at gunpoint. The auto which he had been driving and was stalled on Wilber Road was reportedly stolen in Oakland County.

Maj. Frederick G. Gibout of Wurtsmith Air Force Base; his wife, Joyce, and their six children had driven to the Tawas on Christmas Eve to see the holiday lights. Returning home by way of Wilber Road, the children were singing carols in the back seat of their station wagon when Gibout was flagged down by Graham at the corner of Wilber Road and Timreck Road.

Gibout stopped to offer assistance to the motorist, whose automobile had two wheels in the ditch. In the spirit of the season, the major offered to drive the stranded motorist to Miner's Grove for assistance.

The man pulled a revolver on the family as he got into the car and ordered Gibout to "drive." Gibout told officers he attempted to "talk the man out of it," but continued on when the man pointed the gun in a threatening manner.

The gunman ordered Gibout to turn around at Miner's Grove and head back toward Tawas City. Turning onto M-55, the gunman ordered Gibout to turn west on US-23. Reaching the corner of First Street, the gunman then told Gibout to stop the car and for everyone to get out. He ordered both Gibout and his wife to leave their wallet and purse on the car seat.

The Gibouts walked one block east to the residence of Olaf Rose at the corner of Wheeler Street and US-23, where the Iosco Sheriff's Department was notified.

Mrs. Gibout said she felt no regret over the family decision to stop and aid the disabled motorist—"you know how it is with Christmas, you feel that you have to help your fellow man."

Tody Says Fishery Must be Managed

The opportunity remains for a commercial fishery on the Great Lakes, but that fishery must be controlled and managed so that it supports rather than disrupts management concepts.

So stated Wayne H. Tody, chief of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' division of fisheries, in a recent letter to State Sen. Robert Richardson.

Senator Richardson recently sent a communication to the fish division head following a resolution from the Iosco Board of Commissioners, which urged a review of

the state's zone management plan and urged a lessening of controls on the commercial fishery.

In Tody's letter to Richardson, forwarded this week to the Herald, the fish division chief reiterated five points of consideration:

1. Throughout the history of Michigan, prior to 1970 regulations, the number of commercial fishermen has not been limited.

2. That during this era, extensive over exploitation has occurred as a result of uncontrolled commercial fishery and many

Three-Year Project Completed

Old Car Restoration Preserves Rail History

Work has been completed on the restoration of an old combination baggage car-coach owned by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company. It is now a unique showplace museum which houses many

rare items of historical significance to the railroad and the area it serves.

This project was started about three years ago when Charles A. Pinkerton Jr., chairman of the

D&M's board of directors and an avid historical buff, got tired of looking at several old railroad cars which had been retired from the railroad's work train.

One of the cars, painted an ugly

faded red and rapidly deteriorating with age, was standing on a siding near the railroad shop in Tawas City. Wondering to himself if this old car might be made to look a little more presentable, he sent a memo through channels to see what could be done.

Pinkerton never realized it at the time, but preservation and restoration of that old car turned into a monumental job. After peeling off countless layers of red paint on the exterior and a thick coating of paint on the interior, workmen found that the car was a real beauty—but restoration would require a lot more work than originally intended.

The board chairman gave the go ahead on a complete restoration job and work was commenced. Woodwork missing or rotted on the exterior was replaced with cypress and the oak interior was completely refinished. Missing boards were replaced as were some sections of the ceiling, which had rotted away because of a leaky roof.

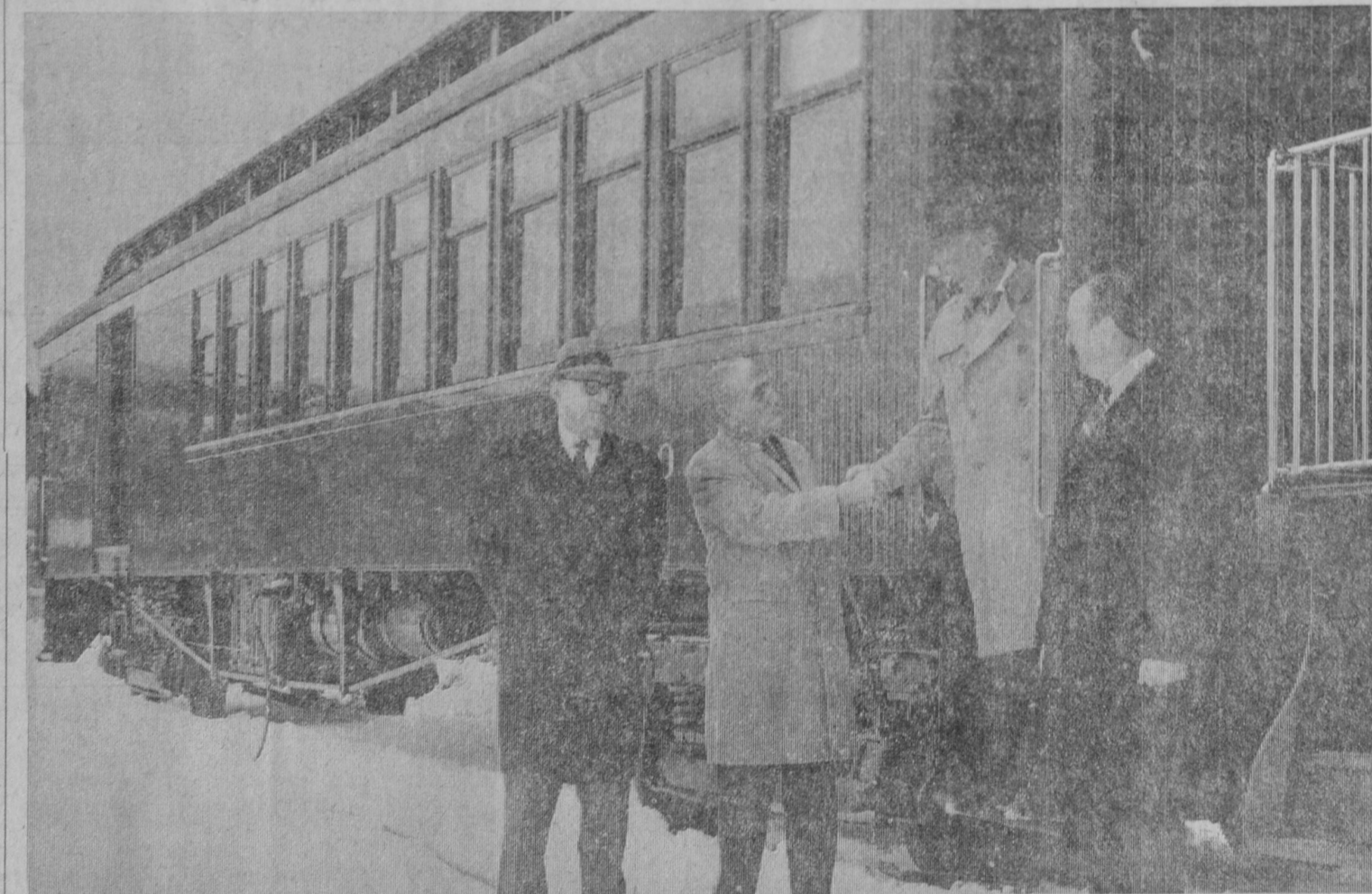
Interior work on the car has been the responsibility of Larry Leslie, who has restored woodwork to its original gleaming varnish.

Then began the job of refurbishing the interior. A search was made throughout the state for seats and kerosene lights to replace those which had been removed many years ago. Suitable replacements were found and restored to original condition. Hanging lamps similar to those which were once in the car were purchased, buffed to a high brass finish and installed. Red carpeting and drapes were installed to complete the job.

The baggage section of the car now houses an ancient roltop desk from one of the D&M's old stations. (See OLD CAR, page 2.)

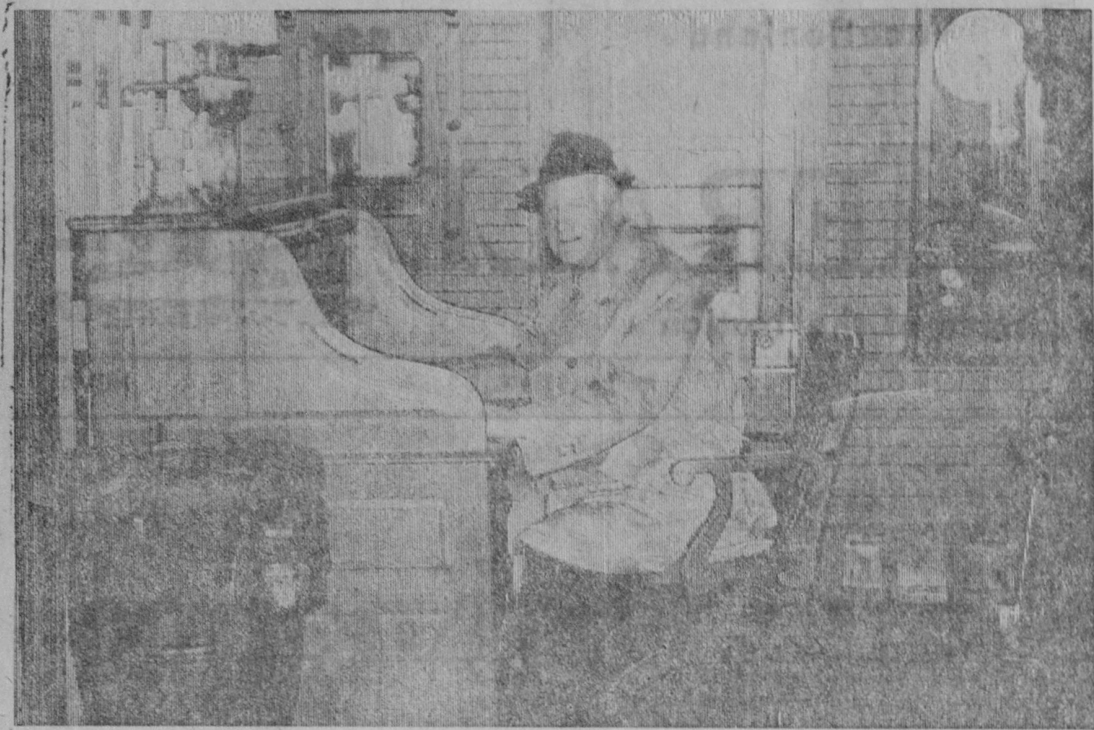

tions, along with an operating time-clock, old switch lanterns, signal flags, signs, records, pictures and other items from the days of steam.

The old car's exterior has been repainted in its original olive green color and relettered in gold—complete with the famous turtle herald which once decorated D&M cars prior to 1920.

The old car is presently stored in the railroad shop building and its "unveiling" was held two weeks ago for members of the board of directors.

The hundreds of hours of work and planning which went into the restoration of this car will never mean a profit to the railroad—just the opposite—but it does mean that a bit of the heritage of the railroad and Northeastern Michigan has been preserved.

In another section of the shop building, an ancient steam locomotive purchased by the railroad two years ago is undergoing restoration.

species of fish are now extinct or in a state of near extinction.

3. Because various fish stocks are in distress, they cannot stand additional pressure of more fishermen.

4. The present regulations have been developed as the result of a comprehensive and critical review of fish stocks and regulations needed to instigate a rehabilitation program.

5. Commercial fishing interests are no longer the sole consideration in Great Lakes waters and the DNR now has the responsibility to reflect sports fishing interests in the total fishery management program.

"In order to be sure that our total management concept continues in the proper perspective of public commitment, we are continually reviewing our program as new data is obtained," said Tody.

"Our present position is that today's commercial fishery still is far too extensive for the available fish stocks."

Tody said Lake Huron chubs, for all practical purposes, are gone. "The remaining Lake Huron yellow perch population in Saginaw Bay is in trouble and all data indicates the need for increased restrictions. We, therefore, can find no feasible justification to consider an expanded commercial fishery," said Tody.

The DNR's plan to restrict commercial fishing on Saginaw Bay has received full support of the Tawas City Council, Tawas City Businessmen's Association and Iosco Sportsmen's Club, which sent supporting resolutions during the past year to the DNR Commission.

"Truly, the community interest behind this effort has been staggering and heartwarming," states Mrs. Louis Pfeiffer, president of the music booster organization. "An undertaking we were told would take from 1½ to two years is nearly complete in two months."

Mrs. Pfeiffer said this could not have been done without a great number of people donating not only their funds, but their kindness, time and effort.

First of all, 44 men and women worked on the community birthday calendar this year and did a great job—the best ever. Total calendars sold was 855 and the net profit on this project alone was \$1,600. The music boosters purchased a Strobocoan electronic tuner for the music department. This device will tune any musical instrument and is invaluable to any music department. The remaining profit went toward new uniforms.

So started a campaign with a goal of \$11,000.

The second project was the new subscription ad from The Tawas Herald. This included a direct donation coupon from which, to date, the fund has received \$208 and donations are still coming in. Notes and letters were received from all over the state, which proved to be very touching.

From this point on, various other projects, too numerous to mention individually at this time, were started.

One particularly interesting project was "The Goody Corner" at Harbor Lights Restaurant. This project has run continually throughout the campaign and is still in action. The restaurant owners put one table aside and placed on it a large piggy bank. Posters labeled the establishment a "music booster locale." Baked goods were donated by band parents, friends and the owners. Anyone who came in for coffee or lunch could have "free goodies" or donate any amount desired to the uniform fund—the piggy bank is gaining weight every day.

Another interesting project was an evening at Coyle's Restaurant.

Mrs. Coyle donated all the food and employees donated all the help. Total receipts for the evening went to the uniform fund.

"Aside from both of these projects being very successful, the most interesting thing they have in common is the fact that they not only brought old friends together again, but new friends as well. All of which adds new meaning to our campaign," said Mrs. Pfeiffer.

All in all, the various projects, both large and small, were most successful.

Then, Tawas Area Board of Education combined its efforts and found it possible to contribute one-half of the total cost of the uniforms.

It was well publicized that anyone wishing to donate the price of one complete uniform (\$131) was entitled to have his name embossed on the inside of the jacket, plus being able to choose the band student he wished to wear it.

Sixteen pledges have not been fulfilled as yet, but donors have promised to do so within 30 days.

The organization is getting close to its goal, although there is much work yet to be done. For instance, there is quite a sum outstanding on the calendars. This project is generally taken care of by the end of January. All canisters are still in circulation. These are distributed throughout the area and these, too, will be gathered by the end of January.

"While it would be almost impossible to mention everyone responsible for the success of this campaign, I would like to take this time to especially thank the radio station and both local newspapers for all the wonderful publicity," said Mrs. Pfeiffer.

She said that it is hoped the organization will reach its goal of \$11,000. One more month of response like the past two should put the fund over the top.

Mrs. Pfeiffer said that band students had given up their gift exchange this year and donated this money for the uniforms. The three bands gave \$170.

"I personally believe our band kids deserve the best and, with a community behind them like we

have, they shall have it," said Mrs. Pfeiffer. "Parents and interested citizens of Tawas Area, I salute you."

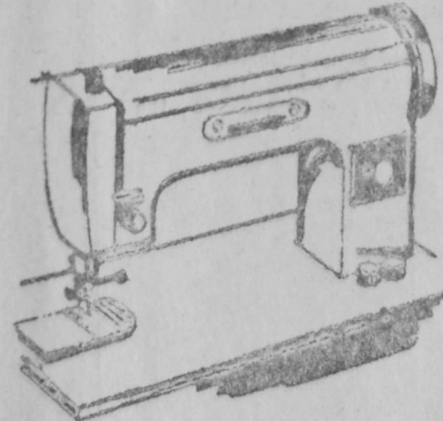

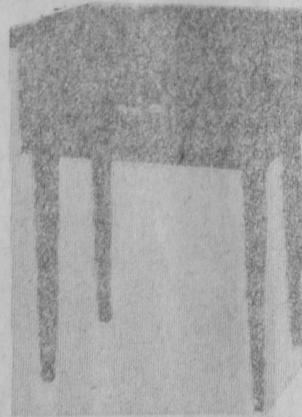

Question: My husband and I have been receiving a single monthly check with both our names on it. He died before endorsing the check. What must I do with the check?

Answer: You can return the check to be re-issued in your name. If you have an immediate need for the money, visit your so-

cial security office and a representative will stamp the check so you can cash it without your husband's signature.

Question: I am a widow with four young children. I expected my social security benefits to stop when I went to work full time. But I still get the same amount every month. Why?

Answer: With four young children, your family is still entitled to the maximum benefit amount based on your husband's earnings. Families with three or more survivors entitled to monthly benefits usually get this maximum. Since your four children continue to collect social security, your family keeps getting the same amount—the family maximum—whether you work or not. Stopping your check and increasing the amount paid to each of your children could cause an interruption in your payments. For this reason, and to save administrative costs, the checks continue in your name.

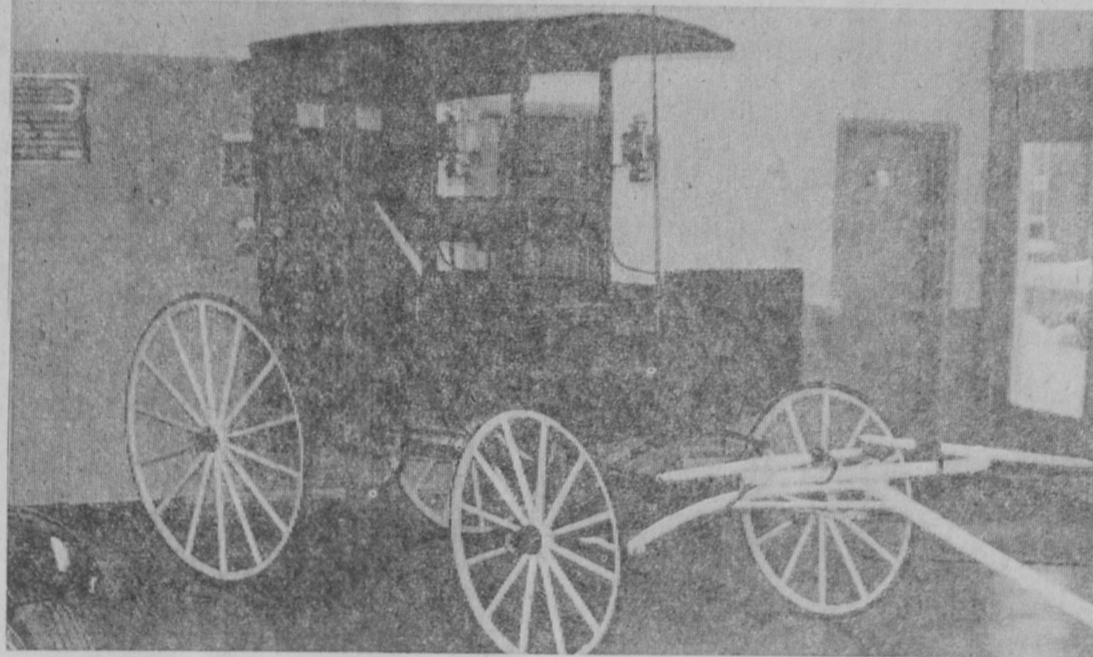
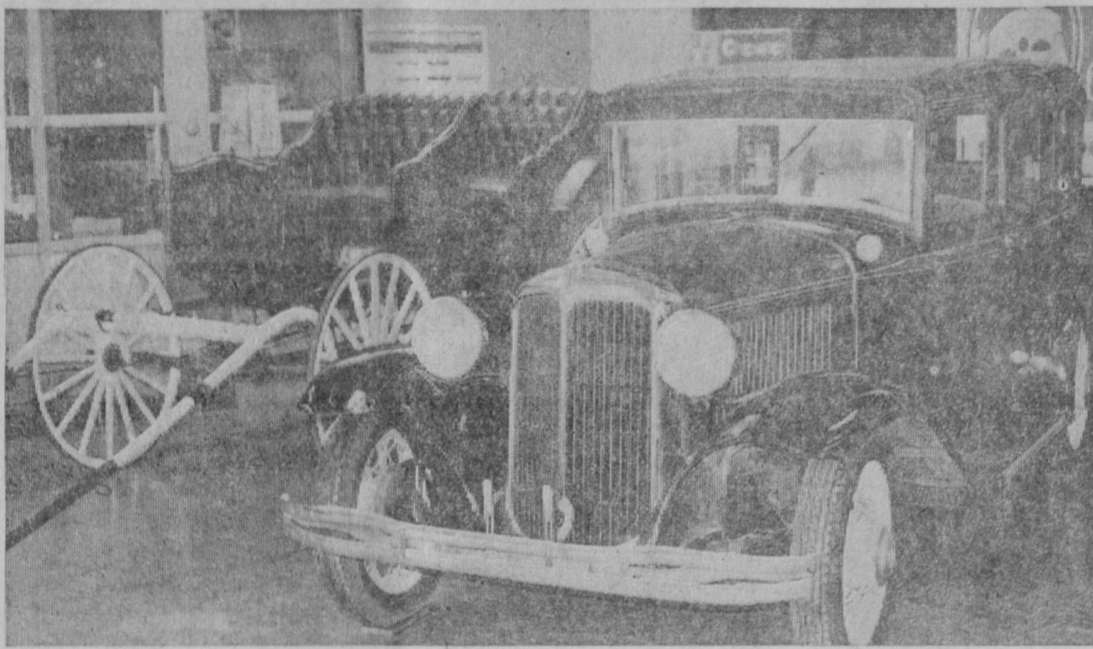

January 7—Capping a phenomenal decade of new construction, East Tawas' building applications totaled \$523,073 during 1969. Some 28 new homes were constructed there during the past 12 months. Plans for proposed modernization and expansion of Tawas City's sanitary sewer disposal system are now being studied by the Michigan Department of Health. Arthur J. Aulerich succeeded Henry M. Conley as chairman of the Iosco County Road Commission.

January 14—Albert H. Buch observed his 25th anniversary as Iosco County register of deeds. Tawas Area Board of Education authorized the hiring of a professional firm to act as contract negotiator with Tawas Area Education Association. Residents of Tawas Area School District are invited to attend a special meeting to discuss possible incorporation of split sessions into the school day as a means of solving the problem of overcrowded classrooms.

January 21—Tawas City Council is to proceed with the necessary steps to purchase property at the west end of the city park for expansion purposes. NASSCO Marine Salvage Company has established its headquarters north of East Tawas. Paul P. Chevris, president of Tawas Plating Company, was elected to the board of directors of Peoples State Bank. Parents of Tawas Area School District apparently would prefer an alternate solution to overcome the problem of overcrowded classrooms, rather than to utilize a split day plan under discussion.

January 28—Oscoda residents have voiced objections to the proposed temporary bridge which is to be used while a new US-23 bridge is under construction over the AuSable River. Tawas Area Board of Education authorized rental of one classroom at Immaculate Heart of Mary School and hiring one additional elementary teacher for a new section of fourth grade. Miss Clara Bolen, veteran school administrator with more than 45 years devoted to the teaching profession, was named Tawas Area Citizen of the year.

February 4, 1970—A ruptured, six-inch water main crossing the Tawas River at the US-23 bridge has resulted in reduced water pressure for Tawas City's southwestern section. Adjusted real estate valuations, based on a 1968-69 sales study conducted by the county tax equalization department, has increased the timber cutover classification valuation by \$1,282,830 and the residential classification by \$3,450,230. A five-man snowmobile team from Tawas established a new speed record over the Michigan Riding and Hiking Trail. East Tawas Council decided against purchase of election machines.

February 11—The number of 8:00 a. m. classes has been increased at Tawas Area High School as a means of coping with the

problem of overcrowded classrooms. Kenneth J. Myles has been named to the board of trustees at Tawas Hospital. Formation of the National Electronic Transmission Service, East Tawas, to provide general data processing service using microwave relay transmission, the first such system in the country, is announced. The era of the Holland Hotel as a famous Northeastern Michigan hostelry is no longer, but the 78-year-old building has a new lease on life as the Holland House.

February 25—An 11-year-old elementary student was crushed to death under the right rear wheels of a school bus Tuesday morning in an unloading zone at Tawas Area High School. Perchville USA went down on record as one of the most successful in history. A new law has completely eliminated the property value ceiling and has raised the income limitation from \$5,000 to \$6,000 on senior citizen homestead property tax exemptions.

March 4—An advisory vote concerning possible revision and modernization of the city charter will be placed before Tawas City voters at the August state primary election. Twenty-four teenagers from Northeastern Michigan schools participated in a pilot program for hundreds of other youths, who will be taking part in the 1970 summer youth encampment program at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Carrollton Cavaliers won the Northern B Conference basketball championship.

March 11—Harry L. Colton and his daughter, Theresa, died at Tawas Hospital as the result of a fire which damaged the Colton home at East Tawas. Phyllis Isabelle Colegrove waived examination when arraigned in district court on a charge of second degree murder. Hale Area Eagles won the class D district tournament at AuGres.

March 18—Operation of a salmon trapping weir on the Tawas River this fall may hinge on 1970 finances of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Richard Matthews is the new officer in charge of the Hale post office. Col. Eugene L. Hudson has been named as the new commander of the 40th Air Division at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

March 25—Action on proposed expansion of the Iosco County Airport has been tabled by the county board of commissioners. An operational budget calling for an expenditure of \$1,131,619, \$55,935 higher than last year, was adopted by Tawas Area Board of Education. Consumers Power Company's office building in Tawas City was damaged when a runaway car smashed through a concrete wall. Wendell Wyatt and Brian Krantz are honor graduates at Hale Area School.

April 1—State fish biologists warn that Lake Huron's yellow perch population, centered in Lower Saginaw Bay, is facing extinction due to over exploitation by commercial operators. Darwin L. Minard of Whitney Township died at Standish Community Hospital of an accidental gunshot wound in the stomach. Today is census day for the United States of America.

April 8—John St. James is the new mayor of Tawas City, succeeding Russell A. Rollin Sr. Charles Lightfoot has been appointed to fill the USDA Soil Conservation Service's district conservationist position. Tawas City Council has joined the Iosco Sportsmen's Club and Tawas City Businessmen's Association in adopting resolutions urging the Michigan Department of Natural Resources Commission to approve recommendations of DNR biologists concerning elimination of gill net fishing for perch on Saginaw Bay.

April 15—A 6.54 percent increase in Iosco's tax base for 1970 is expected to be adopted this week. Recommendations of DNR biologists concerning elimination of gill net fishing for perch in Lower Saginaw Bay were not adopted by the DNR commission. Theodore "Ted" Guthard, former defensive coach at Wake Forest University, has been hired as head football coach at Tawas Area High School.

April 22—Ground was broken at the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation's park for a new building to house Starboard Industries, Incorporated. Charles D. Groff and David Anshutz are honor graduates at Tawas Area High School. Thomas F. Pinkowski was named president of Tawas Area Education Association. Tawas City Council adopted an \$18,500 street program for the coming year.

April 29—The old Bay Theatre building in Tawas City is being razed for new parking facilities on Lake Street. Tawas Area Senior Band received a first division rating in the state festival. Smelt fishing proved to be a big attraction with thousands of fishermen crowding the Whitney Drain, Tawas River and other area streams.

May 6—Board of directors of the Michigan Soil Conservation Service gave its approval to conduct a study of the AuGres water shed to determine means of controlling flooding conditions. Young people at Sand Lake, the Tawas and Whittemore conducted "earth day" cleanup programs along area highways. First competitive bike riding meet was held at the old bombing range north of Oscoda.

May 13—Two highway crashes, only one day apart, claimed the lives of two persons. Thomas Dillon, a volunteer fireman at East Tawas, received fatal injuries when a tank truck overturned. Mrs. Edith Prescott received fatal injuries in a car-truck crash. Tawas Area Board of Education authorized hiring of an assistant band director.

May 20—Four persons were killed and one critically injured in a two-car crash on M-65, about 2½ miles north of the M-65-M-55 intersection. Tawas City Cemetery Board is seeking a new name for the cemetery. A report states that mercury contamination of fish is apparently nothing for Saginaw Bay fishermen to worry about. Van Miller was awarded the 1970 John Philip Sousa plaque Saturday night at Tawas Area High School.

May 27—Controversy over hiring a new county park director by the Iosco Parks Commission was heard during the May session of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. Bruce Wilson of Hale received his eagle scout badge in ceremonies at Plainfield Township Hall. Authorization to seek financing for a new track and purchase of a new bleachers for the football field by means of a revenue bond issue was authorized by Tawas Area Board of Education.

June 3—A span over the Tawas River may be called the "East Tawas bridge" but who owns it? The City of East Tawas disclaims any title, as does the Iosco County Road Commission. Cooperation by a number of garages and service stations in removing unsightly junked automobiles from public view was noted by the Tawas City Council. Delivery of the first segment of NCR 200 computers to

headquarters of the National Electronic Transmission Service at East Tawas proved to be a traffic stopper.

June 10—The gap is narrowing junior and senior high school... slightly, but Hale Area School in one of the hottest school elections in history. Oscoda Area voters again turned down a bonding proposition to build a new (See REVIEW, page 2.)

School voters turned down two millage propositions. Mrs. Austin A. McGuire, Mrs. Clyde Evril and Fred Hickman have retired as teachers at Tawas City Elementary Unit. American House, Incorporated, has selected East Tawas for the site of a planned residential cooperative.

June 17—The Bay City team of Jack Kolka and John Baker won the Tawas River canoe race. A traffic survey is to be conducted at the US-23-M-55 intersection to determine advisability of installing a stop-go traffic signal. Registration starts for Red Cross swimming classes at Sand Lake. A flock of eight Canadian geese made a rest stop in Tawas City.

June 24—A request for authorization to pay hospitalization and medical premiums of members of the Iosco Road Commission was denied by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. Appropriation of \$1,100,000 for a new harbor at the mouth of the AuGres River has been approved by Congress. Treatment of the AuSable River for lamprey control was announced by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

July 1—National Gypsum Company has been directed to remove its dam from the East Branch of the AuGres River south of National City by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. One of the largest contingents of horses and riders ever to cross the Northern Michigan Riding and Hiking Trail arrived at the Tawas City Park. Robert Dust, Tawas Bay Yacht Club, sailing in his class "Duster," was over-all winner based on handicap in the fifth annual Tawas Bay Memorial Race.

July 8—Louis Zanner announces he will construct a new manufacturing plant in Tawas City's industrial park. Due to a conflict with the state pollution act, all burning permits issued under Tawas City's fire zone ordinance of 1965 have been invalidated and revoked by the city council. Approval of a \$145,000 grant from the state for expansion of facilities at the AuSable Park was announced by the county parks and recreation commission. Tawas Area Education Association has requested professional negotiation assistance from Michigan Education Association.

July 15—A week-long program marking the centennial of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church has opened. A mediation session has been scheduled between the Tawas Area Board of Education and Tawas Area Education Association. Robert W. Elliott was named president of Tawas Area Board of Education.

July 22—Councils of Tawas City and East Tawas are asking residents who may not have been

counted in the recent federal census to contact city halls immediately. Both cities face a loss in revenue from the state because of decreases in population. State sales tax rebates and income tax returns are based on population. 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Snowmobile Trails in National Forest Now Open to Public

The United States Forest Service has announced that its snowmobile trails are now open for use by the public. In making the announcement, Forest Supervisor John von Bargen stated that seven trails with a total of over 100 miles in length are open. The longest marked trail is the Caberfae Way Snowmobile Trail, 36 miles long, located near the Caberfae Ski Area. The Ward Hills Trail near Baldwin is 24 miles in length and the 25-mile long Udel Hills Trail has its jumping off point four miles west of Wellston on Highway M-55. The Silver Creek and Gordon Creek Trails on the Tawas District are eight and 13 miles in length, respectively. The forest supervisor noted that the trails on the Huron-Manistee National Forests were designed to take the user to points of interest

and to various forest activities within the forest. The following suggestions were offered by von Bargen to insure a safe and pleasant snowmobile trip: Be in good physical shape for walking. Carry an emergency repair kit. Do not go alone, especially on long trips. Wear proper clothing for prevailing weather—carry extras. Check the weather forecast before going. Carry a map and compass. Stay on marked trails. Carry a survival kit. Map and further information for each trail can be obtained from the Forest Supervisor's Office, Cadillac, or United States Forest Service Ranger's Office in Manistee, Cadillac, Baldwin, White Cloud or East Tawas.

Additional Veterans Eligible for GI Bill

Many veterans who served in the armed forces between January 31, 1955, and March 3, 1966, may not realize they are eligible for educational benefits under the GI Bill, it was pointed out today.

Robert M. Fitzgerald, director of the Detroit Regional Office of the Veterans Administration, noted that the current GI Bill was not enacted until March 3, 1966. However, he explained, the law's provisions cover veterans who served after January 31, 1955, as well as those who have served since the law was passed.

many may not be aware of the change," Fitzgerald explained.

"To be eligible for educational benefits," Fitzgerald said, "these veterans must have been released under other than dishonorable conditions after more than 180 days of active military duty, any part of it after January 31, 1955."

Fitzgerald pointed out that there were exceptions on the length of service, as a veteran released for a service-connected disability is eligible for the benefits regardless of the actual time served.

Fitzgerald also expressed concern that an undetermined number of wives and widows of deceased veterans or veterans totally disabled by service-connected injuries may be missing out on educational benefits.

He noted a law passed in 1956 extended educational assistance to children of such veterans as far back to the Spanish American War. "Wives and widows did not become eligible until the law was amended in December 1968, and
