

# Plan Open House Saturday for NETS Computer

National Electronic Transmission Service, Incorporated, located on the third floor of the Holland House, East Tawas, is holding an open house for the public on Saturday, December 12, from 12 o'clock noon until 5:00 p. m. In order to aid in controlling visitors allowed in the computer

room at any one time and to insure that everyone will be able to view the computer in operation, a visiting hour schedule has been developed according to the alphabetical listing of last names as follows: A-C, 12 o'clock noon; D-H, 1:00 p. m.; I-M, 2:00 p. m.; N-S, 3:00 p. m.; T-Z, 4:00 p. m.

"If the time as indicated is not convenient, please feel free to come at any time during the open house," states Gordon Collins, vice president and general manager. National Electronic Transmission Service (NETS), Incorporated, established a microwave communi-

cations data processing network here earlier this year which is designed to provide on-line computer services to independent banks. The network consists of powerful NCR Century 200 computers installed at its central processing location at East Tawas and linked via microwave to terminal devices in individual banks. In addition to highly sophisticated, multiprogramming, mass random storage and access capabilities provided by the Century 200 computers, the key to the successful operation of the system is the use of microwave instead of telephone communications, along with installation of the recently introduced NCR 720 remote banks system as the terminal device in member banks.

Other officers of NETS, besides Collins, are Bruce C. Freel, president, a leader in the microwave field and president of National Cablecasting, Incorporated; Michael N. Freel, secretary-treasurer. The firm presently employs 10 persons with Richard Nagel as marketing representative and John E. Butler as data processing manager.

Collins said Friday that the firm was presently conducting negotiations with other banks in North-eastern Michigan to provide services similar to those being provided to Peoples State Bank.

NETS currently is processing checking accounts for the East Tawas bank. This includes storing information, recording deposits and withdrawals, compiling monthly statements, giving daily reports on status of checking accounts.

Eventually, NETS will handle savings accounts for Peoples State Bank and its general ledger bookwork.

The East Tawas data processing location is designed to serve Lower Michigan which is included in Federal Reserve District No. 7. Over-all plans call for the eventual establishment of 12 regional centers serving each of the 12 federal reserve districts in the country.

## City Signs New Garbage Pact

A new contract between James Quarters and the City of Tawas City for furnishing garbage and refuse collection was adopted Monday night by the city council. Compensation for this service under the one-year contract will be \$7,680, payable twice monthly, commencing December 1. The agreement requires the contractor to provide public liability insurance, along with property damage and vehicle insurance.

Alderman Frank Ahonen, chairman of the committee which met with Quarters, said the compensation for this service was the same as that paid during the current year.

In other business, minutes of the water and sewer department revealed that the Department of Public Works was to purchase Christmas turkeys for all

salaries and hourly employees of the city.

A hearing has been scheduled Wednesday, January 13, 7:00 p. m., at the city hall on proposed water safety regulations for the Tawas River. The hearing is being conducted by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

A report from the DNR stated that a fence weir placed across the mouth of Dead Creek had been removed over the Thanksgiving week-end.

A hearing is to be held Monday, January 4, 7:30 p. m., on rezoning Lots 1 and 2 and the south one-half of Lots 9 and 10. Block 10, owned by Tawas Hospital, from residential A to residential C, multiple family residential district. This is the same designation as the present hospital zone. The additional property would be used for a parking lot.

The mayor's appointment of Robert N. Rollin to fill a vacancy on the planning commission was approved by the council. He replaces Hugo J. Keiser, who resigned to serve on the charter commission.

Acting on recommendation of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association last spring, the department of public works was directed to use the industrial park as a site for dumping snow removed from city streets. The city park had been used for this purpose for many years, but objections have been heard due to possible contamination by salt and debris from the streets. The location change will result in a longer haul for city trucks and dumping of snow on the industrial site may cause a water problem in the spring. The city superintendent is to use his own judgment as to the amount of salt used for ice removal on city streets, but reduction in the amount of salt has been recommended as a possible means of lessening pollution.

An ordinance regulating the use of snowmobiles in the city was taken under advisement by the council. At the present time, city ordinance prohibits use of snowmobiles on city streets.

George Westcott, chief of police, presented a sample ordinance from the City of Grayling which designates streets upon which snowmobiles are prohibited, areas in which snowmobiles are allowed to operate. The ordinance provides that all operators have a state drivers license.

Chief Westcott believed that permitting some uses would be easier to handle than the present prohibition of snowmobiles.

### Slate Finance Meeting

## Equipment Fund Tabled by Council

A resolution to establish a sinking fund for equipment replacement, financed by a two-mill increase in city taxes, was tabled Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

The resolution was introduced by Jack Lardie, Second Ward alderman, who presented a complete inventory of all equipment owned by the city, along with a replacement schedule and estimated costs.

Lardie pointed out that the city presently does not have a replacement schedule for its equipment and that one was needed in order for the council to keep abreast of its future financial needs.

Other members of the council agreed that such a schedule was necessary, but believed that designation to two mills to finance the program was premature at this time. It was pointed out that the council is to meet as a committee of the whole next Monday night to study city finances and to begin budget planning for the next fiscal year.

A number of items have been added to city expenses during the past several years which will require increasing the city budget in 1971, including property purchases, park expansion, outstanding notes for equipment purchases and salary increases.

Before a vote was taken on Lardie's resolution, Alderman Martin Wellna, finance committee chairman, offered a tabling resolution, stating that the equipment replacement program could again be brought up at any time before the council, but not before next week's special meeting on finances. The tabling resolution ended in a three to three tie with Aldermen Howard Hatton, Cecil Cable and Wellna voting "yes" and Aldermen Lardie, Clark Tanner and Frank Ahonen voting "no." The tie was broken by Mayor John St. James' "yes" vote.

Among items suggested for replacement on the inventory presented by Lardie was the old 1938 fire truck which presently is used as a tanker. Replacing this unit with a fire truck would cost approximately \$25,000. Some members of the council believe that the unit should be replaced with a tanker truck, which would lower the cost considerably.

It was also pointed out that the tanker is used primarily for fires in Alabaster and Tawas Townships,

which receive fire protection under an agreement with the city. The council's fire department committee is to review the present fire agreement with these two townships, which was originally adopted in the early 1960s.

The fire department presently has a 1961 fire truck and a 1949 unit. The department has suggested purchasing a new fire truck and converting the 1949 unit into a tanker.

Other replacement suggestions on Lardie's inventory included a new dump truck and police cruiser in 1971, immediate replacement of a pickup and an air compressor and replacement of the tractor and front end loader in two years.

## Band Uniform Fund Received \$450 Boost

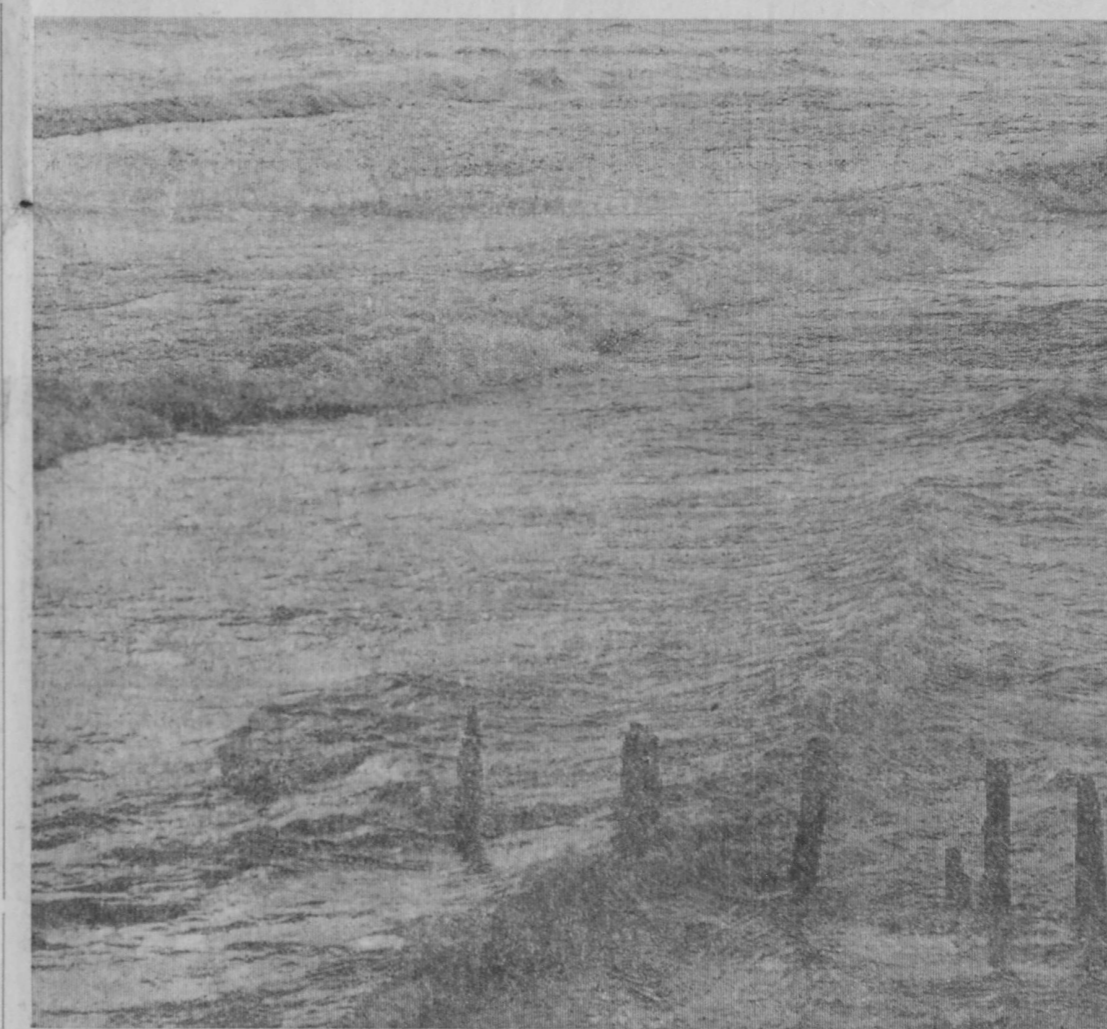

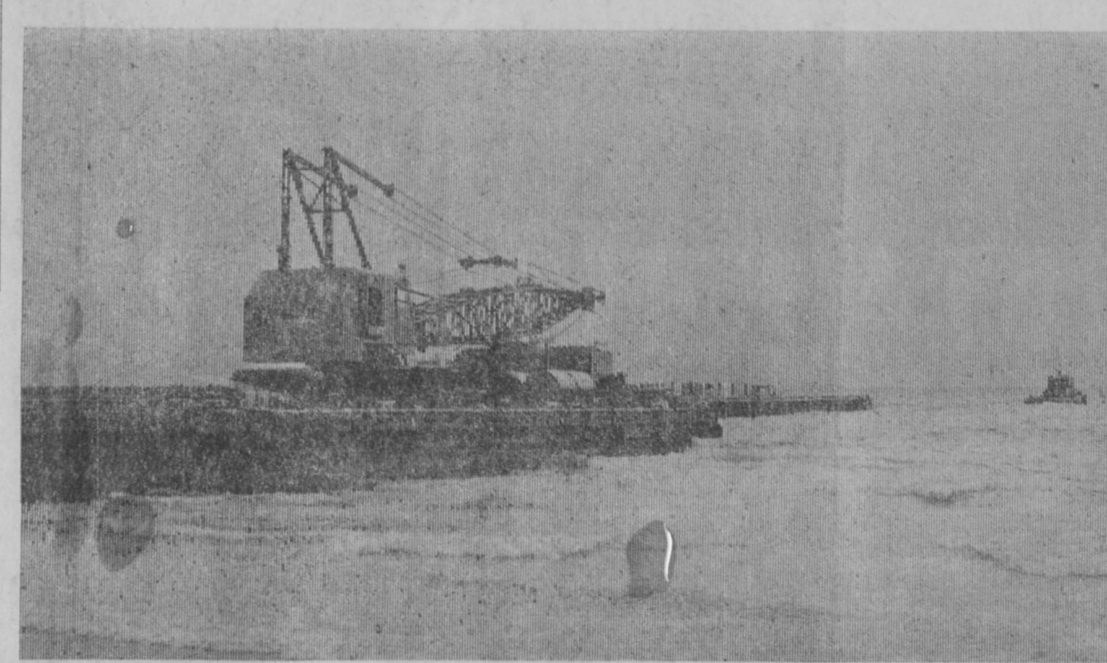
The fund-raising bake sale will be held Saturday, December 12, from 10:00 to 3:00 p. m., at Colton's Sears Store, East Tawas.



### Stormy Weather

CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE to lakefront property north of East Tawas and below Tawas City was caused last week by a heavy northeast wind, which whipped up 10-foot waves and sent them crashing into the outer tip of Tawas Point (top picture). Tawas Bay was relatively calm as compared to Lake Huron and Lower Saginaw Bay, where breakwalls crumbled under the heavy pressure from waves. Friday night, a dredge owned

by Capital Dredge Company of Lorraine, Ohio, came loose from its mooring in Tawas Bay and was nearly washed up on shore near the Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas. A tugboat crew worked several hours to get the huge barge off the lake bottom, bottom picture. ## December 31 Deadline for City Petitions

Deadline for filing nominating petitions for the February 15 primary election to name city officers in Tawas City and East Tawas is Thursday, December 31, 4:00 p. m., according to city clerks of the two communities.

Three aldermen, along with mayor, clerk and treasurer are to be nominated in each city. In addition, Tawas City still elects three supervisors who act as assessors.

In Tawas City, two-year terms of Aldermen Clark Tanner, Jack Lardie and Cecil Cable expire next spring. At East Tawas, terms of Aldermen Charles Schreck, R. E. McElheron and Richard Moss expire at the end of their current two-year terms.

Others presently holding office in Tawas City include John St. James, mayor; Walter Nelson, clerk; Mrs. Mary Byrd, treasurer; Ben Brewer, First Ward supervisor; Horace Hilbert, Second Ward supervisor; Donald Watson, Third Ward supervisor.

Current officers at East Tawas include James Campbell, mayor; Fred B. Lomas, clerk; Mrs. Grace Pelton, treasurer.

Candidates in Tawas City file nominating petitions according to party preference while the election at East Tawas is conducted on a nonpartisan basis.

Nominating petitions are available at city halls in each community.

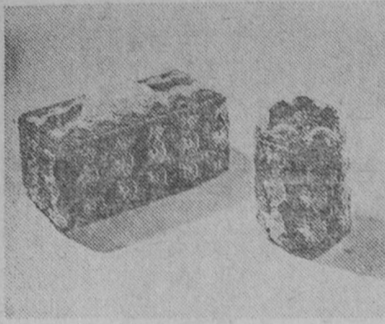

## Gourmet Chicken From Freezer To Table

Don't bother to thaw those chickens you've stashed away in your freezer before roasting them! According to the National Broiler Council, broilers-fryers can be taken from the freezer rock-hard, partially unwrapped and put into a preheated oven for easy cooking and moist delicious results. You're sure to have a supply of these inexpensive, abundant birds in the freezer now, so to serve them, skip the thawing, and put them right from the freezer into the oven.

Just be sure to prepare them oven-ready, wrapping them in Heavy Duty Reynolds Wrap before putting them into the freezer. First, remove the neck and giblets and wrap separately. Then tie legs of chicken together, then to tail. Hook the wing tips behind the back to hold the neck skin and pad sharp bone ends up on a sheet of heavy duty foil and bring long ends up over chicken. **Roast Chicken**  
With Wine And Herbs  
1 foil-wrapped broiler-fryer chicken  
1/2 cup sherry  
Salt, pepper



Mixed herbs (tarragon, marjoram, basil)  
Chicken broth  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 egg yolk  
1/2 cup heavy cream  
1 pkg. (9 oz.) frozen artichoke hearts

Preheat oven to 450°F. Unwrap foil-wrapped frozen chicken and leave it on the foil wrapper. Place in foil-lined shallow baking pan and fold foil loosely over the top of the chicken, leaving the foil open at the ends so that heat can circulate. Roast in preheated oven as follows: 2 1/2 to 3 pounds, 1 hour, 20 minutes; 3 to 3 1/2 pounds, 1 hour, 45 minutes; 3 1/2 to 4 pounds, 2 hours.

Turn back foil and pour sherry over chicken, sprinkle with salt, pepper and herbs. Continue roasting with foil open 20 minutes longer. Transfer chicken to heated serving platter. Pour juices into measuring cup; add chicken broth to make 1 1/2 cups. Melt butter in saucepan; blend in flour. Stir in broth mixture and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Beat egg yolk with cream; stir into sauce and cook over low heat, stirring constantly for 1 minute. Pour into heated sauce boat. Garnish chicken with artichoke hearts prepared according to package directions.

## Christmas Seals Came from Denmark

Slightly newer than the Christmas card is the Christmas seal.

The Christmas seal was originated by a postal clerk, Einar Holboell, who ordered the first Christmas seals printed and sold at regular post offices in Denmark. While stamping letters and Christmas cards in 1909 in the post office in Copenhagen, the idea occurred to him. Why not have a special stamp printed for the many tuberculosis sufferers who need hospital treatment? The first year more than four million stamps were sold, yielding some 18,000 dollars.

The movement for adopting the stamp in the United States was greatly strengthened through the efforts of Miss Emily Bissell of Wilmington, Delaware. She designed the first Christmas seal herself. It had a half wreath of holly and a cross, with "Merry Christmas" in the center and "Happy New Year" at the bottom.

2 cups prepared mince-meat or 1-9oz. pkg.  
2 cups thinly sliced pared tart apples  
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 recipe plain pastry  
Combine prepared mincemeat with apples, lemon peel and lemon juice. Line 8-inch pie plate with pastry; pour in filling. Cut design or use a fork on upper crust. Sprinkle with sugar, and bake in hot oven (400°) about 35 minutes. This pie is delicious served warm.



There are certain precautions that homemakers should be aware of if they receive a poinsettia for Christmas. They will last longer if they have plenty of light, kept in a cool place and given proper watering. You will enjoy your plant longer if it is kept away from radiators, TV sets or other sources of heat. A windowsill location often can furnish both light and cool temperature—provided it is not over a radiator.

Proper watering is necessary to prevent the leaves from dropping. The soil should be watered thoroughly until water runs from the bottom of the pot, then allowed to become rather dry before watering again.

**DOMINICAN HOLIDAY**

Christmas remains a religious holiday in the Dominican Republic. The Christmas dinner is enjoyed generally after the Christmas Eve midnight mass. Carols are sung in the streets.

Through trade and social relations with the United States, Santa Claus is becoming more popular, but the children continue to receive their presents on January 6, when gold, frankincense, and myrrh were traditionally given by the Wise Men.



For two large loaves you'll need: 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 cakes compressed yeast, 5 cups flour, 2 eggs beaten, 1 cup seedless raisins, 1/2 cup butter softened, 1/2 cup citron, 1/4 cup glazed cherries, 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 cup butter, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, Confectioner's frosting, nuts and candied fruit for trim.

Scald milk, add 1/2 cup sugar and the salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add crumbled yeast and mix thoroughly. Add one cup of flour and stir until smooth. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. Add the beaten eggs, softened butter, fruit and nutmeg and mix well. Add remainder of flour to make a dough stiff enough to knead. Knead until smooth and elastic. Allow to rise until double. Knead down and divide in two. Roll each half into a circle about 8 inches in diameter. Spread with softened butter and sugar. Make a crease down the center of the dough and fold over. Place in greased loaf pans and let rise until double in bulk. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees, for 30 to 40 minutes. Frost with confectioner's frosting and sprinkle with nuts or fruit.

Stollen will keep for a week at least. It can be cut in thin slices and toasted, or buttered and placed under the broiler until lightly browned.

**THE YULE LOG**



The yule log is an old and honored Christmas tradition. It has almost vanished from our holiday celebration.  
The Vikings introduced the yule log to Great Britain. They burned it to honor the God Thor. The custom was adopted by the English as part of the Christmas festivities.  
The very best log that could be found was brought into the house and placed in their large fireplace. The fire was lit and the servants of the house gathered with their master. The coming of Christmas was celebrated with much singing and celebrating.  
The custom of those days was to celebrate the holiday season twelve full days and the log burned the entire time.  
At the end of the twelve days any fragments of the log that remained were carefully collected to be used again the following year to kindle the new Yule log.

Form the dough in a ball and chill 3 to 4 hours. Roll on floured board to 1/8 inch thick. Cut with various shaped cookie cutters, bake on a greased cookie sheet. These are really good — Do shake some plain white sugar over some of them — yummy.

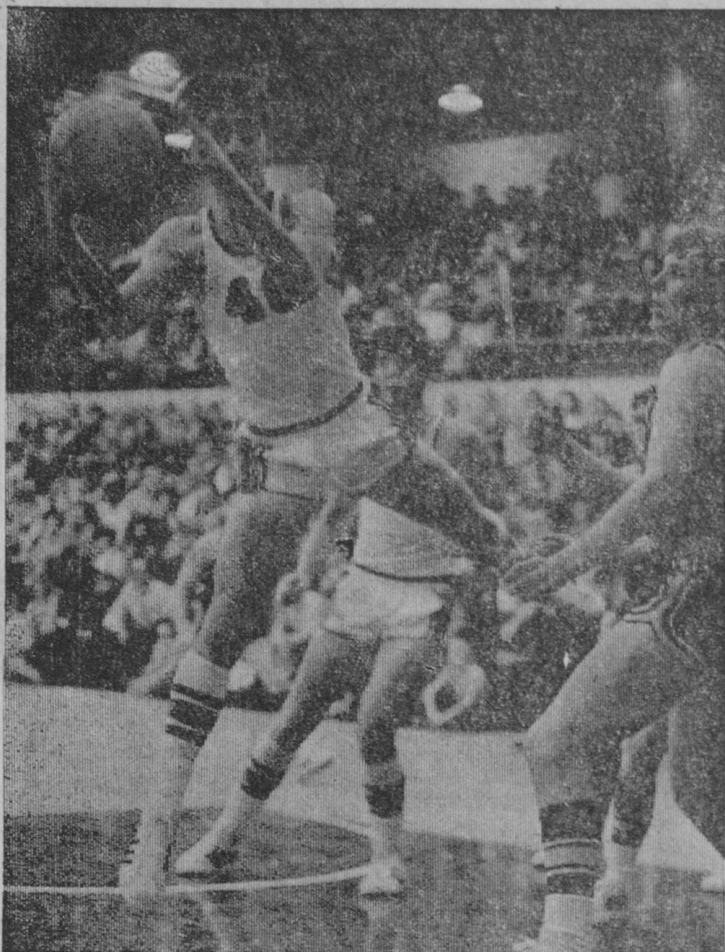

# Tawas Braves Open Season With Win Over Panthers

Tawas Area Braves opened the 1970-71 basketball season Friday night by handily defeating the Standish-Sterling Panthers, 83-51, to gain revenge for a football loss earlier this fall.

The Braves showed considerable depth in the opener with reserves playing much of the second half, but the young Panthers—lacking the manpower and experience of previous Central squads—did not present a real test of strength for the Tawas quintet. That will come this Friday night when the Braves play host to visiting Essexville Garber, which opened on a winning note against Pinconning.

Tawas Area started off slowly in the first quarter but held an 18-15 margin at the buzzer. The Braves then moved far out in front with a 26-13 second quarter spurge. The Braves continued to add to their lead in the third quarter, outscoring the Panthers, 18-7. With reserves playing most of the fourth period, the Braves of Coach Jim Papenfus nailed down their first victory of the season with a 21-16 fourth quarter count.

Tawas Area had four players in double figures paced by Craig Wilkins with 19 points and 14 points by Tim Fox. Bob Towns followed with 13 points and Gary Libka contributed 12.

Shane Walker was scoring leader for the losers with 18 points.

Standish-Sterling won the preliminary game when the Little Panthers overcame a 27-20 half-time deficit by outscoring the Junior Braves, 14-8, in the third quarter and 20-7 in the fourth quarter.

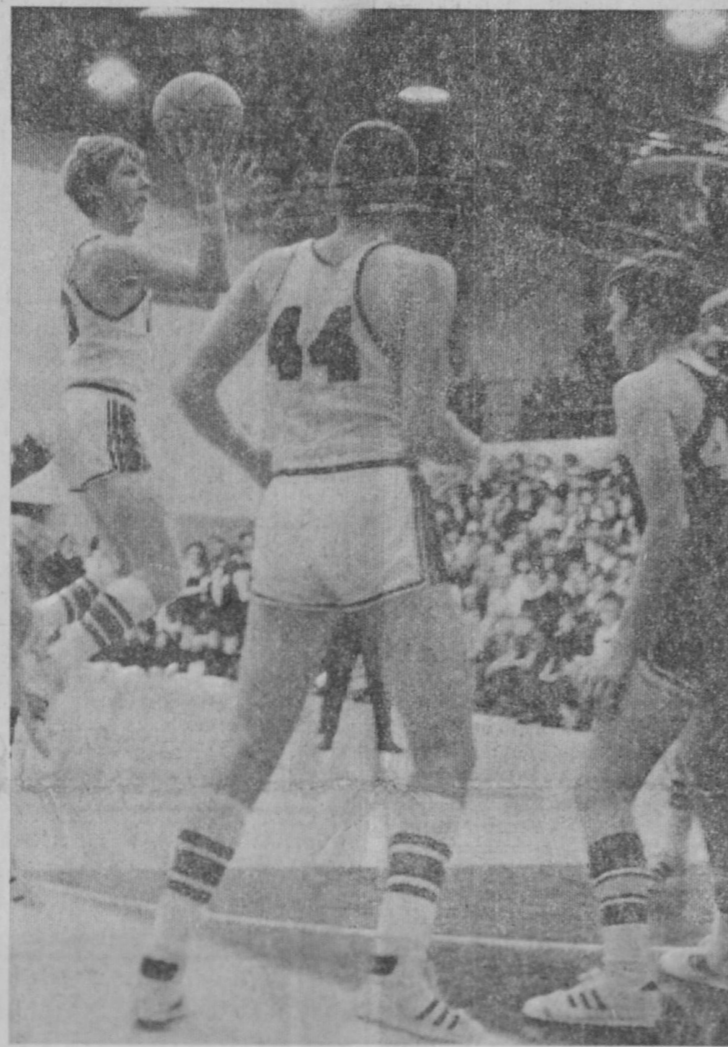

Other action in the Northern B Conference saw Carrollton, last year's championship squad, defeat Gladwin, 71-43; Ogemaw Heights defeated Oscoda, 76-64.

The new Card coach, Mrs. Alan Meean (Sheryl DeShano), was excited about the performance of her girls, but she knows they will have a lot tougher games ahead.

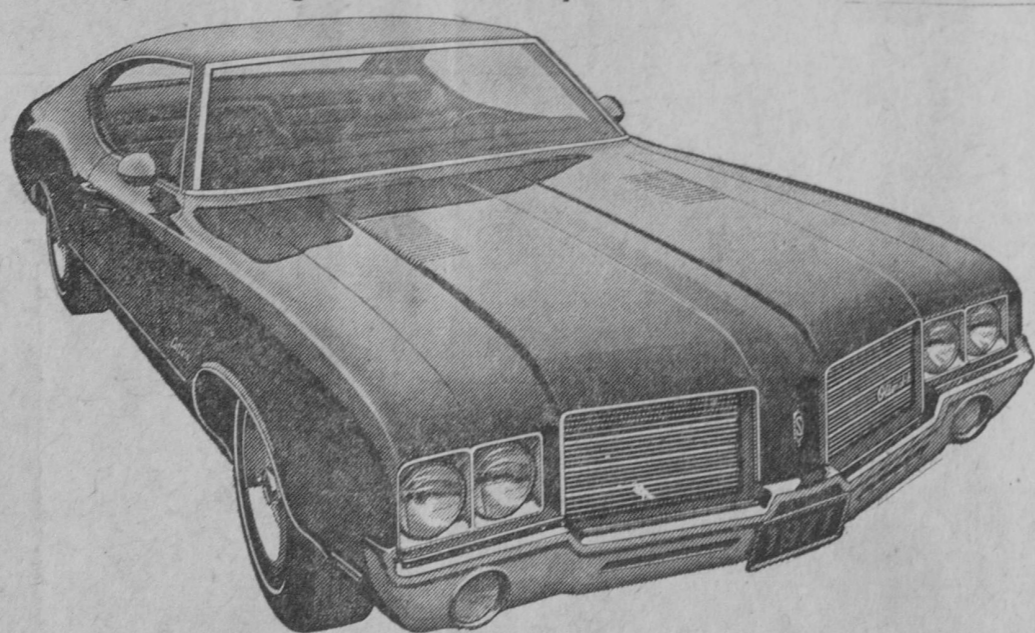

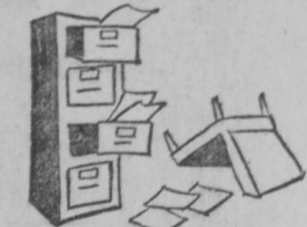

Centuries ago, Romans decorated their homes, public buildings, and temples on festive occasions, and we have followed this ancient custom. In most communities, at Christmas there are beautifully decorated store windows, often depicting the holiday scenes.

 Weeks before Christmas a giant Christmas tree is set up with much ceremony in the center of Rockefeller Plaza, decorated with huge colored baubles, and the lighting of the tree is the official opening of the Christmas season. The entire length of Park Avenue is lined with its own lighted Christmas trees, and it is a beautiful sight in snow. Many New York skyscrapers, always dramatic against the night sky, are also aglow with red and green lights in honor of the occasion.  
 While New York goes all out for brilliant, sophisticated Christmas emphasizing luxury with a touch of frivolity, other cities celebrate in their way. In some where traffic hazards do not prevent, the downtown streets are festooned with colored lights, bells, stars, candles, and other yuletide emblems.  
 Many American cities are famed for their distinctive street decorations, which visitors often drive many miles to see. For instance, since 1920, the city of Fresno, California, has featured its Christmas Tree Lane. This is slightly less than 2 miles in length and is said to be the longest in our country. The project began on a small scale, but by 1930 the great cedars lining Van Ness Avenue had been lighted with colored bulbs for a quarter of a mile. Then, in 1959, more than 300 stately trees had been festooned with lights, and over 121,000 people visited the unusual scene.

### Special Cachet for Apollo 14

Manned Spacecraft Recovery Forces of the United States Navy will provide commemorative cachet and cancellation services for the upcoming Apollo 14 manned flight to the moon.  
 Philatelic coordinators designated for the Atlantic and Pacific Fleet Recovery Forces (Task Force 140 and 130) will receive all such covers and make distribution to assigned recovery ships.  
 To permit adequate time for handling of covers, collectors should send stamped, self-addressed envelopes to the appropriate coordinator at least three weeks prior to the scheduled launch of Apollo 14. Covers should be received prior to January 8.  
 In accordance with United States postal regulations, only United States postage may be used on covers submitted. Postage stamps of other countries or the United Nations cannot be used. Cash, money orders or checks in lieu of postage cannot be accepted. It is requested that collectors furnish standard size covers, 3 5/8 inches by 6 1/2 inches, with a filer inserted to simplify handling.  
 Due to the popularity of the cancellation service and the limited postal facilities on recovery ships, each recovery force coordinator will accept a maximum of two covers from an individual collector.  
 When more than the authorized number of covers is received, they will be returned unprocessed. Covers received too late for distribution to recovery force units will also be returned unprocessed.

Since the first Christmas Christians have followed the Star to the stable-grotto beneath the church of the Nativity, the traditional birthplace of Jesus of Nazareth in Bethlehem.  
 Bethlehem is even poorer than most people would believe. A recent visitor said "Wanderers fill the streets — anyone can see why Mary and Joseph found no room in the Inn."  
 Every Christmas, shepherds watching their flocks outside Bethlehem, had to be especially watchful that the sheep did not trap themselves in the barbed wire separating Jordan and Israel. Bethlehem, on the Jordanian side of the wire, has been sorely affected by the hostility and the uneasy truce. It is crowded with Arab refugees who formerly lived in Israel.  
 The effect of the conflict has been crippling of Bethlehem's chief industry; the making and selling of objects of piety from olive wood, Dead sea stone and mother of pearl. Except at Christmas, pilgrims are so few that the profit had gone from the business.  
 On Christmas eve, however, the dusty city takes on new life. Christmas diplomats living in divided Jerusalem expect to be escorted to the little town over the unusual highway through no-man's land. Pilgrims from the Israel side pass through the Mandelbaum Gate.  
 Rich and poor pilgrims worship together in the fourth century church of the Nativity. There is a high mass, during which the image of the Christ Child is carried from the church through the Mandelbaum Gate.  
 The ceremonies come to a climax before three adjacent shrines. The Altars of the Nativity, The Wise Men and the Manger. Outside, Christians from many lands will sing, as angels sang nearly 2,000 years ago, "Glory To God In The Highest", and on earth peace and good will toward men.

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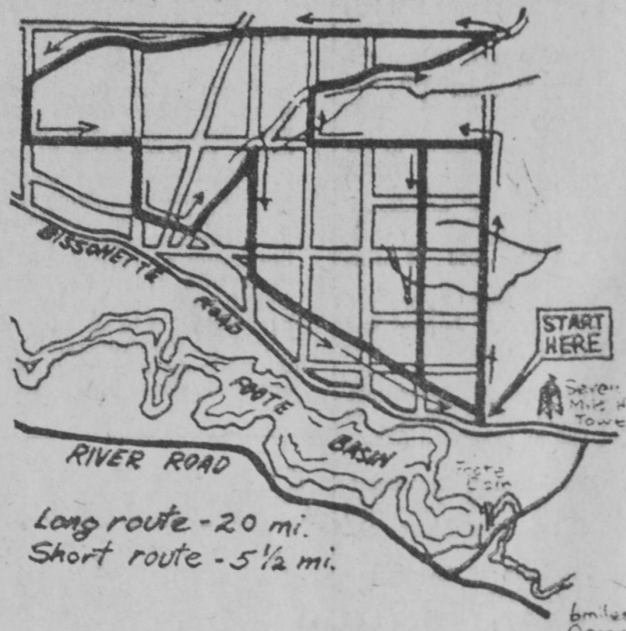

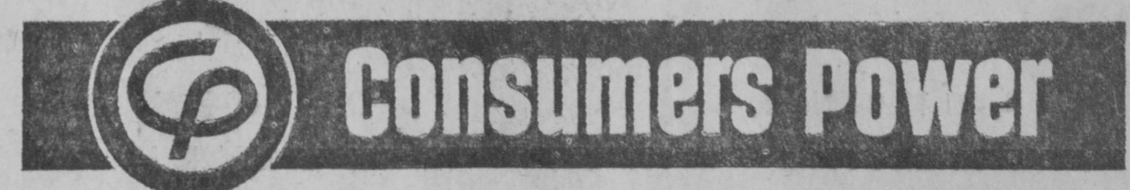

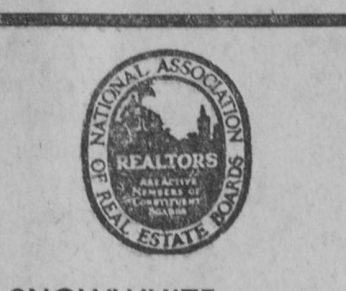

## Some handy information about new phone rates within Michigan.

They're simpler. With the chart below, for instance, you can figure out what it will cost to call any number in the state. Any number outside of your local calling area.

Four things determine what you pay: How far you call within Michigan. How long you talk. Whether an operator calls the number or you dial it yourself. The time and day.

And the rates are more fair. Look at the chart again. Notice that you're now charged for "each" minute you use the phone. (Before, you'd pay for no less than 3 minutes. Whether you used them all or not.)

Also notice that you're given discounts for dialing direct rather than using an operator.

Both of these changes were made for one reason. People should only be asked to pay for what they use. Fair? Fair.
